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PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY IN ORLANDO

MEETING OF CHURCHMEN CLOSES—SHORTEST SESSION IN HISTORY

Orlando, May 26.—The fifty sixth General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States was dissolved today at a few minutes past noon. This marks the second shortest Assembly in the history of the church, the shortest having been that at Bristol, Tenn., which was in session about one hour less than the one of this year.

In addition to the action of the Assembly regarding the protest matter, the session of today was occupied with the clearing of the docket in the adoption of reports not yet considered. An interesting address before the Assembly was that delivered by Rev. Robert H. Fleming, the representative of the body, to the western division of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches.

The Assembly also adopted resolutions regarding the report of the committee on resolution of thanks.

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DRAINAGE DELAYED IN UPPER ST. JOHNS

CHIEF ENGINEER CLAIMS AMENDMENT NO GOOD

Washington, D. C., May 24.—Senator D. U. Fletcher of Florida, today prevented the adoption of an amendment to the river and harbor bill that the St. Johns river, south of Salt Run, should be declared a non-navigable waterway. Just what was thus accomplished is shown in the following remarks of Senator Fletcher.

"I will simply say that I think the purpose of the amendment was without doing any real harm to the navigation of the river to promote the improvement of a large area of land lying in what is going to be a drainage district of the head waters of the St. Johns. There was a difference between the engineers of the drainage district and the army engineers as to the plans for promoting that drainage, and it was proposed that the drainage district should be given the right to do as it pleased.

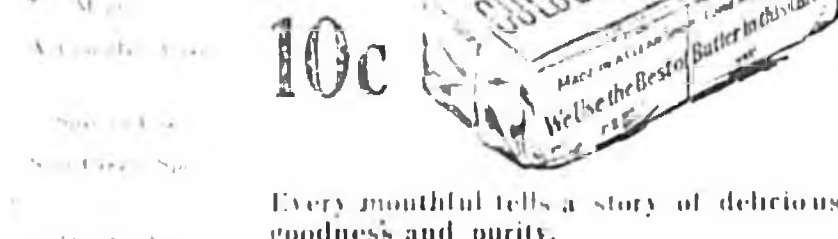

slovenly housekeeper, and there is no law to compel them to their duty, excepting the power of the people who elected them to their places.

It is essential that such men be placed in office as will legislate intelligently for the public good. They may be entirely honest, but if they are ignorant and can't or won't absorb wisdom, they have no right to hold office. It is a duty that the voter owes himself and his neighbors to see that his legislator, his sheriff and county commissioner are honest, intelligent and progressive. And there is quite as much to be feared from ignorance as from crookedness.

It is a duty of every voter to inform himself as to the attitude of every candidate for office toward the health matters of Florida. Every candidate from aspirants for the governorship to those who want to be constables should be asked to declare himself in public utterance on health matters. Each should state whether the administration of the State Health Department, in his opinion, has been satisfactory, and whether or not he is willing and will, when called upon, support reasonable

measures for the protection of public health in the state. There should be no trading for votes by candidates where the health of the state can possibly be made the basis of exchange or influence. If the people of Florida are dissatisfied with the conduct of the Health Department through its progressive and successful management of more than twenty-five years, let them express themselves to that effect in their votes. If the candidates, representing the people favor a change, let them be honest and fearless in saying so. Make them tell the voters what they believe could be enacted into law to improve present conditions in the health status of Florida.

Florida's State Board of Health has been instrumental in securing the enactment by various legislatures of a considerable number of laws, whose sole and unselfish object is to conserve public health. These laws have been the results of years of close study of the conditions that they aim to remedy. Some of these laws are practically dead because they have not been generally enforced. The State Board not being clothed with executive authority is powerless to force the ob-

servance of these laws, powerless beyond the power that belongs to every citizen to bring notice and proof of violation to the attention of administrative officials. Ofttimes and repeatedly it has entered such complaints and it has asked those in power to enforce the laws which would bring relief from avoidable evils, and its complaints have been ignored.

The Board asks cooperation among the voters of Florida at the elections in June, to secure the election in every county in the state of men who appreciate the fact that health is the biggest asset that the public or the individual possesses or can possess, who will conscientiously and actively and aggressively remember this fact after election, as well as before, and who will have the welfare, the healthfulness of their communities as a burden on their souls as long as they hold public office.

