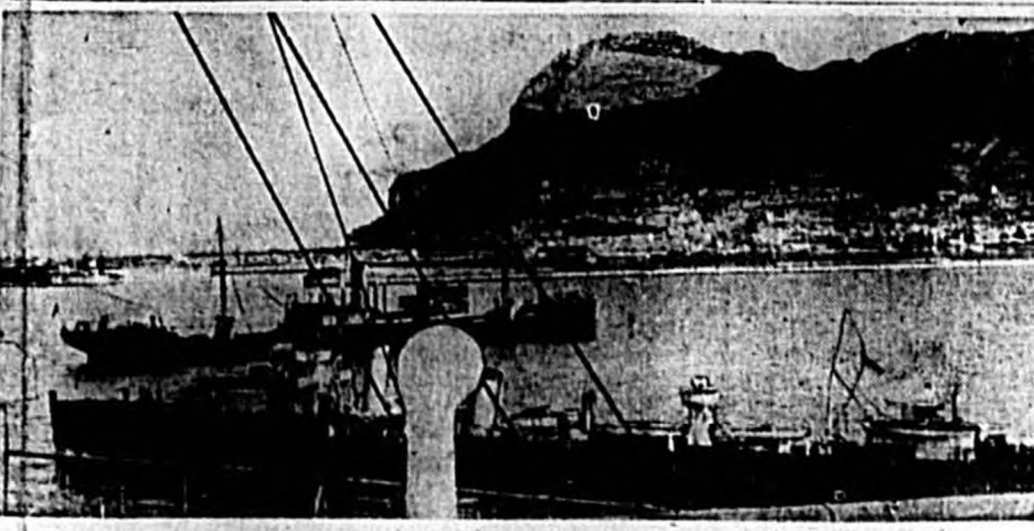

Temperatures Above 32 Are Seen Tonight

Longest Cold Wave In
Florida's History
Is Apparently Broken
Mercury Rises

Extent Of Loss Still Doubt

32 To 40 Degrees Is
Forecast For Pen-
insula Tonight

LAKELAND, Jan. 30.—(AP)—For the first time in nearly two weeks the Weather Bureau forecast temperatures above the freezing point for all parts of peninsular Florida.

The good news came as business cities and resort centers slowly returned to normal activities following the longest cold wave in the state's history.

Efforts were intensified in Washington to obtain federal aid for Florida growers who suffered crop damage which may run into millions of dollars.

The Federal-State Frost Warning Service said the lowest temperatures would be above the danger point for citrus and truck at all stations and in all districts with the lowest temperatures ranging from slightly above 32 degrees in the extreme north portion and near 40 degrees in the central and south portions.

The cold wave was definitely over, but official estimates of damage to agriculture from loss of the most severe weather periods in 1939-40 were still lacking.

Members of Florida's delegation in Congress began an investigation by federal agencies to determine damage and estimate the state marketing bureau at Jacksonville said losses were "very, very heavy" and would run into millions of dollars.

The citrus commission will meet Wednesday to consider the fruit situation throughout the state resulting from a 12-day freeze and determine action necessary under conditions.

Falling of the special session was announced last night by Secretary Charles F. Chastain. Control committee administering Florida's federal marketing agreement will attend.

The state chamber of commerce expressed fear that Florida's losses might be increased if winter visitors left the state to seek warmth in sections with more heating facilities. The chamber urged the press and the radio to advise tourists that the weather bureau had given definite assurance that the cold wave had broken and normal weather again would prevail.

Experts at the state marketing bureau called the long cold spell climaxed by Sunday morning temperatures as low as 17 and 18 degrees far down the Everglades muklands "one of the worst freezes in modern times."

They said reports based on first surveys indicated the value of citrus crops was \$100,000,000.

10 Years Ago

If you are looking back with regret to the good old days of 1929, and feel that the United States is getting old and that its future is behind it, says the Wall Street Journal, here are a few of the things that industry and science have created in 10 years.

Some are just being hatched from their scientific eggs—some we knew about 10 years ago but had not begun to use fully.

Here they are as listed by the Journal—still growing: Transoceanic passenger air traffic across both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Thirty passenger, four engine sleeper planes for transcontinental travel with 2,000 horsepower motors instead of 400 horsepower.

Hundred octane gasoline for airplane motors and large production of 70 to 80 octane gasoline.

A whole new technique of oil refining and processing that is going to turn the oil industry into a synthetic organic chemical industry, and which mean plant expenditures of many hundred million over the next decade.

A completely new synthetic organic chemical industry, in the incubator stage in 1930, which has created a thousand new chemicals and new tank car business.

The new synthetic textile fibres, Nylon and Vinyon, in some ways much better than silk, and unlike rayon in composition.

Industrial felts and textiles made from acetylene gas. Synthetic rubber in variety, better than natural rubber in withstanding oil and oxidation, ready for industry when needed.

