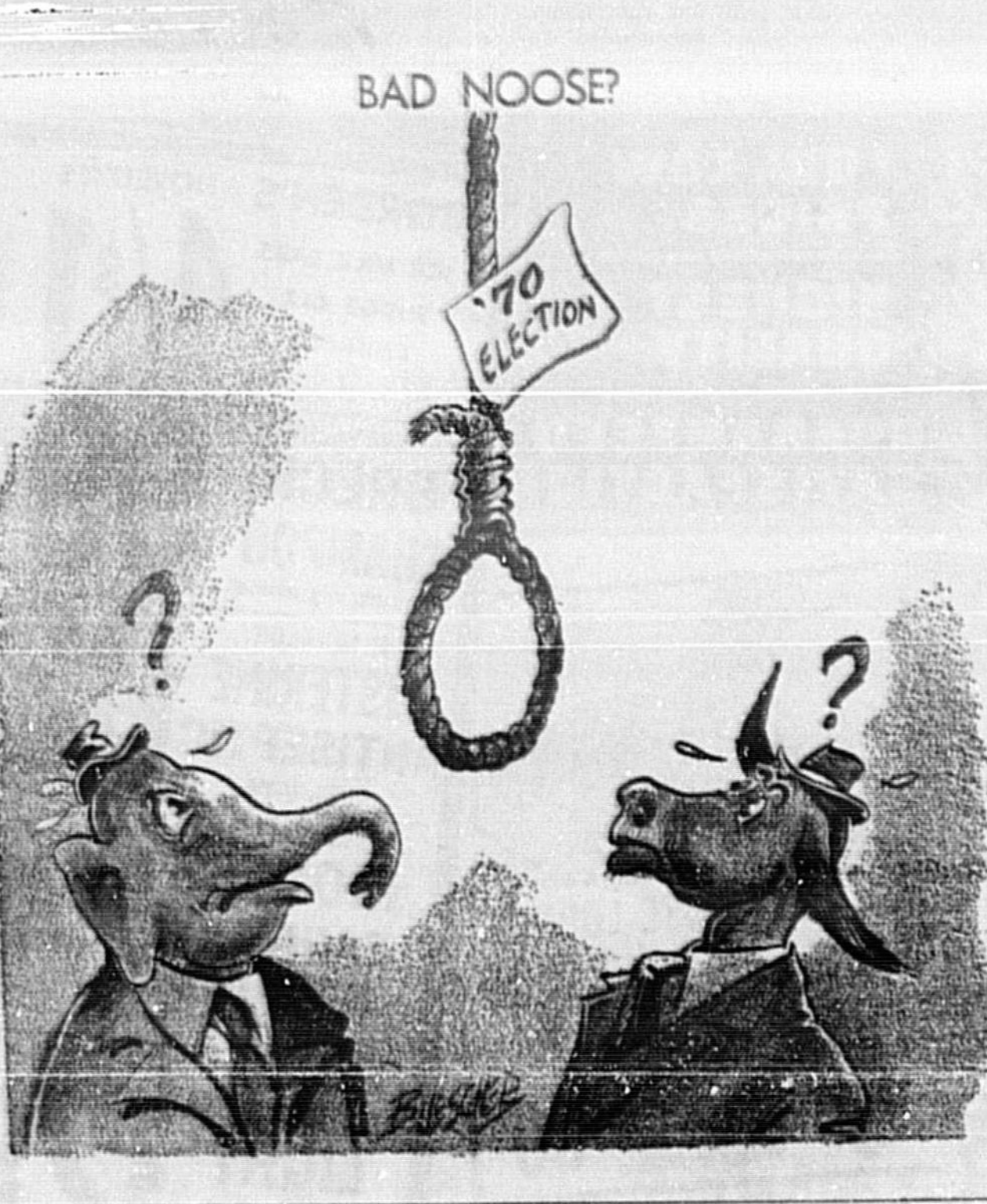
From the minutes of the City Commission meeting on Monday night, it is apparent that Mayor Lee P. Moore, who has had general conversations with Harold Slama of Monroe Harbour, is now authorized to proceed with the needed studies to allow the West Harbor to be expanded and protected.

We are indebted to the Florida AAA Motorist for this timely, useful and practical advice: If present trends continue, car thefts will reach a record annual rate of 1 million in 1970 at a total cost of \$1.8 billion, the vehicle security specialist for Chrysler Corporation says.

