RICKARD TALKS WITH MCGRAW ON SALE OF GIANTS

Promoter Is Slated To Purchase Interest Of Charles Stoneham

Walsh INS Sports Editor NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—Tex Rickard and John McGraw, a couple of gentlemen who normally have little in common beyond the fact that each has no particular objection to doing himself some good, are understood to have been conferring behind closed doors these several days, with the result that the hardy annual having to do with the sale of the New York Giants came up for air again today. Frankly, it is more than possible that it will get exactly what it came up for. Rickard has made no secret of the fact that he would like to buy the controlling interest in the Giants. McGraw, having known matters that were more ideal than his present associations, might be pardoned if he broke right down and laughed over the prospect of Charles Stoneham selling out. It Rickard and McGraw have had anything to say to each other, it seems reasonable to suspect that the merits of hog calling as a vocation were discussed more as an afterthought than anything else.

The entire matter narrows down to this and other revelations of a startling nature; if they talked they said something. If they said something, it had to do with a possibility of Rickard buying out Stoneham's controlling interest in the club, so much for that. Rickard is for it, so probably is McGraw. Unfortunately, one cannot speak with the same assurance for either Stoneham or the National League. I would say, off hand, that both would have to be for it or the deal might prove altogether successful. Nobody knows how Stoneham feels about selling the New York Giants. In the first place, he is under agreement to offer his stock first to McGraw and Judge McQuade in the event that he feels the urge to sell. For obvious reasons, he has set to feel the urge in the face of these conditions. In the second place, the Giants are far from a profitless investment, and it figures to get exactly no worse as time goes on.

As for the National League, it is said to have two things against Rickard and one of them would touch upon the league's usual give its official countenance to transactions like this. Its first objection is said to have to do with an undercurrent of reluctance to mix boxing with baseball, it is being estimated, for some reason or none at all, that the fair name of the sport cannot hope to be elevated thereby. Its second objection springs from Rickard's admitted program in the event he acquired the ball club. It is his plan to retire the Giants from the Polo Grounds and oblige a long-term lease at the Yankee Stadium, whereby both of the local ball clubs could use the field for their home games. The Polo Grounds then would be remedied into a modern fight arena. In other words, Rickard wouldn't enter baseball for baseball's sake. He would be using this entire to get what he always has wanted—a fireproof, permanent outdoor arena devoted almost exclusively to the fight racket.

