Ferrell's resignation accepted

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board Tuesday accepted the resignation of Carey Ferrell, district's assistant superintendent for business and finance. Ferrell has accepted a similar position with the Orange County school district.

"I'll be unemployed for about two hours," he joked when chairman Ann Neiswender announced the resignation.

Ferrell, 59, will be leaving his \$66,595 a year job in Seminole County for a "substantial increase" in pay in Orange County. While the final figure has not yet been negotiated, Ferrell could make as much as \$80,000 a year in his new position.

He begins work in Orange County Monday, but as a Seminole County resident, Ferrell said he plans to remain active in this district's schools.

Board pays \$10,675 for fees

SANFORD — The Seminole County School board agreed Tuesday to pay \$10,675 in attorney's fees in a settlement with a former physical education instructor at Teague Middle School. The teacher had filed an unfair labor practices suit accusing Teague principal Sid Boyette of allegedly harassing the teacher in retaliation for her union activities.

The board agreed unanimously to pay the proposed amount, but member Larry Betsinger went on record as saying that he did not think it was right that a teacher made one tenth or less as much as an attorney and performed what he felt was a more important job.

"It's just not right," he said. Boyette, who is still principal at Teague, was not available for comment.

To merge, or not to merge

Local realtors may join forces with Orange Co.; vote set for next week

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Seminole County Realtors' ability to control their destiny could be diminished or eliminated if their 37-year-old organization merges with the Orange County Realtor's organization, says a Longwood Realtor who proposed the merger last year.

"If this proposal is to give us more clout, on which side is the clout?" Terry Duffy, of HD Realty Longwood, said Wednesday.

But Duffy's fear is expected to fall on unenrolled ears next Thursday when the 1,400 voting SCBR members are scheduled to decide whether to merge their organization with the Orlando Area Association of Realtors Thursday morning at the Altamonte Springs Hilton OAAR, which has mainly an Orange County membership, is scheduled to take their own vote the same day in Maitland.

Observers say the majority of the SCBR members support the merger because it will allow them to use and list properties in OAAR's

larger multiple property listing service. National Realtor rules require that Realtors belong to their local organization before joining another group. As a result, many Seminole County Realtors join both groups, paying dues to both.

If approved by the two organizations, state and national association approvals are assured, said Glenda Philpot, SCBR president and vice president of Emerson Realty Group, Altamonte Springs. The new organization would be named the "Greater Orlando Association of Realtors," Philpot said. The merger could be finalized as early as July or as late as November, she said.

Philpot, who supports the merger, said the See Merge, Page 5A

Lake Mary 'secret service' on the job

LAKE MARY — Volunteers in Public Safety (VIPS), are the secret service in Lake Mary. Maureen Liberatore from the Department of Public Safety said, "They serve the city behind the scenes," she said.

Although other Seminole County cities have used volunteers in a similar way, Lake Mary's program is relatively new.

Ten volunteers participate in the program,

which was begun in December. They perform a wide range of jobs for the city, from greeting the public to police work. "We have a certified police investigator who works with our police department, as a VIP," Liberatore said. "We are currently trying to recruit an engineer to work with our city planning staff, too."

Police Chief G. W. Lauderdale, said the volunteers play a key part in running the city. "The amount of money they save the city is See Volunteers, Page 5A

Garbage pickup now mandatory

SANFORD — Because of Seminole County Commissioners' action Tuesday, garbage pickup is mandatory and you have no choice about who will pick it up.

The commissioners endorsed a consultant's recommendation establishing mandatory countywide garbage collection and exclusive garbage hauler franchises. The recommendations were part of the county's Solid Waste Task Force recommendations approved by commissioners last October.

Many rural residents choose not to pay a regular hauler between \$7 and \$11 month for pickup service and dispose of their garbage on their own. Solid waste officials say much of that uncollected garbage is found in woods throughout the county.

Bill Neron, a member of the county's solid waste consulting firm The Solid Waste Group, said by having mandatory collection, people who are illegally dumping their garbage would have no incentive to continue their own dumping practice, and would reduce roadside and woodland eyesores.

Residents will be charged for the garbage collection on their annual tax bill. Neron said many homeowners pay monthly payments to a mortgage company which pays their taxes for them once a year and then divides those taxes into 12 payments to be paid along with their monthly home loan payments.

The garbage fee would be paid in a similar manner, so homeowners with mortgages, in effect, would be paying for the garbage collection service monthly, Neron said.

Each company would charge their own rates until 1992, the earliest the fee can be added to tax bills. That year, everyone will begin paying the same rate, including cities, Neron said it is too early to determine whether rates will See Garbage, Page 5A

LOST IN SPACE

The Intelsat 4 satellite launched Wednesday by a Titan 3 rocket is the most powerful civilian communications satellite ever built on a commercial basis. Here are details at a glance.

•Owner: The International Telecommunications Satellite Organization, a 118-nation consortium that handles most of the free world's space communications.

•Builder: Hughes Aircraft Co. of El Segundo, Calif.

•Contract value: \$700 million for five Intelsat 4 spacecraft, of about \$140 million each.

•Number of flights in date: 2 (one aboard a French-built Ariane 4 rocket in October and one Wednesday aboard a Titan 3 rocket built by Martin Marietta Astronautics Group of Denver.)

•Launch cost: \$270 million including the price of the satellite, the Titan 3 booster and other launch services.

•Satellite weight at lift-off: 29,448 pounds, including the weight of the spacecraft's built-in solid fuel booster.

Rollout of Discovery delayed; landing gear a source of concern

CAPE CANAVERAL — The shuttle Discovery's trip to the launch pad for blastoff April 12 to launch the Hubble Space Telescope was delayed at least 12 hours today because of concern about the ship's nose landing gear, officials said.

NASA spokesman George Diller said the decision to delay rollout was made after engineers discovered slightly "worn" nuts used to secure axle seals on the nose landing gear of the shuttles Columbia and Atlantis.

Launch director Robert Sieck then delayed Discovery's rollout to launch pad 39B until technicians can evaluate the problem.

"What they're doing is a risk analysis to find out what that erosion means," Diller said. "We're not sure we have a problem yet. We just observed something that's not standard."

Discovery's six-hour 4.2-mile trip from NASA's giant rocket assembly building to the pad had been scheduled to begin at 7:30 a.m. but it was delayed to no earlier than 7:30 p.m.

NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone said Wednesday engineers have four full days of "contingency" time in Discovery's launch processing schedule to handle unexpected problems and still make the April 12 launch date.

But if actual repairs are ordered for Discovery's nose wheel system, the shuttle would have to first be removed, or "destacked," from its external tank, which would put the April 12 date in doubt.

"They can't get to the nose wheel unless they destack the orbiter," Diller said. "But they don't know that they have a problem serious enough to warrant doing something that drastic."

Assuming no major change to the launch processing schedule, the Hubble Space Telescope is scheduled to be moved to the launch pad Monday for installation in Discovery's 60-foot cargo bay.

Shuttle commander Loren Shriver, co-pilot Charles Bolden and astronaut Steven Hawley, Bruce McCandless and Kathryn Sullivan plan to fly to the Kennedy Space Center Monday from Houston to participate in a dress-rehearsal countdown and to See Rollout, Page 5A

Truck driver arrested after fatal crash

A Florida truck driver crossed the divider on the State Inland Expressway and slammed into a passenger car, killing its elderly driver, and police charged him with drunk driving, authorities said Thursday.

