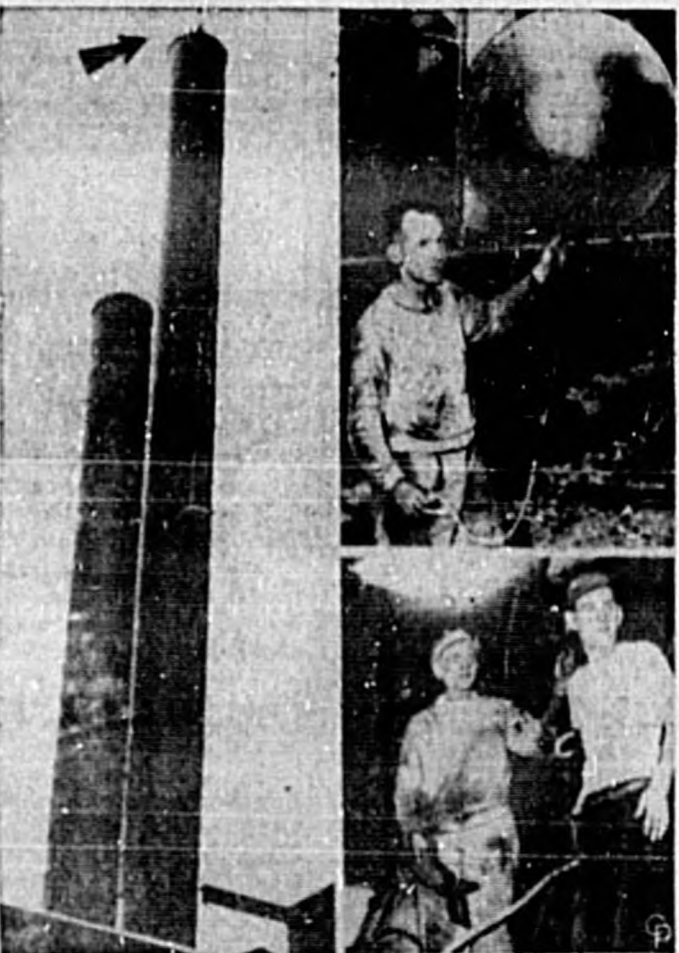

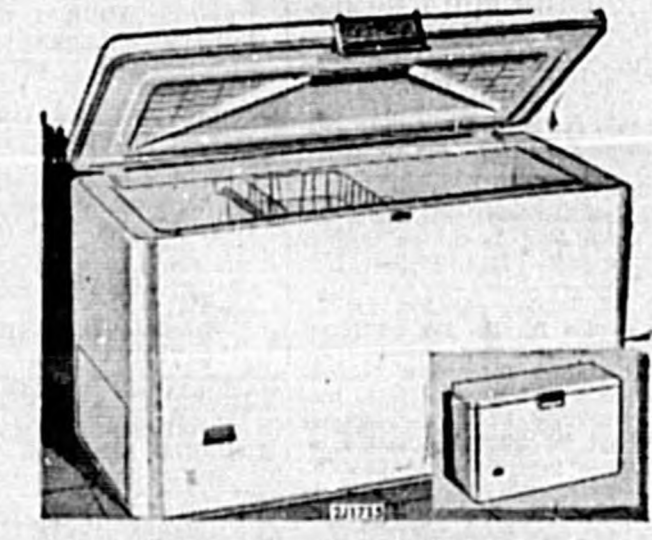

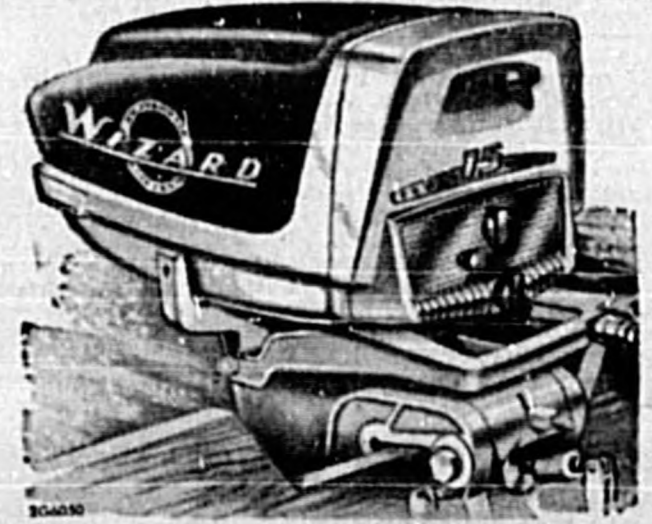

No Outside Help Needed To Get Birth Certificate

"It only costs one dollar, and you don't need any outside help to get a certified copy of a birth certificate."

So said Everett H. Williams, Director of the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Florida State Board of Health, in commenting recently on the efforts of an out-of-state organization to sell genuine Florida birth certificates for two dollars to untrained persons.

Williams said it had come to his attention that a group using an official sounding, though not official, address in Washington, D.C., is calling names of parents of new-born babies from the newspapers, and sending them an official looking application form, instructing them in curt terms to return the application with a two dollar fee within five days to the Washington address. The firm then sends one dollar of the fee to the bureau of vital statistics in the state where the baby is born, with an official application for a birth certificate, which the state then sends to the parents.

It is not believed that any law or postal regulation actually has been broken, since the parents do receive what they applied for, a birth certificate for the child. Williams went on to point out, however, that such applicants are just wasting a dollar, since only one dollar is required for a birth certificate in the state of Florida.

1,000 U. S. Marines Land In Lebanon Today

Force Is With 6th Fleet

A force of 1,000 Marines of the U.S. 6th Fleet landed today in Beirut, Lebanon, on shore leave that pointed up American declarations that the United States could put troops into the straitened Jordan within a few days if necessary.

United Press Correspondent Larry Collins, with the 6th Fleet, radioed the men had been put ashore as part of the American move to show the flag in the troubled Middle East. Vice Adm. Charles R. Cat Brown said the action was carried out under orders from "higher up."

The landing was a friendly one—the Marines were merely paying a visit—but they were an important part of the 1,800-man Marine landing force who entered the eastern part of the Mediterranean this week with powerful carriers.

The Marines reached Beirut a few hours after Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker said the United States could move troops into Jordan in a "matter of days-not weeks or months."

Lebanon is only a few miles from Jordan, but is separated from Jordan by Syria and Israel.

Brucker, speaking on a television program last night, said "emphatically yes" when asked if he thinks President Eisenhower is ready to invade his Middle East military "shield" doctrine to deter Communist aggression in the Middle East.

No Answer on Loan
Jordan last week withheld temporarily its answer to a U.S. offer of \$10 million dollars in aid. It rejected Soviet charges the U.S. is interfering in Jordan's affairs.

It was considered possible King Hussein himself might make known his decision at a news conference he called for later in the day.

The decision was complicated by the Soviet Foreign Ministry's declaration Monday night that "imperialist intrigue" is trying to deprive Jordan's people of their independence "by rendering promises of financial and other help."

The Soviet declaration singled out the United States, Iraq and Israel.

Senator McCarthy Reported Improved
WASHINGTON — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy was reported "somewhat improved" today in his battle with serious illness at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

A hospital spokesman said the 47-year-old Wisconsin Republican was "seriously ill" with acute hepatitis—an inflammation of the liver.

However, McCarthy's condition was reported "slightly improved" Monday afternoon, and his attractive wife Jean said Monday night after visiting him that he "seemed to feel better" and was resting comfortably.

She said the hospital's commander, Capt. E. C. Kenny, reported he was "quite pleased with the progress" McCarthy is making.

Rotarians Hear Interesting Talk On Air Jet Noises

Sanford Rotarians were briefed on the problems and effects of air jet noises at their regular weekly meeting yesterday noon by Dr. Gordon K. Becker, a flight surgeon attached to Heavy Attack Wing One at the Sanford Naval Air Station. Dr. Becker, in a talk that was said to be "interesting, informative and understandable by any civilian" according to Dr. Charles L. Persons, president of the local club, mentioned the three primary sources of noise incident to jet aircraft engines; that occurring at the intake at the front of the engine; the increase in noise in the housing where the compressor blades mix with the fuel and burn off, and, finally, at the rear of the engine when the exhaust, a high velocity stream of air, bounces through the atmosphere at supersonic speed.

