SNAS Not Affected In Pending Cut Order - Holland

Nation Awaits Official Word On 95 Closings

"You can breathe easy," U. S. Sen. Spessard L. Holland's Washington office told The Sanford Herald at noon today when asked about the fate of Sanford Naval Air Station relative to Secretary McNamara's forthcoming announcement of pending military reductions.

Holland's office reported receiving a telephone call from Navy Secretary Paul Nitze in which it was noted that only the Orlando Air Force Base will be affected locally and the ultimate result of changes there will be economically beneficial.

As of an early hour this afternoon no other official word was available from either Holland's office or the Defense Department.

Nitze, in telling Holland of the OAFB status, said he was authorized to make the announcement by the Defense Department.

The Orlando base will find the Navy moving in as the Air Force moves out. The phasing will take place between June 1963, and June, 1967.

The obsolete Mace missile training unit will be phased out, Holland reports.

The Geodetic unit will be transferred to Warren, Wyo. Headquarters of the Air Rescue Service will move to Scott AFB, Ill.

However, only the headquarters portion of the Rescue Service will be changed, the announcement said.

The Navy will move in its Naval Training Device Center from four northern United States bases, one of which is located in New York State.

There will be a reduction of military personnel at OAFB, Holland said, as the changes are made. But the civilian population will increase greatly and the highly skilled personnel will mean a greater payroll for the Orlando area, Holland's office said.

ANNOUNCEMENT

DUE AT 3 P. M.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara has ordered the huge Brooklyn (N. Y.) Navy Yard shut down as one of 95 bases and military installations to be closed for economic reasons, it was learned today.

The Brooklyn Army Terminal and nearby Ft. Jay on Governor's Island in New York harbor also was on McNamara's list of bases to be eliminated.

The Portsmouth Naval Shipyard at Portsmouth, N. H. also will be closed, Sen. Thomas J. McIntyre disclosed today.

McNamara scheduled a news conference at 3 p. m. today to identify the doomed installations. But in a move to soften the impact, he notified members of Congress before the conference.

The defense secretary, in announcing the action, said Wednesday that the closing of the facilities would save the government \$500 million a year and would eliminate 63,000 jobs.

Merchants Ask Recognition

"We're not mad at anybody, but we want recognition and co-operation — we're tired of hearing about 'downtown' Sanford — we are Sanford merchants, too."

This was the general consensus among 26 South Sanford merchants who gathered at a "social meeting" at the Capri Restaurant Wednesday evening.

The group represented a cross-section of the more than 40 businesses in the area south of 20th Street along Park Avenue 25th Street and South French Avenue to the present city limits.

Representatives of the group were expected to call today on the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and Sanford Merchants Association officers to seek recognition.

Almost all said they are members of the Seminole Chamber but few are members of the Merchants Association. All agreed that they should take a more active part in Chamber activities, but most said the only announcement of meetings they ever received was "when membership fees are due."

Charles Robinson, speaking for the Chamber and the Merchants Association told the South Sanford merchants:

"Let's don't divide, that can only weaken all of us. If you'll give me your names, I'll see that everyone is informed of meetings and activities, and I here and now urge your participation and suggest that we all work together."

Robinson told the group that meetings of the Merchants Association are "poorly attended by the 'downtown' merchants and 'if you all come, you could easily dominate the meeting.'"

Speakers from the South Sanford group was George Mills, owner of Southern Air. He led the group in a discussion.

LBJ Accepts Bust Of JFK As Memorial

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson paused for a tribute to the late John F. Kennedy today before departing on a pre-Thanksgiving trip to his Texas ranch.

Johnson was to accept a bust of his predecessor, which will be placed in the White House cabinet room until it can be transferred to the proposed Kennedy Library in Cambridge, Mass.

The bust, by sculptor Felix de Weldon, was commissioned by Kennedy's three military aides as a gift for the late President's widow. It is made of bronze, with a pedestal of Italian marble.

Johnson, before leaving for Texas, also planned to meet today with his cabinet advisers to discuss both foreign and domestic problems confronting the nation.

He called in Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and White House adviser McGeorge Bundy and also scheduled a cabinet meeting.