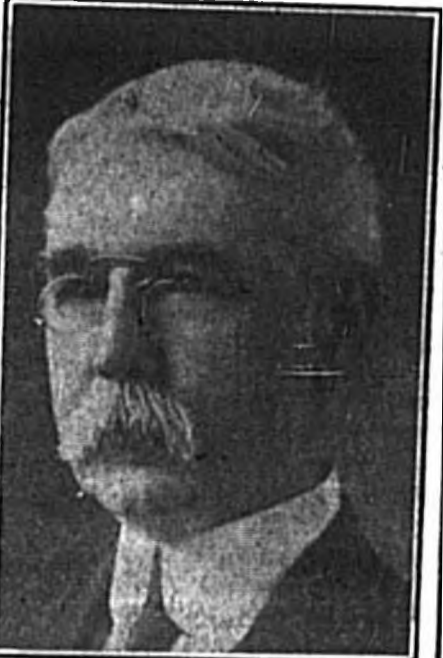

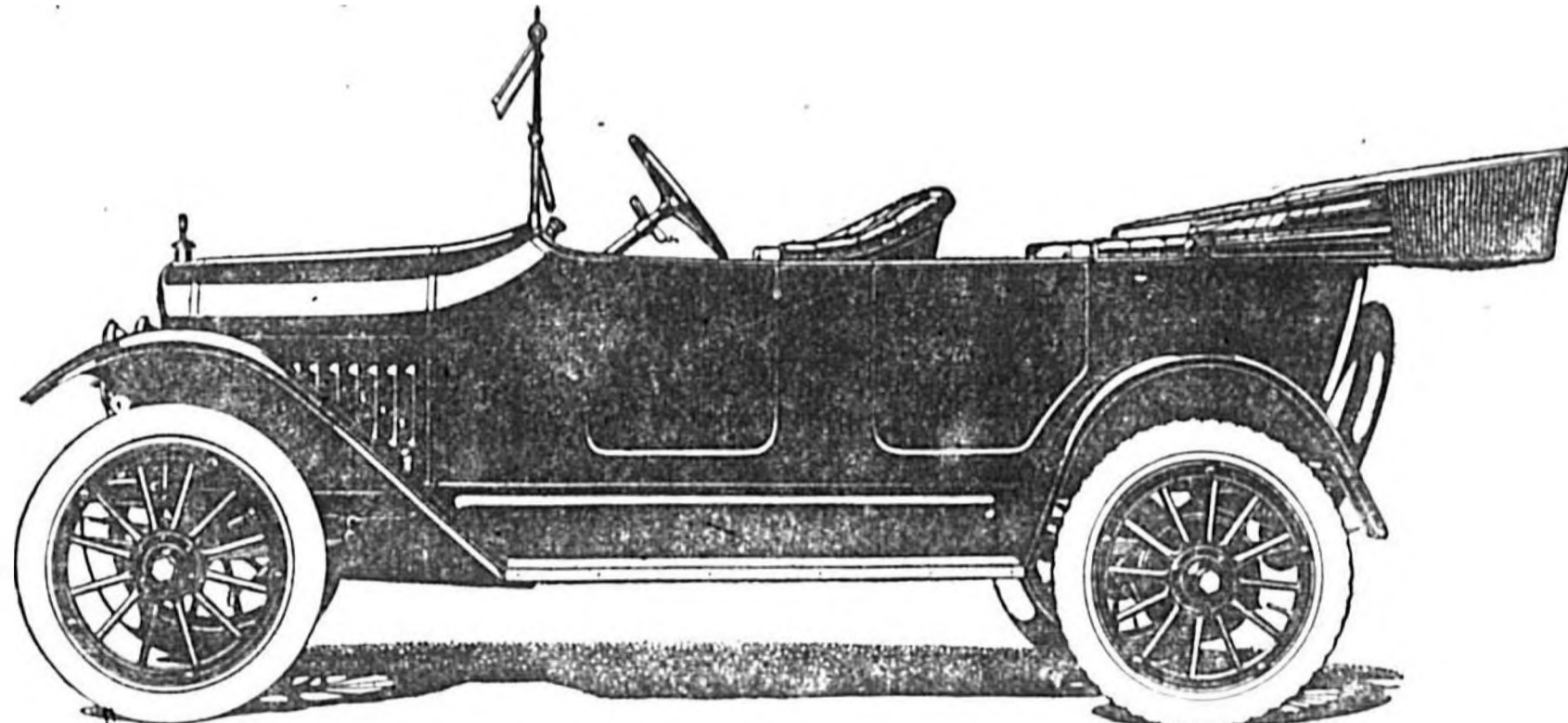
