Industrialists Set Picnic Saturday

Sanford Industrial Commission Director David F. Kelley has received 75 per cent of the questionnaires sent out by his office to area industrial firms requesting information on their plants.

Kelley stated the information is needed in the preparation of an industrial index now underway by his office.

The SIC director disclosed that 1,150 employees are listed in the partial returns from local employers.

On the subject of local industry, Kelley indicated that already 175 persons had indicated they would attend the special industry appreciation outing at the Sanford Airport's Lake Golden tomorrow at 4:30 p.m.

Kelley has invited local industrialists and plant managers along with their spouses to the recreational area as a climax to the present state week-long observance that ends Saturday.

On the subject of attracting industry to the local area, the SIC director disclosed that an official from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) is coming to Sanford to explain the latest information regarding the use of federal help in obtaining loans for the start of business firms.

As a means of influencing an industry with which the SIC has been working, Kelley said aerial photographs are being taken of potential industrial sites and again the director affirmed the need of bonds to help prospective industries get started.

The need of speculative buildings for industry was also mentioned by Kelley as a possible means to influence industrialists to come to Sanford.

Hometown Fetes Donna Lou Askew

Reubin Thanks Herald

Full confidence in a victory on Nov. 3 was imparted by Sen. Reubin Askew, Democratic nominee for governor, at a press conference here today at House of Steak. The hopeful was in Sanford to attend a coffee in honor of his wife, the former Donna Lou Harper, of Sanford, at the Civic Center.

"I have found encouragement throughout the state," said Askew, "and I want now and here to publicly express my appreciation to the Sanford Herald for its endorsement of my candidacy."

Askew said he had found "the Democratic Party united as never before throughout the State," in Dade County, Jacksonville, Ocala, Orlando, Daytona Beach, Tampa-St. Petersburg and Clearwater, Sarasota, West Palm Beach, Fort Lauderdale and the Panhandle.

The nominee pointed to support from the other three Democratic hopefuls, Attorney General Earl Fiereloft, Sen. John Mathews and Mayor Charles Hall, of Miami. He also he is also encouraged by the amount of support promised by Republicans and Independents.

"The Republicans and the Independents," he stated, "assure me they do not want (Claude) Kirk as governor again because of the divisiveness he has brought about in the Republican Party. They dislike his having dismissed (William) Cramer, the titular head of the GOP party, and for his support of (Gov. Nelson) Rockefeller. They also believe he (Kirk) was totally unfair in his television attack on his opponent in the GOP primary, Jack Eckerd, by displaying a book and saying Eckerd was teaching our children to use marijuana."

Askew pledged to continue "working hard until one hour after the polls close in Central Florida because they still will be open one hour later in the Panhandle."

Promising that he will work with elected members representing Florida in Congress and in the State Legislature, Askew concluded: "I want to be Governor and I have a good workable program which will develop into a partnership with the people."

Courthouse Construction Started; Bond Sale OK'd

The death of D. Kirk Gunby, fiscal agent for Seminole County, last Saturday, has caused County Commissioners to be concerned that further delay may be experienced in construction of the new \$3.9 million courthouse. However, County Attorney Harold Johnson advised that Gunby's firm is not a "one man operation" and that he saw no cause for delay.

Notice was given to Greenhut Construction Company, of Pensacola, low bidder on the facility, to commence work following a decision by the Florida Supreme Court last week denying the petition for a rehearing on the bond interest rate. The company has moved in its equipment to the courthouse site fronting Sanford City Hall and adjoining the county jail on the south and Lake Monroe on the north.

The county has approved notice of the sale of the \$2.9 million bond issue this week. Commissioners approved the transfer of \$1,700 from the contingency fund to the attorney fee line on a request from Sheriff John Polk. The amount stems from the budget appeal of Polk in Tallahassee, which was subsequently returned in part. Johnson advised that the bill was not submitted by him, that he did not represent the sheriff.

ROAD COMPLAINTS

Commissioner Sid Vilhen Jr. told the board he had received a request from residents in the Paola area, who live in proximity to the Wakiva River and west SR 46 of a needed addition to the road shoulders from 14 to the county line. Vilhen said he appraised the situation and that the shoulders are pitted and dangerous. He continued that although the road is a "bad one" the county could at least insist upon proper construction. "The commission adopted a resolution requesting the Department of Transportation to give immediate attention to shoulder repair and

Altamonte Program Reviewed

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Mayor Lawrence Swofford is meeting with "a task force from Washington" today in Atlanta relative to reviewing the program for Altamonte's \$1.784,000 sewer system.

Due to the death last week of the municipality's fiscal agent, D. Kirk Gunby, City Council authorized the Mayor be accompanied by City Attorney S. J. Davis and Consulting Engineer Harold Radcliffe.