Michael Bishop, 32, of Cape Canaveral, Fla., was arrested at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday shortly after the incident on the expressway near Mosel Avenue, said Sgt. Ed Burns, a police spokesman.

Burns said Bishop, driving a Mack truck westbound on the State Inland Expressway, crossed the divider and struck a late model Pontiac driven by Isaac Lerner, 65, of 1036 48th St. in Brooklyn.

Lerner, who had no passengers, was pronounced dead at the scene, Burns said.

Bishop was arrested and charged with driving while intoxicated, said Burns, who was unsure where the truck was coming from and where it was bound.

Drive-by gunman opens fire on children

JACKSONVILLE — Authorities said Wednesday they still have no suspects in their search for someone who shot and killed a 3-year-old girl and wounded her 4-year-old sister.

Officials said Latricia and Lamisha Johnson were playing on the front porch of their north Jacksonville home about 8 p.m. Tuesday when shots were fired. Police arrived to find Latricia Johnson had been hit in the head, while her older sister had been hit in the shoulder.

Latricia Johnson was pronounced dead a short time later at a local hospital. Her sister is recovering from the shoulder wound.

Police said Lamisha Johnson told them that the shots were fired from a gray car, but she could not provide much more information.

Investigators said they found some shell casings about 100 yards from the house.

Campan won't run against Martinez

TALLAHASSEE — Gainesville real estate man and auctioneer Ben Campan surprised his supporters Wednesday by announcing that he would not run against Gov. Bob Martinez in the Republican primary.

Campan, a long-time Republican fundraiser whose gubernatorial candidacy had been rumored for weeks, said he would run instead for the District 6 state Senate seat held by Democrat George Kirkpatrick.

In announcing his surprise plans, Campan expressed his support for Martinez and called on other Republican primary candidates to get out of the race.

"A divisive primary is the last thing the Republican Party needs in this crucial election year," Campan said in urging state Sen. Marlene Woodson-Howard, former Gov. Claude Kirk and attorney Anthony Martin to pull out of the gubernatorial primary.

"I predict that the governor's popularity will improve dramatically in the coming months, once he gets his message out, (and) that he ... will be overwhelmingly re-elected in November," he said.

Campan has been openly dissatisfied with how Martinez has been running the state. But he said Wednesday that it is more important for the Republicans to win control of the state Senate this fall.

Lawmakers urge Bush to keep citrus tariff

TALLAHASSEE — A bipartisan group of congressional leaders has asked President Bush to block any attempt to lift the tariff on imported citrus, fearing a takeover of the American market by foreign producers.

Sens. Bob Graham, D-Fla., and Connie Mack, R-Fla., announced Wednesday that 26 congressmen from the citrus producing states of Florida, Arizona, California and Texas signed a March 5 letter to the president urging protection of the U.S. citrus industry.

The Bush Administration has said that all U.S. tariffs are open to change as part of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade negotiations involving the United States, members of the European Commonwealth and most of South America. The GATT agreements will conclude in December. Florida and Texas citrus producers are struggling to recover from a December freeze that wiped out much of the nation's citrus crop and opened up the U.S. market to foreign producers such as Brazil.

Brazil has requested a 50 percent drop in the U.S. citrus tariff, which is 35 cents per gallon on imported frozen citrus concentrate.

"Brazil has been able to expand further into the U.S. market by carrying out policies of subsidization, price dumping, and overproduction," said the letter, which was released in Washington.

MIAMI — Two Texas chemists were arrested Wednesday in northwest Miami after they allegedly started a methamphetamine manufacturing operation and made about \$500,000 worth of the illegal white crystal stimulant for undercover agents.

James R. Carter, 22, of Arlington and Richard Gomez, 23, of Watauga were arrested by Drug Enforcement Administration and Florida Department of Law Enforcement agents after a two-month investigation.

Both were arrested without incident about 10 a.m. and charged with conspiracy to manufacture a controlled substance with intent to distribute and for manufacturing a controlled substance at their "clandestine laboratory" in northwest Miami, said DEA spokesman John Fernandes.

"The undercover operation involved extensive negotiations between the two chemists and DEA undercover agents," he said. "Seized from the clandestine laboratory was eight gallons of P2P, a controlled substance and precursor chemical to produce methamphetamine, and three ounces of methamphetamine."

Carter and Gomez allegedly offered to come from Texas to south Florida to help someone set up a laboratory for manufacturing the drug. The three ounces of methamphetamine were produced in the week before their arrest, Fernandes said.

He said the drug is more popular in Texas and California than in Miami, where cocaine still appears to be the drug of choice, but the defendants' willingness to come is evidence

there is a demand.

"These people exported their knowledge from areas where it is very prevalent to Miami, where it is not as prevalent and that is the significance here," he said.

"Over the two months, these people offered to come in and show people how to manufacture this drug, set up the operation and were able to produce more than \$500,000 worth of product with the volatile chemicals necessary to produce methamphetamine," he said. "These guys didn't flunk chemistry."

Fire burns 5,000 acres in Dade Co.

MIAMI — A small brush fire quickly escalated Wednesday into a wildfire, snarling traffic and destroying about 5,000 acres of sawgrass, much and trees in western Dade County before subsiding late in the day, officials said.

John Kern, a spokesman for the Florida Division of Forestry, said the larger of two fires straddling U.S. 41 was brought under control by late afternoon.

The smaller blaze north of the highway known as Tamiami Trail was nearly contained by 10 p.m., he said. "North of the trail is very close to being under control. They have released some of the crews," he said.

The fire, which was first reported to forestry officials Tuesday afternoon, rekindled and spread quickly Wednesday.

Thick smoke from the fire forced the closing of about five miles of Tamiami Trail, a major east-west link across the Florida peninsula, and Krome Avenue.

Both roads were re-opened later in the day, Kern said.

"Right now, we are looking at about 5,000 acres burned, a little more than 4,000 acres south of the trail, on both sides of sides of Krome," Kern said.

Another 800 acres had burned to the north of the trail, he said. Kern said firefighters were also battling a small, 10-acre blaze to the north, at the Dade-Broward County line. He said about half of that blaze was under control by late Wednesday.

No buildings or other property was reported damaged, Kern said.

The fire had threatened some buildings, including The Pit Bar-B-Q, a popular restaurant on the Tamiami Trail.

Immigration officials also had been prepared to evacuate the Krome Avenue Detention Center, a federal facility for illegal immigrants, if necessary.

Although fires are common near the Everglades during this season, officials said dried vegetation left by the winter freeze and drought conditions have made the situation worse than usual.

"This is our height of our fire season. It starts Nov. 30 and continues until rains come in May or June," said Peter Karayancas, duty officer at the Fort Lauderdale office of the Florida Division of Forestry.

Jury convicts Plant City man in slaying of family

TAMPA — A laborer was convicted Wednesday of killing a family of four in Hillsborough County last year during a murderous rampage that he claimed was induced by drugs.

A 12-member Circuit Court jury deliberated for three hours before finding Newton Slawson guilty of four counts of first-degree murder and one count of manslaughter in the killing of the Wood family. The manslaughter charge stemmed from the death of the unborn child carried by the mother.

Slawson, 35, Plant City, will face the death penalty when the sentencing phase of the week-long trial begins Thursday.

Slawson's attorney, Brian Doneyly, argued during closing arguments Wednesday that the former ditch digger was given a beer laced with cocaine by Gerald Wood.

