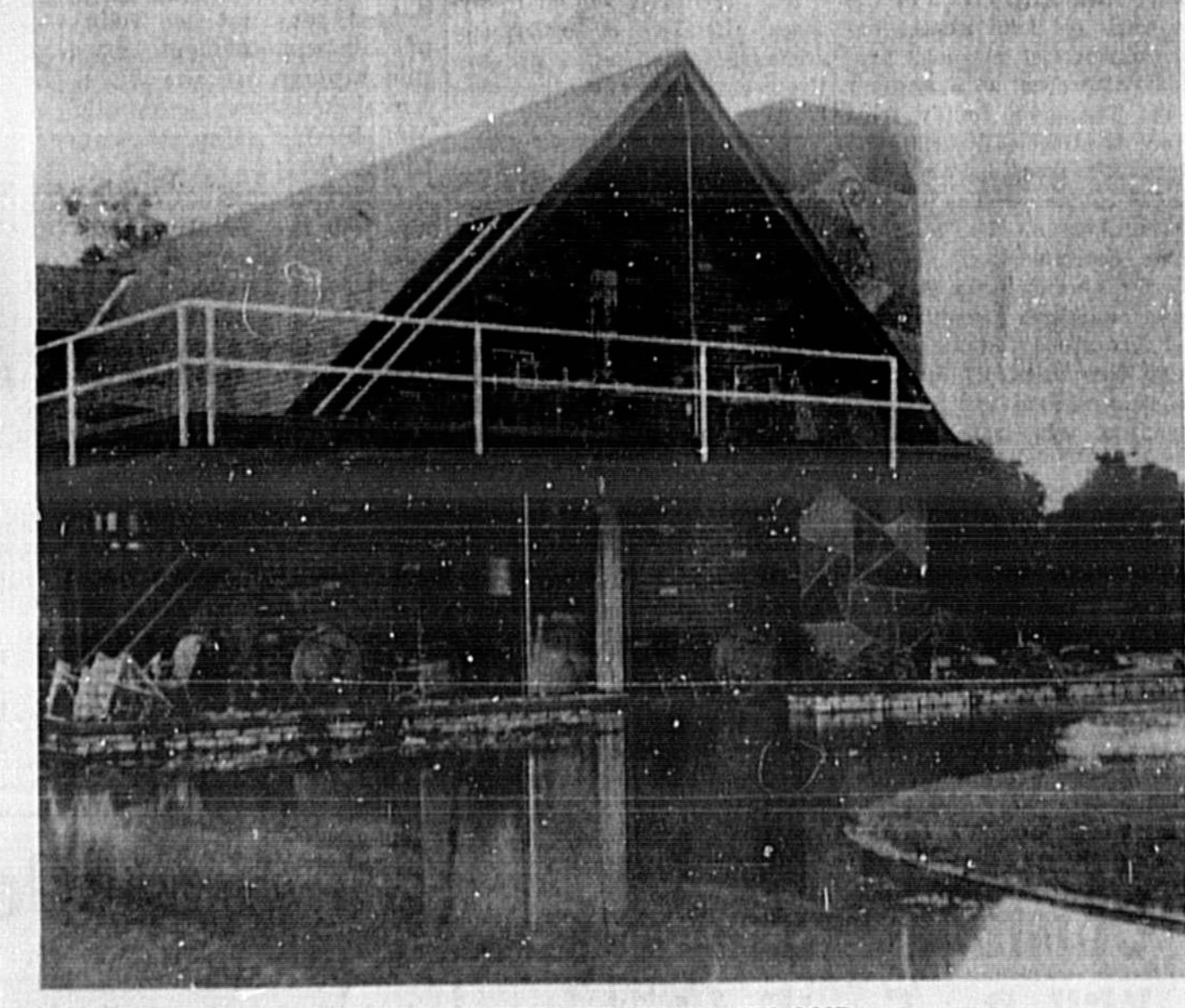

# Commiss Up Supply Moves, Allies Planning Cease-Fire

SAIGON (UPI)—Informed all military sources said today the North Vietnamese were moving supplies into the South at a pace 50 per cent higher than last year but this did not indicate a major Communist offensive during the Tet lunar new year period.

U.S. and South Vietnamese headquarters announced today the allies will observe a one-day cease-fire during the Tet holidays, three days shorter than the cease-fire announced previously by the Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese.

