## County official: London trip was on agenda

SANFORD - Seminole County Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide and County Clerk of the Court Maryanne Morse both refuse to back off from a dispute concerning his costs for a trip to Europe last August.

Morse said again on Tuesday that the Board of County Commissioners authorized Van Der Weide's business trip to the Netherlands but did not approve a three-day visit to London. She also says Van Der Weide failed to produce receipts for his \$50-a-day meal allowance.

"Until I hear otherwise, I can not accept his expenses for the London trip," Morse said. "It's a matter of ethical standards." Morse said the board of commissioners could solve some of the dispute by retroactively approving Van Der Weide's London trip. The board meets on Tuesday, Jan. 14.

"She's looking for a way out," Van Der Weide said. "It's done with; a matter of record. The London trip was part of the plan. Everyone knew it. Maryanne Morse could have checked it but refuses to because she enjoys playing God almighty."

In a meeting Tuesday attended by County Manager Gary Kaiser, County Attorney

## Scottish share culture, tradition in anticipation of Highland Games

LAKE MARY - There was no shortage of smiling faces or plaid during a preview Tuesday of some of the events that will be held Jan. 17 during the Central Florida Scottish Highland Games.

Representatives of the Scottish American Society of Central Florida shared culture, tradition, food and drink during a demonstration at the Bistro Cappuccino. Athletes, dancers, pipers and drummers set the pace

as spectators participated in a haggis ceremony and whiskey noosing.

"It's called the water of life," said Ben Scott of the traditional drink of Scotland. "The word whiskey, he explained is derived from the Gaelic word for water."

Scott, a spokesman for the Scottish Games and author of the *Bl of Thistle*, the Scottish society's newsletter, said his group expects to see about 10,000 visitors this year at the games. About 1,500 people from all over the

## Tempers flare over name of airport

SANFORD - Tempers flared Tuesday as airport authority board members once again decided to table the issue on whether to change the name of the Orlando Sanford Airport.

Though not on the agenda, the question on the name came up when board member Duke Adamson tried to introduce Phil Overton, managing director of Leisure Travel, which books about 20 percent of the flights arriving from England.

With all the noise and dissension regarding the name change, which has also traveled across the Atlantic, Adamson said it was important for the board to hear how the British felt.

Board chairman Sandra Glenn declined the request saying she wanted to postpone discussion until the marketing firm, hired through the recent joint agreement between the airport and the Greater Orlando Airport Authority, makes its presentation to the board.

"When this becomes an agenda item, then you can bring it up," Glenn said.

"I disagree because I requested the item be on the agenda and it was removed a few days before the meeting," Adamson said, adding that he was not calling for a vote.

Adamson said he wanted to act in the airport's best interest and was trying to be hospi-

table to a large customer.

"He's not our customer," Glenn said. "He is a customer of OSI and they are our customer."

Glenn said as chairman it was her prerogative to add or remove items from the agenda.

Board member Ken Wright said he was fed up with the media's attempt to create an image of dissension regarding the name of the airport. "I don't know of any dissension."

Board member Lon Howell said he was concerned that through what has appeared in the newspapers, Adamson was trying to sell the existing name and cause dissension. Howell later made the motion to change the name of the airport to Sanford Orlando International Airport. However, he withdrew the motion after airport attorney Steve Coover questioned whether Howell could act as a board member before Jan. 8.

By city charter, Howell, who served on the Sanford Commission, must wait a year before his term begins on the airport authority. Mayor Larry Dale told Coover that according to the charter, Howell was eligible immediately.

Wright said before a decision is made there should be planning and discussion also involving the City of Sanford and he did not appreciate "some guy trying to lecture me on something like this." Wright

## Sanford police officers go high tech to fight crime

SANFORD - Crime fighting efforts of Sanford police officers will soon be enhanced through technology.

The Sanford Police Department last month received 32 laptop computers. The purchase was made possible through the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant amounting to \$11,046. The SPD contributed \$12,338 toward the computers through a trust fund, according to Sgt. Mark Nichols, who is responsible for training police officers in the use of the laptops.

"We wanted the laptops so we can do police reports, drivers' license checks and arrest and warrant checks," Nichols said. "It's similar to what the sheriff's office uses."

The modem driven computers are state of the art and virtually indestructible, Nichols said. The laptops will be issued to the road patrol and eventually every officer will

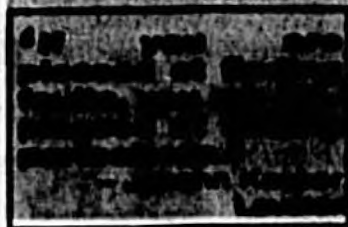

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## Citizens chase and beat robbery suspect

MIDWAY - A man accused of robbing an elderly Midway woman will appear in court with a lacerated face, after neighbors chased the suspect, handcuffed him to a fence, and beat him until sheriff's deputies arrived.

