Grant will raise school standards

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Eight Seminole County schools are applying for a federal education grant under a comprehensive reform program designed to student achievement raise standards.

Each school is seeking \$50,000 in a three-year grant. Florida has received \$6.6 million in a Comprehensive School Reform grant to make school curricula more rigorous

Goldsboro Elementary School, Hamilton Elementary School, Midway Elementary School, Sanford Middle School, Lake Brantley High School, Lake Howell High School, Lyman High School, and Seminole High School have applied through the Seminole County school district, Florida Department of Education Program Specialist Patricia Cheavers maid.

These grants will both start and speed up needed schoolwide change in virtually all aspects of participating schools." U.S. Secretary of Education Richard Riley said. They will expand both the quality and scope of reform efforts that enable all children, particularly at-risk youth, to meet challenging academic standards."

The grants will support schools in achieving measurable student performance goals and in helping students meet state standards.

Officials modify lake path

SANFORD - The Florida Department of Transportation is modifying the Lake Monroe Riverwalk project to end at the Central Florida Zoo, rather than Wayside Park, because of the Interstate-4 St. Johns River Bridge project.

Construction on the bicycle and pedestrian path is scheduled for 2001 or 2002. The FDT is revising its five-year transportation plan to fund \$2.3 million for construction, up from the previously planned

\$1.24 million funding.
Sanford is working with state agencies on a preliminary study for design of the Lake Monroe Riverwalk project.

The Project Development and Environmental study will facilitate the final design and engineering of the Riverwalk.

The study will propose alternatives for the layout and ortentation of the Riverwalk, and assess the feasibility of the project.

The British arrive and drive No car rental problems here

SANFORD - Passengers arriving from England are having no problems getting rental cars at Orlando Sanford Airport as long as they have reservations.

"Just about everything has been set up three and four months in advance by the tour companies," Dollar Rental Car manager Charlie Wilkus said Wednesday. "Ninety-nine percent of our business is with English tourists."

A spokesman for Alamo, the

only other car rental at the airport, said that her company has a similar booking schedule and that everyone who reserved a car has gotten one. Otherwise, it is tight.

We're booked for the holidays," the spokesman said.

Several other automobile rental firms that are not at the airport but supply cars to passengers arriving there report that they also are booked but are experiencing no difficulty supplying cars to those who have pre-booked and pre-paid. We're not that overwhelmed

in that area (Sanford/Lake Mary/Longwood),"

spokesman for Specialty Auto Rental.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said he has heard of no complaints from visitors who require auto rentals at the Orlando Sanford Airport.

We're going to have to ex-pand the car rental service when we begin to get more domestic flights here," Dale said. Everything is fine at present. Dollar has been here since the airport opened."

Orlando International does have a shortage of cars - even for people who had advance reservations. It has been an unusually busy travel season and an industry trend to cut fleet sizes has many rental agencies in a panic. Hertz ran out of specialty vehicles such as minivans and four-wheel drives. Other agencies ran out of everything.

Rental officials say that the three busiest days for rental cars are Dec. 26, 27 and 28. They say that there should be more cars available for the next few days. Between Friday and Monday. Alamo paid for cabs for customers who had made reservations but could not be

Longwood historic district to get facelift

LONGWOOD - The Longwood City Commission will take competitive bids from companies for landscape projects for rightof-ways in the historic district.

The historic district is located north of State Road 434, and west of County Road 427; east of Milwee Avenue, and south of Palmetto Avenue.

"The historic district is the focal point of the city," Mayor Rusty Miles said at last Monday's commission session. "I think it's just the first of many steps to really turn the city around."

Commissioner Ron Sargent said that although he thinks the historic district needs 'an immediate infusion* of money for improvements, he wants to see the specific dollar amount in

Commissioner Steve Miller said cost will be a factor in what work the city does on the right-of-ways in the historic district.

*How much money do you want to spend on 7-foot rightof-ways," Miller said. "Cost is definitely a stipulation. We're going to have to look at it. The idea is in its infancy. A lot of study and debate will need to be done."