Don Wolfslayer told a meeting of civic leaders in Hartford, Conn., that over 778,000 cars were stolen in the United States during 1968. This represents a 15-per cent jump over 1967, and an average of more than one stolen car per minute.

"A similar increase in 1970 will push the number of thefts over 1 million for the first time in history," Wolfslayer said. Theft of automobile accessories is also increasing, especially the stereo tape units that have become popular with motorists.

Capsules And Computers

By GEORGE J. MARDER WASHINGTON (UPI) — The new head of the Selective Service System is torn between capsules and computers for the next draft lottery.

Draft Director Curtis W. Tarr has been reading statistical reports until he sees numbers in his sleep. Capsules were used in the Dec. 1 birth date lottery, but many statisticians complained that the way it was handled was something less than random, and therefore not fair to all young men.

Tarr decided he had better look into the situation and now has reports from statisticians on how to make the lottery truly random so that all will have an equal chance of being drafted or avoiding the draft.

The statistical expert agreed that the most equitable way of handling it would be to base the lottery on a statistical table of numbers. It would then be a simple matter to program the table into a computer which could spew out the numbers to decide the order of draft.

But that there must be physical signs of the fairness. He feels the young would resent having their draft dates determined by a computer. The lottery will increase in importance if Congress goes along with Nixon's proposed reforms. The President has recommended that Congress end the system of local draft boards, making each month's call a national quota on lottery numbers alone.

The proposed new system would eliminate the confusion which results when one draft board has to drop to a certain quota while another local board may not have to go nearly as far down the list to meet its quota.

Tarr believes that the final decision may be something combining the use of capsules and computers.

"Whirly Birds" and Generals

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Good thinking in Congress is not as rare as a day in June, but it still comes under the heading of news when it happens.

It is therefore my duty to report an outbreak of good thinking on the part of Rep. William E. Minshall, an Ohio Republican who celebrates on the House defense appropriations subcommittee.

In a volume of recently released testimony, Minshall and friends interrogated Gen. William G. Westmoreland about the Army's plan to train certain generals to fly helicopters.

Minshall also questioned when there was "really a need for a general officer to be a helicopter pilot."

On that point, Westmoreland's reply was more cogent. When a general has helicopters under his command, he should understand the capabilities and limitations of the helicopter.

It would be difficult to argue with this philosophy. Were it otherwise, a situation something like this might arise: SAIGON—Three helicopters under the command of Brig. Gen. Gideon E. Whirly sailed up the Mekong River today to launch an underwater attack on Communist gunboats near Phnom Penh.

