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Six named finalists for top cop

SANFORD — The list of Sanford Police Chief candidates is down to six, with a marathon day of interviews scheduled for July 22.

The finalists will face oral interviews, plus mock staff and community meetings, for three hours on July 22 at Sanford Middle School. In the afternoon, after the finalists are narrowed to three, City Manager Tony VanDerworp will conduct further interviews.

The candidates include Norman Botsford, Chief of the Columbia Police Department in Missouri; Brian Tooley, Deputy Chief for the Orlando Police Department; and William Anderson, a Commander for the Daytona Beach Police Department.

Additional candidates include David Slusser, Chief of the Panama City Police Department; Keith Stiles, Chief of Police for Leesburg, Va.; and Edward Overman, Chief of the Oakland Park Police Department.

The morning exercises will be conducted by the five-member Selection Committee plus a representative from the state attorney's office.

In a mock staff meeting, the candidates will be judged on oral communication skills, leadership, interpersonal sensitivity, and observations of strengths or weaknesses.

The candidates will also be judged on their sense of priorities, depth of understanding, problem solving skills, composure, and fact finding skills in a mock community meeting. The candidates will be expected to demonstrate skill in inter-

acting with the community, and address neighborhood problems.

In oral interviews, candidates will be judged on oral communication skills, composure, depth of understanding, leadership abilities, and sense of priorities.

After the exercises, the six assessors will meet to select the top three candidates. VanDerworp will then meet with the candidates, and could potentially choose the top one, Denaro said.

Youths arrested for flag burning

Home claims actions were result of 'dropping acid'

SANFORD — When Seminole County Sheriff's deputies Mike McCullough and Lucas Jordan spotted a gray sedan pull into the back entrance of NationsBank on Hunt Club Boulevard at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday morning, their instincts kicked in, and their suspicions paid off.

The two deputies rolled quietly to the back entrance of the bank and observed two males exit the vehicle, disappear behind a maintenance shed and

into the woods adjacent to Memory Gardens Cemetery. They called for backup, found fresh footprints, and were soon joined by deputies Nathan Wilkerson and Richard Kolentus. Aided by a nearby streetlight, the four officers then spent 20 minutes, observing the two suspects inside the cemetery. What they observed brought a sou: end to their long Fourth of July weekend.

As they watched, the two suspects picked separate objects from one of the tombs and set them on fire with a cigarette lighter. A few moments later, the deputies made their arrests. The objects that were set afire were two American flags.

Ironically, one of the suspects had just celebrated his birthday — on the Fourth of July.

Widow of slain deputy says thanks to officers

SANFORD — In a setting choked by emotion and punctuated with courage, valor, and commitment, the Seminole County Sheriff's department held its semi-annual awards ceremony at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility Thursday evening.

The presentations came one year to the day that deputy Gene Gregory was killed in the line of duty during a 13-hour shoot-out and standoff while responding to a landlord-tenant

dispute in Geneva.

Alan Singletary, a 43-year old Geneva resident with a history of mental health problems fatally shot Gregory and wounded two other officers before he was killed by deputies in a prolonged gun battle.

"We have unfinished business this evening," Sheriff Don Eslinger told the packed gathering in his opening remarks.

"Our lives are highly different today than a year ago. We've had our emotional ups and downs. I'm thrilled at your commitment. You are unsung

Commission to discuss stormwater pond

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission on Monday will consider awarding a \$950,000 contract to construct a retention pond on 65 acres in the Mill Creek project for the Goldsboro area.

Bishop & Buttrey, Inc. of Orlando is proposing to construct the pond, fence the site, and construct a connection to the city's storm water utility system. Upon completion, the property would be transferred to the city of Sanford.

The city would provide plans for the connections to the pond.

On June 14, the City Commission agreed to the

concept and asked for several minor modifications to the contract. The modifications have been made, and await commission approval.

Bishop & Buttrey has already completed geotechnical and preliminary environmental work on the site. Of the total 65 acres, 25 acres are expected to be wetlands, leaving about 40 acres to be excavated as a pond, the company said.

The city would be responsible for mitigating any wetlands impacts.

