Carter's A Liar, Crane Tells GOP

The public believed the promise of candidate Jimmy Carter in 1976 that he would not raise a tax, but what they found after the election was "politics as usual," presidential candidate U.S. Rep. Phil Crane, R-Ill., told 300 Republicans at a banquet in Alamosa Springs Wednesday night.

The occasion was the annual Lincoln Day dinner sponsored by the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee and was one of eight appearances in Central Florida for Crane, kicking off the southern portion of his run for the presidency.

Saying the Democratic administration in Washington is attempting "to fulfill the promise" of defeated 1972 Democratic presidential nominee, Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota,

Crane said the people had expected Carter's "performance to measure up to his rhetoric" and since it hasn't the "loss of public confidence is mounting."

Crane listed broken Carter promises, including one as late as this past December when he signed into law a bill sponsored by Sen. Richard Stone, D-Fla., guaranteeing no treaties would be signed with Communist China which could compromise the freedom and political independence of Taiwan without prior approval of the Congress.

"Carter didn't even let Stone know before he signed a treaty guaranteeing that law," Crane said. "Carter did not even seek an agreement from China that it would not attack Taiwan," Crane said.

He said Carter in 1976 promised a balanced budget before the end of his first term, yet deficit spending continues

to rise; he promised to reduce the size of government yet created the "monstrous" Department of Energy which has 20,000 bureaucrats and a \$10.6 billion annual budget and is promoting creation of a Department of Education with 18,000 more bureaucrats and a \$14 billion budget; promised deregulation of gas and oil and sent an energy bill to Congress with no mention of deregulation; promised he would not impose new taxes on the people and signed into law a bill that raised social security taxes by 4 percent.

Crane compared his own service to the people of his Illinois district, saying he has "never come, deceived, nor glossed over the truth to his constituents. 'The people want the same thing I do. They want candor from their representatives."

Continuing a fight he began years ago as a state senator, Graham recommended abolition of the state's motor vehicle inspection program effective Oct. 1 and an extra \$8.1 million to the Florida Highway Patrol to transfer 60 employees in inspection stations to road duty and hire 87 additional troopers. He recommended abolition of four of the seven state "welcome stations," facilities at Campbellton, Fernandina Beach, Hilliard and Tallahassee, and the state vocational rehabilitation program, turning over job training for handicapped persons to the federal government.

He also recommended elimination or reorganization of 18 programs, saying taxpayers will save \$107 million over the next two years. The number of state employees, now 66,630, would be trimmed by 471 over

TALLAHASSEE, UPI) — Gov. Bob Graham unveiled today a \$14 billion two-year state budget and a plan giving the average homeowner a 94¢ break on his property taxes.

Graham's first state budget ever and Florida's first biennial spending plan in 11 years provides hefty increases for public schools and the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, but leaves \$307.6 million unappropriated in a "stabilization fund" as a hedge against inflation and unexpected financial emergencies.

State spending for the 1979-81 biennium would total \$14.083 billion. Spending for the fiscal year beginning July 1 would total \$6.788 billion, a \$437 million or 10 percent increase over this year.

Graham said his budget is supportive of President Carter's inflation fight because wage increases for public employees are within Carter's 7 percent ceiling and overall state spending is not growing faster than the population.

Puffing one of his major campaign commitments, Graham recommended a two-mill rollback in property taxes going for schools and a freeze on property taxes levied for city and county government operations.

The proposal would provide short-term relief while the state commission headed by Lt. Gov. Wayne Mixson tries to come up with long-range tax reform recommendations. Graham intends to call a special legislative session next December to consider the panel's recommendations.

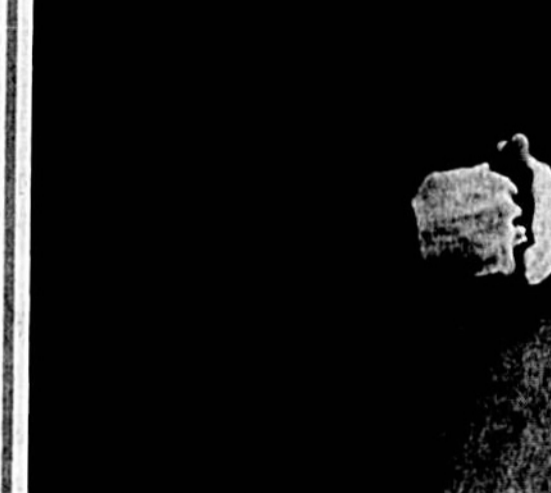

Board Approves Split Sessions At Brantley HS

To help Lake Brantley High School deal with what its principal called a "population explosion" the Seminole County School Board has unanimously adopted a split session plan for the school which will go into effect in September.

