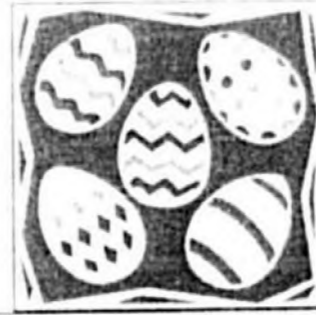

Focus: Tobacco-free kids

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The statistics are staggering. Annual tobacco-related deaths exceed all deaths associated with drug abuse, drunk driving, homicide, suicide, fires and AIDS. One in five Floridians die from tobacco use, according to the Florida Department of Health.

These statistics represent billions of dollars in medical costs.

They also represent real people. People who did not have to die prematurely.

The Tobacco-Free Partnership of Seminole County is working to lower the statistics and to save lives. The Partnership in conjunction with the Governor's Kids Campaign Against Tobacco will focus first on young people. In the future, the Partnership will address the issue of smoking cessation programs.

"We want Seminole County to be

a model tobacco initiative," explains Michael Mobley, Tobacco Prevention coordinator for the Seminole County Health Department.

Throughout Mobley's career, he has talked with young people. More importantly, he has listened to them. When asked, young people most often say they feel manipulated by the Tobacco Industry, according to Mobley. The youth feel targeted by tobacco advertising campaigns.

Mobley's vision for the Partnership is to involve youth in the planning of prevention and intervention programs for youth. The message, stresses Mobley, needs to be from youth to youth. He would like to see one half of the Partnership be youth with a voice in decision making. Young people helping to decide what it will take to positively impact other young people.

New contract awarded airport Director Cooke

SANFORD - Orlando Sanford Airport Director of Aviation Steve Cooke will keep his job. The Sanford Airport Authority voted Tuesday to give him a new contract.

Cooke said this morning he was very delighted that the board saw fit to continue his contract. "It will be a much lengthier contract than I've had in the past," he said. "So I'll be waiting to find out all the details. Basically they told me to get with Authority Attorney Steve Coover and work out the details."

The vote on Cooke's contract was 6 to 2. Members Bill Miller and Ben Wright voted against it. The other six voted in favor. One member, Robbie Robertson, was not on hand at the meeting, but Cooke said he believes Robert

Hampton quits Oviedo council

OVIEDO - Oviedo City Council member Phil Hampton has quit the city commission. Hampton resigned his position to take a job with one of Oviedo's consulting firms. This is the second time Hampton has left his seat to pursue other interests.

In 1996, Hampton left his position to run against Tom Feeney for state legislation but lost. Now, Hampton, an independent land surveyor, will become the director of public and government relations for Conklin Porter & Holmes Engineers Inc., a Sanford-based firm. Hampton had to give up his seat because his new job conflicts with it, according to Florida Commission on Ethics staff.

The city is presently accepting applications to fill Hampton's spot. Applications must be in by April 24. The council will appoint the position by May 4. This member will serve the commission until the fall elections. Those who wish to apply must contact the City Clerk, and the seat pays about \$300 a month.

Hampton made his announcement Monday night at the first meeting for the month of April. It came on the heels of a long, heated debate about the Live Oaks Reserve project, over which the developers and area citizens are in conflict. With Hampton's absence, the new project could face a tougher battle since it will need three of the remaining four council members to pass.

Juvenile crime still a major problem

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Violent crimes are reportedly diminishing in Seminole County, but juvenile crime is still a matter of serious concern locally as well as statewide.

"We have been realigning our resources to address the issue of juvenile crime as much as possible," said Sheriff Don Estinger. Regarding the overall crime figures he added, "I don't know where the county stands in regard to the state average yet, the FDLE hasn't sent us the final figures for last year, but locally, I tend to believe that violent crime seems to be dropping, especially in the unincorporated areas of Seminole County."

The juvenile crime situation however, is giving the sheriff serious concerns. "Working on reducing juvenile crime is what I consider an investment in our future," he said. "The way we look at it, the 800-plus adult inmates in our jail right now, didn't suddenly decide they would become involved in crime when they reached adult age. They had this inbred early in life, and that's what we are trying to deal with."