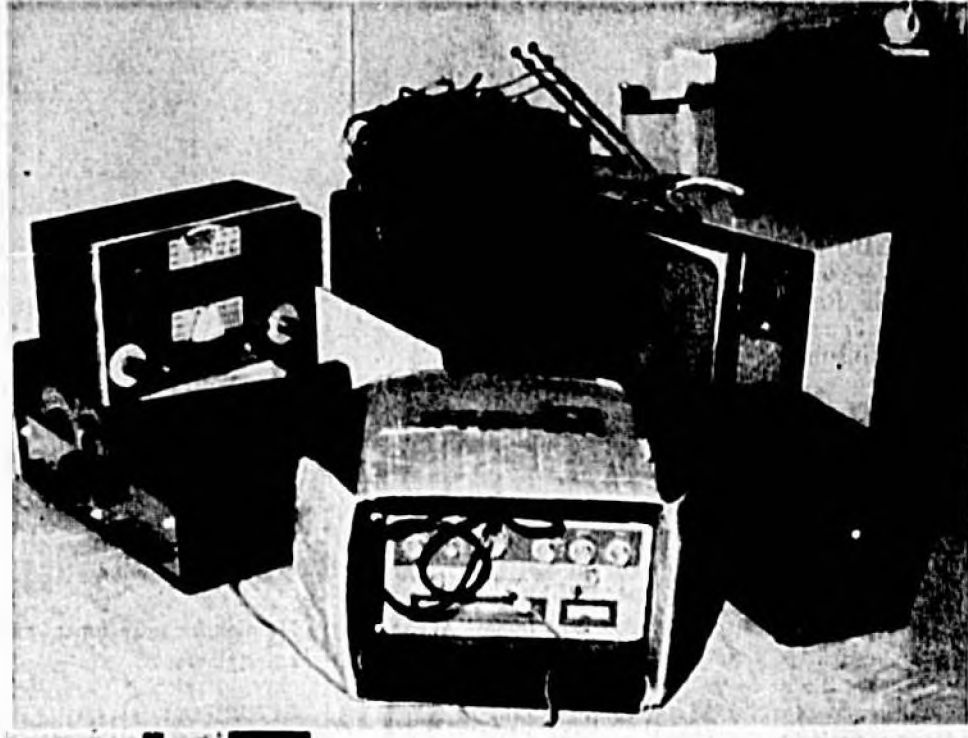
Johnson hoped to climb aboard his big Air Force jet in mid-afternoon to begin an extended visit to his LBJ Ranch in central Texas. No date for his return to Washington has been announced, but he is expected to remain through the Thanksgiving weekend.

Williams OKs Injunction

Juvenile Theft Ring Ends Here

Six boys involved in a theft ring which dated back to last September were tripped up by an antique teapot and their arrests were made Wednesday by Constable R. E. Carroll.

The loot was found in an abandoned garage in an alley off Fifth Street between Magnolia and Palmetto Avenues. Carroll said the garage had been used as a clubhouse by the boys.

Total value of the recovered items was listed at more than \$1,500, the constable stated.

The constable said the boys ranged in ages from 12 to 16 and that they "came from good, highly respected families." They were released pending their parents' custody pending future court action.

The teapot was one of a host of items taken from a Paola home and had been sold to an area dealer for "about a dollar," according to Carroll.

The original owner, Joseph Shaw, of Paola, found it in the shop, identified it as his stolen property and notified Carroll.

Carroll contacted the shop proprietor and learned the identity of the seller.

This clue, the constable said, led to the ultimate apprehension of the six boys.

The officer said the home of Shaw was entered last Sept. 10 while the owner was on vacation in the North and the house was empty.

Carroll said he knew the home was empty, had checked nearby in the day and that it was later the same day the burglary occurred.

It was not until last Thursday that the owner returned and a complete list of the items could be learned.

The boys concentrated on electronic items mainly, the investigating officer said. Taken were a tube tester, a Heathkit stereo outfit, a box of RCA records, an electronics voltmeter, a "genometer," a tape recorder and a television antenna.

Found in the garage was a nearly-new Zenith portable television set and Carroll said the owner has not been identified.

Earlier in their budding crime spree, the boys reportedly took six tents from Troop 242 in Lake Mary. Those were also found in the garage.

Carroll said the boys had been given permission to use the abandoned garage as a clubhouse and it is believed the short crime spree idea blossomed from such meetings.

Four Are Held In Gem Burglary

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Two men and a woman from Pensacola, Fla., were arrested and accused of the \$38,000 burglary of a Miami Beach home.

Frank Silva, of New Orleans, was also arrested after the three Florida people told police he was aiding them to dispose of \$25,000 of jewels taken in the robbery Nov. 10.

The district attorney's office said confessions indicated that John William Von Genta, 47, and his wife, Donna Fae, 36, apparently set up the burglary of the Howard Kane home while they were working as butler and maid in the Miami Beach home.

Investigators said Thomas Gary Congdon, 28, apparently carried out the burglary, escaping with the jewels and \$13,000 in checks.

Religious Liberty Vote Is Blocked

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Ecumenical Council officials today blocked a crucial vote on religious liberty.

A delegation headed by three North American cardinals went directly to Pope Paul VI to protest the action.

Cardinals Joseph Elmer Rittler, of St. Louis; Albert Gregory Meyer, of Chicago, and Paul Emilio Leger, of Montreal, Canada, headed a petition drive in St. Peter's Basilica to demand immediate voting on the controversial declaration granting freedom of worship.

Weapons Evaluation Team Here

A friend of Sanford returned here Wednesday for a day-long visit and as a member of the Defense Department's Weapons System Evaluation Group out of Washington.

He is Capt. Ira M. Rowell, commanding officer of Heavy Attack Squadron 6 while stationed at the Sanford Naval Air Station in the late 1950s. He was a commander at the time.

Rowell reminisced on his stay here and said he hoped someday to retire here.

After his Defense Department duties are completed, he said, he expected to be named Commander of a base in Kodiak, Alaska. And, he adds, he's looking forward to it so he can do some hunting.

Captain Rowell was one of an 18-man team sent here to study the reconnaissance capabilities of the local base. The team is headed by Dr. Bernard Koopman, a civilian equivalent to a major general.

