Speed Slogan Is Adopted By Navy Football Forces

ANNAPOLIS Md., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Admiral David Farragut didn't know anything about football but his "full speed ahead and damn the torpedoes" just about describes the Navy's 1941 gridiron policy.

The Middies are mazing away at football opponents with a versatile, deceptive, and wide open attack—and they don't seem to give a hang about the chances they take to make it click.

Skeptics took a "wait and see" position when pre-season dope indicated that Swede Larson had a football super-dreamnaught ready for launching down on the banks of the Severn.

It let get with full speed ahead right from the start, and upset William and Mary, West Virginia, Lafayette and Cornell like so many canoes. The invincible between came in the mud against Harvard in 6-0 tie but the Middies were back up again next week to topple undefeated Penn.

The 1940 Middies proceeded to bull foes around in midfield with comparative ease—but they lacked scoring punch and finesse.

Larson concentrated this fall on getting some fire into that two-team attack (both outfits returned almost intact). He cut the number of offensive maneuvers, insisted on letter-perfect execution, and then played it safe.

"Take chances," he said. "You know: 'Full speed ahead and damn the torpedoes!'"

The Middies know how to take orders.

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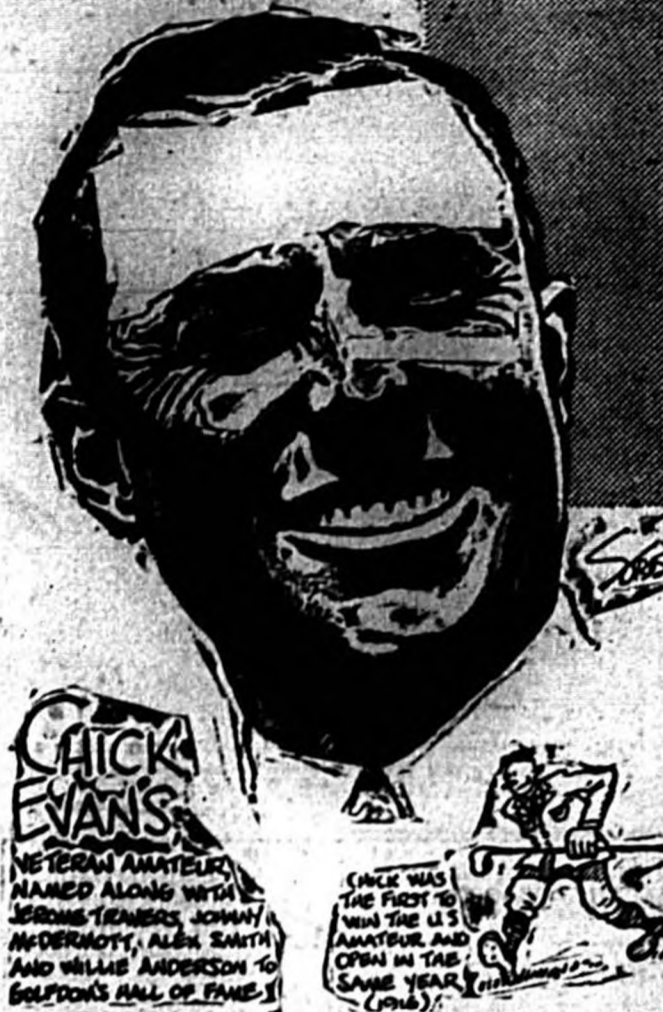

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Miami's Amazing Sophomores Meet Alabama Friday

Miami's amazing sophomores take on Alabama in the Orange Bowl stadium Friday night in the feature game of this week's Florida collegiate football season. The fast-stopping Hurricanes have surprised even their most optimistic supporters in winning seven of eight games this season. They will be underdogs against powerful Alabama, but Miami fans are convinced the Crimson Tide will have to play its best football to win.

The Hurricanes, beaten only by Florida this season, turned in another upset last week by routing South Carolina, 7-6.

Rollins entertains Howard college at Orlando Friday night in the only other Florida collegiate game this week. The Tars were upset, 14-6, by Presbyterian last week, a game that gave the S. C. A. A. a 2-1 record in the league team. The game with Howard rates as about a toss-up on the basis of comparative scores.

