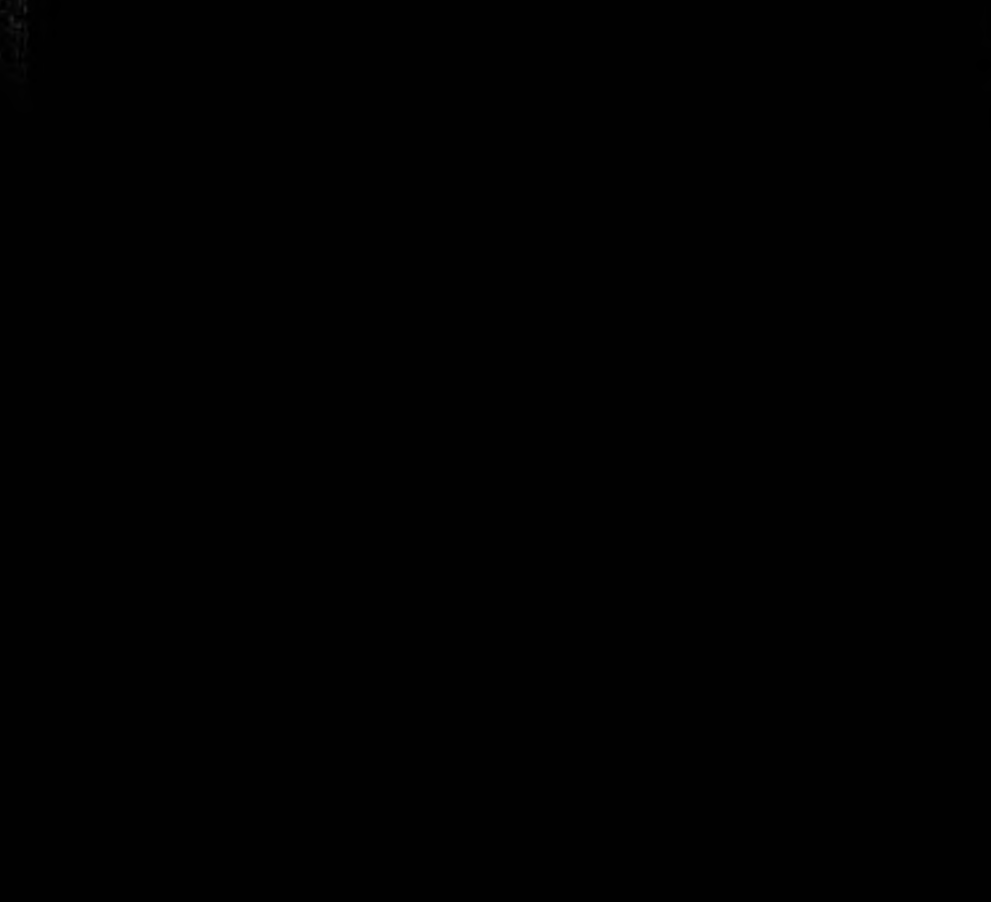

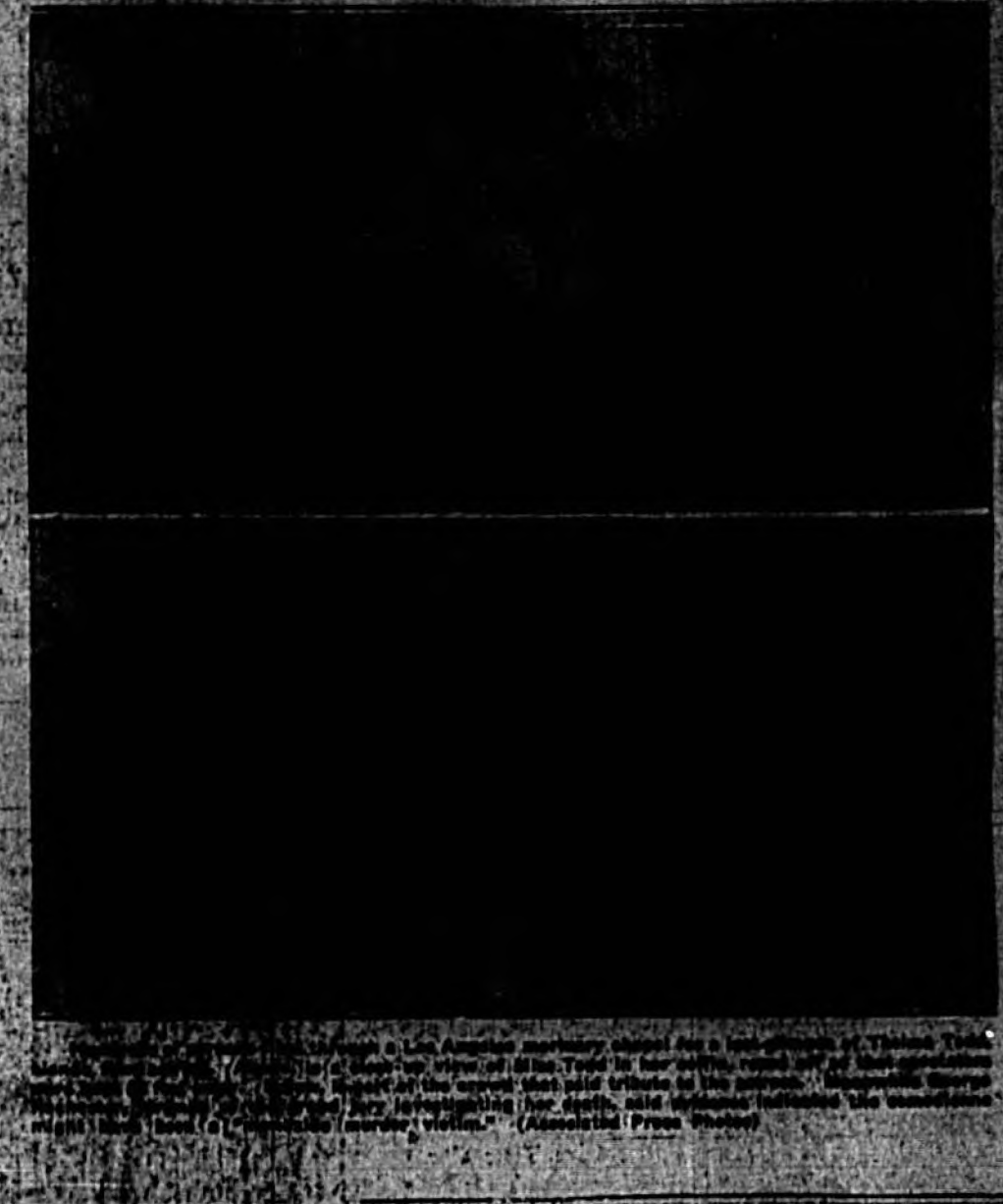

 to stop is to have the

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**"God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen"**

On Christmas Eve, in a troubled world, full of  
 "war and rumors of war" and struggling with economic  
 problems that seem completely baffling, the happy words,  
 "God rest ye, merry gentlemen" from the old carol, ring  
 upon the ear with a particularly welcome appeal, for Christ-  
 mas is a familiar and beloved oasis in a desert of strange  
 and trying difficulties. It is a release from the fight for  
 material existence, an inn of respite on the year's circuitous  
 highway where both the spirit and the body can be  
 refreshed, a glorified Sunday with a shining golden halo  
 around it, a respite that not always "merry" gentlemen  
 the man in the street.

Two thousand years ago, another man of humble  
 origin, a carpenter by trade, set out on a hazardous  
 journey, a journey that was to change the entire course of  
 world history. Joseph of Nazareth and his wife, Mary,  
 left Galilee, on a trip they could ill afford to take, to  
 Bethlehem because Caesar had ordered all his subjects to  
 go to the nearest city and register for taxes. When  
 Mary and Joseph arrived, there was no room for them at  
 the inn, and they found shelter in the stable where Christ  
 was born. The homely beauty of this scene with the  
 baby lying in the manger, his mother bending over him,  
 and the patient cattle, the shepherds, and the wise men,  
 is so lovely that it has survived unmarred through the  
 centuries. Even during the periods in history when the  
 world has seemed drunk on lust and greed, when gold  
 seemed to be the only god that men worshipped and hu-  
 manity and decency were scoffed at, the story of this baby  
 whose first crib was a manger and whose only mattress  
 was sweet-smelling hay, has been told and retold.

