

Conference On Strike At Ford Plant Delayed

Violent Fighting Occurs Near Closed Plant In Detroit; 4 Men Are Beaten Pickets Injured By Union Auto Car Chasing Negroes Runs Into Group, Witnesses Declare

DETROIT, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Violent but isolated outbreaks of fighting occurred near the strike-closed Ford Motor Company plant today and Governor Murray D. Van Wageningen announced that resumption of mediation conferences with the C. I. O. and company officials had been postponed.

Four negroes in an automobile were beaten severely by union pickets who chased them nearly a mile from the main plant gate. Three of the pickets were struck down as the car following the negroes machine ploughed through a fighting group at a speed reported by witnesses at 40 miles an hour.

One picket asserted he was stabbed in the stomach. Swift mediation efforts in the strike paralyzed the Ford Motor plant today. "The Ford Motor Company has a plan for settlement," last night some after state police were stationed in the plant area.

Detroit Mediator James F. Dwyer, two hours after sleeping one of a plane on a hurried flight to Detroit, announced the plan. It was estimated in a 75-minute conference with Governor Van Wageningen and C. I. O. officials that the strike would be called off by 11 o'clock last night.

Although Dwyer declined to say more, his statements were interpreted to mean that the C. I. O. leaders had agreed with him on a definite program. Conferees had included August Schmitt, state director of the C. I. O., and Walter Reuther, president of the International Executive Board.

Later a committee of five representatives of the Ford Company entered the Ford plant today. The Ford Company officials were accompanied by Harry Morgan, a company official. Two others were identified as Elmer Hogan and James Braxton Reynolds, C. I. O. representatives.

MARINE RECRUITING OFFICE IS OPENED

Prompt Recall Of Italian Is Asked By U.S.

Fascist Naval Official In Washington Thought Connected With Ship Sabotage

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(AP)—The United States demanded today the immediate recall of the Italian naval attaché in Washington, Admiral Alberto Lais, on the grounds that he was connected with the sabotaging of Italian ships in this country.

Secretary of State Hull sent a note to this effect to the Italian Ambassador, Prince Colonna, an order of President Roosevelt, who had decided the continued presence of Admiral Lais "would no longer be agreeable to this government."

Secretary Morgenthau said today he and Attorney General Robert H. Jackson were "studying" the incident in order to take prompt action against the Italian attaché in Washington, D. C., and the Italian vessels seized last week-end.

The 1917 law under which the Axis ships were seized because of sabotage by the crews provides that the government may ask forfeiture of the ships as a penalty of sabotage.

Asked whether the ships of any other nation might be taken into custody, Morgenthau replied that an advance notice of such an action could be given if it was contemplated.

HUNGARIAN PREMIER DIES UNEXPECTEDLY

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Couda Pal Teleki, 65-year-old premier of Hungary, died unexpectedly during the night. The Hungarian cabinet was said today to have resigned as a result. The foreign office said the death was caused by a heart ailment.

United Yugoslavia Faces Threat Of Nazi Invasion

Germans Report Heavy Blows On Enemy Shipping

Fascists, Nazis Claim New Successes In North African War

BERLIN, Apr. 3.—(AP)—The German navy operating in the Atlantic sank 367,800 tons of merchant shipping from Mar. 16 to 23 in one of the heaviest series of bows yet claimed against British shipping, informed a German official today.

Coupled with this report, the High Command announced that German and Italian troops had scored new land successes in North Africa with the recapture of Argadda, in northwestern Libya.

The British minimized this land engagement between 30,000 and 40,000 Italian soldiers, the beaten remnants of the Fascist army in Eritrea, are fleeing southward toward Addis Ababa, Ethiopian capital, as fast as they can. British military sources said last night.

The only major point left in the Italian flag in Mesania, Red Sea port and that city was described as on the brink of capitulation.

The Fascists reported leaving 600 other Italian troops virtually isolated in Ethiopia are all the Italia troops left to fight in East Africa.

City News Briefs

Legislation To Amend Sanford's Charter Is Discussed By Group Of Citizens And Representatives

Proposed changes in the City Charter, including one providing for the election of a Mayor by popular vote, were discussed at a meeting in the City Hall last night by a group of about 60 persons and this district's representatives to the Legislature State Senator E. F. Householder, and John G. Leonardy and E. E. Brady, representatives.

