



FTP Head: Add Tax, **Drop Literacy Test**

A moratorium should be declared on all testing, including the Functional Literacy Test, except those examinations created by

the classroom teacher. Tenure for teachers (their right to an automatic contract renewal after three years of teaching at a school) should be eliminated as soon as an improved collective-bargaining law is passed.

Those are some of the changes that Florida Teaching Profession-National Education Association (FTP-NEA) President Wallace Orr and his organization would like to see. "There are some teachers in Florida who will climb the wall when they hear those suggestions," Orr predicted "but it is time that teachers realized they should become more politically involved.

"If there ever is going to be any change in education, teachers will have to be the catalyst," Orr said during trip to Sanford this

Orr, who grew up in Seminole County and graduated from Crooms Academy in 1943, was in Sanford to address the Seminole brother of Horace Orr head, of SEEDCO

He is traveling the state on behalf of FTP-NEA, telling teachers that somehow they are going to have to "form sort of partnership with parents to bring about some changes in which are on teachers and schools now." What caused those pressures?

'Inflation, the literacy requirements, and the new law which requires that all handicapped students who can be taught in a regular classroom setting, with nonnandicapped people, should be," Orr said. "Main streaming" is what the law on behalf of education of the handicapped is called, Orr said, and some teachers have expressed concern that including handleapped children in their classroom might slow other children.

supports it wholeheartedly. It won't slow down teaching in the classroom if Congress provides proper funding for handicapped education, along with funding from state and local agencies, " Orr said. Orr speaks from classroom experience. He


What in the world happend to old Joe? You know who I'm talking about - Everyone knows Joe - He's the guy who ran the service station down on the corner for years and years.

Invasion Of Privacy Or Useful Business Tool?

MIAMI (AP) — A lie detector test administered to a burglary suspect in 1966 produced a confession to two murders for which Freddie Pitts and Wilbert Lee had been sentenced to death in

eventually pardoned after living 12 years and 48 days behind bars. Recently, a 17-year-old youth compelled to submit to a lie de-tector test as a preemployment requirement for a janitor's job at a department store here, failed his test and was not hired. The polygraph operator said the results showed the young man was a subversive although he belonged to no organization and could not define the word subversive.

Heralded as a boon to business and damned as an invasion of privacy, the use of polygraph has attracted national attention. At present, 15 states ban or severely limit the use of polygraph by employers. Most of these exempt only law enforcement agencies. The 15 are Alaska, California, Connecticut, Delaware,

A two-year study by the Privacy Protection Study Commission created by the Privacy Act of 1974 was presented to President Carter and Congress in July. It examined individual privacy rights and record-keeping practices used by employers to acquire

The commission found a few techniques "so intolerably in-trusive as to justify banning them, irrespective of the relevance of

the information they generate."

At the top of the list was the polygraph. "The polygraph examination, often called the lie-detector test, is one technique the commission believes should be proscribed on intrusiveness grounds," the report said.

The commission recommended that "a federal law be amended or enacted to provide that an employer is forbidden to use polygraph or other truth verification equipment to gather information from an applicant or employee."

Main objections to its use were "that it deprives individuals of any control over divulging information about themselves, and

that it is unreliable." Lenny Bierman, a polygraph expert with 20 years experience, says polygraph is not an invasion of privacy and argues the device is necessary for employers to hire trustworthy employes. "If there is invasion of privacy, it is when they (employers) ask anything other than your name — not when the polygraph operator checks your reply," Bierman said. (Employers usually

corroborate with polygraph operators on what questions should protect and has the right to weed out the dishonest employe."

While polygraph tests are not admissible in any court unless both sides agree, Holmes' opinions and evaluations carry considerable weight when he testifies.

The apparatus, which costs between \$1,600 and \$2,500, is connected to the person being tested. While the person is being questioned, a graph records respiration, cardio-vascular activity and galvanic skin response. The operator then evaluates the graf markings to discern whether the subject has lied or told the truth

on each question.

MX Factor In SALT

Details are leaking out about the terms that may form the basis for new strategic arms limitation agreements between the United States and the Soviet Union. However, a recent announcement by Defense Secretary Harold Brown may tell us more about the drift of the SALT talks than the unofficial reports circulating around Washington and Geneva.

Mr. Brown said the Defense Department has decided to go ahead with full-scale development of a mobile intercontinental missile system - the socalled MX missile. This would mean a commitment on the scale of the now-suspended B-1 bomber program, with an ultimate cost of \$35 billion or more by the time the new missiles are deployed in

The MX decision, because of the cost of the program and because it introduces another factor into the already difficult SALT negotiations, is bound to come under attack. Why embark on a major new missile program when the aim of SALT is to put a limit on nuclear arsenals and if possible start scaling them back?