And today, this same scene in the stable is painted  
 and painted again and somehow it miraculously retains its  
 loveliness and that quality that Matthew Arnold called  
 "sweetness and light." No speaker, however bombastic  
 and florid his sentences, no writer, however verbose and  
 ornate his phraseology, no pseudo-artist, however abstruse  
 and exaggerated his style, can destroy the beautiful  
 simplicity of the original picture. There is something  
 vital, something appealing, something so strangely mov-  
 ing about it that it cannot be spoiled. The crudest Christ-  
 mas card executed by the most unskilled fingers cannot  
 be touched with at least a spark of the magic that  
 exists in the star of Bethlehem two thousand years ago.  
 So let us make the most of our Christmas Day, bring-  
 ing care and worry aside and singing with the carolers:  
 "God rest ye, merry gentlemen,  
 Let nothing you dismay,  
 For Jesus Christ, our Saviour,  
 Was born on Christmas Day."

**What Is Worth While?**

 At least a hundred young people have written me let-  
 ters like the following, in the tough year 1933:  
 "What inspiration or interest can I find in life? I sup-  
 pose I should consider myself lucky just to have a job, but  
 it is a dreadfully dull job. I am a cog in the industrial ma-  
 chine. When I left school I thought I should some day  
 have a chance to do something splendid. The days and  
 years pass. I make a living, but I do nothing that counts."  
 Reading one of the older books of my friend William  
 Lyon Phelps the other day, I came across the character  
 from the great ball player, Ty Cobb: "If I had my time  
 live over again I would probably be a burglar instead of a  
 baseball player. . . . I shall not have done any good to hu-  
 manity when I retire."  
 Well, if I were making a list of Americans who have  
 done a great deal of good to humanity I certainly would  
 write the name of Mr. Ty Cobb near the top. I also  
 would write the names of Charlie Chaplin, Ed Wynn,  
 George M. Cohan, Irving Berlin, Katharine Hepburn and  
 dozens of others who have helped men and women to for-  
 get their troubles and made them smile. I am inclined  
 to think that I would rank all of these folks ahead of any  
 man who has served in the Senate in our time, perhaps  
 ahead of our presidents.

Then if I were to complete my list I would write down  
 a lot of names of people who have never been in the news-  
 papers at all. Names of women who raised their sons and  
 daughters with clean minds and right ideas; women who  
 did a thousand kindnesses for other people, all unrecor-  
 ded. I would write the names of many men, too, who  
 fame, who carried on daily in dull tasks and never let  
 their cheerfulness or their faith.  
 I sympathize with the impatience and restlessness of  
 the young. In my teens I, too, wanted to be president of  
 a senator, or something notable. Now, in my forties,  
 I would not care for any of these things. I enjoy my busi-  
 ness. I enjoy my family. I enjoy the privilege of being  
 alive in days when the whole country is going through a  
 social revolution. I walk through the streets and see the  
 status of men who were very famous only to find that they  
 are already forgotten, and I reflect that it had not been  
 very much different, provided one is a member of the right  
 spirit and has learned to be reasonably content.  
 I feel this way at Christmas time particularly when  
 there is a little more leisure at home. Christmas is essen-  
 tially the festival of the ordinary people, the shepherds  
 tending their flocks by night, the wise men who were  
 engaged in humble work, and some of them in work dis-  
 turbed by the thought that they had done nothing im-  
 portant.

Yet to them, not to the mighty or the prominent, the  
 Christmas message came.

