Sandra Gallant, coordinator for the Family Support group of Company B., 124th Infantry unit. said, "We plan to have all the spouses and family members meet at the Armory at 11 a.m., to welcome them home.

Gallant said. "When the troops were called to duty, 147 members of the Sanford unit were sent south, but several have returned since then, and we expect 110 will be in the returning group Friday."

She said she has been notified that the unit will leave the Miami area between 6 and 8 a.m., with hopes of arriving home around the noon hour. "We are contacting the Police department." she said. "in the hope that we can get them to provide an escort and make a motorcade out of their arrival."

Crew to take care of road complaints

LAKE MARY - Some construction activity has resumed along Lake Mary Boulevard this morn-

A small crew and equipment arrived ready for maintenance work on the road widening project that has been stalled since July. The work now is centered on maintenance and reducing traffic obstructions, not a resumption of the actual widening project.

Parties argue over candidate

SANFORD - State and local Democrats responded angrily to a GOP charge they are unaympathetic to the suffering of the Bob Starks family by appointing an opponent against him in the House District 34

"That's absurd," said Bill Gilmartin, chairman of the Semi-nole County Democratic Executive Committee. "It's ridiculous to come out with a statement like that. We have always said we are very sympathetic to Mrs. Starks and do not condone violent acts. But 1 would be doing a disservice to the voters of that district if I didn't provide them a choice. Re-electing Bob Starks based on a sympathy vote would be a disservice to Florida."

Gilmartin responded to comments by GOP leaders that they were angered by the Democrat's decision to place an o ponent in inc race after Eric Adam "Rick" Kaplan dropped out last week while facing charges of attempted murder of

"We think it's pretty outrageous that they would do something like this," said Ned Monroe, executive director of the Republican Party of Florida. "Bob Starks and his family have other priorities right now and they do not need to be thinking

about a campaign. [The Democrats] had a chance to screen their candidates. Allegedly, they did not do such a good job." The subject of Monroe's barb was Kaplan, the Casselberry Democrat

accused of attempting to murder his political opponent Starks in the pre-dawn hours of Sept. 27, Starks' wife Judy Starks was wounded by one of five buliets Seminole County investigators say Kaplan fired into Starks' Maitland home.

Although Sanford already had a couple of banks. The Peoples Bank & Trust Company and the First National, Lake founded the Seminole County Bank & Trust Company. He opened for business Sept. 27, 1913. It was located in the Wellborn building at Park Avenue and Commercial. The site later became the location of the Valdez Hotel. Today, it's a parking lot owned by Jeno Paulucei.

Conflict charge sparks school board race

Goff: Strickler's job is a factor

SANFORD - One Seminole County School Board candidate has charged that his opponent, if elected, would become a candidate for removal from office.

Bob Goff said his opponent Larry Strickler has a conflict of interest because he is a manager for Southern Bell. He sald Strickler would have to keep away from so many board votes because of his employment that he will eventually have to be replaced.

'I want to resolve this conflict.' Goff said. "It is a violation of district policy and state statutes."

Some portions of the school dis-trict, including the district offices in Sanford, get their phone service from Southern Bell.

The district recently spent \$125,000 on a new telephone switching system from Southern Bell.

Under state law, if conflict of interest is called too many times. the governor has the option to remove that person from office.

Goff says that he is trying to avoid giving the governor the opportunity to appoint a member of the school board in Seminole County. If his opponent in the race for the

District 4 sent is elected, he said, that is exactly what will happen. Strickler said he is not at all concerned about the allegations.

'I understand conflict of interest," Strickler said yesterday. □See Board, Page 5A

2 airport businesses receive notices to vacate structures

SANFORD - Two Central Florida Regional Airport businesses will relocate elsewhere at the airport after receiving vacate notices from the airport authority Tuesday.

Authority members ordered Express Airways Inc. to vacate the structure in two weeks unless it pays about \$10,000 in past-due rent. If so, it can stay until February. Central Florida Air Maintenance has until February to vacate the structure.