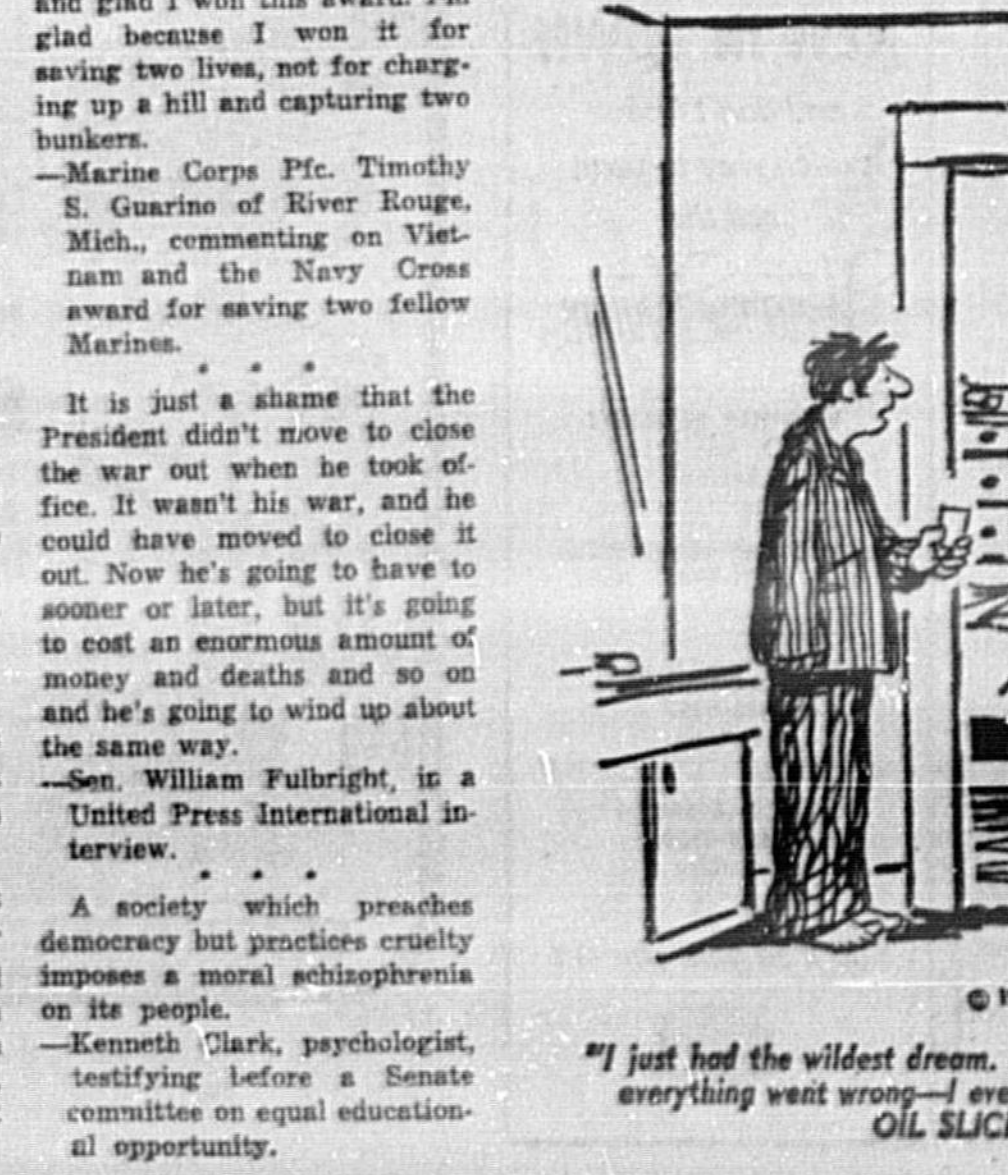
"Nobody told me helicopters wouldn't float," Whirly said as the thin machines sank in 30 feet of water. "This convinces me that helicopters are unsuitable for naval warfare," the general added. "From now on I'm going to run my helicopters on the ground, where they belong, even if they do jump the track occasionally."