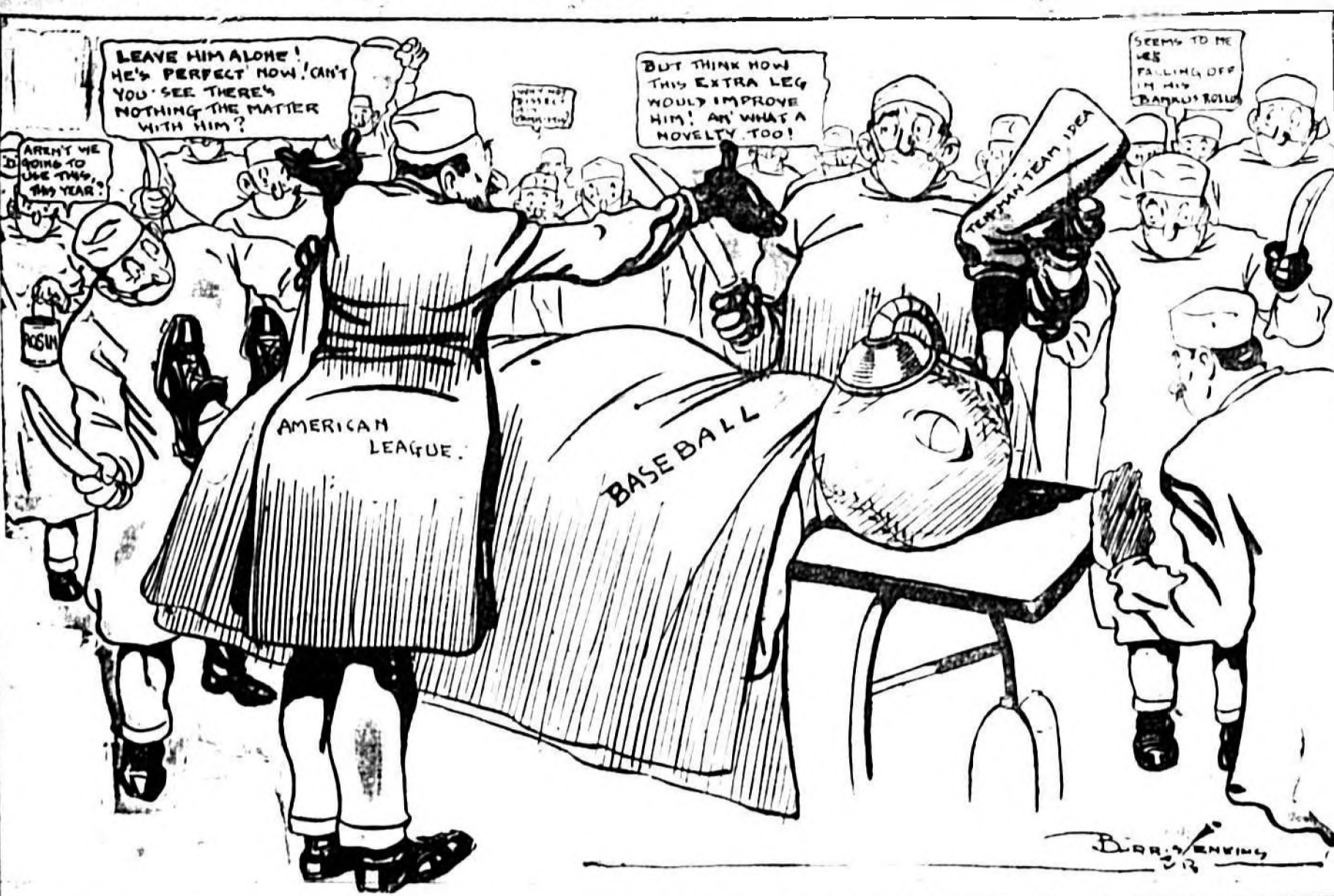

Santa Is Requested Congress Sets New To Bring Bicycle Record In Passing And Bugle To Youth 4 Bills In 15 Days

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(INS)—Congressional leaders declared today that a new piece of time and money fiscal legislation had been established with the passage of four annual supply bills in 15 working days carrying a total of more than \$2,900,000,000 in more than 100 bills.

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While House leaders at the opening of the short session intended to get only two of the four supply bills out of the way before Christmas, the House had not only failed to do so but had two days of comparative inactivity ahead before the Christmas recess.

The four bills, providing funds for the Treasury, Postoffice, Agriculture, State, Justice, Commerce and Labor departments, were cut \$3,418,960 under the budget estimated in the two bills which have passed as they passed the house.

Although increases have been noted in the two bills which have thus far reached action on the floor of the senate, house fiscal leaders expressed confidence that when congress has finished approving the four billion dollar bills, they will still be under the budget.

The bills as they passed the house carried \$2,912,801,578, divided among departments as follows: Treasury postoffice, \$4,235,000,000; State, \$1,233,000,000; Commerce and labor, \$11,000,000,000; and agriculture, \$1,200,000,000.