"Wonderful airport, wonderful board, wonderful director," said an angry Express Airways president Harry Deino this morning. "We're debating leaving, but I don't think we have much choice. We have a lot of stuff. What if you were told to move out of your home in two weeks?" your home in two weeks?"

Deino said he was angry that a 13-year

tenant of the airport would be given such short notice. Delno said the company has seven employees at the airport operating and maintaining a fleet of eight cargo aircraft.

Delno admitted his company owed rent, but added "Nobody says anything about the 10 years we were here without a late

payment. It's the times."

Airport director Steve Cooke said the 50-year-old hangar has been a concern for 10 years, but in the last two months, has become a greater problem. The building is infested with termites, he said. And two months ago, one of the 60,000-square-foot building's augment columns, collapsed. building's support columns collapsed,
Cooke said. About the same time, one of the
hangar's huge doors fell down, he said.
"Thank heavens there was no one under
it," Cooke said.

MIAMI — A couple who adopted two abused children gave them back to the state after Hurricane Andrew wrecked their home and huniness, but the state wants a judge to order the family back together.

Alma and Gary Knight — who are now living in a trailer in front of their home in Princeton, just north of Homestead — took their two adopted children, an II-year-old boy and his 7-year-old sister, back to court last month with a suitcase full of clothing.

The state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services calls it abundonment.

"There is such as a thing as criminal abandonment." said Jim Towey, head of HRS's Dade County office. "The law is closs, hurricane or no hurricane."

The Knights are scheduled to appear before a juvenile court judge Oct. 13 for a dependency hearing.

Elderly neglect on rise

TAMPA - Reports of neglect of Florida's elderly and disabled adults are soaring, but abuse allegations are on the decline, a new state study says.

"Although fewer elder Flori-dians were abused in 1991, our older residents were neglected at an astounding rate." Bob Williams, secretary of the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said in the introduction to his agency's third annual adult abuse study. reported in today's editions of

The Tampa Tribune. Allegations of neglect jumped by nearly 3,000, or 11 percent, between 1989-90 and 1991. while abuse reports dropped almost 22 percent, the study

It does not mention a reason for the trends. But Bentley Lipscomb, secretary of the state Department of Elder Affairs, said Wednesday he isn't surprised that reports of neglect are increasing.

The recession and state budget cuts are factors, he said. Also, reductions in case manager staffing and some Medicald-related programs also have hurt.

They are vital programs in precluding people from going over the edge," he said.

The study said that most commonly, the elderly and dis-abled suffered from self-neglect. which is a lack of adequate nutrition, housing or medical care. About half of verified mistreatments in 1991 involved self-neglect, researchers found.

HRS completed investigations on 21,410 reports of adult abuse or neglect last year - 2 percent more than in 1989-90. The agency changed its reporting period from fiscal year to calendar year to comply with a federal

requirement.

The agency confirmed or proposed to confirm just 827 reports, down 40 percent from the 1,385 in 1989-90.

Panic button

Pendant device alerts police if abused woman is threatened signal to an ADT operator in

Women who live in the shadow of domestic abuse now can fight back by hitting a "panic button" pendant that secretly alerts police they are in danger.

Middlesex County officials denationwide, including two in Florida, in trying the Abused Women's Active Response Emergency program, AWARE, in the hope of sparing women from physical abuse. The program was started Tuesday and will operate for six months before it is evaluated for possible long-term use.

Parsippany-based ADT Security Systems developed AWARE and operates the program free of charge. "The women who have re-

ceived the AWARE pendants are

at grave risk, but living in the community." said Jackie Marich, executive director of Women Aware Inc., a shelter for abused women and children in Middlesex County.

"These women all have an order for protection — that's a civil no-contact order — against their assailants," Marich said. "Still, it is not unheard of for an assailant to break into a victim's home and club her to unconaciousness, or worse."

AWARE could have helped

avoid some deadly domestic violence incidents in the county. such as when John J. Arias stormed into the Edison home of his ex-girlfriend, said South River Police Chief Francis Eib. who brought the program to the county after reading about it in a magazine.