Whether the arms buildup was the latest Communist activity is expected to change the truce decision. The Viet Cong staged their largest attacks in the Saigon area in three months Monday and early today, smashing a truck convoy with rocket grenades and snatching two village headquarters.

Military sources said troop infiltration had actually decreased 50 per cent from last year. Reliable informants said about 15,000 truck movements were observed on the Ho Chi Minh Trail during December alone and that the Communists also had set up huge fuel dumps in Quang Binh Province of North Vietnam bordering Laos and above the Demilitarized Zone.

The Viet Cong assault in the Saigon area killed four persons and captured 100 prisoners.

## Carswell Decision Near

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee, about to go into closed session on the Supreme Court nomination of G. Harrold Carswell, has heard evidence that the judge was hostile and insulting toward civil rights lawyers.

The committee arranged to hear today two more opposition witnesses—civil rights lawyer Joseph L. Rauh Jr., and NAACP official Clarence Mitchell—before going behind closed doors to discuss and possibly vote on the nomination made Jan. 19 by President Nixon.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy said, however, he did not expect a vote today on the nomination. The Massachusetts Democrat declined to say whether he might invoke a committee rule allowing any member to force a week's postponement of a vote on the appointment.

## Transport May Alter Weather Pollution Critics Fight Jet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sensitors of the supersonic transport concede only one point to the antipollution critics: The SST as presently designed will make more airport noise than any existing commercial jetliner.

But larger questions about SST noise, sonic boom and weather alterations still are hotly contested.

The nation may know better in a few weeks whether the 1,600-mile-an-hour, needle-nosed plane is indeed a serious threat to the environment. Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, tentatively has scheduled hearings on the question before his Senate air and water pollution subcommittee.

Environmentalists in fact the SST on two counts: Noise, both airport and sonic boom during flight; and possible weather alterations from water vapor and engine effluents dumped into the upper atmosphere.

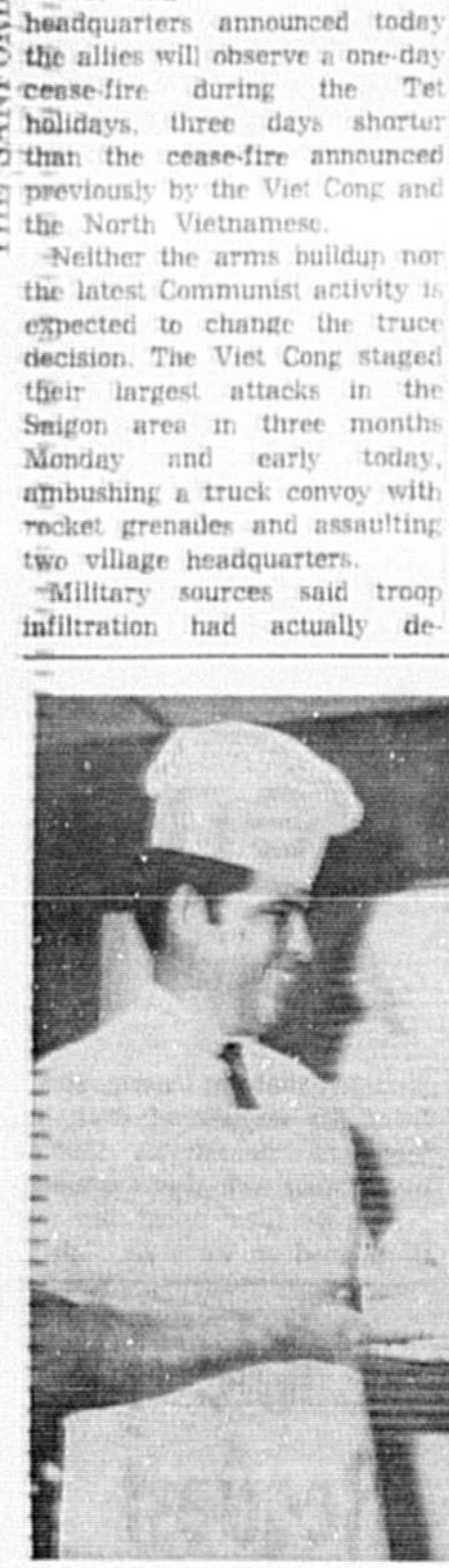
The Federal Aviation Administration and its allies in Congress have long since dropped as futile any defense of sonic boom, the 25 to 30 mile wide carpet of thunder which trails the SST at speeds greater than sound.