That concoction, Doneyly said, drove Slawson into a rampage April 11 that ended with the stabbing and shooting deaths of Gerald Wood, 23; his pregnant wife Peggy, 21; their daughter, Jennifer, 4, and son, Glendon, 3.

"There was cocaine in that beer that made Newton Slawson kill Jerry, Peggy, Jennifer and Glendon Wood," Doneyly said. "Cocaine has caused a lot of deaths in the 1980s, and these are five of them."

But Assistant State Attorney Bill James called the cocaine defense, "sheer nonsense." "It's an insult to your intelligence, and it's nothing but an afterthought on Slawson's part in an attempt to try to avoid the consequences of his murderous acts," James told jurors.

"Newton Slawson is a vicious, cunning, cold-blooded killer. He knew exactly what he was doing when he executed the Wood family," James said.

The manslaughter charge stemmed from the death of Peggy Wood's nearly full-term unborn son. Slawson admitted during testimony that he carved the baby from her womb before she died.

Judge obeys high court order; sets inmate free

ORLANDO — A former soldier condemned for killing an Orlando woman was acquitted Wednesday on order of the Florida Supreme Court, more than 11 years after he crushed his victim's skull and nearly two years after he was convicted and sent to death row.

The Florida Supreme Court ruled Dec. 21, 1989, that jurors had erred and there was insufficient evidence to convict Robert C. Cox of first-degree murder. It ordered that Cox be acquitted.

Circuit Judge Richard Conrad on Wednesday carried out that order before about 15 friends and family members of the victim, Sharon Zellers, 19, of Orlando.

"There is absolutely no justice in this," said Charles Zellers, the victim's father. "and I hope the voters and law-abiding citizens of Florida remember this on election day."

Despite the acquittal, Cox remained in the Orange County Jail.

Authorities from the California Department of Corrections were to pick him up and return him to prison there to serve time on a conviction for two counts of assault with a deadly weapon and one count of kidnapping in the abduction of two young women.

Assistant State Attorney Jeff Ashton said Cox, 30, would likely be released between August 1990 and June 1991.

The ruling closed the already very long Zellers case. Zellers disappeared on Dec. 30, 1978. Cox was convicted July 2, 1988.

Zellers' body was found in a sewer in an orange grove five days after she disappeared while on her way home from her job at Walt Disney World.

She had been beaten to death, Ashton said she had suffered 14 blows to the head.

Her abandoned car was about 300 feet from the hotel where Cox, then an Army private, was staying.

Found in her car were hair and blood that matched his. A print from a military-style boot also was found on the back seat of her car, Ashton said.

Lottery winner files suit against financial adviser

TAMPA — A financial adviser already being sued by sportscasters Dick Enberg and Merlin Olsen now faces a federal lawsuit brought by the third person to win a million dollars in the Florida lottery's Instant money game.

Jonathan Johnson of Sarasota, filed the suit against Tampa businessman Richard M. Wood in U.S. District Court in Tampa Friday.

He is seeking to recover damages, attorney fees and \$715,000

of prize money he said he entrusted to Wood, who was acting as his financial adviser.

The suit claims that Wood refused to return the investment and document its whereabouts. Also named in the suit are Wood's bookkeeper, Margery Fisk of Ann Arbor, Mich.

Enberg, Olsen and 11 other investors sued Wood in February, claiming Wood owed them \$9 million from the sale of land in Ann Arbor.

Johnson said he sought Wood's financial advice after winning \$1 million in the lottery's instant money game in

April 1988. But one year later, Johnson said he asked Wood for some of the money so he could pay his taxes.

Wood told Johnson he could not give him the money because it was "tied up," Johnson said, adding he was forced to borrow money from a bank to foot the tax bill.

Johnson said in the suit that he asked Wood several times after that to return the money without success. He acknowledged, however, that he has received several interest payments on his investments.

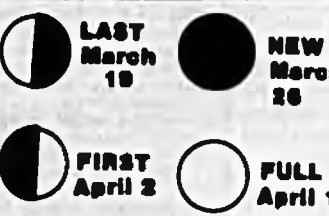

SHA to consider drug-free policy

SANFORD — In order to avoid losing the federal assistance that keeps the agency operating, the Sanford Housing Authority tonight will consider adoption of a "drug-free workplace" policy.

The federal Drug-Free Workplace Act, passed in 1988, requires all agencies to adopt such policies if they are to continue competing for federal grants and contracts.

Agencies failing to comply with the act may lose all federal money for up to five years.

SHA receives money from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to operate 480 apartments for low-income tenants and about 20 Section Eight rent vouchers for privately-owned apartments. SHA is currently renovating William Clark Court's 85 apartments with a \$2.3 million grant.

The policy the SHA commission will consider tonight includes creation of an awareness program for employees and

establishment of a system for tracking and disciplining offenders.

In other business, the commission will also consider forming an insurance pool for Florida public housing authorities. The pool, which would offer self-insurance, fire and extended coverage insurance for SHA, would reduce the costs of insuring apartments in five housing projects in Sanford.

The SHA commission will meet tonight at 7 p.m. at the Redding Gardens community center, 400 Locust Ave.

Lake Mary wants help with new park

LAKE MARY — When it comes to new parks, Lake Mary officials want the residents to plan them.

Mark Reggentin, Lake Mary's associate city planner, said a residents' survey will be mailed out within six weeks to the 2,400 homes in Lake Mary. "Before we can plan the park, we want to know what everybody wants in an active park," Reggentin said.

The new park is planned for 38 acres on Country Club Road. "It's on the drawing board, but will take between three and five years to develop," Reggentin said.

Reggentin said the new park will be an "active park," a park with up to eight ballfields, one or two soccer fields, at least six tennis courts, and four to six racquetball courts. Reggentin said, "We'll know exactly what to build when we get the surveys back," he said.

"We have no community sized parks in Lake Mary, at this time," Reggentin said. We do have one of the largest kids' softball leagues in the area. We want them to have a place to play ball," he said. Currently, softball leagues play at field all over the county.

Reggentin said the acquisition of the land will take about two years, with an additional two to three years for development. Lake Mary's new passive park, Liberty Park, will be adjacent to the planned active park and will be developed this year.

Reggentin asked all residents to return their surveys in their water bills as soon as possible. "If the city doesn't get them back, what we decide to do may or may not be in the best interest of area residents," he said.

Report: FBI agent was duped by Cubans

MIAMI — An FBI agent suspended six weeks ago has been under investigation for three years because some of the spies he recruited were double agents working for Fidel Castro. The Miami Herald reported Thursday.

Quoting unidentified current and former federal officials and FBI agents, the newspaper said the investigation had uncovered no evidence that Special Agent Fernando Mata was involved in espionage against the United States.

But Mata may have acted improperly in protecting his informants from FBI scrutiny, the newspaper said.

Mata, 48, who received the Attorney General's award in 1983 for his work in the foreign counter-intelligence section of the FBI's Miami office, has been placed on administrative leave with pay and had his security clearance revoked.

The FBI, citing "privacy considerations," refused to discuss the case. Mata's attorney, Hugo Rodriguez, said neither he nor Mata had been given details about the investigation or the reason for the suspension.

Rodriguez maintains the FBI suspended Mata in retaliation for his involvement in a successful 1988 discrimination suit against the agency.