Florida's Gators jubilant over their 14-7 homecoming triumph over the Georgia Tech Engineers, will be idle until they play U. C. L. A. in Jacksonville Dec. 20.

The Gators were at their best against Tech and made efficient use of their aerial weapons to win. A forward-lateral-Tommy Harrison to Forest Ferguson to Milton Hull—was good for 26 yards and the first touchdown.

A pass from Harrison to Leo Cahill—good for 48 yards set up the next touchdown, which was made by Red Mack in a plunger from the one-yard line. Paul Eller placekicked the extra points.

Fullback Ralph Plaster scored Tech's touchdown in the fourth period as the climax to a 60-yard drive sparked by Dave Elsdredge and Bobbie Dodd, Plaster's understudy. Plaster kicked the extra point.

Cairo Admits Foe Is On Offensive

American, English Newsmen Are Reported Captives

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—(AP) Premier Mussolini may have been for the Libyans front to encourage his Italian soldiers, the Rome radio said today in a broadcast heard by N. B. C.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—(AP) Both sides probably will throw in "about everything they have got" to win the great battle in the Resegh area, which will determine the fate of Libya, informed quarters said today. An announcement from Cairo that both the British and the Axis forces had brought up reinforcements in the Resegh area would be a sign that the heavy losses already suffered.

Axis dispatches declared today that British troops south of Resegh, 10 miles from Tobruk, had been encircled and "annihilated" and 5,000 prisoners captured, and the Germans said the Libyan campaign could no longer be considered as a British offensive.

British Cairo headquarters announced that the German forces had captured the British command post and the British command, reporting the Axis victory south of Resegh, said that two American observers and "various English and American journalists" were among the captives. It also said in south central Libya, by the "overwhelming" British forces.

Word that the Axis had passed on the attack in some sectors, and indeed had been in such action in those sectors for 48 hours, came coincidentally with the inclusive end of the first phase of the British invasion—the great (Continued On Page 2)

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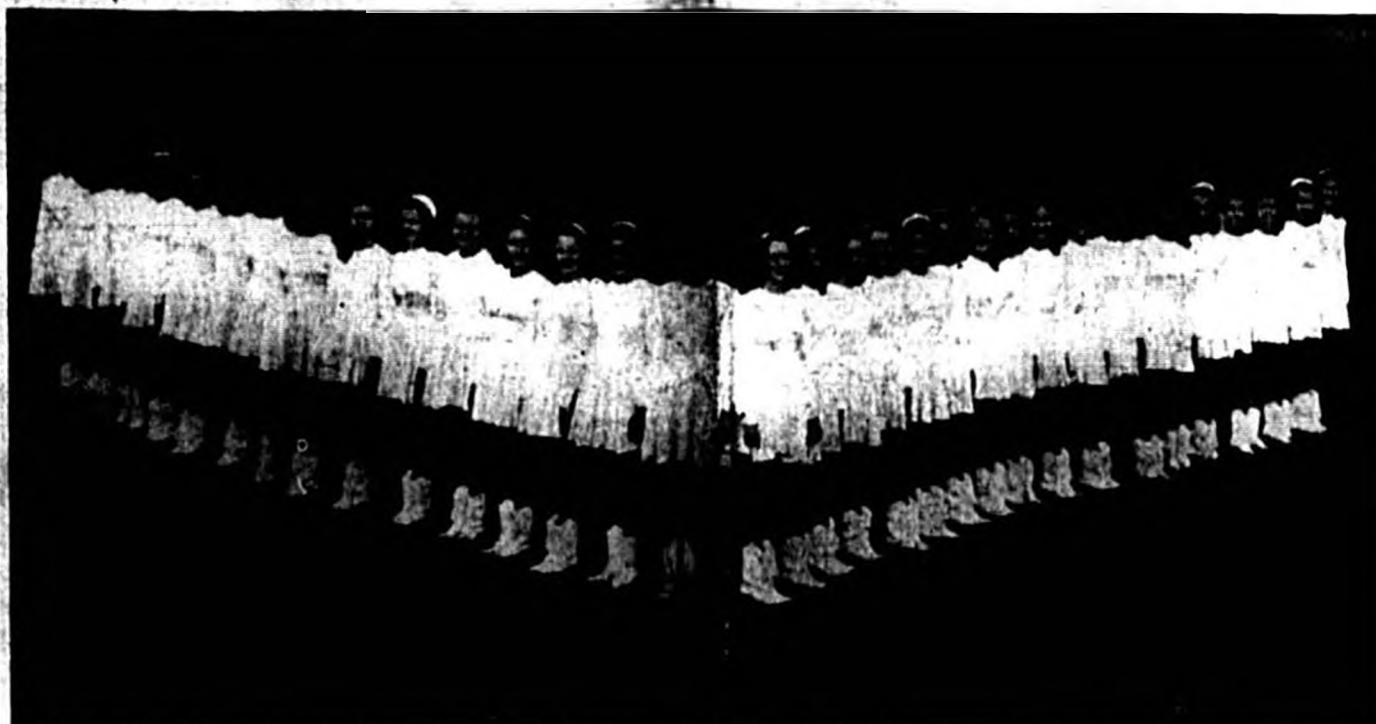

