Mysteriously revived Boston Braves furnished most of the runs in the big league yesterday when, for the third time, they stopped the New York Yankees. Ed Brandt held the other heavy hitters gathered by the Yankees for the penultimate to five measly hits, struck out seven of them. The game went at it carefully, with a run in the second, two in the fifth, and, with the score 3 and 3 against them, they were victorious by pound-throwing Denny Vance for four runs, three hits and a walk, and Charlie Gehringer for four runs, three hits and a walk over the last field fence with two on base in the seventh.

Keeping pace with the Braves in the fifth and seventh innings, scoring five and seven runs respectively to severely trounce the Phillies, 14 to 4. McGraw's team batted off 20 hits off four pitchers, J. Elliott, Schebler, Egan and Fallenstein, while the Braves got but nine off old Cleveland Mitchell. Young Mel Ott led the Giant attack with four out of five hits.

A resounding eighth inning was run by George Grantham and the right field bloschers of the Pirates their first win of the season, for since Lloyd Motter was on the base, two runs came over, and it made the score 6 to 3. The Cubs got nine hits, but the pitcher did not last long, and a last batting round left 12 Cubs on the base, while the Pirates, while Blalock, Johnson and Malone had to go to the mill for the Cubs.

CARNERA IS NOW FREE TO BATTLE WHERE HE WILLS

NEW YORK, Apr. 17.—(AP)—The shackles were stripped from the wrists of Primo Carnera by the New York state athletic commission Thursday and for the first time in a year, statically speaking, he was a free man again. The solemn fathers lifted the suspension that was hung over the Italian giant since April 30, 1933, without a word of explanation. Carnera now is free to fight Jack Sharkey for Jimmy Johnston at Ebbets field July 10 on a huge charity card, but Madison Square Garden insists that it has a prior lien on his services. While Johnston is expected to announce definitely that he has closed the Carnera-Sharkey match, the Garden, on behalf of its Illinois subsidiary, already has served notice to all parties concerned that it holds a contract calling for Primo to fight no one but the winner of the Max Schmelling-Young Stribling heavy-weight title go in Cleveland. 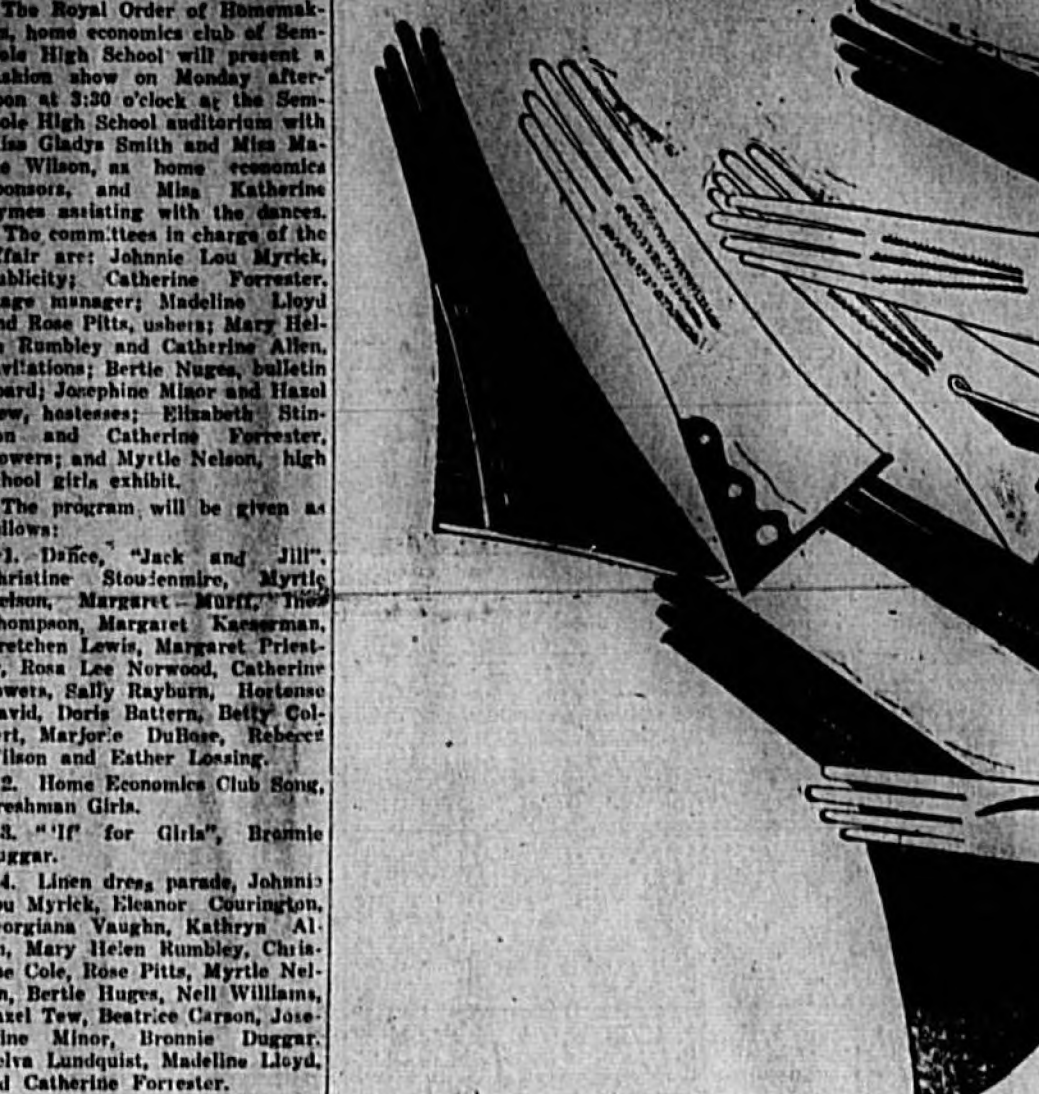
