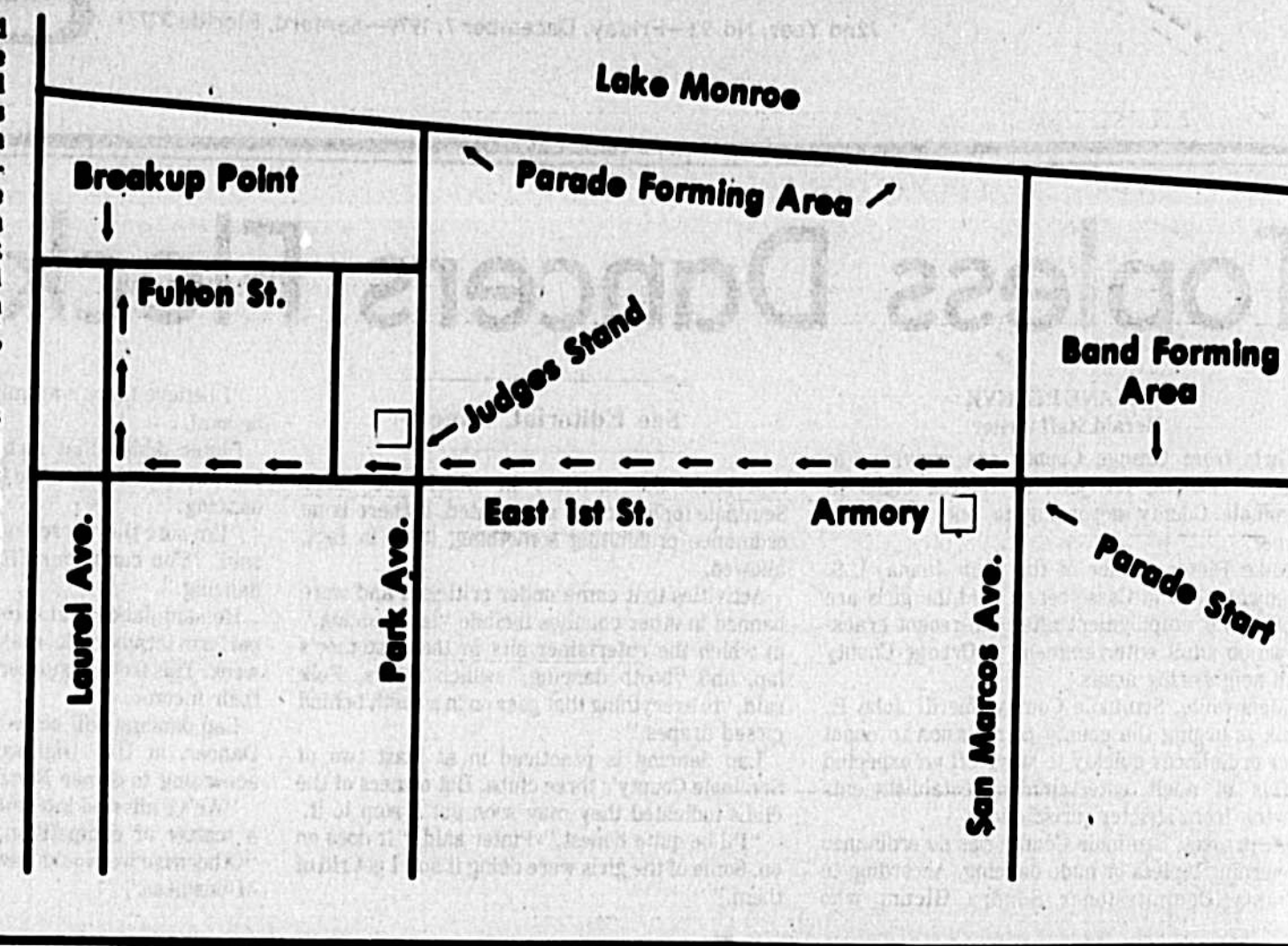

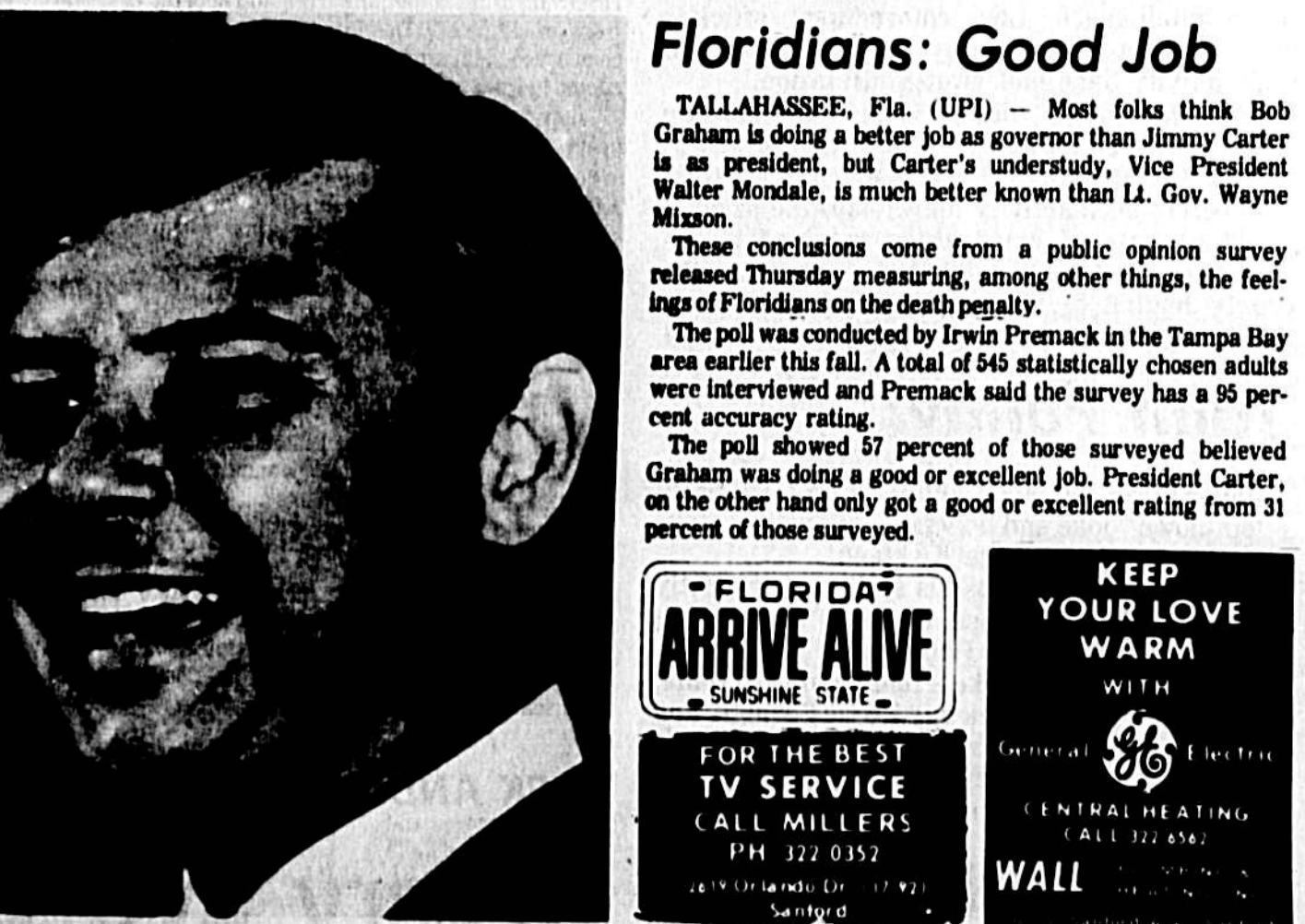

Your Rifles, Step Into The Past

Through the pine trees marched soldiers of the East Florida Rangers. Next to them, scarlet coats brilliant in the morning sun, stepped troops of His Majesty's 60th Royal Infantry of Foot, muskets and bayonets held at the ready.

History seemed to stop and reverse itself some 200 years at Lakeview Middle School recently when seven members of the Historic Florida Militia gave a talk and demonstration of what it was like to be British troops and settlers in Florida during colonial days.

