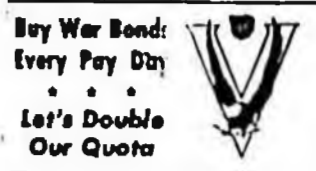

## Soviets Split Nazi Lines At Leningrad

### Another German Detachment Trapped West Of Besieged City, RAF Is Busy

(By Associated Press) LUTZGART, south Germany industrial center, for the third successive night and continued with daylight attacks over France.

The Red Army reported a wedge has been driven between two German forces before Leningrad and another Nazi detachment is encircled west of the besieged city.

Russia has thrown into the front Spring offensive the first of its reserve divisions raised and trained deep in Siberia last winter, and the fresh troops have captured an important river valley from the Germans, Red Army spokesmen said yesterday.

This vanguard of the new troops fought a four-day battle with a German force holding the banks high above the river, and the account of the engagement, published in the army newspaper Red Star.

On the second day, the Russian division mopped up one tank and captured a village against strong resistance; on the third day it held its ground against counter-attacks by two German divisions, heavily supported by aircraft.

On the fourth day the Russians forced the river, captured an important bridge and drove the Germans into a forest.

The government newspaper said today the war with Germany has entered a new phase, and that the Red Army will be won in 1942.

"This Spring and summer the Red Army will defeat the German army," Premier Stalin's May day address said. "The German army will be crushed this year."

The Watt and Sinclair Construction Company of West Palm Beach and the Belcher Oil Company have been awarded the contract jointly. The expenditure of the base is figured to be approximately \$1,300,000.

Under the present set-up, the Navy Department is to buy the 800 acre field from the City for the sum of \$1. ## Japs Capture Over 11,000 At Corregidor

### Figure Includes Men In Armed Forces And Civilians At Manila Bay Forts

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The War Department announced today that approximately 11,374 soldiers, sailors, marines and civilians presumably were captured by the Japanese on Corregidor and other Manila Bay forts. The estimate is based on reports on April 13 and did not take into consideration the casualties that might have been suffered the last three weeks. The total included 2,275 Naval men, 1,570 marines, 3,274 American soldiers, 1,290 Philippine Scouts, 1,118 soldiers of the Philippine Commonwealth army and 1,258 including civilians and 11,374, not otherwise classified.

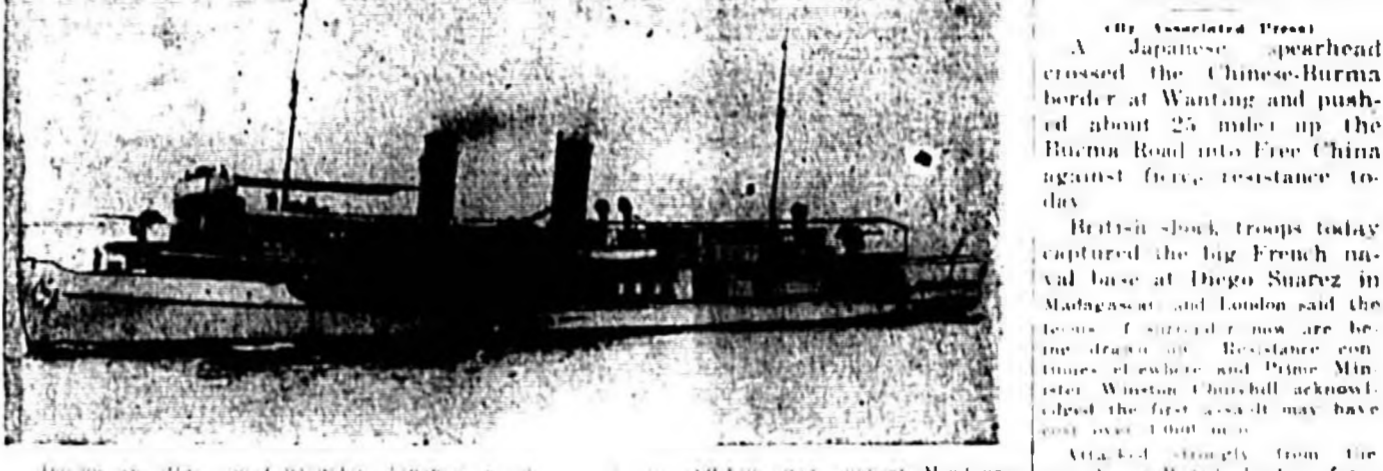

It is possible that Mussolini is planning the removal of his present position himself, to win concessions from the Axis. The rise of Laval, and the possibility that France might desert, have inspired Mussolini to consider the German side his only possible ally.

