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Boxing Business Improves After Slump Last Summer Which Caused Much Worry

Tunney-Heeney Fight Signified Lowest Ebb Reached By Pugilistic Industry; Decided Activity Is Seen

By Davis J. Walsh, International News Service Sports Editor. NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Among the prominent institutions today, that, apparently, are not going to die just yet are your rich, maiden aunt and that gift to mankind known as professional boxing.

Only a few months ago, its life was despaired of. The patient was described as being very low but that wouldn't do because of the ambiguity involved. Nutsay even had thought it was very high in the first place. The diagnosis, therefore, gathered about the bed of pain—it was the type known as a four-poster with canvas, in a counterpane—and decided to describe the patient's condition as comatose. Baby Joe Gans and Joe Glick sold the garden out last Friday to more than 18,000, you couldn't have enticed 18,000 people anywhere to see Messrs. That also was the killing of Andre's young life.

RUANCY CALLED TEPPING STONE O CRIME CAREER

Commission Reports Findings Of Study Of 251 Delinquents

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 22.—Chronic truancy is the first step in a criminal career in a proportion of juvenile delinquency cases, according to a report issued by the Crime Commission of New York State on the basis of a study of 251 adolescents.

Fifteen per cent of the group studied are of native parentage, 85 per cent are of foreign parentage. Eighty-one per cent of all felonies for which they were responsible consisted of burglary, larceny and robbery. Among the adult offenders, 16 per cent committed offenses of a more serious character and 14 per cent were arraigned for felony offenses of the type usually committed by professional criminals.

Based on estimates of criminals, it is estimated that 1 per cent of the population of the United States engage in some form of crime. The top 251 truants were responsible during a limited period of time for as many felonies as are committed by the population at large, the report points out.

Felonies were committed more frequently by sons of natives than by sons of immigrants—that is, persons acquainted with the ways of the land, whereas minor offenses were committed in about equal proportions by sons of recently arrived immigrants.

The survey shows that virtually the entire group of cases lived under conditions of extreme poverty, congested housing, in homes that were broken up by death or eviction. All of the boys whose names were studied had been confined to the truancy school because of chronic absence from school.

Legal procedure, although admittedly necessary, did not prove effective in preventing further absences among truants, the report states, that the "individual method" is recommended.

The annual cost of crime in the United States is estimated at billions of dollars, the commission points out. "The individual method" probably less expensive than the usual legal procedure. In the cases studied no fewer than 100 arraignments before education and judicial authorities took place and 400 commitments were made to various reformatory and industrial institutions. The process of signing and maintaining these commitments have cost incalculable amounts. The community has a responsibility through fines to extend of \$100. Surely New York City, with its willingness to tear down old structures to make way for new, must concede the importance of tearing down old habits when they stand in the way of progress.

There is no doubt that present methods of dealing with crime among the youth of the city are wasteful of money and careers. There is doubt that the time in industrial methods of child guidance during childhood. There is doubt that the school system is in place to begin the method. 


Jersey City Mayor To Accept Warrant


Mayor Hague, returning from New York, characterized the raid as an outrage. He directed that Garrison and his companions be released, however.



CLEARWATER-Atlantic Coast Line and Seaboard Air Line railroads reduce rates on citrus shipments.