The meeting was held at the invitation of the legislators, who said they wished to sound out public sentiment on the bills before they left for the opening of the Legislature on Tuesday.

Four of the bills discussed had been advertised. The other proposals, to change the present method whereby the City Commission elects the Mayor and the terms of the Commission members are staggered, was brought up for the first time without having been previously advertised.

Two changes in the Commission setup were suggested in bills that had been drawn up and that were read at the meeting. One provides that the Mayor be elected at a general election for a term of three years, two Commissioners elected for a term of two years each, and two other Commissioners elected for terms of one year each.

The alternative bill provides that the Mayor and all the members of the Commission would be elected by popular vote at one time for two-year terms each.

The consensus of those at the meeting who voiced their opinions favored having the people elect their Mayor, but supported the present method of having the terms of the Commissioners staggered.

Much of the discussion of the other four bills centered around the question of whether it was wise for the City to pass any further tax measures, and what benefits would accrue from the bills.

Several of those present suggested that a referendum should be held on the proposed amendments to determine public opinion.

Fears Of Attack Are Increased By Outbursts Over Radio

ROME, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Virginia Gavia, leading Fascist editorial spokesman, asserted today Germany and Italy are hungry for bound to respect Yugoslavia's territorial integrity and political independence as was guaranteed when the former Belgrade regime signed the Axis pact.

War alarms reached a vibrant pitch in the Balkans today as Adolf Hitler called home the German legation staff in Belgrade.

Diplomatic circles asserted the Nazi Fuehrer had apparently decided that war with Yugoslavia was inevitable.

In neighboring Hungary the Hungarian government was reported to have resigned following the mysterious death of Premier Count Pal Teleki, known for his pro-British sympathies. The foreign office said he died of a heart ailment.

German motorized "Hitler" forces were reported missing in large numbers on the Rumania frontier less than 50 miles from Belgrade. (Other East Nazi divisions continued on Page 21A1)

Matsuoka, Axis Heads Agree On Action Plan

ROME, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuoka has agreed with Premier Mussolini and Adolf Hitler on a joint plan of action against the United States in the event of American involvement—declared or undecided—in hostilities against the Axis powers, authoritative Italian sources indicated yesterday.

The Japanese statesman said goodbye to Mussolini before returning tomorrow to Berlin for further conferences with Hitler.

He also talked yesterday with Pope Pius XII at a 45-minute interview at the Vatican, one of the longest any statesman has ever had with the pontiff. There is a portion to know and they surveyed the whole world situation.

First Week In September Called Best Time For German Invasion

By MORGAN M. BEATTY WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(AP)—Canvass the best military, economic and diplomatic opinion on the side of the Atlantic and you get a picture of Germany attempting an all-out invasion of the British Isles along a fairly definite pattern. And you also find odds about 3 to 2 against an all-out attempt this year. If the Germans should try it, however, the first week in September affords the most auspicious combination of advantages from their point of view. The odds as reckoned here are a little higher than 2 to 1 that the invasion attempt would attempt fall. Most expert accept the general thesis that the Germans will first loose their submarines and planes on the British. In fact the battle of the Atlantic already has started, and the stepped-up air Battle of Britain should begin about mid-April. Meanwhile, the Nazis use Axis diplomacy and force along the British lifelines to divert as much empire strength as possible to those danger points. In the opinion of observers here— If the submarines and their helping plane eyes threaten the British Isles with strangulation, and if air attack shows signs of breaking British morale, and if thrusts at empire lifelines succeed, Then—and only then—should a prudent German high command consider all-out invasion. But Nevertheless, Hitler should be prepared for the odds, and have a huge army to spring from the invasion coast of France anytime between April 1 and Sept. 30. On the other hand there are three stark, compelling reasons why the Nazis might throw caution to the winds and attack this summer. 1. Germany must feed several hundred millions of people in conquered Europe. Diet deficiency among these people already ranges close to 50 percent by official Nazi reports. The Germans must break the blockade soon. 2. American aid is mounting fast. 3. Except for war industry, economic stagnation is admittedly general over Europe. Peacetime work must be resumed before people can receive money for work and afford the necessities of life. The weather should go a long way to dictate the timing of the German attack. The best weather has been for major factor with German military leaders. The battle of the Atlantic, in line with this weather factor theory, was launched about Mar. 1. The ideal weather is clear, white caps hide periscopes, torpedo wakes. Spring air attacks should start in April as land storms subside and generally milder conditions prevail. The ideal period for land invasion is the first week in September. It's usually extremely