Composed of high-ranking civilians and captains and colonels from all three services, the group is visiting various reconnaissance centers as part of a long range study of the nation's reconnaissance requirements. Next on the agenda is a tour of MacDill Air Force Base.

The Sanford tour began with a briefing on the Sanford reconnaissance program by Capt. James O. Mayo, commander of Reconnaissance Attack Wing One.

Later, the group toured the Integrated Operational Intelligence Center (IOIC), the high-speed data-processing center for intelligence collected by the RA-5C.

During the afternoon the team inspected an RA-5C Vigilante aircraft and participated in a round table discussion on the overall reconnaissance operation with Capt. Mayo moderating.

Value Of Technical Schools Stressed For PTA

In introducing the guest speakers from the Manpower Development Training School in Orlando Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the Lyman PTA County School Superintendent H. T. Milwee announced that the school board has requested a survey on the eligibility of the Seminole area for a technical vocational school.

Speakers were Henry Pilcher, principal of the MDT School and Jerry Belehick, director of counseling. The school was established with federal funds allotted in the last session of congress to give young people a second chance who have dropped out of high school for at least a year and are unemployable due to a lack of skilled training.

Pilcher stated that the school serves five counties including Seminole and trains young people between the ages of 16 and 21 years. At present 16 students are enrolled from Seminole. All students are referred by the Florida State Employment Service and there is a waiting list of 150 persons.

In 1963 there were 700,000 young people between 16 and 21 unable to find jobs because they were not trained for the jobs available. There is no future for unskilled workers, he added.

Training is available for auto parts clerk, institutional services, small appliance repair, air-conditioning and refrigeration, clerk-typist, retail sales, small engine repair, and service station management. Classes are held in four academic areas, occupational math, communications, personal hygiene, and reading. Individual and group counseling is also given.

Unless it is extended the program is scheduled to be phased out in June.

