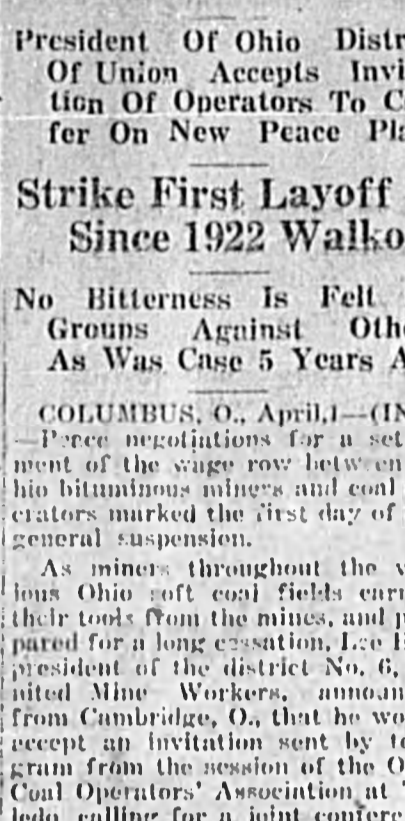

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Situation In China Grows Worse, Says Williams In Report

BRITAIN IS READY
TO TAKE ACTION
AGAINST CHINESE

Reparations Must Be Made
For Nanking Outrages, Is
Declaration; Japan, U. S.
Urged To Join Movement

LONDON, Apr. 1.—Great Britain
is prepared to take action in
China if the Nationalists fail to
make proper preparations for the
Nanking outrages, it was learned
today.

The majority of the cabinet fa-
vors a strict blockade of all Chi-
nese ports, but the admiralty has
recommended that all of the Yan-
tze River as far as Hankow be
taken over, it is learned in authori-
tative circles.

While Great Britain is prepared
to act alone in this matter, there
are still hopes that the United
States and Japan will join.

Negotiations between Great
Britain, the United States and Ja-
pan are still proceeding and Great
Britain will not take any single-
handed steps until these negotia-
tions have been completed.

All nations, it is learned, are
approaching the question from
the viewpoint of "intolerable hu-
manitarian" inflicted upon their
women nationals in Nanking.

C. J. Wallis, British consul at
Nanking, has rendered a final re-
port stating that his investiga-
tions have shown that the Nanking
outrages were "deliberately orga-
nized by the Chinese troops who
were never out of hand but were
acting under orders."

The Yangtze is now navigable
for the largest destroyers, it is
pointed out and might easily be
taken over by the powers. This
rich river valley is an important
waterway and its being closed to
the nationalists would cause se-
rious economic disruption.

Great Britain it is understood
feels that she has sufficient na-
val power in China now to enforce
sanctions and that her land forces
are sufficient to protect her na-
tionals in Shanghai from any re-
taliations that the Chinese might
effect.

Japanese Fleet Arrives At Amoy

Protection Of Foreign Property Assured By Chinese Leader

WASHINGTON, April 1.—
(INS)—The situation at sev-
eral points in China, notably
at Hankow and at Chunking,
is growing worse, according to
a dispatch to the navy today
from Admiral C. S. Williams,
commanding the Asiatic
squadron.

It was at Chunking that
unofficial reports pictured the de-
struction of the American flag in
the hands of the American consul
by Chinese mobs.

The Japanese second fleet has
arrived at Amoy, midway between
Canton and Shanghai, Admiral
Williams reported, and expects to
stay there until April 5. No reason
was given in the dispatch for the
Japanese mobilization at that point.
Williams dispatch said:

"The American consulate at
Chungking closed and sealed up
board U. S. S. Monacary, (river
gunboat)."

"Gen. Liu Hsiang has assured the
American and British consuls that
foreign property would be protected,
but his control is incomplete."

"British boats due to call down
the Yangtze River yesterday. The
Monacary with the American con-
sular staff is writing until word is received
from Americans in outlying dis-
tricts as to whether they intend
leaving or not."

"The situation at Chungking is
growing worse."

"Report from Hankow indicates
the possibility of serious distur-
bances there shortly."

"All Americans evacuated from
Chao-Hsien, Anhwei province."

"The Japanese second fleet con-
sisting of the Kongo (battleship),
five submarines and one tori-
pedo boat arrived at Amoy and expects
to remain at that port until April 5."

hai April 1, 11:45 A. M.

Andrews Rounds Out His Second Year As Director Of Federal Prohibition

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Gen-
eral Lincoln C. Andrews, dry czar,
today saluted into the third year of
his trip through the rough and

ment.