Fertilizer Increases Returns On Tobacco

GAINESVILLE, Apr. 3.—(Special)—Florida bright leaf tobacco farmers may obtain better yields and returns from their allotte decrease by proper use of fertilizers, according to W. E. Stokes, State Experiment Station agronomist. Application of 1,000 pounds of a 3-5-5, 3-5-5 to the acre in the drill row before planting is recommended by the Experiment Station workers. If a 3-5-5 or 3-5-5 is used for this purpose, however, the farmer will find it profitable to side-dress with 100 pounds of sulphate of potash to the acre not later than three weeks after the plants have been set in the field, he pointed out. "Coinciding with results obtained by research workers in other tobacco-growing states, our fertilizer experiments with bright tobacco have indicated definitely that a fertilizer containing a relatively high percentage of potash will produce better yields and returns per acre," Stokes said. If a 3-5-5, at the rate of 1,000 pounds per acre, is applied in the drill row prior to planting and thoroughly mixed with the soil to prevent injury to the plants, no additional potash will be needed, but a potash side-dressing within three weeks after planting has been found decidedly beneficial and profitable when mixtures containing less than 5 percent potash have been used in the initial application. This inspection drive, Mr. Thomas said, is the result of an agreement last fall between the Division and the Florida Citrus Growers Association, whereby the Association undertook a self-enforcement campaign among its members, the industry-wide inspection by the Division to follow as the citrus season neared its close.

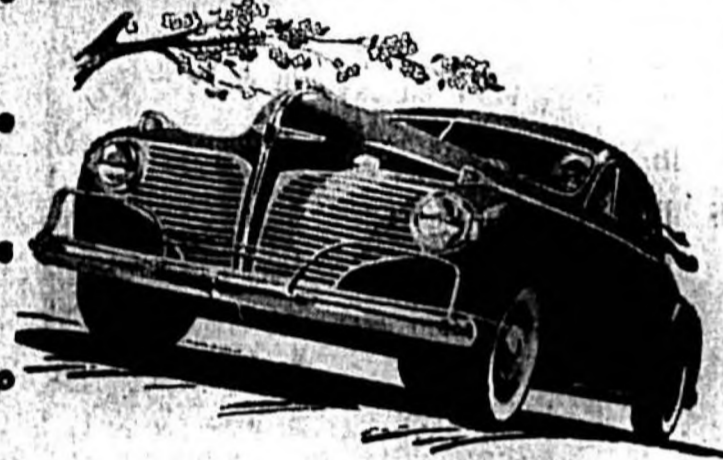

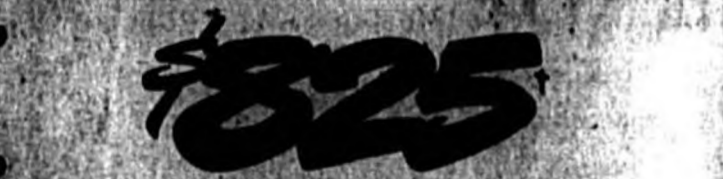

CAA Plans To Spend \$4,000,000 In Florida

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration plans to spend \$4,852,942 in Florida airport projects during the year beginning July 1.

The program, subject to congressional approval of budget estimates, was submitted recently to the House Appropriations Committee. The record of hearings was made public yesterday.

The Florida fund would be used to complete 15 of the 16 projects undertaken during this fiscal year but would not include six new projects. CAA officials declined to state the locations of the new projects, explaining this information could be withheld until the financing arrangement was complete.

Senate Okeys Bill For Canker Fight

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—(AP)—The Senate, overruling the budget bureau, wrote into the agriculture appropriation bill yesterday a \$1,125,000 item for citrus canker eradication activities during the year beginning July 1.

Funds for this purpose had been omitted from budget bureau estimates. It was restored by the Senate Appropriations Committee at the urging of Florida senators.

The league, it is expected, will give professional football a setup similar to that under which the American Association rules professional baseball.