Some background helps explain the Pentagon's case for the MX. Putting land-based missiles in a channel or tunnel so their launch-point can be selected at random is not a new idea. The Russians already have deployed mobile intermediate range missiles and are presumed ready to deploy mobile intercontinental missiles. Last February, President Carter urged the Russians to join in a moratorium on mobile missiles so the United States would not have to invest in their develop-

The decision to go ahead with our MX missile suggests that the Soviets — so far at least — do not want to discard mobile missiles. Obviously they are aware of the vulnerability of their fixed-base missiles to the accuracy of American missiles. The problem is, Soviet missile technology is not standing still, and with increasing accuracy of their missiles the fixed silos of our own Titan and es become unacceptably vulnerable in the various "first strike" scenarios that concern our deterrent strategists.

The SALT negotiators may be within grasp of an acceptable formula imposing a ceiling on numbers of strategic weapons in various categories. However, Mr. Brown's announcement seems to rule out an agreement by which both sides would forego the option of protecting land-based missiles by introducing mobility into their launch sites. This brings a certain inevitability to the decision to proceed with the MX program.

The cost of the MX is roughly \$100 million per missile - like the price tag of the B-1, a staggering figure. It would be welcome news if there were an alternative to this follow-on of the Titan-Minuteman generation of missiles. But the investment we have already made in those latter strategic weapons will have brought us no future security if weapons development on the Soviet side undermines their deterrent value.

Jefferson Starship:

Flying To The GOP?

"I find myself getting dangerously Republican," says Paul Kantner, of the legendary Jefferson Airplane, now Jefferson Starship. "The Republicans and the anar-chists are close to one another, starting at opposite ends but going over the top and touching, particularly on the issues of human freedom . . . People are learning, slowly."

Since its debut in 1965, Jefferson Airplane

has had a socio-political impact at least equal to its musical influence. Welcome to Lake Mary, Florida! We're located between the Cities of Longwood to the south, and Sanford, Seminole County seat to the north; geographically in the center of Seminole

Lake Mary covers nine square miles, has its own police force and fire department. The tax rate, which has been the same since it was levied, is 3 mills or \$3 per \$1,000 property valuation. The City of Lake Mary employs 19 fulltime people and 1 CETA

.... As City Manager Knowles Sees It

"The future must first be defined as a fixed period of time. If that is to be in 20 years, I believe you will find Sanford as the northeastern portion of the metropolitan area of Central Florida. This will be a huge, densely populated urban area extending out from the core city of Orlando in all directions. No doubt Sanford will be a residential type area with retail commercial support areas much larger than now exist. This support will consist of at least one large shopping center complex. large shopping center complex.

"The industrial growth will continue to expand but at a slower rate and it will cluster along and around transportation arteries; be they rail, land, water, or air. Fuel and energy will become the critical factors for industrial health; more so than now with dependence on the available labor market. Labor costs will have become uniformedly high and costly throughout the country and it will no longer be the

"This growth will produce an urban City of San-ford of some 54,000 people. Intra-city travel will

become a task that will continue to cause an outward migration of residents and leaving a trend towards more multi-story dwelling complexes within the city center. The problems of dense growth will result in talk and projects of how government could or should control and direct it. But this will not stem nor stop the population trend and there will be no con structive revamping of government as we know it today. There will be more acceptance of the regional approach to selective governmental services as economy means but this will dictate the growth of an impersonal attitude by the public towards local government. The past twenty years have already initiated this fact.

"The two major problems confronting this urban growth of Central Florida will be mass transportation and solid waste disposal. There is no combination of fiscal resources and industrial techniques now available to effect a viable solution to these two problems. The future does not hold an

Local Schools Have Reason To Be Proud-Layer

Whether progress within a school system is measured in terms of physical expansion or academic achievement, Seminole School Supt. William P. Layer believes the local system has reason to be

In state tests administered to 12th and 8th graders in all Florida counties in 1975, Seminole County students scored second overall in both grades.

"We've been making fine progress in our instructional program over the last six years," said Layer, "and have developed an outstanding instructional program.

"The test results show we've got a good group of teachers and we're spending money in the right places," he asserted.

Seminole County is spending a disproportionate amount of its budget on instructional personnel, compared with most Florida counties, he said. The county has a relatively small administrative body, and relatively large instructional body for a system its size, and Layer believes the students are the beneficiaries of this arrangement. eneficiaries of this arrangement.

In recent years, he said more personnel have been placed in elementary school guidance programs. "We believe it's important to get problems corrected early," he remarked.