On the statewide level, the annual "Crime in Florida" report released this week by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement indicates that crime in Florida is continuing a relative decline. In 1997 the overall crime rate dropped by only 2.6 percent compared to 1996.

This slight decline marks the sixth year in a row Florida has experienced a drop in the standard crime rate. In addition, the violent crime rate also fell by approximately 2.4 percent making a decrease in this category for the past five years. Please See Crime, Page 3A.

Nostalgia bound non-revenue producing white elephant? Tax base windfall waiting to happen? Bold statement of values that says the citizens of Sanford are more important than commerce? Beautiful place where all of Sanford's citizens can gather with each other? What's your feeling about Fort Mellon Park and the pending development thereof?

On January 5, 1998, Mayor Larry Dale signed an agreement with PRA Development and Management that states, in part:

"The CITY concludes that the development of lakefront property as a hotel/convention center would serve a valid public purpose and therefore hereby agrees that it will allow PRA a period of one (1) year from the date of this Agreement to perform certain preliminary development tasks on the above-described real property. During this one (1) year period, the CITY agrees that it will deal exclusively with PRA in considering the potential development of the above-described real property as a hotel/convention center."

PRA hereby agrees that in the one (1) year period from the date of this Agreement, it will perform the following tasks adhering to the schedule set forth as closely as possible...

- a. Feasibility Study and Appraisal, 3 months
- b. Conceptual Design Phase, 6 months
- c. Development approvals, including all applicable site plan review and permits, 9 months
- d. Long Term Lease Agreement with CITY, i.e., 99 year lease, 12 months
- e. Securing suitable financing, construction to commence in stages after financing is obtained... 18 months.

This is the document the *Herald* reported as "an agreement to conduct a feasibility study." This is the agreement The Mayor and two Commissioners have described in two "town meetings" as "very innocuous," "not really obligating anyone to anything," and "just an exclusive to investigate possibilities." True, later in the document there is what one attorney described to me as "a squirrel clause" which states, "This agreement is not intended to obligate the CITY to any particular course of action with PRA or this project... It is understood that the project is ultimately subject to ap-

proval, modification or disapproval without limitation by the City Commission."

Both attorneys with whom I've reviewed the document have independently opined that this clause is "pretty standard" in preliminary agreement and "the intent of the document clearly is to proceed with full development." There is no language in this document that stipulates that any portion of Ft. Mellon Park will remain as park land, nothing which precludes the developer from building on every square foot of land between NTM and the Civic Center, First Street and Lake Monroe.

Do you believe Mayor Dale and the Commissioners have been completely forthcoming with the citizens about what is and is not in this agreement?

Though it has been mentioned a few times in the past, does anyone believe it is coincidence (or divine intervention) that the current City Hall location has suddenly been offered for sale to Seminole County just as it was being raised by a number of citizens as a viable alternate location for a hotel/conference center? This location would have enabled Ft. Mellon Park's preservation and, in many aspects is a much better location for a hotel/conference center.

The die clearly has been cast, but has not yet come completely to rest. This freight train, engineered by the Mayor, can still be derailed. The current zoning on Ft. Mellon Park must be changed before a hotel or multi-family dwellings can be built there. The City Commission still has the ability to change or stop this madness.

As a longtime developer Mayor Dale sees the world

through a developer's eyes. Here is a chance to create something that will draw people to Sanford, that will immediately inject significant funds into the tax base and develop undeveloped land. Could it also be, just perhaps, a way to provide very profitable long-term work for some of the twenty-four development/contractor related contributors who provided some \$7,900 to the Mayor's campaign fund?

As a citizen I am fully supportive of locating a hotel/conference center in Sanford and totally against placing it in Fort Mellon Park. Why? Because having the most valuable/dearable real estate in town dedicated to the people is a value statement I believe is important. Because going to a strictly neighborhood park system will bring de facto segregation of recreation and park facilities, which I believe is absolutely wrong. Because other cities have managed to attract desirable development and preserve their waterfront parks. And, simply because Ft. Mellon Park should be preserved as a historic site, a throwback to times when preserving open spaces meant more than hermetically sealing them in concrete. They paved paradise and put up a parking lot."