Using a blackboard to diagram his talk, Dr. Becker held the interest of his hearers and explained in detail the methods employed in preventing hearing damage to the men working with the jet engines. He showed small ear plugs and a helmet which he stated had proven very helpful in keeping down "hearing loss." In a question and answer period at the close of his talk, one of his listeners asked if the Navy would sell the ear plugs at cost to local citizens, the doctor's answer was lost in a burst of laughter.

The speaker was presented by Charlie Morrison, program chairman for the day. Morrison, with Harry Kudell at the piano, led the club singing. Gordon Bradley offered the invocation.

Unknown Object Seen Streaking Over Channel

LONDON — A Royal Air Force radar station Monday night spotted an "unidentified object" streaking over the English Channel so swiftly that two of Britain's fastest jet fighters could not intercept it.

It was the second unexplained sighting in three weeks. A London newspaper suggested the object might be a new type Russian bomber.

The Air Ministry announced today only that "one of our radar screens" sighted the object travelling due west near St. Margate's Bay, about 70 miles southeast of London at the bottleneck leading from the North Sea into the English Channel.

Two Javelin fighters were dispatched from Orford RAF base to investigate but did not make contact," the announcement said.

Otham is a major British fighter base halfway between London and Southampton and lies 103 miles northwest of the reported sighting area. The twin-jet Javelins mentioned are capable of well over 700 miles an hour.

Missile Veers Off Course; Destroyed

WASHINGTON — The Army Jupiter missile, given its second test last Friday, veered off course and had to be destroyed over the Atlantic.

The big missile — designed to have a 1,500 mile range — was fired while Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson looked on at the Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., testing center.

Pentagon sources disclosed Monday night that the Jupiter roared to an altitude of about 16 miles and began to tilt from a vertical toward a horizontal position. They said it was destroyed because it might have fallen into the Atlantic about 40 miles from the launching point.

The Army Jupiter is in competition with the Air Force Thor to become this country's intermediate range ballistic missile.

Southern Texas In Grave Danger From Floodwaters

DALLAS, Tex. — Floodwaters churned down at least 11 major rivers today. Their fury was concentrated on the southern part of Texas and reached into Louisiana.

Texas' violent weather has claimed 17 lives in 11 days. President Eisenhower has declared the huge sector of Texas racked by floods a major disaster area.

Besides the floodwaters, a new flurry of tornadoes that have accompanied the flood-spawning rains, flicked over a wide area of Texas Monday.

Wharton and Bay City, about 45 miles from Houston near the Gulf of Mexico, were in grave danger today from the swollen Colorado River. Major overflowing was expected in the lowlands around the two cities, late today.

Levee May Overflow
A levee protects Bay City, but it would overflow at 44 feet. The Colorado was expected to crest there at from 43 to 45 feet today.

President Eisenhower wired Gov. Price Daniel Monday expressing his "deep concern" with the "hardship and suffering" caused by the floods.

Daniel had requested federal aid. The declaration of Texas as a major disaster area will enable the allocation of federal funds to the stricken area. The President did not mention the amount of money which would be forthcoming.

Three R's Are Still Taught To Tune Of Hickory Stick In Some Schools

 WASHINGTON — The three R's can still be taught to the tune of a hickory stick in three-fourths of the nation's schools.

That is the surprise finding of a nationwide survey of school discipline just completed by the National Education Assn.

The survey also showed teachers generally are far less disturbed about behavior of today's school children than some outsiders who think juvenile delinquency runs rampant in the classroom. More than 90 per cent of the teachers rated their students "well behaved."

The NEA research division sent questionnaires to 10,000 teachers selected by the "random sample" method to provide a representative cross-section of the nation's more than one million public school teachers.

Nearly half the teachers said they personally had authority to administer whippings to unruly pupils if they considered it necessary. And 75 per cent said the principal of their school had such authority.

The NEA did not ask right out how extensively corporal punishment is actually used. But it learned through a roundabout question that most teachers con-

sider "spanking rights" a necessary feature of running an orderly classroom.

To the question, "Do you think classroom teachers should be allowed to administer corporal punishment to pupils in elementary-school grades?" 77 per cent of the teachers replied yes. Two-thirds also held out for spanking rights in junior high school.

Seeking to find whether "blackboard jungle" conditions prevail in many schools, the questionnaire asked whether teachers had been subjected during the past year to any "act of physical violence" by a student.

Sixteen teachers out of every 1,000 said they personally had experienced such an act. Another 11 per cent said they knew of a violent attack on another teacher in their school.

Analysis of replies by type of school district showed the highest incidence of serious misbehavior, including attacks on teachers, in congested city areas.

The number of teachers reporting their students "exceptionally well behaved" was highest in suburban school districts where living conditions were rated "above average" or "very good."

Next to poverty and generally poor environment in city slums, teachers listed as main causes of pupil misbehavior "irresponsible parents," "broken homes" and "inadequate parental supervision" due to mothers with jobs keeping them away from home.

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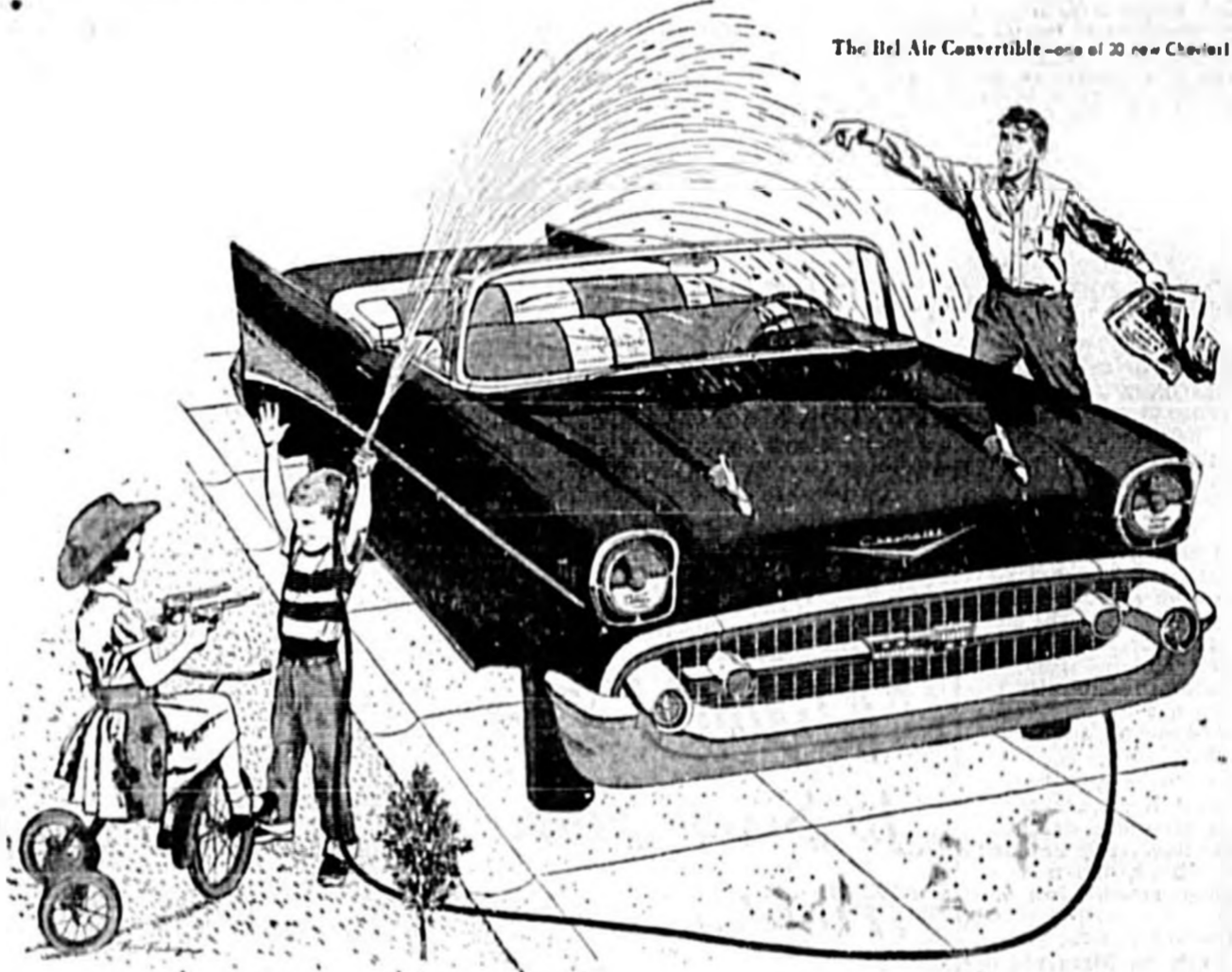

A foothill town lived in fear of destruction. Every summer, when the mountain snows melted, flash floods inundated the town. Bridges collapsed; houses were swept away; people drowned.