Emphasis is also placed on the compensatory program, par-ticularly in the first three grades. This program caters to the educably and economically deprived student, serving to enrich their environment and improve their chances of succeeding in

If the required level is not achieved in the 3rd, 5th and 8th grades, students are retained. If they don't pass the 11th grade tests, they are put in remedial programs to improve their basic skills. If they still fail the 11th grade test, a differential diploma is issued the

failing students.

Tremendous expansion has been accomplished in the areas of vocational and exceptional child education, said Layer. "In the vocational programs we offer almost every kind of occupational skill, from agriculture to office to data processing.

"The exceptional child program includes special classes for everyone from the gifted to the profoundly retarded. The chances of handicapped children making it in today's achool system are

vastly improved."

All these new or expanded programs cost a lot more money,
Layer agreed. But he believes "investment in education is the
best way to prevent problems — and it's a lot less expensive than
remedial programs later."

The Seminole County school system has a student enrollment of
32,000. There are 2,800 employes in the system, 1,800 of them

teachers.

The system has an operating budget of \$40 million and a combined operating and capital outlay budget of \$50 million.

The school system is currently seeking to have its high schools accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). The SACS accrediting teams will be visiting the county's five high schools in the fall to make recommendations on any areas which need to be changed before the schools can be accredited. Layer said if the system continues to seek accreditation, it should receive it by the Fall of 1978.

New building programs for the 1977-78 program include the construction of an elementary school at Wekiva in southwest Seminole County; a vocational addition at Lyman and Lake Howell High Schools; a music addition at Teague and repairs to

Howell High Schools; a music addition at Teague and repairs to the roofs of several schools throughout the county.

Sanford, County Seat Seen As City With Bright Future

The City of Sanford celebrated the Centennial of its in-corporation on September 29 and elected officials and residents of cole's largest city and the county seat see a bright future

No matter what the future holds, the city's founding by General Sanford, the inclusion within its limits of the historic Ft. Mellon area and the City of Mellonville, the Indian Wars and the city's truggle for survival cannot be forgotten.

Long before General Sanford was heard in Florida Camp Monroe had been established in the wilderness by Col. Fanning in December, 1836 on the south bank of Lake Monroe. The post was occupied by two companies of artillery, four companies of ragoons and some Creek Indians.

In a battle with the Seminole Indians at the post in February. 1837, Capt. Charles Mellon was killed and a lieutenant and 14 thers were wounded while the Indian loss was 25.

Capt, Mellon and the others who lost their lives at the post were siried at the water's edge of Lake Monroe, near where the Elks Club building is today. The fort at the site was renamed Fort

Mellon in honor of the slain captain.

A community, known as Mellonville, evolved at the site. By 1843 when the new County of Orange, composed of what is now Volusia, Semimole and Orange Counties, was split away from Mosquito County by legislative act, Mellonville was designated the county

In 1854, Volusia became a separate county and by 1856 Orlando was the new county seat of Orange which included what was to become Seminole County.

In 1913 Seminole was split from Orange and Sanford designated

In the years after its designation as county seat of Orange in 1843, the community of Mellonville first competed with and then joined and finally died.

During Mellonville's time as county seat, Arthur Ginn, who was populated clerk of the court, secured the tract of land on which he appointed clerk of the court, secured the tract of land on which he planted the orange grove — later known as the Speer Grove — and which is a county parkland today. The grove froze out during the great freeze of the 1890s and only a few of those trees still survive today at the site designated with a marker off Mellouville Avenue.

By 1858, the fort was unnecessary, the federal government

naving succeeded in moving the Indians west.

By this time a large hotel had been constructed across Lake Monroe at Enterprise, and many Northerners were coming down by boat from Jacksonville to hunt and fish.

Fort Mellon became important to the settlement of Central Florida. All goods were brought into this section by boat to the fort and carried by mule team to other sections of the state.

In 1870, Gen. Henry S. Sanford, former minister to Belgium, purchased 12,535 acres of land and laid out the town that was

amed for him, west of Fort Mellon. out the town that was named for him, west of Fort Mellon. The General interested a group of English capitalists in his

plans and personally brought over a colony of Swedes, settling them in his new town.

In 1880, former President Ulysses S. Grant was in Sanford at ceremonies to mark the beginning of construction of the South Florida Railroad. Grant turned the first shovel of earth to begin

When J.E. Ingraham, Gen Sanford's agent in charge of the Sanford property, received a telegram that Grant and his party were due to reach Sanford on the early afternoon of Jan. 12, 1800, he gave a courier a list of the people in the backwoods he wished notified and an invitation extended to them to be in Sanford at the hour when the boat was scheduled to arrive.