It was stated that the contract for a portion of the system which has been reserved for use by the City of Eatonville had been forwarded to that city's mayor, and that the agreement was in the hands of the attorney for the city. It was further stated that Public Works Supt. Don Bundy had spoken with officials of the Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and that they "were concerned that the agreement with Eatonville had not been executed, and that this "might hold up the project."

Mayor Swofford told the council that "Atlanta is concerned that Eatonville is asking for a 90 per cent grant to construct a system without a plant."

Water Content Study Slated

Although no explanation was given for King's absence at the meeting, County Attorney Harold Johnson stated that King had been in his office on Monday to ascertain certain legal aspects in the matter, and presumably this may have been the reason for King's non-appearance.

UNDER HOME RULE

Johnson is drafting the board that he is advising an ordinance, under home rule, for the board to consider on Nov. 10. The board, he said, is necessary because of his duties in conjunction with the Nov. 3 election.

The ordinance will give the county regulatory powers for drilling and operation of wells where the water is transmitted from Seminole County to areas outside the county.

Commissioner Greg Drummond had advised the Commission that Titusville had expressed plans to drill a test well 1,000 feet west of SR 46 and SR 424.

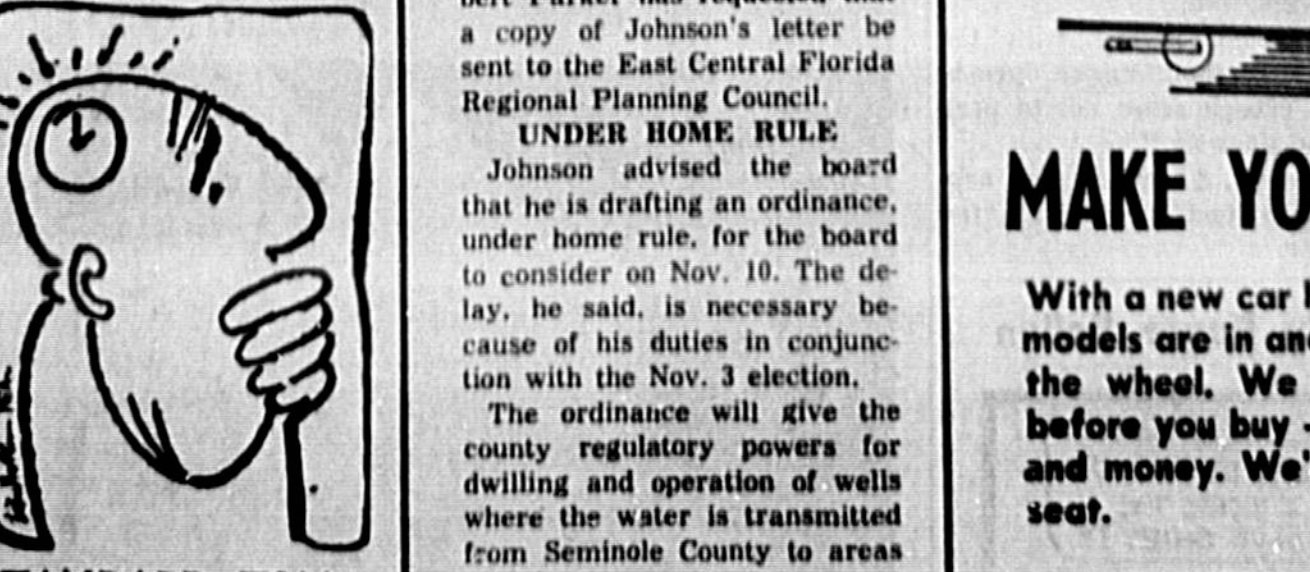

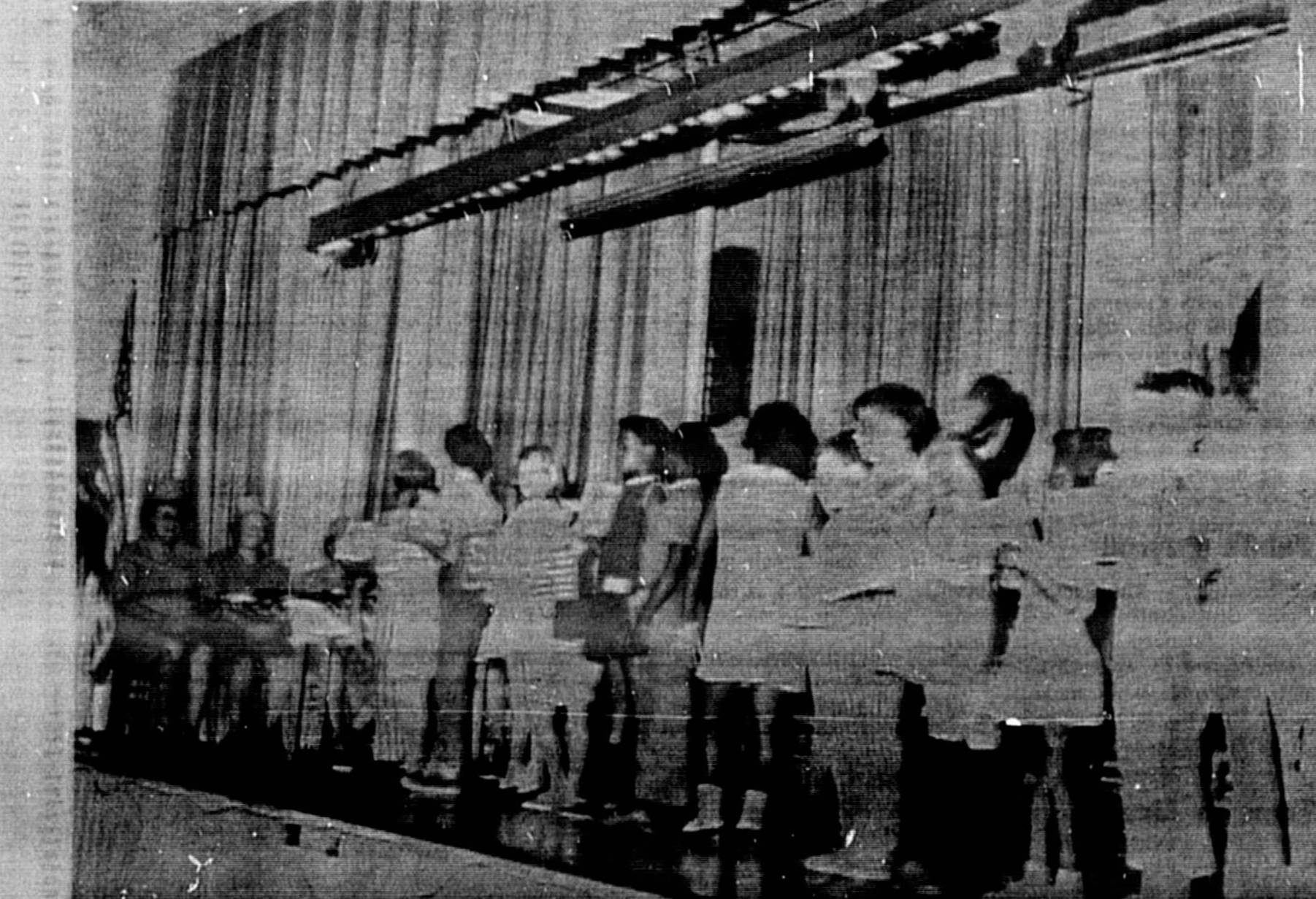

Political Oratory Must Not Distort This Issue

Murders in California, terrorist killings in Canada, revolting testimony of the violence which sensationalizes the Sharon Tate-Manson trial have made "law-and-order" much more than a political issue.

No amount of partisan or slanted oratory before the Nov. 3 general elections should be allowed to distort the continuing and grave challenge which violence poses.

No party, no candidate would openly run for election on a platform in which one plank would be dedicated to the continuation of the law of the jungle.