According to the newspaper,

Econ setback plan can't find support

OVIDO — A special task force of the St. Johns River Water Management District Tuesday balked at supporting a 550-foot no-build zone from the Econlockhatchee River.

Members of the 17-member task force from the development community and county government failed to establish a 550-foot no-build "setback" from the river's edge with an additional 50-foot buffer from wetlands extending beyond the 550-foot limit. State restrictions aimed at protecting the Wekiva River carry the same setback limits.

John Hankinson, director of the district's land acquisition program, said the board mem-

bers were concerned about why those specific limits were set. He said the limits are justifiable since wetlands are determined by vegetation. The buffer allows preservation of paths along the river where wetlands vegetation can flourish and wildlife can still frequent, he said.

Task force members did recommend drainage for frequently-flooded areas near the river be limited. Hankinson said the practice of building six-foot-deep drainage ponds and ditches lowers the water table in those flat areas, killing vegetation that requires wet and frequently flooded soil conditions.

Task force members recommended limiting drainage ponds and ditches to one or two feet in depth but larger in size and filling only those portions of a

development where houses or streets are to be built. Hankinson said that recommendation would still allow some natural vegetation to grow in areas between houses and roadways.

Task force members will continue their review March 30. The committee must complete its recommendations in April because Rep. Tom Drage, R-Maitland, has filed a bill in the Florida Legislature for the Econ that is identical in many ways to his Wekiva River protection bill. The task force's recommendations will be used to adapt Drage's bill for the Econlockhatchee.

The district governing board could take up the recommendations by April 10, if they are completed, Hankinson said.

Special advertisement used in HRS attack

ORLANDO — A group calling itself the Family Rights Committee used a special advertising section in Tuesday's editions of the Orlando Sentinel to accuse the state's child welfare agency of running a "reign of terror."

The eight-page insert said "about 100,000 families in Florida will be falsely accused of child abuse" by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, whose workers were depicted as "Florida's Gestapo."

Opponents of HRS have been claiming for months that the agency, through its Child Abuse Registry, is quick to put people on its computerized list of potential child abusers, but is slow or reluctant to take the names off if nothing is proven.

John Ostalkiewicz, chairman of the committee, said the tabloid insert has already appeared in the Tampa Tribune and may appear in other newspapers statewide.

"When the HRS comes in and takes someone children at gunpoint, they call it removal. We don't call that removal. We call that kidnapping, and that's

exactly what it is," said Ostalkiewicz, a jewelry manufacturer and retailer who lives in Windermere, an Orlando suburb.

"We would take child abuse investigations and take it away from HRS and give it to the police, and that would insure that the basic constitutional rights of innocent people are observed," he said in explaining the group's goals.

He said a bill that would accomplish that has been introduced by state Reps. Dan Webster, R-Orlando, and Bob Sindler, D-Apopka.

"The second thing we want to do is we want to make the child abuse laws specific and narrowly defined so that ... every good parent would have nothing to fear from this process, and that would also allow the state to spend its resources better in rooting out child abuse," Ostalkiewicz said.

"I feel personally that the HRS coming in and literally taking a person's child away in the middle of the night or anytime is definitely Gestapo-like tactics. ... What is going on here is the type of things that went on in

Gestapo Germany or Stalin's Russia," he said.

Instead of removing children, "I think they ought to arrest the perpetrator ... and leave the child alone," he said.

Ostalkiewicz said the insert in the Sentinel cost about \$20,000 and was paid for through "donations." His group claims about 500 to 600 members statewide, mostly in the Orlando and Tampa areas.

Peace Corps can benefit minorities

The Peace Corps wants to show the true face of the United States to developing world — by recruiting as volunteers more Americans of African, Hispanic and Asian descent. That laudable goal promises to enhance U.S. relations on a multicultural globe, and it amounts to an offer that members of the targeted minority groups ought to seriously consider.

Right now minorities make up 7 percent of Peace Corps volunteers — far less than their share of the U.S. population. The agency wants minorities to make up 10 percent of volunteers next year. Since the agency operates mostly in Latin America, Africa and Asia, the increase in Americans whose ancestors hail from those regions can only help.

A legacy of president John Kennedy, the Peace Corps reflects the noblest of Yankee instincts, the willingness to give a hand to the less fortunate. Volunteers work directly with the people of the host nation, helping them to meet basic needs for health care, food, shelter and education — thereby promoting international peace and friendship.

The agency suspects that minority college graduates may shun the Peace Corps because they feel more pressure than whites to begin their careers and thereby to start earning money. However, the corps may be an excellent career move, providing experiences that increase the job marketability of those who serve.

True, volunteers don't make much money, but neither do they need all that much. The cost of living is typically so low in their assigned countries that many manage to save a good deal of their monthly expense allowance. In addition, upon completion of their tour of duty, typically two years, volunteers get \$200 for each month in service.

The volunteers need not be young college graduates, so long as they have useful skills. In fact, many are over 50. All in all, an increase in minority volunteers at the Peace Corps promises to be mutually beneficial.

Pie in the sky

The National Governors Association should slap a happy face on its logo and elect Peter Pan to be its president. The governors' six goals to reform American education by the year 2000 have no basis in reality. One doesn't wipe out illiteracy, drugs and dropouts simply by thinking good thoughts. The governors' intentions are noble, but useless. Somewhere in the Education Department there is a room filled with dusty reports, studies and goals. The road to that room is paved with good intentions.

Remembering a Democratic organizer

Maria Thomas, 63, wife, mother and political activist, died on March 1. At a memorial service in a Washington union building, there was talk not only about Maria, but about "The Movement."

We've heard a lot about movements and the famous people who mount the platforms provided by movements. In the '60s, "The Movement" referred to left-wing radicals who wanted to stop the Vietnam War and "re-order priorities." In the '80s, there were "Movement Conservatives," activists who wanted to build American defenses, cut taxes and spur capitalism.

Maria Thomas was a master sergeant in one part of yet another movement of ideas, what some have called "neo-conservatism." Perhaps a more appropriate name would be "paleoliberalism."

It is the glory and mystery of American political eclecticism that, to some extent, all these movements succeeded. Little noted is the role of the un-famous organizers who move the movements and make success possible.

Our gang had two patron saints: Sen. Henry "Scoop" Jackson and AFL-CIO President George Meany. Our cause was a mixture of "anti-communism" and "pro-democracy." We were called "Cold War liberals." Many still are.

because, even as the Cold War ends, we remember that we had this strange belief that "anti-communism" and "pro-democracy" was the same issue. Nicaragua showed that, again.

