## Allied Control Plans \$1.5 Million Plant Here

### 200 Start On Payroll

Construction of a \$1.5 million facility west of Sanford is planned by the Allied Control Company, of New York. It was announced formally last night. (The Sanford Herald yesterday reprinted a news article from the Meriden (Conn.) Journal hinting that Allied Control was considering moving its valve division from that city to Sanford.)

James S. Anderson, president of the firm, revealed that the new 75,000 square foot building will be constructed on an site which is now owned by Sanford City Commissioner Earl Higginbotham. The plant will employ about 200 persons to start, with building construction scheduled to start about Dec. 1 - to be completed by April 1.

Paul S. Polgar, who continued his residence here after retiring from the Navy at Sanford Naval Air Station, has been named manager of the Orlando office of Wand Labs, of Atlanta, manufacturer of electronic systems.

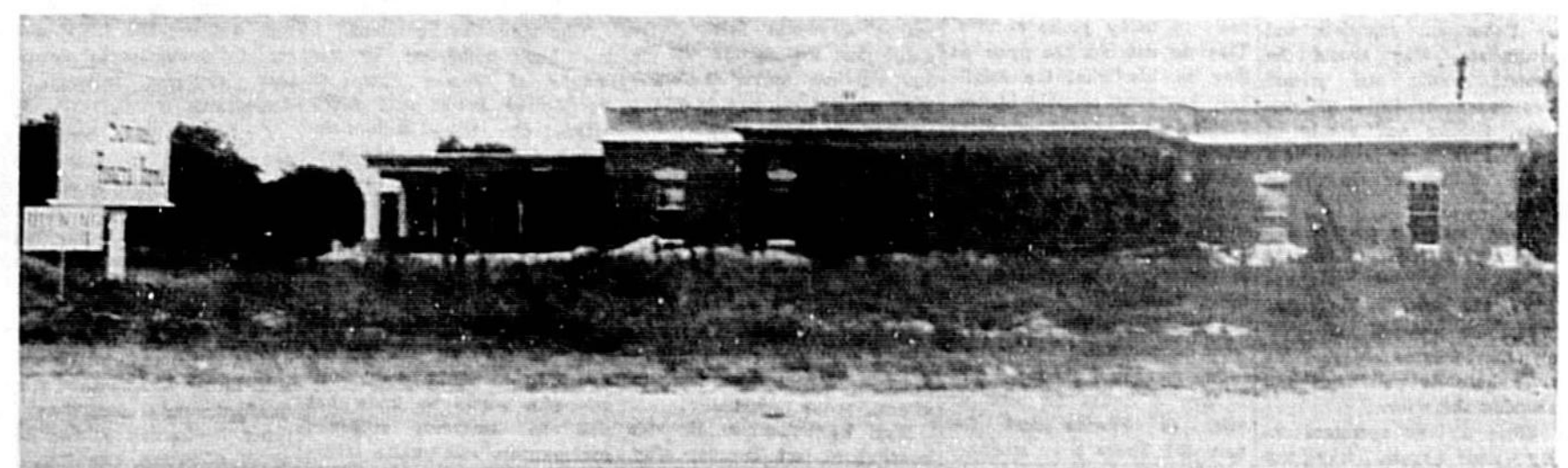

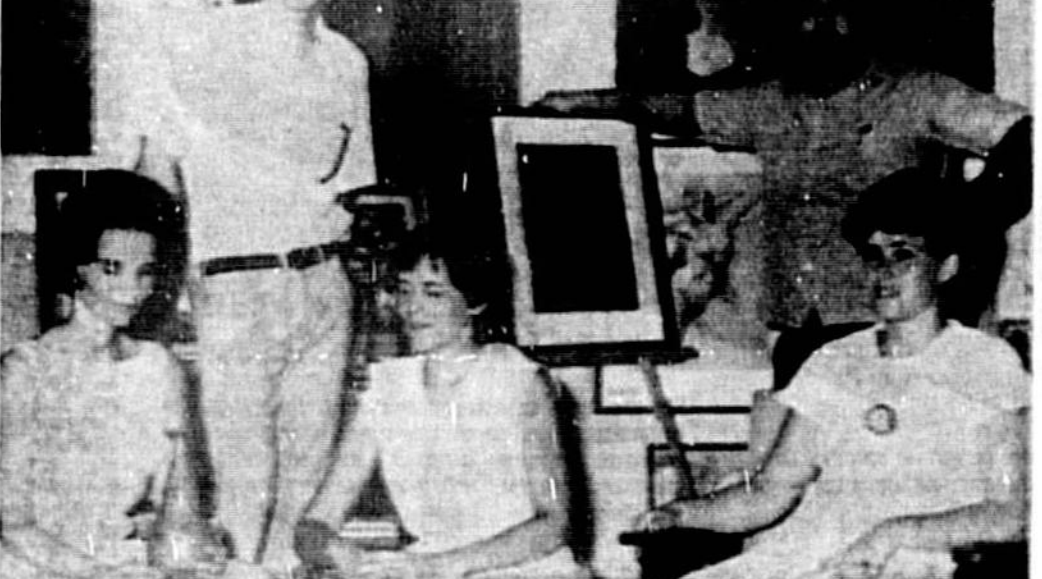

# Fortas Refuses Senators' Invite

WASHINGTON (AP) — Justice Abe Fortas of the Supreme Court refused today to appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee for further testimony on his nomination to be chief justice of the United States. Fortas declined "respectfully" the committee's invitation in a two-paragraph letter addressed to the chairman, Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss. The letter was delivered to Eastland's office this morning by Walter H. Sweeney, Fortas' law clerk for the new court term that begins next month. It was then distributed to reporters at the Supreme Court.