The messenger covered 15-20 miles on horseback to carry the

The messenger covered 15-20 miles on horseback to carry the news to the residents of Mellopvilla Avenue, Fort Reid, Twin Lakes, Paola and Sylvan Fake.

According to one account at the time, "Some of the settlers notified were Confederate veterans who, when advised of Gen. Grant's approach, looked at the messenger in a critical way and stated they were not interested, and did not give a damn if he was going to arrive in Sanford."

The steamer, known as the Geo. M. Byrd, reached the old Sanford dock around 2 p.m. When the steamer docked, Capt. D.L. May, publisher of the Sanford Journal, was the first one to board the boat, handing the general a recent issue of his paper.

The general turned over the first shovel of dirt. The shovel he used is now owned by the General Sanford Library. Following the ceremony, the visiting dignitaries were driven in carriages on a tour of the Spaer and Doyle groves.

At the time of Grant's visit, there was practically no town. There were three saloons, two stores (one operated by Gen. Sanford and the other by H.L. DeForest), and a small hardware store.

By 1864, the railroad had been completed. It linked Jacksonville with Sanford. The little town on the St. Johns River had both rail

with Santord. The little town on the St. Johns River had both rail and water transportation to the markets of the north.

The year before general was incorporated was 1886. The town's officials were: Albert M. Thrasher, mayor; Duncan J. Campbell, marshal; Thomas M. MacRae, clerk and assessor; Fay S. Phelps, transurer and collector. Aldermen were Phillip J. Parramore (chairman) Stephen J. Drawdy, Henry L. Lillienthal, A.E. Phillips, Adams S. Travis, and J.B. Randall, Sanford was incorporated as a city on Sept. 29, 1877. T. Pearson was elected mayor.

The meeting had been preceded by a notification made and signed on Aug. 29 of that year by N.A. Hull. Robert B. Rich and T. Pearson, urging all persons who were registered voters within the proposed corporate limits to assemble at 10 a.m. on Saturday, ept. 29, to form the new government

At that time, the largest settlement in the area was Mellonville which lay east of the proposed town of Sanford. Its main street, ville Avenue, was laid out by Col. Zachary Taylor, later resident of the United States, and was extended through the orest from the fort here to Fort Brooke, which later became

The notice of the Sanford meeting summoned all persons who were registered voters residing within the following proposed

Seginning at the end of Sanford Avenue on Lake Monroe, ence running south along said Avenue two and a quarter miles, thence due west two and a half miles, thence due north to Lake Monroe and then eastward along the margin of the lake to the

County. It was not until 1913 that Seminole County was created and Sanford became the county seat.

There were 50 qualified electors residing within the prescribed town limits present at the meeting in 1877, and this presented

more than two-thirds of the electors. Hull, president of the meeting, appointed George C. Granter, Frank Lewis and William Boatwright sergeants at arms.

It was voted that the corporate name for the new municipality should be Sanford, and a city seal was designed bearing a palm tree illustration and the words, "Sanford, Orange County,

In the vote for incorporation, 53 voted for and one against the move, and since it appeared that not less than two-thirds of the duly qualified and registered voters of the proposed city had voted to form a municipal corporation, it was declared carried and the

The voters then chose the new city's first officials. T. Pearson was elected mayor, edging E.S. White by a 39-10 vote. Elected as the first aldermen of Sanford were A.C. Martin, 44 votes; A. Nillson, 38 votes; E.S. White, 38 votes; R.B. Rich, 47 D.L. Way became the first city clerk, defeating J.A. McRae 38-

George C. Granter, with 44 votes, was elected town marshal. W.J. Hill, founder of the Hill Lumber and Hardware Co., received one vote and F. Lewis received four votes.

By 1909 Sanford could boast of being the only interior city in the State of Florida with its own intracity railway. Lettuce and celery crops flourished, and Sanford became a national leader in

producing these two vegetables.

Sanford joined the Bell Telephone system in 1915, when Southern Bell bought Sanford Telephone Co. The April 30, 1915, Sanford Herald reported: "It is now learned that the new owners vill spend a large sum of money on the plant here and will endeavor to give the patrons one of the best-equipped and most-complete telephone systems in the state; in fact, it will be a model telephone system in every respect."

The "great improvements to the system" would mean "a slight raise in the rates," the Herald reported.

In 1823, Sanford became the first city in Florids to secure the necessary state legislation to allow the city to establish a city planning commission. The bill's passage was the result of lobbying by the Chamber of Commerce's city planning committee.

The planning commission was expected to develop a zoning plan for the city, which, it was hoped, would attract residents and restors to the city which had become the celery capital of the

The planning commission would have jurisdiction over changes in, or creation of, city streets, subdivisions, new business locations and city parks.