Every citizen should have an opinion on this proposed development and, every citizen should make her or his views known. On Thursday, April 9, a third town meeting will be held at 7 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce. Whether you support this proposal or are against it, please come and participate in the democratic process. Questions will be raised, and hopefully answered, about the status of this agreement, the rezoning process, continuation of citizen petitions for a referendum, proposed traffic rerouting, and potential legal action.

at 3 p.m. at the Seminole County Health Department located at 400 W. Airport Blvd., Sanford. Youth, community leaders, and individuals from organizations serving youth are encouraged to attend the meeting. The Partnership will work to develop local strategies for implementing tobacco prevention and intervention programs for youth and promoting a healthy community through a tobacco-free environment.

Prior to October, 1997, in the State of Florida it was only against the law to give or sell tobacco products to any one under the age of 18. Changes to the law now make it illegal for any one under the age of 18 to purchase or possess, or misrepresent their age to obtain tobacco products.

A minor can receive 16 hours of community service or a \$25 fine and be required to attend a school approved anti-smoking program for a first violation. A second violation within 12 weeks is a \$25 fine. For a third

violation within 12 weeks, the court will withhold issuance or suspend the minor's driving privileges.

The law authorizes counties and municipalities to train special Tobacco Enforcement Officers who, in addition to law enforcement officers, will have the authority to enforce the new prohibition against minors. This provision would allow school administrators and others who work with youth to be certified to enforce the new law making it more effective.

When the how versus the why people die is examined, unhealthy behaviors are the contributing factor in 50 percent of premature deaths. Tobacco products are the leading lifestyle factor in these deaths.

Similar to Sheriff Ealinger's concern for the local area however, juvenile crime continues to be a concern across the state. The number of juveniles arrested for murder, sex offenses, drugs and robbery all rose in 1997.

In the overall category of violent crimes, murders are down 5.8 percent from 1996. This represents 6.9 murders per 100,000 population. This is the lowest murder rate recorded for the state since 1933. However, forcible sex offenses rose by over 2 percent.

"While we can be somewhat encouraged by these latest numbers, we must all be aware that our state is constantly facing the challenge of far too many violent criminals and teen offenders," said FDLE Commissioner Tim Moore.

He continued, "In addition, there is an explosion of a new generation of criminals who

are sophisticated in using computer technology and complex fraud scams to victimize our citizens, businesses and the state. We must remain vigilant in our efforts by prioritizing public safety issues in Florida."

In the area of domestic violence, the number of incidents and arrests are up this year. This may indicate that victims are more willing to report abuse to law enforcement. In 1997, domestic violence arrests rose 4.3 percent in Florida and reported domestic violence offenses increased by 2.7 percent. In fact, nearly 41 percent of certain offenses including murder, rape and assault were domestic violence related.

This year's report contains statistics from 377 of Florida's 394 local law enforcement agencies. Of the 17 that did not report, their combined populations represent less than one percent of the total population.

son would have voted in favor of his continuing.

Cooke had been operating on a one-year contract, which would have expired on Sept. 30 of this year. There had been indications during previous Authority meetings that the contract would not be renewed.

Cooke said several weeks ago that he was uncertain why there was an effort to have him removed. "What I didn't like," he said, "was that they didn't make it clear regarding what I might have been doing that they thought was wrong." Cooke added that this past year was the best year so far in the history of the airport.

Now, because a new contract is to be drawn up, it appears Cooke will remain at his post. The length of the contract

however, as well as Cooke's salary for the new time period, remains to be determined. Aviation Authority members have indicated they would vote on those points at a subsequent meeting, possibly in May.

The Sanford Airport Authority was created by Florida Statute in 1971, to provide for the operation, management and development of the airport. Members of the Authority are selected by the Sanford City Commission.