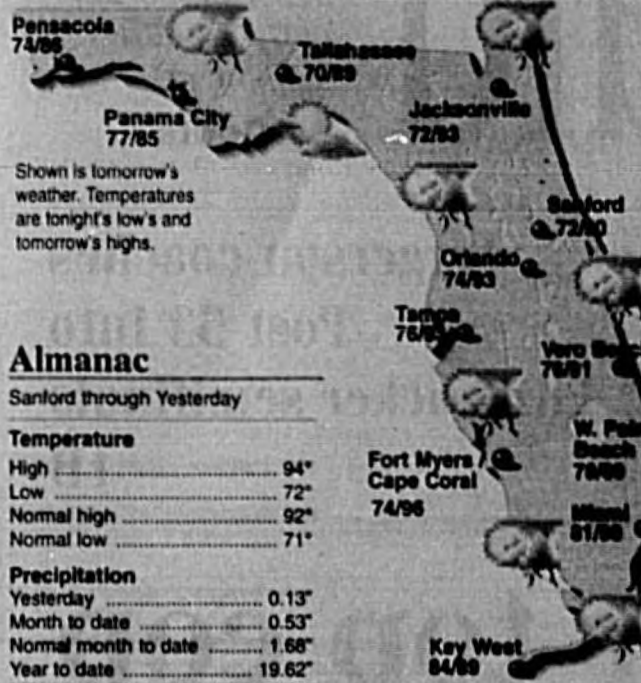
In addition to providing a storm water facility, the proposed project would eliminate a significant amount of large truck traffic on the areas roadways, the company said.

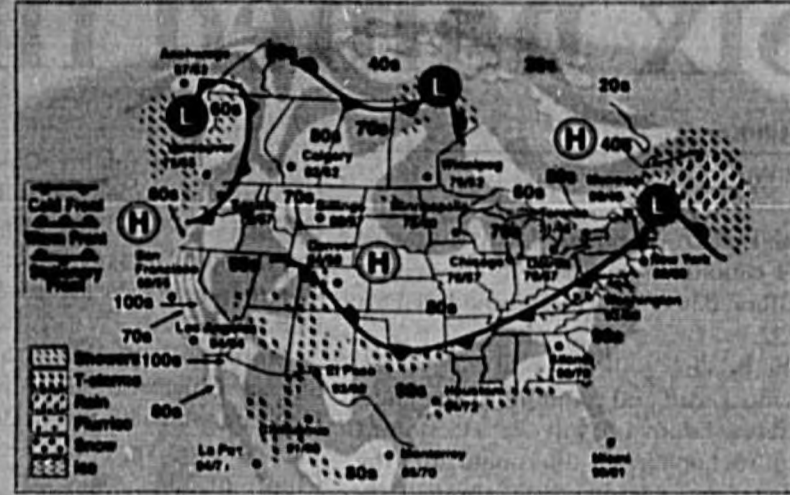

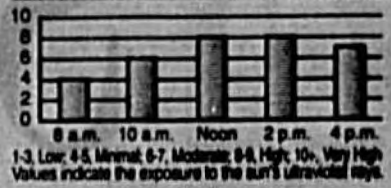

The proposed haul road would be near Country Club Drive and Airport Boulevard. Two sections of the GreeneWay's so-called missing link are within two miles of the site.

City staff originally planned to use only the eastern pit of Mill Creek, which is about 20 acres. The pond now being considered will give four times the retention capacity and water quality treatment, and staff said it will reduce the risk of flooding.

The appraisal for the property was originally \$27,000 per acre, which places a value of \$1.75 million for the 65 acres. Added to the pond construction cost estimate of \$550,000, the total estimated cost of the project had been \$2.3 million.

City Manager Tony

VanDerworp said the city will save \$116,000 with the proposed agreement.

"Not only do we save money," said VanDerworp. "But, we gain a large stormwater drainage area that will help provide storage capacity and excellent flood-proofing capability."

In other action, the City Commission will also:

- Consider rescinding potable and reclaimed water restrictions because of increased rainfall in June.

- Discuss the assignment of the Marina Hotel Land Lease. Venture Thirty-Two, the current leaseholder, is requesting assignment of the lease to the Marina Hotel Corporation of Sanford, owned by James Barggren, who is the President and shareholder

in the Lakeside Inn and Highlander Inn of Mount Dora.