That was a domestic violence case that ended in murder," said

Eib, a representative of the New Jersey State Chiefs Association to the governor's Advisory Council on Domestic Violence.

Arias wounded his exgirlfriend and killed her mother in 1991. He was convicted Sept. 22 of Linda M. Galbo's murder and a jury has recommended he serve a life term. Arias has not yet been sentenced.

Elb said he wanted to bring AWARE to his county to help curb the number of domestic violence cases he's seen.

There were 61 murders statewide tied to domestic violence last year, according to the 1991 New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Report. Of that number, there were three murders committed in Middlesex County. Essex County had the highest

number of reported domestic violence incidents in 1991 with

4.862, the report said. There were 3,709 reported domestic violence cases last year in Middlesex County, an increase of 8 percent over 1990, the report said. The report said there were 55,698 domestic abuse cases

statewide last year. Women Aware will decide which women will get panic buttons, said Middlesex County Assistant Prosecutor Raymond Storch.

He said the women who get the panic buttons must pass three requirements: they must be in imminent danger of harm from their spouse or boyfriend. willing to sign a restraining order to keep their abuser away, and willing to testify against their abuser if he is arrested and brought to trial.

When a woman activates the panic button, a security system installed in the home sends a Pennsauken Township. The operator then calls the police. The pendant, worn like a necklace, is 11/2-inches in diame-

ter and has panic buttons on each side. The program was begun in

Montreal in 1990 and was rted this yes he United States in Tampa. Fla. Four other cities already have the program in place: Jacksonville, Fla.; Knoxville, Tenn.; Boston and Seattle.

In Jacksonville, Fla., eight women currently have panic buttons, said Karen Follon, associate director of Hubbard House, a shelter for abused women and children.

"We've been fortunate that none of the women have had to activate the panic button yet." Follon said.

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

Defensible sale

Politics is rarely divorced from any presidential decision in an election year, especially when the president is behind in the polis and struggling hard to close the mp.

So, domestic politics played a role, of course, in President Bush's decision to

approve the sale of fighter aircraft to Saudi Arabia and Taiwan. The thousands of American jobs preserved by this decision should help Bush in Missouri, Texas, California, Connecticut and a score of other states.

Nonetheless, it happens that both sales are quite defensible on their own merits. Indeed, both should advance American interests in two critically important parts of the world. Saudi Arabia is the linchpin of America's

strategic interests in the oil-rich Persian Gulf region. This was demonstrated anew when Saddam Hussein's aggressive adventurism threatened the Saudis. The United States and 30 other nations sent military forces to the Gulf not merely to liberate Kuwait but also to safeguard Saudi Arabia's independence and. with it. Western access to Saudi oil.

The Saudis are still threatened by the militantly anti-American regimes in Iraq and Iran. Both have substantial military forces. and Iran is vigorously expanding and up-grading its arsens. Thus, there is every reason for the United States to sells the Saudis 72 F-15 fighters.

The sale will produce 60 billion in revenue for McDonnell Douglas. The benefits will be shared by McDonnell Douglas workers, the U.S. Treasury and a wide network of subcontractors in many states. The Bush administration calculates the Saudi sale would preserve 40,000 American jobs, including several thousand in California.

larael filed a pro forms objection to the sale.

but is not expected to try blocking it in Congress. The Bush administration accompanied announcement of the Saudi sale with a reaffirmation of its long-standing promise to preserve israel's qualitative edge in advanced technology arms.

The announced sale to Taiwan of 150 F-16A fighters to be built by General Dynamics entails more delicate geopolitics.


Taiwan needs new fighter aircraft to modernize its aging air defenses. Had the F-16s not been approved for sale. Taiwan would have purchased French-built Mirage 2000a instead.

Predictably, Beijing objected to Bush's decision. But the interests of peace and stability in Asia are served by discouraging any thought on the mainland of settling differences with Taiwan by force or intimida-

indeed, communist China and capitalist, democratic Taiwan are quietly building a mutually beneficial commercial relationship. A stronger, more modern air force for Taiwan actually might enhance commercial cooperation even as it helps counter the modern armaments China is now purchasing from Russia and Ukraine.