# Allies Meet Strong Foe; Kill 217

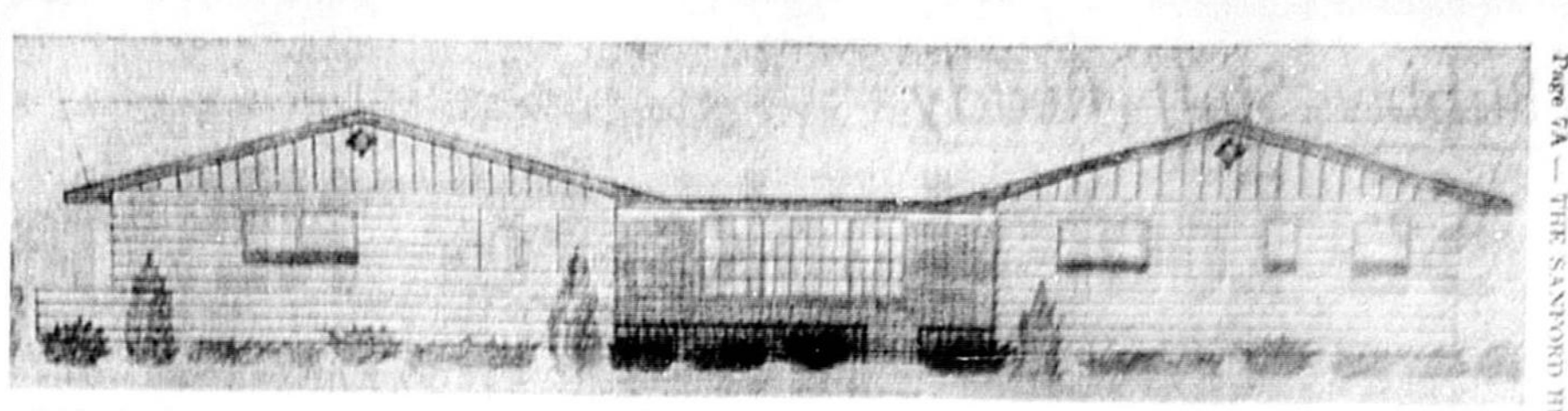

The bubbly stuff is ready and it looks like the St. Louis Cardinals will taste it before the Detroit Tigers do.  
Champagne the traditional celebration liquid for pennant winners, will be on ice in the St. Louis dressing room at Houston this weekend as the Cards close in on their second consecutive National League pennant.  
The magic number is four and with a little co-operation from Cincinnati, the Cards could wrap it up Saturday or Sunday. The Reds are in San Francisco

this weekend to play the second place Giants. Any combination of four Cardinals victories—St. Louis plays the ninth place Astros three times this weekend—or Giant losses sends the race. The American League Tigers will have to wait a little longer. Their magic number is seven after Washington, whipped second place Baltimore 4-1 in the only game played Thursday.  
Detroit is at home for three games and Oakland this weekend and then the streaking New York Yankees, who have won six straight, visit for three. Baltimore will have to wait for three games starting tonight and then the Orioles go to Boston for a three-game set.  
The earliest the Tigers can clinch is Monday and to do that they would need help from the