Neither can any one candidate or any one party drape the mantle of justice or slip into the trench-coat costume of the law enforcer as either a pose to win votes or stake out this basic and continuing issue as theirs alone.

That this is being attempted and that it has

been successful in past election campaigns cannot, however, be denied nor should it be forgotten.

These 1970s, however, have erupted — after the horrific assassinations, armed confrontations and civil strife of the 1960s — with such global surfacings of law and order that the need for immediate, effective actions is obvious.

Here in the United States the passage of the major crime control act by the Congress is a long step in the direction of beefing up the law enforcement agencies.

Such atrocities as the Sharon Tate murders and now the incredible savagery which left Dr. Victor M. Ota, his wife, two young sons and his secretary bound, blindfolded and shot to death in the Obita swimming pool and his mansion gutted with fire have raised the question of whether or not capital punishment must not be allowed as a final deterrent.

In Canada the killing of Quebec Labor Minister

Pierre Laporte by Front de Liberation du Quebec terrorists has been met by a stern-faced Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau who has invoked the strongest of measures to see that the FLQ killers are brought to task.

All of these events may seem to be far away from the Sunshine State in which we are fortunate enough to be residents. Yet the problem — much more than a political issue — is at our doorsteps.

With slow and ponderous steps the causes which are believed to breed the kind of mental imbalance and desperation which foster these challenges to law and order are under attack.

Courts and the legal profession catch some of this attention. Their province is, however, in the process of dispensing and assuring justice. It is utterly impractical to think that in these areas changes will ever catch up with the speed which characterizes both the spread of organized crime and the violent

reactions of unbalanced individuals.

