Oil Company Rocked By Explosion, Fire

WHITING, Ind., Aug. 28 (AP)—An explosion rocked a portion of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana's plant early today, causing the company to lose 24,000 barrels daily capacity in processing crude oil, company officials said.

One worker, Julius Kopaz, 52, of Whiting was missing as flames fought flames which at first were brought under control, then broke out again several hours later. Three workers, injured slightly, were given first aid treatment and returned to their jobs.

The explosion, which occurred in a pump house serving the company's No. 5 and 6 pipe stills, was heard for a radius of a mile from the blast. Within two hours, flames which followed the explosion were reported under control, but fire broke out again around 9:00 A. M.

A company spokesman estimated damage at \$78,000, and said that the cut in daily crude oil capacity necessitated by the damage was doubly severe because it was added to destruction of another daily 2400 barrels capacity suffered in another fire three weeks ago.

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 28 (AP)—Police prohibited a meeting called tonight by the "committee for liberation of the Nile Valley," which proposed an immediate "national struggle" against the United Nations rejection of Egypt's demand for immediate withdrawal of British troops.

The committee, which asserted it included representatives of all political parties, met Tuesday and demonstrations followed.

Members of the Muslim Brotherhood, who led violent anti-British and anti-American demonstrations last Friday, were to listen by radio today to proceedings of the Security Council hearing the Egyptian plea.

The newspaper said the British army had placed cities in the Suez Canal zone out of bounds to its troops because of tension and ordered all units to place mines around their camps.

Towns With Hobbies Are Happier Places

When the Packers, a professional football team—loses a game, the players sometimes sneak down the back streets of Green Bay, Wis. They can't stand the sight of so many sad faces.

That's because Green Bay is a town with a hobby and the fortunes of the Green Bay Packers are the direct concern of almost the entire population.

There are hobby towns all over the United States, in which a leisure project, game or interest is the avocation of almost everyone.

Hobby towns are happy towns. Catching tourists is only an incidental by-product.

Consider Prescott, Ariz. and its annual Snake Dances. Back in 1921 a group of local residents decided to put on an entertainment. Part of it was to be a burlesque of the old Hopi Indian snake dances.

Something happened that switched the project from burlesque to a serious imitation—and a hobby was born. The students of Indian lore banded together as an organization called the "Smoki people." Waving live snakes and hinting that their rituals will bring rain, the Smoki present their dances annually before large crowds.

Ethnologists who have seen the smoki performances say it is hard to tell between the Hopi McCoy and the white man's fasciols.

Seventeen years ago the Gainesville, Tex., amateur theater was on its last, shaky legs. The little theater enthusiasts decided to give a burlesque circus to put the project in the black. That was the birth of a famous town hobby, the Gainesville community circus.

High school kids do the tumbler act, the undertaker takes tickets, a railroad switchman does a trapeze act. It's a real circus, complete with home-trained animal acts, high-wire performers and a troupe of clowns. Last year it netted \$25,000.

Apart from the financial returns, Gainesville's happy hobby has brought about decline in juvenile delinquency. It has netted a town of 12,000 in a common cause, providing year-round physical exercises for young and old performers.

Rossmore Island, N. C., is a whole hobby land. Ten years ago someone wrote a sympathetic drama, "The Lost Colony," about the founding of the English colony on the island 250 years before and retold the story of Virginia Dare. The island folk whose daily language still sounds like Elizabethan English, put on an amateur production for their own delight.

Today the big show—an annual affair—draws crowds from all over the United States. When the open-air Waterside Theater burned, this summer, in mid-season, volunteers by the score appeared to rebuild it in big time so the show could go on.

Most rodeos are small town picnics where the local boys and girls show how good they are. Around Cody, Wyo., for instance, ranchers and their families spend plenty of time in the early Summer polishing up saddles and chaps and practicing bulldozing. Then at the July round-up, men and women, young and old, perform with only a handful of competition from outsiders.

The hobby of Bemidji, Minn., is spinning tall tales about Paul Bunyan, the lumberman's hero, and Babe, the Blue Ox. Bemidji is headquarters for Bunyan lore and an annual celebration.

New Orleans has its Mardi Gras, a festival which is one of America's great off-season (February) attractions for tourists, vying with ski centers and Florida beaches.

Long before the big show held an important spot in travel agents' pamphlets, the residents of the old French city in Louisiana held their traditional blowout. The Mardi

with a year-round membership of around 10,000. One club has 103 courts and a concrete, covered grandstand which holds a cheering section of 500 persons.

But perhaps the most fanatical hobbyists of them all are the 50,000 residents of Green Bay where the football season officially opens Aug. 1.

Football became Green Bay's principal obsession after 1923 when almost everyone in town bought, for a few pieces, shares in a shaky pro club which couldn't even manage \$250 to keep its National League franchise. Today the crowd packs a stadium of 24,000 seats for at-home games.

**Australian Ants Are Brought To U. S.**

OAKLAND, Calif. — Meet the bull ant of the Antipodes. "He" may be a lady, but grows to be an inch long and charges like a bull at anything threatening his nest, which is in Australia.

If the Department of Agriculture has its way, this ant will never break up an American picnic.

Australian Naturalist Ellen Clark, of Box Hill, near Melbourne, has arrived with 1,700 of these ants, with which she "sat up" on the 8,000-mile flight across the Pacific.

The idea is to compare the ants with the less belligerent ants of America. Miss Clark has been studying bull ants for a year and is cooperating with the American Research Institute.

Most bull ants, she explains, are not really bulls at all. Most are "chiefs" or sexually immature females who do all the work and fighting.

The male of the species, known as Myrmica, is no great shakes. He flies only on his honeymoon, then dies. His widow, however, tears off her own wings and devotes her life to laying eggs, eight to 10 in a batch.

Miss Clark soon will have to take these ants back to Australia by plane. The Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine is out to see that no Australian bull ant, sexually immature or not, gets loose in this country.

"Pooh," says Miss Clark. "If turned loose they would die. I'm sure of it. They would not climate."

"Besides," smiles this ant's aunt from the antipodes, "these ant are not anticipating."