The \$4 billion F-16 sale also will save thousands of American jobs, beginning with the 3,000 assembly-line workers at the General Dynamics plant in Texas. Moreover, both the F-16 sale and the F-15 deal will bolster a U.S. defense industrial base badly battered by defense cuts. That serves America's national security interests.

Whatever the political considerations in these sales. Bush's decision was fully merited.

Debates can turn up campaign

President Bush's managers deserve a pat on the back (one of the few they have earned this year) for the way in which they have engineered

the presidential debates.

Not long ago the election was, as the saying goes, Cliston's to lose. After having golfed the spring and summer away while the recession hung grimly on and Cliston came from far behind to move well shead, life. Bush simply had to hit a home run at the Republican Convention to get back in the race at all. For a time it appeared that he had done so, but subsequent media criticisms of the Houston convention turned the national perception of it into a net negative for the Bush campaign (a point to which we will return below). Then came Mr. Bush's surprise demand for even more debates than Clinton had requested, and his offer to split the difference on their dispute about the ground rules. Studenly it was Clinton who was on the defensive and calling for negotiations. Now the format and schedule of the debates have been agreed on, and it's almost, if not quite, a brand-new ballgame. The election may still be Clinton's to lose, but the debates have opened up a whole series of new ways in which he can lose it.

For another thing. Clinton (and of course Bush as well) must run the risk of making some borrendous gaffe in full view of 60 or 70 million people. Here Bush's tendency to a nort of verbal dynlexin would appear to put him at a disadvantage. But the very perception of this fact may actually aid Bush and hurt Clinton, if Bush exceeds the public's expectations or

Clinton falls below them. (The same applies, incidentally, to Vice President Quayle. After four years of being portrayed as a totally hapless nerd, he is well positioned to surprise

It's almost, if not quite, a brand-new ballgame.

Lantly, if Itom Perot is allowed to participate in the debates (a point not quite nailed down yet at this writing), the uncertainties will incre almost exponentially. With no serious hope of winning the election himself, Perot can afford to bear down hard on both Bush and Cinton on the tough economic questions that both have ducked. What's more, by doing so Perot will probably maximise his own vote, whatever that may be. There is understandable confusion over which candidate — Bush or Clinton — Perot will have from most beavily on Election Day, but if draw from most heavily on Election Day, but if he succerde in personifying, in the debates, the demand for serious "change," he can hardly help doing considerable damage to Gov. Clinton.

If Perot realizes this, he may try to pull his punches at Clinton in the debates, or even join him in piling on Bush. But there's nothing Americans like better than an underdog. especially when his termentors are both calling for higher taxes and he isn't.

One caveat about the effect of the debates. Our liberal media are (mercifully) not all-powerful. but they are very powerful indeed. As pointed out above, they took a reasonably upbeat Republican Convention and rewrote the public memory of it as an abortion-bashing, homophobic war dance.

George Bush just can't play dumb

We've heard President Bush on Iran-Contra explaining what he didn't know and why he didn't know it.

We've heard President Bush on Iraquate explaining that he never knew all that U.S. intelligence knew about Saddam Hussein's quest for nukes, back when he sent Iraq billions in aid that was diverted to buy weapons, not wheat.

We've heard President Bush's rosy scenario that Economic Re-

covery is Just Around the Corner in 1990, in 1991, in 1992. So if, after hearing

all that, we still vote to re-elect President Bush, we must at least redesign America's presidential seal to reflect our choice. Picture it: A Great American Ostrich, with the cluster of arrows in his left claw, the olive branch in his right and his head in the send.

Amezing, these politicians. They spend their lives in public service, yet

they have no faith in the public they ostensibly serve. They think we can't accept hard truths and make fair judgments about honest mistakes. Just telling us the truth is rarely the option of choice. Playing dumb is. Politicians pretend they just couldn't see even things that were obvious to everybody around them.

