Nixon Orders Bombing Curtailment

SAIGON (AP) - President Nixon has ordered a further curtailment of the bombing of North Vietnam as a sign of good will during the current

peace negotiations, U.S. sources reported today. The sources would not say, however, whether Nixon had ordered a full bombing halt over all of North Vietnam, a reduction in the number of raids or a limitation in the areas that may be attacked. Nor would they say if the new orders

had gone into effect yet. The sources said an announcement about this was expected soon from Washington.

Peace Pact Revisions To Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — Official South Vietnamese sources said oday that Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr. is bringing a revised draft peace agreement to Saigon. And a leading newspaper quoted an unnamed source as saying a cease-fire might occur before Feb. 3, the Tet new year.

The newspaper, Tin Song, often regarded as the official voice of President Nguyen Van Thieu's palace, quoted another source as saying the Saigon government was "neither optimistic nor pessimistic" about peace.

Haig, the U.S. Army vice chief of staff, was flying to Saigon to report to Thieu on the latest round of private Paris peace talks between Henry A. Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho. He was due here early Tuesday.

Thieu, meanwhile, met with members of his National Security Council, his closest group of senior aides, to lay groundwork for the meeting with Haig. Official sources said the meeting lasted eight hours, the longest ever held by the council, and involved an intensive review of Saigon's positions on an Indochina peace set-

From reports relayed from Paris by his own chief negotiator, Pham Dang Lam, and through U.S. Ambassador El-Isworth Bunker, Thieu already knows what changes have been made in the latest version of the draft agreement which

originally was negotiated last October. Well informed sources said Saturday that Saigon saw "encouraging signs" in Paris on the issue of South Vietnamese sovereignty, which Thieu says must be provided for in any agreement he will sign.

At the same time, the sources indicated the possibility of a compromise by Thieu on his demand that the agreement specifically provide for the total withdrawal of all North Vietnamese troops in South Vietnam.

There has been no official comment on this report.

The communique reported that 10 B52 missions, or 30 strikes, were flown in the southern panhandle of North Vietnam below the 19th parallel during the 24-hour period ending at

North Vietnam since the aerial blitz against Hanoi and Haiphong was launched Dec. 18. And, since the blitz was suspended Dec. 30, the nor20th parallel of latitude, 60 miles north of the 19th

The U.S. Command also said its fighterbombers flew 100 strikes against North Vietnam from 8 a.m. Sunday to 8 a.m. Monday. It said they destroyed 12 railroad and highway bridges between Thanh Hoa, just below the 20th parallel, and Dong Hoi, 45 miles above the demilitarized

The command also reported that a Navy F4 was hit by antiaircraft fire over North Vietnam

Sunday afternoon. It said the two crewmen parachuted and were rescued about 25 miles southeast of Thanh Hoa.

President Nixon first halted bombing above the 20th parallel last Oct. 23, when it appeared that the United States and North Vietnam were near a cease-fire agreement. When the negotiations broke off, Nixon resumed the bombing Dec. 18 with the biggest air blitz of the war. He halted the bombing above the 20th parallel again Dec. 30, saying Hanoi had signaled its intention to negotiate seriously.

40 War Protestors Arrested



Congress Has Rare Opportunity Session

The 93rd Congress convened in Washington recently, confronted with so many issues familiar from previous sessions that the overriding question may be whether Congress itself can surmount the hurdles of politics and its own ponderous machinery to fulfill its obligations.

Congressional Quarterly has catalogued no less than 116 noteworthy issues facing the new Congress, and observes that the major ones have not changed much since President Nixon first took office in 1969. Indeed, Congress is meeting this time under heavy pressure to prove, to its own satisfaction if not for the nation as a whole, that it can exercise the power accorded to it under the Constitution.

The unexpected turn in the Vietnam truce negotiations makes it a certainty that anti-war voices in Congress will quickly seek to steer the new session toward a challenge of the President's powers as commander in chief. Unfortunately, the most interested spectators of this debate will probably be the Communists in Hanoi, who face the grim prospect of sitting down at the bargaining table with a nation that has exhibited that it will not accept peace at any

While the war may provide the most emotional issue for a contest of power between Congress and the presidency, the more substantive one involves federal spending. Congressional hackles have been raised by Mr. Nixon's veto of appropriation bills and impounding of appropriated funds in his efforts to keep the federal budget within limits considered noninflationary.

Computer Data Bank On Pupils

University of Arkanasa' Medical School in Little Rock contains information on more than 350,000 children, about 85 per cent of the pupils from raigrant families.

The project is designed to make it easier for school officials to place children who move from state to state in the proper grade. Taxpayers finance it through Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act scheduled for reenactment during the 93rd

No further congressional action is required, however, to put data about the rest of the nation's 53 million public school children on computer.

Federal and state officials have all the authority they need now. California state Superintendent Wilson Riles, the armed forces, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Puerto Rico are considering installation of a computerized pupil information system because the nation's population has become so mobile and children change schools frequently.