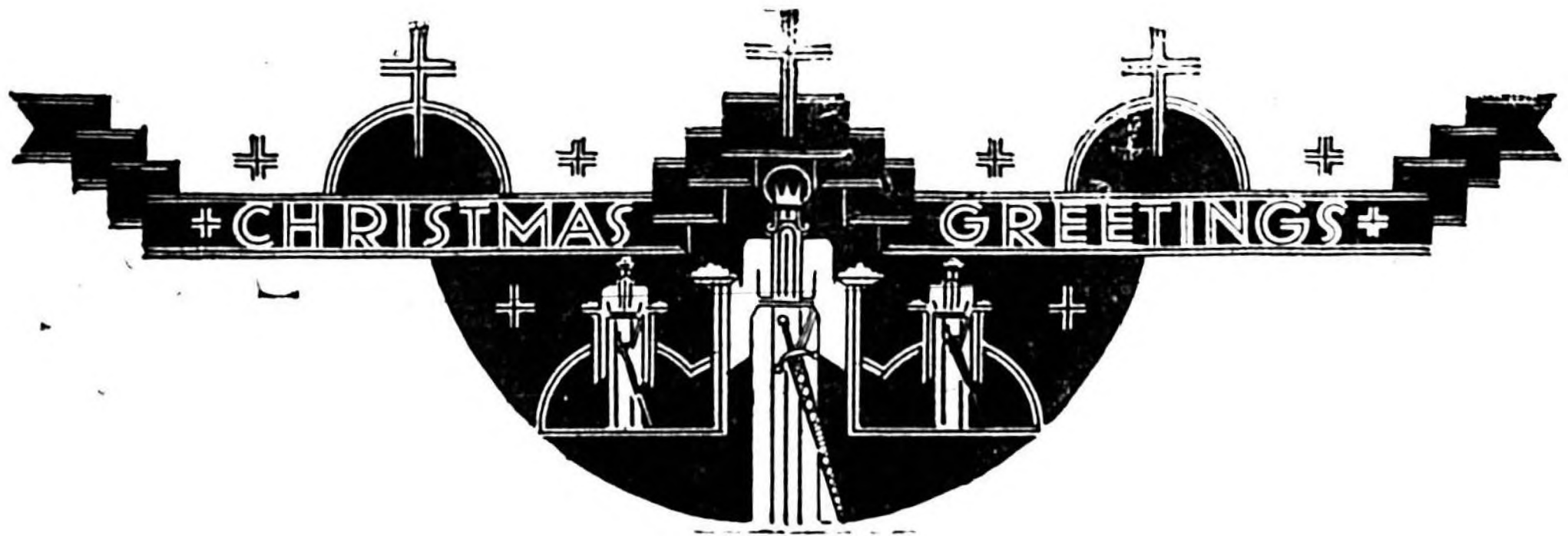

The Spirit Of Christmas

A recent dispatch from Moscow brings the news that the Soviet government is making a determined effort to abolish the celebration of Christmas in Russia. Any government owned store displaying Christmas toys or decorations in window or shop will be prosecuted and citizens caught buying such goods will be penalized. We do not know what the reaction of the Russian people will be to this law, but we do know that we are thankful that we live in a country where the possibility of such legislation is inconceivable, and we might even hazard a guess that no matter how much vodka is drunk in Moscow that the season which used to be called Christmas will be a very bleak affair.

It is difficult to imagine just what it would be like if Christmas were suddenly taken away. Through the centuries, the lovely story of the first Christmas has been handed down and celebrated by each succeeding generation and there has grown up around this most important religious festival a mass of folklore and tradition, a treasure of old ways and customs that serve as the embroidery on an already beautiful fabric. These traditions might be likened to a rich mullened cathedral window through which the white radiance of the real Christmas spirit shines, undimmed, but colored and varied to suit the needs of many peoples and many ages. So we have a heritage of Christmas carols and Christmas trees, of holly and mistletoe, of good Saint Nick and his prancing reindeer, of hopeful empty stockings and jolly bulging ones, of yule logs and plum puddings, and of merry wishes both by word and post.

