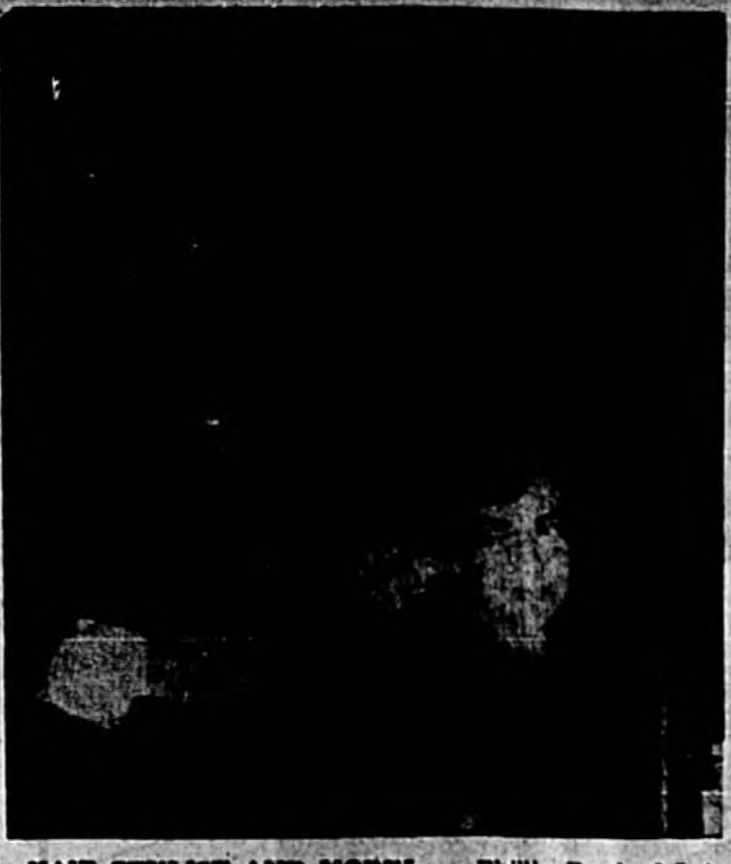
Betty Joyce is a very active member of the Central Baptist Church, helping out in any capacity where she is needed.

# Garden Gate

The rains "God's air conditioner" are refreshing to man and the garden, but they seem to make the grass and weeds grow twice as fast. This is a good time to move any shrubbery or day-lilies. The damp night air seems to perk them up.

If you will plant some stokesia, some will repay you in the early spring. They are resistant to heat, cold, rain and also multiply very fast. Although the lavender blue variety is most common, they can be found in white and pink also.

The flowers last only for a day but there is a succession of the blooms at intermittent periods and colors are unlimited both single and double. Neither are they choosy as to climate or soil and no plant responds more readily to a semi-attention.

# Seven Tips On How To Care For Clothing

Shall I wash this garment or send it to the dry cleaners? If I wash it, should it be done by hand or in the washing machine? Will it be difficult to iron? These are questions you may be asking about clothing care.

Proper care of clothing is quite different today from even 10 years ago. New developments in fabrics and in washing and drying equipment are responsible for the difference. Understanding factors that determine care to today's clothes is necessary if they are to give good service and satisfaction.

The following factors are important in deciding how the garment should be cleaned, says Miss Elizabeth Dickenson, Clothing Specialist.

1. Information on the hang-tag or on bolt of fabric: Care recommended, fiber content and finish, 2. How the fabric is made, 3. How the fabric is finished, 4. How the garment is made (construction and style), 5. Type of laundry equipment, 6. Time the homemaker has to devote to care, and 7.

Relative cost of home laundering versus commercial laundry or dry cleaning.

The many synthetic fibers, blends and new finishes on the market today make labeled merchandise increasingly important, for the label may reveal hidden qualities of a fabric. There is always some risk when unlabeled garments or fabrics are bought.

The label should be read carefully for information on care, performance and fiber content. The manufacturer's instructions should be followed and the label saved for future use.

Reading labels, keeping informed of new developments and following care instructions on the label will result in clothes that look better, give longer service and save time and money.