Having originally intended to re-
main as assistant secretary of the
treasury only until a general re-
organization of the service had
been effected, Andrews' future is
uncertain. The recent selection of
Roy A. Haynes as prohibition com-
missioner was a jolt to him.

"I cannot estimate how the fu-
ture of prohibition will work out,"
Andrews said. "It would take a
wiser man than I."

Interstate Commerce Board Policy Arouses The Ire Of American Rail Systems

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(INS)—
A momentous court battle loomed
today as result of the enuncia-
tion of the Interstate Commerce
Commission's policy for determin-
ing the valuation of American rail-
roads for restructure and rate-mak-
ing purposes.

Overriding opposition of the car-
riers, the commission, by a 6 to 4
vote, decided to fix the value upon
the estimated cost of reproduction
as of 1914, plus costs for additions
and betterments since that date.
The railroads asked that the value
be set upon the present cost of re-
production.

The commission's decision, if sus-
tained in the courts, will mean that
approximately \$11,000,000,000 will
be wiped off the book value of the
railroads. It also will effectively
checkmate concerted efforts by the
carriers to obtain higher freight
and passenger rates which would
follow if a higher valuation were
allowed.

Carriers' representatives declared
they would carry a fight to the
courts to upset the commission's
policy.

The decision was rendered in the
case of the St. Louis and O'Fallon
and manufacturer's railway in the
St. Louis district.

The commission anticipates a
court fight. Its argument was out-
lined by commissioner Eastman in
his opinion discussing the duty of
the commission to regulate rail-
roads. He said that in such matters
the commission occupies "a front
seat upon the stage, while the su-
preme court of necessity is only an
occasional visitor in the balcony."

Women

American Women Are More Modest Than Turkish, Says Wealthy Coffee Merchant

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., April 1.—(INS)—American women are more modest as a whole than Turkish women.

This observation was made here by Chari Mora, wealthy Turkish coffee merchant, shortly after his arrival from Constantinople, following a study of customs and costumes in West Palm Beach and his home city.

The feminine revolt in Turkey, he said, has gone to the extreme since women obtained permission to go without the veil. They get anything they can get in foreign clothing, and wear it anywhere they go.

"Do not misunderstand me," Chari Mora continued, "I do not criticize either American or Turkish women. The majority in each country are rather conservative. It is the flappers who attract our attention, especially when they go to extremes. Powder, paint, lip sticks, perfume, and similar things are general now in my country, and wo-

men have drinking parlors where they may accompany gentlemen to purchase wines.

"Smoke? Why, certainly, it is my understanding that your American women get their cigarettes from our women. Most of our men smoke long, slim-stemmed pipes, and the contents are far better than tobacco.

"China? You ask me difficult things. I should not make too radical statements, but I believe the hope of the world lies in the stabilization of the Chinese and Russian governments, and I believe my own country is working rapidly to the point where it will be heartily approved by the best other governments. Chinese women, Turkish women, Russian women, all have thrown down their limitations, and the result must be beneficial. We have an old saying: "When the hammer takes the sword, heads will fly." And it is true; women cut everything out of their way once they decide to advance.

Husband, Wife And Lover Had Dramatic Meeting Prior To Shooting In Paris

PARIS, Apr. 1.—A dramatic scene between husband, wife and lover was the pride to the Countess de Janze, formerly Alice Silverthorn of Chicago, shooting Raymond de Trafford and then turning the gun on herself, according to a statement made today to the International News Service by a close friend of Count de Janze.

Count de Janze is said to have formed his friend of the dramatic triangular meeting himself, the Countess and de Trafford.

The Count called at the hotel where de Trafford and the Countess were guests and met the two together. The Count was unarmed.

"I am giving my wife a divorce so that she may marry you," Count de Janze is said to have told de Trafford, in the presence of the Countess.

De Trafford, according to the friend of the count, immediately declared he would not marry the countess if she were divorced.

"I refuse, absolutely, to marry her," de Trafford is quoted as

saying, "I have no intention whatsoever of doing so. My family won't stand for it."

Violent words were then exchanged by the count and de Trafford, who nearly came to blows. As the countess looked on amazed and bewildered.

"He is not going to marry you, I'll make him do it," the count said to the countess as he departed in a storm of fury.

The countess called on the count the next day and told him she was in a fearful mental state and that she had actual fears that she might be losing her mind.

While the State Police at Malone and other points adjacent to the border are being recruited to full "wet" strength, the United States Customs and Immigration patrols are being enlarged.

FREE STATE TO HOLD ELECTION ABOUT JUNE 15

Political Activity Jumps As Announcement Is Sent Out; Labor Party Very Strong

DUBLIN, Apr. 1.—(INS)—The semi-official announcement that the Free State elections will be held about June 15 has had the effect of quickening political activity in every camp.

