

EARLY DINNER TRADE BODY URNS GLOOM

Atmosphere Of Optimism And Friendship
Permeates Talks By
Leaders In Utilities

Sholtz Delivers Principal Speech Urges Hearers To Look Into Future In Order To Build Big State

As the atmosphere of optimism and good fellowship permeated the annual dinner of the Chamber of Commerce at the Hotel Forrest Lake, two hundred persons, representatives of the City's business, professional and industrial interests, were present to take part in the festivities and join hands in the standing felicitation to visiting high officials of the honored companies.

The assemblage heard warm words of appreciation uttered by speakers for the corporations, and also delivered enthusiastic addresses of confidence in the future of the State. Suggestions for the upbuilding of Sanford, the advancement of her claims and the development of her soil and her resources were among the things touched upon by those on the program. The speaking came to a climax in a short discourse by David Sholtz, president of the State Chamber of Commerce.

"We must be Florida thinking," he said, "and looking into the future in order to build a great state," declared Mr. Sholtz in the epilogue of his address.

Mr. Sholtz called upon his hearers to have "faith, courage and vision" and to work together to build a great state.

Mr. Sholtz served as toastmaster. In taking charge of the program, after being presented by Clyde A. Byrd, president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Sholtz landed the purpose of the gathering, describing it as "another get-together meeting when we can all take stock and join hands in a demonstration of our faith in Sanford and Seminole County."

The toastmaster presented local representatives of the public service companies, who in turn introduced their out-of-town guests who spoke briefly. Managers of the several corporations were introduced as follows: T. L. Dumas of the Atlantic Coast Line, Clyde A. Byrd of the Florida Power & Light Company; George Overly of the American Bell Telephone Company, P. E. Scott of the Sanford Gas Company, and R. H. Bullock of the Western Union.

Speakers for the honored companies were: R. A. McCranie, assistant general passenger agent for the Coast Line; George H. Hilly, publicity director of the Florida Power & Light Company; George A. DeCotton, legal representative of the Sanford Gas Company; V. T. Powe, district manager of the American Bell Telephone Company, and J. M. Peacock, district manager of the Western Union.

Many Are Injured In Freak Mishap

BOSTON, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Four persons were seriously injured today and John Miller, 26, was believed to be dying in one of the strangest accidents and fires on record here. A gasoline truck crashed into two poles on Southampton Street, the tank being fired by a contact with live trolley wires. A subterranean fire in the sewerage system followed. Manhole blasts added to the excitement. Trolley lines were tied up and the street had to be closed to traffic. When the first pole fell it crashed through the window of a trolley car, injuring eight men and women and shaking up 20 others. Burning gasoline swept down the street and ignited a bridge. Miller fell through one of the holes. Firemen had chopped in the bridge and were pulling from the creek by means of a life line.

ROCKEFELLER TO BUCK INDIANA OIL IF STEWART WINS

Will Form New Company
Or Use Eastern
One For His Purpose

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—(INS)—In the event that Col. Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the directors of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, is successful in his flight with John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to retain his position as head of the company, Rockefeller intends to form either a new corporation or use eastern Standard Oil companies to buck the Standard of Indiana on a competitive basis in the Middle West, reports from a reliable source indicated here today.

Col. Stewart returned to Chicago from New York today with President Seabert of the Standard of Indiana. Both refused to comment on the current "battle of proxies." It was learned from a close friend of Stewart, however, that he termed reports that Rockefeller considered him a "victorious" as "absolutely ridiculous and silly."

It was also said that one of the heads of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, for the past several months has been in Northern Illinois, Eastern Iowa and Southern Wisconsin, buying up options on property. These options are said to expire May 1st, two months after the time Rockefeller will learn whether or not he is successful in ousting the Colonel from the chairmanship of the board.

Pomp, Democracy Mingle At Funeral Of Von Huenefeld

BERLIN, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Royalty and democracy mingled in common grief at the funeral of the late Baron Von Huenefeld, a German aristocrat, this afternoon. The United States was represented at the services by Maj. Reinhold representatives of the former Kaiser. The former Crown Prince, President Von Hindenburg and numerous war veterans, attended.