Yet there is one aspect of the crime control problem which can and should be injected into and made part and parcel of the Nov. 3 elections. This is the matter of election of legislators who want to go to Tallahassee and take part in the momentous session which will start in 1971.

We believe that each should be able and willing to stand up and make his or her concept of what new legislation should be passed that would make the level, able to cope better with the crime, violence and law-breaking challenge.

Here is a basic problem, a persistent issue which continues to emblazon its horrid image on the public mind through shocking excesses, to which the very troubles he and others who have tried to work with the Communists have been through, it is difficult to see how the Paris talks could reach any agreement which has any hope of succeeding.

For how can these men trust a coalition? Or how can other men trust a coalition, knowing what they know of these experiences? Can one honestly say the men in Hanoi have changed? Is there evidence of this? And if there is no evidence, then how is lasting peace to be achieved except by helping the South Vietnamese to build themselves politically and economically to a point where the war winds down simply because the Communists do not have the strength to force their will?

Forcing Change

There's a chance — a slight chance — that Congress will move into the 20th Century next January by modifying the tyranny of its senility system.

This unlikely event will take place if enough public and private pressure is immediately brought upon all candidates for election or reelection to the House of Representatives this November.

Newspapers, unions, voters' leagues, student groups and other lobbies have the moral, political and financial power to exert sufficient pressure.

Today, the seniority system allows a group of fossils to run key committees of the House by controlling the flow of legislation debate, staff and subcommittee appointments, witness selections, etc.

As U.S. Rep. Richard Bolling (D-Mo.) has said: "If a member of a particular committee gets elected more often and lives longer than anybody ahead of him on that committee he will automatically become chairman of the committee if his party is in the majority in the House."

"That is true whether he agrees with his party or votes more like a member of the opposite party. That is true if he is the dumbest member of his party on that committee or the smartest, the laziest or the hardest working, a demagogue or a dedicated public servant. Rigid adherence to that custom simply does not make sense. It must be modified."

The rules of seniority are not set in concrete. They are the result of the party caucuses, and can be changed by those caucuses.

Public pressure can be effective. The specific target of those who would make the Congress a broader, responsible, co-equal branch of government should be that portion of the seniority system that selects the chairmen of committees. Once this is changed, the selection of subcommittee chairmen and other satellite matters will move into reasonable position.

South Is Rising With People

WASHINGTON (UPI) — My granddaddy always said the South would rise again. And by golly, he was right.

Any Southerner who is weary of having his region scorned by Westerners, newsmen and Democrats will find solace for his wounded pride in data gathered by the Census Bureau during its 1970 head-count of the U.S. population.

Census figures show that the South during the 1960s achieved greater gains in population, economic growth and education — than any other region of the country.

From the end of the Civil War until 1960 — a period of nearly a century — more people moved out of the South each year than have moved into the South.

This "out-migration," as population experts call it, amounted to about 3.5 million people during the 1960s.

But during the past decade, the flow reversed. The South experienced a net "in-migration." The number of people moving to the South from other regions exceeded the number going the other way by 900,000.

The Census Bureau includes 16 states and the District of Columbia in the Southern Region: the states are Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee, Kentucky and West Virginia.

Together they now have 61.8 million, or 31 per cent of the total U.S. population. That makes the South the most populous of the four regions of the country.

In educational attainment — as measured by the average number of years of school completed — the South still ranks slightly below the national average. But its educational level is rising faster than that of the rest of the country and may exceed the national average by the mid-1970s.

Per capita income is about 21 per cent lower in the South than elsewhere. But here again the trend is rapidly upward.

Saigon's Senator Fulbright

WASHINGTON (NEA) — This reporter has had long private talks recently with Mr. Do Quang Giai (pronounced Zai), whom some Americans refer to as the "Senator Fulbright of South Vietnam."

Like Fulbright, Giai is chairman of his country's Senate Foreign Relations Committee. And he is a leading and vocal political opponent of his country's resident and his administration. (Actually, Giai is the deputy chief of the major opposition bloc in the Senate.)

But there the similarity ends. Giai is violently anti-Hanoi. He is a vice-president of South Vietnam's anti-Communist League. Though he is willing to give the vote and the privilege of running for office to South Vietnam's Communists if they pledge themselves to renounce their allegiance to the North and help to destroy the nationalists.

Another son was picked up and jailed by the Communists, also during the truce. So far as Giai was able to find out, he was never charged with a crime. But he was killed in prison.

A third son disappeared in the interior of North Vietnam. Giai thinks President Nixon's disengagement policy is well conceived and well carried out.

Now there are several reasons why Giai does not see eye to eye with his American counterpart, Fulbright.