But U. S. Sen. Sam Ervin, D-N.C., chairman of the Senate subcommittee on constitutional rights, who has been holding hearings on government attempts to censor the press, is making a major study of the use of data banks by the federal government. He is concerned about "the possible misuse" of current and planned pupil information systems.

Changing World

Is Japan On Nuclear Road?

Most Asian nations, and some far removed from Asia, always have dreaded the prospect of a Japan with nuclear was capability. They never have been satisfied with what Japan for all the years since Hiroshima has pledged as a "no

Now, what otherwise might ordinarily have caused a very minor stir is giving rise to the very fears raised many times in Korea, the Republic of China on Taiwan, the Philippines, Thailand and other nations that felt the heavy hand of Japanese conquest and occupation in World War II. It all concerns the matter of nuclear missiles and nuclear launching facilities being turned over by the Americans to the Japanese on Okinawa.

The Japanese Defense Agency (the Tokyo government seeks to play down its military buildup by making the defense establishment a sub-Cabinet organization) has announced it will not de-nuclearize the launchers and other ground equipment involved in the missile system it is buying from the United States on Okinawa for about \$25.5 million.

The missiles will have their atomic warheads replaced. As critics even in Japan have noted, this contradicts a Tokyo government statement made in the Diet in 1967 that not only missiles themselves but also ground equipment would be remodeled for non-nuclear use. It also contradicts Japanese vows in the face of fierce internal and external demands that Japan stay clear of all involvement in nuclear

However, this move also vindicates many Americans who long have suspected that Japan in its urge to regain prewar prestige would go as far as it felt useful to show its muscle in Asia—both an economic and a military muscle. Already, the effectiveness of the economic muscle is

building a new reservoir of anti-Japanese feeling throughout Asia, and even in Europe and America. Kyodo, Japan's own widely respected news service, in a recent story distributed by Copley News Service, noted that there was an increasing ":igly Japanese" image spreading throughout Southeast Asia, particularly in Thailand, a nation that once had been Japan's best friend in that area of the

world. Kyodo warned that Japanese businessmen had best mend their ways if their economic "miracle" was to continue in that rich market. Now, the turn off the "no nuclear" road in Okinawa is increasing the bad image of Tokyo in Asia—and it is bound to cause new troubles for Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka, whose honeymoon with the Japanese people, its press and its

politicians has already come to a grinding halt. In Okinawa, 82 Nike missiles, 24 launchers with 144 Hawk missiles plus the entire equipment of four radar sites in Naha

and other areas of the island are involved. Japan will take over the air defense of Okinawa officially

Japan's Influence Trade, Not Arms

WASHINGTON (NEA) The substantial victory of Japanese Premier Tanaka's Liberal Democratic party in national elections gives him freedom to press ahead on his country's unique coursetoward real rank among the world's great powers with-

out a base of military strength. Tanaka's already announced plan to double Japan's defense spending by 1976 should not be misunderstood. Its purpose is to modernize and re-equip the nation's armed forces, not enlarge them. And it still would leave Japanese defense expenditures at only one per cent of gross national product, as compared with eight per cent for the

To put the matter in fullest perspective, Japan's armed forces, totaling some 260,000 men, give it a smaller military base than such secondary countries as Poland, Turkey, Pakistan and Egypt. What it is trying to do then, is achieve major diplomatic and political influence almost wholly on the basis of its status as the world's third greatest economic power. A year ago, this was widely viewed as a doubtful pros-

pect. The Japanese themselves had no great confidence in the idea, even as they voiced it. On my extended visit there in late 1971, I heard no clear suggestions as to how strictly economic power could be converted to political Yet the first signs are showing that the thing might just work. Japan's economic strength is not merely great-it

is well placed geographically. With a GNP equalling that

of all the rest of Asia combined, it is a magnet for China

and the lesser countries of that continent. Tokyo has become the natural core of this vast region. Peking is not bending toward an easing of relations with Japan out of sheer good will. If China is to assuage its fears of the Soviet Union, it needs major industrial advancement. Japan, bulging with manufactured goods, technical know-how, and capital, is the obvious source

Other lands in Asia see the same opportunity in dealing with Tokyo, but their capacity for balanced trading is understandably more limited. Here Japan properly perceives the need for expanding its aid program, which government officials freely acknowledge has grown too slowly in recent years.

Its 1975 goal in overseas economic assistance is the range of 4 billion to \$5 billion. The present level is around But-America's syldently flagging interest in providing

such aid offers Japan a widening prospect. And, again, the factor of proximity makes Japan the logical source for the developing nations of Asia. Nor should anyone imagine that Japan is confining itself to Asia as it attempts to make economic authority count heavily in the broader realms of diplomacy. Rus-

sia is interested in Japanese capital and technology. So are Australia, Latin America, Africa. Tokyo is still often criticized for maintaining too high tariff barriers on some goods. But in fact it has made much progress toward lowering many, and most significant is the point that it offers especially favorable trading terms to developing nations in Asia and beyond. For instance, though a leading textile exporter itself, it allows Taiwan, South Korea and others to sell textiles at

iounting pace in Japan. Close Japan-watchers find Tokyo's tracks everywhere. Mostly they still bear the sign of the yen. But they are beginning to merge into broad avenues that may take Japan into the highest councils of world power. No nation has ever made it this way before.