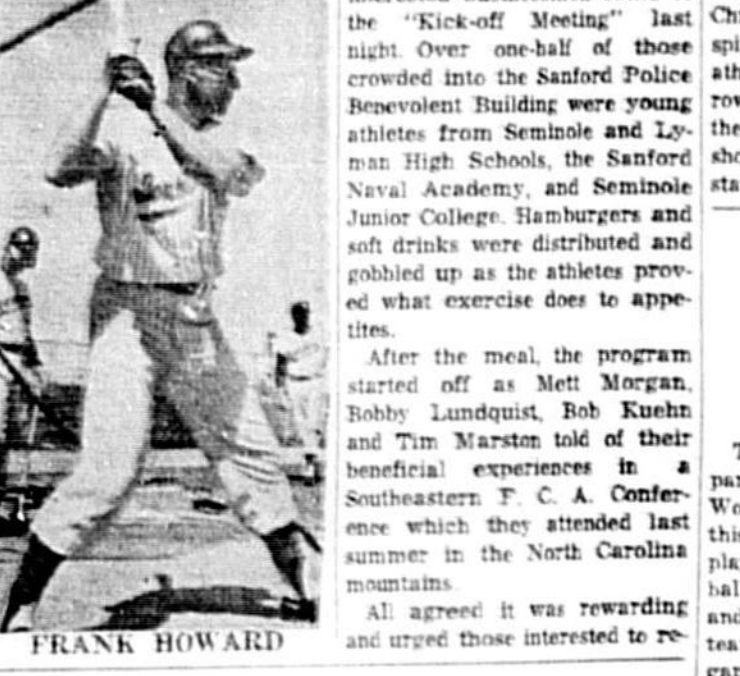
Indians and perhaps the Red Sox. They got plenty of help from Frank Howard against the Orioles Thursday.  
The big Washington slugger claimed his 41st and 42nd home runs of the year, driving in three runs and tagging Dave McNally with his first loss in more than two months.  
McNally, 26, had won 12 straight since the All-Star break. Howard's first home run tied the game at 1-1 in the fourth and his second shot gave the Senators a two-run bulge in the seventh.  
The Tigers send Earl Wilson, 12-12, against the A's tonight with Oakland coming with the series.  
In other American League games tonight, Minnesota is at Boston, Baltimore at Cleveland,

California at Chicago, and New York at Washington for a two-night doubleheader.

Elsewhere it will be Pittsburgh at New York, Atlanta at Los Angeles, Cincinnati at San Francisco and Chicago at Philadelphia for a two-night doubleheader.

Ellis, 28, has won 28 and lost five fights. Patterson, 31, has won 10 and lost six and drawn one.



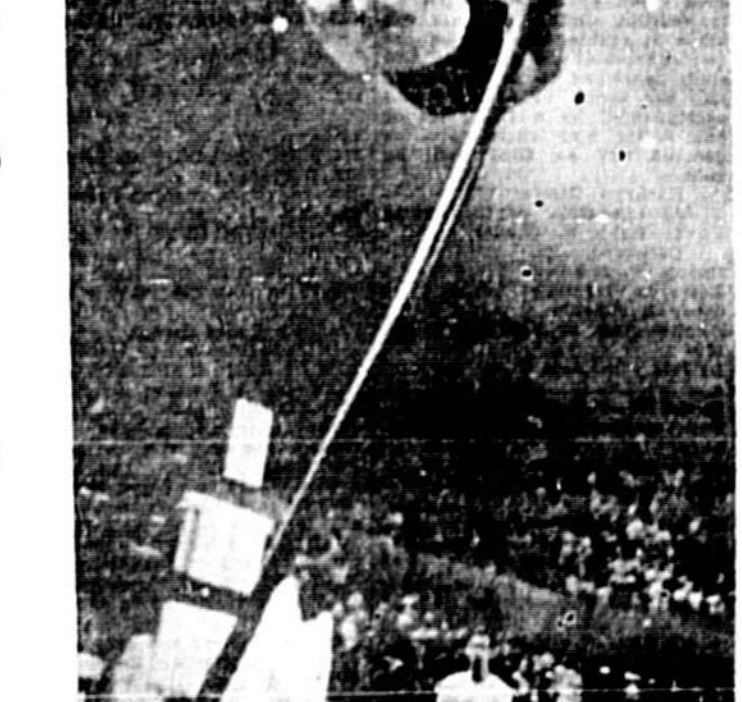

West's two no-trump call was one of the modern gag called "the unusual no-trump." It has nothing to do with no-trump but shows a minor two-suit hand.

Both Montreal and Minneapolis used this convention in their match and it worked very well for Minneapolis on the hand in the box. South won via playing four hearts.

The bidding shows how Ron DeHartman and Newt Decker of Minneapolis countered this unusual no-trump. Ron's bid of three diamonds said, "Partner, I am making a cue bid to show a good hand with heart support." The fact that he did hold the ace of diamonds was incidental.

Ron's later bid of five diamonds showed this ace and Newt's six-club bid was a belated grand slam invitation. Ron did not accept because he

West showed out and Ron saw problems. He could not afford to draw trumps because he would have no entry to dump my except the spade. He solved his problem by deciding that West's unusual no-trump must have been based on at least minor suit cards. This he cashed dummy's ace and east played low but that did him no good. Next discarded the one of clubs. Then he played dummy's second diamond. Later he ruffed his last diamond with the queen of trumps and made the slam.
