Soviets Split Nazi Lines At Leningrad

Another German Detachment Trapped West Of Besieged City, RAF Is Busy

(By Associated Press) LUTZGART, south Germany industrial center, for the third successive night and continued with daylight attacks over France.

This vanguard of the new troops fought a four-day battle with a German force holding the banks high above the river, and the account of the engagement, published in the army newspaper Red Star.



On the fourth day the Russians forced the river, captured an opposing tank and drove the Germans into a forest.

The government newspaper said today the war with Germany has entered a new phase, and that the Red Army will be won in 1942.

"This Spring and summer the Red Army will defeat the German army," the newspaper said, "and the Red Army will be won in 1942."

Green, Cannon, Contractors For Hendricks And Navy Authorized Sikes Triumph To Start Work

Authority by the City of Sanford has been given to the United States Navy allowing contractors designated by the Navy, to start work at the Naval Training Base here before the Navy officially takes over the huge airport, Mayor W. C. Hill stated this morning.

Mr. Hill and City Clerk H. S. Sayer held a conference in Jacksonville Tuesday with Lt. Raymond Lamont, United States Navy officer in charge of constructing Naval operational training bases, at which permission was given to the Navy to take over the airport. It is expected that the contractors will start work here by May 15.

The Watt and Sinclair Construction Company of West Palm Beach and the Belcher Oil Company have been awarded the contract jointly. The expenditure of the base is figured to be approximately \$1,300,000.

Under the present set-up, the Navy Department is to buy the 800 acre field from the City for the sum of \$1. Then when the Navy has no further use for the base, it is to be turned back to the City for the same figure. In addition, any additional land the Navy acquires for the field is to be given to the City without charge when the base is turned back. It has been reported that the site will be increased to 1,500 acres.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The War Department announced today that approximately 11,374 soldiers, sailors, marines and civilians presumably were captured by the Japanese on Corregidor and other Manila Bay forts. The estimate is based on reports on April 13 and did not take into consideration the casualties that might have been suffered the last three weeks. The total included 2,275 Naval men, 1,570 marines, 3,274 American soldiers, 1,290 Philippine scouts, 1,116 soldiers of the Philippine commonwealth army and 1,258 including civilians and Filipinos, not otherwise classified.

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

The new Army Air Force Enlisted Reserve Plan is part of an overall Army Enlisted Reserve Program shortly to be announced, it was stated.

Washington Is Wary Of Peace Talks By Axis

 Rumors of an Axis peace offer, though denied by Hitler since Adolf Hitler's speech a few days ago, have had little effect on Washington officials closest to the peace process, who say they have never been more wary than before.

From diplomatic channels came reports that Germany was seeking British aid in opening peace negotiations with both England and the United States.

However, officials here say Italy is now so weak that Mussolini is about to be ousted. Japanese and Russian diplomatic relations were said to be improving, hinting at an effort to terminate Russo-German hostilities.

But there was no evidence that Washington was taking the reports seriously. In fact, experts here said that in the case of Russia, available information seemed to point away from his ouster, rather than toward it.

There's no doubt that conditions in Italy are worse than bad. The people are on near-starvation diets. Black market grafters are reaping a harvest and inflation threatens peasant savings. Despite these facts, the well-informed don't think Italy will desert the Axis right now.

The report that King Victor Emmanuel would depose Mussolini and replace him with Marshal Pietro Badoglio isn't logical, according to experts here. The coup would have to be with Hitler's consent, and there's strong doubt that the Nazis would want to oust the Duce.

Establishment of Badoglio as premier would mean disorganization of the whole Fascist structure. Thousands of minor party officials are dependent on Mussolini for livelihood and are anti-Badoglio.

Badoglio is first loyal to the king. He wasn't a member of the Fascist party until after the Ethiopian incident. To replace Mussolini with a man of dubious loyalty doesn't make sense to the analysts.

While the Italian army has been feeble since Italy's geographical position plans a major part in Axis strategy. Loss of sea, road or air routes would necessitate complete rethinking of German plans.

The possible ouster of Mussolini is being watched by the British, who are hoping for concessions from the Axis. The rise of Laval, and the possibility that France might be able to stand under him as the head of a puppet government, has been inspired by the German desire to see the German army's friends in the Italian forces make a good impression on the Italian populace. However, much they like the Germans, the Italians have a healthy respect for their own army. It's thought unlikely they'll stage a real revolt until the German military machine has been discredited by a defeat.

At present there is no shortage of spices, nor is one likely soon. But the United States did import an average of 118 million pounds of spices a year, and these have been practically cut off.

