County to OK Cross Seminole Trail plan

SEMINOLE COUNTY - They don't agree often, but the Cross Seminole Trail issue excites the Board of County Commissioners to no end. Listen, and you'll hear them singing *Happy Trails to You*.

On Tuesday, the Board is expected to unanimously approve joint management and usage agreements for the Cross Seminole/Florida National Scenic Trail Certification Plan. "This is a universally approved project," Commission Chairman Randy Morris said today. "Some extremely hard-working citizens helped make it happen. And before our Cross Seminole Trail was in place, we were included in the National Scenic Trail package."

When the Florida National Scenic Trail is completed it will cover 1,300 miles across the state from the Big Cypress National Preserve in Monroe County to the Gulf Islands National Seashore in Santa Rosa County at the northwestern tip of the state.

The Certification plan the commissioners will execute officially certifies more than nine

miles of existing portions of the Florida Trail through the Econ State Forest and the Spring Hammock Preserve with City of Oviedo and the Cross Seminole Trail.

The commission is also expected to approve joint use agreements between the county and Florida Power & Light Company and MacAsphalt APAC Florida Inc.

It is the county's goal to have the National Certification in place for the announcement by **Please See Trail, Page 4A**

Winter Springs has a different idea for trail

WINTER SPRINGS - While the proposed City of Winter Springs Town Center is gathering praise across Central Florida, some are taking a wait and see attitude.

Case in point, Seminole County planners are in discussion at present with the City of Winter Springs.

On the wait and see front, "We have not had time yet to review the concept," says Colleen Rotella, acting Comprehensive Planning Manager for the county. Rotella goes on to say that the path for the Cross Seminole Trail as currently presented is in a high, dry location. "We need to be careful that if the project doesn't come about, then the trail is left adjacent to wetlands," Rotella also said, this trail could work wonderfully in a downtown setting.

The talks are over the planned realignment of the piece of the Trails property by the City of Winter Springs. This move **Please See Downtown, Page 4A**

Change in county no wake zone

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Words of caution are being expressed by the Seminole County Sheriff's Department. The warning is in regard to water safety.

With the coming of warmer months, it is expected that the vessel traffic on Seminole County lakes will increase drastically. In the past, there have been problems when vessels have been operated in a careless manner too close to the shoreline, docks or swimming areas.

Recently, the Seminole County Commission passed a change to the existing county ordinance that establishes a no-wake zone. As a result of the change, it is now unlawful to operate a vessel, aquaplane or similar device at a speed that creates a wake in any bathing, swimming or launching area.

Sheriff's Lieutenant Jack Cash said the phrase "bathing, swimming or launching area" is defined in the ordinance change as "any area within 50 yards of the shoreline, docks, piers, bridges or boathouses."

OVIDO - Yes, Virginia, Regal Cinema's Oviedo Marketplace 22 will be opening Friday, April 10. After being held up due to electrical wiring problems, the massive cineplex will finally make its debut to awaiting customers.

The new theaters further the trend of bringing a high level of comfort to movie-going. "We're trying to rescreen America," said Jennifer Harris, Regal Cinemas marketing director, of the new wave happening more and more in the construction of movie theaters. Harris said that theater chains are trying to take the public out of their homes and back into theaters to watch movies.

Oviedo Marketplace 22 is lathered in amenities ranging from high back, plush seating with retractable arms to a full service concession stand with gourmet coffee and baked goods. The theaters sport the latest in digital sound and the rows are in stadium formation.

Tickets will be available at the entrance to the theater. However, patrons will have the option of buying two-day advance tickets and even purchasing tickets with credit card. Harris said there may even be kiosks set up at both ends of the Oviedo Marketplace mall in the future for customers to buy tickets.

Rowe: Community development touches everyone

SANFORD - "In one way or another, community development touches everyone," says Sanford Community Development Director Charles Rowe.

Rowe commented on Governor Lawton Chiles' proclamation of the week of April 6 as Community Development Week

in Florida. The designation is part of a nationwide effort to promote the impact community development programs make every day.

"Here in Sanford," Rowe explained, "Community Development involves the Building Department, Code Enforcement, Licensing, Economic Development and a variety of grant programs. We cover code enforcement complaints, occupational licenses, low income home rehabilitation and many other projects including attracting new economic development which helps create more jobs and subsequently helps in the tax base of the city."