Also in 1923 the city approved construction of a boat basin and concrete pier and dock on the Lake Monroe waterfront.

Noting that "We are overofficered, overtaxed, oversolicited, overburdened with clubs and organizations, top-heavy in every part of our... official life," the Herald of July 9, 1923, called for a consolidation of Seminole County and City of Sanford governments.

"Half of the officials could be dispensed with and while those holding fat offices might object to the arrangement the taxpayer after it is explained to him would favor it heartily. Abolish as many offices as you can, get your county and city government under as few heads as possible — getting the right kind of heads — get your county and city business in a business form and then go to it," editorialized the Herald.

The year 1925 was a hectic one for the growing city. The commissioners voted to purchase the city's power plants from Southern Utilities Co. and develop a city water system. The city also adopted a charter form of government in 1923.

"Sanford's New City Hall To Be Formally Opened Tomorrow," read the headline of the June 14, 1925, Sanford Herald. The stucco building, described by the Herald as "of a modified Spanish architectural design," was reported to be "the finest municipal hall in Florida for a city the size of Sanford," according to "a number of contractors and builders" in the state. of contractors and builders" in the state.
"The building forms an imposing picture from any angle and

reported.

Nineteen city employes worked in the new city hall. Through the years the number has grown to 31.

Forrest Lake was then in his 11th term as mayor. Almost exactly 50 years later, the Sanford City Commission ratified a contract with Orlando architect Wayne Heasley to design a new city hall to replace the proud, old structure that had become completely outmoded. The second floor has been closed for many years because it is uninsurable.

The new city hall, which will be completed in December or early in 1978, will cost about \$1.4 million, provided by the federal Economic Development Administration of the U.S. Department

The \$75,000 cost of the old city hall was paid by the issuance of bonds. In the years 1924 and 1925 the city issued \$2.94 million in bonds for public improvements, including \$25,000 for a library, \$50,000 for new police headquarters and jail, \$200,000 for bulkhead construction on the waterfront, \$1,500,000 for 31 miles of street paving, \$300,000 for storm sewers and \$375,000 for a new water

of owners through the years, was recently purchased by New Tribes Mission for the group's international headquarters.

The city commission in 1926 proposed yet another bond issue, this one for \$2.5 million. With the harvest in 1925 of an \$8 million celery crop, economic and civic confidence was high. The \$2.5 million bond issue was approved April 20, 1926, by Sanford voters, by a 7,053-to-1,069 vote.

The optimism of the 1920's burst when the real-estate boom came to an abrupt halt in 1926, however. The banks ran into difficulty, and farmers were hard-pressed.

By 1930 the city was deeply in debt, owing \$6,500,000 in bonded

debt. The debt was finally paid off earlier this year. Mayor Lake eventually went to prison for misuse of public funds, and Sanford, like other cities, had to struggle to survive.

But survive it did, and the opening of the Sanford Naval Air Station in 1942 provided a much-needed economic stimulus to the

With the purchase of the former Sanford Naval Academy properties, the New Tribes Mission, a non-denor mission-oriented religion, will be moving its international headquarters and publishing operation from Woodworth, Wis., to Sanford.

The New Tribes Mission purchased for \$400,000 the large former hotel on a city block and later a Naval Academy; a two-story building on 16 city lots and a gymnasium on eight city lots. The publishing operation is to be conducted out of the former gymnasium

The organization considers itself a growing family of more than 1,200 missionaries and 800 students. The group, according to its publication "Brown Gold," plans to remodel the buildings and to move its headquarters office, publications and staff to the new location.

The Sanford property, the publication said, will provide much needed space for publications and sufficient guest space for publications and sufficient guest space for missionaries and Mission friends.

New Tribes Mission has a "boot eamp" and training institute in Oviedo and facilities, not only in the United States, but also in Canada and Australia. Bill Barron

is chairman of New Tribes Mission. The property was purchased from a California liquidating trust.

Upon purchasing the property, Barron said, "We'll try to restore it, do some rebuilding and bring it up to the city

building code."

New Tribes Mission was created in 1942.

It is a worldwide Christian organization, which Barron describes as denominational and non-profit.

The group operates missions in the Philippines, Indonesia, South America and the Southeast Asia. It operates Bible schools in Australia, Pennsylvania, California, Missouri and Wisconsin. The Sanford Naval Academy which had occupied the buildings for 13 years ceased

operation in 1976, closing its doors because of decreased enrollment. Students said one reason for the decreased enrollment was a substitution of Marine discipline over the lack of Naval discipline for students. The properties had been purchased by the Bernarr McFadden Foundation in 1963. The buildings were originally con-structed in 1925 as the Forrest Lake Hotel.