Brandt Tastes Soviet Duplicity

NEW YORK (NEA) — Now it is the West Germans who have cause to worry about the credibility of the men in the Kremlin.

Last August Chancellor Willy Brandt signed his celebrated nonaggression pact with Moscow which he proclaimed as the "cornerstone" of a European "detente."

The treaty is still to be ratified by Bonn's Parliament and Brandt — whose political fortunes rest heavily on the success of his politics in the East — is beginning to doubt whether he can deal with Moscow from a position of trust.

Such doubts were freely raised by his closest associates who came here to urge the Nixon administration to continue the presence of U.S. troops in Europe. They also sought to assure U.S. policymakers and journalists that West Germany remains loyal to NATO.

"Brandt is too aware of Soviet duplicity to fall into any trap set by Moscow," a top German official told this writer. But the official troubles nevertheless.

Brandt was "somewhat optimistic" in his negotiations with the Communists, he added.

A case in point is West Berlin which has been for more than two decades a good yardstick by which to assess Russian intentions in Germany.

The West Germans have long been seeking a Soviet guarantee of unhindered access to the divided city isolated 110 miles inside Communist East Germany. They also want freedom for West Berliners to visit East Berlin and Moscow's acknowledgment of legal ties between West Berlin and Bonn.

When Brandt was in Moscow in August he made it clear to the Russians that a satisfactory settlement of the Berlin issue was a prerequisite for Bonn's ratification of the non-aggression treaty by Bonn's Bundestag. The Kremlin leaders were

Injunction Asked Against State Insurance Suit Decision Due

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Circuit Judge Hugh Taylor is expected to grant or deny today a request to restrain the state from enforcing its 130-day moratorium and price rollback on auto insurance rates.

The veteran jurist heard three and one-half hours of testimony and arguments by Hartford lawmakers and attorneys for the state at a Wednesday hearing, and promised to rule today.

Although Hartford is asking only that the state be restrained from enforcing the moratorium as it applies to itself, a state of Florida request probably would negate the effect of the moratorium as it applies to all companies in Florida.

Deputy Insurance Commissioner Harry Landrum said in a "horseback opinion" that he could not conceive of how the state could refrain from enforcing the moratorium against one firm, but not others.

The moratorium was adopted by the Florida Legislature Oct. 9, and became effective immediately upon Gov. Claude Kirk signing it into law the following day.

It prohibits firms from changing rates for 180 days, a period when, presumably, the legislature is to conduct an exhaustive review of rate-making practices and law in Florida. The Oct. 9 legislation also directed all auto insurance firms to roll back their rates to the levels in force on July 1, 1970, until the conclusion of the moratorium.

During the hearing, Deputy Atty. Gen. Robert Kelly brought out that while Hartford Accident Indemnity Co. was claiming losses nationwide of \$17.5 million in 1968 and \$21.7 million in 1969, its parent affiliate, the Hartford Group, continues to pay stockholders quarterly dividends of \$1.30 per share.

"How can a company have a \$20 million loss and still pay dividends?" Kelly asked.

Kirk Readies Request Of Space Shuttle Base

KENNEDY SPACE CENTER, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk threatened at the Kennedy Space Center Wednesday the nation's space shuttle base.

"Inasmuch as I'm going to help the President make this decision next week, I thought I'd practice a little with you," the governor told space workers at TRW Systems in nearby Cape Canaveral.

In addition to honing his persuasive powers for Nixon's visit next Tuesday and Wednesday, Kirk: — Linked Democratic candidate Reubin Askew to portograpers.

Kirk told TRW employees he would take Space Center Director Kurt Debus's model of a space shuttle with him when he got on Air Force One with Nixon next week.

The space shuttle is a reusable spacecraft designed to ferry men and equipment between the Earth and orbiting space stations.

Holland Plugs For Chile

Appearing with Chiles on the campaign trail, Holland said, "When I hear talk about Lawton being too liberal, I just want to tell you Polk County just doesn't support a liberal."

"When Claude Kirk (Florida's Republican governor) ran against me in 1964, he called me an ultra-liberal," said the staunchly conservative Holland.

"That seems to be a custom among Republicans."

Chiles said he would prefer Holland's support to that of President Nixon or Vice President Spiro Agnew.

Chiles' opponent, Republican Bill Cramer, Wednesday told about 100 supporters at his Broward County headquarters in Fort Lauderdale that he was "gonna give the death penalty to the bombers and radicals who shoot the heads off our judges."

Hammering away on his law and order campaign, Cramer rallied at the "stalwart, sneaky, cowardly bombers threatening to destroy law and order in America."

Cramer also slanted at the "ultra-liberal Democratic leadership of the U.S. Senate and said, 'We've got a great leader in President Nixon and I'm gonna back him.'"