Barggren said he intends to renovate the property for use as a Best Western Hotel.

- Consider approving an agreement with Infrastructure Management Services, Inc. for Professional Engineering Services for a Comprehensive Pavement Management Program and Concrete Sidewalk Inventory.

This is the first time the City has performed a comprehensive inventory of road and sidewalk infrastructure. It is expected to be complete in the fall, VanDerworp said.

The City Commission's work session will be held at 5 p.m. at Sanford City Hall, followed by the 7 p.m. regular session.

Sanford power plant gets approval

DEBARY - Florida Power & Light Company received land use approvals Wednesday from the DeBary /City Council in connection with the company's plans to "repower" the Sanford power plant. The company will replace 1970's power plant technology with state-of-the-art technology using natural gas instead of oil.

The power plant is located just north of the St. Johns River and west of US Highway 17-92 in DeBary. The electric power plant has been in operation since 1927.

The project will use clean, natural gas technology and double the generating capacity of the existing facility without requiring additional land to meet the electricity needs of FPL's cus-

tomers in Central Florida.

The repowering proposal calls for expanding the power plant's current capability of providing power for 220,000 homes and businesses to serve more than 486,000 homes and businesses in the area. FPL plans to begin construction in February 2000 and phase the new turbines into operation beginning in early 2002.

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Trauma to triumph ... it's a great trip

For the past two weeks directors of laboratories in Orlando and Richmond, Va., have been studying two slides of what one called a "challenging" prostate biopsy of a 59-year-old man.

The doctors concurred with a diagnosis, and the patient was called in Thursday.

Dr. A. Arciola, the well-respected Lake Mary urologist, opened a folder and slid his fingers down a page of notes from Dr. David G. Bostwick, the medical director at Bostwick Laboratories in Richmond.

Much of the phrasing was difficult to grasp — "high-grade prostatic intraepithelial neoplasia ... a high predictive accuracy for adenocarcinoma."

Finally, Dr. Arciola said it all in a word: "Benign."

Ten million American men have prostate cancer but as for the moment I am not No. 10,000,001. For that I thank God. I also thank those trying to save the lives of those who have the cancer.

Being tested early is crucial. A prostate biopsy is no picnic. I've had two in the last four months and must have another one in December. I'm in a high risk group — 45 to 60 percent of those with high-grade prostatic intraepithelial neoplasia (PIN) are found to have cancer on a subsequent biopsy.

Material from a biopsy, such as the one taken on me two weeks ago, are an enormously valuable source of material for teaching residents, fellows and pathologists at various university hospitals. My biopsy will be studied at the University of Virginia.

In recent years men have

begun to speak more openly about prostate cancer. Bob Dole needed surgery. So did Arnold Palmer and Yankees manager Joe Torre. My grandfather died from prostate cancer in 1945. He refused help.

I've been just as stubborn as he was at times. I've known for three years that I am high risk for a stroke, having experi-

enced a series of transient ischemic attacks - losing sight in the right eye on each occasion. Until being hospitalized I didn't know zilch about TIAs. Until yesterday, I didn't know zilch about PINs.

TIAs and PINs are more important to guys my age than RBI and ERAs. They are warning signs,

As we age our chances of a stroke go up, as men age their changes of having prostate cancer go up. Stroke risks double with each decade past 55.

I do not smoke, my cholesterol is better than it was, my blood pressure is okay. I intend to lose at least 20 pounds before the next prostate biopsy in December and I plan to walk or exercise three or more days a week.

This is a time to be grateful and to be optimistic. To walk a little taller, treat others more respectfully, spend time with family and friends and sing, "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

Please remember, if you have the slightest suspicion that you or someone you know may be experiencing problems related to stroke or prostate cancer, get help. If you have questions, ask them. Be grateful help is a call away.

You'll discover there are many others just like you. We're not alone.