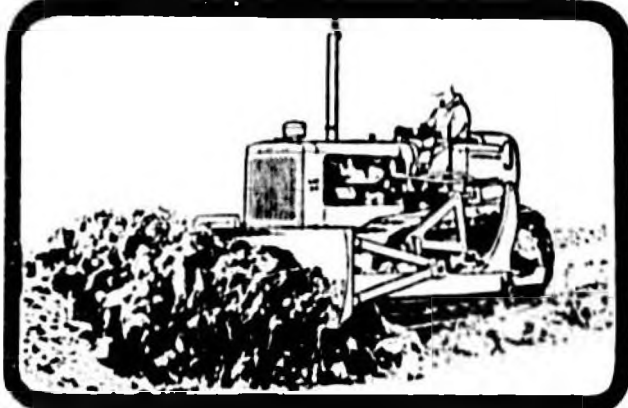

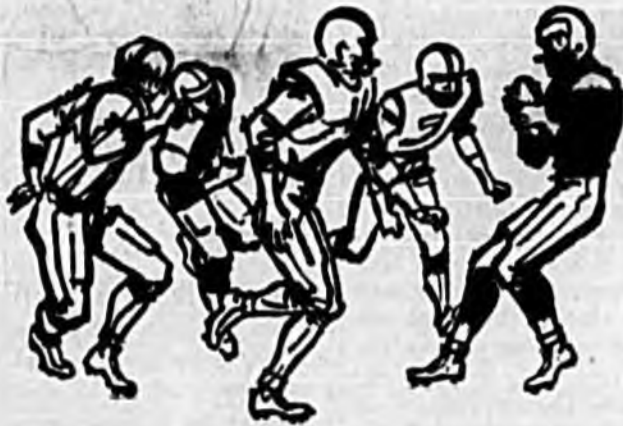

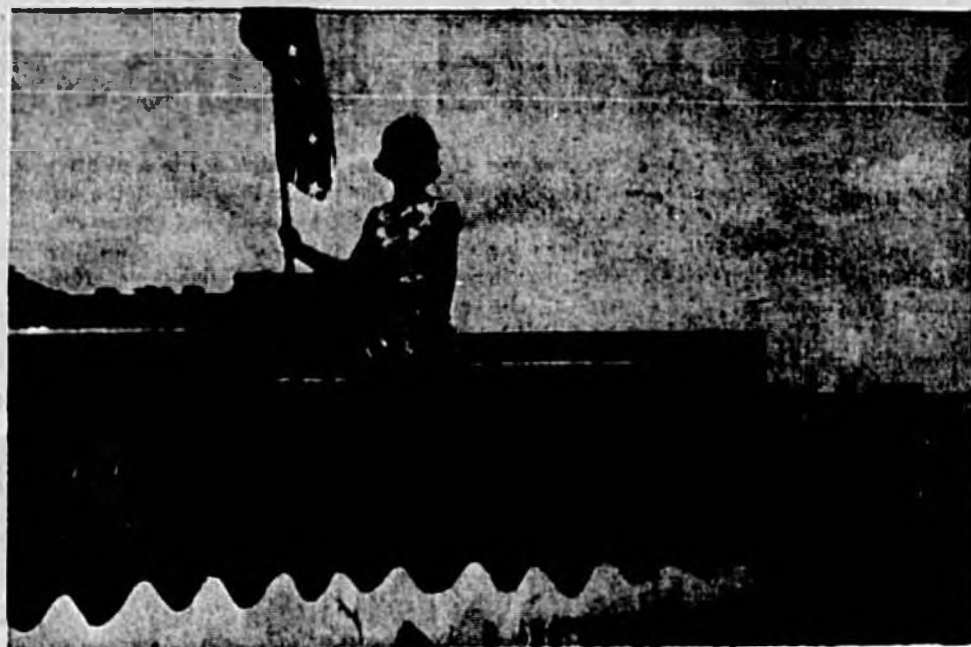

Roast turkey plus more turkey is called for by most Thanksgiving Day gatherings. Some may still want to stuff and roast the turkey, but the modern hostess who wants to spend a little extra time with her guests will achieve this goal by selecting one or more of the newest convenient poultry items. A 12 to 15 pound turkey that is already stuffed with old-fashioned bread stuffing and a four pound boneless turkey roast will supply about the same amount of meat to serve 12 to 16 persons.

If you have turkey and there is some left try this Turkey Crunch.

TURKEY CRUNCH
8 cups diced cooked turkey
4 oz. can mushroom stems, drained
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped onion
3 oz. jar sliced pimento, drained
1/2 tsp. poultry seasoning
3 cans (10 1/2 oz. each) condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 cup milk
3 oz. can chow mein noodles
Into a 2-quart casserole, rubbed with butter, combine the turkey, mushrooms, celery, onion, green pepper, pimento and poultry seasoning. Blend together mushroom soup and milk. Pour over the turkey mixture. Sprinkle chow mein noodles around the edge of the casserole. Bake in slow oven at 325 degrees for 40 minutes. Serves 6.

Those happy peanut butter sandwich eaters should be eternally grateful to a St. Louis, Mo., physician, who invented peanut butter while seeking a nutritious, easily digested high protein food for his patients. It wasn't so long ago, either—in 1890—that this food took its place among the favorite foods for children, but in just a few years its popularity grew until today peanut butter ranks right behind margarine and butter as the most widely used spread for bread. It is not the exclusive property of children, however, as survey shows that it is enjoyed by adults of all ages. Peanut butter provides the same amount of protein as two whole eggs and more protein than is contained in a glass of milk. It has more protein per ounce than beef, ham, chicken or liver.

Here are several recipes from the peanut butter institute. I think you will like them very much.

PEANUT BUTTER CAKE
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
eggs as directed on pkg.
water, as directed on pkg.

Prepare cake mix as directed on pkg., adding peanut butter with eggs and water. Bake according to pkg. directions. Makes two 8 or 9-inch layers.

PEANUT BUTTER FROSTING
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/4 cup margarine (1/4 stick)
2 cups powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
dash salt
Cream together peanut butter and margarine. Continue whipping and slowly add powdered sugar, beating until smooth. Add cream, vanilla and salt and beat until thoroughly mixed and smooth. Makes enough to frost and fill an 8-inch, two layer cake.

PEANUT BUTTER FRUIT SALAD TOPPING
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
1/2 cup honey
1/2 cup pineapple-grapefruit drink
Combine and blend peanut butter, sour cream and honey. Gradually add pineapple-grapefruit drink, stirring constantly and carefully. Serve over your favorite fruit salads. This topping is especially good on apples and bananas. Makes 1 cup.

CREAMED ONIONS WITH DRIED BEEF
1 lb. pkg. sliced dried beef
2 lbs. small onions (18)
2 tbsps. margarine
2 tbsps. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups milk
1 cup bread crumbs
2 tbsps. butter or margarine
Peel onions and place in boiling salted water until tender, about 10 minutes. Drain and place in 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Melt 2 tbsps. butter in saucepan. Stir in flour and salt. Add milk gradually and stir until sauce thickens. Cut dried beef into pieces and cover with boiling water. Drain immediately. Add dried beef to sauce. Pour sauce over onions. Combine bread crumbs

1/2 cup margarine
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 tsp. lemon extract

1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 cup raisins

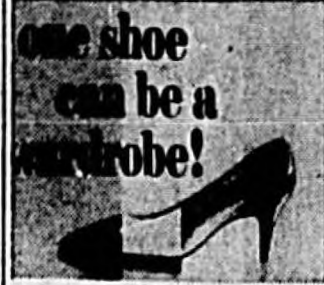

New Travel Organization Houses Americans Abroad

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—For the family that has everything, how about a villa in Spain?

Or a castle on the Rhine? Procuring such accommodations is the specialty of a new travel organization here, World Wide Living Inc., which deals in luxury housing abroad for discriminating American travelers.

The firm can procure, for example, a 16th century, seven-bedroom castle in Tangier, built by Moorish invaders; a 14th century farmhouse near Paris that once was the pleasure abode of Louis VIII; or a three-story terraced villa in Majorca, overlooking the yachts of Europe's pleasure set.

It admittedly caters to a limited market.

"We are in business for the man who travels to vacation, rather than the person who

vacations to travel," said James McLaughlin, executive secretary.