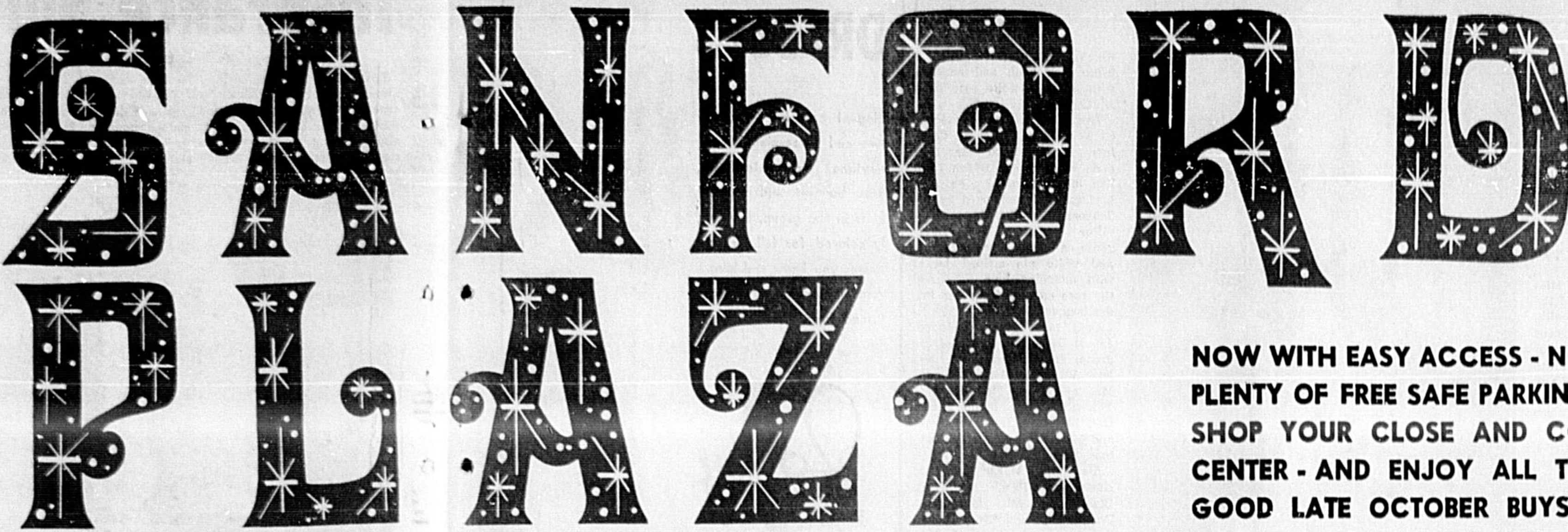

Farm Labor Agents Serve Only Growers?

When a widow with five children, unemployed half the year and dependent utterly on a monthly State Welfare check of \$150, still has to pay \$50 a month in the public housing project, the question explodes, "Why?"
Sanford Housing Director Gordon L. Bradley, claims he must charge housing rates based on income. But he first assigns the income; in this case, \$250 a month for the year. He does not ask them their farm work income. We wonder, does he check out the growers' and crew bosses' records for social security? He assigns a blanket income to all women farm-workers.

Unemployed, this widow gets only her \$150 for six months—any widow with five does. To average \$250 a month she must get \$350 for the six months of winter work. This is impossible for 2,000 farm workers to average in our county. Even our State Welfare holds them liable to earn only \$175 a month, but will then give them all day, they have chronic or \$75. Total income would then be \$250 for the best work season, but the winter, too, when needs of the destitute double for food, fuel, clothes, school, etc.

DON'T THEY KNOW?
State Welfare is assigning what a woman ought to earn, then deducting on that basis. Don't they know what each one earns? Surely our Growers keep books. Or are the actual figures so much lower?
We assume that no one is hiding these facts. What does our Farm Labor Division find from their tax-paid surveys? My thorough inquiry of our local and branch offices discloses there are no surveys of average earnings for farm-workers in Seminole County or the State of Florida.

AREN'T Farm Labor agents paid out of taxes to go to help the workers as well as the growers? Or do they just provide the cheap labor for the growers at their command? The facts can give our whole county heart, that fair-play is still our motto. But neglecting surveys to assign a fictitious income is neither fair-play, Christian Brotherhood, nor good business.