The basic concept of the plan is to have juniors and seniors attend a five-hour morning session from 7 a.m. to 11:55 a.m. and freshmen and sophomores attend a five-hour afternoon session from 12:05 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the school at 975 Sand Lake Road in south Seminole County.

However, School Principal Darvin Boothe also referred to the plan as an "extended day" because there will be some students who will choose to go six hours and thus their schedule will overlap with the other students. He estimated this number at 200 at each grade level or 800 total.

Boothe noted the students taking the extra hour will be those interested in getting extra credits to help them when they go to college and the parent-teacher committee which helped develop the plan thought it would be best if that opportunity is available to the students.

However, that will require the school and district officials to work on bus schedule conflicts, student schedule conflicts and supervision at the school while students are coming

and going. Lake Brantley High School was originally built in 1972 for 2,000 students but now has a student population of 2,850.

To cope with the increase the school has added eight portables and has made eight multi-purpose rooms into 16 classrooms, Boothe said.

Despite these steps the school has been unable to effectively control the increasing student population.

"We are really expanded to our absolute capacity and we do not feel now we can effectively serve the students," Boothe told the board Wednesday.

The principal noted for the past several years the school has experienced steady growth from 2,136 students in 1971-1972 to 2,320 students during the school year 1977-1978, to the current 2,850 and he is expecting the school population to increase to 2,800 next school year.

It is hoped the split session plan will only be for the next school year, pending completion of the new Lake Mary High School. That school is expected to be ready by December 1980 and it is hoped students transferring there from Lake Brantley will solve the problem.

The split session plan received some opposition Wednesday from Eleanor Spencer who has a daughter at Lake Brantley.

She complained the plan had been given little publicity and there had

Sanford Girl In Drug Gang Is Daughter Of Ex-Mayor

The daughter of a former mayor of Sanford is among 11 persons arrested in connection with the "Drugstore Gang."

Orange County Sheriff's investigators said the gang, consisting of 18 persons, is responsible for the theft of \$150,000 in drugs from pharmacies in Seminole, Orange, Volusia and Osceola counties.

Being held at the Orange County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond is Cindy Baker, 22. She is the daughter of former Sanford commissioner and mayor Joe B. Baker.

Baker, who served as Sanford's mayor in 1967, owns a dairy business called Baker Farms at 546 Old Orlando Road. A spokesman for the sheriff's department in Orange County said Miss Baker gave her address as Rt. 3, Box 346 in Sanford.

She is charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance.

A spokesman for Baker Farms said Baker is out of town and was expected to return sometime this afternoon. The spokesman said Miss Baker had been living with her brother in Sanford while attending school.

The Baker Farms spokesman said Miss Baker dropped out of school, moved out of her brother's home and "dropped out of sight" about one month ago.

Miss Baker faces an initial court appearance today. Roger Fields, director of an investigative team at the Orange County Sheriff's Department, said the "Drugstore Gang" stole

heroin, morphine, cocaine, demoral and dilaudid and then sold the drugs for profit.

Fields estimated the gang was responsible for 25 burglaries and 15 armed robberies during the past year.

No drugs were found when the 11 persons were taken into custody Wednesday.

Among those still at-large are the purported leaders of the gang.

"The potential for violence in these crimes was great," Fields said. "It has been fortunate that no pharmacists or citizens have been killed so far."

"The pharmaceuticals taken in these crimes have often caused spinoff crimes ranging from burglary to murder among the criminal element as they compete for control of the stolen drugs," Fields said.

One member of the gang is being sought on murder charges stemming from a shooting and knifing murder during an apparent drug ripoff, authorities reported.

Fields said the newly formed investigative unit he heads, the Metropolitan Bureau of Investigation, will be the gang which is believed to have operated in Georgia and Alabama as well as Florida.

He said they were targeted for investigation because of the "alarming" increase in the number of pharmacy robberies in the last year.

U.S. To Yanks: Git! Can't Guard You...

TERRAN, Iran (UPI) — The U.S. Embassy today urged all Americans to leave Iran because their lives could no longer be protected. But officials immediately ran into growing opposition from the Iranian government over impending contingency plans for the evacuation.