While the city reviews and approves the airport's annual budget and appoints the Authority members, it is the authority which is responsible for the hiring of the airport director.

Authority Chairman Sandra Olen and Sanford Mayor Larry Dale were unavailable for comment this morning.

Tragedies, love of baseball motivate Diemer

SANFORD - Andrew Diemer never had a chance.

He was born prematurely, didn't have a chance when he was born, and certainly didn't have a chance to pitch at Seminole High this year. That was the last thing on his mind.

Diemer has never had it easy; somehow he's turned a lifelong series of tragedies into a success story that has him preparing for college - probably Seminole Community College - where he hopes to walk on to the baseball team.

The whole story starts when a one-pound, eight-ounce kid was born about 18 years ago, three months premature.

There was a stroke that caused a blockage in baby Andrew.

"It's made me stronger," Diemer said. "I've had to get stronger but it has made me strive to be a better athlete, but even more importantly, a better person."

Diemer struggled at times. He's a left-handed pitcher for the Seminole High baseball team who got his first start last Friday, pitching three innings in a win over Pine Ridge. He is part of the county's deepest rotation which includes Chaz Lytle, Lance Odom and several relievers who can take over at any time.

It has been a long, arduous journey for Diemer, who doctors said shouldn't have made it past birth.

Now, he's a 3.6 grade-point average student who is ready to take his next step in a life that almost never began.

"I'm proud of what I've accomplished," Diemer said. "Doctors said I'd never be able to walk or even make it through the first few days."

He started playing recreation baseball and said there were coaches who looked at him as a project who required help, but he said the coaches always gave him a chance.

Sometimes his teammates had questions, but Diemer always survived them.

"With kids, you can always tell by their body language and the way they look at you," Diemer said. "I realized that's just the way things are."

Diemer, as a result of the stroke, still

Treat yourself to poached monk fish

Poached Monk Fish in Citrus and Wine

Every once in a while you find yourself walking the store aisles when some item jumps up and says "take me". It may be a little over the budget, but you have to treat yourself sometimes. The cost of seafood has sky rocketed over the years so unless you fish yourself, the cost can be higher than good steak. This recipe works well on all types of fish. I just happen to enjoy monk fish when I can find a good fresh piece. When we serve this particular recipe we use a cold pasta salad with basil vinaigrette as the side dish. In this way the light flavor of the fish is not over-powered by the side dish. I also enjoy a dark bread and dry white wine with this entree.

Ingredients:
Approx. 2 lb. monk fish filets
1/4 cup chopped chives
1/4 cup dry white wine
4 TB. orange juice
Juice and seed of 1 small lemon
1/2 tsp. tarragon
Dash of white pepper
2 TB. seasoned bread crumbs (corn meal grit size)
Prograsso Italian style bread crumbs work well or make your own with one slice of dry bread and 1/4 tsp. of Italian seasoning crushed fine.
Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Wash filets with cold water and pat dry with paper towel. Place filets in one layer in a baking dish. Mix together chives, wine, juices, and pepper and pour over the filets. Sprinkle top of filets with tar-



ragon and cover pan with foil. Bake in preheated oven for 7 minutes.

Please Note: The times given are based on the 2/4 inch thick monk fish filets I am cooking. The thinner the fish, the less time you will need.

Remove the foil cover and sprinkle the filets with the bread crumbs. Turn your oven to high broil setting and return pan to the oven on the center shelf. Broil the filets for approximately 3 to 4 minutes until bread crumbs are just lightly golden. The filets should be easily separated with a fork. Keep a close eye on this step so you do not over cook the fish.

For the pasta salad use 2 cups of rotini noodles, cooked and chilled. Mix 1 tsp. dry basil, 2 TB. olive oil, 2 tsp. red wine vinegar, 1/2 tsp. balsamic

vinegar, and a pinch of salt and fresh ground pepper to taste. Lightly toss vinaigrette into the noodles and keep chilled until you serve.