Nobody was better at this political craft of playing dumb than Ronald Reagan. Years of playing The Best Friend in Hollywood made him a natural at playing the awshucks president.

Nobody is worse at playing dumb than George Bush. He doesn't know how to do it, doesn't know when to do it - without getting caught.

Consider Iran-Contra. He's insisted he was out of "the loop" as a vice president — didn't know that his administration was paying ransom by selling arms for hostages, didn't know that then-Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and then Secretary of State George Shults had weighed in with heavy objections. But cops, now we have a memo that shows that Weinberger and Shultz talked by phone, saying they were astounded that Bush denied knowing how they'd felt, that Bush was in a meeting where they'd voiced their objections strongly; and Bush sided with Reagan and the others in favor of arms for hostages.

In contrast, the fraqgate affair is a work in progress. As president, Bush approved grain-credit loan guarantees for Iraq prior to the Gulf War, to woo the despotic Saddam. But U.S. intelligence already had ample evidence that Saddam was trying to build a nuclear bomb; agents had tracked Iraqis as they bought parts for a nuclear trigger. Also, the State Department had blasted fraqi crimes in its annual human rights report. Now we have reports that Bush officials may have impeded federal investigators who uncovered evidence that the loans were diverted in part to buy weapons.

A simple 1-meant-well-but-l-goofed would have been preferable. Instead, Bush recently chose a childish tack — trying to say Clinton did it too. When CNN's Larry King asked about the matter, Bush said: "Do you know who wanted to make loans, grain-credit loans and got hold of the ... Iraq ambassador on grain credits? Gov. Clinton.

Does Bush think voters will believe that a governor of Arkansas was in the loop of the U.S. intelligence assessments about Saddam's nuclear thing? Most likely, they'll agree with Clinton, who called Bush's blame-shifting comment "pathetic."

Seminole County didn't actually become a county as such until June of 1913 when Governor Trammel appointed Semi-nole's first officials.

E.A. Douglas was named clerk of the court; T.J. Bates, tax assessor: John D. Jinkins, tax collector: Charlie Hand, sheriff: D.L. Thrusher, superintendent of Public Instruction: B.F. Whitner Sr., county judge; H.C. Dullone, supervisor of voter registration and J.B. Jones, county treasurer. Frank Forster, Professor J. Tilden Jacobs and S.C. Dickson were named to the first school board. And, Trammell named Frank Woodruff Sr., J.T. Mc-Clain, J.A. Clark, L.P. Hagan and C.W. Entsminger to the board of county commissioners.

Even with these appointments, operations didn't get underway until Aug. 5, 1912. The first county offices were located on the third floor of the new Valdez Hotel.

Mayor Lake was honored at a fantastic Fourth of July celebration that year for his part in making the new county a reality. Also honored for his support was State Senstor Arthur E. Donnegan of Kissimmee. And that afternoon just about everybody in town went to Holden Park for baseball game between Orlando and Sanford. Sam Maxwell's city band led the parade and Felix Frank, sports editor of The Herald, was the drummer. The drum, by the way, was carried on the back of Peter Schaal. Frank taught Schaal how to door ballgauers and this jed Pais in become for years and years the afficial statistician for the Central Florida League and the Florida State League.

Shortly after the new county offices opened in the Valdex Hotel, the Sanford Elks Club completed its new brick building several hundred feet north of the hotel. It wasn't until 1918 county officials decided they could no longer operate efficiently in the hotel. World War I had hurt everyone, including the

Elks. Bo, the club sold its handsome building to the county. It became Seminole's first counthouse. It served so such until 1972. It was demoished when the present county courthouse was completed.

The townspeople really got excited May 13, 1913, right after the new county came into existence. B. Bobo Dean, owner of the Mant Metropolis as well as the Detroit Times, published a suggestion that the most logical ce in Florida for the new location of the state capital would be Sanford. This was also published by Holly in The raid and it was all the people could talk about.