Ambassador William Sullivan, who was captured and then released in the latest guerrilla attack on the U.S. Embassy Wednesday, issued a directive to American citizens saying:

"We cannot protect American lives in Iran. We strongly recommend evacuation from Iran. You should prepare for contingencies. The ambassador said every person should carry only one suitcase and 'we have aircraft planning to arrive on Saturday, Feb. 17.'"

All Americans were told to make contact with the embassy and then "we will contact you when to go for processing. We are still processing limited government travel requests."

The message said: "We are in phase three of the emergency evacuation."

"You can tell the American public, frankly, I don't give a damn for the American government," said a spokesman for Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the power behind the new government.

The Iranians said they were upset because the Americans had blown the latest guerrilla attack on the embassy Wednesday into a "massacre" and then had made a unilateral decision to evacuate citizens without proper consultation with Khomeini.

When U.S. officials requested visas to begin transferring American evacuees throughout the city to central shopping areas prior to the start of an expected air lift Saturday, they were told brusquely by aides to Khomeini.

"When the time comes we will give you visas and everything you request," not before.

Six Americans including four Marines, a Navy man and a cook were held overnight at Khomeini's headquarters after being taken from the embassy Wednesday.

WASHINGTON — "As a special mark of respect," President Carter has ordered U.S. Navy planes to hold still and fly in formation over the day of funeral services for Ambassador Adolph Dubs.

...U.S. Blames Soviets For Envoy's Slaying

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States, deeply angered at the murder of the American ambassador to Afghanistan, protested harshly to the Kremlin over the role of Soviet advisers in the events that led to Adolph Dubs' assassination.

The United States also charged that Afghanistan's pro-Soviet government shared responsibility for the death of the diplomat.

But the protest to the Soviet Union was the more significant action. A State Department statement read to reporters late Wednesday stopped just short of accusing Moscow of responsibility in Dubs' murder.

Dubs, 66, was kidnapped by Muslim extremists Wednesday as he drove to the American Embassy in Kabul. A few hours later at a downtown hotel, in a shootout between the extremists and Afghan police, he was killed.

The American protest was conveyed late Wednesday to Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin, called to the State Department by acting Secretary of State Warren Christopher.

Other American officials went further, saying one of the four Soviet officials on the scene was a security agent from the Soviet Embassy with whom American officials had been in touch regarding the possibility of negotiations to seek Dubs' release.

According to these officials the United States received reports the Soviet advisers and the security agent helped the ambush force and even provided weapons. The officials, who cannot be identified, accused the Soviet advisers and the security agent of "callous disregard" for the life of the American.

"The refusal of the Soviet advisers on the spot to comment on these questions is grossly unjust — given the fact that the life of the American ambassador was in jeopardy," Carter said.

As of Wednesday night, it was not clear whether Dubs died from police bullets or was shot by his captors.

In an effort to improve moral values among Seminole County school children as well as cut down on teen-age pregnancies, the Florida Alliance For Responsible Adolescent Parenting (FAFRAP) has for about a year now been drumming up support to incorporate into the school curriculum subject matter to achieve those goals.

Winter Springs Planner The First City Manager?

The chances are good that City Planner Dick Rozanski, employed by the city of Winter Springs for the past 22 months under the federally funded Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA), may become the city's first city manager.

Lake Mary Boy, 2 1/2, Dead

'He Didn't Know The Gun Was Loaded'

The 12-year-old Sanford boy who shot and killed a two-and-one-half-year-old Lake Mary boy in a rural Sanford trailer Thursday did not know the .30 caliber rifle he used was loaded, according to his father, Jesse J. Lee, 42, Lot 11 Pinecrest Trailer Park, Sanford.

Lee said today his son had taken the loaded rifle from a gun rack in the master bedroom of his home.

The master bedroom, where the rifle was kept on a wall-type gun rack, is next to the bathroom where Michael Eric Smith, son of Mrs. Steven Bauder, 457 Crystal Lake Ave., Lake Mary, was shot, said Lee.

The 25-year-old father is a refrigeration serviceman at Bauder Associates in Sanford. The mother, Delores, 34, is a bookkeeper at Northgate Tire Center in Orlando.

Seminole County Medical Examiner Dr. G. V. Garay ruled today the cause of death was due to external hemorrhaging caused by a massive neck wound. Dr. Garay performed an autopsy on the body this morning at Seminole Memorial Hospital.