The center will contain a classroom building manned by fulltime staff, picnic areas, several group environmental study areas, 1,300 feet of nature trail and 1,800 feet of nature boardwalk.

— Mullet Lake Park, 151 acres on the St. Johns River in northeast Seminole. The park sports fishing and camping facilities.



Star Line Enterprises Inc. is only four years old, but the impact it has made in the business world would be remarkable even for a longestablished company.

Star Line officials expect to take in \$4

million this year just for the ambulances and farm equipment it manufactures, and the surplus jeeps and helicopters it sells.

Star Line is headed by 47-year-old Earl Smith, who usually sports a Hawaiian shirt

and a Dale Carnegie smile. Smith is a mild-mannered but ambitious entrepreneur.

He's been in a hurry since he was 16 when he dropped out of his junior year at Orlando High School to talk his way into the Marines during World War II.

They sent him home — too young. He never graduated from high school.

Two heart attacks almost killed him when he was 26 and 27 because he was pushing too hard, smoking three packs of cigarettes a day, through the pace of a salesman's life.

Since then he's driven his way to the top of one company after the next, buying out partners and most recently adding small firms into his Star-Line group based at the Sanford Airport.

Smith and a partner opened Star-Line Enterprises Inc., in 1973 to build ambulances. Two months later he bought out the partner. Smith also is one of the founders and the former president of Cobia Boats, a boat manufacturing plant in Sanford. He merged a smaller boat plant he had taken over with another company and Cobia was born when he

Smith left Cobia in 1968 and became an investor in a number of other projects, but that wasn't satisfying enough for Earl Smith, who'd been in sales and marketing most of his life, and so he got into building ambulances. And going to church.

I've really tried to be a Christian for the last few years. I didn't think that I had time to go to Church (Seventh-day Adventist) while I was with Cobia.

"It's made a big difference. Things don't seem so hectic and frantic." "It's been a lot of work. It doesn't just

happen real easy," Smith said. He lives in Longwood with his wife and seven children. The one thing that helps make it easier. Smith said, is the people, the 90 or so workers

who build the ambulances and equipment and run the plants.

The trick is to get the right people. He said the Bible taught him how to do that. "The first thing I look for when a man comes to work for Star-Line is his character.

If he comes in here cussing and carrying on, he can just forget it." "The people who work with us are entitled to work with people of character.'

Character like that of their boss. Earl Smith is president, chairman of the board and the private firm's major stockholder.

Smith decided two years ago to diversify his corporation to financially protect the ambulance operation.

Star-Line purchased a Lake County farm equipment manufacturing plant in February and an Orange County steel and erector manufacturing plant this summer. The two firms are now subsidiaries of the parent Star-

Smith finds "it interesting to put these little companies together. There are so many products that still need to be built and sold." And so, he's doing it some more, by negotiating to purchase two Sanford manufacturing firms.

Star-Line has started building small fiberglass houses Smith hopes to market in the oil-rich Middle East and Central and South America where countries are moving into the industrial world.

Star-Line International Inc., is the third offspring of the parent company.

Eleven years ago two enterprising young women, the Rye Sisters, Valerie Weld and Miriam Wright, moved to Sanford from Jacksonville to open the School of Dance

Their talk of starting a ballet company was met with negativism and iciness when they approached community leaders. But the avalanche of discouraging rejections only incited the sisters to pursue their objective.

The sister's determination and perserverance combined with the enthusiasm and support of alightly more than a handful of friends saw the birth of Ballet Guild of

inole (BGS) in 1968. At the inaugural concert, "The Nutcracker Suite," in December of that year, only a sprinkling of supporters turned out at Seminole High School auditorium.

Those attending the performance reviewed the production as excellent and many appeared overwhelmed that such talent existed in the community.

But, from where the Rye sisters stood, the non-profit community endeavor would require more than talented twirling toes. They projected that through the efforts of warm working bodies the necessary opeational funds would follow through.

And that's the way it was.

As the dance company progressed, classical ballet took a backseat to jazz and free-style ballet, and year after year the repertoire has included "Something For Everyone — Country to Classic."

And through the years, as artistic-directors and choreographers of the company, the sisters have managed to exceed their efforts. Their remuneration for this service requiring endless after-hours, is \$1 each But their rewards are many. They beam. The merits -

The Chase brothers bought orange groves and successfully sold their crops. Their operations proved so successful that other orange growers came to the Chase brothers and asked them to sell their crops. This was the beginning of the company's packing and selling Before the 1894 freeze San-

ford was the largest orange shipping point in Florida. But terrible freezes in December of 1894 and February of 1895 almost wiped out the Florida citrus industry. Shipments from Florida were reduced from over 5 million boxes annually to less than 150,000.