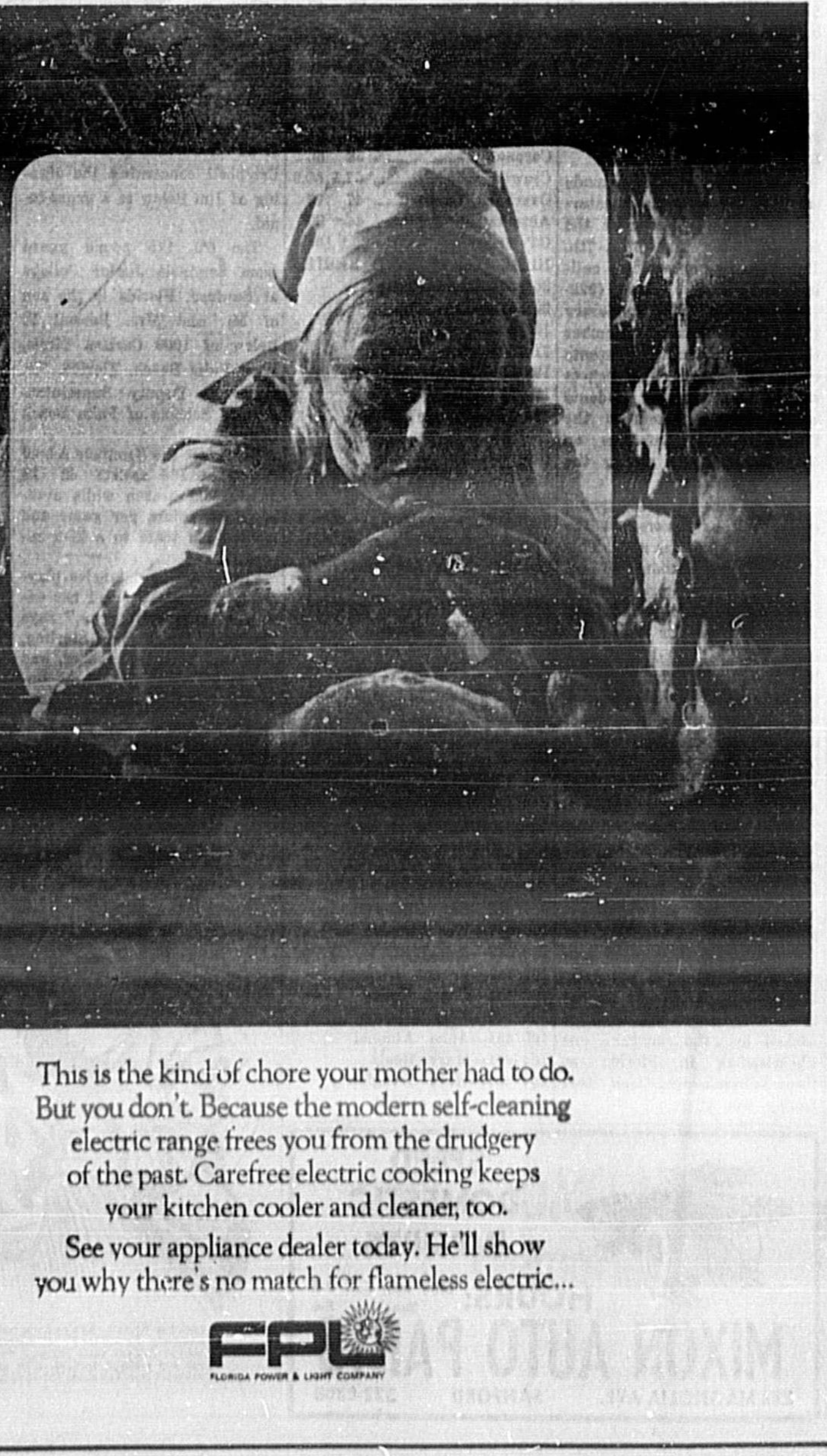

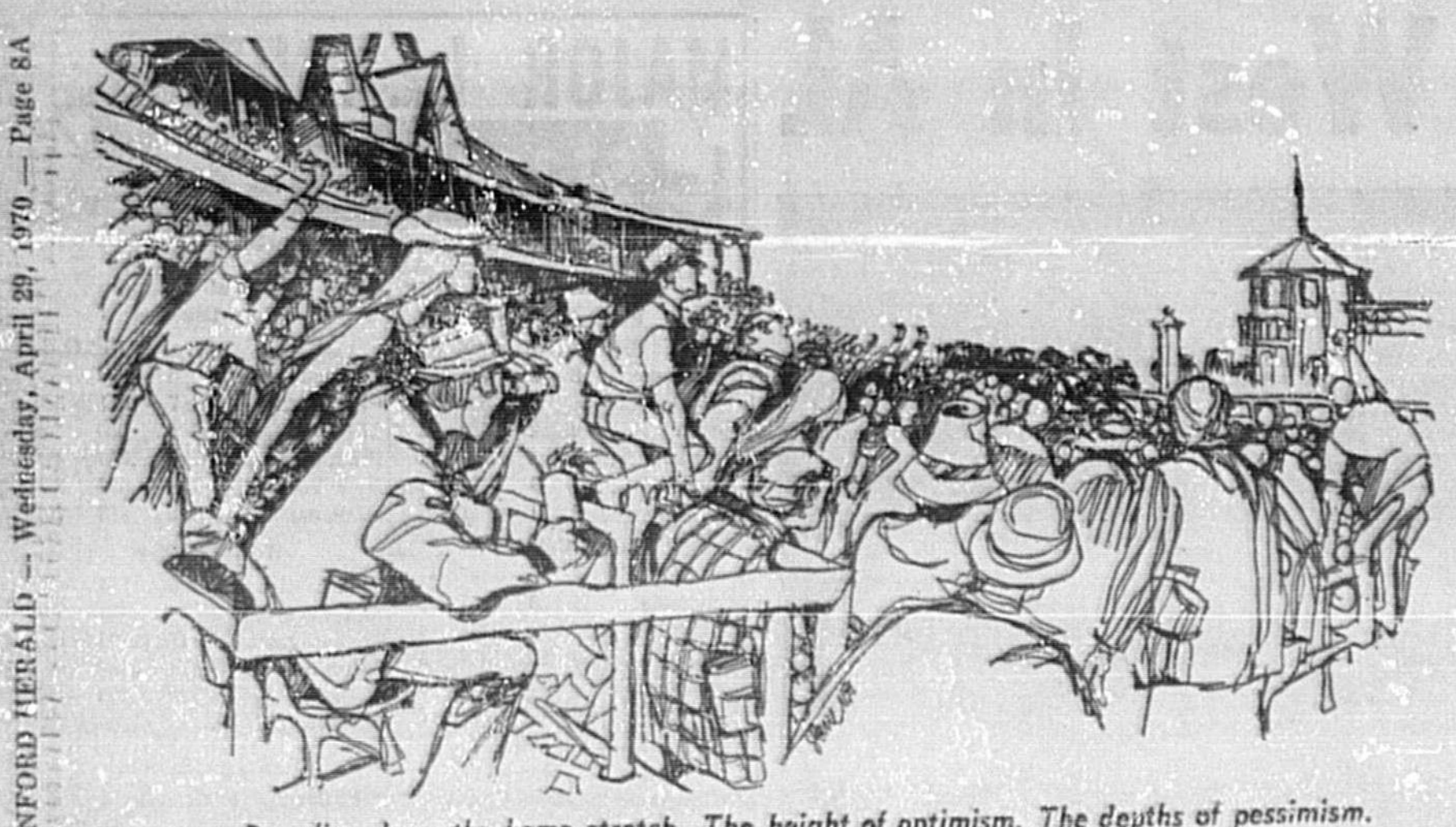

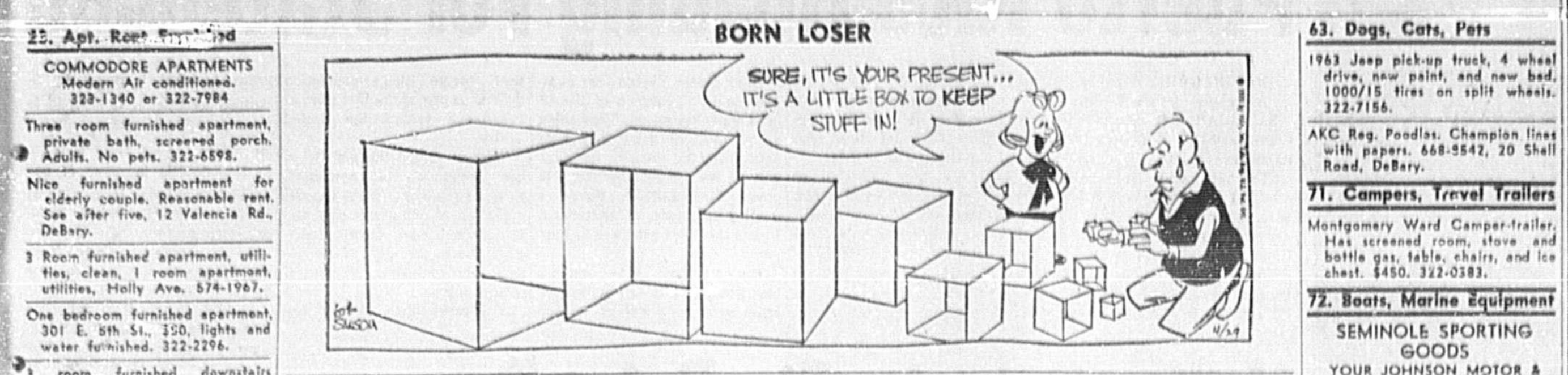

Design was the gem of a single blossom in an elegant vase to a magnificent plant which "just grew that way."