At the end of 1913, Senford's tion had reacted 6,580 population had reneited 6,550 and the county, 9,480. The area was beginning to boom. The new two-story Sanford High School at Ninth and Palmetto was built at a cost of \$20,000. The grammar school was at Seventh and Myrile, and the only elementary school was Eastside Primary at Palmetto and Sixth Street.

The Commercial Club - San-ford's original "chamber of commerce," was led by banker Forster of First National. Other members were Frank Miller, George Fernald, Henry McLaulin, T.K. Bates, C.R. Walker, R.C. Maxwell, Sheriff Hand and W.H. Abernathy.

Seen on the streets of Sanford were such autos as Buicks. Alcos, Fords, Duncana, Reos, Flanders, Everetts, Schoochts, EMFs and Overlands. In Nov. 1913, folks paid 50 cents admission to the imperial Theatre (later the Princeso Theatre) to hear Verne Hurt, an ACL telegrapher, receive and announce elections returns. Theodore Roosevelt and William Howard Taft were defeated by Woodrow Wilson.

Having been elected mayor again, Lake led a giant parade through downtown Sanford on Nov. 11, 1918, marking the end of World War I. Lake was still highly popular and his bank was growing like a weed in a pea patch.

One reason for the growth was that Lake saw to it the city's operating funds as well as the town's reserve funds were deposited in the mayor's bank. It was said that Mayor Lake would sit at his big deak near the entrance to the bank and hum the words to "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." Between bars he'd light up and puff on those big black Cuban cigars he had shipped to him from Havana. When he wasn't humming or smoking he was making loans to any and everybody who'd take them. secured or unsecured.



Rejecting charges that he had not "come clean on leanContra." the president said. "I've answered every question. If Bill Clinton would do on the draft what I've done on Iran-Contra, we'd have the facts out

King saked Bush to react to recent stories sizoui Chaton's trip to Moscow in the winter of 1989-70 while he was at Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar.

"To go to Moscow after Russia crushed Czechoslovakia, not remember who you saw - ! really think the answer is, level with the American people, Bush said.

"I'm just concerned about it because it's a pattern here" about Clinton's judgment.

Responding to Bush's charges. Clinton's communications chief George Stephanopoulos said. "It's a pathetic ploy by a desper ate man. He's reading the polls and he's scared. He said he would do anything to get elected and now he's stouping to the lowest form of innuendo."

"Banish fried food and all these canned products with chemicals and preservatives." he said. "Nothing is wrong with meat as long as you don't eat a pound of it."







over 20 years. I'm very active and feel perfectly healthy. I'd like your opinion, though, on my dictary practice of concuming an average of one can per day of sardines, complete with packing oils. Is there any harm in this and are there controls over which waters, polluted or not, can be fished by canneries?

DEAR READER: To a large

degree, the answer to your question depends on the brand of sardines, where the fish were caught and how they were

Pish is beneficial to health. This food contains protein, vitamins, calcium and omega oil. Sardines are no exception, providing they were not netted in polluted waters or canned under unsanitary conditions.
Also, the olive oil used in the processing is not harmful to health and is not prohibited in low-cholesterol diets. Therefore, you'll have to read labels to make sure that the sardines are distributed by a reputable com-pany and that the product doesn't contain inappropriate

additives or ingredients.


DEAR READER: Oral contraceptive pills are associated with a wide range of symptoms that include: elevated blood pressure, headache, depression,

When North was willing to heart ace, South used Blackwood and bid the slam. West led the club 10, East winning with the ace and re-

turning the queen to South's

king.

Declarer saw that he needed to find the diamond queen to make his slam. Rather than blithely assume it was in the hand of the overcaller, he tried to get a count of the hand. After winning with the club king, South led a heart to dummy's ace and ruffed a heart in his hand. He drew two rounds of trumps ending in the dummy; then he ruffed another heart. A club ruff and a third heart ruff followed.

Now South had all the evidence he needed. East was known to have started with two spades, four hearts and six clubs. Ergo, he had only one diamond. Declarer cashed the low cards. Then he tabled his cards with a flourish, saying that he would take the guaranteed diamond finesse through West.