Lee said the shooting took place at "11:35 p.m.

precisely," Garay pronounced the child dead at 1:30 p.m.

"He had sat down for the noon meal," Lee said today of Eric. "He hadn't eaten but just a little bit when he had to go to the bathroom."

The shooting occurred in the bathroom, according to Lee, not in the bedroom as had been reported earlier.

Lee said he jumped to his feet when he heard the shot and ran to the bathroom. There he found Eric on the floor.

Lee remembers checking Eric to see if he could feel a pulse, he said. However, he was too shaken to tell if the

sheriff's department summoned an ambulance, Lee added.

"They were just playing around," Lee said of the shooting.

Lee, who used the gun for hunting, said his 12-year-old son had accompanied him on hunting trips and was familiar with the use of guns. However, he ruled out the possibility of his son loading the gun.

"Apparently it had to have been loaded, he would not have had time to load the gun," Lee said of his son.

Lee said his son is in a "dazed condition."

"I don't think he can believe it happened," said Lee.

The 12-year-old Lee youth was staying home from Liberty Christian School, 2626 Palmetto Ave., Sanford, because of classroom problems, said his father.

"It wasn't that he was being bad or anything, he just wasn't paying attention to his school work," Lee said of his son's dismissal from classes.

Lee described Eric, as the Smith boy was known, as "one in a million."

"He was just like a member of the family to all of us,"

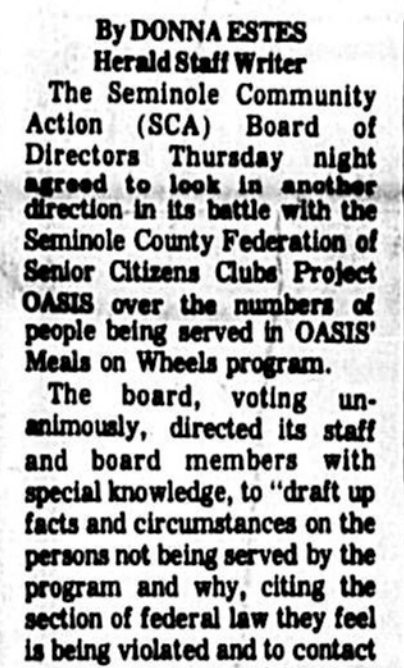

Meals On Wheels Hassle: SCA Looks Toward Legal Remedy

The Seminole Community Action (SCA) Board of Directors Thursday night agreed to look in another direction in its battle with the Seminole County Federation of Senior Citizens Clubs' Project OASIS over the numbers of people being served in OASIS' Meals on Wheels program.

The board, voting unanimously, directed its staff and board members with special knowledge, to "draft up facts and circumstances of the persons not being served by the program and why, citing the section of federal law they feel is being violated and to contact Central Florida Legal Services, asking for a memo on the legal recourse available."

The board over the past several months has discussed gathering this type of documentation together with a memo are to be submitted to the board at its March meeting. The action was taken after a lengthy meeting with Joe

MAHER, director of Project OASIS, and the board over the recent monitoring report compiled by the Area Agency on the Aging (AAA) of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council on the OASIS MOW program.

The AAA several months ago decided not to re-fund (for the year which began Oct. 1) the MOW program conducted by SCA, deciding instead to give the funding to Project OASIS.

At that time the SCA board of directors was assured that all of those household elderly persons who were served by SCA would be picked up by the OASIS program. Since that time reports of the number of persons picked up by OASIS has changed from time to time.

In the meantime, SCA has provided through another MOW program meals to a number of persons dropped by OASIS.

As Maher was explaining how the Project OASIS program is functioning and the number of persons served, SCA board member Dr. Ned Johnson, pointing to the monitoring report, said the numbers didn't add up.

Rev. Amos Jones, SCA executive director, said it was his understanding that no one served by SCA would be left out for the meeting, but said earlier that some not picked up in the MOW program would be served by congregated meals.

MAHER said there are some clients in the Bookertown area who cannot be reached by the

congregate meals bus, insisting that all the people who are qualified are now receiving MOW.

Still questioning the numbers, board member Jerry Cannon suggested Maher was "doing a fast shuffle and looking for excuses" and vice president John Moore asked if there was any possibility the four or more persons still not receiving MOW could be added to the OASIS program.