There are more Nicaraguans to come. Maria came from Cedar Rapids, of Czech parentage. She held graduate degrees from Columbia University and Columbia's Russian Institute. I met her after the 1972 elections when an organization called the Coalition for a Democratic Majority was being formed. CDM's goal was to bring Democrats back from the radicalism of the presidential campaign of George McGovern. We were unhappy about McGovernite views that were anti-defense, and anti-anti-communist



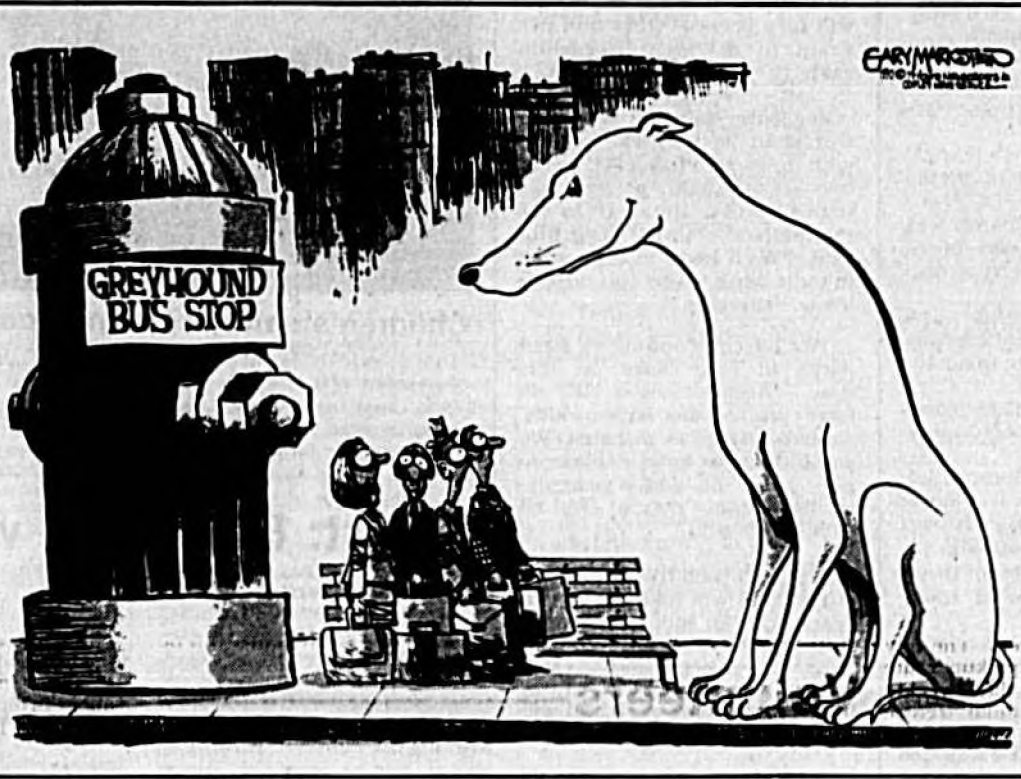

(very different from pro-communist) — and that lulu about America being the problem not the solution.

Maria came to work for CDM. She had a flair for logistics and was involved in running the office, arranging seminars and dinners, and writing letters asking for money. In the mid-'70s, working with Penn Kemble, CDM's then-executive director, she helped fashion an organization, dedicated to an amorphous aim: Changing the climate of opinion. Jeanne Kirkpatrick, a CDM founding member said, "CDM is not an organization. It's a state of mind." Maria became CDM's Secretary-Treasurer.

Along with sorrow, there was some cheer at the movement's memorial service for Maria. She had lived to see political dreams realized. Others had snickered at the phrase, but she never doubted what all now see: It was indeed an evil empire. She worked with the Democratic opposition in Nicaragua, and saw what she already knew: that the taste for liberty extends everywhere.

Our movement likes to say "Ideas Have Consequences." Thinking about Maria, we should add, "when people organize behind them."

The cost of life, clean air

WASHINGTON — "Who," asked Senator Majority Leader George Mitchell when questioned about the cost of clean-air legislation, "can calculate the dollar value of a child's health and life?" Well now. Whose child, mine or yours?

We calculate the value of loved ones and strangers differently. Parents will pay more to educate their children than they would be willing to have government pay, in taxes, for all children. Government does not legislate for "a" child.

Mitchell's question was rhetorical and his point is not just that such a calculation is complex. Rather, his implication is that attaching monetary values to such moral values is morally dubious, even repellent. However, policymakers do that constantly. They do not advertise that fact; they often do not admit it even to themselves. But it is sometimes — not always — well to dwell upon it.

Let us stipulate that the clean-air compromise to which the Bush administration has subscribed is sensible. Its cost to industry (to be passed along in various ways) would be about \$21 billion. That may be, as some say, a bargain, purchasing health-care savings and preventing much lost productivity as a result of pollution-related illness and premature death. That may be so, but two things must be said.

First, we have seen this movie before. Washington is always awash with programs "certain" to pay for themselves, programs that will not really cost what they seem to cost. A jobs program will "pay for itself" in increased tax revenues and decreased welfare payments; a tax cut will be self-financing because it will be wondrously stimulative; health savings will exceed the costs of this or that environmental program.

Second, one thing is certain: The \$21 billion spent for cleaner air cannot be spent on other things. Many environmentalists argue that health and longevity are values so valuable that no alternative augmentations of social welfare can be weighted against them. Like all extremists, this could produce perverse outcomes.

It is obviously preposterous to say that any incremental improvement in health, however marginal, is worth any cost to, say, economic vitality, however severe. Economic vitality produces jobs, wealth and other satisfactions; economic vitality underwrites government, the arts and sciences, including sciences pertaining to health. It is crude biological materialism to assert that health and longevity are values superior to all others.

But even if one grants that premise, policymakers face morally difficult trade-offs. Comparative returns on health must be considered. The \$21 billion spent on cleaner

air is \$21 billion that cannot be spent on immunization, infant mortality, care for poor pregnant women. If we really believe that health and longevity are values immune from cost-benefit scrutiny we should, for starters (on an endless list), limit automobile speeds to 35 mph and ban left turns.

Last week, a bipartisan commission voted 8-7 to recommend providing health insurance and long-term care to all in need. It would cost business \$20 billion and government \$66 billion. Because the government has inadequate resources (of revenues, and of the will to increase them), the commission's proposal is being dismissed as a mere audit of needs it would be nice to fill. An additional 70-cent tax on a gallon of gasoline (raising the price, in real terms, to what it was in 1980) would pay for it. But no elected official is going to say that such a gasoline tax, or some other equivalent revenue-raiser, is morally obligatory lest we be guilty of putting a dollar value on health and life.

Policies concerning health take odd caroms. The use of automobile safety belts is good, but because of it there are fewer dead drivers and passengers, so there are fewer organs available for transplants. Smoking is a health catastrophe, but an end of smoking would be a blow to Social Security and private pensions: Their actuarial assumptions count on millions of smokers dying before they collect much, or any, of the entitlements. Anti-pollution technologies required on cars since 1980 have raised car prices, thereby encouraging many people to continue driving older cars. Pre-1980 cars are one-third of those now operating and they produce 88 percent of automotive pollution.

Environmentalism is a worthy concern. But it is one among many, and attaching the adjective "environmental" to legislation and demonstrating a health benefit from the legislation does not give it irresistible momentum for enactment.

The idea that "life is priceless" comes under the category of useful nonsense. It is useful to talk that way, thereby inclining our minds to place high value on life, precisely because we constantly must act in ways that causes that value to be jostled and compromised.

Congressional pension plan is too generous

WASHINGTON — Without working a day, former president Gerald R. Ford will pocket more money from the federal government next year than will President George Bush.

While Ford lounges at his retreats in Vail and Palm Springs, he will collect a yearly federal pension of \$219,199 — the combined pension for his years as a congressman and president. Bush, who must show up at the office every day, will receive a salary of \$200,000.

Why should an ex-president cost the taxpayers more than the current one? In its self-serving wisdom, Congress has devised a retirement program that may be the most generous in the land. If Congress were a private business, the IRS would disqualify this pension plan.

Congress gives full benefits to workers who would be considered ineligible, early retirees in the private sector. In the real world, former Rep. Tony Coelho, D-Calif., would not have been cleared for hefty pension benefits when he left his post at the age of 47. Nevertheless, when Coelho turns 50, the government pension checks will start arriving in the mail.