The German army's recent crushing Italian forces made a deep impression on the Italian populace. However, much they respect the Germans, the Italians have a healthy respect for Germany. It is thought unlikely that they will stage a real revolt until the German military machine has been discredited by a defeat.

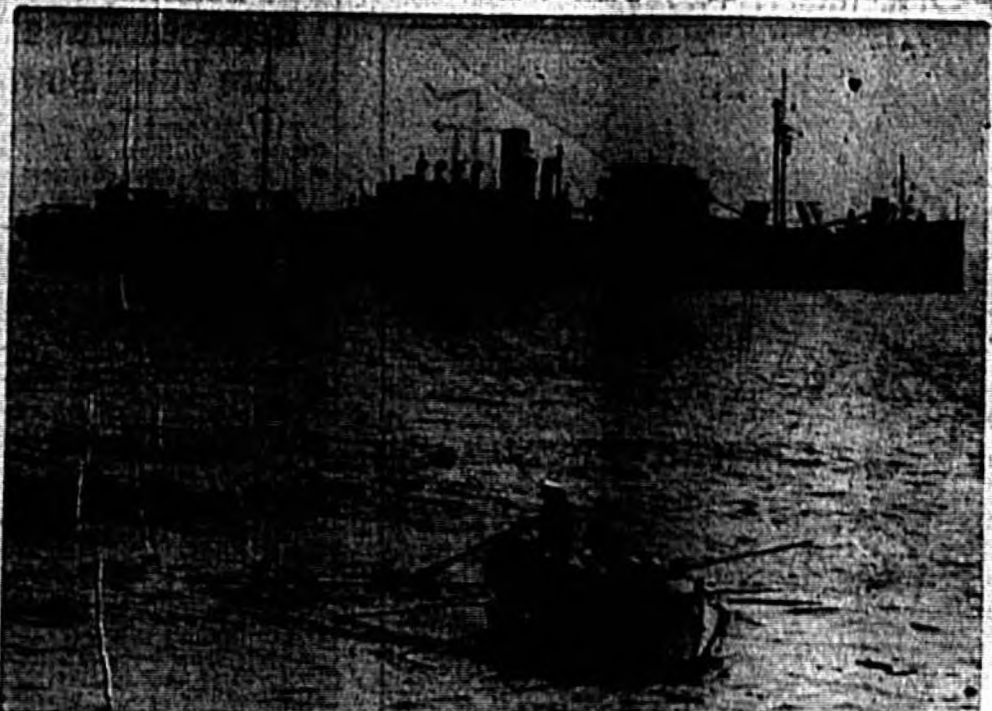

Almost A Hospital

Although it is by no means certain yet that Tuesday's hospital bond election did not bring out the necessary 51 percent of all registered freeholders, we believe we can predict that Seminole County citizens have again allowed an opportunity to obtain a first class hospital through their fingers.