When ready, remove fish from pan. Cut into 2 inch slices and place on plate in a fan like pattern. Spoon a little juice from the pan over the slices, around a scoop of pasta salad. Sprinkle the top with fresh chopped parsley, sit back and enjoy.

Whole fish should have clear eyes and no dry spots on the meat.

Well, I must admit I am a carnivore by choice, however, I have enjoyed many fine vege-

tarian meals. I will try to feature a vegetarian meal in the near future. To hold you over until then, here is a recipe from Napu Valley, Calif. that you might enjoy.

Grilled Stuffed Eggplant
Slice eggplant lengthwise into 1/4 inch thick pieces, coat with olive oil and grill on a hot BBQ or sauté in a hot pan for 1 minute on each side. Sauté fine chopped onions, garlic, green peppers and mushrooms until onions are just starting to become translucent. Blanch or fast steam fresh spinach.

On each slice of eggplant, place a thin layer of spinach leaves, then coat with sautéed veggies approximately 1/4 inch thick. Drizzle dry red wine over each slice and roll up into a cannelloni like shape.

Lightly coat a casserole dish with olive oil and place rolls in one layer into pan. Pour your favorite tomato sauce or pesto over the center of each roll. Bake at 350 degrees covered until sauce starts to bubble about 20 minutes. If fits your taste, sprinkle with fresh parmesan and organo and serve with pasta, bread, fine red wine and candlelight.

Luscious cake brings eggs to Easter dinner

Ever wondered why we hunt for chocolate eggs (laid by a rabbit) on Easter? More importantly, ever wondered how to incorporate those Easter eggs into your holiday meal without a chocolate overdose? So has Zella Junkin, the director of consumer affairs for Wilton Enterprises, the nation's leading supplier of cake and confectionery supplies.

4 eggs
2 cups light sour cream
1/2 cup milk
2 tbs. lemon juice
1 tsp. vanilla extract
4 cups all-purpose flour
2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup poppyseeds
2 tbs. lemon zest

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray pans with vegetable spray. In mixing bowl cream cutter with sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time. Add sour cream, lemon juice and vanilla extract; mix. Mix in flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, poppyseeds and lemon zest. Mix just until flour is combined. Pour into prepared pans. Bake 30-35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in middle comes out clean. Cool 5 minutes on rack. Turn cakes out on cooling racks; cool completely before icing and decorating. Frost with Cream Cheese Icing below. Makes 20-24 servings.

Cream Cheese Icing
1 cup (2 sticks) butter
16 oz. cream cheese, softened
2 lb. (8 cups) confectioners sugar
2 tbs. milk

Note: Do not use light cream cheese or butter substitute. If margarine is used, icing will be softer.

In a medium mixer bowl

cream butter and cream cheese together until smooth. Add sugar and milk. Beat on high until smooth (only 30 seconds to 1 minute). Thin to ice cake smooth; use full strength for piping borders.

Makes 5-1/2 cups.

To decorate Easter Cake you will need:
Leaf Green paste food color
1 pkg. Icing decorations Mini Eggs and Bunnies or Easter candies
1/2 cup chocolate eggs or jelly beans
Tip #233 (to make grass)
Tip #4 (round tip)
2 disposable or other decorating bags
1 recipe Cream Cheese Icing
2 layer poppyseed cake.
Reserve one cup icing, tint

green. Fill and ice two layer Poppyseed cake with remaining icing. With toothpick mark circle for nest and lightly mark lines for Happy Easter. With tip #4 follow lines for message. With tip #233 fill in bottom of nest build up sides with additional icing and tip #233. Place eggs or jelly beans in nest on top of cake. With tip #233 add grass for top border. Place bunnies around bottom edge of cake and decorate with grass tip around candy bunnies.

To make grass, hold bag with #233 tip straight up with tip almost touching the surface. Squeeze icing, ease off pressure and pull up to make grass. Practice a few times on a cookie sheet. You can scrape the icing back into the bag.