This season, when we scan our Christmas cards eagerly learning that one friend is in Shanghai and another in a nearby city in Florida that others are here and there, and wishing us a "good old fashioned merrie Christmas", what we see the gay wreaths and catch glimpses of lovely bedecked trees through the windows of homes and in the shops, when we see the wondering, happy, breathless looks of some round eyed youngster, when the Salvation Army Santa Claus on the streets shakes hands with him, and most of all when we hear some sweet voiced carollers singing to the Christmas Eve stars, "God rest ye Merry Gentlemen, let nothing you dismay, for Jesus Christ, Our Savior was born on Christmas Day", we strike a pang for both the children and the grown ups of Moscow, and are again thankful that this beauty has not been taken away from us.

Behind this outward loveliness is the real spirit of Christmas that somehow draws all humanity closer together, rich and poor, old and young, white and colored. The scoffers may laugh, but there is something in the air at Christmas that makes the tired shopping crowds genial and friendly. There is something touching about a man blundering around a lady's shop trying to find a gift, that will please his wife, and something charming about a woman confiding eagerly to the haberdasher that she wants a lounching robe of powder blue to match her husband's eyes.

WHAT CHRISTMAS MEANS TO ME

The almost universal custom of birthday congratulations is an unconscious but overwhelming vote against pessimism. We congratulate people when they win prizes, when they obtain good positions, when they marry, when they have children. The fact that we congratulate them on their birthdays is evidence that we regard life as an asset; that we believe that people are lucky to have been born. There are many who still themselves pessimists, but a consistent pessimist is the rarest of all persons, much rarer than a consistent Christian. John Temple Graves was a consistent pessimist, but he really believed that not only for himself, but for the vast majority, the accident of birth was the worst possible luck. Therefore he invariably kept his birthdays as a day of fasting and mourning. He put on black clothes and refused to eat anything but the worst possible food. The birthdays of great men, especially when they live, have been a blessing to mankind, and widely celebrated. We make much of the birthdays of great poets, musicians, and statesmen. In America the anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin is celebrated every year; the birthdays of Washington and Lincoln are national holidays.

Today, as the tide of civilization sweeps onward, and the cities and towns are packed together in space and time, and the world is becoming more and more recognized by wise men as the only one that can make light the pathways of life, "Peace on earth, good will towards men," it is the secret of all living. For the old God of fear and vengeance, for the pitiless God, sitting the throne of the fathers upon the seven vents of the third and fourth continents, Christ brought a Divine substitute, a God of love, of compassion and forgiveness. And for the direct and sacrificial worship of a remote and dreadful Deity He brought the indirect, universal and intimate service of God through good will towards men.

If all stocks listed on the New York exchange should crash down to a quotation of zero, the loss would be a hundred billion dollars, and the percentage of wealth of the United States. On the other hand, if all of the owners of life insurance policies in the country should die, their beneficiaries would receive one hundred billion dollars, or one-fifth of the wealth of the United States. What this proves we don't know—except that America is a big country and that investments in stocks and life insurance, are enormous.

Christmas is the supreme date. Whatever view may be held of his credentials and authority, it is significant that even those who write against him are forced to date their articles from his birth. So far as we know, Jesus never wrote anything except the few words on the ground. If he had not done that, we should not be able to say whether or not his teachings have come down to us from reports of his sermons and his conversations, the entire collection of his sayings in three hours. His sayings are the most profound and the most beautiful that ever fell from human lips. Never man spoke like this man. Few as are his reported words, they constitute the supreme literature of the world. The best poetry of Shakespeare, Dante and Goethe is, from the point of view of literary art, inferior to the language of the carpenter's Son.

But his lonely eminence as a master of speech can not in itself account for the supremacy of Christmas. The world rightly honors its great poets and literary artists but not so such an extent or in such a manner as this. There is something behind all this eloquence. There are certain writers whose books are more interesting than their personalities. Everyone is charmed by "Robinson Crusoe", but few know or care anything about the life and character of its author, Daniel Defoe. On the other hand, the poetry and prose of Sir Philip Sidney are familiar to only a few. But the brave and gracious personality of Sidney has been a powerful influence. A personality can be an immortal force. Yet here is a man whose grace and charm of Sidney's heroic soldier, courtier, what are they in comparison with the range and depth of the influence coming from similar characteristics in the peasant of Nazareth?