Following the freeze, Chase and Co. got into the vegetable

usiness, in which a crop could be planted and harvested within a single year. An orange tree takes at least five years to start producing marketable oranges. By 1904 the company had opened an office in Jacksonville, and the citrus and vegetable business were

booming. The celery business in Sanford was still in its infancy. The insurance business recovered from the freezes of a decade earlier, which had placed many businesses insured by Chase in the position of not being able to meet their insurance premiums. Chase sold insurance all over the State Shortly after World War I, the

insurance business was sold. allowing Chase officials to devote full-time efforts to the fruit, vegetable and growers' supply efforts.

By 1910 the economy of Sanford was based entirely on agriculture. In the early part of the decade much of Sanford's produce was shipped by riverboat, but the growth of the railroads soon permitted produce to be shipped faster by Sanford became a major trans-shipment center. Goods

from the industrial centers of the northeastern United States reached Sanford by rail or boat for shipment to southern Florida, and goods were shipped overland to eastern Florida from Sanford. The 1920's were a time of booming growth all over the state, but severe difficulties were to follow. The Florida real estate boom collapsed in 1926, and Sanford's banks found themselves in deep trouble. "Practically all the banks had problems," S.O. Chase

State of Florida closed many banks to try and head off financial panic. It was no surprise then that President Franklin D. Roosevelt's "bank holiday" in 1933, in which banks across America were temporarily closed by order of the President, did not affect Florida as much as other states. The Sunshine State had been through its own bank

Just before 1930 Chase sold most of its citrus business, retaining only the few groves the company owned outright and the Sanford packinghouse. For the next five years crops from the Chase groves were marketed through the Florida Citrus Exchange, After that time, Chase resumed the

marketing of citrus.

The vegetable, fertilizer and growers' supply business was developed rapidly and profitably under the direction of W.A. Leffler, who had joined W.A. Leffler, who had joined the company in 1908. Leffler also developed Chase's highly successful wholesaling of building supplies, an activity the company continues today. In the 1930's agricultural production increased continually until shortly before World War II.

Why did business slack off at that time? Chase attributes the decline to the nature of the agricultural business itself.





Here's What To Expect

Are You Planning Move To Central Florida Soon?

you'll need? Well, here's a list of agencies or companies you might have to deal with sooner or later. And, in an effort to help our readers, we include here what one

can expect when dealing with them: FLORIDA POWER & LIGHT CO.: A \$50 deposit is required. After a year, 6 per cent interest is paid on the deposit. The interest is deducted from the August bill. For a place with established service, there's a \$6 service charge for a reconnection. If it's a new meter installation, there's a \$25 service charge. Usually service can be connected in one day.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT: A child entering kindergarten must reach his 5th birthday by Jan. 1 of the current school year.
Kindergarten attendance isn't mandatory. A child entering first
grade must reach his 6th birthday by Jan. 1, of the current
school year. To find out what school your children will attend, call the county school system administrative offices, and ask for the Pupil Placement Office School assignments are based on the parents' legal address. Parents must show proof of residence. This can be accomplished by a driver's license with an address or a voter registration card.

Proof of age must be shown for children entering kindergarten or first grade for the first time in Florida. Some record of the birth, a birth certificate is preferred, is required. Students of any age registering in Florida schools for the first time must show proof of immunization against: polio, diptheria, whooping cough, tetanus, measles — both rubella and rubeola — and mumps. Proof may be a military shot record, a doctor's shot record, a doctor's letter, or a public health form, which most

While it's not mandatory, school officials recommend having previous school records forwarded to the child's new school as soon as possible. This helps in placing the child and in recording credits toward graduation. Enrollments are done at the school

to which the child is assigned.

VOTER REGISTRATION: Check under your county offices listings in the telephone book for the elections supervisor's office. You will register there. You must be 18. There is no residency time requirement. No proof of residence is required. If the elections supervisor feels it's necessary, proof of age, such as a birth certificate or a driver's license, will be required. An oath is administered in which the person swears he is qualified to vote. If he's registered in another Florida county or another state, he will be asked to turn in his card or provide information so the prior registration can be cancelled.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION: Florida homeowners are given a property tax exemption on the first \$5,000 valuation of their me, if they claim it. Homeowners must register with the operty appraiser's office in their county between Jan. 1 and March 1. You will have to provide the appraiser's office with a copy of your deed, which is returned after information is taken

If you bought a new house after the homestead qualifying deadline, you would only be paying taxes on the vacant land for the remainder of that year and could qualify for the exemption the following year. If you bought a used house and the previous owner had claimed homestead, you would get the benefit of that exemption for the remainder of the year and could qualify for your own exemption the following year. mail to you if it's properly addressed to you. You'll have a problem if you didn't leave a forwarding address with the post office that last served you. If no forwarding address was left, your mail would be held for 10 days, then returned to the sender with the notation that no forwarding address was available. Deltona: A Post Office ...