Thomas Murrell, 67, 201 Martin Luther King Boulevard, Cincinnati, and Lawrence Harrison, 55, 1018 West Anderson St., Orlando, are accused of robbing an 85-year-old woman of \$3,000 on Tuesday. Murrell is charged with robbery, aggravated battery and impersonating a law enforcement officer. He is currently in Orlando Regional Medical Center recov-

ering from injuries received in the fight with Midway residents Tuesday. Harrison will make his initial court appearance today, charged with one count of robbery.

According to the sheriff's spokesman, Ed McDonough, the incident began about 1 p.m. Tuesday when Murrell and an unidentified woman confronted the victim at her Midway Avenue home. They identified themselves as police officers. Murrell and his accomplice allegedly told the victim that they had just seen her pass a phony \$10 bill at a Sanford grocery store. They asked to see all her money to

have a computer. "This is going to speed things up for the officers because everything can be done at the scene," Nichols said. Legibility of the police reports is also greatly improved by using the laptops, Nichols said. A laser printer will generate the reports, the format of which is the same as those used currently at the station, he said. Nichols said his department is also waiting to see what type of software state law enforcement agencies will be

using. "We'll try to go by what the state chooses," he said. Nichols held the first in-house computer training session Tuesday. Depending on the individuals' knowledge of computers, he said hands on training could take anywhere from a few minutes to an hour. The second session will be on Thursday. "It's real easy," he said of the Windows based program. "It's self-explanatory." Nichols said SPD commanders and supervisors are famil-

iar with the software and are using it in-house.

Police officers will be required to input information onto a form that will appear on the computer screen. For now, the software is limited to the reports, however Nichols said the police department will be searching for software that will allow additional functions such as drivers' license and arrest and warrant searches.

"Everyone is biting at the bit to get these on the road," he said. "We're ready to push this on to the street."

Bob McMillan, Economic Development Manager Bob Turk and Economic Development Planner John Jones, Van Der Weide produced a day-by-day, hour-by-hour appointment summary of the August trip.

Clearly, his itinerary included a train trip from Rotterdam to London on Thursday, Aug. 21. He had a 4 p.m. meeting at the U.S. Embassy Commercial Services Agency. Topics discussed included services available to Seminole companies.

"I was given an itinerary and I followed it," Van Der Weide said. "London was part of it."

"Everyone in the county knows he went to London on a pleasure trip with his wife, Judy," Morse said. "And I still don't understand how we're supposed to pay for his London hotel that was paid for by a credit card belonging to his

sister. It doesn't add up."

The purpose of Van Der Weide's European trip was to establish direct contacts with government and business leaders who can support and influence increased trade and investment between the Central Florida Region, Seminole County, and the City of Rotterdam, Netherlands, Wicklow County, Ireland and London.

Van Der Weide was part of a mission team consisting of Seminole County Government representatives, as well as those from the Seminole County Tourism Development Commission and the Economic Development Commission of Mid Florida.

"The sad thing about this whole episode is the fact the economic development program is one of the bright, shining stars in county government," Van Der Weide. "The results are very positive. I've

been part of it since Day 1. I'm proud of the role I've had. This hassle over the August trip distracts from the good that is being accomplished."

"Was I authorized to go to London? I certainly was," Van Der Weide said.

"Was I authorized to receive the \$50 a day in meals? I certainly was."

"I didn't set up the criteria. It was done in advance. The whole hassle is nothing but the shrewdest of political games I've ever experienced. It's a political hatchet job by Maryanne Morse and (Deputy Clerk) Bob Lewis. They're both trying to play God."

Van Der Weide said he has done no wrong. "If anyone wants to check, they'll see that I don't charge for mileage when I inspect sites in county business. I'm not out to pick up any extra bucks."

country will be participating in the scheduled events, he said.

Longtime Sanford resident and former Seminole County School Board member Al Keeth performed the hags ceremony as he recited a piece by poet Robert Burns. Hags, the national food of Scotland, is a mixture of liver and other ingredients which are packed into a bag and then boiled. Choosing to forsake the traditional bag, which is a sheep's stomach, the cook used a small burlap bag.

In its 21st year, the games were held in Orlando until three years ago when the event moved to Seminole County.

"We wooed them here," said Jack Wert, executive director of the Seminole County Tourist Development Commission. "The event is important to the eco and heritage tourism in the county."

In addition to the competitions in bagpiping, drumming and dancing, there will be live jousting with real weapons and the Field of Bannockburn, which is a re-creation of Scottish history from the 13th century.

"It's like an encampment," said Anyah Cook, an event or-

ganizer. Appearing in costume will be historical figures such as William Wallace, Robert the Bruce and Mary Queen of Scots.

