Moonshot Chief Raps Industry

HOUSTON (UPI) - Amer ica's moonshot chief said today industry must improve its standards before U. S. astronauts can make a successful lunar mission.

Walter Williams, deputy bring fatter dividend checks director for mission requirements and flight operations for the U. S. Space Agency, blamed poor industrial testing for the failure of Astronaut Gordon Cooper's Mercury capsule to make an automatic re-entry into earth's atmosphere.

John C. French, an assistant space reliability and safety chief, said the tests failed to adjust for handling and shipping of the delicate equipment.

Williams and French spoke at the start of a two-day conference on project Mercury that will detail everything about the highly successful venture from astronaut training to man's reactions in out-

Cooper, who made a 22orbit flight, complained of crowded conditions in the space capsule and said the long countdowns sapped an astronaut's energy. He said the countdowns could be accomplished with the backup pilot.



Flora Heads North, But Stalls Again **Cuba Battered** For Fourth Straight Day

MIAMI (UPI)-Deadly herricane Fiora made a slow turn northward today, then stalled once again over flooded eastern Cuba to inflict a fourth day of punishment on the region that produces most of the island's food.

Cuhan Premier Fidel Castro arrived at Santiago, cap-Ital of Oriente, to take personal command of relief operations which appeared from radio reports to be blocked by the continued pounding of torrential rains.

Radio reports of erop and livestock losses, monitored here, began to reach disaster

proportions. At 11 a.m. EST, the Miami Weather Bureau located the hurricane's center near latitude 21.0 north, longitude 78.0 west, south of Camaguey, about halfway between the city and the southern coast. This was about the same location the storm took up early today after it drifted alightly northward out of the bay of

Guacanayabo. "The steering currents surrounding the hurricane remain quite weak and variable so movement will be very slow," the Weather Bureau said. "However, there are some indications of a trend to a slow northward drift at not more than five miles per hour beginning late today or tonight."

The Weather Bureau warmed all interests north of the storm, "particularly the Bahamas," to maintain vigi-

ance. Forecasters refused to speculate whether the storm would offer a threat to the United States after crossing Cuba but said if it continued pass east of the Florida coart, On Havana radio, Carlos Rafael Rodriguez, president of Cuba's Agrarian Reform Institute, reported this morning that half of Cuba's rice crop had been destroyed, 26 to 30 per cent of the cotton crop and 40 million pounds of

corn had been lost, Rodrigues also said poultry farms of central and eastern Cuba had suffered "enormous damage." Chicken and rice are the main staples of the

Cuban diet. Unofficial radio reports estimated 90 per cent of Cuba's colfee crop, which had just reached maturity in the Oriente mountains, had been des-

troved. Flora's highest winds, which reached 140 m.p.h. when it hit Haili last Thursday and caused at least 400 deaths, decreased to 85 m.p.h. today when the center moved back

Some lawyers and specialists in federal - state relations are saving there is now virtually no likelihood any of the so-called "atates' rights" amendments to the U. S. Constitution will make serious headway toward passage.

In recent weeks they have been condemned by the American Bar Association and the National Association of Attorneys General (of the 50 states).

The National Legislative Conference, a body of state legislators who last year started these amendments on their way, this summer took a wobbly stand whose net effect is rated negative.

The amendments, of course, are those which would (1) alter the conatitutional amending process to make it easier for states (without participation of Congress) to initiate and ratify amendments; (2) bar the federal courts from any role in state legislative reapportionment; (3) create a special 50-member Court of the Union, superior to the U. S. Supreme Court, to hear cases involving federal-state relations.

Roughly a dozen state legislatures have approved the first two, but only five have endorsed the Court of the Union. And relatively few legislatures will convene in 1964. Each proposal would have to have the endorsement of 84 state legisla-

Yet even though chances are now regarded as slim that this will happen on any of these proposals, some persons continue to voice concern that they may somehow find new life in the months ahead.

One such is Archibald Cox, U. S. Solicitor General. In a Washington talk, he deplored the proposal he said would "eliminate the national voice" from the constitutional amending process.

Congress is that voice, and it is considered significant that all the existing 23 amendments to the U.S. Constitution were initiated by Congress-not the states.

Under the proposed change, 34 states approving an identical amendment could have it thereafter submitted for ratification by 38 states (three-fourths of the 50) without any reference to Congress.

Cox points out that it would be possible to put together a combination of 38 states whose total population would be less than 40 per cent of all Americans.

This hardly seems a sufficient proportion to be given a controlling voice in altering the Constitution and perhaps affecting the whole course of American life for decades
