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**Honesty in Government**  
President Truman's mud-slinging campaign, or as he prefers to call it, his "whistle stop tour" in which he is repeating his own shop worn "Give 'em hell" method of campaigning which proved so effective in 1948, is all that was needed to convince us that General Eisenhower is the Man of the Year in 1952.

The more the President pours on the more he tries to smear the record of one of our greatest generals, the more vile language he uses and the more vicious the charges he makes, the more it seems to be in evidence in the "whistle stop" of public opinion which will insure Eisenhower's election.

That we are not alone in this opinion is shown by a survey conducted by the Princeton Research Service which shows that among independent voters only 30 percent think Truman is helping Stevenson, while 65 percent think he is not. Many of those who think Truman is helping, of course are against this sort of campaigning, but fear that many people will be fooled by it.

If anything were needed to show that Governor Stevenson's nomination was simply a matter of window dressing and that the same old gang of rascals will continue to run the show after he is elected, this "whistle stop tour" of the President is sufficient. He wouldn't be working himself in death for someone who was going to "clean up the mess in Washington."

No matter how honest a man Governor Stevenson may be personally, no matter how much he wants to get rid of dishonest officials, if he is elected, no matter how hard he tries to do one for Truman's sake will be handicapped by his friends, blocked by his supporters, and stymied by his party.

Governor Stevenson will use his election to that fact in the Democratic party which is inimical to the interests of the South, to the power-mad politicians who dominate the sprawling federal bureaucracy and to the political bosses who control the big city machines, to the five percenters, the milk coats and the red herrings. He could no more clean up the mess in Washington than he could clean up the mess in the White House.

What another four years of that kind of government would do to this country is horrible to contemplate. World peace, the American way of life, the rights of the citizen, the complete breakdown of national character and public morality is even more to be feared.

Until there is honesty in government and an honest approach to the problems confronting us, we have no hope for any improvement in either our domestic affairs or our international relations. A complete change of administration is our only hope for Washington, or for our country.

**Koestler's Story**  
It is sometimes difficult to understand how intelligent men can be deluded into accepting the doctrines of Communism. Yet some of the most valuable information available on this subject is to be found in the autobiography of Arthur Koestler, the first volume of whose autobiography has been recently published.

Since he renounced Communism Koestler has waged war upon his former beliefs with all of his literary talents. His novel "Night" has been adapted for the stage and presented a frightening picture of a police state and the men who create and maintain it. His central character is the architect or secretary of a totalitarian tendency. Only at the end did the old man realize that the idea that "this and justifies the means" is an eternal dark even at noon.

Koestler's autobiography, "Arrow in the Blue," tells of his early life and why fear of fascism and distrust of existing forms of government led him into the Party ranks. A man searching for the truth must eventually find his dehumanizing tendencies. For the end had become the means and his world was plunged into a state where it was always dark even at noon.