And President Nixon largely detested boom critics by pledge to allow SST flights over populated areas at speeds slow enough to prevent a boom.

But some were not won over. Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., condemns the booms that would be generated on transoceanic flights.

"If the sonic boom can cause damage on land, then it can cause damage at sea, too," he says.

The FAA, which administers the SST project, counters with studies showing the plane to be economically feasible without overland, supersonic flights.



## Tension Is Starting To Show In Local Trial

The grueling trial of the "corpse in the closet" continued yesterday and the apparent strain of the case took its toll on family members of Mrs. Mabel Frances Thompson, on trial for her life, accused of killing her former husband, Bobby, on a June 26, 1968, murder charge.

The tension and strain of the two-week-old trial almost became physical at one point yesterday afternoon, as a member of the Thompson family tried to assist Duane Watson, the defendant's accused lover, outside the courtroom. The incident was broken up by a plain clothes detective.

Under questioning yesterday, Watson admitted sleeping with Mrs. Thompson the night following her husband's apparent disappearance on June 26, 1968.

A boy and a girl will be selected from each high school and college in Central Florida.

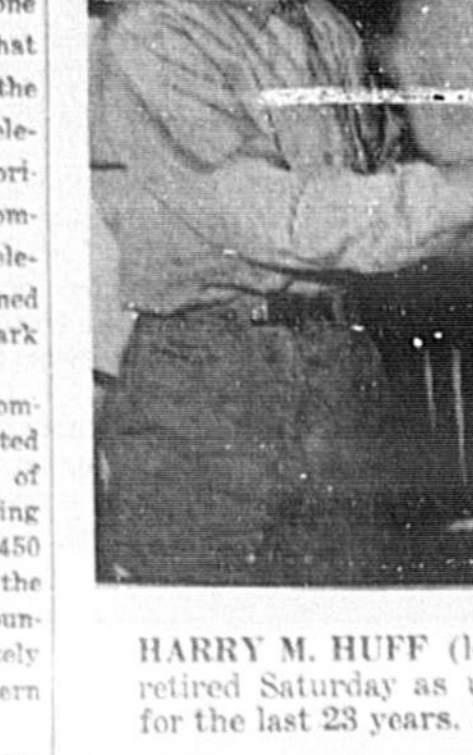

NEW YORK (UPI)—Repeaters disrupted the opening trial session Monday of 13 Black Panthers charged in an alleged bombing conspiracy. The uproar prompted an early adjournment.

"I have a voice and it will be heard," said one defendant. "If our families can't hear what happened to our lives, we won't listen to you."

State Supreme Court Justice John M. Murphy, after listening to a number of outbursts, angrily called an early recess in the trial of the Panthers charged with attempting to bomb several buildings and utilities last year.

## Explosion Demolishes City Hall; 15 Injured

SHAKER HEIGHTS, Ohio (UPI)—A violent explosion possibly caused by a bomb destroyed the municipal building of this exclusive Cleveland suburb Monday night. Fifteen persons were injured, including five policemen, a judge and the clerk of courts.

A federal investigator said it appeared the blast was caused by a bomb. The police chief said it could have been a gas leak.

## Attorney Blasts Jurist

CHICAGO (UPI)—Attorney William M. Kunstler, defending the "Chicago Seven," was furious.

"I have to lose my license to practice law and if I have to go to jail," he said, "I can't think of a better cause to go to jail for and to lose my license than to let my honor be trampled by a disservice to the cause of civil liberties."

U.S. District Court Judge Julius J. Hoffman had just ruled Monday that the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy could not testify in the trial of seven men charged with conspiring to incite riots at the 1968 Democratic national convention.

After Kunstler's tirade—he charged the judge with conducting a "legal lynching"—and after the government said it had no objection, Hoffman reversed himself and said Abernathy could testify if the defense could produce him in court today. Defense attorneys said Abernathy had flown to Mississippi after Monday's court session, and it was unlikely they could get him back in time.

The judge first had said he would add Kunstler to his worst list of last Friday that the defense had finished presenting live witnesses, except possibly for a cameraman who made films in convention violence. Monday Kunstler told the judge the defense could not find the cameraman, but the head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the Rev. Abernathy, was en route from O'Hare Airport and ready to testify. He said Abernathy had been in Europe before, unavailable to the defense.