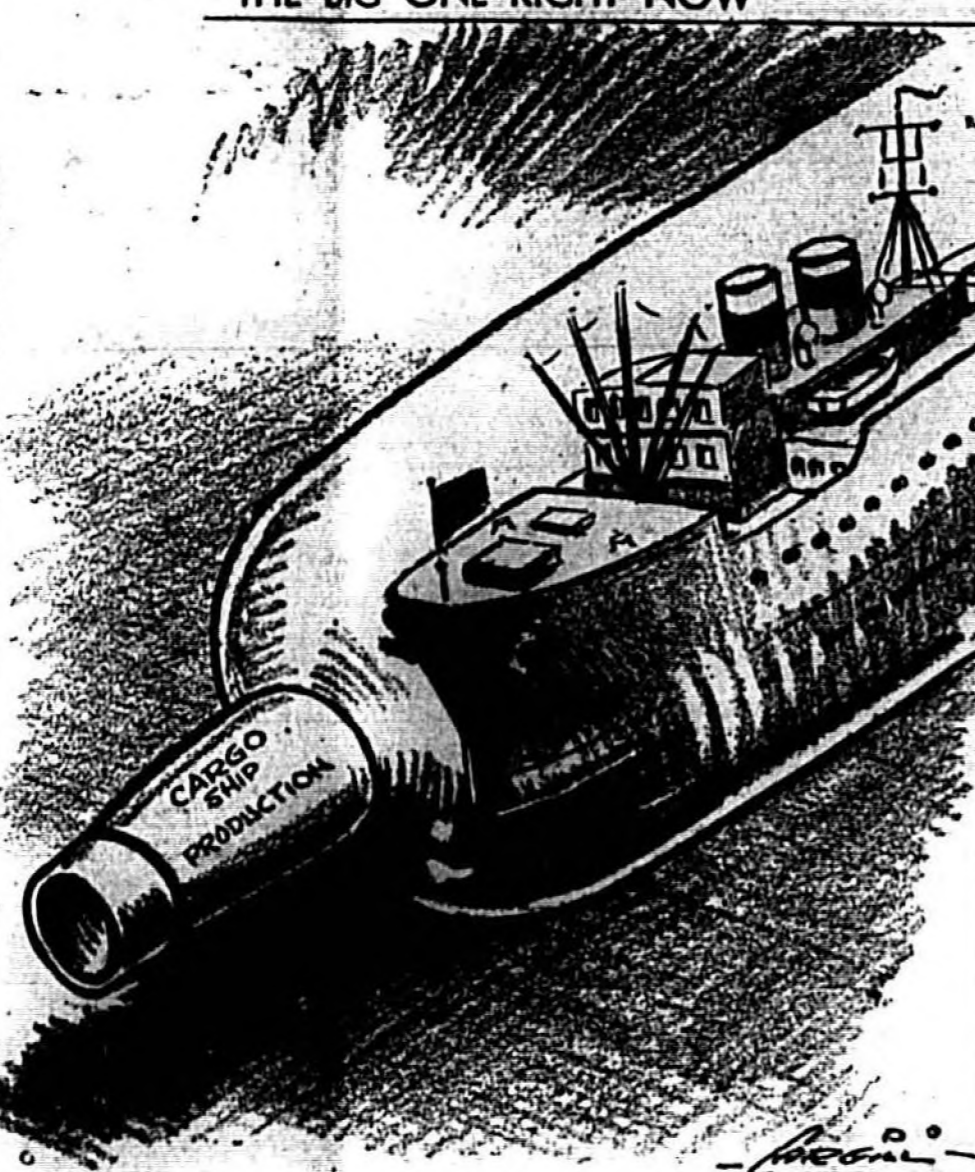
The only figures which we have available show that with five precincts still missing, some 1212 votes have been accounted for. This does not include any of the votes cast in Goldenrod, Longwood, Altamonte, Forrest City or Fern Park.

Now in Longwood alone there were about 144 votes cast in other precincts on Tuesday. There were about 20 in Goldenrod; about 80 in Altamonte; about 70 in Fern Park; and about 25 in Forest City.

On the other hand, however, the figures on the whole tend to prove that not as many persons voted in the precincts, except in Monroe, were not tabulated. If the proportion in the county runs as high as it did in the city, there should be another 15 or 20 votes to add to the total. Also there were probably a number of absentee ballots cast in the hospital election.

Just a few more votes would have put it over. Just a little more effort to get out the vote would have given us the hospital. But there is no question how the people feel about it. If the taxpayers vote four to one in favor of bonding themselves for a new hospital, how must the thousands of other people who would pay none of the tax feel about it?