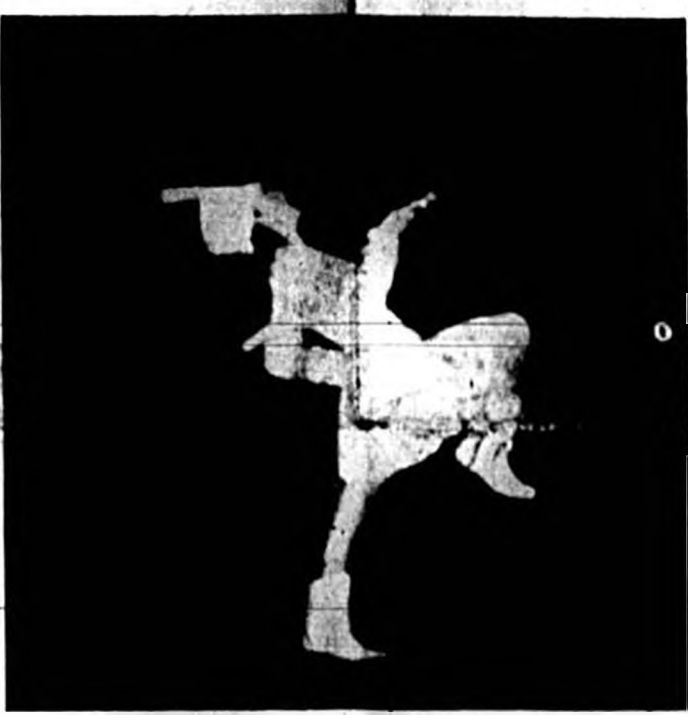
The requests were for fishing information in Seminole County and as the result, John Schirani, well known local fisherman, was asked to write an article on fishing in Seminole County. The article follows:

Thanksgiving

With Thanksgiving tomorrow coming somewhat as an anti-climax to many persons who celebrated it last week, it is perhaps fortunate that we in America actually have so much to be thankful for that it really takes two days to do the occasion the full justice which it deserves.

When the Pilgrim fathers were first inspired to inaugurate a period of special thanks giving, they were primarily concerned with the bounteous crops which the fertility of the soil and the favors of the climate they found in the New World had bestowed upon them. After three hundred years we can still be thankful that food is plentiful in this country.

Elsewhere throughout the world millions suffer from starvation and malnutrition. Europe's millions grow thin and sickly as Britain's blockade of the continent and the Nazi submarine campaign take their toll of merchant shipping and as young men are called from their plows in the fields to handle the machine guns and tanks at the battle-front.

But the Pilgrim fathers were thankful for something far more important than the food with which they filled their stomachs. They were thankful that after years of persecution they had found a haven of refuge, far removed from an Old World tyranny which had sought to stifle their religious beliefs. We are thankful that after three hundred years America is still free and a man can worship God as he chooses.

Elsewhere throughout the world, men are being shot, not for what they do, but for what they think. The minds of Europe's millions are being starved as surely as their bodies when the right to think, read, write and study is denied them and they are fed on a diet exclusively of Nazi propaganda which warps their souls. Not enough to be denied their freedom; they are taught that freedom is harmful and wicked.

But there is so much for which we can be thankful. Though war now may not be far away, thank Heavens it did not come sooner when we were fully unprepared. Through we may have our Wheelers, Lindberghs and John L. Lewis, thank Heavens their power is limited and none of them sits in the White House. Though we may have strikes and political disunity, thank Heavens for the British navy which enables us to afford such luxuries.