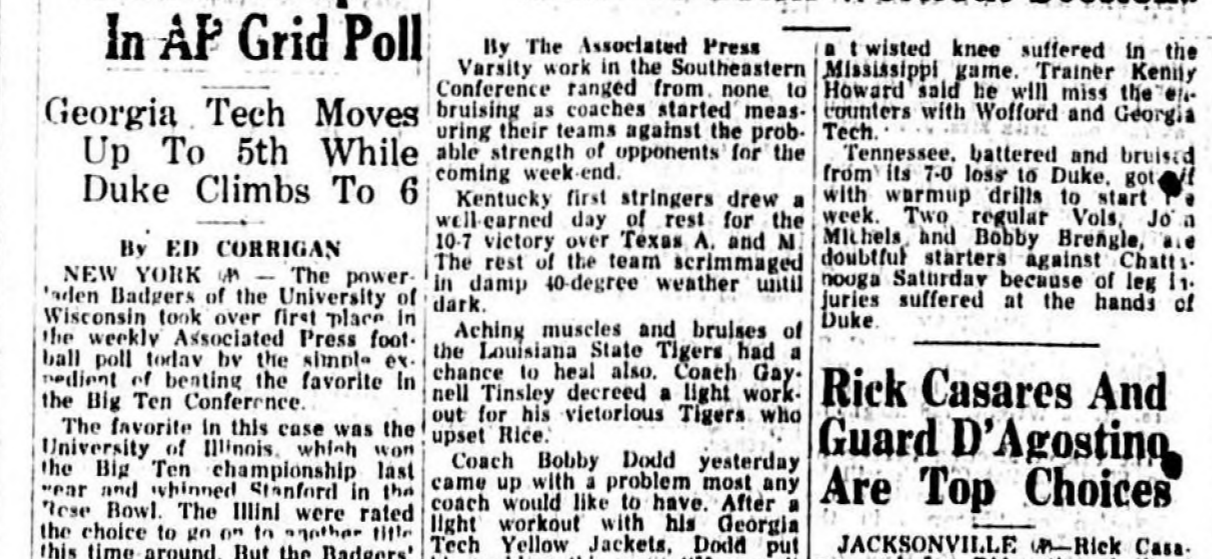

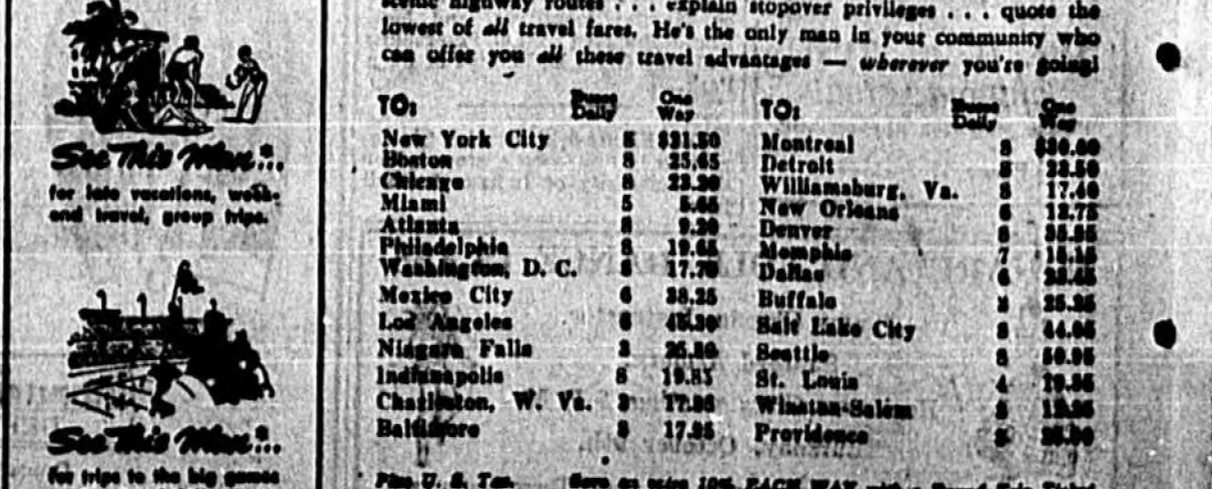
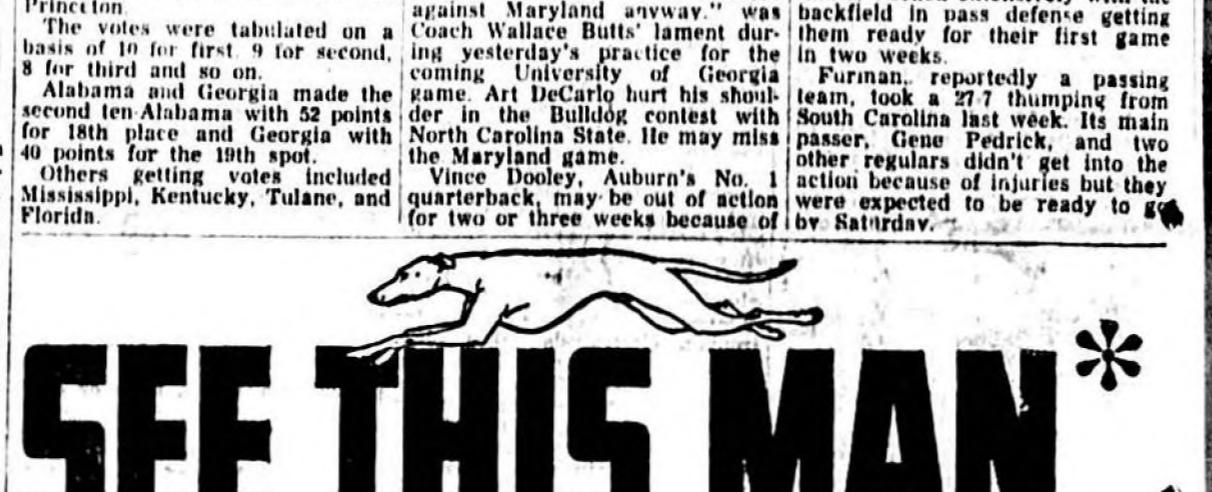

