March On Moonshiners

Florida moonshiners, recently the target of a stepped-up campaign by law enforcement officers in many areas, soon are to face an even more formidable foe — their tax paying competition.

The battle plan of the multi-mil-lion dollar legitimate liquor industry rests chiefly on the tenet of enlight-ening the public in an area of prime concern to them — their pocketbooks.

How serious a blow to the pocketbook the moonshine whiskey operations deliver, depends largely on where you sit. The legitimate indus-try estimates its loss at far in excess of one billion dollars every year. For those who fail to find sym-

pathy for the beverage industry, a look at the tax loss, which must be made up on other items, takes on another appearance.

This figure is in excess of \$610 million, and Florida's loss by a conservative estimate, some \$54 million annually, is stirring concern in many quarters.

Illegal moonshine has long been recognized by the beverage industry as a major competitor, but until recently, beverage dealers chose to play only minor roles in the war to halt the seemingly endless flow of shine.

However, as organization has paid off in huge returns for the moon-shiner so will it benefit the legitimate industry, with distillers, dis-tributors, and retailers contributing to a concentrated drive to end moonshine production.

This state is only one of 19 where the "war" will be waged by the in-dustry through its public relation and research organization known as

Licensed Beverage Industries, Inc. A branch organization, labeled Na-tional Council Against Illegal Liquor (NCAIL) was formed to conduct the program. Heading the new council is Louis E. Howall, retired regional commissioner of the Federal Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Howell, at a recent meeting in Tallahassee with State Beverage Direct-or Richard B. Keating, said he chose Florida as the pilot state for his pro-gram and after establishing the operation here will move into the remaining 18 states.

Operations in Florida will be spearheaded by Martin Noel, liquor distributor in Pensacola. Noel said he plans to employ various methods to drive home to the citizens of this State that while they pay enormous taxes for the operation of their governments, moonshiners reap untold millions of dollars that could be helpbusiness, Noel promised to exploit in his campaign, is the unbelievable filth and health hazzards synonymous with moonshine whiskey.

One of the greatest threats to the health or very life of moonshine consumers is lead saits poisoning. Deadly lead salts frequently found in 'shine enters the whiskey from solder used to seal the seams of illegal distilleries.

Only four one-hundred-thousandths of an ounce of lead salts is needed to constitute a lethal dose. This represents a mass of approxi-mately one-third the size of a pin head.

Added to this danger is the fact that lead salts is accumulative, meaning simply that minute quantities of this death factor can be taken internally over an extended period and when the lethal quantity is reached, death can occur.

If the threat of death is not a deterring factor, moonshine consumption would almost certainly be reduced if consumers were able to view moonshine stills found by officers. It is rare indeed to discover a still devoid of the usual inhabitants which include maggots, worms of diverse size and description, snakes and rodent.

Still operators are apparently seldom concerned about the inhabitants, at least enough to remove them from the vats of mash.

The threat of arrest with exposure nearly always forces operators to set up their stills in swampy, unsanitary areas where clean water is rarely available.

Consequently, most stills are operated with water drawn from filth ridden swamps or muddy holes dug in the ground. Again it is more the exception than the rule to find one using water acceptable for wading by humans, much less consumption. One still was found being operated with water drawn from a septie tank. There are many things moonshine consumers should consider before risking life and health with the product, and these points will be given the appropriate attention in coming months.

Thinking Out Loud Ball Season With Lyman

BY JULIAN STENSTROM

If you want to know what will happen to minor league baseball in the future, don't ask Ray Kennedy-a New York Met scout who lives in Casselberry and scouts this area for the Met farm system in seatch of young and potential baseball talent.

Kennedy doesn't know and doesn't propose to know. He's got some idea, however as to what's happening to minor league baseball.

"In 1932," says Ray, "there were only 12 minor leagues operating in this country." Then, Kennedy recalls, 'Branch Rickey instituted the farm system idea when he organized the now famed St. Louis Cardinal "chain gang" as it was unaffectionately called by others in baseball."

But Kennedy went on to say that "the idea caught on and major league baseball adopted the system and minor league baseball, no one can deny, began to really flourish."

In 1049 Kennedy said that there were 59 minor leagues operating in the United States and interest hit its peak. For example, that year Kennedy-then director of the Pittsburgh Pirate farm system-was in charge of 19 minor league teams.

"We owned eight of the clube outright," recalls Ray, "and we had working agreements with the other 11."

Kennedy remembers some of the talent he had opportunities to help develop in his many years in baseball. "One of them was Charlie Keller of the New York Yankees. Another youngster was Spud Chandler who went on to make a name for himself with the Yankees."

Kennedy also had a hand in developing Frank Thomas and Bob Purkey.

Sanford fans who recall the days in 1939 when Dale Alexander manager the Sanford entry in the Florida State League will be interested to know that Kennedy at one time managed the giant first basebman who went on to become an American League batting champion. Kennedy also tutored such greats as Ben Chapman, Dusty Cook and Joe Stripp.

But back to the minor loagues, Kennedy says there is no doubt but that the class of young ball players today has advanced minor league ball both socially and financially. But that could be part of the problem, Kennedy considers, "because they not hungry enough."

"Back in my days of managing the fellows weren't paid much and when we were on the road about a buck a day was tops for meal money. That's why we ate in boarding houses where food was served family style."

As to the future of minor league baseball, "Who knows?" asks Kennedy. "It might make a comeback, and it might not." Kennedy feels that despite what is said about radio and television coverage of major league baseball, it's a sure thing that towns and cities have lost their individual community pride in many things, including baseball.

He recalled that when he managed Newark in the old