And thank Heavens for the natural industriousness of the American people which makes them work all the harder in the face of overwhelming odds and for their sound common sense which enables them, though they have the right to make the mistakes of the French and the blunders of the British, to do the right thing at the right time when only the right thing could save their skins.

And let us be thankful that this is the last year we will have to celebrate two Thanksgiving days and that henceforth the nation will be united on this one occasion at least.

More Hospitals Needed

It should cause no wonder if hospitals make strange bedfellows, seeing there is only one hospital bed in Florida for each 294 residents.

If any sudden epidemic or widespread disease should visit the State or even a major calamity, these accommodations would be exhausted in no time at all.

Even under normal conditions most of the hospitals are cramped for room and lack needed facilities.

Orlando's own Orange General makes regular appeals for funds and contributions to meet the demands over and above its normal capacity to care for them.

It is calculated the State would need 55 more 170-bed hospitals to meet the minimum requirements, and this applies particularly to accommodations for mental and tubercular cases.

The Florida Sanatorium located in Orange County, excellently managed as it is, has more applicants than it can accept, while the State hospital for the insane is so hopelessly overtaxed that many subjects languish in jails or are kept in private homes awaiting vacancies slow in coming.

It looks very much as if, as a part of our defense obligations and precautions, the people of Florida ought to do something now about this very serious situation.—Orlando Sentinel.

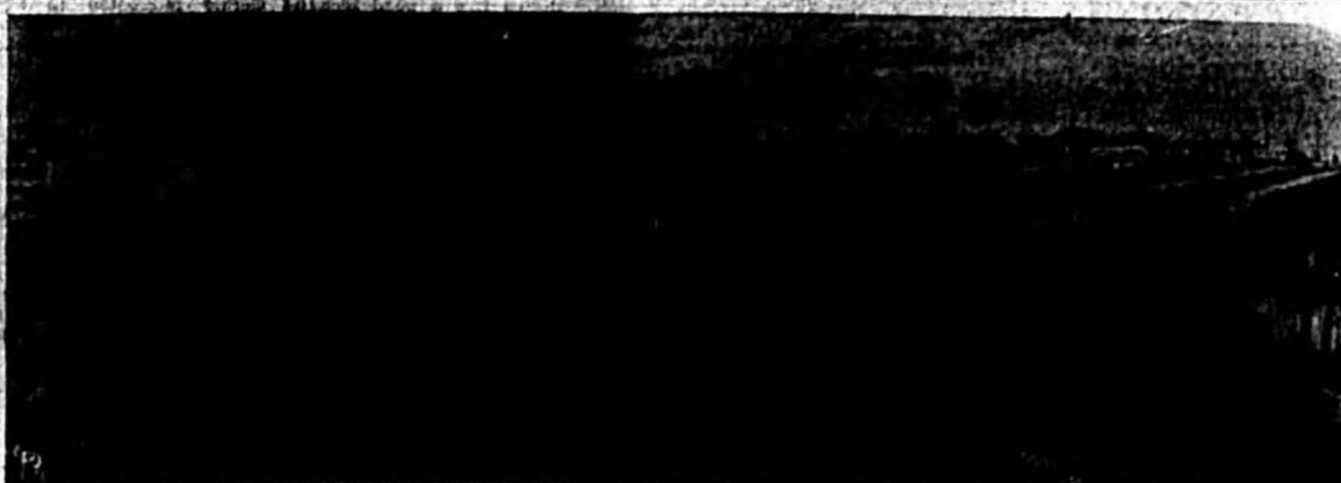

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—Although much has been written about the training of Army and Navy pilots, few persons realize the enormity of the growth in civilian flying. The other day, I heard a reasonably conservative aviation association official estimate that within the next few years one

out of every 100 persons certainly—possibly one out of every 50—in the United States would hold a pilot's license of some kind.

That would mean a considerable acceleration in the rate at which the country now is turning out civilian pilots (about 100,000 a year), but when everything is considered, it is not an impossibility.