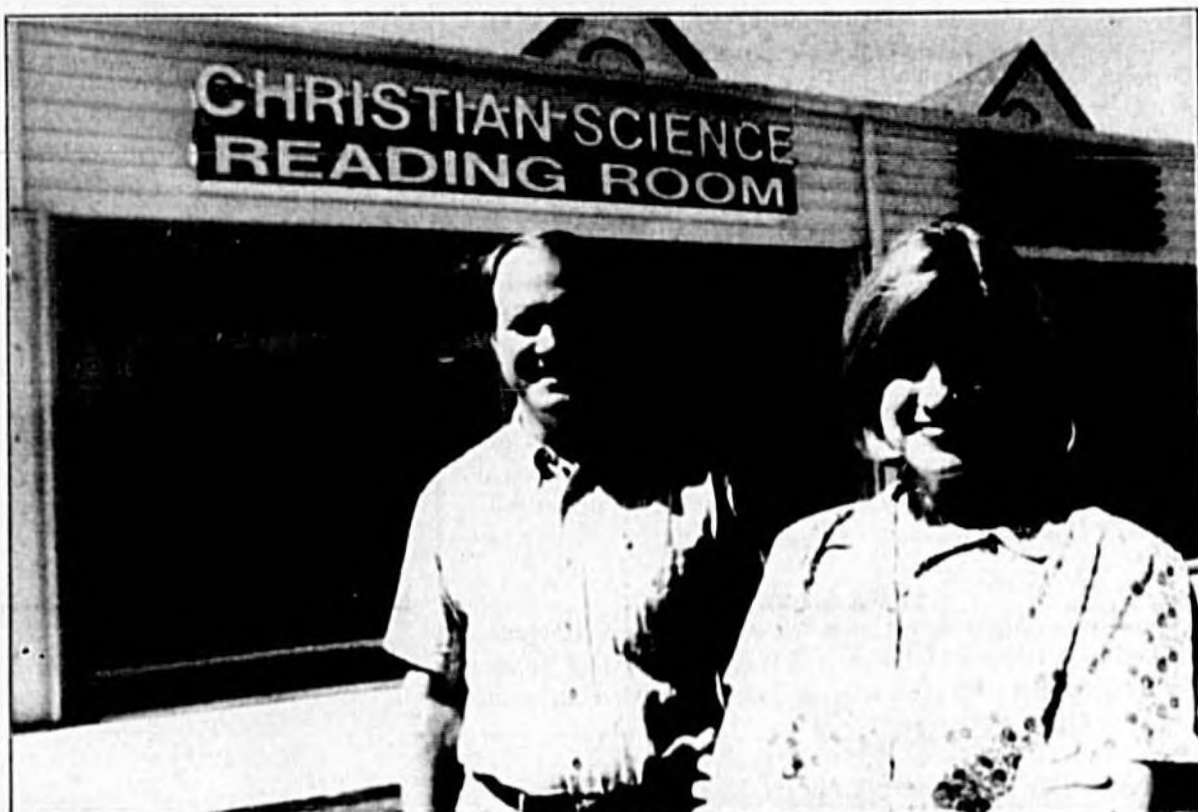

SANFORD - The dress was spit and polish, the mood serious and celebratory. The occasion, the Seminole County Sheriff department's semi-annual awards ceremony.

Gregory was killed and two other deputies wounded in a 13-hour shoot-out involving Geneva resident Alan Singletary. "I salute your hard work and commitment," Eslinger told the gathering of law enforcement officers. "We can

assess our success as a department by the relationship we have with our community. It's and honor and a privilege to lead you and be a part of this mission."

Medals of Merit, second only to the department's Award of Valor, were presented to officers Gene Fry, Kevin Mahanke, and Warren Treadwell Jr., for their actions on April 26, 1998, in disarming and apprehending a distraught and suicidal subject who was armed with a handgun. Also cited was deputy Donald Rufo for his actions on April 30, 1998, in negotiating face-to-face with a mentally ill subject who was also armed with a handgun. The Medal of Merit is presented to employees for conduct depicting sound judgment and exceptional bravery at the risk of imminent danger of great bodily harm.

Sheriff's Commendation awards were presented to a number of officers for their diligence beyond that normally required for the efficient accomplishment of their duty. Recipients included: William Shaffer in recognition of his

Eighteen-year old Gregory Allen Horne of Riverbend Boulevard in Longwood and a juvenile accomplice were charged with public mutilation of an American flag, disturbing the contents of a grave or tomb, and loitering and prowling. Allen was booked on \$500 bond into the Polk Correctional Facility. The youth was turned over to juvenile authorities for evaluation.

"We heard their voices but couldn't really make out what they were talking about," said McCullough following the arrests.