Congressional pensions are based on a variety of factors, including the member's three highest years of income. The pay raise Congress gave itself last year runs up the pensions. By the first of next year, serving House members will be making almost 40 percent more money in raises and cost-of-living increases than they were at the beginning of this year.

Because of that pay raise, pension checks for retirees after 1993 will be based on an income of at least \$125,218 for House members.

Consider what that means to House Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., who promoted the pay raise. If Foley decided to throw in the gavel in three years, he would immediately start receiving a pension of about \$101,000 a year.

The pension plan faithfully keeps pace with inflation. Just ask Albert Gore Sr., the father of Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn. Since Al senior retired from the Senate in 1970, he has been eligible for more than \$1 million in pension payments. He is entitled to \$88,564 a year now, and his last salary in the Senate was only \$42,500.

If the entire Congress were to retire in 1993, the National Taxpayers Union has estimated that the government would pay at least \$1 million each to more than 300 retirees before they died. "Most average Americans dream of earning \$1 million in their lifetime," said David Keating of the NTU. "These retired members of Congress will receive that without working."

In these days of smothering budget deficits, one would expect Congress to set an example — but no.

Rep. Howard Coble, R-N.C., stands alone. He has refused to participate in the pension program and says he will take only Social Security. He has introduced a bill to cut the pension plan, but he says his colleagues tell him to "put a lid on it."

Coble told our associate Jim Lynch, "I just think we could do a whole lot of sacrificing that would play well with our constituents back home and would bring some fiscal sanity to this town."

Now, that's a novel idea — fiscal sanity. But the insanity is likely to win out. Just ask Gerald Ford. As of March 1, Ford had received more than \$1.8 million in federal pension payments. He told us that he wrote Congress last year opposing an increase in the presidential pension, but to no avail.

Ford was unaware that he would receive more than Bush next year.

change for residents, although some may see increases while others will see a decreased garbage collection fee.

Currently, Seminole County operates a "free market" garbage collection method which means unincorporated residents can use any of the 20 haulers willing to pick up their garbage. The result is garbage trucks r u m b l i n g t h r o u g h neighborhoods sometimes four or more days a week instead of two.

To help end that practice and bring some manageable order to

county garbage collection, The Solid Waste Group proposed to have exclusive franchise districts for residential pickup, dividing the county into 11 districts. Each hauling company would have exclusive pickup rights in their district.

Neron said backdoor garbage pickup for the handicapped would be included in the basic rate. He said some garbage haulers may choose to offer the service to non-handicapped residents for a separate fee negotiated between residents and the hauler.

Free pickup of bulky items may be nixed

SANFORD — Free pickup of old refrigerators and sofas may not be in the offing in Seminole County.

Seminole County commissioners nixed immediate support for the proposal, Tuesday, saying they'd like to see a comparison of the "free" service — which would actually be paid as part of an annual garbage fee — or a customer pay-as-needed basis.

Hill Neron, a principal in the county's solid waste consulting firm The Solid Waste Group, said the average charge to residents would be "a few cents per month" for the service. Neron argued that by offering the service for "free," it would deter illegal dumping from occurring.

"You'll be much more likely to find (old refrigerators and sofas) out in the woods or along a roadside somewhere," Neron said. "Also, if it isn't regulated, the customer may wind up paying much more than they would for a few cents a month."

(In Sanford, residents may request free pickup of regular refuse during the month of March under the Make Sanford Shine program. One free large-

item pickup will also be offered during the month. The city is maintaining regular route schedules during the Make Sanford Shine campaign. Ordinarily, Sanford residents are entitled to one free, large-item pickup per single-family home per year; homeowners are charged for all others. The city operates a special pickup route for such items five days weekly in addition to regular refuse pickup routes.)

County commissioners Pat Warren and Fred Streetman said they wanted to see a comparison of the costs because everyone won't use the service and it might be unfair to charge those who don't.

Streetman said even if the county's level of garbage collection service is lowered as a result, he would prefer a pay as needed pickup service rather than the averaged payment.

Neron said he would provide the information to commissioners in two to four weeks.

A status meeting of the Make Sanford Shine Trash Force will be tomorrow at 8 a.m. in the city commission conference room in Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Ave. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

Governor calls on troopers for bus safety

TALLAHASSEE — Concern over the recent shootings at Greyhound buses that began earlier this week in Jacksonville prompted Florida Gov. Bob Martinez to call on state troopers to monitor the passenger buses.

Martinez asked the Florida Highway Patrol on Wednesday to keep an eye on Greyhound buses traveling in Florida because of incidents associated with the two-week-old labor strike against the company.

He also asked the company's chairman to install radios in the buses so drivers can call for help in emergencies.

Martinez said he wanted to ensure public safety and maintain the confidence of residents and tourists traveling through Florida by bus.

"The safety of our residents is paramount," Martinez said in a letter to Greyhound chairman

and chief executive officer Fred G. Currey. "We want prospective visitors to feel completely comfortable here, without worrying about their personal safety while traveling in our state."

Company officials said there had been eight shootings involving Greyhound buses. One striker has been killed since walkout began March 2.

The first shooting took place Sunday night near Jacksonville, injuring seven people.

The eighth and most recent Greyhound bus shooting occurred Wednesday night when two bullets struck a passenger bus while it was traveling on Interstate 24 in Chattanooga, Tenn. None of the 48 passengers was hurt.

Authorities in Tacoma, Wash., were investigating the suspicious bombing Tuesday of a

garage adjacent to a Greyhound terminal, and several shots were fired at a bus carrying passengers in Chicago.

No injuries were reported in either incident.

With federally mediated talks between Greyhound's management and striking drivers scheduled to resume this weekend, Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner expressed hope Wednesday that the walkout could be resolved.

The strike began after negotiations broke off on a new three-year contract for about 9,000 Greyhound employees represented by the union, including drivers, baggage handlers, mechanics, ticket agents and reservation clerks.

The walkout was called on grounds of unfair labor practices, rather than simple economics, union officials said.

The National Labor Relations Board is reviewing a complaint by the union that Greyhound was bargaining in bad faith before the strike, and was trying to break the union.

Greyhound, based in Dallas, carried 22 million passengers last year and is crucial to low-income travelers who live in smaller communities that have no bus lines of their own.

The company says 1,800 union employees have returned to work, including 358 drivers. The company also has hired 700 replacement workers. Greyhound said it is running at 33 percent of its normal service levels.

The union says the hiring of replacement workers is illegal, and that actually only about 400 union members have crossed picket lines, with fewer than 100 union drivers returning to work.

setback for the free world's commercial rocket industry.

The Intelsat satellite was launched Wednesday morning by a Titan 3 rocket making only its second flight in what was to have been another step forward for builder Martin Marietta Astronautics Group's bid to carve out a niche in the private-sector launch market.

Instead, dismayed Intelsat ground controllers spent a harried day trying to save the errant satellite and prevent a \$265 million disaster for the International Telecommunications Satellite Organization, a 118-nation group that handles most of the free world's space communications traffic.

The problem began after the Titan 3's flawless launch from the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station after the rocket's second stage, carrying Intelsat 6, was placed into an egg-shaped orbit with a low point of 110 miles and high point of 247 miles.

The satellite was to have separated from the spent rocket stage 25 minutes after takeoff. An on-board rocket then was scheduled to fire to begin boosting the spacecraft to its final orbit 22,300 miles above the

equator over the Atlantic Ocean.