Under the inspiration and guidance of the National Aeronautic Association, the number of model airplane builders in the U. S. has crept up to 2,000,000. The "fish breeding grounds" you read about. Take up one side and down the other. There is more certainty of a good haul of fish from this water than will be found anywhere, and the variety simply is left to the angler; however, you're just as likely as not to get a "big Speck" when you are casting for bass (and we do mean big). The advantage in this fishing lake is that you won't need to worry about how the wind is blowing—just fish the off side. It's just lined with creeks and coves on the east side. Going in from the St. John's River is "Nacy's," then "Salt Run," and in order "Sweet-water," "Little Gator," "Big Gator," and right off the middle is "Bird Isle"; way up is "Soldier Creek," then down what is known as the "west side."

"You can take your choice in Lake Jessup fish in deep water, shallow, around the bunnets, cypress trees, around the grass, or way up on the flats. It's just one big fishing heaven. And again, you'd better not start out with a sorry line. Also see that you don't have a run hook on that plug because it'll just be one strike and out for you.

"These big-mouth bass must get out of bed every morning. If it's surprise you're looking for, he won't disappoint you. First, he'll

hit like a house-afire, turn for cover, and that's where you gotta have that good line or he'll probably come up shaking right in a big bunch of lily pads. When you get him out of that mess, he'll head straight for the boat. You think for a minute you can catch up with him, but that's just another error on your part. About the time you know he's off the hook, he'll come up on the other side and shake some more, and this is when he'll get in his dirty work. More than likely you'll find your plug sailing in the air. It may fall in the boat, or even just disappear. You'll have the jitter a-plenty, but that thrill will be in a class all its own. Don't forget the big one nearly always gets away. You don't need worry so terribly because after you have made the usual excuses to the paddler, of your buddy, just get your tackle all untangled, and get set for the next go round. He'll more than likely be waiting for your new plug just on the next point.

"It's possible, too, that most any time you'll get mixed up with one of those high powered "Jacks." About the only difference is that he may not furnish the kind of dance indulged by the black bass, but he will jump in about three directions at once. He is built for speed, of course, it's our opinion they should have named him a "fresh water sail fish." Unless the hooks are wrapped around his head, you'll only see him when he makes his second jump. You can tell them at the corner drug store about the other big-uns that get away.

"If it's a nice, still, quiet fishing jaunt you want—say when you take the lady for a little outing—anchor off from the island (the man from whom you get your bait will show you about the spot) and get set to really angle for speckled perch. They'll be there, and some of the largest ones you ever had any dealings with. As always, we suggest a good strong line because a big bass can come along and give you a fit most any time.

"Lake Harney is a very wide spot in the St. John's River. The channel busts it wide open, and while it runs out quite shallow from the banks and has plenty of holes, this lake is almost 100% hard sand bottom. You can see the bottom in as deep as four feet of water, and believe it or not, it's full of fish. There are also grass pockets on the edge running out for a good distance, and for early morning fishing this lake cannot be beaten. It is also good just before sundown. We have seen the time that the limit could be caught

British Troopers Forging Westward South Of Tobruk

Trend Is Turning In Favor Of English As Nazi Force Is Cut Off At Rezegh Axis Soldiers Fighting Hard Italy's Last East African Stronghold Is Captured

British Cairo headquarters reported today that their mechanized forces are "forging their way westward" from the Rezegh battle area, south of Tobruk. The Tobruk garrison and the British forces from Egypt, which yesterday were reported to have made "direct contact," are apparently in a drive to open communications and a supply path through Tobruk.

The British said that German forces, attempting a diversion thrust into Egypt, are now trying to rejoin Axis forces west of Rezegh in Libya. The British admitted "determined opposition," but claimed the trend is slowly turning in their favor.

The Italian high command admitted the fall of Gondar, Italy's last stronghold in east Africa, after a 10-hour assault by the British.

British imperial troops have smashed Axis tank lines four miles north of the recaptured battlefront of Rezegh to make a decisive turning point in the fight for Tobruk.

This vital desert meeting occurred at 24 Duda on the tenth day of the great Libyan offensive. That point Rezegh was captured by the Tobruk troops in a stab which carried them ten miles outside their defenses.

New Zealand troops, supported by American-British tanks and armor, joined with Tobruk's men in a push from the south after overcoming violent Axis opposition. The desert point of Bir El Hammed was taken enroute.

Then the British now have a tenuous communication line curving over 100 miles from the Egyptian border near Sid Omar northward to Tobruk.