"We put these people in neighborhoods where they can meet their sophisticated counterparts around the world, or just relax with the nobility."

The major lament of World Wide is the "luxury housing shortage" in Europe—luxury housing on the European standard roughly compares to middle class housing in America, said McLaughlin.

European economic programs, it seems, have forced more and more rural workers into the cities, dwindling the housing supply, while at the same time enriching more persons who then want to spend their wealth on better housing.

This shortage, said Michael Paulin, a second member of the organization, was a reason the organization started.

"Thousands of Americans leave to live in foreign countries each year," Paulin said. "In Southern Europe—that is, Greece, Italy, France and Spain—more than 75,000 Americans have taken residence, not counting government workers."

Paulin and McLaughlin, together with overseas representative Kenneth Katz, arrange for these expatriates to be surrounded with gardens, yachts and scenic views during their stay abroad instead of tourist-clogged downtown hotels and apartments.

Katz travels the spa and resort areas of the Continent from his overseas headquarters in Majorca, Spain—its own established pleasure center.

"We have provided anything from fully appointed yachts and villas to deluxe condominium apartments along the Mediterranean coast," Paulin said.

"More than half of these overseas residents are retired doctors, executives and government employees who find stimulating relaxation through a change in environment."

Survey Indicates Eggheads Prefer Working Alone

NEW YORK (UPI)—A study of 342 persons with "high intellectual capability" shows that 70 per cent of them took jobs "which gave them freedom to work alone or power to individually lead and dominate others."

The study, conducted by seven Columbia University researchers and published as a book, "Talent and Performance," was conducted among persons who had received fellowships at Columbia for post-graduate or professional training 15 years ago. The researchers concluded that these "academically talented" people "tend not to be the type who enjoy being team members in the organization."

"This 70 per cent figure is much higher than we expected," said Ell Ginzberg, Columbia economics professor. "It's an important finding because it indicates how very large the search for self-determination, self-expression and autonomy looms in the talented people's plans for their life work."

Therefore, South could and would have bid the grand slam with a slightly better hand. At the other table, the Ital-

ians took seven rounds of bidding to reach the grand slam. Actually, it wasn't too bad a contract, but there was no way to make it. Terence Reese opened the ten of diamonds. South might have tried the diamond finesse right then and there, but he decided that Reese would not lead from a king and that he had better play for a 3-3 spade break. Hence, he went up with the ace of diamonds, led a spade to his king and a second spade back to dummy's ace. Then he led the all important third spade. East showed out and South conceded down one because he could not get three diamond discards. First Government Was 'One House'

Unicameral Legislature Not New In State

The recent U. S. Supreme Court ruling on reapportionment, based on the principle of "one man, one vote," has stirred a flurry of talk in Florida about adopting a unicameral legislature.

Unicameral means "one house," and the system operates today in but one of the 50 states of the nation—Nebraska.

If this should ever come to pass, it would not be unprecedented in this state. History records that Florida's very first self-governing body was a unicameral legislature!

In 1822, when Florida was a Territory, Congress passed an act vesting the legislative power in the Governor and a Legislative Council composed of "13 of the most fit and discreet persons" appointed annually by the President.

The task of finding these "most fit and discreet" gentlemen remained with the President until 1826 when the Territorial Legislative Council was made elective. At that time the Territory was divided into 13 districts, each containing approximately the same number of residents.

It was not until 1838, 16 years after creation of the Legislative Council, that Florida adopted a bicameral system of lawmaking. The Constitution of 1838, which set the stage for statehood, established a General Assembly consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives.

Relative merits of the two plans got varied reaction in present day discussions. In Pinellas County recently, the St. Petersburg Times took a poll on a one-house legislature. One booster of the bicameral system reasoned, "We need two sets of crooks to keep an eye on each other."

Eighteen per cent favored a single house, 39 per cent were for the bicameral legislature, and 43 per cent were undecided.

Territorial Gov. William P. DuVal, termed by some historians as "the greatest Governor Florida ever had," strived to help the new lawmakers keep their feet on the ground and get the new government off to a sound start.

But the early Councils apparently were a free-wheeling bunch. Beginning in 1828, banks and insurance companies were chartered with little restriction. The Territory issued bonds for the Union Bank of Tallahassee totaling \$3 million.

An account of the period relates: "Money flowed freely until the panic of 1837 when a decline in cotton prices, the prolonged Seminole War and a frost which destroyed the citrus crop contributed to the downfall of credit. Many banks failed, including the Union Bank of Tallahassee, and when the State Constitution was adopted it made it unlawful for the Government to go into debt or for bankers to hold office."

The Territorial Council ran into fierce criticism from one recognized leader of the day, Col. Joseph M. White, who served many years in Congress as the Delegate from Florida.

He once quoted the chairman of the judiciary committee as saying there had been "more vicious legislation in the Territory of Florida than in all other territories put together."

Johnson: Next Phase

The most important event in the United States today is taking place behind closed doors, necessarily so at the start. It is the development of new goals, and the reappraisal of old goals, by President Johnson. It has begun with the Cabinet-level consultations at the LBJ ranch. It will continue with the reports of the President's task forces that have been working quietly in most of the big problem areas for several months.