The townspeople got together to end this threat. They raised money and hired experts to construct a scheme of protection. This consisted of a series of dams and channels to trap the floodwaters upstream and divert them around the town. Three floodgates controlled the system. By turns the townspeople were to watch and work the floodgates.

For a time they did. Then, one after another, they found excuses. Their jobs were pressing; they didn't have time; they put it off or forgot about it. The gates remain unguarded.

One night a flash flood swept down the mountainside and wiped out the town. The U. S. polio story is not unlike the story of this town. For years we lived under the shadow of polio paralysis. We spent time and money to find a preventative. Now that we have it — the Salk Vaccine — we neglect it. Only one polio-susceptible person in ten properly vaccinated. The polio season is upon us and once more we tremble in fear of epidemics.

If we are to escape them, over 50 million Americans must be vaccinated. It takes three properly spaced Salk shots to set up maximum immunity. If you are under 40, don't wait till disaster strikes. Vaccinate at the earliest opportunity.

'Modern Republicanism' Scrap

WASHINGTON — One of the questions now being debated around in Republican circles is: How will the scrap over "modern Republicanism" affect the future of Vice President Richard M. Nixon?

Some of his fellow Republicans in Congress depict him as a man treading a path of caution. They view him as an administration agent presiding for action on programs which cause no significant rift in the party. They also see him as one who is not eager to join the debate over "modern Republicanism."

During more than four years as vice president Nixon has seldom strayed in his public statements from policy lines set by President Eisenhower. But he has made no major policy speech since last December.

Care's Seems Set

It is a safe bet Nixon will do nothing to separate himself from the policies of the administration. But some of his friends doubt he is enthusiastic about use of labels like "modern" and "up to date" which stir resentment among Republican conservatives.

They believe the Nixon approach would be to spell out his program on a specific issue and fight for it without suggesting there are two kinds of Republicanism dwelling in "modern"

and potential challenger for the 1960 presidential nomination. Knowland seems to be drifting steadily toward a position of opposition to the administration. He has been a frequent policy when administration foreign policy whenever he thought the executive branch was taking too soft a line toward international Communism. More recently he has thrown more punches at the administration's domestic policy.

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School Of Experience

Unlike the lower animals, man has a racial memory that functions above the level of instinct. Men do learn from history, though the hardest lessons often go unlearned. Men do profit to some extent by the mistake of past generations. Men do profit, though not always as much as they might, by the accumulated wisdom of the ages. If it were not so, we might still be existing as our stone age forebears did.

Despite all this, it is nevertheless true that each generation must learn certain things for itself, and that each young person must learn certain things for himself. The best training and education in the world cannot entirely substitute for what is learned in the school of experience. Young people simply cannot reach adulthood without stubbing their toes and bloodying their noses on some of the hard facts of human experience.

This is one of the most difficult things for a parent to accept. How often one hears a father advise his son to take this or that course of action, winding up with the supposedly clinching argument, "I know that it is the thing to do, because I went through it all when I was your age." And how many times one then sees the son, after nodding his head in seeming agreement, proceed in the way experience says will lead to trouble. It takes a little moral stamina on such occasions for the father to refrain from saying, "I told you so."

Parents have an obligation to teach, to admonish to exercise reasonable discipline — above all, to set a good example. But beyond that they cannot go. They cannot, in short, live their children's lives for them. Perhaps it is just as well. Swimming against the current toughens the muscle of mind and spirit for maturity.

Good Philosophy

Christopher Morley, the American novelist, essayist and poet who died recently, was a man with a rare touch for the apt and penetrating phrase. Many of the things he said will be long remembered because they had a proverb quality about them; they were said in such a way that one enjoys repeating them.

One of Morley's most striking characteristics was his refusal to be dull, or to think along prescribed and conventional lines. "Nothing ages people like not thinking," he once wrote. And he advocated the kind of thinking that prods and pries, that gets an idea from different angles, that turns over accepted notions to see whether they are worth accepting.

In one of his famous columns in the Saturday Review, then known as the Saturday Review of Literature, Morley wrote: "Read everyday, something no one else is reading. Think, everyday, something no one else is thinking. Do everyday, something no one else would do. It is a bad for the mind to always be part of a unanimity."

This philosophy could be carried to an absurd extreme, yet there is a lot of merit in it. Too many of us allow our minds to plod always along the same road, until they have worn a track so deep that they cannot escape it. By doing that we miss the freshness and beauty of the surrounding countryside, much of the adventure of traveling an occasional narrow path to the top of the hill from which can be seen some of the vast unexplored territory of the mind.

New Look
Washington insiders report that a "new look" United States military program will get under way soon. It will mean more emphasis on missiles: A cut in Army strength by one or two divisions and a 300,000-man cut in the armed forces over the next three or four years.

Bad News
Paris expects the French taxpayer to get some bad news tonight when Premier Guy Mollet makes a nation-wide broadcast on the financial situation. The government is trying to find ways of slashing expenditures by about 718 million dollars in order to reduce a threatened 3 billion dollar deficit in the 1957 budget. Mollet may announce increased taxes on higher incomes, higher corporation taxes, and higher sales taxes on such "luxuries" items as television and radio sets.

Fading
Prospects for congressional action on a civil rights bill are fading fast. Southern opponents are fighting a grim delaying action. Now they have come up with a new, tough argument — they charge that the administration bill would take away the right to jury trial in many civil rights cases.

Blow-Up
Don't be surprised if there is an anti-British blow-up soon on Malta, the tiny Mediterranean island which was a vital bastion in World War II. It won't be aimed against British rule, Malta wants to be incorporated into the United Kingdom, like Northern Ireland. It would be represented in Parliament. The British government is agreeable to that. But Maltese Prime Minister Dom Mintoff demands that all Maltese get the same socialized medicine, unemployment and other social benefits that Britons do. That would cost a lot of money.

New Entrant
Tom Flynn, head of the Eastern Conference of Teamsters, is being named as a new possibility to succeed embattled Dave Beck as president of the nation's largest union, Washington hears that union secretary-treasurer John English and James R. Hoffa, who was regarded as Beck's crown prince until his indictment for bribery, feel Flynn would be acceptable in the No. 1 post.

Angling
Soviet Russia is angling for an invitation to one of its top leaders to visit Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. The Russians say it would be nice if a top-ranking man went to Bonn to sign the Russo-German trade agreement which is to be negotiated sometime in May. The real reason; they are worried over the prospect that the West German army will get tactical atomic weapons and they fear that the Western Allies may back Adenauer in a new drive for German unification.

Latest Method Of Installing Formica In Home

Formica is the inspiration for new tricks in interior decoration — thanks to newly discovered adhesives and techniques.

The use of Formica on the walls is not new, but the latest methods of installation open up a new realm of ideas for its use.

Formerly the only recommended method of installation was to veneer the Formica sheet to plywood and then attach the entire slab to the wall. This meant that part of the work had to be done in a shop equipped for veneering.