Members of the Orlando chapter, through the Dividends program, came to the school dressed as British soldiers complete with flintlock muskets. The group re-enacts Florida history and its 50 members have costumes from the Spanish occupation of the mid 1500s, through the Revolutionary and Civil wars, up to the late 1800s.

Interested people are encouraged to join the group, pick a period of Florida history they like and jump back in time. "We like to help inform people of Florida history," said group spokesman Roger Lancaster, who can be reached in Orlando at 209-295-7049, "and to give them more information as to what happened, how it happened, when and why."

Members make or buy their own costumes and they try to be as authentic as possible down to the smallest details. One member laughed and said he would recommend anyone just starting to become a Confederate soldier because it is the cheapest.



Carter To Use Food As Weapon In Iran?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter believes Iran is suffering a massive shortage of imported goods and thinks he must consider a food embargo as one option that might lead to release of the hostages. It was learned today.

Carter also recognizes the Iranian crisis has helped his standing in political polls and thinks it has disproven Sen. Edward Kennedy's charges that he lacks ability to lead America.

Carter's detailed views on the crisis were learned under White House ground rules forbidding attribution of the source. The president has decided he must consider withholding American food shipments from Iran, but is not singling out that option above others at this point.

He does not feel the crisis has eased substantially, but does feel confident of his ability to deal with it, it was learned. He is grateful for the widespread support he feels American allies have given in the United States.

It is also known that Carter believes: —America's seizure of Iranian assets in the United States already has made it all but impossible for Iran to import American goods.

—Insurance rates for shipments to Iran have quadrupled and the nation has suffered a decline in imports ranging between 65 percent and 80 percent.

In Iran, the government said it soon would establish an international commission to investigate American "espionage crimes" in the country and would present some of the American hostages to the panel.

Foreign Minister Sadegh Qotbzadeh said in a statement published in local newspapers today the international commission would expose "imperialist and Zionist crimes in Iran and the world."

The commission would help Iran show "to the deprived of the world what American imperialism and international Zionism does to weak nations," the statement said.

In addition, the commission would investigate the crimes of some hostages, and all American crimes in Iran since 1953, the year Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi was restored to power with U.S. support after a brief exile.

Iran: The Real Story

'An Entebbe-Type Raid Would Not Work,' Says Local Woman Who Visited Country

When the three wise men left for Bethlehem, it depleted the intelligence resources of Persia.

Will Rogers never met a Persian.

These were popular American slogans when Rene Johnson, new management analyst for the Seminole County Human Services Department, was working in Iran.

Part of what was once called Persia is now Iran.

"In Iran, Americans found it very difficult to cope," Ms. Johnson said, "because Iranians are not logical people."

"I never saw logic applied," she said. "Only pride. They are volatile, reactionary people."

That's why in her opinion, it is impossible to predict what the Iranians will do with the American hostages.

Ms. Johnson has a bachelor's degree in social work and is near completion of a master's degree in public policy. She spent a year and half in Isfahan, a city in central Iran, and left in November, 1978, just as the revolution that put Ayatollah Khomeini in power was getting started.

Being split on in the street and called names convinced her that it was time to leave, she said.

"Historically, the people from the area that is now Iran led the world," she said. "They developed the Hammurabi Code. But they don't know they're not leaders of the world anymore."

Ms. Johnson said even when Iranians came to the U.S. for their technical training, they lose the skills they learned when they return to Iran.

Even Iranian doctors trained in the U.S. lose their skills when they return, she said.

Although her job in Iran was running a teen center for dependents of Americans working in that country, she lived among Iranians and said she feels she got to know what they were like.

"I went to Iran because I wanted to see what the Middle East was like. I didn't like it," she said.

Iranians had two alternative attitudes to Americans when she was there, she said.

"Either they didn't want any part of you or they smothered you. If they liked you they would not leave you alone."

Ms. Johnson said she firmly believes the Iranian student's actions are being orchestrated by the Iranian government.

"Someone had to have given Khomeini the idea to," she said.

"When I was in Iran," she explained, "the story was that Khomeini held a personal grudge against the Shah and the Shah's father. In 1978, while Khomeini was in exile in Iraq, tapes were played in the mosques to incite people to demonstrate against the Shah."