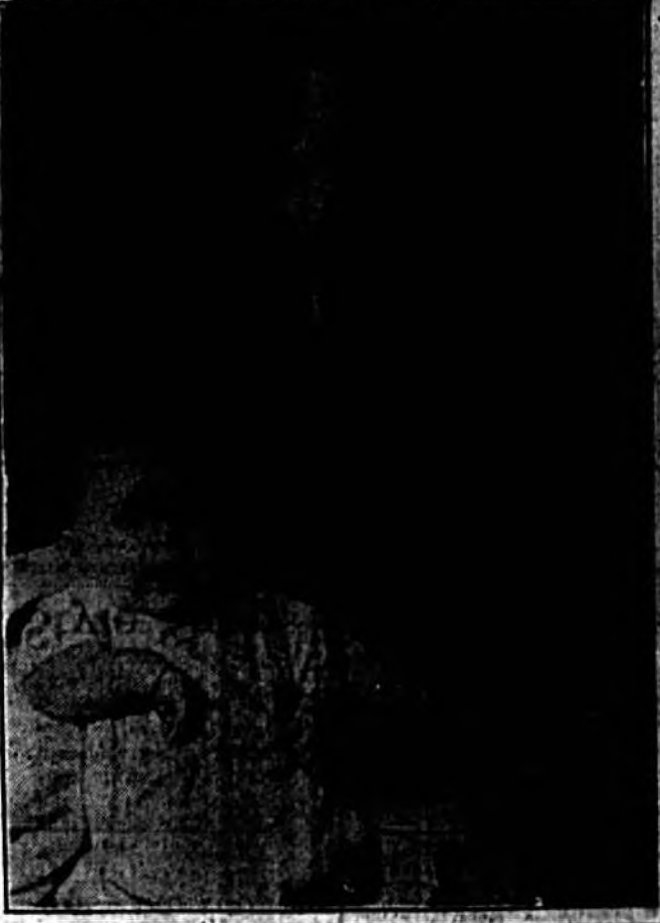

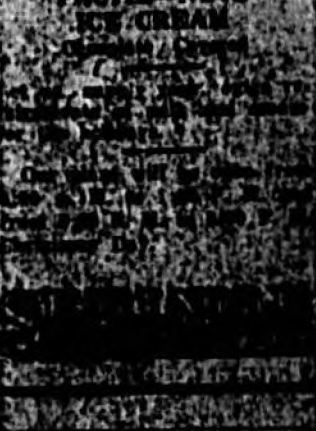

## Divergent Are Proposals For Next Congress

### Democrats For Short, Harmony Session But G. O. P. May Prolong It Months

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—(AP)—New Dealers and opponents concentrated today on a rickety different plans for the new session of Congress opening Jan. 3, eight days hence.

Roosevelt men were striving for a short harmonious session and here were reports that President Roosevelt might propose much in the way of new legislation beyond a new neutrality bill and appropriation measures.

In Republican ranks, however, there was strong sentiment for breaking the whole fight over the New Deal wide open again in an aggressive attack on Administration men and policies.

Moreover, the American Liberty League was fighting for drastic revision of the Utility Holding Company Act, AAA, Social Security plan and tax legislation. Most plans were contingent, however, on what the Supreme Court does about six pieces of legislation now before it.

Some legislators see close fights which may stretch the session into summer, pointing to Congress as an ideal forum for campaign speeches.

The first big issue expected to come up is the \$2,000,000,000 bill for the neutrality bill.

## 261,960 Gallons Gasoline Used In County In Month

Gasoline consumption in Seminole County during the month of November totaled 261,960 gallons, even though it is one of the smallest counties in the state, according to tabulations issued today by the Department of Agriculture in Tallahassee.

The largest consumption, more than three and one-half million gallons, was in Dade county (Miami), Duval county (Jacksonville) ranked second with the consumption of slightly less than two and one-half million gallons, and Hillsboro county (Tampa) was third with the consumption of slightly more than two million gallons of gasoline.

Palm Beach, Pinellas and Polk counties each exceeded one million gallons in gasoline consumption. The total amount of gasoline burned in the state during the month was 22,468,322 gallons, exclusive of that sold to government agencies.

During the month residents of Seminole County bought 41,732 gallons of kerosene. The total state in November was 2,982,231 gallons. Dade, Duval and Hillsboro counties also leading in consumption of the fuel.

### Millions Of Subjects On 7 Continents Hear British Ruler

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"I have been deeply touched by the greetings which in the last few minutes have reached me from all parts of the Empire. Let me in response send to each of you a greeting from myself. My words will be very simple, but spoken from the heart, on this family festival of Christmas.

"The year that is passing, the twenty-fifth since my accession, has been to me most memorable. It called for a spontaneous offering of loyalty and, I may say, of love, which the Queen and I can never forget. How could I fail to note in all the rejoicings, not merely respect for the throne, but a warm and generous remembrance of the man himself, who, may God help him, has been placed upon it.

"It is this personal link between me and my people which I value more than I can say. It binds us together in all our common joys and sorrows, as when this year you showed your happiness in the marriage of my son and your sympathy in the death of my beloved sister. I feel this link now as I speak to you. I am thinking not so much of the empire itself as of the individual men, women and children who live within it, whether they are dwelling here at home or in some distant outpost of the empire.