Rowe estimated that there probably isn't a citizen of the city who hasn't, in one way or

another, been connected with the activities of the Community Development Department.

State Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Secretary Jim Murley added safe neighborhoods and affordable housing to the work done by the department. "Community Development Week is yet another opportunity for us to find ways to bring even better businesses, create even more jobs and foster self-sustaining communities across the state," he said.

Statewide, since 1991, DCA has provided over \$1 billion to local governments through its Community Development Block Grant Program. Local governments use most of the money to rehabilitate low to moderate **Please See Community, Page 6A**

Rural areas targeted Help for first time homebuyers

The Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta (FHLBA) announced the offering of its 1998 First Time Homebuyer Program (FHP), which provides \$1 million in matching funds to FHLBA member financial institutions for qualifying first-time homebuyers.

Twenty-five percent of this year's funds will be set aside first for rural areas as defined by the Rural Housing Service. FHLBA members serving rural areas exclusively will receive priority until the rural set aside funds have been allocated. The programs are non-competitive and to assure maximum geographic distribution FHP funds will be awarded through a rotation by state lottery process. Members may request an aggregate maximum of \$50,000 of FHP subsidy funds annually.

"In our first year of the program, 478 families in 21 communities became first-time homebuyers," said Paul Hill, president of the FHLBA. "We are proud of our role in providing opportunities for affordable housing through our partnerships with local financial institutions."

Member institutions are encouraged to involve non-profit organizations in the activities of their programs and must provide some form of tangible, measurable contribution to a household's mortgage beyond FHP funds.

The funds can only be used for down payment and closing cost assistance. To qualify prospective homebuyers must:
• have household incomes at or below 80 percent of the area median income;
• complete an eligible homebuyer counseling program approved by the member bank.

FHP applications may be submitted only by financial institutions which are members of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta, and must be received by the FHLBA by April 20. To obtain a copy of the 1998 FHP summary and application, call the automated phone line at (404) 999-5365.

says City of Winter Springs Commissioner as well as chairwoman of Seminole County's Cross Seminole Trails Task Force, Cindy Gennell, "is in the best interest of economic viability. The move will give hikers and equestrians better access."

In addition, the city will also be constructing several supplemental trails of its own, throughout downtown. This is in accordance with a rule by the office of Greenways and Trails, which says that if you take a piece of property, you

must give property of equal value of that amount in dollar value. All this fits in with the city's extensive master plan of creating a downtown area.

Still others are not crazy about the project. At the March 23 city commission meeting, Michael Schrimsher, owner of Schrimsher Properties, which manages much of the property in that area for a group of investors said, "I feel like someone who just built a house to see if the government is going to give me a lot of rules on that property."

Schrimsher went on to say, "If you are going to tell me how to run their property, you might as well buy it, I would

urge the city not to approve this plan unless there is a certain amount of property. Without our support, it will not go."

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Gypsy burglars plague police across the nation

SANFORD - "This isn't a crime alert bulletin. It's an informational alert," said Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Richard Kay of the Crime Prevention Unit. Kay has issued a warning to residents of Central Florida about the continued problem with so-called Gypsy burglars.

"They use so many names and travel across the country so much it's difficult to find them," said Sheriff's Lieutenant John Thorp. "Then too, there has been difficulty in keeping

these people in jail or prosecuting them properly."

Thorp told of one man, who at times has used the name Adomo Mariello. (Most of the names used were extremely difficult to spell or were derivations of names, such as one used by the male, "Krystina.") "He was part of the Los Angeles 20," he said. "This was a group of about 20 individuals arrested in Los Angeles in 1988. He was taken to court and ordered to leave the country. But the deportation never took place, and he was arrested again in 1989 in Canada along with a white female. This time they were using French names.

Thorp ran off a list of aliases used by these two, as well as others who have been involved in similar cases. "With all the aliases, we have no idea what their real names might be," he commented.

He also explained how they were arrested again in 1991, then in 1995 in Pinellas County. "From there they were to be transported to Miami for court," he said, "but somewhere along the line, some of the papers were lost, and she ended up being charged with only a minor count and was let loose for time served."