Leaving aside the question of literary supremacy and the influence of a fruit-bearing personality, the world has always listened to, and to a certain extent been affected by its great moral teachers. The conscience in men and women responds to a direct appeal to virtue, when that appeal is made with both art and sincerity. Soerens, Plato, Marcus Aurelius, Carlyle, Emerson, to name only a few, have observed and elevated the minds of thousands of men and women. Yet all five put together have not equalled in their cumulative force the effect wrought by the single influence of Jesus Christ. He is the world's supreme moral leader. Many of the most cultivated and learned and intellectual Jews of our time have taken an attitude toward him directly contrary to the traditional one. Instead of regarding him

THE VISIT OF ST. NICHOLAS

The author of this poem, a historian and scholar in ancient languages who lived in New York, wrote it in 1822, as a Christmas present to his children. A friend of the family copied it into her album and later sent it to the Troy Sentinel, which first published it on Dec. 21, 1823. The author name, although enough was omitted, not because he thought the poem of slight literary value and did not want it published at all.

Twice the night before Christmas, when all through the house, Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse; The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, In hope that St. Nicholas soon would be there; The children were nestled all snug in their beds, While visions of sugar plums danced in their heads; And Momma in her apron and I, On my cap (That just settled our hair for a long winter's nap) When out on the lawn there rose such a clatter, I sprang from the bed to see what was the matter. Away to the window I flew like a flash, Tore open the shutters and threw up the sash. The moon on the breast of the new-fallen snow, Gave a lustre of midday to objects below.

When, what to my wondering eyes should appear, But a miniature sleigh and eight tiny reindeer, With a little old driver, so lively and quick, I knew in a moment it must be St. Nick. More rapid than eagles his courses they trace, And he whistled and shouted, and called them by name: "Now, Danter! Now, Dancer, Now, Prancer and Vixen! On, Comet! On, Cupid! On, Dasher and Blitzen!" To the top of the porch, to the top of the wall! Now dash away, dash away, dash away, all!

As dry leaves before the wild hurricane fly, When they meet with an obstacle, mount to the sky; So up to the house-top the couriers they flew, With the sleigh full of toys, and Saint Nicholas too. And then in a twinkling, I heard on the roof The prancing and pawing of each tiny hoof— As I drew in my head, and was turning around, Down the chimney St. Nicholas came with a bound. He was dressed all in fur, from his head to his foot, And his clothes were all tarnished with ashes and soot; A bundle of toys he had slung on his back, And he looked like a peddler just opening his pack. His eyes, how they twinkled! His dimples, how merry! His cheeks were like roses, His nose like a cherry! His droll little mouth was drawn up like a bow, And the beard of his chin was as white as the snow; The stump of a pipe he held tight in his teeth, And the smoke it encircled his head like a wreath; He had a broad face and a round little belly That shook when he laughed like a bowl full of jelly. He was chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf, And I laughed, when I saw him, In spite of myself; A wink of his eye, and a twist of his head, Soon gave me to know I had nothing to dread; He spoke not a word, but went straight to my work; And filled all the stockings; then turned with a jerk, And laying his fingers aside of his nose, And giving a nod, up the chimney he rose; He sprang to his sleigh, to his team gave a whistle, And away they all flew like the down of a thistle. But I heard him exclaim, ere he drove out of sight, "Happy Christmas to all and to all a good night!"

MUSSOLINI NOW HOLDS 7 PLACES IN OWN CABINET

Premier Becomes Majority By Assuming Colonies' Portfolio

ROME, Dec. 24.—Luigi Federzoni, Minister of Colonies and for the last six years one of Premier Mussolini's closest collaborators in the Cabinet, resigned Tuesday, setting in motion a whole chain of changes in the higher posts of the Italian state.