Horne and the juvenile at first denied setting the flags on fire. Later, in the official arrest records, they admitted to the act. The two told police they were just out for a walk in a quiet place and wanted to look at the statues in the cemetery because they were so lifelike. They admitted to taking flowers out of vases on headstones. The 16-year old told deputies, "These people are dead, they don't have any stuff."

In an interview, Horne said he'd been in a lot of trouble before, but

this was the first time he'd been jailed. The Longwood teen pointed to drug use that led to his spending 60-hours behind bars.

"I've had a drug problem for a while, but with the suicide of my friend a month ago, I've been very unstable."

Horne said he was high at the time of the incident.

"I was dropping acid which is why we burned the flags. The acid made my actions out of control, and I was too high to know what I was doing."

The Longwood teen said he's dropped acid about five times before and is currently in a drug rehabilitation program.

"This is by far the worst thing I've ever done and I feel pretty bad about it."

McCullough, an eight-year veteran of the Sheriff's department said it was one of the most bizarre arrests he's made.

"What they did was pretty disgusting, burning the American flag. And to think that one of them was born on the Fourth of July."

No court date has been set for the matter.

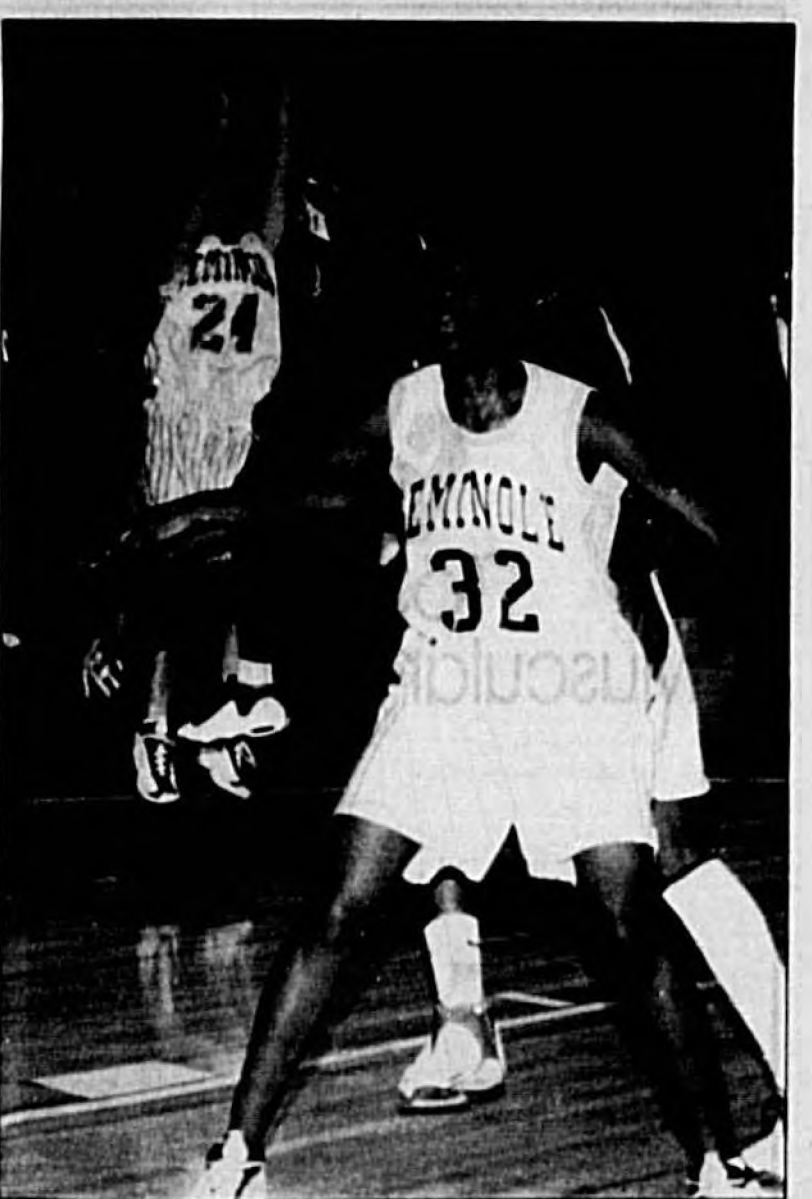

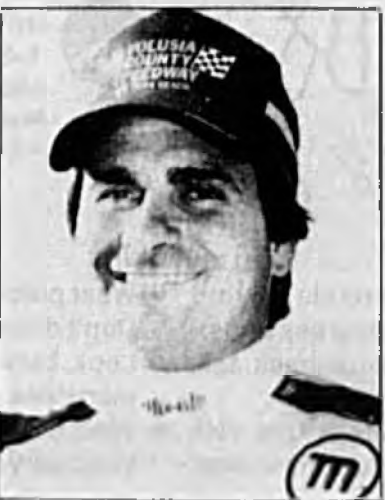

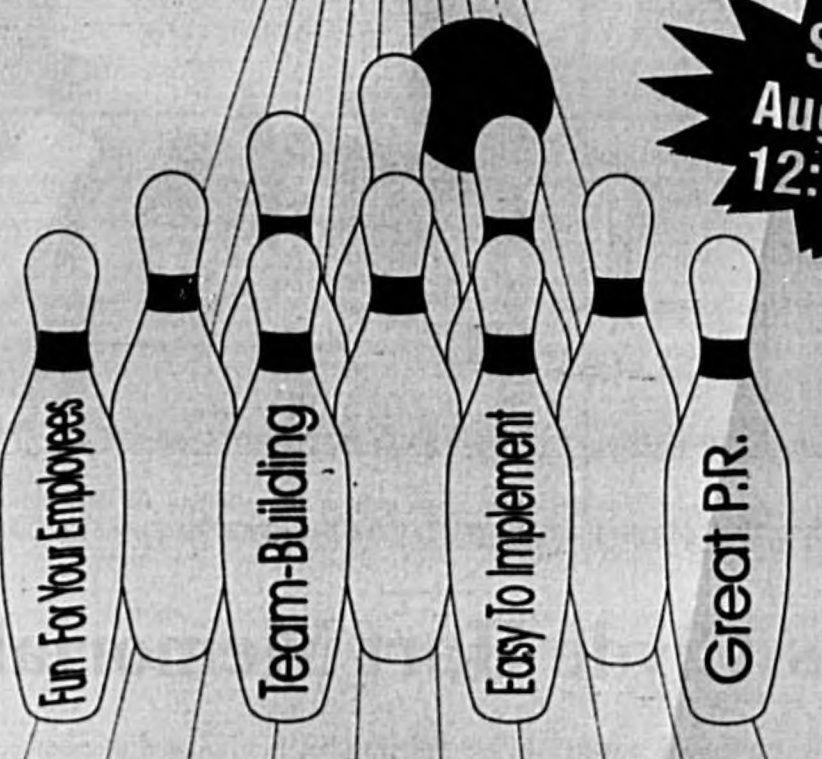

Calling numbers may have pitfalls

Deals aren't always a perfect '10'