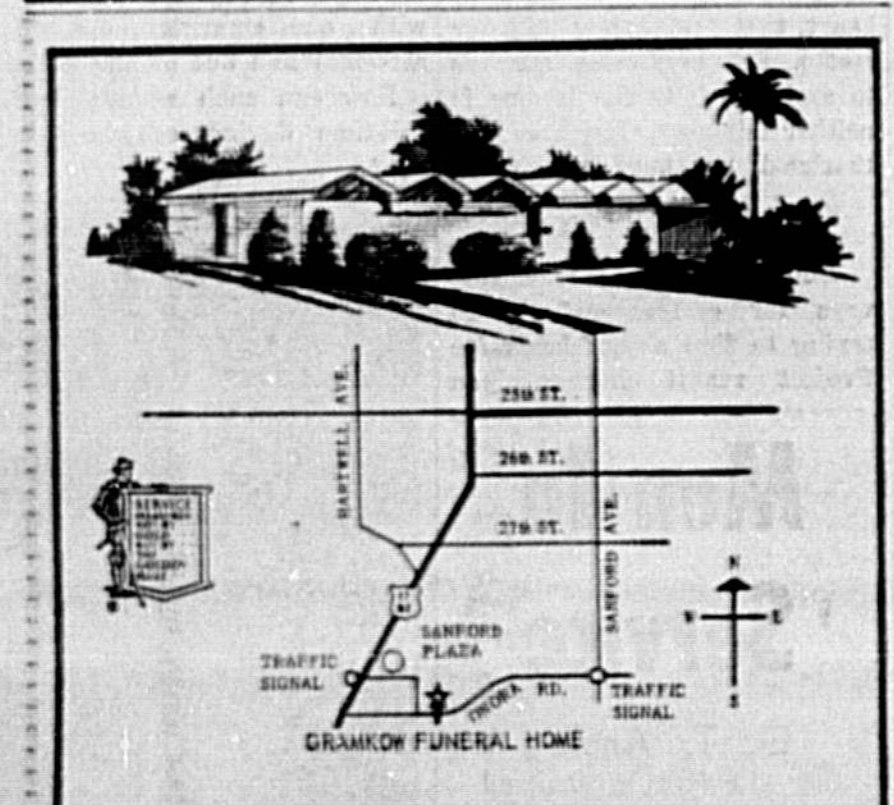

North wanted to play JACOBY MODERN. Z complained that in his day conventions were something for political parties and large organizations, but he had looked over JACOBY MODERN and it seemed to be the simplest system currently available, so he would try it.

His two-heart response showed 4-6 high-card points. His partner bid three hearts. Z didn't want to raise with three trumps until he realized that he was going to play the heart contract. He was delighted to hear his partner's

side bid but wasn't at all pleased with the opening lead. Without a trump lead, it would have been a simple matter to ruff three of dummy's

spades with his three trumps. Now he had a choice of ways to go after his contract.

The simple way would be to let the lead come around to his 10 and take a spade finessé.