On February 1st this year every resident in Deltona got a number — a zip code number. It came to them along with the new Deltona Post Office, which was first used that day.

The zip code, first one the city has ever had, is

"We have a terrific facility," said Ken Fleischer, postal supervisor, who said the 8,000 square foot building cost \$276,000 to build.

The post office, located at 944 Deltona Boulevard, near Balsam Street, contains about 600 boxes for postal patrons, said Fleischer, "and there are plenty of them available for people who want them." "We are a full service installation," said Fleischer, "meaning that we have a window counter with three window clerks, operate 10 postal routes to serve a potential of 5,371 deliveries, and provide all the services usually provided by large post offices." Fleischer said the post office is still a branch, with its headquarters in Orange City under the direction of postmaster Herb Sever. Branch manager of the Deltona post office is James Shuck, who lives on Stone Island in Enterprise, while supervisor Fleischer drives in each day from Longwood.

The post office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

... And A New Library

The Deltona Public Library, 1691 Providence Blvd., is a new facility, opened in 1976. It, like its companion facility in DeBary, belongs to the Volusia County Library system, which has a total of 12

Together the libraries offer more than 27,000 books to readers in southwest Volusia County, with slightly more than half the books housed at Deltona facility at 2 Azalea Drive.

The libraries not only put books into circulation, but have large collections of records which may be checked out by people who would rather listen than

read. Together they have about 1367 records, with about half of those housed at each library.

Both libraries offer summer programs for children, including story hours, and the programs are provided without charge.

New Sanford Site Possible For Keller Smelting Plant

Keller Industries Inc., an aluminum manufacturing firm planning to locate a \$750,000 smelting and recycling plant in Sanford has added a second possible site for the facility.

But, although it now has two possible sites for the plant in Sanford, one of a group of homeowners who objects to the plant said today such a plant as the one planned by Keller Industries has no place in Sanford.

Kenneth McIntosh, attorney for Keller Industries Inc., a Miamibased firm, said as part of the company's effort to develop as "good a public relations as possible," an alternative four-acre parcel, north of Cobia Boat Works on the west side of the railroad racks and adjacent to Cornwall Street has been

Silver Lake-Mellonville tract, McIntosh said the firm is "keenly

The original site selected by Keller was a three-acre parcel on Silver Lake and Mellonville roads.

The new site because it is larger and would require the improvement of Consell-Street and the railroad siding there will require an additional expenditure of \$40,000, McInton estimated.

But, retired U.S. Army Lt. Col. Kenneth Pritchard, a member of the Concerned Property Owners Association, fighting the location of the Keller plant in the Silver Lake-Mellonville area, said today, "I can't think of any place within the city limits of Sanford for an industry of this sort."

Some 650 pamphlets were distributed by the organization in the Sanora and South Pinecrest area over the past week objecting to the industry.

The one-page leaflet entitled, "Do you want a smelter in your neighborhood?" says the Sanford City Commission has approved a bond issue for construction of an aluminum smelter "near you" at Mellonville and Silver Lake Road.

"Do you want heavy industry of this kind in Sanford with the dangers of pollution, property devaluation and diminished quality of life?"

The answer given in the leaflet is "No" and urges those reading the pamphlet to tell their city commissioners, listing each with residence and office telephone number.

The leaflet asks for contributions toward legal fees to fight the issue be sent to William S. Butler, treasurer of the organization. McIntosh said in choosing the new site, the effort was to get it as far away from the area objectionable to the citizens as possible. The new tract, has a one-quarter mile buffer from the residential area, estimated City Manager W.E. Knowles today.

McIntosh said the new site is available to all utilities and rail and road transportation and has no known impediment as far as soning is concerned for the recycling operation. He said Keller is waiting for a reply from the city and if a favorable one is received will begin moving forward again.

Keller Industries spokesmen said previously plans are to spend 20 per cent of the project costs for pollution control devices in line with city regulations and deed restrictions from the Hunt Oil Co., owner of both parcels.

Both sites are zoned for medium industrial development. The property was originally zoned industrial by the county as requested by the Hunt interests and was later annexed to the city. Pritchard said the homeowners group has hired Thom Rumberger, former circuit judge and ex-county attorney, and "Buddy" Kirk as its legal counsel.