James Garner can't stop smiling about his 10-10 number. Sugar Ray Leonard says you'll get hammered without his. And you are from another planet if you don't use John Lithgow's seven-digit code.

And now there's even a dog hawking "a new breed of long distance"—the lucky dog (a.k.a. the industry's biggest dog, AT&T).

What are dog and man hyping? The product is "dial-around" long distance services—numbers like the heavily advertised 10-10-321—which allows you to bypass your regular long-distance company by dialing a seven digit prefix.

If you feel overwhelmed by the hype and are skeptical that these calls are truly a bargain, you're in good company. Dial-arounds have been around for more than a decade. Now, suddenly, they are the phone industry's hottest turf and are drawing a close look

from regulators and other industry watchdogs.

Are they good deals?

"There are some out there where consumers can save money," said Becky Sachs, a spokeswoman for the Telecommunications Research and Action Center (TRAC), a

nonprofit group that monitors long-distance rates.

Caution is crucial with dial-arounds. Consumers should watch out for monthly fees, minimum call lengths and other drawbacks not obviously in the advertising.

What's not just potential are the sales. Sales of dialing-arounds have soared from about \$96 million 1993 to more than \$2 billion last year.

That was before AT&T entered

the market with its Lucky Dog brand and MCI WorldCom launched its second dial-around number, competing with its own heavily marketed 10-10-321. Some industry watchers expect sales to reach \$3 billion next year. Americans spend \$92 billion annually on all long-distance calling.