MAHER said there are no vacancies available.

Meanwhile, Terri Buratt, board secretary, said she has monitored the congregate meals served at the Knights of Columbus building in Sanford by Project OASIS and found that recipients all drove to the site in personally owned vehicles.

"I have had difficulty finding minority persons and the poor being served there," she said, adding the clientele is "lily white and sure as hell are not poor."

MAHER explained that OASIS cannot deliver meals to the Bookertown area because it has only one van.

Andy Knight, who heads the congregate meals program under OASIS was not present for the meeting, but said earlier that some not picked up in the MOW program would be served by congregated meals.

MAHER said there are some clients in the Bookertown area who cannot be reached by the

Board Wants More Info Family Life In Schools?

The concept of a family life program in Seminole County schools is a meeting with almost total approval from school board members.

Although the members stopped short of stating they would actually vote for the program until they get more information they all agreed the concept for the program, which includes sex education, is needed.

All members agreed there should be heavy concentration on teaching students the responsibility of sexual activities but there was differing opinion on whether the subject should be part of the regular curriculum or a separate class of its own.

The Seminole County Chapter of the Florida Alliance for Responsible Adolescent Parenting (FARAP) will be asking the school board to approve such a program at the board's FARAP March 14 meeting.

Included among the recently released proposal is the statement "the content should be a part of the regular curriculum for all students in grades one through 12, to be taught in mixed groups and included within the framework of existing subject areas. The content shall differ in kind and design according to the maturity of the students."

"I believe what should be taught to the boy and girl is what type of responsibilities are involved when they engage in sexual intercourse if they eventually become parents," said board Chairman Robert Feather.

"Today students look at television, see ads and any F.G. movie which have sex denotations and I don't think the school system has any choice but to counteract this presentation of a sexual nature

Iran: Executions And Evacuations

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Four of the shah's top generals, including the former head of the SAVAK secret police, were convicted in a secret trial of crimes ranging from tyranny to torture and executed by firing squad, Iran Radio said today.

The radio identified them as Gen. Mostafaez Nasiri, former head of the shah's hated secret police, SAVAK; Gen. Manucher Khorrami, the former chief of the army paratroopers who was especially hated by Khomeni forces; and the martial law administrators of Tehran and Isfahan, Gen. Mehdi Bahmani and Reza Najfi.

Also, a massive evacuation of Americans and Europeans got under way today when a Pan American Airways jetliner landed at Tehran International Airport to transport all Pan American employees out of the country.

Further flights arranged by the U.S. and British embassies were scheduled Saturday. Heavy fighting was reported in the northwest city of Tabriz between forces of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini and troops still loyal to Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi.

Reports said there were at least 700 dead in the continuing battles.

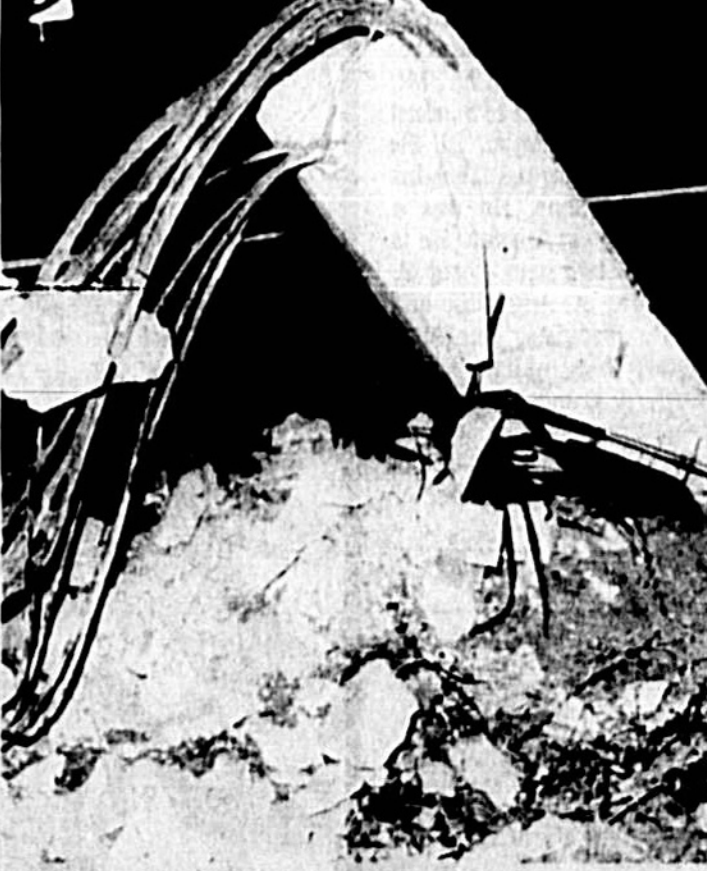
Since religious revolutionaries loyal to Khomeini seized total power Monday they have resumed revaccines of the shah's generals and former ministers. Many of them were expected to be put on trial in the near future.