Then the message on the State of the Union will be written and legislation drawn up.

This is an important process for at least two reasons. The President has vigorous majorities in Congress which President Kennedy did not have. And he is plainly determined to make a mark of his own on his time.

The Kennedy style was to gather around him intellectuals and planners and officials, to argue and draft proposals, and then for Mr. Kennedy to decide.

President Johnson works by consensus. He wants capable groups to come up with programs he can adopt. Of necessity he will remain at the center of the process. The various parts of his program have to be coordinated. As the most obvious example, what a task force wants to do is limited by what the financial policymakers say the government can afford. But Mr. Johnson wants more of the decision-making to be done by others, further away from himself at the center.

Mr. Kennedy, whose process of thought was closer to himself, looked for what he thought was the best program under the circumstances. The circumstances began with his

own ideas and ended with his narrow margin of victory and his limited influence in Congress.

Mr. Johnson usually looks farther out. He obviously intends to involve Congress and the public at an early stage in debates generated by his task forces and the proposals that result. His method is to include them in the process of decision-making itself. They would then be more likely to support the result. They would have helped to shape it.

This is a lively prospect. As the concept of the Great Society begins to take tangible shape we will all be able to discuss it. We for our part welcome a broader share by the public in policymaking. Like others we have our own ideas to express.

But more than this, most of today's great decisions are complex. They involve a hard labor of thought, studying the facts, sorting out the gains and risks of a given step, thinking the implications through. The public too often is left out in the wilderness instead of being invited inside.

The election campaign was remarkably short on intelligent discussion of issues. We trust that the President's flair for communicating will now progress from his personal life to his organized ideas.

Dead-End Of Calamity

The liberal Republicans who are demanding that the Goldwater party leadership walk the plank are the same soft-boiled Republicans who goofed every presidential contest since 1928.

The liberals won in 1952-56 with Dwight D. Eisenhower, feats of no political magic whatever. General Ike would have been a shoo-in running as a Democrat or you name it.

Strike the Eisenhower landslide from the Republican record and what have you got?

You have a party that steadily has been going down the drain since its leadership seized caboose position in the parade of Democratic dealers, frontiersmen and such. It is a sorry record of second class leadership, pedestrian presidential candidates and dismal defeat.

Berry Goldwater did, of

course, lead the Republican party into a dead-end of calamity. It would be too much to expect Goldwater as its leader into the future.

But it is equally too much to expect that the soft-boiled party men who deserted to the storm cellar during the 1964 presidential campaign should be rewarded now with the party command.

Despite the enormity of the 1964 defeat and the GOP's gloomy immediate prospects the election returns established an important fact. It was this:

There are a great many millions of political conservatives in the United States who are eager to put a conservative in the White House.

Goldwater and the other party conservatives accepted their own rejection in 1960 and rallied around the soft-boiled Republican ticket consisting of Richard M. Nixon

and Henry Cabot Lodge. When the soft-boiled ticket lost to the Kennedy family thrust, the conservatives determined that they should have their own overdue chance at the prize.

Mathematical fairness suggests that maybe the conservatives should have several more chances before being waved to the showers. After all, the soft-boiled Republicans were losing elections for years without being required to surrender party leadership.

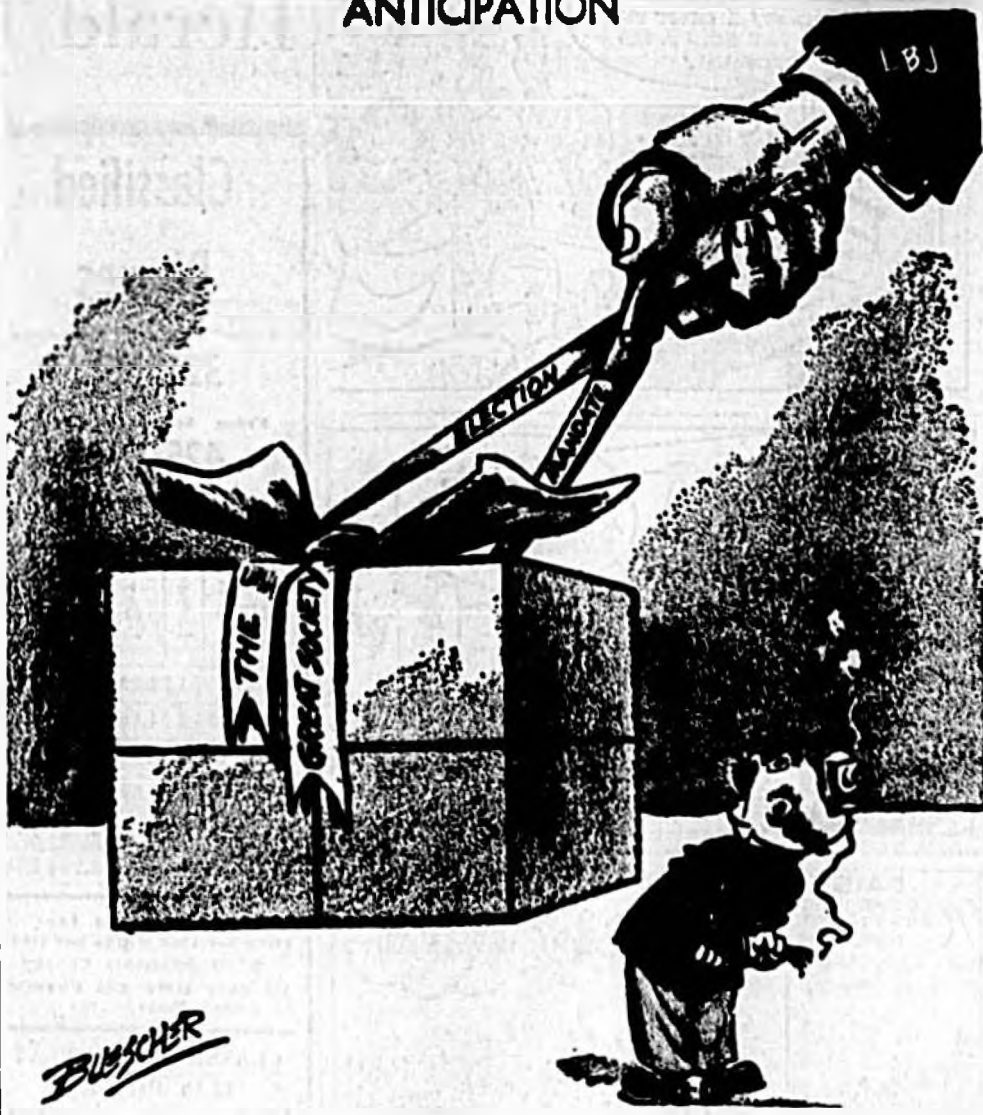
It is quite obvious, however, that the Republican party requires new leadership. Obvious also is that no Republican leader who bolted the Goldwater-Miller ticket this year or who gave it no more than faint praise would be acceptable to Republican conservatives.