Senator Federzoni's place was taken by Mussolini himself, who has assumed his seventh Cabinet post, and this constituted himself a majority. Federzoni, who a short time ago was made Senator by the King on Il Duce's request is expected to be created President of the upper house of Parliament by royal decree soon.

Since Federzoni was granted his Senate seat it has been persistently whispered that he proposed soon to withdraw from active direction of Italian affairs. His resignation therefore, was not a surprise.

The fact that it was expected, however, robs it of none of its interest or political significance. Federzoni is head of the Nationalist party and alone among Mussolini's collaborators has held his post in the Cabinet during the whole of the six years since the march on Rome.

Holds Important Posts

The relations between the Nationalists and the Fascists, who before the march on Rome collaborated wholeheartedly for the overthrow of the old political regime, afterwards went through alternate phases of great cordiality followed by lukewarmness. It was suggested that perhaps not until now has Mussolini felt sufficiently strong to do without Federzoni's cooperation.

Now that Il Duce has added the Ministry of Colonies to the other Cabinet posts he is already holding, it is easier to count the ministries of which he is not at the head rather than those of which he is. He controls seven ministries, namely, Foreign Affairs, Internal Affairs, War, Navy, Aeronautics, Corporations and Colonies. Only six others are left to his collaborators—Finance, Justice, Public Works, National Economy, Communications and Education.

In addition to these seven ministries, Mussolini also has on his

shoulders the work detailed by his position as President of the Cabinet Council, head of the Fascist party, President of the Fascist Grand Council and less important tasks.

As his direct colleague in the Ministry of Colonies, Il Duce has chosen General Debono, who becomes Under Secretary for the Colonies. The general was formerly of that rank in the regular army and was a member of the quadrumvirate which led the march on Rome.

Debono Picked as Aid

Following his rehabilitation after the Matteotti affair, Debono was nominated Governor of Tripoli, which post he still holds. His place will be taken by General Baulgno, Chief of the General Staff of the Italian army, who at the same time will be nominated to be Governor of Cyrenaica, it having been decided that the two adjacent colonies should be fused into a single administrative entity.

The present Governor of Cyrenaica, Attilio Terruzzi, whose wife is an American singer, formerly known as Lillian Forman, the daughter of Isaac Weisman, of New York, will be nominated to be Chief of the General Staff of the Fascist militia, replacing General Bataan, who was created Senator.

Other changes announced include the elevation of Senator Carlo Schanzer, former Italian Foreign Minister, and of Edmondo Rossoni, head of the Fascist labor syndicates to the high posts of Ministers of State.

Simultaneously with these changes in high government posts, it was announced Tuesday, that Deputy Tirrali, Secretary General of the Fascist party, will have the right hereafter to participate to the meeting of the Cabinet. This is highly significant, as it will be the first time that any one belonging to the Cabinet could share in the government's executive and legislative functions.

