 ed. Our wealth had been great beyond measure. This wealth, we predicted, must be brought back. We still lagged in our hearts the delusion that we all could be rich without working. We shut our eyes to the fact that our whole economic structure had been undermined.

Some say that the ancient system has broken down. It hasn't. In our madness we loaded it beyond its capacity to carry. Positionism is still a common word, yet positionism always follows on the heels of such delusions as we have gone through. Our delusions of unending wealth have given place to delusions of unending gloom. One is as unreal as the other.

The time has come for us to cool off. The time has come for us to speculate.

No word in all our language has been more abused and less understood than this. To meet us, it means to observe, to see, that is, to study, to contemplate what has happened in relation to what is now to come. The true speculator is he who, having studied, sees what is to come and is prepared to act before it occurs.

Now, we are in the process of examining critically our emergency legislation, in order to absorb and fit into our permanent system that which is good. No laws, by themselves, will get us out of our troubles. Natural laws cannot be opposed successfully by legislation for long. Spiritual and moral values must be restored, and common sense and simple honesty must return. We must realize that we have