Kay explained that although there have not been any cases involving the so-called Gypsy burglars in Seminole County in over a year, they are still operating across the nation and may well be in the Central Florida area from time to time.

Last month, the City of Philadelphia arrested four of the gypsies during the commission of "Impositor Burglaries." Some \$1.8 million in cash and an unknown amount of jewelry and coins were recovered from safe deposit boxes. One of those safe deposit boxes was located in Orlando.

Even though the persons were arrested in Pennsylvania, Kay said others, apparently in the organization, attempted to access the Orlando safe deposit box but were unsuccessful.

"What they generally do," Kay said, "is have a box right with them when they commit the burglary, and as soon as they get their loot, they put it in the box and mail it to some other location. That way, if they're caught, there is no evidence on hand."

Kay said he wants to warn Central Florida residents about how this operation works. In the hopes of preventing a recurrence of the crimes, as had been reported in several areas in South Seminole County in the past.

"These crimes are typically committed against the elderly segment of mainstream society (70 to 90) at the victim's residence. The victims are selected by observing them at banks and stores, and following them home or by door knocking in residential neighborhoods where greater numbers of elderly victims are located," he said.

He continued: "The crime is typically committed by a group of 3 to 5 gypsy males. The ruse to gain entry to the victim's residence may be quite varied and even tailored to the location where they are working. Examples include posing as utility workers, cable TV employees, tree trimmers, pest control company employees, etc. Clothing is worn to match whichever ruse is being employed, similar to that worn by bona fide company employees."

"One male will be the contact person. His job will be to distract the victim away from the front door. He may ask the victim to step into the back yard so he may explain what type of work is to be done, or he may simply divert the victim to an area out of sight of the front door."

"Once the victim is isolated, two or three other members of the group enter the residence and commit the crime."

Kay said loot may range from small to very large amounts of cash, jewelry, coin collections and small safes. Members of the group often use portable radios or cell phones to communicate between themselves during the crime.

Many victims have reported a foreign language is spoken. Kay said the language is Romanian (Gypsy). In Florida, many have reported the accent may be Hispanic. Others say Italian or Indian.

Subjects are generally described as swarthy, with dark hair, and medium to heavy set in build.

Deputies say that anyone who believes they may be the victim of such an operation should contact the Sheriff's Office or nearest law enforcement agency as soon as possible.

While there have been no reported cases in Seminole County recently, there is always the possibility that activities could resume at any time.

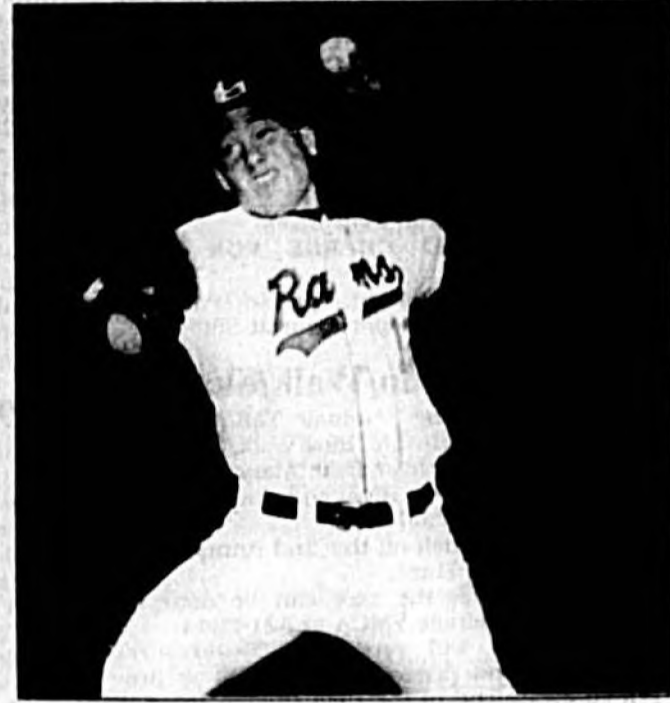

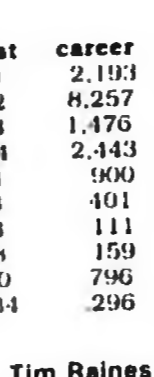

Sunrise service to be held for 72nd year

Public invited to attend service to be held on shores of Big Lake Mary

LAKE MARY - In 1926, on Easter morning, just at sunrise, a small group of Lake Mary citizens gathered at Evansdale Park, the public beach on Lake Mary to worship together and celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The stillness of the morning was not interrupted by the sound of cars or planes, just the occasional call of a bird and the chirp of a cricket.