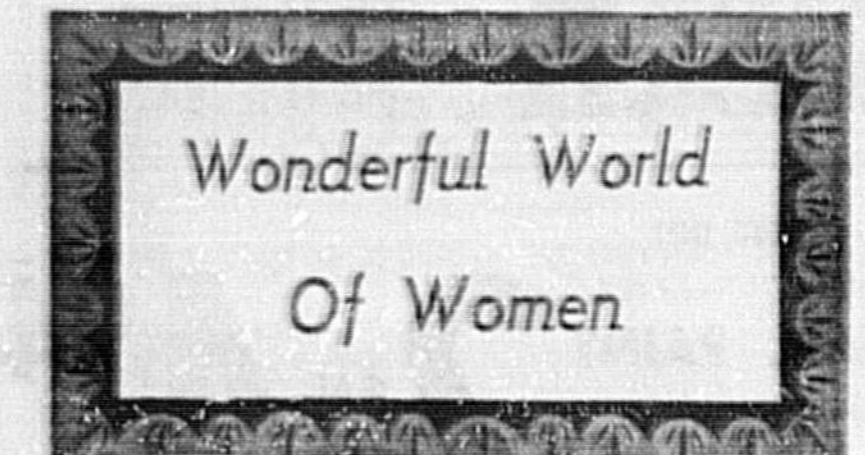

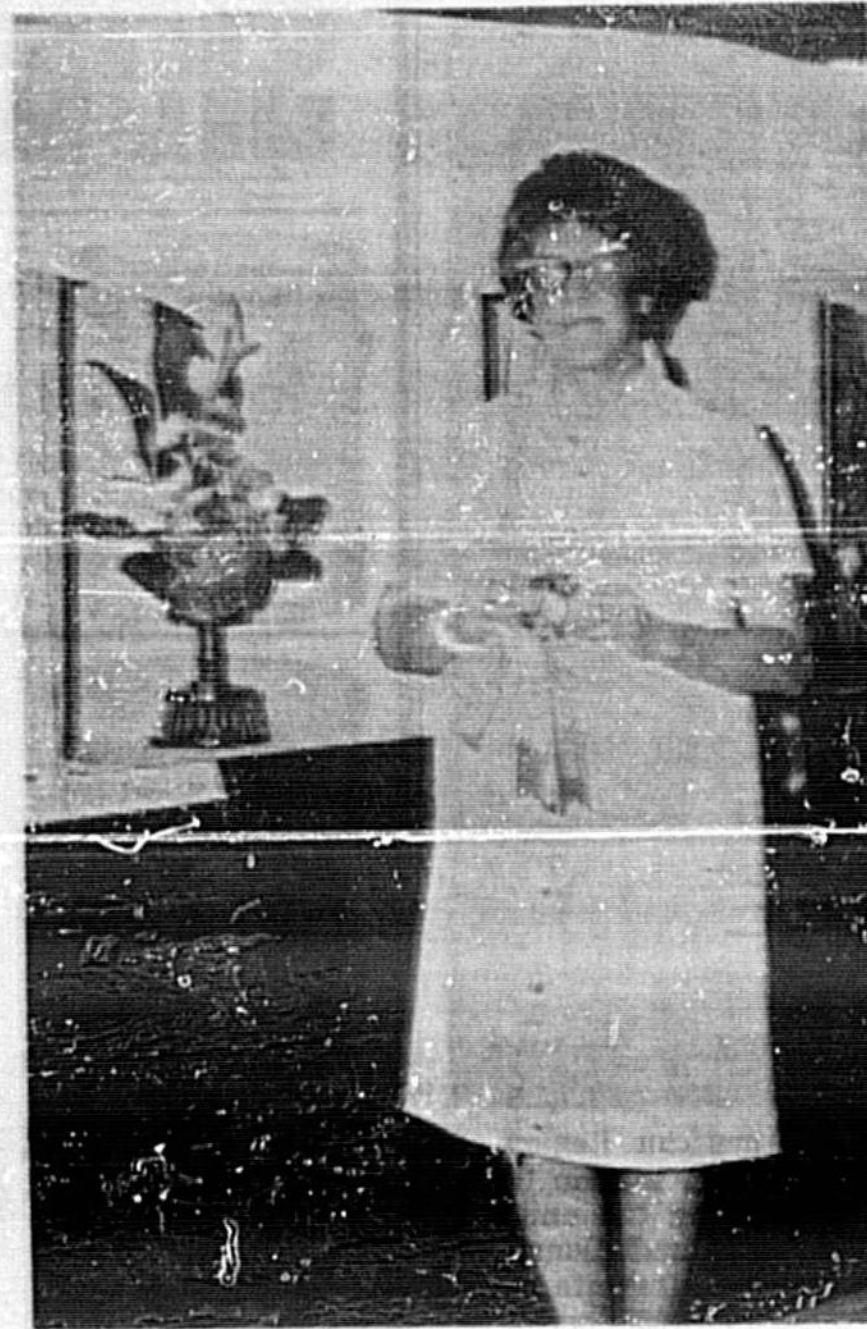

Delicious stuffed pork chops make a very special dinner for guests or important family occasions.