"Middle-class Iranians told me these demonstrations were led by Communist supporters of Khomeini. These Communists went to the students and gave them their goals and objectives."

"Persians have got to be the most vindictive people in the world. They hold a grudge until they get even and Khomeini has not fulfilled his dream of getting even with the Shah."

The Shah was definitely better for Iran than Khomeini, Ms. Johnson said.

"By our standards, the Shah did some inhumane things. But there was 6 percent unemployment in Iran when I left and now the unemployment rate is 60 percent."

The Shah also established a system of public hospitals and public schools. Before the Shah, only children of the rich went to school. He also began a social service system.

"Crosses the Shah had money and liked the things money could buy, but under the Shah a middle class developed, where before people were only very poor or very rich."

Middle-class Iranians are not pro-Khomeini, she said.

"Two months ago one of my friends called a friend in Iran and was told there are demonstrations against Khomeini in areas outside of Tehran."

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Leland: Poor Should Use Ballot Box

U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, warned in a speech Friday night that the nation's underemployed and unemployed are "in trouble from all the rhetoric" taking place in the nation today.

Speaking to the more than 800 persons attending the 8th annual BEEDCO (Baltimore Economic Development Corp.) Friends Inquest, Leland said the rhetoric of "slapping inflation, reducing the budget and cutting up military spending" is absurd.

The plan to spend "118 billion for national defense in 1981 to develop greater nuclear capability to destroy other human beings," Leland said. "We could take \$8 billion out of the military budget and still be the most powerful nation in the world."

The request of safety that will suffer from the historic Leland said, are the poor and the senior citizens as social programs are cut.

"In the 1970's we were being told to just surrender up by our politicians," Leland said, "and the civil rights activists Dick Gregory's response was, 'We have no balls.'"

"Pointing out weakness, but when John Leland said, 'Let us build our own plant to manufacture balls and we'll sell the balls to our own people and come to you (the other 1979)'"

Leland said the gathering was his brother worked in a garment making \$30-40 per week to support his brother and his, while going to college at the same time.

"She got a teaching job, a year after she graduated from college, and raised her sons with integrity and morality," he said. He added his mother got both his brother and him through college to earn pharmacy degrees.

The congressman said during the late 1960's he had known as a revolutionary and a radical. Watching the difficulties encountered by Dr. Martin Luther King and his non-violent movement, Leland said he became very militant in his own rhetoric.

But when Dr. King was killed, "his teachings were more inspiring and I knew if we were going to survive, we had to forgive our enemies, co-exist peacefully and enter into the system so we could produce as a people," he said.

"I served six years in the Texas Legislature and then returned I was going to Washington," Leland said. Asked by a member of the press why he wanted to serve in the Congress, Leland said he responded that he wanted to be president of the United States someday and "Why not?" he asked Friday night's audience.

"Why is it so absurd that any black person would aspire to be the president of the United States?" Leland asked the new media for the belief among Americans that the trend in the country is to conservatism saying reaction to that takes itself too close to the centerline in the White House to consider on cutting back federal funds for the poor and senior citizens.

"We are not moving to the right. We are not declaring

we want conservatism to be the mark of today," Leland insisted. "It is the few who are standing up — the same ones who called Martin Luther King names — who are preaching this."

"Where is the morality and ideals in the body politic today? If I run to get elected in perpetuity what good would I be to my constituents?" he asked.

Leland said the one positive thing the Ayatollah Khomeini has done is pull Americans together. "After all this flaccid is over, I hope we can continue as Americans together, working to fulfill the promises of the U.S. Constitution," he said.

Leland urged the press to let their voices be heard at the ballot box, saying he is appalled that so few young people are voting.

To conclude his talk, he urged that all pray for peace. "And take the hand of the someone next to you and tell him you love him," he said.

Entertainment for the event was provided by the Edward Waters College Concert Chorus.

Horace Orr, president and executive director of BEEDCO, announced that Leland asked that the honorarium, which would have been given to him as the keynote speaker be donated instead to two Houston charitable organizations, the Edward Waters College Foundation and to the Rev. Anne Jones Educational Foundation.

The foundation annually awards college scholarships to deserving high school graduates. Jones is chairman of the BEEDCO board and the organization's founder.