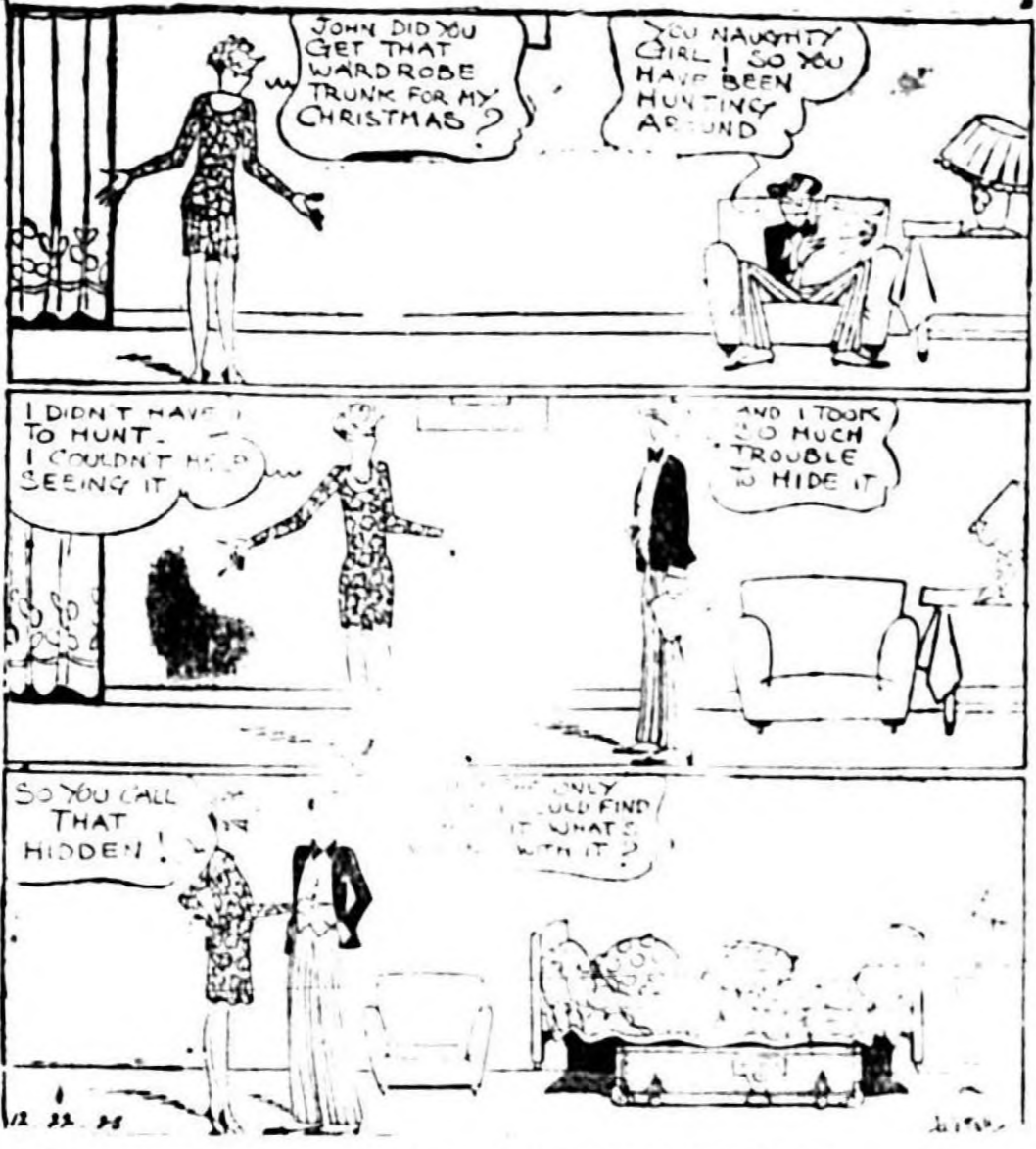

Georgia Team Begins Workouts Today In Preparing For Game

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 24.—(INS)—Their long journey across the continent at an end, Georgia Tech's warriors of the gridiron today buckled down to the exacting task of preparing for their inter-sectional game with the University of California Bears in the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day.

Coach Bill Alexander's stalwart arrived here with a bang yesterday afternoon. They are scheduled to take their first workout on California soil today and will continue to go through their furthest process until the day of the annual tournament of roses football classic arrives.

Few traces of train-weariness were noticeable as the boys from Atlanta leaped from the train, inhaled a long dash of western air, yelled "whoop," and proceeded to stretch their legs. One look at the healthy gang was enough to dispel the rumors of illness in their ranks. Every man was in good shape and needs only a few days of scampering about on the sod to limber up and be in shape for the golden bears.