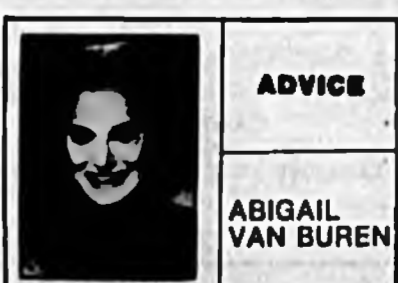
Son's live-in not family

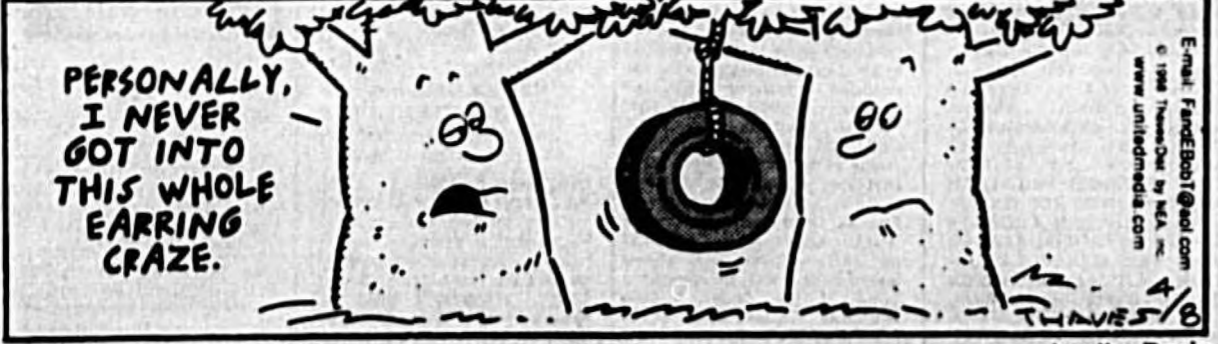

Thyroid hormone therapy can help

DEAR DR. GOTT: Blood tests have indicated that my thyroid gland is practically nonfunctioning. What are the risks if I do nothing about this?

DEAR READER: The risks are substantial.

The thyroid gland is one of the major organs that control metabolism: too much thyroid hormone speeds up metabolism, too little slows it down. You apparently have this latter condition, called hypothyroidism. The affliction causes lethargy, intolerance to cold, constipation, muscle cramping, loss of appetite, impaired intellect and motor skills, coarse skin and hair, and heart disease. If not treated, thyroid deficiency can progress to coma and death.

Fortunately, therapy is simple, cheap and universally successful: thyroid supplement pills. I urge you to follow your physician's advice with respect to treatment. If you don't, you will become very ill.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My granddaughter was recently diagnosed with "aporia asthma." I've never heard of this. She is a well-trained high-school athlete in perfect health. Is there treatment?

DEAR READER: Asthma is caused by hyperreactive airway disease, meaning that when the bronchial tubes constrict, not enough air can enter the lungs; wheezing, coughing and shortness of breath soon follow.

Many factors can cause bronchial constriction. The most common is infection. In some people, bronchitis leads to asthma. In others, pollen and other allergens trigger bronchial constriction. Finally, rapid breathing, especially in cold air, can sometimes initiate asthmatic spasms. Such a reaction may affect athletes, even world-class competitors.

Exercise-induced asthma, which can severely hamper athletic performance, has traditionally been treated with inhaled sprays to dilate the bronchial passages. Now sports experts are more commonly relying on a prescription spray (Serevent) that is used as a preventative, before exercise begins. The medicine is safe and, when used properly, usually stops an asthma attack from getting started. Ask your granddaughter's doctor about this.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What do you think about a mother and grandmother who put the baby's pacifier in their mouths before giving it to the baby?

DEAR READER: I don't think much about the practice, because it seems so off-the-wall. Although it's possible that the adults could spread infection to the baby in this manner, I doubt that this is a serious health consideration. Unless of course the mother or grandmother has an upper respiratory infection.

Sometimes grownups do strange things that they believe are appropriate for infants. This is such an instance, in my opinion. The whole ritual is sort of senseless.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is a "beer belly" and how can it be prevented?

