Books are becoming a major industry. Their sales are astonishing the publishers. The popularity of Willkie's "One World" is well known; it is less well known that many ther books are doing as well. The humorous soldier's flary, "See Here. Private Hargrove," recently sold a million ries in a month.

An "Aircraft Spotters' Handbook" overwhelmed its ublishers by creating a demand for a million copies, keeping four printers busy night and day, trying to print the needed volumes. Series featuring the world's best books, are selling in seven figures. Bibles are being bought so fast that at least two large-scale publishers are rationing

old customers, and refusing new ones.

The war is responsible. Rival amusements like driving and playing golf are more or less out, yielding their place to reading. Millions of warworkers, making more money than ever before in their lives, now feel able to buy books. An even more powerful cause is the cheapening of successful titles. Inexpensive reprints account for something like two-thirds of the increased sales.

There are also more sales outlets. To the 2,000 bookstores in the United States are now added the book depart ments, lately installed, of drug stores, toy departments and even automobile accessory stores. Rationed on other goods, these are turning to books to have something to sell. Publishers are even dreaming now of getting books into the nation's 250,000 grocery stores.