When planning to stuff pork chops, buy double thick ribs chops, plan on one chop per person and ask the butcher to cut a pocket in the side of each. This is to hold a great appetizing stuffing. For the stuffing, simply combine canned apple sauce, chopped walnuts and an egg with seasoned bread cubes and processed packaging stuffing. The apple sauce provides moisture and a complementary tart apple flavor to the pork.

APPLE-NUX STUFFED PORK CHOPS
4 pork chops (1 1/2 inches thick) with pocket
1 cup seasoned prepared bread cubes for stuffing
1 cup canned apple sauce
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1 egg
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Wipe chops with damp cloth. In small bowl, combine bread cubes, apple sauce, walnuts and egg. Mix well, then let stand until thoroughly moistened. Stuff each chop with 1-3 cup stuffing. Arrange in baking pan. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake in 350-degree oven 1 hour, 15 minutes (or until tender). Turn once during baking. Makes four servings.

1 Italian green sausage or 2 sweet and 2 hot
1 small onion, chopped
1 can (8 oz) tomato sauce
1 can (about 1 1/2) garbanzo (chick peas or ceci)
1 tablespoon minced parsley

In a 10-inch skillet fry sausages until they are cooked and browned. Remove excess fat. Add onion; cook gently until wilted. Add tomato sauce. Bring to a boil. Add chick peas and parsley and heat. Makes four servings.

THE FAMILY LAWYER
Bookkeeper Jenkins, arriving at his place of employment one wintry morning, reached out for the knob on the front door. Unfortunately, the sidewalk on which he was standing was slick with ice. His foot slipped and down he went, suffering painful injuries.

Could he collect workman's compensation? Was his an "on-the-job" accident? Jenkins argued that it was, because his outstretched arm had been across the property line, over the company's property, at the moment he slipped.

However, the court denied his claim, noting that his feet had still been on the public sidewalk. The judge pointed out that it was his foot, not his arm, that did the slipping.

This case, although a close one, illustrates a common principle of almost all workman's compensation laws. An employee is generally covered only while he is on the company's premises. Of the premises, he is in his own.

Nevertheless, there are important exceptions. A workman may be covered off the premises, too, if he is still somewhat under the company's "sphere of influence."

Thus, an employee who was hit by a car while on his way to lunch was held entitled to compensation, when it appeared that his lunch hour was paid for by the company. Under these circumstances, the court found him to be sufficiently "on the job" to be protected.

By the same token, in another case, the court held that a victim did collect compensation because of two extra factors in the situation. First, the sidewalk was used almost exclusively by company employees. Second, the company was supposed to keep it free of ice.

These factors, said the court, brought the sidewalk area within the scope of the job, justifying protection for workmen who were injured there.

As one judge put it:

1 tablespoon unsalted butter
Salt and pepper

Drop small butter pat in cast-iron or aluminum skillet to test heat. It should sizzle without browning. Too high heat makes eggs tough.

Saute peppers lightly in butter. Break up corned beef with slinger. Beat eggs with wire whisk until mixed without being frothy. Melt butter in skillet. Add corned beef, peppers, chives and parsley over eggs. Pour mixture into pan. Sizzle quickly with a fork and shake the pan until eggs start to set. Then stir slowly on top of eggs for a minute or two. Let cook for a second. Fold the omelet over to the edge of pan with spatula. Put on hot platter. Makes four servings.

Into a medium mixing bowl sift together the flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir in walnuts and orange peel. Beat together milk, egg and oil; add to dry ingredients and stir only until moistened. Fill greased medium-size muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake in preheated 425-degree oven until golden brown—15 to 18 minutes. Remove from pan and drizzle with Frosting. Serve warm with butter. Makes 12.

Frosting: Mix together until smooth 1 teaspoon soft butter, 1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar and 4 teaspoons milk.

Enchiladas, Squash a la Mexico

Holidays are fun, especially if they inspire special dishes. In Mexico, for example, May 5 or Cinco de Mayo finds residents in a fiesta mood. Parade and pageantry commemorate the victory of the Mexican forces over the French in 1862 and the end of European colonization.

A special flower festival in Fort St. Vrain, Colorado, Verano, the gardens center of Mexico, is a highlight. Vendors' carts are stocked with crisp tacos, burrito rolls, beef enchiladas and tamales. Since such foods are increasingly popular in all parts of the United States, here is a recipe for an enchilada squash bake which combines two Mexican favorites, available frozen in supermarkets. Serve with a crisp vegetable salad, chocolate pudding and fresh oranges, also Mexican favorites.

