Then early this month came the Soviet announcement that German captives were complete. Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of the West German government bitterly charged that 1,500,000 Germans, including tens of thousands of deported civilians, were still missing in Russia.

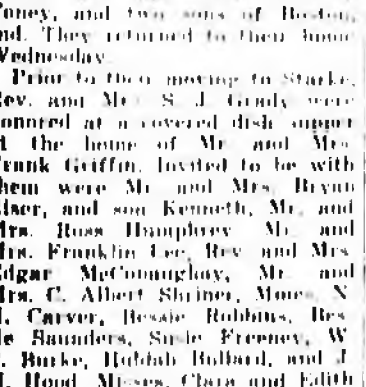

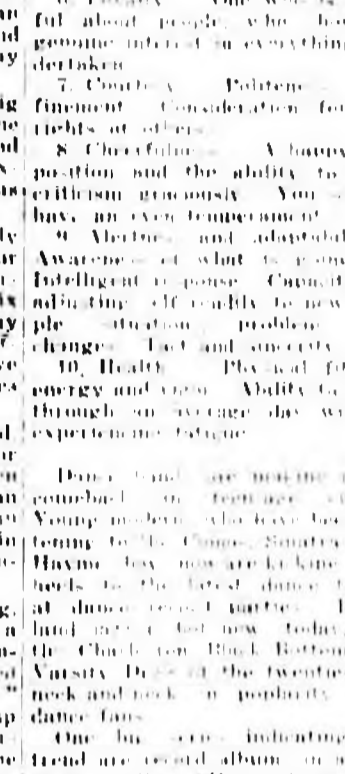

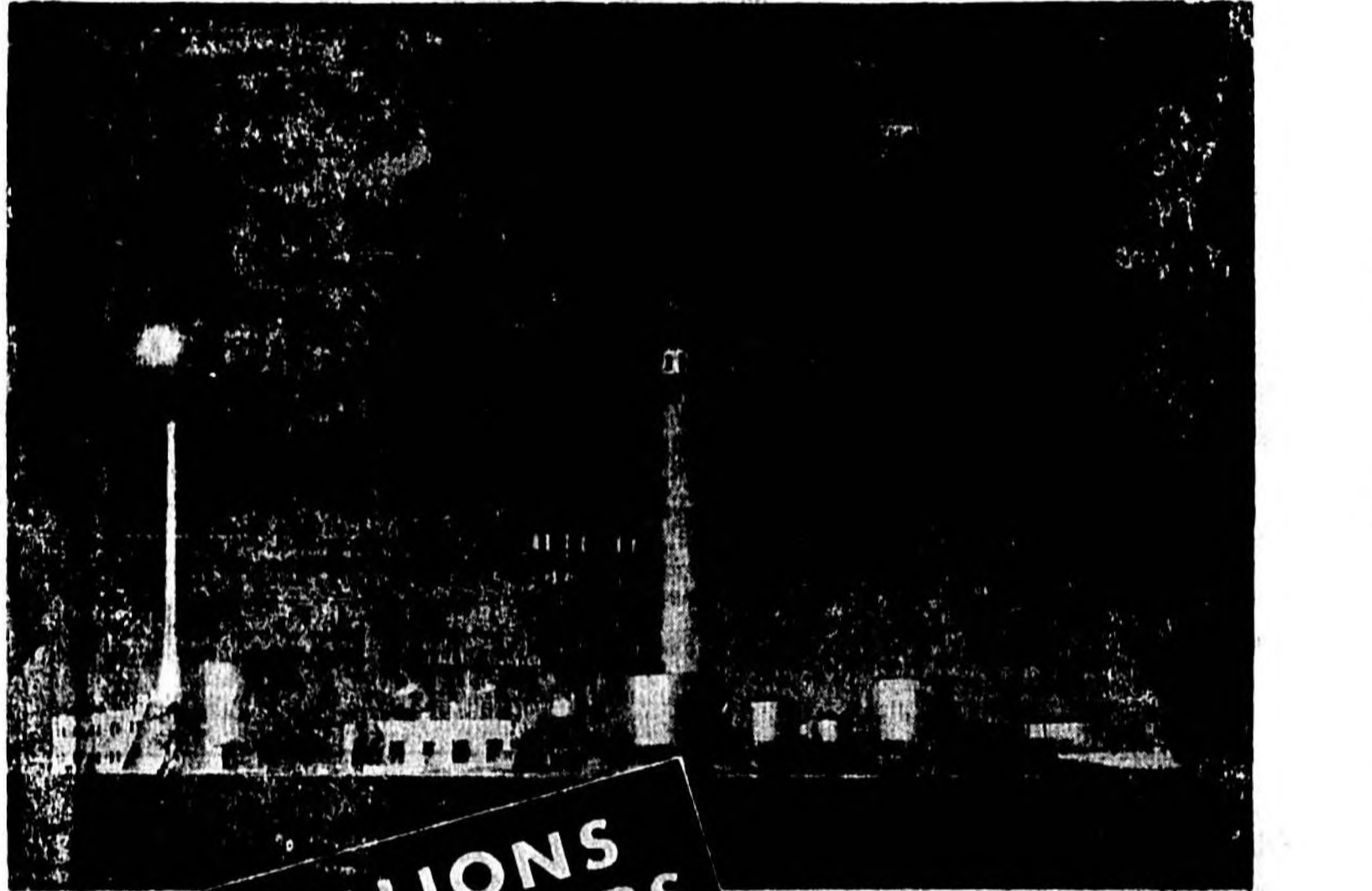

## Watson Loses For Congress In 1st District

### King Wins Easily For R.R. Commission; Littlefield Is Defeated In Volusia

By ASSOCIATED PRESS  
Chester B. McMullen of Clearwater crushed J. Tom Watson's hopes for a political comeback in Tuesday's runoff primary by decisively defeating him for Congress.

Watson, a colorful political figure for years who was two years ago defeated in his race for governor, trailed with 37,924 votes to McMullen's 55,536 with only seven precincts in the first district uncounted.

In the only statewide contest, Wilbur C. King easily defeated Grady Albritton for the State Railroad and Public Utilities Commission. King, the commission chairman, was renominated after campaigning on his first term record. The vote from 1,479 of the state's 1,595 precincts was 179,022 for King, 109,229 for Albritton.

McMullen who scored an easy win in the First District congressional race, returned to his desk today as though nothing had happened. He questioned witnesses in criminal cases which he will prosecute as state attorney for Pinellas and Pasco counties. In a victory statement he said "I hope that the people of the district will unite in continued progress of Florida's fastest growing section."

Sheriff Alex Littlefield of Volusia county, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, today lost his seat on the committee. He was defeated by Dr. E. L. Thompson, Daytona Beach dentist. Thompson polled 7,408 votes; Littlefield 4,076. Five men sought the post, drew scattering votes.