All but one of the defendants, referred to as the "Panther 21," have been in jail since April 2, 1969, in lieu of bail. The other defendant, James Earl Ray, was freed on bail last week.

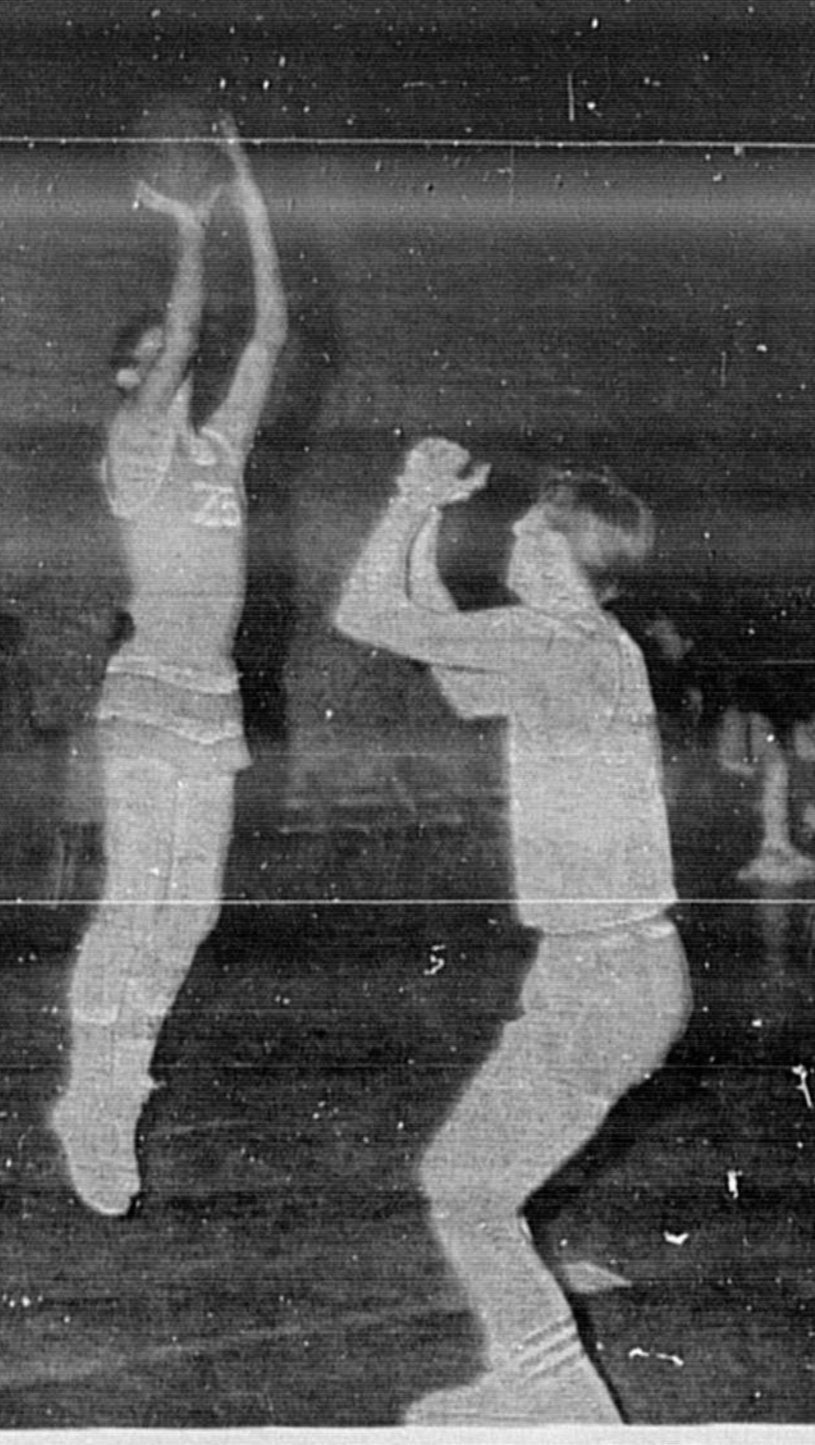

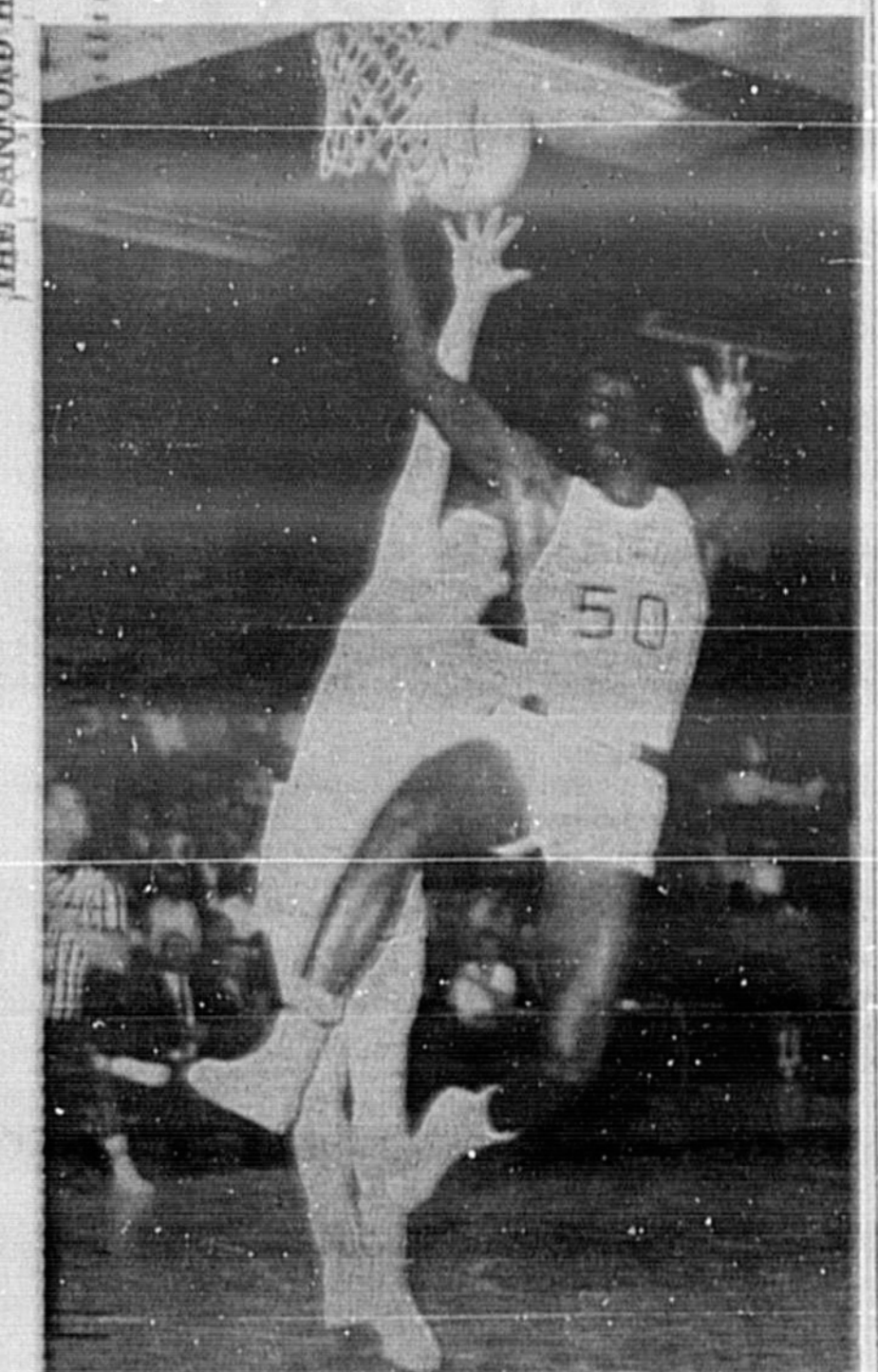

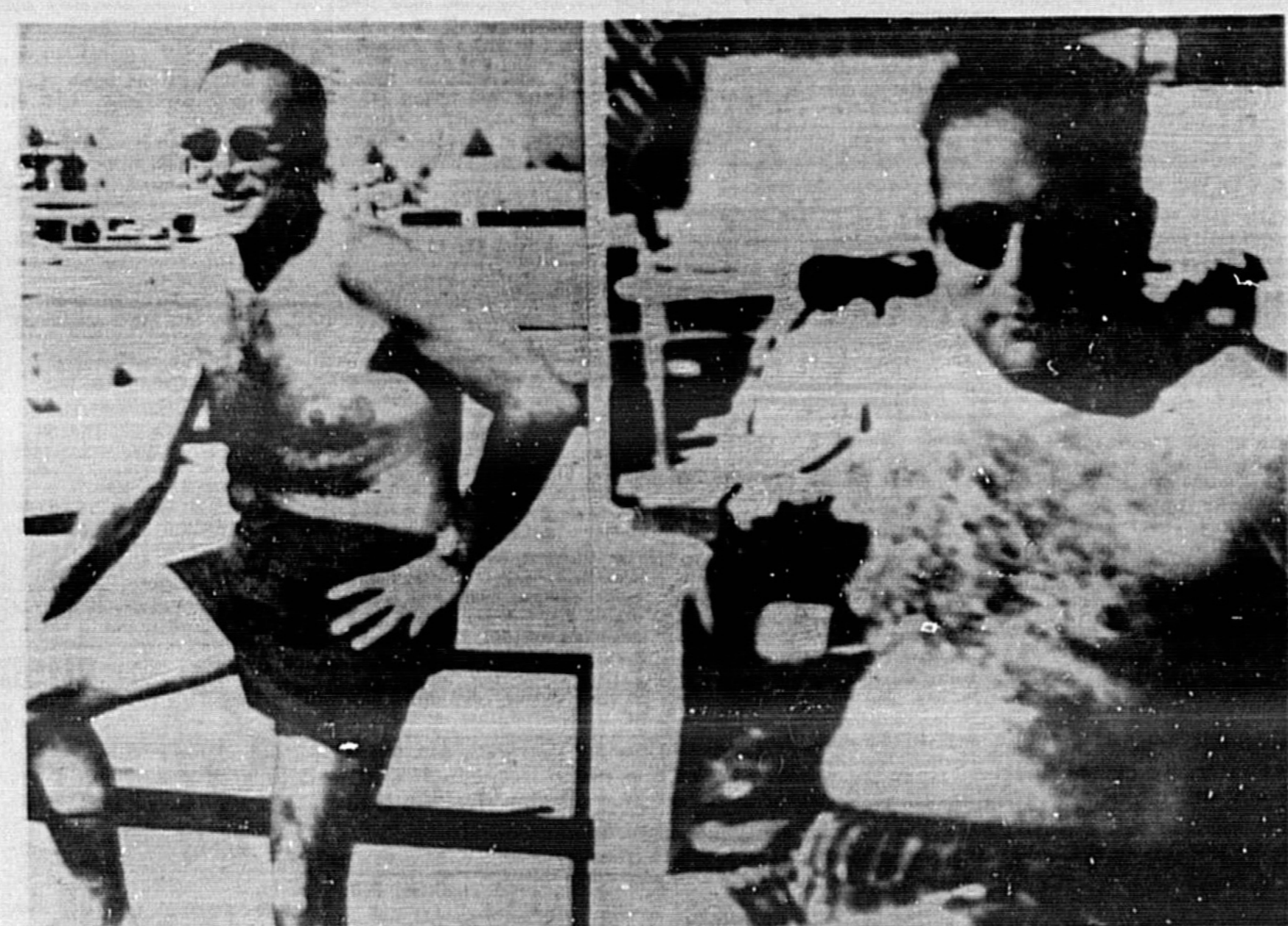

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## Mrs. Thompson Faces Life In Prison Will Appeal Murder Verdict

By BILL SCOTT. Mabel Frances Thompson, attractive mother of four, sits alone in a county jail cell today, faced with a life sentence in the women's state prison at Raiford. Her only hope is that her attorney, by successful with motions to the trial court, or that a higher court will uphold an appeal from her conviction of murder in the first degree, with mercy.

Under Florida law, a first degree murder conviction carries a mandatory life imprisonment penalty, if accompanied by a mercy plea by the jury, which occurred in this case. Since sentencing was deferred by Judge Rumberger, no appeal can be made or bond set until a motion from defense lawyers is made to the court.

Defense Attorney Mark N. Cleveland Jr. was not available this morning for comment, but an appeal of the conviction is expected and the attorney may file some form of motion in the next few days. Cleveland could file a motion to have his client released on bond pending appeal of the verdict.

Some court observers this morning were confused over whether the court had ruled on Cleveland's motion asking Rumberger to direct a verdict of acquittal based upon defense's contentions that state had failed to prove its case.