dock, she said, had been used for three or four boats at a time. She stated that Mr. Todd claimed the water rights at the end of the road belonged to him, meaning which the dock was removed and she now has to leave her own boat at a neighbor's residence.  
Mrs. J. H. Cowan, another neighbor, said that Mr. Todd had attempted to persuade her to close the road. "There wouldn't be a person in Lake Mary in my neighborhood who would speak to me if I should do such a thing as that," she exclaimed.

G. W. Spencer, Sanford attorney, representing the Lake Mary group, pointed out that the road had been dedicated to the public in 1922 by H. D. Durant, the original owner. He contended it was a "public road and a county road and had been carried since 1922 as a public road." He brought out he would like to avoid a lawsuit. Lloyd P. Boyle, County attorney, and Attorney Spencer had a heated discussion concerning the feasibility of a law suit, the former thinking it was a good idea.

Mr. Spencer said he didn't want to have a warrant served on Mr. Todd. Mr. Boyle said he should have one served as Todd was treating them badly.  
It was at this stage that Attorney Williams came upon the scene and told of his discussion with Mr. Todd. He said he had advised Mr. Todd to remove a log at the end of the road and leave it clear.  
Mr. Spencer exclaimed, "Will you tell him to remove the obstruction?" Mr. Williams replied, "I've already told him." He went on to say he would advise him again of the matter and that he felt that Mr. Todd would comply with the dissenters' wishes.

The citizens committee had contacted the State Attorney General, Richard W. Ervin, concerning the matter. Although he said he couldn't give an official solution, Mr. Ervin stated in part in the letter, "If Palmetto Avenue has become a county road, either by dedication or through long continued use by the public so as to ripen into an easement, the Board of County Commissioners may, if they see fit, take jurisdiction in the controversy." The letter referred to a court case.

Other than Lake Mary residents were present at the meeting to present their individual cases on matters dealing with the county, adding up to a large crowd in the audience section of the meeting room. Several people were standing both inside the room and immediately outside the doors.  
Several times during the morning session of the meeting, B. C. Dodd, Board Chairman, had to rap for attention to quiet the crowd in order that business before the Commission could be transacted.

Several people, led by G. P. Brasington, chairman of the road committee of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce, appeared on behalf of the improvement of a road leading to Lake Mary from Sanford along the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad.  
The Commission agreed to widen and improve the dirt road,

of which less than two miles needs work done on it.  
Frank Evans also appeared in behalf of 36 petitioners for improvement of Sanford Avenue, between Pineway and Myrtle Streets, in Lake Mary. Commissioner H. B. Pope, Sanford, said he would petition the Commission to proceed in correcting the matter as soon as equipment is available and the weather is favorable.  
The closing of Seventh and Water Streets, north of Lakeview Avenue in Lake Mary, was approved. The former was requested to be closed by Mr. Brasington while the second request was made by Raymond Ball.