Miller said the city is investigating making improvements in the district, not redeveloping the district.

There is a big difference between taking care of grass on right-of-ways and doing a complete redevelopment," Miller said. "I'm certainly not going to be in favor of grandiose spending on seven foot right of ways. However, making what we have a little more beautiful would be important. What does beautiful mean? That we don't know at this point."

Acting city administrator Oreg city a sense of pride. Manning said he believes a grant program could enable businesses in the historic district to submit grants through the Historic Preservation Board, with the city matching the grant funding.

Manning said he believes the city should create a Community Redevelopment Area for the historic district, with the tax money from the district designated for improvements in the

We have the funds to initiate the start-up of this," Manning said. We need to investigate exactly how much it would cost. The best thing we can do is do it all at once. If we do it piecemeal, it will cost us more money in the long wrong."

"It doesn't have to cost a lot of money to look right," Manjura said. This can be a phenomenal place. Now is the time to get people to move in here. We should look at the way Winter Park is re-doing Park Avenue. Look at St. Augustine's historic district. The potential here is



The way we were: More biographies from 1933

Here are additional biographies of those listed in "Who's Who in Sanford 1933", a special edition of the Sanford Herald published April 29,

Ernest P. Housholder

Ernest F. Housholder, city attorney, was born in Bartow and came to Sanford at the age of 14. After graduating from Seminole High School, he studied at the University of Florida.

He had previously served as an elected county judge 1916 until 1924 when he was elected county prosecuting attorney. In 1926 he became a city commissioner and served that body as mayor for two years. He also had served in the state legislature.

Housholder was a Mason, Elk and a member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and the First Methodist Church. His favorite recreation as golf, but he was interested in all sports.

Mrs. Housholder before her was Gretchen marriage Schultz and they had one son, Karlyle. The family resided at 107 W. 17th Street.

L.P. Hagan Sr. Mr. L.P. Hagan entered the turpentine business in 1901 as manager of a plant in Lake County. After remaining in that position for six years, he moved to Sanford and opened a turpentine plant of his own near Markham.

He was a member of the Masonie Lodge, Elks, Kiwanis, Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and had been president of the Board of Trustees for the Methodist Orphanage at Benson Springs for the past six years.

Mr. Hagan resided at 1702 Park Ave. with his wife, the former Bertha Hart and their children, Robert, Lena Belle and L.P. Jr.

When Seminole County was formed. Hagan was appointed county commissioner and served five consecutive terms. In 1926 he was elected to the state legislature and served there three terms. He also served on the Sanford City Council at the time of the new

(During the summer of 1950, I met Hagan's granddaughter, Barbara Hagan, through the Dr. C.L. Parks who lived near the Hagans on West 17th Street. Barbara lived in Orlando; I believe her father was L.P. Hagan Jr. At the time she was staying with the Parks at New Smyrna Beach right next door to my family. Others near by were Bobby and Ernie Morris, Beverly Cooper, and, of course, Billy Park. We all had a great time together that week and Barbara and I continued our friendship for several years as she would visit her Wanford relatives often.)

Mrs. Helen Moye Mrs. Helen Move operated Sanford's oldest and one of its foremost beauty shops, known as Peter Paul's Beauty Shoppe. She was an experienced opcrator and frequently attended schools to keep pace in her chosen vocation.

Moye was born in 1908 in Atlanta. She moved to Sanford in 1926 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.M. Wilson, and was graduated from Seminole High School in 1927.

She was married to Morris (Mutt) Moye and they resided at 714 Oak Ave. [They later lived on West 15th Street.) They were members of First Baptist Church and she was a member of the Fireman's Aux-

Moye enjoyed awimming and attending movies; her hobbies included painting and fancy novelties.

(Helen Moye was a good friend of my mother's so I was in their home often as a child.