Half a dozen new plastics and resins, such as Styrene, the best insulator in the plastic field; various types of vinyls; duPont's Lucite with the properties of rock crystal; others under way.

Organic chemicals, including synthetic vanilla and plastics from the waste liquors of the paper industry.

New plywoods with plastic glues, sufficiently strong and resistant to the elements so that they can be used for building houses, boats and airplane wings.

Sulphadiazole and sulphapyridine, drugs that cure the deadly streptococcus germs, pneumonia and perhaps many other diseases.

Synthetic vitamins and hormones, once thought to be mysterious products of living plants and animals and now just new organic chemicals, helpful to health.

Tank car shipment of liquid oxygen which has revolutionized use of this gas in the steel industry.

Record use of ferro-alloys to make record amounts of fine steels in infinite variety for specialized uses.

Continuous wide sheet steel mills.

New metals for alloys, including columbium, tantalum and beryllium.

Multi-million-volt X-ray atom smashers that are enabling the research man to know the structure of the molecule and how to make it do tricks. New devices using infra-red light and electric current to make diagrams of organic molecules—which sounds pretty theoretical, but which is being put to highly practical use.

Fluorescent lighting—using new chemicals to coat light tubes which use a fraction of current now required and give better light in colors if desired. Some day we may paint our walls with fluorescent paint.

Modulated frequency radio broadcasting that does away with static and gives "clear as a bell" reception.

Television, coming slowly, but rapidly improving in quality and use.

Better safety glass using new plastics as a binder.

Polarized glass and invisible glass.

Fibre glass for insulation and a new industrial use, also glass partitions.

Glass building blocks for houses and factories.

Streamline light weight passenger trains made of new steels and aluminum.

'March Of Time' Film Shows Fighting Finns

The courageous fight of the Finnish people against the Russian invaders is vividly shown in the latest "March of Time" film to be shown at the Ritz tomorrow and Thursday.

Entitled "The Republic of Finland," the film depicts the rise of the Finns through the centuries as they fought for their freedom against the tyranny of the czars, finally achieving it 21 years ago.

The character and national life of the Finns are shown in the picture which features scenes of the founding of the Republic in 1919 when General Mannerheim led the white armies against the Bolsheviks in a successful fight for independence.

The development of the republic since then is traced in this latest March of Time film, and it shows how the little nation was able to forestall starvation and immediate ruin with the aid of a heroic review of other vital phases of Finland's national life as dramatically portrayed in the "March of Time" film.

Much space is given to the interesting industrial production of the nation including the wood pulp industry which farms about 90 percent of the export trade of Finland.

The small but thriving agricultural development, the cooperative methods of production, distribution and consumption, development of cheap electric power, progressive system of government, and other vital phases of Finland's national life are dramatically portrayed in the "March of Time" film.

 bombs near the steamer Llanwrthwl (4955 tons) in the Tyne estuary and several air raid alarms were sounded along the coast. One report said 18 Nazi planes were seen over the east coast itself. Violent explosions were heard at a north Yorkshire resort.

Ships reported attacked besides the Llanwrthwl and Tautmla, were: British Officer, 6200 tons; Stamburgh, 2500 tons; (Liverpool); Kaituma, 2272 tons; Wellpart, 4619 tons; Impetini, 1000 tons; Atholl Monarch, and the Danny Blyn. The names of the two lightships were not available.

In one instance, a German plane was said to have attacked a merchant ship about a mile from the coast, dropping six bombs which it hurriedly hurled into underground shelters.

On land bitter weather tied up food, freight and mail trains from 11 to 24 hours. Nearly 400 passengers were kept in their compartments when the trains were stranded.

As transport officials struggled to get traffic moving, hundreds of thousands of Londoners walked to work, many arriving hours late.

The aerial attacks were coupled with a British announcement that three neutral ships had been sunk by German submarines.

 able winter vegetable crop in South Florida had been killed, the huge citrus crop severely damaged, the strawberry and watermelon crop in jeopardy.

They were reluctant to place the losses in terms of dollars, saying that would depend on how much could be salvaged and the condition of markets as a result of the freeze.

The citrus crop last year was valued at \$50,000,000; the winter vegetable crop at \$38,500,000; the strawberry and watermelon crop at \$5,000,000.

Fruitmen, busy trying to protect their trees last night and to salvage something by rashing oranges, grapefruit, and tangerines, were hoping for warmer weather cause rapid deterioration, varied their estimates of the loss at from 20 to 90 percent.

George E. Copeland, state marketing inspector for the Florida department of agriculture, said:

"Losses will not be as great as temperatures ranging throughout the citrus belt would indicate. Thermometers dropped very low but the trees and fruit were able to withstand lower temperatures due to the fact that we have had cool weather for the past six weeks."

"This caused trees to be in a more dormant state than I personally ever have seen them in during 14 years' connection with the state bureau. There was practically no new growth and the cool weather also contributed toward the maturing of fruit. As a consequence all kinds of fruit were unusually well matured."