As the funeral procession moved through the principal streets, squadrons of airplanes flew overhead. A huge crowd stood in reverent silence as the cortege passed. Major James Fitzmaurice, who flew from Ireland to America with Baron Von Huenefeld and Capt. Herman Kuehl, came from London to attend the funeral.

A farewell salute was fired by a detachment from the Steel Helms, a memorial organization. Capt. Kuehl, who contracted the grippe, was prevented by illness from leaving death watch at the Berlin Cathedral to which sanctuary the body was transferred here tonight.

Big Celebration Set For Monday

Ford, Firestone, Herb
To Meet With Inven-
tor On His Birthday

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 9.—(INS)—Immediately after a ceremony, in which the President-elect took his "first degree" in the Boy Scouts, Mr. and Mrs. Hoover departed at noon on another fishing trip.

The immediate objective was Fort Myers, on the west coast where on Monday Thomas Edison, world-famous inventor, celebrates his eighty-second birthday. The President-elect plans to join with Henry Ford and Harvey Firestone inveterate companions of the aged genius, in making the occasion a gala affair.

Behind him, Mr. Hoover will leave still another possibility for inclusion in the makeup of the federal machine. Somewhat tardily, it was learned today that E. C. Jameson, president of the Globe and Rutgers Fire Insurance Company, of New York, is being quietly boosted for an appointment in the Hoover administration. Yesterday he had lunch at Belle Isle in company with J. L. Repley, the steel magnate; Louis K. Largent, Republican committeeman from Massachusetts; and Charles Francis Williams, treasurer of Harvard.

Jameson, it seems, along with Senator Freylinghausen of New Jersey, put up much of the money that financed Bishop James Canon's bitter anti-Smith pro-American campaign through the South and East last fall. The contribution, it was further learned, was arranged by none other than C. Bascom Slomp, former Republican congressman from Virginia, former secretary to President Coolidge, and politician extraordinary in the last campaign.

A combination of these elements is said to be pushing Jameson strongly for a post of some consequence. Just what the post will be could not be ascertained. The insurance man, however, is said to be in the President-elect's good graces.

Mr. Hoover was scheduled to leave the beach at noon today, and to be at a point between Key Largo and Long Key, farther down the east coast, and there board his houseboat. A leisurely cruise around the tip of the state, interspersed with considerable fishing will bring him to another tomorrow night somewhere off the west coast. Monday morning, he and Mrs. Hoover will land at Fort Myers.

A large celebration has been arranged at Edison's winter home, and the President-elect stands to figure quite prominently in it. After the Monday luncheon, he and Mrs. Hoover will head an informal parade through the crowds.

With the Edison celebration behind him, Mr. Hoover will again take off on an unannounced fishing trip. He has expressed determination to land a tarpon, and to land the largest fish yet to fail to succumb to his piscatorial ability, and his aides have arranged to take him down to Shark River, near the southern extremity of the west coast.

HARVARD SCOFFS HARKNESS OFFER OF \$13,000,000

College Paper Sees In
Gift Unwanted Con-
dition In University

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 9.—(INS)—"A thirteen million dollar offer of cocaine that will chop things up for a while, but what a morning after there will be," was the way Harvard Lampoon, the college funny paper, today harpooned the recent gift to Harvard by Edward S. Harkness, New York multimillionaire and Yale graduate.

The Lampoon printed a check for \$13,000,000 signed Edward S. Harkness and marked "no funds." Under it are the famous words from Homer, "I fear the Greeks bearing gifts."

Allyn Russell, Blackburn, Jr., senior, president of the Lampoon, declared that he felt that the attack was warranted by the fact that the great majority of students at Harvard are opposed to the Harkness house plan, a half a dozen groups of colleges within the main institution.

New Outbreaks Of Rioting In Bombay Suspend Business

LONDON, Feb. 9.—(INS)—All activity in the native quarters of Bombay was at a standstill today following renewed Hindu-Muslim clashes of serious proportions, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from that city.

Four new murders were reported in the districts. The death toll in the riots which have been in progress for almost a week is now estimated at 110. At least 600 have been seriously injured.

Troops were patrolling the city in motor trucks and private automobiles commandeered for the purpose. Rioters who clashed on a busy street this morning were quickly dispersed by troops. Other clashes involving Hindus and Muslims were reported in several other sections of the city. The exact number of casualties resulting from these clashes is not yet known.