The Republican conservatives could and probably would sabotage the presidential campaign of any soft-boiled leader who might now be imposed on them. Why not? Many soft-boiled Republicans boycotted the Goldwater campaign.

What the Republicans had better come up with in a hurry is a compromise on the party leadership. It is not necessary that either faction love the compromise leader. But it is very necessary that neither side hates or despises him.

There are not many such. First to mind probably would be Nixon. He did a big job for Goldwater this year while such as Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Sen. Jacob K. Javits, both of New York, were quaking under the storm cellar bunks. Illinois' Charles H. Percy didn't offend either side in the campaign. He did worse. Percy offended all hands by losing his run for governor. If he had been elected, Percy might have been everybody's candidate for leader of the GOP.

Worry Clinic

Billy is a victim of one of the common nuisance habits that afflict children. It starts in early infancy but often embarrasses youngsters through grammar school, so learn to curb this habit by indirect psychological approach listed below. And will you parents please calm down, too, when his bedtime arrives?

CASE U-34: Billy G., aged 18 months, has a typical problem.

"Dr. Crane," his mother began, "Billy sucks his thumb as soon as I put him to bed for his nap."

"And at night, he inevitably will get his thumb into his mouth as a part of his bedtime ritual."

"I've painted his thumb with bitter stuff from the drugstore, but this hasn't stopped him."

"So what else can I do? Our dentist says he may distort the position of his teeth if he persists."

You Bible scholars may recall that when Gideon was chosen to lead the Israelites against a vast army of the invaders, he didn't meet them head-on in active combat.

No, indeed! For God had urged Gideon to employ what we psychologists call the indirect method for breaking this habit:

Gideon, with only 300 picked

men, thus employed psychological strategy and routed an army of about 185,000 men.

Use this same indirect method when trying to break a child of the entrenched habit of thumb sucking.

For this problem is very common and develops early, due to the child's attempt to relax.

It often starts because the child is put to bed with a bottle and the act of nursing thus is a symbol that "triggers" his complete relaxation into deep sleep.

But sometimes the child is still restless or hungry or the bottle rolls out of his reach.

In his resulting frustration and irritability from hunger cramps, he finally gets his thumb into his mouth.

So he starts sucking on his thumb. This serves as a substitute for the former "trigger" and also produces more saliva, which he then swallows to help fill his stomach.

After the habit has become well developed, it is difficult to change, as many adults have likewise learned regarding their own nuisance habits of smoking, drinking or overeating.

But here are some of the indirect methods for breaking this habit:

(1) See that the child's sto-

mach is full when he goes to bed.

(2) Avoid arguments and angry words among the rest of the family, for this disturbs the child and leaves him unduly tense or fearful, thus requiring his typical "trigger" to gain relaxation.

(3) Offer him a substitute toy to hold in his hands, such as a woolly lamb or cloth puppy, panda, etc.

Children relish having such a pet as a bedfellow, for the pet vaguely gives them the feeling they are not alone.

Even older children of high school age will thus take their childhood panda or teddy bear to bed to "trigger" their relaxation.

(4) Roll some lumber cardboard into cylinders and thrust the child's arms into them, as stiff sleeves. Pin the cylinder to the pajama sleeves.

The child can then bend his arms partially but not reach his mouth.