Now the Formica sheet can be installed directly to the existing wall surface. This has been made possible through the development of a new Formica adhesive for on-the-job installations.

Today, with this simplified, faster method, home owners can look to this practical and attractive material as a decorative element in home design.

The use of Formica is no longer limited to institutional buildings and counter tops. Now it can be tilted on edge and glued to the wall to achieve a number of unusual and modern decorative effects.

Formica can be applied to plaster wall surfaces, including rough coat plaster which has been steel troweled. It also adheres to plywood, masonite or poured concrete.

In new construction the simplest, most economical and satisfactory base is to nail 1/2-inch plywood directly to the studs.

In old construction, where the base has deteriorated, it is best to cover the existing base with 1/2-inch plywood before installing the Formica.

A number of interesting patterns can be created with Formica blocks and planks. Where seams are exposed, new color-blended Formica moldings are available.

Many People Prefer Hardwood Flooring

Many home owners prefer hardwood flooring to cement or tile, because of its richness and beauty.

When adding another room, or re-doing existing floors, it is wise to consider the type of flooring and estimate the cost.

To figure the number of feet of hardwood flooring needed for a room: find the number of square feet of floor space to be covered and add the following percentages depending on the face width of the flooring:

For the popular standard face width of 4 1/4 inches, add 31.13 per cent; for 1 1/2 inch widths, add 50 per cent; for 2-inch widths, add 37.2 per cent.

An additional 3 to 5 per cent should be tacked on to the total to allow customary waste in cutting and fitting.

Hardwood flooring should never be laid until all plaster and cement work are thoroughly dry and all woodwork and trim is installed.

The last step in building is the laying and finishing of hardwood floors.

Roof Covering
Now's the time to do something about a shabby, leaky, old roof! No other part of a house is more likely to cause serious trouble if it is left unattended.

If a roof is in really bad condition, the only safe remedy is a new roof covering. Asbestos-cement shingles have proved especially durable. They cannot burn, will not rot and stay on, even in high winds.

Roofing shingles are made in a variety of styles, including the strip type which gives the coverage of several individual shingles. Among the old standbys are hexagonal and Dutch lap patterns.

A new addition to this popular shingle family is a large size, self-aligning unit known as raph design. It is sold under various brand names, but can be identified by its size, which is 24 inches wide by 12 inches deep. They are easy to apply.

Carpet In Home Aid To Easy Housekeeping

Carpet's quieting effect has extra meaning during the summer when children are home from school, and the windows are open to let in street noises. A carpet or rug absorbs the higher level of sound—a boon in hot weather, when nerves are apt to be jumpy.

Carpet is an aid to easy housekeeping, too, important during the "lazy" months. Here are some tips for simple care:

"When windows are open, dust has a chance to enter and be blown around the room on furniture and books. With carpet, any dust that settles is held lightly on the surface and cannot circulate. Vacuum when convenient, particularly under open windows. The indoor-outdoor traffic dur-

ing the summer could mean constant tracking through the house except for carpet at the entrance, which catches outdoor soil at the source. Carpet-sweep or vacuum this area more frequently. The rest of the house will be spared.

The back-breaking labor of beating a rug is not only unnecessary, but even harmful to the fabric. The deep suction of modern cleaning appliances does the job easily and thoroughly.

If it is time for a professional cleaning, summer is the ideal season. Send the rugs out while you are on vacation, and have them like new on return. If the cleaning is done at home, fresh air will speed up the drying process. Fast drying is a secret of success. Use fans to aid the process if necessary, and do not walk on the rug until dry.

Any time of the year, the same rules for carpet care hold true: a thorough vacuuming once a week, a once-over with sweeper or vacuum daily or when necessary, and professional cleaning periodically.

"The Clean Up Program lowers the crime rate in several important ways," Chief Williams said. PLACEMENT OF THE HOUSE
A little thought in the placement of the house can save on equipment and operating costs. For example: a minimum amount of windows on the west side is important to reduce cooling loads.

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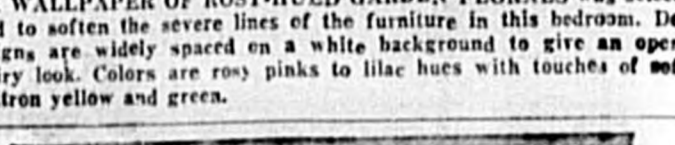
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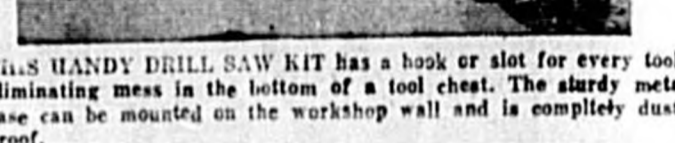

Aids In Estimating Paint Needs

With the advent of Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up time, you're probably planning to wield a brush or roller. To save time, money, and paint, you should have an accurate idea of the paint you'll need.

The first figures to remember are the average spreading rates for paint:

1 gallon covers approximately 500 square feet, 1 quart covers approximately 125 square feet, 1 pint covers approximately 65 square feet, 1/2 pint covers approximately 30 square feet, 1/4 pint covers approximately 15 square feet.

More exact figures are indicated on each container.

To estimate the amount of gallonage required for a room, you multiply the length of the room by the height and double the total. Then you multiply the width of the room by the height and that total is doubled. Your two totals added together are the area of all four walls. A window or door is not deducted unless it is greater than 100 square feet in size. If you have picture windows in your room or a greater number of windows and doors than average, you should make a deduction. For example, if your living room has four windows (15 square feet each), two doors (18 square feet per, and a fire

1-Bathroom House Becoming Obsolete

The one-bathroom house is fast becoming obsolete. The majority of new homes have at least one-and-a-half bathrooms. Owners of older houses complain of lack of facilities.

Bathroom improvements not only add comfort to a house, but will increase its economic value!

A common headache... the bathroom bottleneck... can be corrected by adding a second complete bathroom. Installing a half-bath, or powder room, or by making the most of the existing bathing area by partitioning and adding fixtures.

The cost of adding extra plumbing can be reduced by careful planning. Locating an extra bath or powder room as near as possible to the master bath saves time and money. Putting facilities side by side, or placing them above or under each other reduces the cost of long runs of pipe.

In a one-story house, savings can be had by installing a powder room near the laundry room, bathroom, or other plumbing. In a two-story house, it's more economical to put a second full bathroom alongside, below or above the master bathroom.

In a new home, the plumbing can be "roughed-in" in such a way that additional fixtures can be installed easily and economically whenever the family needs them.

Where lack of space is a problem, careful selection of fixtures will provide a complete bathroom in small areas such as: alcoves, back-to-back closets, or under a staircase.

A half-bathroom or powder room should be installed near centers of heaviest traffic flow in the house. A lavatory designed to fit a corner will save space and add a unique style note to the powder room.

By building partitions in the existing bathroom, the full usefulness of each fixture can be exploited.

Use Containers Not Gutter Says City Manager

Use trash containers, not gutters, for litter disposal. City Manager Warren E. Knowles urged today in asking for support of the city-wide Clean Up - Fix Up campaign.

"Gutters were designed to drain water and are not waste receptacles," the Commissioner added. "Remember, trash that's thrown in gutters and in the street is money—your money and mine—because trash in our streets means higher tax allocations for street cleaning and tower stoppage."

"Nothing makes us bad an impression on visitors to our city as debris-laden streets," City Manager Knowles pointed out. Let's show our civic pride. Help us keep Sanford streets clean. Start during Clean Up Week and make it a year-round resolution.

Protect Children; Provide Play Yard

During Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up time, change your children's favorite play area from street to yard as a major contribution to their safety and your peace of mind.

A clean, attractive yard is inviting even to an adventuresome three-year-old, and by an all-out family attack, even a barren area can be transformed into a lovely natural setting.

Rake up leaves, stones, sticks and general rubbish and then sow grass seed, put in annuals. In just a few weeks your yard will have a pleasing appearance, and be ready for both organized and spontaneous play.

There are numerous formal games that can be organized in your yard.