Congress Has Rare Opportunity Session

The 93rd Congress convened in Washington recently, confronted with so many issues familiar from previous sessions that the overriding question may be whether Congress itself can surmount the hurdles of politics and its own ponderous machinery to fulfill its

Congressional Quarterly has catalogued no less than 116 noteworthy issues facing the new Congress, and observes that the major ones have not changed much since President Nixon first took office in 1969. Indeed, Congress is meeting this time under heavy pressure to prove, to its own satisfaction if not for the nation as a whole, that it can exercise the power accorded to it under the Constitution.

The unexpected turn in the Vietnam truce negotiations makes it a certainty that anti-war voices in Congress will quickly seek to steer the new session toward a challenge of the President's powers as commander in chief. Unfortunately, the most interested spectators of this debate will probably be the Communists in Hanoi, who face the grim prospect of sitting down at the bargaining table with a nation that has exhibited that it will not accept peace at any

While the war may provide the most emotional issue for a contest of power between Congress and the presidency, the more substantive one involves federal spending. Congressional hackles have been raised by Mr. Nixon's veto of appropriation bills and impounding of appropriated funds in his efforts to keep the federal budget within limits considered noninflationary.

The fact is that the President's hand on the budget has become the only responsible one. This is in no sense a cree to the executive usurping the power of Congress, but a case of

Changing World

Is Japan On Nuclear Road?

Most Asian nations, and some far removed from Asia, always have dreaded the prospect of a Japan with nuclear was capability. They never have been satisfied with what Japan for all the years since Hiroshima has pledged as a "no

Now, what otherwise might ordinarily have caused a very minor stir is giving rise to the very fears raised many times in Korea, the Republic of China on Taiwan, the Philippines, Thailand and other nations that felt the heavy hand of Japanese conquest and occupation in World War II. It all concerns the matter of nuclear missiles and nuclear launching facilities being turned over by the Americans to the Japanese on Okinawa.

The Japanese Defense Agency (the Tokyo government seeks to play down its military buildup by making the defense establishment a sub-Cabinet organization) has announced it will not de-nuclearize the launchers and other ground equipment involved in the missile system it is buying from the United States on Okinawa for about \$23.5 million. The missiles will have their atomic warheads replaced.

As critics even in Japan have noted, this contradicts a Tokyo government statement made in the Diet in 1967 that not only missiles themselves but also ground equipment would be remodeled for non-nuclear use. It also contradicts Japanese vows in the face of fierce internal and external demands that Japan stay clear of all involvement in nuclear warfare.

However, this move also vindicates many Americans who long have suspected that Japan in its urge to regain prewar prestige would go as far as it felt useful to show its muscle in Asia-both an economic and a military muscle. Already, the effectiveness of the economic muscle is building a new reservoir of anti-Japanese feeling throughout

Kyodo, Japan's own widely respected news service, in a recent story distributed by Copley News Service, noted that there was an increasing "ugly Japanese" image spreading throughout Southeast Asia, particularly in Thailand, a nation that once had been Japan's best friend in that area of the world. Kyodo warned that Japanese businessmen had best mend their ways if their economic "miracle" was to continue in that rich market. Now, the turn off the "no nuclear" road in Okinawa is

Japan's Influence Trade, Not Arms

WASHINGTON (NEA) The substantial victory of Japanese Premier Tanaka's Liberal Democratic party in national elections gives him freedom to press ahead on his country's unique course-



### Judicial Reforms Sought By League

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The 4,000-member Florida League of Women Voters has asked the 1973 Legislature to strip grand juries of their power to indict, to create a state sentencing board and to permit 18-year-olds to serve on

In a statement summarizing proposals made last week at a board of directors meeting in Gainesville, League President Mrs. Grant Staton of Orlando said the judicial recommendations resulted from a two-year study of Florida courts. "The League of Women Voters believes that the

administration of justice in Florida courts would be improved by substantial changes in laws and procedures regarding juries and sentencing," said

The league said the power of state grand juries should be curtailed.

"Indictments should be issued by the committing magistrate, but the investigative powers of the grand jury should be retained," said Mrs. Staton. If such a law couldn't be enacted, said the league, then all recorded testimony that went into the issuance of an indictment should be made available to both the prosecution and the defense.

Grand jury sessions and testimony are secret under current Florida law.

"The league supports delegation of authority for reviewing sentences to a state sentencing board in order to guarantee equal application of the law throughout the state," said the league statement. It also proposed that a "school for sentencing" be

In addition to allowing 18-20 year olds on juries, "fewer professional people should be excused and those who cannot serve because of temporary inconvenience should be assigned at a later date.