(5) Cut some strips of rubber from an old inner tube. When his arms are extended, pin one end to each sleeve's cuff and the other to the mattress so when he raises his hand to his mouth, his arm will be under tension and soon this thumb will slide out of his mouth, due to fatigue.

Confession Of Failure

BUDAPEST, Hungary (UPI)—The gypsy violins have come back to Budapest.

And with them has returned a measure of gaiety to this city astride the Danube.

The violins and a new-found freedom dim but do not erase the memories of the 1954 revolt which, if nothing else, proved to the Communist leadership that an oppressed people armed only with flats and paving blocks can arise against tanks and guns.

The freedom and the stocks of consumer goods on Budapest shelves are relative and to be compared not with the West but to the Communist satellite states to the east and how far among them the Iron Curtain has been raised or lowered.

And among them, as this correspondent found in a swing through Budapest, Sofia, Bucharest, Prague and Warsaw, the Hungarians have the best of it.

In a Budapest cabaret, an entertainer directs a guarded fire against the regime of Premier Janos Kadar.

A journalist charges that Communist planners speak of "realistic socialism" but are unable to explain it.

Neither will go to jail for his boldness.

Budapest streets are grimy from the oily soot of cheap brown coal but the dress of the people is a little brighter than elsewhere in the bloc.

In the shops are French and American cosmetics, British woollens and tinned fish from Denmark. In the block-square public market are fresh vegetables, the pork which Hungarians prefer over beef and the bunches of paprika which they love. The quantities are not great but they are there.

These are some of the outward signs of a relaxation which began being felt in 1960, concessions wrung from a frightened regime after the 1956 revolt which cost 25,000 lives.

They are fragile things. The revolt drained the Hungarian people and in Hungary now there is not the spark that touched off the 1956 uprising. But they desperately hope that

today also is a sign of tomorrow.

A cold wave of fear swept across Budapest the night Khrushchev was fired in Moscow.

Kadar's assurance that co-existence remained a basic policy did not really allay the fears.

Within recent weeks a new agreement was reached between the state and the Roman Catholic church and new bishops were named to posts long vacant.

Within coming weeks it is widely anticipated with a change also will come in the status of Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, for eight years a voluntary prisoner in a tiny apartment atop the U. S. legation.

Soon, it is believed, depending at least in part on his own wishes, the cardinal will be in Rome.

And the state which in 1939 sentenced him to life imprisonment will agree to his going.

Partly, these are Communist confessions of failure. Partly they are the result of the Eastern bloc's gradual loss of independence from Moscow and partly they are the results of a desperate need for Western currencies to help finance a continuing drive toward development of heavy industry.

The new church-state agreement and the release of thousands of political prisoners are part of Hungary's drive to improve its relations with the West. Hungarian officials entertain obvious hopes that the

United States soon will up its legation to the status of embassy.

But first must come settlement of approximately \$100 million worth of U. S. claims on nationalized Hungarian property, Hungarian bonds and war surplus.

Economically, the country suffers the usual Communist ills of centralized planning and lack of incentive.

Once able to produce enough grain to feed itself and even to export, it now must import.

Despite a conspicuous lack of raw materials, the regime continues to press a campaign for heavy industry.

In Hungary, the average wage is about 1,700 forints per month, or something less than \$80, just about enough to buy a medium quality man's overcoat.

Italian Police Puzzled In Case A La Hollywood

ROME (UPI) — The case of the kidnaped man in the Houdini-like trunk puzzled Italian police today. The file read like a Hollywood screen script of foreign intrigue.

The characters were a Moroccan with dyed blond hair and two diplomats from the United Arab Republic who apparently were trying to smuggle him to Egypt.

The Moroccan was found in a specially equipped trunk which would have defied the escape attempts of the great Houdini. He was freed when his means for help were heard.

The trunk carried official wax seals of the UAR Embassy here and orders to deliver it by airfreight to the Egyptian Foreign Ministry in Cairo. The Moroccan was carefully packed inside.

Police identified the Moroccan as a linguist who spoke seven languages and said he worked as an interpreter for the Egyptian Embassy here.

November In Dallas

By Robert Cochran DALLAS — (NEA)—Rain drips from the plastic flowers, spreading the ink on the hand-written notes pinned to the green wreaths. Cold needles of water bounce on the sidewalks and turn the lily pond into a boiling sea.

The aquat brick and cement buildings which face the plaza are dark and streaked with water. The wet, black streets glisten. A man, standing in the doorway of the Texas School Book Depository to escape the rain, ceaselessly snaps pictures.

It is November in Dallas. A year ago on November 22, Main and Elm and Houston streets were bathed in sunlight, lined with people straining to catch a glimpse of the motorcade which was to take the President of the United States to the Dallas Trade Mart.

But on this day, the rain has cleared the streets and traffic is slow and silent.

"Dear God," the note pinned to the plastic wreath says, "Please take care of our beloved President. We miss him very much and sort of feel that even though he isn't here, in body, on earth with us, he is still watching over us to protect us from other evils. God bless you, President Kennedy, and your beloved family. Thank you for being our President."

"There are always a dozen or so people around Dealey Plaza," a policeman said.

20 Below Seen For The Dakotas