Every year since, there has been a sunrise service in Lake Mary on Easter morning. Gone are the long dresses and big hats. Still intact is the faith. Still intact is the beauty of the lake.

The services were started by the First Presbyterian Church of Lake Mary, which at the time was called the Community Church. The Rev. James M. Thompson was the first minister to preside over the service. Later the Nazarene church joined in. For many years, it was just these two churches because there were no other churches in Lake Mary. When the Baptist church came into town, they joined in. Those who have been attending the services over the years can only remember it raining once in those 72 years. That Sunday, the ceremony was held in the

then new Baptist church.

The services were moved one year during World War II to the shores of West Crystal Lake. It was a year when a little pagantry was added to the service.

Richard Keogh portrayed Jesus by dressing in a flowing white robe. He got in a small boat and a friend rowed him across the lake to the services. It made quite a vision as the boat floated almost silently through the mist.

Richard's children, asked what they thought about their father taking on this role, said, with characteristic children's honesty, that they were waiting for him to fall in the water.

One local resident, who was known to imbibe a little too much, quit drinking for a week after seeing Jesus, (after the service) outside his window, with his robe swept up over his arm, smoking a cigarette.

After the war, the service was moved back to the shores of Lake Mary. This time, it went not back to Evansdale Park, but to the front yard of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Evans. The home, on 227 Clermont Avenue, is now owned by Claire Evans O'Connor. The services are still held there, on the shores of Lake Mary.

Everyone is invited to attend the services, scheduled for Easter Sunday, April 12 at 7 a.m. (In the years before daylight savings time, the service was usually held at 6 a.m.) Bring your own folding chairs because there are no pews by the lake. This year, the services will be conducted by The Rev. A. F. Stevens of the Lake Mary Presbyterian Church. If you're not familiar with the area, just follow the signs.

Maunder Thursday observance is an important part of Easter Holy Week

SANFORD - The day before Good Friday and the third day before Easter is called Maunder Thursday. It is observed by many major Christian religions throughout the world.

The word Maunder is taken from the Latin word *mandatum*, or French word *mandare*, "to command."

Some explanations of the meaning of the event is related to the ancient custom of washing the feet of the poor on this day, which was taken to be the fulfillment of the "new commandment" (John xiii, 5-34), relating to what is known as The Last Supper.

"Some religions ignore this particular observance," said the Rev. Bruce Scott, pastor of Sanford's First Presbyterian Church, "but they are not getting the full picture of all that happened during Holy Week."

Scott said the Last Supper, (feast of the Passover) as depicted by Leonardo da Vinci's painting, will be portrayed at the Maunder Thursday service in a special event in First Presbyterian Church's Fellowship Hall this evening beginning at 7 p.m.

"We'll have individuals, costumed as each of the disciples of Christ. After they are introduced, each will sit down at a table and reenact the da Vinci painting. Then we'll be offering Holy Communion, with the people on hand able to join in this event."

Some churches hold a Tenebrae service. Tenebrae commemorates the sufferings and death of Christ, often with songs of sorrow sung on the afternoon and evening of the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday prior to Easter, rather than during the following day.

Scott said often lights are extinguished in the church-sanctuary to portray the sadness of the crucifixion.

In addition to Presbyterian, Scott said others observing Maunder Thursday include Lutheran, Episcopal, Methodist, and other liturgical churches.

The event this evening at First Presbyterian Church, 301 S. Oak Avenue in Sanford, is open to everyone.

It does not take someone with a bad, pessimistic, morbid outlook on life to admit to a gross understatement that "this life doesn't always go well."