Household boarding won't help. Spices disintegrate into dust when left around for a long time, especially on warm pantry shelves.

Mrs. Average Jones doesn't go in for a great variety of spices, nor does she "spice" her preparations heavily. Her favorite seasonings are pepper, of which she uses most by far, mustard, cinnamon, vanilla, cloves, nutmeg and ginger.

Except for mustard, none of

Mrs. Jones' spices can be grown in this country. Pepper comes almost exclusively from India, now in the shadow of the rising sun. Cloves is the home of true cinnamon. What Mrs. Jones calls cinnamon is really cassia, which grows in the East Indies and in China.

From our own hemisphere come vanilla beans from Mexico, allspice and ginger from Jamaica, mustard from California and Montana.



U. S. Battleship and 2 Plane Carriers Are Claimed Sunk; Nip Losses Heavy

A mammoth battle is raging between great Allied and Japanese Naval forces in the Coral Sea off northeast Australia, and first reports of losses for the past five days indicate it is the greatest Naval action of the new world war.

The Allies said at least 18 enemy warships already are sunk or crippled, including reports today of the sinking of an aircraft carrier and a heavy cruiser, and the damaging of another aircraft carrier and another heavy cruiser. Imperial Tokyo headquarters claimed the sinking of a United States battleship of the California class and the aircraft carriers Saratoga and Yorktown and the crippling of a British battleship and an Australian heavy cruiser.

Not since the combined Australian-American bombing of an enemy ship concentration off Leyte and Samar in New Guinea, had such a United States success been reported by the Navy.

That action carried out mostly by American forces resulted, the Navy announced March 18, in the sinking or damaging of 21 Japanese ships including 12 war vessels.

The Solomon Islands action commencing in a considerable extent for the American British-Dutch forces in the great battle of the Java Sea in late February, when the Allies lost 13 warships and the Japanese had seven sunk or damaged.

The basis of what the communiqué indicated, however, was that the Japanese action appeared to have been a success. It was a battle between the American and Japanese forces and other results were so clearly known to the Americans that they may have occurred in daylight. The word "Naval engagement" meant that American surface ships as well as aircraft had participated.

Allies Account For 2 Jap Planes Over New Guinea

Eight Japanese zero fighters were shot down by Allied forces today and Allied headquarters reported one was shot down. Allied reconnaissance planes downed another enemy fighter over New Guinea.

3,563 Are Passenger Autos, Ration Procedure Announced

Gasoline rationing in Seminole County will directly affect owners of passenger cars, trucks and motorcycles, A. B. Peterson, secretary of the Rationing Board, announced today as he released information on the rationing procedure which will come into effect on May 15.

This Board has classified cars, trucks and motorcycles as follows:

1. Passenger cars, trucks and motorcycles, which are used for personal use, will be classified as "Type A" cars.

2. Commercial trucks and motorcycles, which are used for business purposes, will be classified as "Type B" cars.

3. Motorcycles, which are used for personal use, will be classified as "Type C" cars.

The Board will determine the exact date in gallonage of the unit, and the motorist will be entitled to seven times that much gasoline. He may buy it all at once or stretch the purchase over the 45-day period.

If a motorist must obtain a rationing card, he must fill out an application, giving his name and address, the nature and description of his business or work, and answer the following questions:

"If you drive to your work, what is the shortest mileage from your home to your regular place of work or commercial point? How many miles do you drive each working day in carrying your work (other than from home to work and back)? What is the total average daily mileage customarily driven in the car described above to get to and from work and to carry on your work? Are you making every possible effort to reduce the mileage by using public transportation and by doubling up with your neighbors? (Answer Yes or No)."

If an applicant answers these questions under oath, subject to a \$10,000 fine and 10 years imprisonment.

The employment service will open at this time and will take applications for jobs at Sanford's base and other defense projects. No applications are to be taken for other than defense work.

The service is to be established here under a recent plan, placing such a unit in every county in the state. It will be located at the City Hall in a room provided by the City Commission. It is expected that persons who already have made application at the Chamber of Commerce for work at the airport will have to file another application with the employment bureau.

Hospital Bond Election Falls Short 91 Votes

The official count of the voters cast in Seminole County during the May 5 hospital bond election, held at the County Clerk's office, showed that 1,007 voters cast their ballots, 916 for the bond and 91 against it.

The total number of voters registered in the county was 1,098. The voters who did not vote were 91.

The hospital bond issue of \$100,000 failed to reach the number of votes necessary to legalize the bond, which would have been 1,007.