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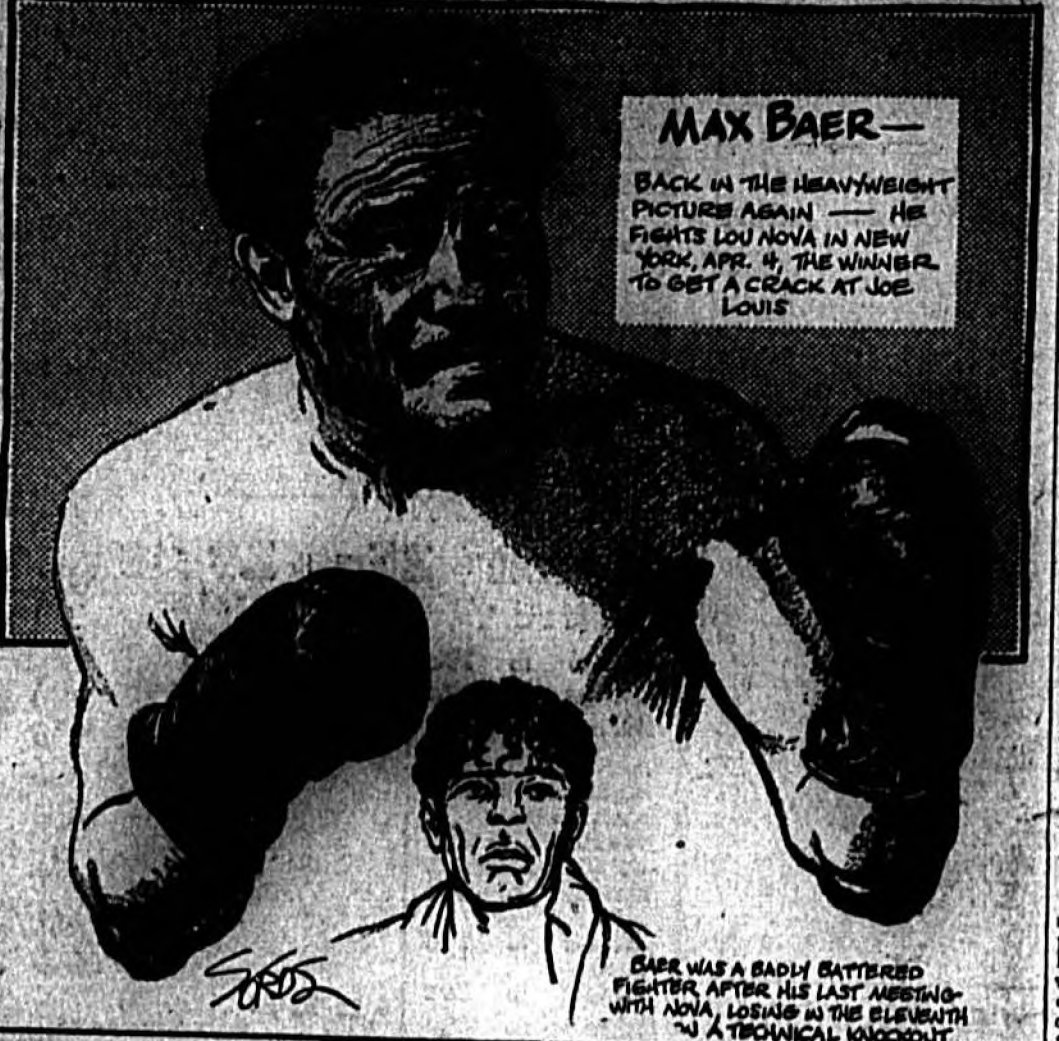

Lou was a standout then and Max apparently was finished, but the picture has changed. Lou became ill, was badly mauled by Tony Galento and was bed-ridden for weeks. After months of inactivity, Nova regained his health and returned to the ring. His first serious opponent was Pat Comiskey and he gave Pat a lashing. He's back in the ring again but they've ordered him to tackle a rejuvenated

Max before getting the title chance.

Joe came out of retirement to technically knock out Galeotti. Then Max exploded the Conis bay ballon with a first round knockout.

So Lou and Max are back just where they were two years ago. The winner will be offered Louis. That is, if Joe gets by Tony Musto, Abe Simon and Billy Conn.

Joe had trouble with Red Burman, looked off form against Gus Dorazio and had his hands full against big Abe Simon. Simon, who went 12 rounds before being knocked out by Jim Braddock, was a champion before he was beaten by Nova and Buddy Baur.