The immediate response from the recent Jonesboro, Arkansas tragedy was "total shock," "disbelief," and a "flood of questions" that could seemingly never be answered in a rational way. Within a few days, however, when reason moved somewhat beyond emotional chaos, the headlines read: "In a few hours, misfits became killers" and "No one had paid attention to Jonesboro boys' threats." Reading the headlines and between the lines, one could hear: "These things don't just happen; they have causes and motivations." Whatever the causes or whatever the motivations, the event still leaves emptiness, loss and hurtful, resentful feelings. Why me? Why us? Why Jonesboro—a family oriented town where people speak of a community of faith? The saga progresses and the headlines read: "With songs, mementos and prayers, mourners said good-bye to two girls and a heroic teacher killed at their school." After a week's media coverage, the headlines read: "Jonesboro finds 'solace' at church." Indeed, it is true, "solace" (alleviation of grief) is found in the "resurrected" Lord!

Death comes like a ruthless thief, snatching away a treasured presence and much of the time leaving only hollow memories. Tragedies happen in lives daily in a hundred ways and more. What is the ultimate answer to pain, disease, heartache and trouble? Where is hope for the blind, paralyzed, and the family who has lost a child by death? What can be said when a widow stands beside the grave—feeling and sensing a total emptiness?

With the above life stories—enter Easter—the miraculous celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ!

Resurrection Sunday is every Sunday; yet, Easter is the time the masses give attention to the resurrection. The resurrection is, indeed, what makes the Christian faith unique. No other religious claims its founder has returned from the grave and is now seated at the right hand of God in the heavens. Indeed, there is a resurrection of hope. Hope in God, trust in God—nothing is too difficult for Him!

Easter's history & traditions

Easter history
 Easter and Pentecost, two of Christianity's most important holy days, have their origins in the Jewish festivals of Passover and Shavuot. Indeed, many early Jewish Christians continued not only to observe the Sabbath, or Saturday, as a holyday, they also continued to celebrate the Jewish festivals. In time, however, these festival observances were transformed into commemorations of New Testament events.

When the church began to celebrate Easter in the second century, there was disagreement over whether it should be kept on Passover or consistently on a Sunday. But the Council of Nicea in A.D. 325 fixed the date as the Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal, or spring, equinox. Thus, the Jewish and Christian holidays were separated, though they continued to fall close together and occasionally on the same day. The link between Passover and Easter is preserved in such names for the Christian holiday as Pasqua (Italian), Pascua (Spanish), and Paques (French).

Holy Week
 How are the days from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday linked to Jesus' story? Hearing that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem (JN. 12:13) Passover pilgrims "took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him," Mark relates that on Jesus' arrival (MK. 11:8-9) "many spread their garments on the road, and others spread leafy branches which they had cut from the fields," and cries of "Hosanna!" filled the air. So began the first day of Jesus' last week, observed today as Palm Sunday. Gradually, the commemoration of Jesus' death and resurrection expanded to an entire holyweek that starts with Palm Sunday, Maundy, or Holy Thursday, marks the Last Supper; Good Friday,

Jesus' death on the cross; Holy Saturday, a day of vigil; and Easter Sunday, His resurrection, the joyous confirmation of Christ's divinity.
Good Friday
 Why is the Friday before Easter called Good Friday? There is no single, widely accepted explanation of why the most solemn day of the Christian liturgical calendar-the commemoration of Jesus' death on the cross - came to be called Good Friday. Some claim that good is a corruption of God and that the name was actually God's Friday. Others hold that good refers to the belief that Christ died for the good of mankind, for human salvation from sin. A third theory states that good is an archaic term for holy; a fourth, that good was a euphemism for bad. Not until the fourth century was Good Friday observed apart from Easter. Early names were the Festival of the Crucifixion and Day of Salvation. Today in France, Italy, and Spain, it is called Holy Friday; in Greece, Holy, or Great, Friday.

Easter traditions
 Many Easter customs come from the Old World. The white lily, the symbol of the resurrection, is the special Easter flower which stands for purity. Artists for centuries have pictured the Angel Gabriel coming to the Virgin Mary with a spray of lilies in his hand, to announce that she is to be the mother of the Christ Child. The lily is also the sign of the Resurrection. The lovely white Madonna lily was used for years as the Easter lily. It often failed to bloom in time for Easter, however, and so Bremuda lilies were substituted.
 Rabbits and colored eggs have come from pagan antiquity as symbols of new life. Easter Monday egg rolling, a custom of European origin, has become a tradition on the lawn of the White House.