Headquarters of the various political parties incline to regard the announcement as good news since it is expected to have the effect of stimulating into activity their all too sluggish supporters in the constituencies.

In this respect the Labor Party is in a much more favorable position than any of the others. The Laborites have been devoting a great deal of attention to the organizing of the constituencies and already their election machine is taking shape.

Machinery Ready After the Laborites, the most efficient election machine at the moment is that of the Republicans.

Election machinery has already been set up in half the constituencies. De Valera's party is expected to put up between eight and nine candidates altogether and the Sinn Fein organization about half a dozen.

The Government Party, as witnessed by the recent speeches of Kevin O'Higgins and other Ministers, is at last awakening to the fact that unless they bestir themselves during the next few months they stand to face almost certain defeat. The recent reverse sustained Kevin O'Higgins at the hands of the Republicans over the Liquor Bill has afforded the Government some indication of their position in the country.

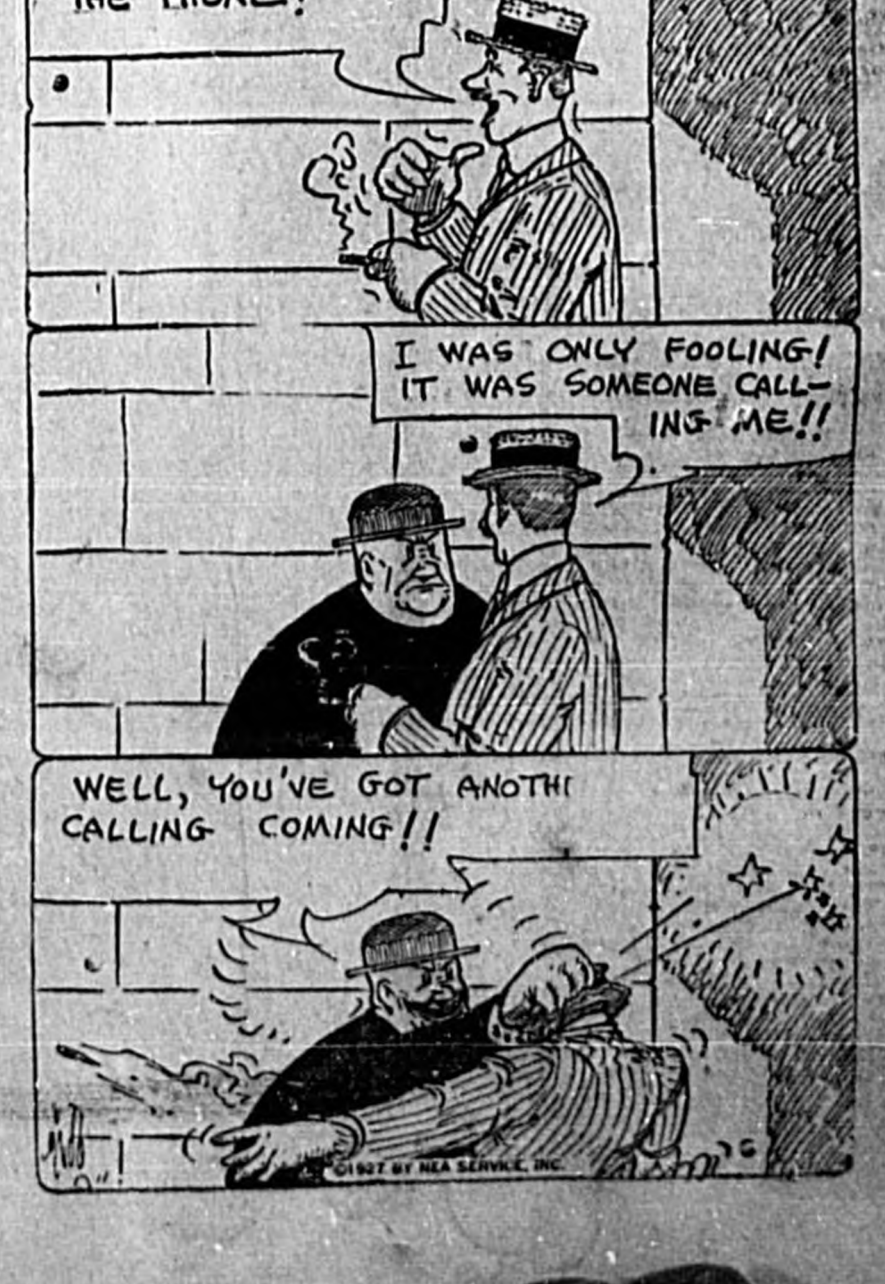