DEAR READER: Beer drinkers are often overweight and frequently have

enlarged livers. Both these factors can cause the abdomen to pouch abnormally. Thus, the simplest answer to your second question is: "Don't drink beer."

However, the situation is not that simple. Men and women, as they age, tend to develop prominent abdomens. In part, this tendency is hereditary. But it is also a common pattern of fat distribution. Therefore, you don't have to be a beer drinker to get a beer belly; you just have to have the right genes — and the wrong diet.

Of course, the empty calories in alcohol-containing beverages markedly aggravate the situation.

Beer bellies are not common in adults who exercise regularly, maintain an ideal weight, avoid alcohol, and take pains to firm up their abdominal muscles by performing leg-lifts and sit-ups.

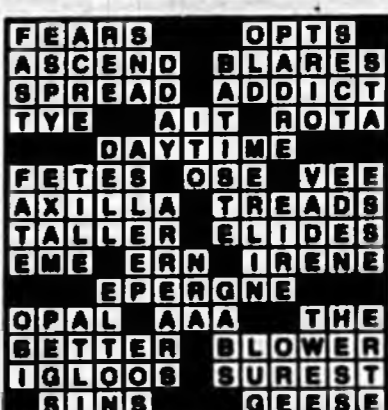

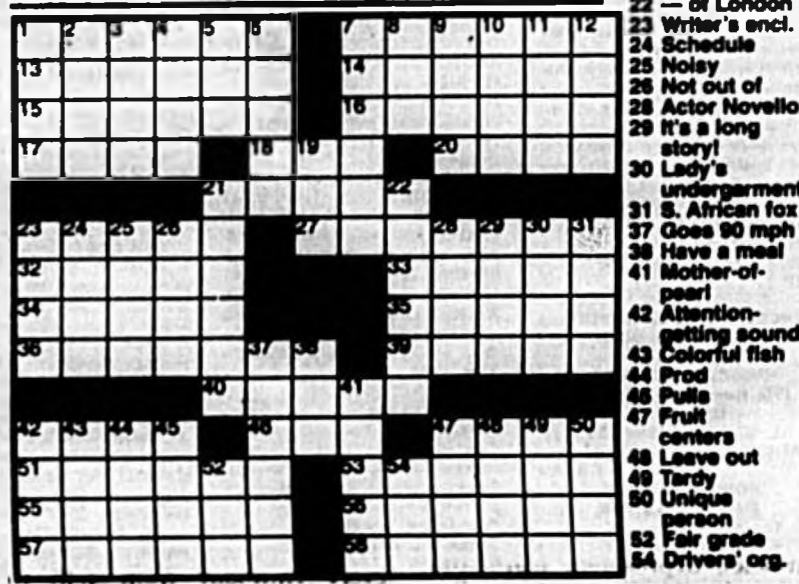

Another line lurking in the trees

By Phillip Alder

Teaching bridge is a lot of fun for me. Yet occasionally I set up a practice deal for a particular theme, only to realize, when it is being played by my students, that an alternative line works much better.

Today's deal is an example. Taking the club suit in isolation, what is the right play for only two losers? And how do you play in five diamonds given the full North and South hands?

The bidding is exciting. Despite only nine high-card points, East is right to overcall two spades. Opposite some diamond length, South bids the contract he thinks he can make. But West finds a good vulnerable sacrifice: Four spades doubled is only one down. Yet

South gives five diamonds a try. Taken on its own, the correct play in the club suit is low to the nine, then, assuming it loses to the jack or queen, low to the 10. This works whenever West has the jack or queen (or both). The alternative of low to the king works only when West has the ace. It is better to play West for one of two cards (the jack or queen) rather than one specific card (the ace).

However, with a no-club lead, the contract is laydown even if East started with the ace-queen-jack of clubs. South draws the missing trump using his ace or king, unblocks his top hearts, crosses to dummy's diamond queen, ruffs the last heart in hand, and plays off the spade ace. Having eliminated the majors, he leads a club to dummy's nine, displaying East. He must either return a club, which allows dummy's king to score, or concede a ruff-and-discard.