ENCHILADA SQUASH BAKE

1 1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups sliced summer or zucchini squash, OR
2 packages frozen sliced summer or zucchini squash, thawed
1 medium onion, sliced
Dash black pepper
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 teaspoons finely chopped parsley (optional)
1 package (10 ounces) frozen beef enchiladas
1 slice day-old white bread
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine

If using fresh squash, wash, quarter and slice squash into thick slices. Cook with onion until barely tender (about 10 minutes) in just enough salted water (about 4-cups) to keep from burning. If using frozen squash, bring water and salt to a boil in a saucepan. Add squash and onion and cook until barely tender (about 10 minutes). Drain cooked squash; add black pepper, butter and parsley. Meanwhile, heat beef enchiladas in a 425-degree oven for 12 minutes. Place half the squash in a 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Cut enchiladas in half and place on squash layer. Spread remaining squash on top of the enchiladas along the sides of the dish. Cut bread into very small cubes. Stir in butter. Sprinkle down center of casserole over enchiladas. Bake in a pre-heated 425-degree oven for 15 minutes. Make 4 to 6 servings.

Drain pears; place cavity sides up in a small shallow pan. Fill each pear cavity with about 1 tablespoon mincemeat. Cover tightly with foil. Bake in a pre-heated, 400-degree oven until heated through-about 8 minutes. Serve hot stuffed pears with scoops of vanilla ice cream. Makes 6 to 7 servings.

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Corn Bread, Ham Ring Is Super

A dish made of leftovers can still tempt the most picky eater. One such is a baked ring mold of corn bread flavored with caraway seed. Fill it with leftover ham in a cheese sauce. Serve with a green vegetable, tossed salad, brownies, coffee and milk.

HAM 'N' CORN BREAD SUPPER RING

Corn Bread Ring:
1 1/4 cups vegetable oil
1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons caraway seed
1 egg, beaten
1 1/2 cups buttermilk
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted

Ham 'n' Cheese Filling:
1/4 cup chopped onion
2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
1 1/4 cups cubed cooked ham
1/4 cup butter or margarine
3 tablespoons unflavored all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
1/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

For corn bread ring, heat oven to 425 degrees. Sift together cornmeal, flour, soda and salt into bowl; stir in caraway seed. Add egg, buttermilk and melted butter, stirring until dry ingredients are moistened. Pour batter into greased 5-cup ring mold. Bake in preheated 425-degree oven about 20 minutes.

For filling, saute onion, mushrooms and ham in butter. Stir in flour and salt. Gradually add milk, all ingredients, until thickened. Stir in cheese.

To serve, invert corn bread ring on serving plate. Fill center with hot ham 'n' cheese filling. Makes 6 servings.

We're all familiar with rice and walnuts. Why not put the two together for a different and delicious salad? In the inexpensive category, the salad plays a natural role warm or cold for buffets or barbecues.

This particular dish is inspired by eating habits of those in the Near Eastern countries such as Turkey, Iran, Romania and Yugoslavia. Here rice and walnuts are particularly favored in cookery.

A walnut-rice salad is easy to do and also is low in calories.

TURKISH WALNUT RICE SALAD

2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon oregano
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon peel
1 cup long-grain rice
1 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
1/4 cup coarsely chopped toasted walnuts
1/4 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed olives
Lemon dressing
Crisp lettuce
Yogurt (optional)

Heat water to boiling with salt, oregano and lemon peel. Add rice, cover and cook for 20 minutes or until water is absorbed. Cool thoroughly. Add celery, onion, walnuts and olives. Pour Lemon dressing over all and toss lightly. Serve on crisp lettuce. Top with a small spoonful of yogurt if desired. Makes six servings.

Lemon Dressing
Combine 1/4-cup salad oil, two tablespoons lemon juice, 1/4-teaspoon salt and 1/8-teaspoon pepper. Shake together or beat well.

1 1/2 cups (18 1/2 oz.) condensed tomato soup
1 soup can water
1 to 2 tablespoons tomato catsup
1/4 teaspoon ground cardamom
1 pinch paprika
1 small bay leaf
Pepper to taste

In a saucepan mix together all the ingredients; heat slowly, stirring often to serving temperature. Remove bay leaf. Makes 4 small servings-to serve in cups.