A croquet course can be laid out anywhere. This favorite lawn game is now in style and is enjoyed by old and young, skilled and novices. For a new twist, play it with half the players using croquet equipment and the other half using golf balls and putters.

A driveway or patio can be utilized for shuffleboard, requiring a hard surface about six feet wide and 43 feet long.

Three shoes or the easier ring toss played with seven rings of varying size made of rope or light metal are good lawn games.

Teenagers are attached to badminton and its fast and furious elements. Volley ball, almost limitless in number of players, is good neighborhood fun. A variation that is most enjoyable is "curtain ball." A heavy curtain or a blanket is substituted for the net. The teams can't see each other and the opponent never knows where the ball will come over. Still another version of this popular game is balloon for the volley ball. Another game using volley ball rules is aerial darts. Players use shuttle cocks instead of a volley ball and paddles, tennis or badminton racquets instead of hands.

Other game possibilities are outdoor bowling, deck tennis, basket ball shooting, plus the numerous ones that will be invented by your children.

A tent for the boys and a playhouse of discarded but freshly enameled furniture for the girls will keep the younger children amused.

If a carpet or rug is chosen for a summer house, where possibly dampness might occur, it is wise to choose a fiber that does not absorb moisture readily, such as nylon or acrilan, dyneel and to a lesser degree, rayon.

All of these fibers are mildew-proof, too. There are many inexpensive tufted versions that can add their gaiety and comfort to a summer residence.

Usually vacation houses are unheated, and a carpet helps to insulate a floor that becomes chilly on cool evenings. And in all homes, permanent or temporary, a carpet or rug quiets the extra sounds that come with stepped-up summer activity.

Accent Beauty Of Furnishings With New Light

Lighting is an important home decorating aid. The dollars invested in smart, new furnishings and decorating are wasted unless they're properly lighted.

Fixtures are necessary, since they provide a flexibility and range of lighting effects beyond the reach of portable lamps.

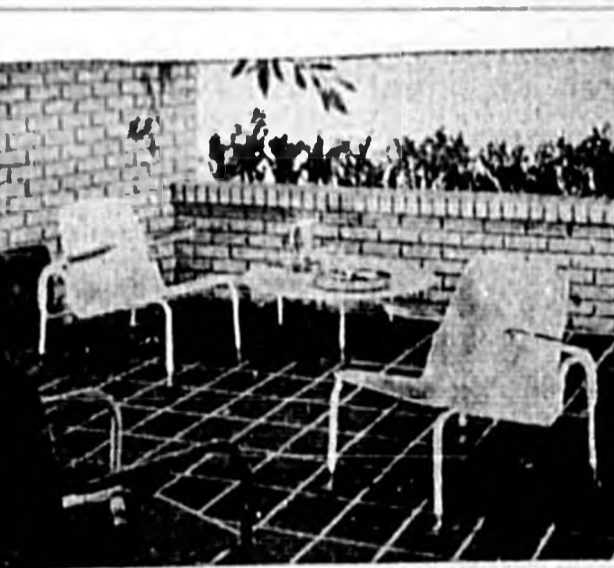

Edging Material

Such material could be coarse gravel, brick, cement blocks, concrete, planks or logs — or whatever natural materials is appropriate to your locality. The more simple the edging you use, the more beautiful will be the overall effect.

Inset your edging to lawn level for the greatest convenience. In this way it serves as a wheel base for your lawn mower.

Make your edge path wide enough to be used as a walkway on rainy days, and deep enough to hold water and mulch in flower beds, and act as a barrier for grass roots.

place of 24 square feet, your total is 110 square feet which would save you almost a quart of paint.

Ceiling and floor are determined by simply multiplying length by width.

To determine the quantity of material which will be needed, you divide the total number of square feet in an area by the coverage the desired type of coating provides.

Cabinets and radiators are a special consideration. On cabinets, measure the front area and multiply by five while radiators require that you measure the front area and multiply by seven.

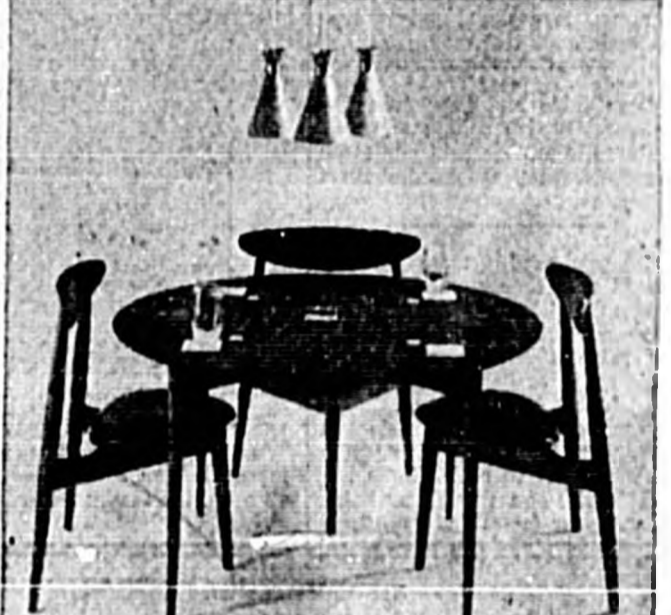
For the exterior you follow a similar procedure as you did inside. Multiply length by height, doubling that figure, then multiplying the width by height and by two and adding the two results. For example, a house 50' (length) x 40' (width) x 11' (height) would be estimated as follows:

14x50=700x2=1,400 square feet. 14x40=560x2=1,120 square feet. 1,400 plus 1,120 is 2,520 square feet. Gables or any triangular-shaped surface, measure the width and multiply by one-half of the height. This total should be added to the 2,520 square feet figure.

The range of coverage of type of finish recommended (indicated on the can), the number of coats, the type and condition of surface all must be considered.

With these ideas in mind, you will find paint estimating less of a mystery and as a result, you'll avoid waste and save money.