Coach Clarence "Nibs" Price of California called a recess in the practice drill of his charges to go to the hotel where the Georgia Tech contingent is staying and convey his greetings to Coach Alexander and members of his staff. Accompanying the Golden Tornado on its westward jaunt, was a delegation composed of members of the Georgia Tech faculty, headed by Dr. M. L. Brittain, president of the college.

Price has adopted a strict discipline for the first time since he brought his team to Pasadena. The Bears, it must be explained, have begun to round themselves out to their accustomed form. FAMOUS HOTEL IS TO GIVE WAY TO 50-STORY BLOCK

Waldorf, Landmark Of New York, To Be Torn Down In Next Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 24—(INS)—The Waldorf-Astoria, a hotel known the world over and for 35 years one of the distinctive landmarks of New York, has been sold and will be demolished in 1929.

The site, on the west side of Fifth Avenue, extending from Thirty-fourth Street, will be occupied by a fifty story office building. Covering the entire area now occupied by the hotel, by Astor Court and the Astor Court Office Building, the new structure has been designed on an imposing scale. A massive central tower, rising above the offsets of the lower floors, will add a new monument to the mid-town section.

Sold to Engineering Firm
The hotel has been bought by the Bethlehem Engineering Corporation, of which Floyd Del. Brown is president. Delivery will be made next June. In making the announcement Saturday neither Mr. Brown nor Lucius M. Boomer, president of the Waldorf-Astoria Realty Corporation, the present holders, made public the price.

In well-informed realty circles, however, it is set down as about \$16,000,000, of which \$14,000,000 is thought to cover the site, the private street known as Astor Court, and the hotel and office building, and about \$2,000,000 to cover the unexpired leases for the stores and other holdings now on the property. There are thirty-five leases, and they are thought to have been the reason why none of several previous negotiations for the sale of the property was ever consummated.

Non-Productive Areas Burdensome
Mr. Boomer gave as the reason for the sale the fact that "the great non-productive areas in the hotel have become burdensome." Some, who remembered the great days of the hotel, were inclined to think that as a fashion, also, it had passed.

If so, its history covers very accurately a definite period in that of the nation. The twin hotel began with the Waldorf, covering the southern half of the area, and replacing the house of William Waldorf Astor. Mr. Astor had decided to move to England (Lady Nancy Astor, first woman member of Parliament, is his daughter-in-law) and he erected the hotel, upon a scale of "European magnificence," then unfamiliar in the United States, thinking that it would house the visitors to the Chicago Exposition of 1893.

Henry Adams is only one of the historians who have set down the Chicago Exposition as definitely marking the opening of a national epoch, the epoch which was to turn the nation from the pre-occupations of the post-Civil War days and lead it up to its entry into the World War. The Waldorf opened in 1893, was to span that time. Its first manager, George C. Boldt, was said to have announced: "I am going to provide luxury—for the masses," and the phrase, whether authentic or not, was a prophetic commentary on the period to come.

Soon Firmly Established
After some difficulties, the hotel was soon firmly established. The north half of the block was owned by William Astor's brother, John Jacob Astor, and Mr. Boldt persuaded him to devote it to a second hotel, which was in reality an addition to the first. The John Jacob Astor house—the mansion whose ballroom, capable of holding only 600, gave rise to Ward McAllister's supposed pronouncement concerning "the Four Hundred"—was torn down, and in 1897 the Astoria was opened, the combined building receiving the name of the Waldorf-Astoria.

A long succession of famous functions, public events and brilliant affairs followed. Presidents of the United States including Taft, Harding and Coolidge have stayed there, and occupied the President's suite on their visits to New York. Li Hung Chang, the Chinese statesman and envoy of the Dragon Throne was a guest, and Prince Henry of Prussia, who visited there, during the memorable reception tendered him on his second visit to the city in 1902.

Prince Felix, Henry, Oscar received the Order of the Double Eagle, and the Prince of Wales, the King of the Belgians and, it is said, every other royal personage who has visited the city during the period of the existence of the Waldorf-Astoria.