But Intelsat 6 failed to separate from the second stage and ground controllers ultimately radioed commands to the relay station that caused it to separate instead from its "perigee kick motor," the solid-fuel rocket required to boost it toward its final orbit.

Dean Burch, director general of Intelsat, said the maneuver "allowed the satellite to be placed in a safe low-Earth orbit for the time being while options, including the possibility of a shuttle recovery, are examined."

NASA rescued or repaired four satellite during three pre-Challenger shuttle missions, but an agency engineer who requested anonymity said he did not have enough data even to consider whether such a shuttle rescue flight might be feasible for Intelsat 6.

"In the climate that we're in right now, I'd find that hard to believe that we would (do that)," he said. But he quickly added: "It's hard for me to say it can't be done."

"The only thing is, the way the (launch schedule) is laid out, I have no idea how that would fit into the scheme of things."

Intelsat 6 has liquid-fueled maneuvering rockets that can be

used to raise the satellite's orbit slightly to slow the effects of atmospheric friction, or "drag," which can cause spacecraft in such low orbits to slow down and fall back into the atmosphere.

But that apparently was not the case with the Titan's second stage, and an official with U.S. Space Command said preliminary radar tracking data indicated that the 33-foot-long rocket stage and the satellite motor could plunge back into Earth's atmosphere in less than two weeks.

Intelsat 6 was the second in a series of five super-powerful communications satellites built by Hughes Aircraft Co. of El Segundo, Calif., under a contract valued at \$700 million. The first was successfully launched last

October by an Ariane 4 rocket.

It was only the second flight of a Titan 3 in the post-Challenger commercial space program, and if the satellite cannot be salvaged the emerging commercial launch industry in the United States will be dealt a major setback.

The next Titan launch is scheduled for June 1 to carry another Intelsat 6 into orbit. What effect the problem Wednesday might have on those plans was not immediately known.

The most recent previous Intelsat loss came in 1986 when the third stage of an Ariane rocket failed. The last time an Intelsat spacecraft was lost after launch from Cape Canaveral came on June 9, 1984.

review emergency procedures.

Wearing bright-orange spacesuits, all five are scheduled to climb aboard Discovery Thursday for the final hours of the mock countdown, a standard exercise to give the astronauts and engineers a final chance to practice launch-day procedures.

A formal flight readiness review to assess launch processing is scheduled for March 30 and 31, and if all goes well the \$2 billion orbiter will blast off at 9:21 a.m. Thursday, April 12, to kick off the year's third shuttle flight.

The highlight of the mission will come the day after liftoff when Hawley, operating Discov-

ery's 50-foot robot arm, plans to launch the telescope from the shuttle's cargo bay.

The telescope is expected to revolutionize optical astronomy and help scientists learn more about the conditions that existed in the universe shortly after the big bang explosion believed to have given birth to the cosmos some 15 billion years ago.

It also may be able to find direct evidence of planets circling other stars and it is expected to provide routine Voyager-class photos of Jupiter and Saturn.

Launch originally was scheduled for October 1988, but the Challenger shuttle disaster grounded the American manned space program and put the flight on hold until now.

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Child-care money lacking

WASHINGTON — A major federal study called for overhauling the U.S. child-care system through billions of dollars in new government spending, federal standards for day-care centers and a year's unpaid leave from work for parents of newborns.

"Existing child-care services in the United States are inadequate," concluded the two-year study conducted by a 19-member National Research Council panel of experts at the request of the Health and Human Services Department.

"Of greatest concern is the large number of children who are presently cared for in settings that do not protect their health and safety and do not provide appropriate developmental stimulation."

The report, released Wednesday, said America has fallen behind other industrial countries in responding to the "social revolution" of recent decades that reshaped the family and resulted in the majority of children having mothers who work.

Since there is agreement that "mothers are in the labor force to stay," the study proposed devoting \$5 billion to \$10 billion a year in government money and "substantial" private funds for a child-care system that in many cases would go beyond even the most controversial proposals now before Congress.

About one in every five children in the United States lives in a household headed by a mother only, according to statistics compiled by the Bureau of the Census.

"Child-care must be viewed as an investment in the health and development of children in America, the well-being of all American families and the future productivity of the American work force," panel Chairman John Palmer, dean of the public affairs school at Syracuse University, told a news conference.

Child-care legislation has been stalled since last fall because of a turf battle between two House committees over financing methods. But, in a major difference from the report, it would only require that states set standards.

The Washington Post reported a compromise bill costing at

least \$2.4 billion a year could emerge Wednesday or Thursday. House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., told reporters he did not "see any great impediments" to an agreement and added a compromise could come this week.

Congress also is considering a parental leave bill this year, but it too falls short of the report's plan, guaranteeing only 15 weeks of unpaid leave.

The child-care bill faces an uncertain fate at the White House, and Labor Secretary Elizabeth Dole has said she will urge President Bush to veto any bill requiring employers to provide leave.

North testified Poindexter gave him overall direction

WASHINGTON — Oliver North, ending four days of testimony in the Iran-Contra trial of John Poindexter, conceded to prosecutors his former White House boss was at the center of all aspects of Ronald Reagan's worst scandal.

In a rapid series of questions to the former Marine, prosecutor Dan Webb tried Wednesday to counter the defense argument that North frequently acted behind Poindexter's back in selling missiles to Iran and providing arms and money to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

After defense lawyer Richard Beckler finished questioning North, Webb bore down on the retired lieutenant colonel with question after question and won potentially damaging admissions that Poindexter was heavily involved in the scandal.

North told Webb that Poindexter, who was President Reagan's

national security adviser, knew about the secret plan to help the Contras, that he was one of the White House officials in charge of the arms-for-hostages deals with Iran and was involved in trying to conceal both operations.

Poindexter, 53, is charged with five felony counts of lying to Congress and obstructing its investigation of the scandal.

The prosecution is trying to prove that the retired rear admiral broke the law by destroying some politically embarrassing documents, knew North was destroying others and also effectively ordered North to lie to Congress when it began investigating.

North's former secretary, Fawn Hall, was the second prosecution witness. Like North, she testified under a grant of immunity from further prosecution.

Butcher wins 4th Iditarod

NOME, Alaska (UPI) — Susan Butcher drove her huskies to a record victory Wednesday to win her fourth Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, covering the 1,161-mile distance in 11 days, 1 hour, 53 minutes and 23 seconds.

Butcher, who won prizes totalling more than \$70,000, easily beat two men, Joe Ruyuan and Lavon Barve, who had been chasing her along the Bering Sea coast and who arrived later Wednesday.

Butcher, 35, of Manley, Alaska, drove her 11-dog team under the gnarled burwood arch that marks the Front Street finish line at 10:53 a.m. local time to the cheers of onlookers in sunny 13-below-zero weather.

Students naive about campus crime

WASHINGTON — Despite more incidents of campus crime, college students often are naive about potential danger and unaware that most criminals are from their own ranks, lawmakers and experts told a House panel Wednesday.

Recent studies show about one in three students report being a crime victim while away at a university and up to 85 percent of campus crime is student-against-student, Dorothy Siegel of Towson State University told a subcommittee of the House Committee on Education and Labor.

Siegel, director of Towson State's Center for the Study and Prevention of Campus Violence, which conducted the studies, said they also show between 60 percent and 95 percent of all campus crime and violence is alcohol related.