Dressed in his signature kilt, Chip Crawford, who will be portraying Wallace, said he travels to shows around the country because he enjoys it and also because he is Scottish. Crawford is also related to William Wallace.

Athletic competitions will include the caber toss where an 18-foot wooden pole, similar in size to a telephone pole and weighing close to 130 pounds is thrown, the hammer toss and the stone throw. In addition to the feats of strength, there will be sheep herding, a hags toss, and a parade.

Anne Morrison, chieftain of the Morrison clan, is charged with drumming up membership and keeping the Scottish heritage alive.

By encouraging clans, which are families, Morrison said it keeps people together and involved in the culture. Her group also promotes scholarships to encourage participation by the youth "so they can carry on when we are gone."

"We all have roots and this allows us to get together," she said.

The event will be held from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Seminole Greyhound Park in Casselberry. For more information and tickets, call 426-SCOT or 1-800-800-7832.

determine if it was counterfeit.

The victim spread \$2,000 in cash on the table. McDonough said Murrell and his accomplice began scooping up the money just as the victim's daughter came home and realized what was happening. The pair ran from the house and reportedly got into a car with Harrison.

A group of Midway citizens chased the suspects, apprehending Murrell on Center Street. The citizens handcuffed him to a fence post with his own handcuffs and beat him. When Seminole County sheriff's deputies arrived, Murrell's suit was shredded and he had severe facial injuries. A group of citizens had Harrison in custody. The female accomplice is still being sought.

said did not appreciate Adamson's unwittingly attempting to cause dissension for personal reasons.

"Let me talk plainly because we're talking around this," Wright said.

"That is just not true," Adamson said. "There is no private agenda here...I'm not a developer, I have nothing to gain. I have a personal belief this is the proper name for the future of the airport. I've been on this board for seven years...I don't do anything unwittingly."

As a board member, Adamson said, he had the right to speak and voice his opinions.

"I don't mind standing out in the storm," he said. "I enjoy it."

Overton, who flew into Sanford from England over the holidays, spoke to the board during the public input session. He told board members that he was in town for other business. "If the name change had come up he was prepared to offer input from the British carriers."

## Tardiness turns bowler into heroine

**ALTAMONTE SPRINGS** - There are many bowlers on bowling teams throughout Seminole County.

Through a very simple yet special act, one Lake Brantley bowler set herself apart from the rest.

Natalie Johnson, a freshman at the Altamonte Springs school, simply went to bowling practice one day and became a local hero.

"I only did what I thought was right and was trained to do in a first aid class," Johnson said. "I stood there for a moment and then just ran over. I didn't even think about it. I just did it."

Johnson is referring to an incident that occurred while she was at bowling practice.

She was a little late for practice, so Johnson and about five of her teammates stayed after to get in the games they had missed.

There was a birthday party at the other end of the bowling alley for a five year old little boy.

Suddenly, Johnson realized that the mother of the boy was screaming for help.

After a moment's pause, Johnson rushed over to the party and found the little boy choking. Without a second thought, she grabbed the boy, performed the Heimlich Maneuver.

"It took about five or six tries and finally I was able to dislodge a buttercotch candy that the boy was choking on," Johnson explained. "Once he was all right, his mother grabbed me and told me how thankful she was. I only did what I had been taught to do. I never really thought I would ever have to use it, though."

Luckily for the little boy, Johnson took up bowling when she was in the fifth grade. That year she maintained a .91 average, which is very good for a first year bowler.

She was always interested in bowling because her father bowled. Johnson also always wanted to be on the high school team.

"It has been so much fun being on the team," Johnson said. "I have made so many new friends and plan on staying on the team as long as they'll have me."

Johnson hopes that what she did will teach people not to be afraid to help if they know how.

She wants everyone to know that no matter what, they should at least offer to do whatever they can.

"I was really suprised that I was the only one who reacted," Johnson recalled. "Everyone else just stood there. The boy's mother attempted to help her son, but she was afraid she would hurt him."

In fact, knowing the importance of learning first aid has become evident to Johnson twice in the past few weeks.