Like AT&T, MCI WorldCom doesn't use its own name to market its dial-around numbers, which helps explain common misconception: that dial-arounds represent the cheaper off-brands of the long distance industry.

If you're going to use a dial-around, watch out for the fine print. All dial-arounds are not equal. Some charge monthly and other fees whether you use the number once or for all calls. Some tout low per-minute rates but charge more for short or daytime calls.

With some, in-state long-distance calls cost more than state-to-state calls. And some dial-arounds charge a minimum

amount per call—as much as 99 cents—even if a call lasts just a few seconds.

The ads for dial-arounds often do not fully explain these complex charges. With no simple way for consumers to check rates, some of the advertising has attracted regulatory scrutiny.

Increased competition has brought dial-around pricing down—if you find the right service. Some dial-arounds come with few if any drawbacks. But the savings depend on what you pay per minute for dialing long-distance the ordinary "1-plus" way.

If you already pay 10 cents or less per minute for long-distance, a dial-around could cost you.

But if you are like many consumers who are not on calling plans or your plan trades cheaper evening and weekend rates for highly weekday-daytime rates, judicious use of dial-around could shave quite a bit off your bills.

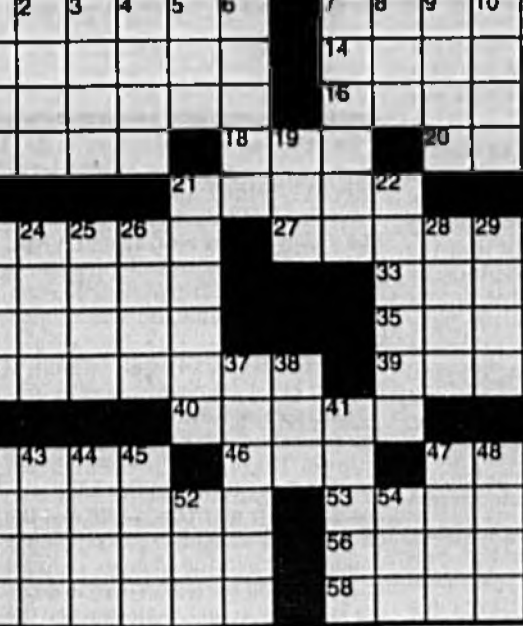

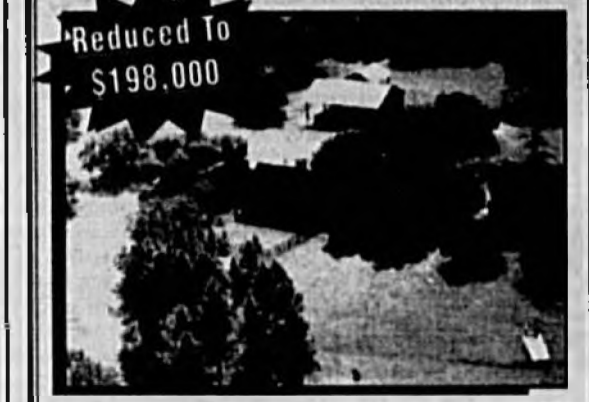

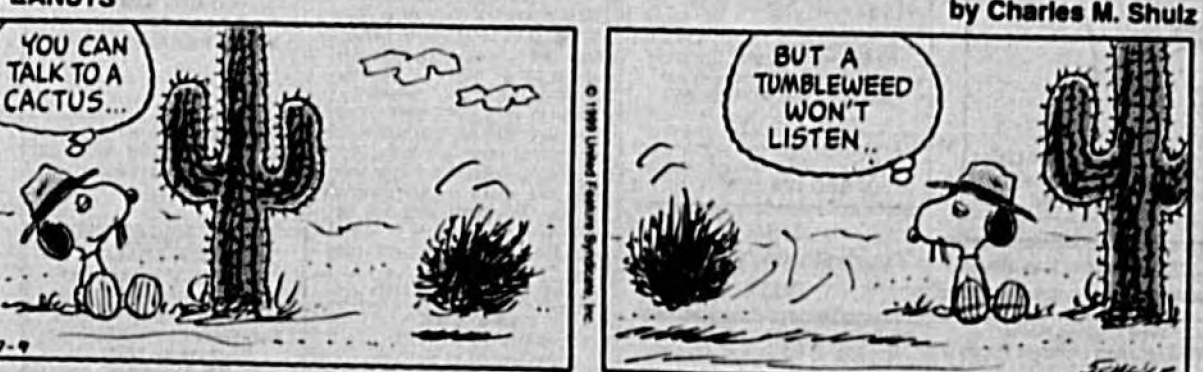

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WIN AT BRIDGE

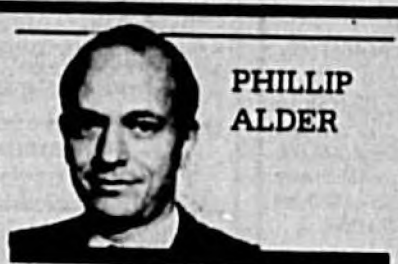
If it's in your hands, grasp it

William James, an American psychologist and philosopher, claimed, "It is nice to make heroic decisions and to be prevented by 'circumstances beyond your control' from ever trying to execute them." That reminds me of someone appearing brave in a hypothetical situation. How can you know what your reaction will be when the critical moment arrives?

Occasionally at the bridge table, circumstances are beyond your control. Partner doesn't see your beautiful line of defense, going onto a losing side track. However, much more often, if you see how to defeat a contract, you will be in a position to do just that.

For example, in this deal, South is in six spades. West leads the club king. How should the defense proceed?

It is reasonable for North to launch into a slam via Blackwood — assuming South isn't a Young Turk who would open four spades with 13 cards, of

which a majority are spades of some ilk.

After West leads the club king, East can see how to defeat the contract, assuming South has at least two clubs (which is likely). If a second round of clubs is led, dummy will be forced to ruff. Then declarer cannot pick up East's spade king, and the contract goes down. So, perhaps you think East should encourage with the club eight. True, this might persuade West to lead a second club. However, it is much safer for East to overtake with the club ace and return a club, to make sure the dummy is forced to ruff.