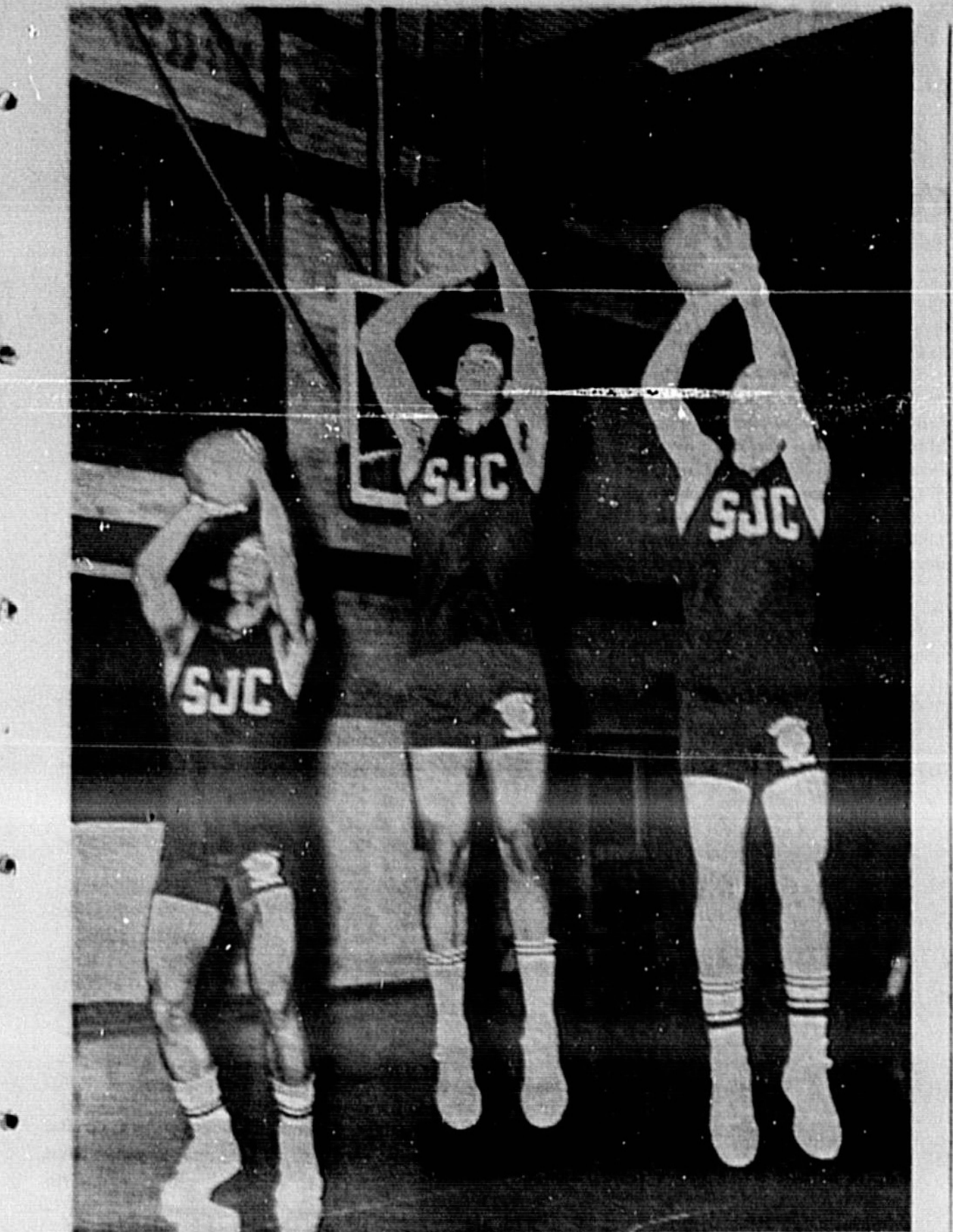

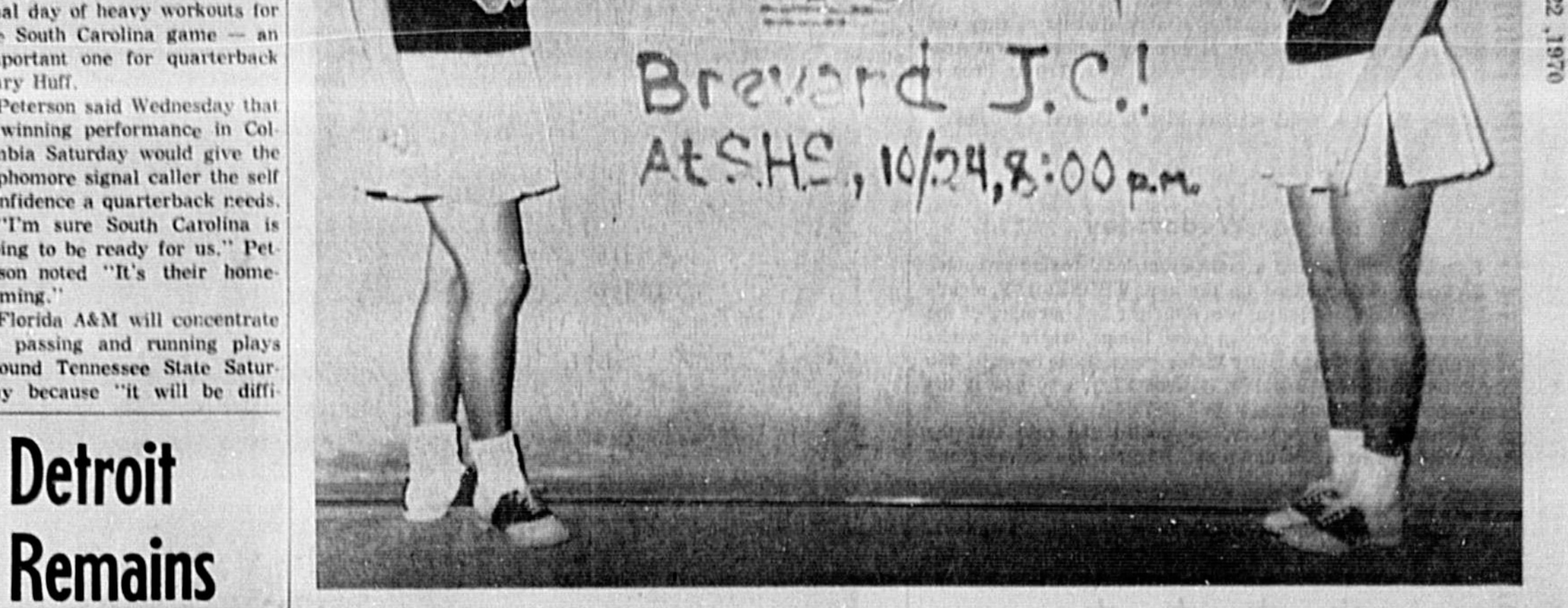