Alleged Wife Slayer Is Released On Bond

YORK, N. C., Feb. 9.—(INS)—Rafe King, son of an old South Carolina family, was released today on \$3,000 bond on a charge of murdering his pretty young school teacher wife, whose bloodstained and acid-seared body was found hidden in the smokehouse of their home.

Officials have examined the body of the slain woman at Kings Mountain, N. C., and removed the viscera for chemical analysis. Physicians found that a blow on the woman's head did not fracture her skull and could not have within itself caused her death.

ENGLISH RULER QUITS PALACE FOR SEASHORE

King George Leaves In
Specially Built Ambulance
As Throng Give Cheers At Gate

LONDON, Feb. 9.—(INS)—King George left Buckingham Palace at 10:17 A. M. today in a large specially built ambulance bound for Craigwell House at Bognor, where he will complete his convalescence. His Majesty waved his hand to a huge throng which had gathered outside the palace gates early in the morning to witness his departure. It was the first time he had been out of the palace in almost three months.

The crowd about the palace has been warned to stand in absolute silence in order not to disturb the king. But the sight of their beloved monarch waving to them after having been so close to death was too much for those in the waiting throng and a tremendous cheer went up as the ambulance emerged through the main gate. Queen Mary followed in a limousine five minutes later.

The ambulance was fitted with huge plate glass windows in both sides, permitting a partial view of its royal occupant. The crowd caught just a glimpse of the King's head but when he lifted his arm and valiantly waved a thin, white hand, it went wild with surprise and gratification at his activity and ability to greet his subjects.

The King was removed from the palace on a comfortable cot along in springs. Two uniformed men sat opposite each other on either side of him. The royal physicians followed in another motorcar. Household officials in two other cars also followed, making it a procession of five vehicles including the Queen's limousine. The ambulance was driven by His Majesty's personal chauffeur, Humphreys.

The distance to Bognor is 64 miles. It is expected the King will arrive there in about three hours. Guards had been placed at all dangerous crossings, curves and hills enroute, to provide every possible measure of safety. All morning police officials had received reports on weather and road conditions before the decision to make the journey was arrived at. All arrangements for receiving His Majesty at Craigwell House have been completed.

The Eleanore Bolling told the radio operator here that she was 1040 miles southwest of Dunedin, New Zealand enroute to Dunedin after taking aboard 80 tons of coal from the whaling steamer, C. A. Larsen.

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FEDERAL QUIZ OF RESERVE BOARD MAY TAKE PLACE

House Committee Seen
As Likely Body For
Conducting Probe

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(INS)—An indirect inquiry by Congress into the action of the Federal Reserve Board in warning member banks against loans for speculative purposes, may result from testimony caused by the tumble of New York Stock Exchange prices, it was indicated today.

Rep. Louis T. McFadden, (R., Pa.), chairman of the subcommittee of the House banking committee, said that his committee may undertake a study of the entire credit situation which would, it is believed, bring the reserve board's policy squarely before the committee. Although he has criticized the Federal Reserve board's letter of Wednesday, which was followed by the stock crash, McFadden declined to either command or oppose a resolution of Rep. Blaine (D) of New York directing his committee to make an investigation of the board's action.

Meanwhile Sen. Heflin (D) of Alabama, is awaiting decision of Senate leaders upon his resolution requesting the reserve board to lay before Congress full information concerning the situation which prompted the board to warn member banks.

Church Ceremonies To Have Two-Fold Purpose Tomorrow

ROME, Feb. 9.—(INS)—Church ceremonies beginning tomorrow in celebration of the seventh anniversary of the coronation of Pope Pius XI will also embrace ceremonies of joy over the second between the Catholic Church and the Italian state. Next Tuesday is the actual date of the anniversary of the pontiff's coronation, a solemn Te Deum will be sung tomorrow in the Basilica of St. John Lateran, which adjoins the Lateran Palace.

The treaty of conciliation between the Vatican and the state will be signed on Monday in the Lateran Palace.

Reports that a group of cardinals and archbishops might be appointed senators in the Italian Parliament were said today to be groundless. It is now understood that the reason the Pope abandoned the original plan for extension of the Vatican territory is that he preferred instead of territorial extension, the official recognition of extraterritorial rights for many church properties scattered throughout Rome.