Don't leave to partner what you can do yourself.

Blood type can affect pregnancy

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please review Rh blood typing and how it can complicate childbirth.

DEAR READER: Blood cells are coated with proteins that are like fingerprints; they may identify the bearer. The simplest classification of blood types is the Rh factor, in contrast to the additional classification of A, B, AB or O. Every living person is either Rh-positive or Rh-negative. This designation was derived from early blood grouping that involved the rhesus monkey. When you are Rh-positive, you carry the Rh protein; when Rh-negative, you are free of it.

If an Rh-negative woman conceives a child by an Rh positive father, the baby may inherit the father's Rh-positive blood group. As the fetus grows and forms its own blood, traces of this blood normally enter the mother's circulation via the placenta. In the Rh-negative mother, such Rh-positive blood is immediately perceived as a threat, as something dangerously foreign that must be destroyed.

Her own chemical system begins frantically to make anti-Rh antidote to

protect her. This anti-Rh protein enters the fetal circulation and begins methodically to destroy the baby's Rh-positive blood cells.

At birth, such a child will be anemic and jaundiced from mother-induced blood-cell breakdown. In the most fundamental sense, the infant has been uncontrollably poisoned by its own mother.

Before the advent of exchange transfusions, such babies suffered a high mortality rate. Now, with present techniques, the problem is completely solvable, but may require that the infant's entire blood volume be washed out and replaced with new Rh-positive blood. Since the baby after birth is "free living," he or she can happily go about making Rh-positive blood, while the mother makes her own brand of Rh-negative.

Repeated, incompatible pregnancies result in more and more Rh-incompatibility; the mother's immune system "remembers" the preceding pregnancies. Therefore, while the first Rh baby may be only mildly affected, subsequent children will be progressively more afflicted by this strange interaction between mother and her unborn child.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can vitamin E prevent heart attacks?

DEAR READER: I am unaware of any consistent and valid evidence that vitamin E helps to prevent heart attacks. True, some studies have suggested that it may play a role, but the effects of the vitamin are incompletely understood and the genesis of heart attacks is still unclear. There is ongoing research to delineate further the relation of vitamin E to cardiovascular disorders.