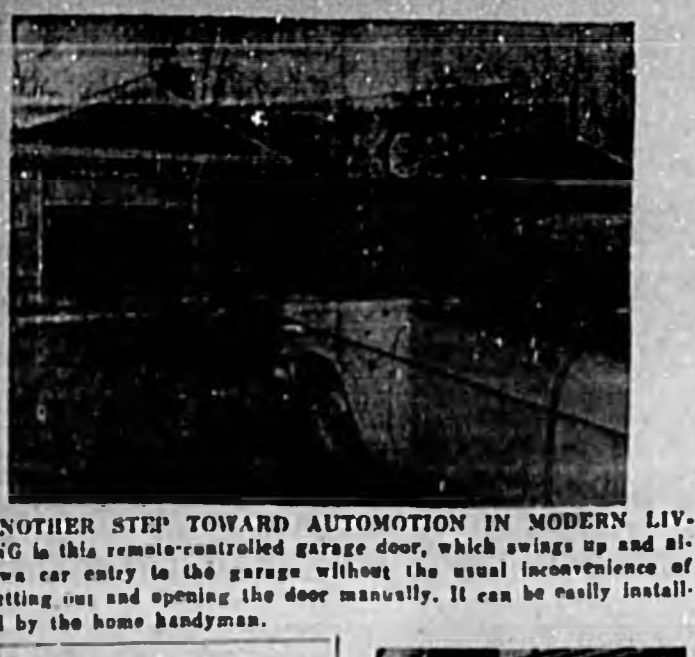

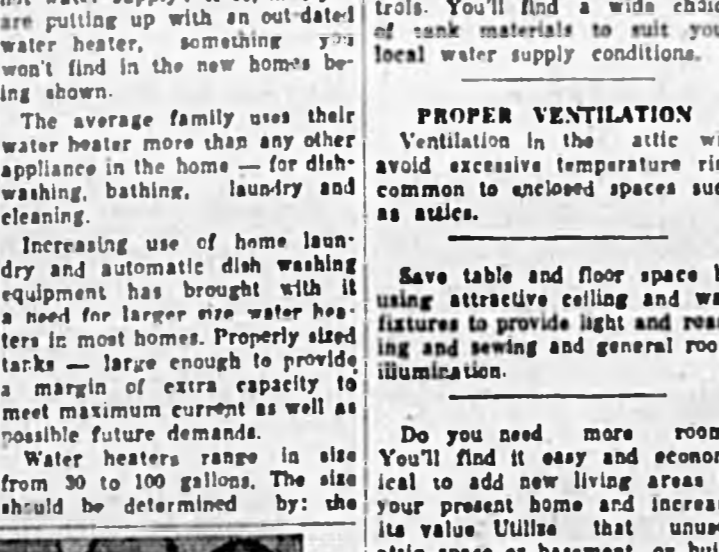

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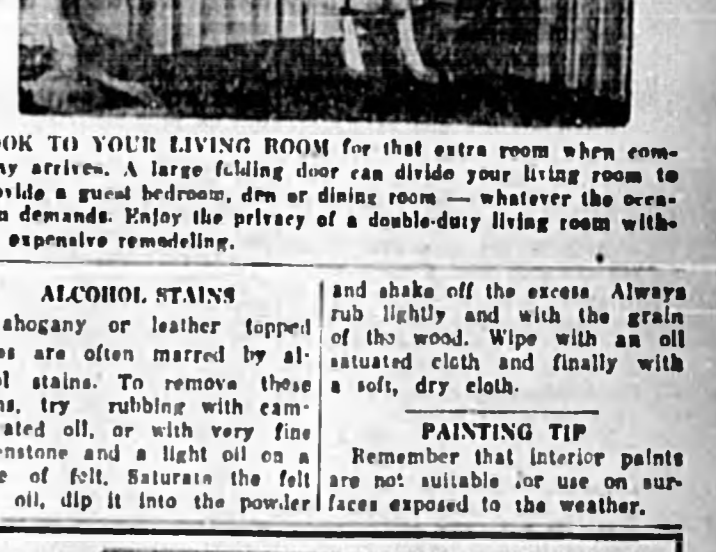
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Remodel Kitchen

It's easier than you think to have a real dream kitchen — using materials and equipment currently available.

Research indicates that about 25 million American homemakers are wasting time, energy and a lot of good humor working in outdated, inadequate kitchens, most of them more than 30 years old.

If you're planning to remodel your kitchen this year, you'll want your new kitchen to include these general working areas: a food preparation and storage center, cooking center, clean-up center, laundry, sewing center, family dining area, and homemaker's planning center. And each will have its own storage.

The overall appearance of your kitchen should be warm and inviting. New colored appliances can set the keynote for your favorite type of decor, either sophisticated modern or quaint Early American.

New pastel colored appliances can be used with a variety of color schemes. However, if you still prefer white appliances, you can add color to your kitchen in other ways.

The heart of your cooking center is your range. Choose the finest you can afford, and it will repay you with time saving and efficiency.

A modern exhaust hood above the range plays a functional role, helping to keep the rest of your kitchen clean.

The wall behind your range should be of some wall material that is easy to wipe clean.

Small utensils and condiments can be stored beside the range in handy shallow cabinets.

Base cabinets in the cooking center should be planned for convenient storage — a drawer file for saucepan lids; a heavy wood-pull-out shelf that doubles as a chopping block; a place to set hot casseroles and roasts; a knife drawer, and pull-out racks for trays; cookie sheets, broiler pans and other utensils.

Mixer and blender should be in the center for food preparation and storage. Roll-out shelves could store toaster and coffee maker, and other special roll-out drawers, bins and racks can hold dry foods, canned goods and bottles.

The sink cabinet is the place for a convenient waste-basket and a pull-out rack for drying towels.

Your automatic dishwashers can be built-in under the counter, and your sink should be equipped with a food waste disposer.

There should be ample food capacity for even a large family in your food freezer and refrigerator.

Automatic washer, dryer, a built-in clothes hamper and ironing board make a compact center of your home laundry area. Roll-out shelves in a base cabinet provide handy storage for the iron and laundry supplies.

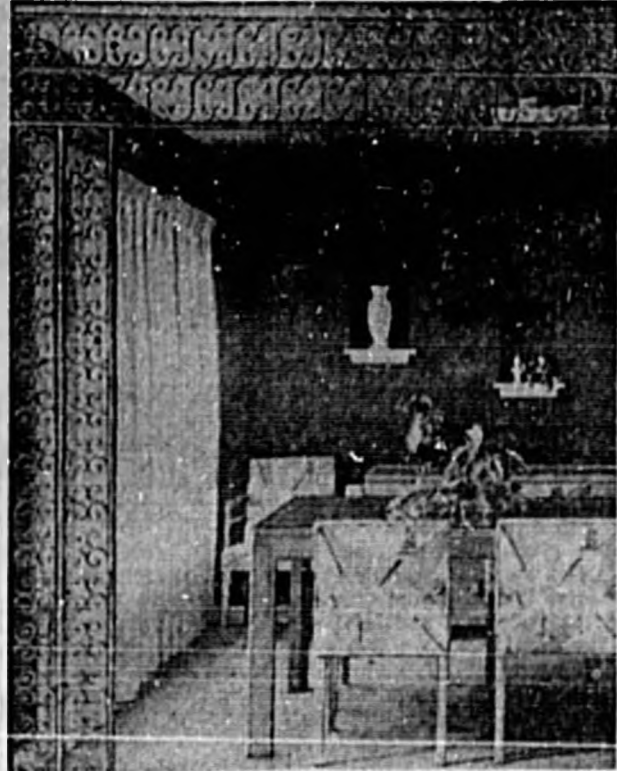

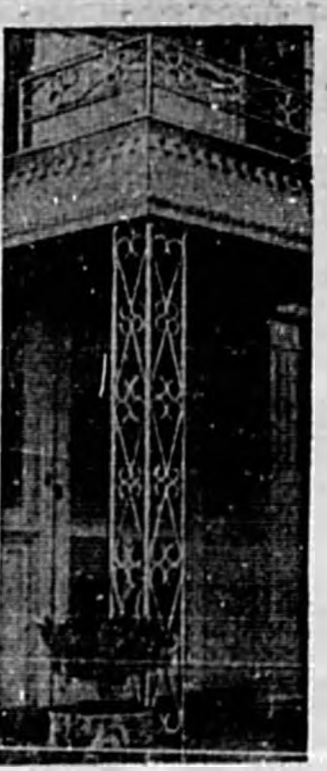

Key To Inexpensive Redecorating

An easy way to perk up your home is to purchase unpainted furniture and finish it yourself.

Room dividers are particularly effective in this furniture type, as well as sectional bookcases painted the same color as the wall to look as if they had been custom-built for the room. Other popular pieces are coffee tables and chests.

Before you begin the finishing process, put down newspapers or heavy wrapping on the floor and line up your materials.

First of all, make sure that all cracks and nail head indentations are filled with a wood filler or sparkling material. Use a knife, putty or even kitchen variety, to smooth the filling material into the holes. When it's dry, sand the entire surface until smooth, then dust off the loose particles.

As a first coating, apply thin shellac or thin varnish to seal the pores of the wood and to prevent subsequent coats from being unevenly absorbed.

The next step is to apply enamel undercoat if your finish coats are of gloss or semi-gloss. Before you begin, make certain that the undercoat is thoroughly stirred so that the entire quantity is of uniform consistency.

When the undercoat is dry, apply the enamel by flowing it on from your brush. Load the brush heavy enough to do the job but not so much that you deposit a pool of the enamel where you first contact the surface.

Unfinished furniture comes in pine, fir, poplar, eypress, redwood, maple, birch, beech and gum. According to dealers, gum and pine are most widely sold.

A special file drawer could keep sewing patterns, and a swing-out lamp can be used with both the desk and sewing machine.

Gum may be stained to imitate walnut or mahogany, or it may be bleached. You can stain pine to a rather good imitation of maple, but an enamel finish is usually preferred.

If you've admired the smart blonde furniture which is so popular, you can get the same effect with an unfinished piece, provided the wood is even in color. Bleach the article with a commercial chemical solution, obtainable at paint dealers. Use rubber gloves while applying the bleach with a rubber sponge. Wet the surface evenly. Bleaches with a hydrogen peroxide base leave nothing in the wood to harm the finishing coats. When the wood is dry, sand it and finish with white shellac—then wax if desired.