There will be at least 36 new representatives in the 1951 Legislature. In a closely contested race for the three-county 13th Senatorial seat, Senator Evans Crary of Stuart, a former speaker of the Legislature, held a narrow lead over C. R. Parker, Jr. of Fort Pierce. With only Crary's home precinct unreported he had 1,604 to 1,535.

## McClelland Wins Renomination To Post On County Commission

This was a good index of the total vote in the county of approximately 1,813 votes. The total vote in Precinct No. 1 was 709, indicating that there were but few ballots cast out.

The count was completed in Precinct No. 1 at about 9:30 o'clock with Mr. McClelland and Stemper both present. W. R. Ellerbe served as clerk with Edward W. Meinch, Clarence J. Henderson and Leo Butner as inspectors.

Precinct No. 3 completed its count early and posted it on the bulletin board at the Town Clerk's Office. Fred Pope was elected and R. L. Perkins, Jr., Kelvin Houssholder and R. A. Newman served as inspectors.

At Precinct No. 14, Fern Park, Charles A. Walter won over A. E. Weaver for the post of County Democratic Executive Committee member by a vote of 81 to 71.

## English General Viscount Wavell Dies In London

London, May 24—(AP)—Viscount Wavell, the once-moved British field marshal who crushed Italian armies in Abyssinia years ago, died today.

The veteran soldier, who also served as Viceroy of India in the immediate period after the war, underwent an abdominal operation on May 2, his 67th birthday. He underwent a relapse today.

A young stranger who believed in taking calculated risks, Archibald Percival Wavell was the first substantial victory for the Brits in the last war. He turned the tide, temporarily at least, in 1940 and 1941 and inspired the empire with hope in a time of deep depression.