The most prominent prisoner was former Prime Minister Shapour Bakhtiar, who was forced from office Sunday and later captured by teen-age vigilantes and air force cadets.

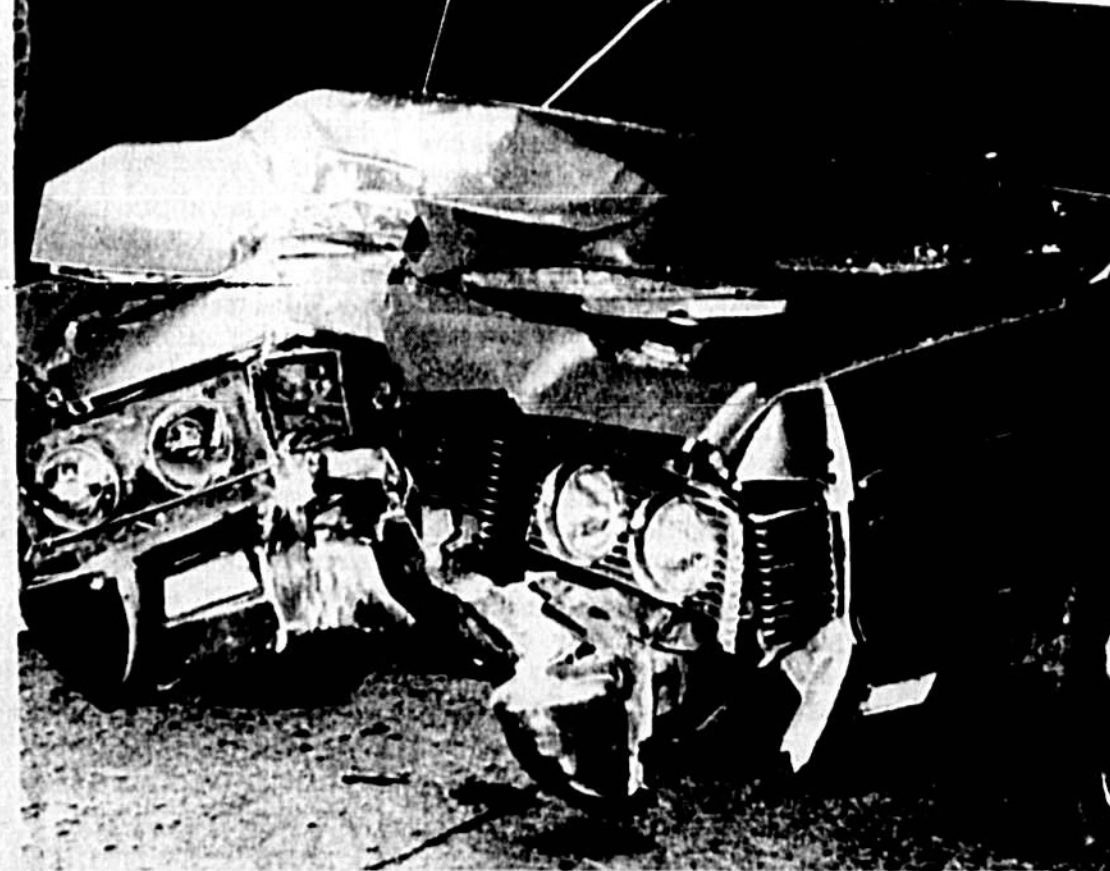
Extremist revolutionaries here demanded Bakhtiar also be put on trial but his old friend, Premier Mehdi Bazargan has been resisting such pressure.

Most of the estimated 15,000 Americans and Europeans were expected to leave the country in the next week. The U.S. Embassy urged all Americans to leave now because they could no longer be guaranteed protection.

Again there was sporadic shooting in Tehran. A heavy fog had erupted outside the office of United Press International.