Once you have finished a few pieces, you will want to use your

imagination and originality in the design.

You'll have fun, gain a real sense of accomplishment, and save money when you use unpainted furniture, coat it and coordinate it with your particular decorating scheme.

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20 Million Homes In U. S. Have Inadequate Wiring

Here's a Home Improvement reminder about electrical facts and figures: In your home.

If your house is over ten years old, there's a good chance that it's among the 20,000,000 in the United States today with inadequate wiring.

The reason for the overload today is simple . . . there are more appliances in use today than there were ten years ago.

Such things as television sets were virtually non-existent in 1946. Today there are 33,200,000 of them in use.

There are 17,000,000 more radios in use today. Most homes today have at a minimum eight kinds of appliances: radio, TV, refrigerator, iron, electric clock, washer, toaster and vacuum cleaner.

Put too many of these on one circuit and, poof, a fuse is blown! Many American homes are chugging along with only thirty or sixty amperes service. Electricians say that one-hundred amperes are barely ample.

A thirty ampere entrance service is one in which a maximum of 3,600 watts are available in the house at any one time.

The wattage rating of an automatic toaster is 1,100 watts, hand iron 1,000 watts, coffee maker 1,000 watts, TV set 300 watts, a broiler, 1,450 watts, a roaster 1,450 watts and a refrigerator 300 watts.

Turn most of these on all at once, also a washing machine with 1,200 watts and an auto-

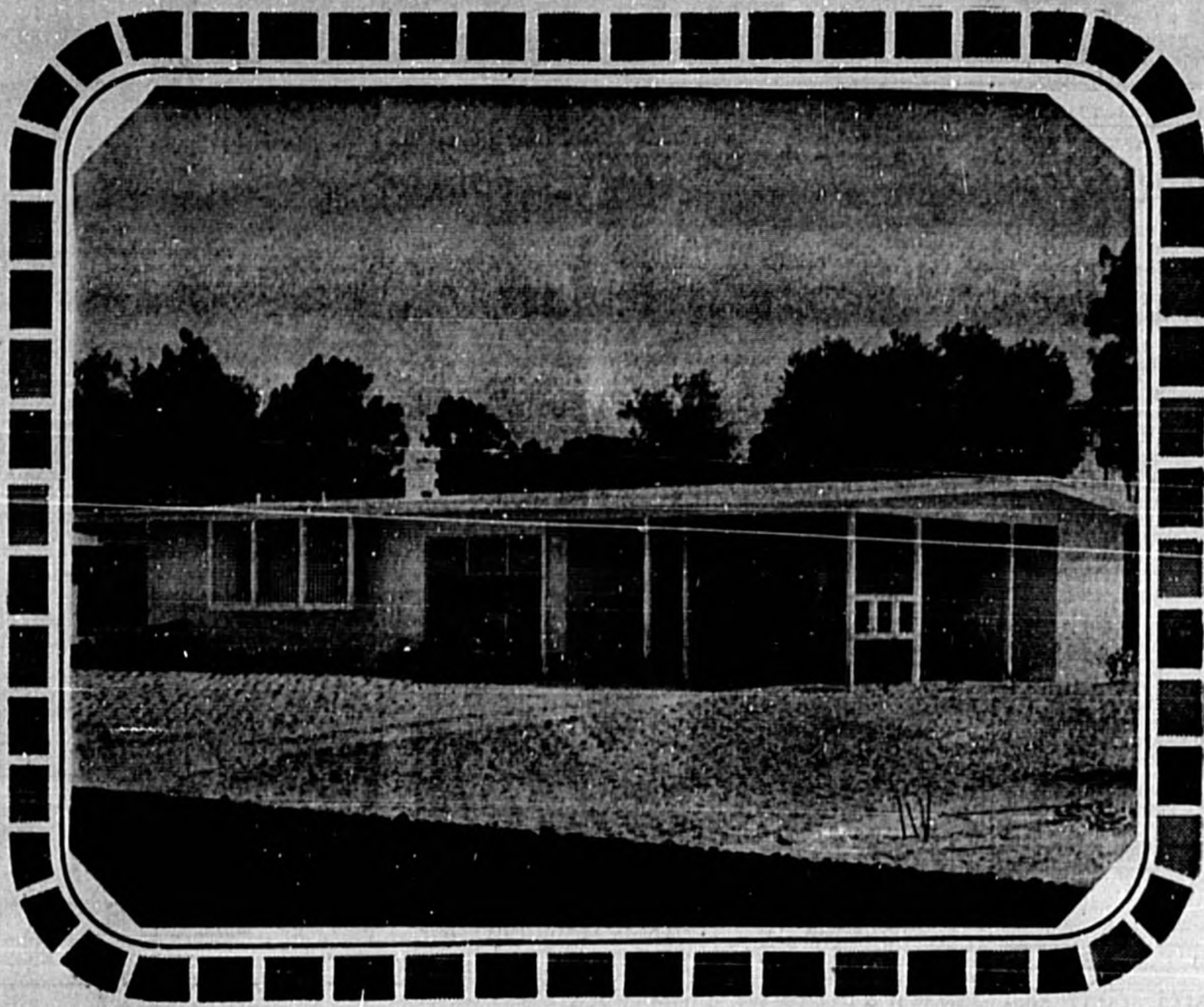

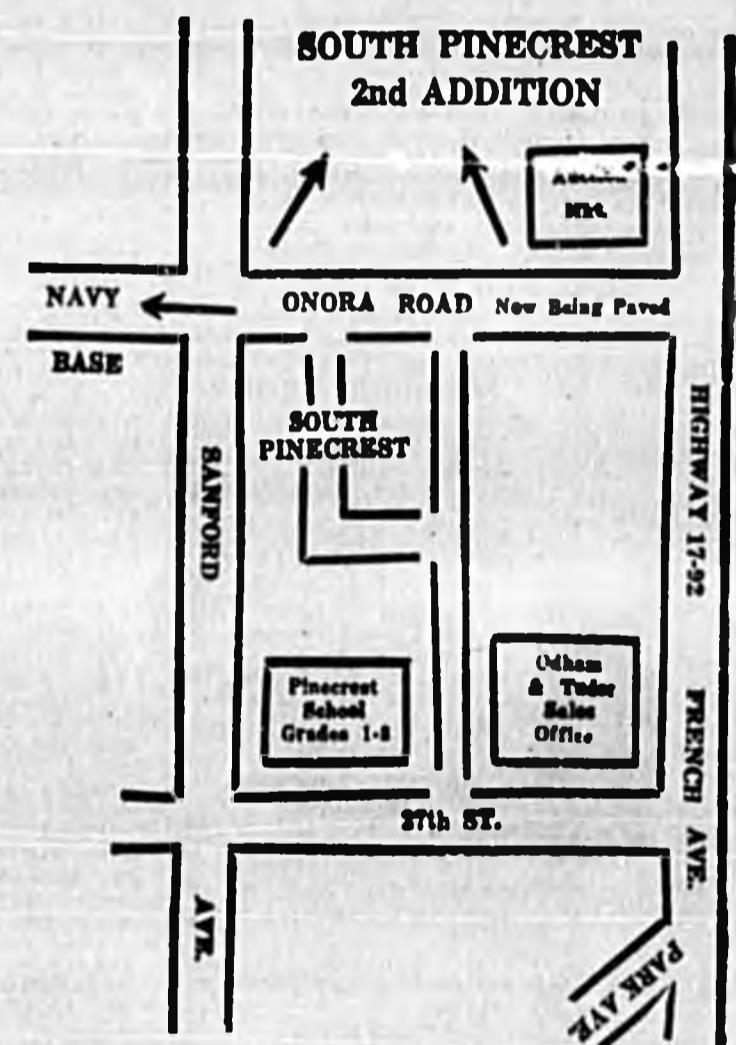

Red Army Told To Ready For Danger Of New War

Zhukov Issues Statement

By UNITED PRESS
Soviet Defense Minister Georgi Zhukov told Russia's armed forces in a May Day statement in Moscow today to be prepared for the "danger of a new war."
He issued the statement as an order of the day as Russian paraded one million persons through Moscow to pace Communist demonstrations of Red unity on the international labor day.
The Russian show did not display any new planes but it was twice as big as the demonstrations in Tokyo and Peking. All foreign embassies in Moscow scanned the parade for new weapons but no foreigners were permitted to take photographs.
A note of Communist disunity came from Belgrade, Marshal Tito opened May Day celebrations with the statement that Yugoslavia would pursue world communism to abandon "certain old concepts and methods."
Tito Wants Change
He served notice that Yugoslavia intends to encourage other nations to develop independent brands of communism in defiance of Moscow's method.
Soviet President Kliment E. Voroshilov attended the 500,000-strong Red Chinese demonstration in Peking with Mao Tse-tung. Peking radio said visitors from 45 other nations also witnessed the show.