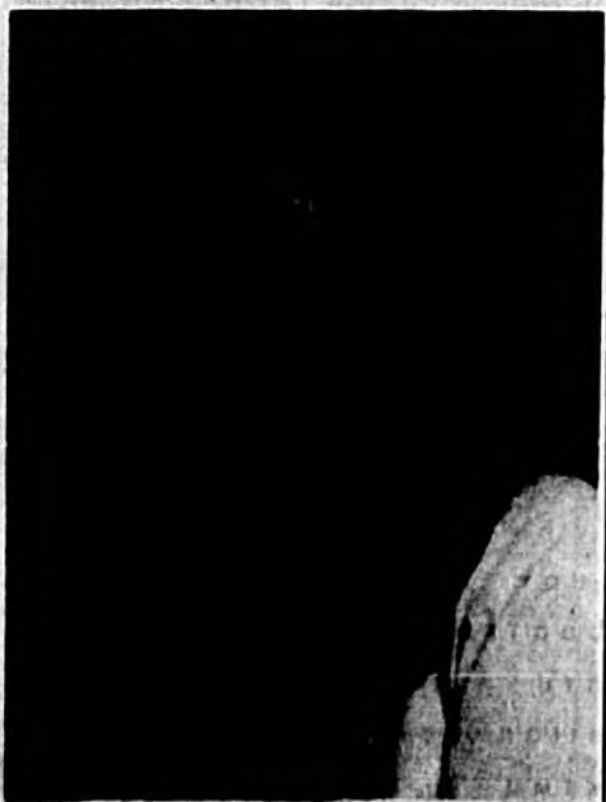
Just before the incident at the bowling alley, a friend of Johnson's mother died because he choked to death while he was alone.

Johnson said that while taking the "Safe Sitter" class two years ago, she was also taught how to do the Heimlich Maneuver when alone by using a chair.

"I really realize now how important it is for everyone to learn basic first aid," Johnson said. "You never know when you will need it."

There is at least one family that is very glad that Johnson took the class.

And very glad that she is on the Lake Brantley bowling team.

# Testosterone injections have risks

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 87 and receive testosterone injections every month to help with erections. Is there any harm in this?

DEAR READER: Yes, there is. Continued hormone stimulation in elderly men can lead to prostate cancer. If you understand this and accept it, you can keep going with your shots, but even at your age, there is a risk.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My elderly father, who fought in World War II, was recently hospitalized because of neglect by an HMO doctor. I don't know much about health maintenance organizations, but it doesn't seem right to me that these corporations are only concerned about bottom-line profits.

DEAR READER: Welcome to managed care, an unpleasant reality that is increasingly taking the responsibility for medical care away from physicians and giving it to corporate managers. HMOs want to make money — and this is what they're doing.

You may be surprised to learn that doctors have very little influence on HMO operations, and most physicians who have joined these organizations have experienced a drop in income. Moreover, some HMOs, such as Oxford, are in trouble because of "creative billing" and are under investigation by federal authorities.

Despite these facts, consumers — you — do have the power to change HMO policies by complaining to these huge companies in large numbers, or — as an alternative — changing plans altogether. For example, because your father is older than 65, he could choose to join Medicare directly; in my experience, this resource is more patient-friendly.

DEAR READER: Take him to the doctor for an examination. Gynecomastia (enlarged breasts) is common in boys at early adolescence and is caused by increasing levels of hormones. If your child is otherwise normal, I urge you to consider breast-reduction surgery. Growing up is tough enough without the stigma of gynecomastia in young men. The surgery should solve the problem and help improve your son's self-esteem.

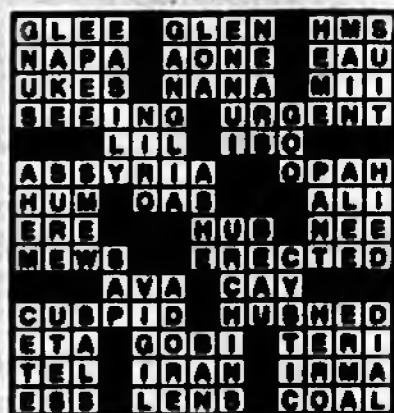

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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### With your eyes open

By Phillip Alder

It is a rule of Blackwood that you mustn't ask for aces when looking at two immediate losers in an unbid suit unless you are 100 percent sure partner has a control in that suit (the ace or king, a void or a singleton). However, there are times when expediency overrules.

This deal occurred in the Premier League in England, in which the top teams compete throughout the year.

That South hand is worth an opening one-bid. The six-card suit and three first-round controls make it stronger than a balanced 13- or 14-point hand — if a fit can be found.

Now, theoretically North shouldn't use Blackwood because of those club losers. However, it simplified the auction. And if South had shown only one ace, North was going to bid six

spades. Maybe it would be a laydown; maybe West would find the wrong opening lead.

One declarer immediately drew a second round of trumps. Then, when the hearts broke badly, he couldn't recover.

Count your tricks. You start with six spades, two hearts, two minor-suit aces and two diamond ruffs in the dummy: 12 in all. So, a long heart must be established. Win trick one in the dummy and immediately ruff a low heart with the spade queen. (Don't waste the dummy entry.) Play a trump back to dummy and cash the top hearts, throwing clubs from hand. Ruff a heart, cash the diamond ace, ruff a diamond, ruff a heart (bringing down the queen), ruff a diamond, and discard your last diamond on the heart jack.

True, here you could organize three diamond ruffs in the dummy, but the recommended line is better.
