

#### Filipino Independence

According to Boy Howard, president of the Scrippe Howard chain of newspapers, who is now in Manila conducting an investigation of conditions in the Philippines, there is not as much enthusiasm in the islands over the prospects of a total severance of all political ties with the United States as there was at the first realization of independence.

"Japan's arms stretching out ever more menacingly and apparently intent on embracing the entire Orient," he writes, "today are casting a dark shadow across the Philippines. A political metamorphosis is resulting. The security of liberties already achieved, rather than national independence, has become the major political objective. This security, to which new value suddenly has been added, will be vigorously sought under the American flag. Filipinos want none of Japan's 'Asia for the Asiatics,' which like the Chinese, they interpret as 'Asia for the Japanese."

Mr. Howard predicts that sometime before the ten year period of the protectorate expires, the Pilipinos will petition the American Congress to make the present temporary status permanent, and if this attempt to gain national protection should fail, the Insular government "will approach Great Britain with a request for territorial status under the British flag." But what the Filipinos really want is a continuation of the present commonwealth government under which they exercise all the freedom of complete independence and at the same time enjoy the protection of the United States from foreign aggression.

But, says the New York Herald-Tribune, discussing Mr. Howard's dispatch, "What of America? Why should the people of the United States continue a responsibility which may well involve them in a war, when they receive no possible compensating benefit for their generosity? We have done much for the Filipinos already. We have brought them from a state of semi-barbarism into a state of pseudocivilization. We have eliminated contagious plagues. We PARRAMACLE MAPTINT CHURCH have made inroads into illiteracy. We have poured hundreds of millions of dollars into the defenses of the islands. We have financed them throughout a generation.

"In return, thanks to the politicians, we have not even won their gratitude. Should we, under the circumstances, swallow their latest propaganda which is designed to perpetuate all of the disadvantages that America has incurred in holding the islands, at the same time that it insures to the Filipinos all their advantages? The answer is clearly 'No!'