"You have an awful lot of naive young people coming to a campus who often believe it is a safe area," said Rep. William Goodling, R-Pa.

The Postsecondary Education Subcommittee hearing on campus crime focused on a bill proposed by Goodling that would require colleges and universities to gather statistics on campus crime and distribute them annually to students and employees.

Gorbachev wins presidency battle

MOSCOW — Mikhail Gorbachev won parliamentary election as president today, took the oath of office and vowed to use his strengthened powers to defeat the bureaucrats blocking his reform drive.

In results of secret balloting late Wednesday at the Congress of People's Deputies, 1,329 lawmakers voted for Gorbachev and 495 voted against him. He faced no opposition.

When the election results were announced after the opening of the Congress's morning session, legislators gave Gorbachev a brief standing ovation as he descended from his presiding chair at the front of the Kremlin hall and stood before them.

Gorbachev, 59, then placed his hand on a red bound copy of the Soviet Constitution and swore himself in as president in a short formal ceremony.

"I solemnly swear to faithfully serve the peoples of our nation, to strictly observe the Soviet

Constitution, to guarantee the rights and freedoms of citizens and to conscientiously fulfill the high responsibilities placed in me as president of the Soviet Union," Gorbachev said.

In a brief address after taking the oath of office, Gorbachev said there was no danger of him exploiting his broadened authority, and he promised to use the new presidency to radicalize his "perestroika" drive for economic and political renewal.

The election results showed that more than 25 percent of the

deputies who participated in the balloting had voted against Gorbachev even though he ran unopposed.

Gorbachev noted he had heard the sharp criticism some lawmakers directed at him during the nominating session Wednesday evening, but he blamed "ossified consciousness" for his program's failure to bring more tangible benefits.

"There are no grounds for panic," Gorbachev said.

The new post, created at the extraordinary session of Con-

gress convened by Gorbachev, gives him the sweeping powers he said were necessary to save his reform program and consolidate the vast country in the face of disintegrating forces.

Gorbachev took office four days after a new nationalist-dominated Parliament in Lithuania declared the republic independent. He also faces secessionist sentiment elsewhere in the Baltic region, and other parts of the vast country have been torn by ethnic clashes and anti-communist insurrections.

Libya blames U.S. in plant fire

ALGIERS, Algeria — The Libyan news agency JANA said today that most of the Rabta chemical plant was destroyed in a fire that swept through the facility and blamed the United States and Israel for the blaze.

Arab diplomatic sources in Algiers told United Press International the fire was set by a commando team that traveled to Libya from neighboring Tunisia. The raiders were disguised as tourists, said the sources. Tunisia has made no comment on the incident.

"Most of the factory has been destroyed," said the Libyan news agency JANA, in a report monitored in Algiers. JANA did not say how the fire broke out and did not mention casualties.

"Libyans accuse the Israelis and the United States," said the agency in a brief statement.

The White House has said the United States has received reports from foreign governments that a fire of unknown origin and severity struck the plant, suspected by the Bush administration of producing chemical weapons.

Quayle asks Latin leaders to sway Castro

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina — Vice President Dan Quayle today urged meeting Cuban President Fidel Castro when their paths cross in Brazil, but Quayle has asked other world leaders to urge Castro to stop arming leftist rebels in El Salvador.

Quayle, at a news conference Wednesday, said he would not meet with Castro when the two attend the presidential inauguration in Brasilia Thursday of Fernando Collor de Mello.

"We're not going to meet with Castro," Quayle told reporters at the U.S. ambassador's residence in Buenos Aires. "Castro remains isolated. Castro must change. Sooner or later change will come to Cuba," one of a handful of nations that has resisted democratic reforms sweeping other communist nations.

Carter again tours Mideast pursuing peace

DAMASCUS, Syria — Former President Jimmy Carter arrived in Syria on the second leg of a four-nation Middle East tour and said he hoped Syria would use its influence to win freedom for Western hostages in Lebanon.

Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk Sharaa, who met Carter and his wife, Rosalynn, at Damascus airport, said Wednesday there was reason for hope.

"We are not pessimistic. And as we have exerted great efforts in the past to secure the release of many hostages, we will intensify our efforts in this regard," Sharaa said.

Carter told reporters after his arrival from Egypt that Syria could play a role in gaining the release of the 18 Western hostages, including eight Americans, being held by various pro-Iranian guerrilla groups. He said Syria could have an impact because of its influence in Lebanon and strong ties with Iran. Syria is Iran's sole Arab ally.

Earlier in Cairo, Egypt, Carter said he thinks Iran would use its influence to release the hostages when it believed such a move served its national interests.

After Syria, Carter is scheduled to visit Jordan before ending his nine-day tour in Israel.

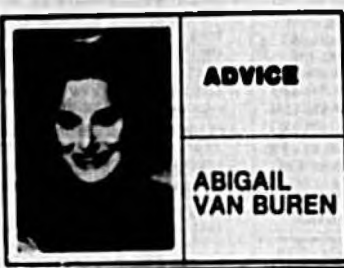

Small seeds could spur diverticulitis

DEAR DR. GOTT: A month ago, I had a colonoscopy and was told I had diverticular disease. My doctor said I shouldn't eat nuts, popcorn or anything with seeds such as berries, tomatoes, pickles, jams and the like. A relative, who is a nurse, says I should eat everything with seeds. Who is right?

DEAR READER: As people age, they tend to develop little herniations or sacular out-growths in the lining of the large intestine. This is called diverticulosis and causes no discomfort or ill health. On occasion, these sacs become filled with fecal material; infection sets in. This is called diverticulitis, which causes abdominal pain and — sometimes — hemorrhage. Diverticulitis is treated with antibiotics or, in particularly severe cases, surgery to remove infected, bleeding portions of bowel.

Years ago, doctors insisted on stringent diets to prevent diverticulosis from turning into diverticulitis. Roughage and spices were prohibited. No salads, bran, raw fruit, nuts or seed vegetables were permitted. These restrictions probably did little good, and most physicians have now eliminated them.

However, some specialists still prohibit foods with small, indigestible seeds — such as strawberries, blueberries, raspberries and figs — on the theory that such seeds could become wedged in diverticular sacs to cause infection. Time will tell whether this view is correct.

Given present medical opinion, I side with your doctor. However, I would prohibit only fruit with small seeds: tomatoes, popcorn, cucumbers and nuts are, in my opinion, permissible.

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WIN AT BRIDGE

By James Jacoby

South didn't believe in scientific bidding. When North jumped to three hearts as a forcing raise showing 13-15 points in support, South just bid the slam. Not for him to worry that the defenders might be able to quickly take the first two diamond tricks. Luckily North had the right cards, but there were choices as the play developed. Declarer won the 10 of clubs in his hand and played a heart to the king. When West played the jack, South remembered reading somewhere that this was likely to be a singleton. So he finessed the 10 on the way back. West took the queen and later East made the diamond

king to set the contract. South should do better. After winning dummy's king of hearts, before deciding the best play in trumps, declarer should try the spade finesse. That will win. He now has a sure-fire play to guarantee the slam: Play the ace of hearts. As it happens, that drops the queen and makes the contract. But see what would happen if West showed out on the second heart. Declarer would cash the spade ace, go to the jack of clubs and ruff a spade. Then he would play out the high clubs and eventually throw East in with the heart winner to force a lead into dummy's A-Q of diamonds.