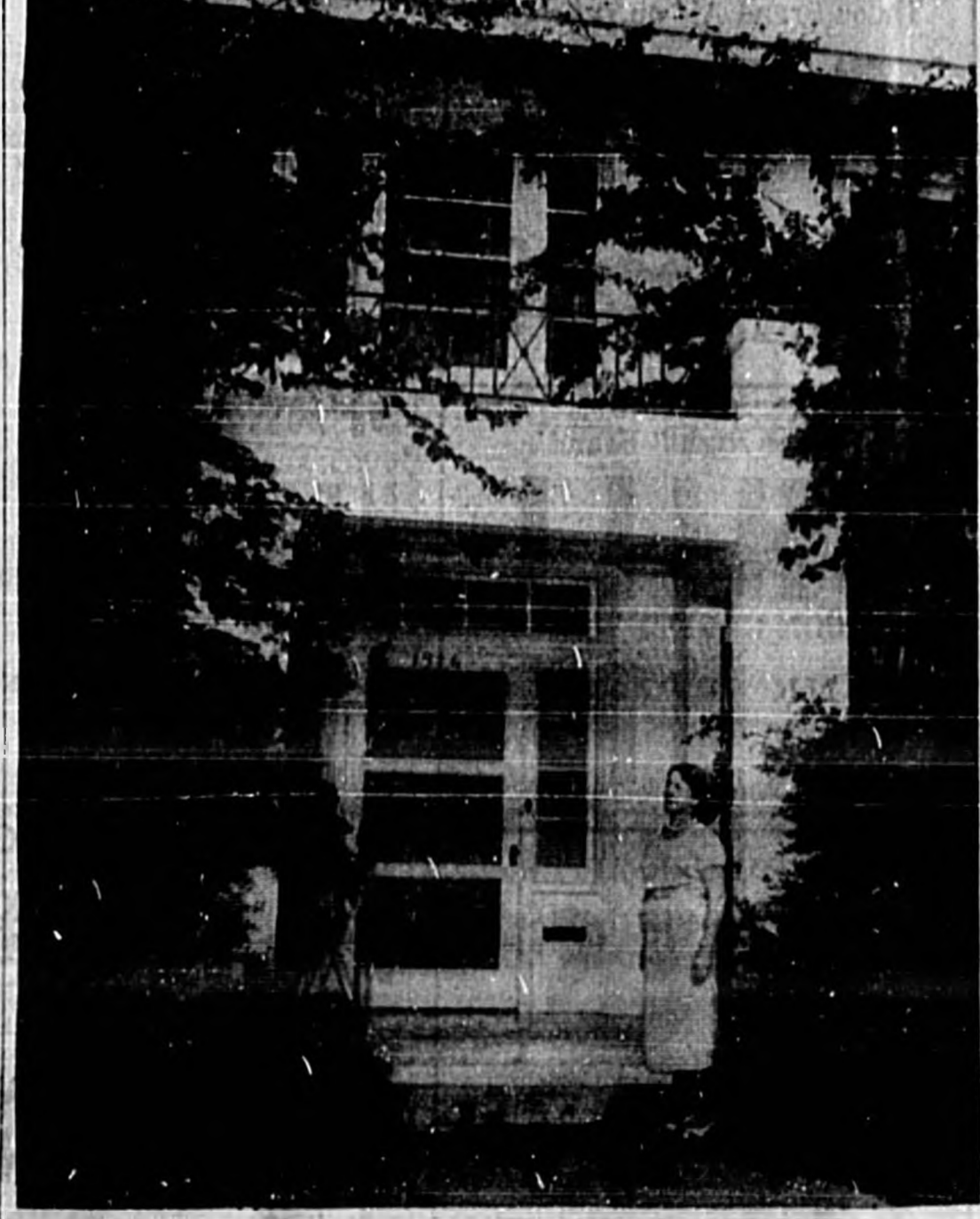

Longwood Resident Succumbs Monday

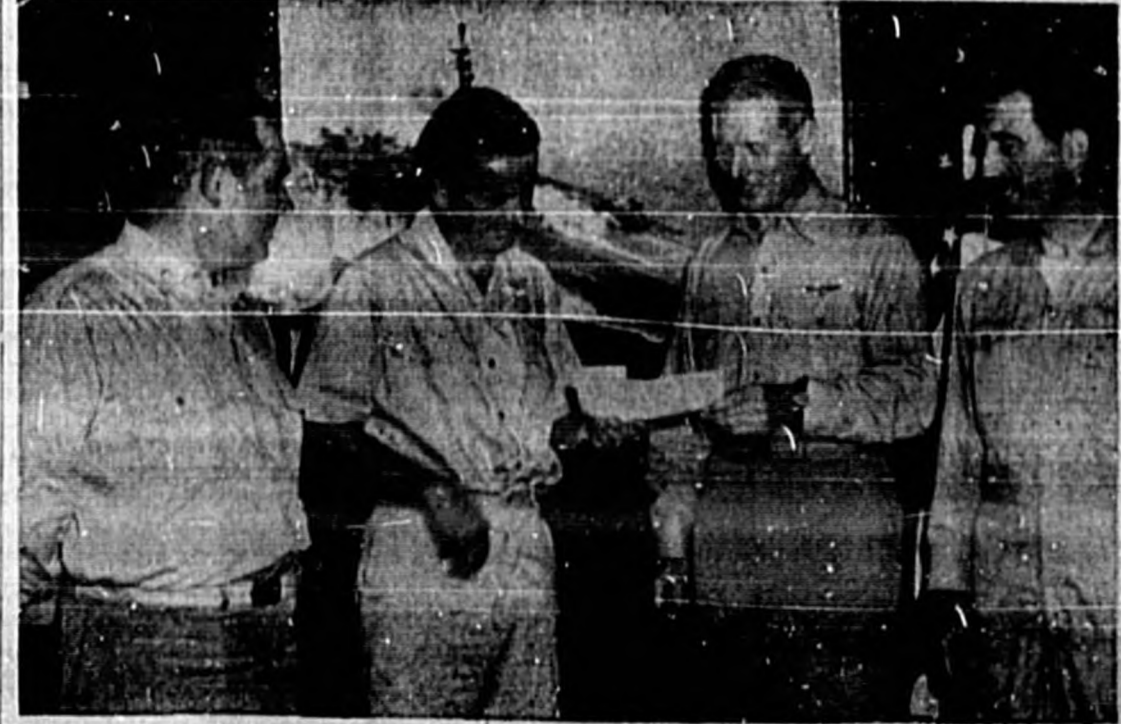

Indoctrination Course Conducted For Capt. Bringle

Since Apr. 9, 1957, the Heavy Attack Training Unit has been conducting a special "Heavy Attack Indoctrination Course" for Capt. W. F. Bringle, USN, prospective Commander Heavy Attack Wing TWO. The purpose of the course is to present an "Overview of the Heavy Attack mission and the methods and equipment used to carry out this mission."
In addition to an introduction to all the areas of training to prepare a tactical crew, the indoctrination course includes a thorough briefing on the development of the HAWING program.