Their children were Miriam

Bobby, I also recall getting my first permanent wave at the Peter Paul Beauty Shoppe when I was about 10 years old. Those of you who remember getting permanents before 1950 or so will recall those machines which were almost a torture! I'm sure it was Mrs. Wilson, Helen's mother, who gave me my permanent. The shop was located in the 100 block of Magnolia Avenue, on the other side of the alley from Touchtons Drug. The other stores I remember in that building were Coleman's Gift Shop, Randall Electric and Sanford Electric Co.)

Mrs. Fannie Munson Mrs. Fannie Stembridge Munson had taught music in Sanford for over 35 years and continued to conduct plano instruction at her home, 613 Myrtle Avenue, Each year her pupils performed in a recital during the high school commencement exercises.

She was born Milledgeville, Ga. and received a kindergarten teaching diploma from Brenau College in Gainesville, Ga. She later studied music at Brenau Conservatory and under outstanding teachers in New York

When only 16, she played the manual pipe organ at the St. Stephan Episcopal Church in Milledgeville and continued until she came to Florida. She had been organist at Holy Cross Episcopal Church for the past 25 years.

(Her daughter, Miss Fannie Reba Munson, also taught piano from the same studio. Several of my friends took lessons from her; I took piano from Miss Margaret Davis, another local characteri) C.M. Hand

When Seminole County became a separate county from Orange in 1913, C.M. Hand was appointed by the governor to act as sheriff and he held that position until 1928 with the exception of one term.

Hand, a resident of the city since 1879, was first married to Miss Martha Beaty and had two daughters, Mrs. Sherman Lloyd and Mrs. Archie Betts, both still in Sanford.

His present wife was the former Mrs. Ruby Powell who







The season came out much the way I had forcasted with two disappointing exceptions. The Scattle Scahawks and the Tennessee Otlers. now Titans, blew ttl



Filing juvenile cases, part two

Last week we discussed the circumstances under which a state attorney may direct file a juvenile's case in circuit court. As noted then, the criteria used in determining whether a case may be direct filed in circuit court were the juvenile's age, the offense the juvenile is accused of, and the juvenile's prior history.

Additionally, the public interest in having adult sanctions considered or imposed upon the juvenile was a consideration. With the exception of the last factor mentioned, the same criteria, age, offense, and prior history, are used to determine when the state attorney is required to direct file a juvenile's case in circuit court.

Florida law requires that the state attorney direct file a case in circuit court if a child was 16 or 17 years of age at the time the alleged offense was committed and the child has been previously adjudicated delinquent for murder, sexual battery, armed or strong-armed robbery, carjacking, homeinvasion robbery, aggravated battery, or aggravated assault,

and is currently charged with a second or subsequent violent crime against a person.

Additionally, the state attorney must direct file a casein circuit court, regardless of the child's age at the time the alleged offense was committed, if the child has previously been adjudicated for offenses which, If committed by an adult, would be felonies and such adjudication's occurred at three or more separate delinquency adjudicatory hearings, and three of which resulted in residential commitments.

Furthermore, the state attorney must direct file a case in circuit court, regardless of the child's age at the time the alleged offense was committed, if

the child is alleged to have committed an act that would be a violation of law if the child were an adult, that involves stealing a motor vehicle, including, but not limited to, a violation relating to carjacking or relating to grand theft of a motor vehicle, and while the child was in possession of the stolen motor vehicle the child caused serious bodily injury to or the death of a person who was not involved in the underlying offense.

One of the main goals of the juvenile system is the rehabilitation of the juvenile offender. in order to accomplish that goal, the Juvenile Justice Reform act of 1990 was passed and an emphasis was placed on providing prevention, diversion, and early intervention programs as well as the provision for the physical and men-

tal health, educational, and vocational needs of the youth. However, when a Juvenile's history demonstrates that efforts at rehabilitation have failed, the law provides for the treatment of the juvenile as an adult. This is evidenced by the statues that require the state attorney direct file a juvenile's case in circuit court when the seriousness of the crime alleged combined with the juvenile's prior history indicate that rehabilitation is not likely. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of juvenile