The President lathered Sens. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin, William Jenner of Indiana, James P. Kem of Missouri and Ohio's Robert A. Taft, all Republicans. Truman said yesterday he doesn't see how Eisenhower can be elected "with the crew he has got around him" and its "terrible record."

Speaking at a train stop at Helper, Utah, the President said: "I just don't think the people are going to elect a president who has surrendered to Taft and McCarthy and Jenner and Kem."  
He cracked that the GOP is revealing behind a new candidate the same old party, "without faith without vision, without strategy."  
The Republicans were charged with attempting to hide what Truman called a 20-year record of obstruction and isolationism behind "the shining armor of a national hero."

Truman intensified his campaign for Colorado's six electoral votes for Adlai Stevenson today.



## ROK Troops Retake Strategic Hill In Frenzied Fighting

### Bayonet Wielding Koreans Recapture Vital Peak On Invasion Road To Seoul

By GEORGE A. MCARTHUR  
SEOUL, Korea (AP)—South Korean commandos fighting with bayonets tonight recaptured a vital shell-cratered peak overlooking the an ancient invasion route to Seoul in a brutal battle that has raged since Monday night.

A front line officer said the Korean troops cut a Chinese battalion of 700 men down to 150 in recapturing the crest of White Horse Hill on the Western Front.

The peak—main objective of the biggest Communist attack in a year—has changed hands more than a dozen times as both sides threw tanks, artillery and men into the raging battle.

A few hours earlier the Chinese recklessly charged through an Allied artillery barrage and captured defenders on the south slope but the crest. Then they hit the Korean Republicans held fast.

Fighting was slightly less bitter elsewhere along the front as the big Red offensive moved into its third day.

Allied warplanes rumbled over the scene, dropping red lines directly behind the front.

Earlier today in Seoul, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Eighth Army commander, said the Chinese had stopped all attacks without any penetration of their main battle positions.

Action has been limited to outposts, and the enemy has been cloistered in that area.

"The troops which have participated in the current action are as fit as ever," Gen. Van Fleet said. "I am sure morale never has been higher."

Front line reports said a reinforced battalion of Chinese shells up the slopes of White Horse mountain despite a shattering Allied artillery barrage. They landed the crest at 5 p. m. and held on.

When they made their charge down the south slope, South Korean troops met them with bayonets, hand grenades and machine guns. Communist dead littered the hill side.

Eighth Army said the South Korean troops struck the Red line between 10 and 11 p. m. Tuesday night and Wednesday noon.

During the afternoon a running artillery duel between both sides raged from the crest.

AP correspondent Milo Farneti reported from the front that the crest of White Horse mountain was a shell-cratered no-man's-land. It had changed hands 12 times in 42 hours of almost continuous fighting.

White Horse, and nearby Arrowhead Ridge, guard the sprawling Chorwon Valley and the gateway to the south. The peaks have been the main target of the Red of late.

Farneti said the battered remnants of a Red battalion were dug in on one slope. South Koreans of the Republic's Ninth Division were just off the peak on the other side.

The crestline itself was a rubble mass of log and dirt bunkers. The Chinese were paying a terrible price. Allied gunners ripped into one group of 1,000 Chinese reinforcements. Swiftness said half the Reds were killed or wounded.

U. S. warplanes and artillery caught smaller groups of Reds in the open and pounded them with shells, bombs, rockets and machine gun fire.

Whether the infantry clashed, Allied and Communist artillery joined in. In the 24 hours ended at 6 p. m. yesterday the Communists had fired 800 rounds—almost double their previous high for a single day.

The Communists also brought tanks into the action. White Horse and Arrowhead were hit by Communist tanks.

French troops on Arrowhead fought off about 450 Chinese before dusk last night. More Reds pushed into the valley between White Horse and Arrowhead just before midnight. A French counterattack drove them off.

West of the Mundung Valley Allied soldiers regained one of the positions lost yesterday. They moved into the outpost without firing a shot.

The Red still hold five of the major positions they grabbed in the impetus of their opening attack Monday.
