

Ethiopian Rains May Give Trouble To Italian Army

Wet Season Expected To Begin Soon In Northern Section

ASMAR, Ethiopia, Dec. 13. — (AP)—What will happen to Italy's big army in Ethiopia when the rainy season comes and sky torrents turn roads into quagmires where men sink to the hip and animals flounder and die?

This is a question preoccupying foreign journalists here who have had military experience. Those reports range from an English general to a French lieutenant.

Some 110,000 men now are lined up on Italy's northern front. They are constantly arriving. They are 50 miles beyond the old border.

In January comes the season of the "little rains," the unimportant one lasting until March. This should not bother them much.

But the real rainy season starts the end of May and lasts until September, blotting out the face of the earth with a sheet of water.

When that evil day comes, the roads constructed so laboriously the last few weeks to enable trucks to carry up provisions and ammunition will be wiped out. Officers make no secret of it.

"Only roads with a strong stone foundation will stand up," said an engineering major. "And less than ten percent of our roads beyond the old frontier are of that nature."

Most of the roads built by the Italians since they crossed the border follow the old caravan routes. Those trails have been widened, straightened, banked, reinforced with gravel, but in the main they are dirt roads.

Trucks in dry weather grind them into powder six inches deep inside a week. Road crews constantly are at work on them.

In the rainy season the caravan trails themselves were impassable, even for mules and camels. The roads will be little better.

What, therefore, will happen to the big Italian army? Supplies cannot be brought up in trucks. There is not enough in the country to support the troops. The trucks, even now, are having all they can do to bring up sufficient supplies, so no surplus can be laid by.

Perhaps, it is suggested, the majority of the troops, after having occupied that part of Ethiopia that Italy desires, will return to Ethiopia, leaving strong garrisons in the strategic points.

Another suggestion is that air transport will be used. Airplanes could take off from Asmara and land easily at Axum or Makale. However, the pay load that a plane can carry in the mountain-

ous war theater is comparatively small.

Air transport, therefore, even taking into account its rapidity and the frequency of round trips, would feed and munition only a small portion of the troops.

One thing is certain—all the fighting that is to be done must be completed before the "big rains." What the Italian high command will do then with its huge body of soldiers will form an interesting chapter of modern warfare.

Baldwin As Four Time Premier Ties Gladstone Record

LONDON, Dec. 13. — (AP)—The prime minister of Great Britain, Sir Stanley Baldwin, today took his place beside the immortal Gladstone as the second man in Britain's long parliamentary history to win a fourth term in the highest office in the land.

Four others—Derby, Disraeli, Salisbury and Ramsay MacDonald—have held the premiership three times, and nine have held it twice.

Until 1905, the office was technically "unknown" to the law, although history cites Sir Robert Walpole (1721-1742) as the first prime minister.

Before George Washington became the first President of the United States.

Even Walpole's claim was dubious. Lord Melbourne, in a letter to Queen Victoria, caustically referred to Walpole as having "arranged to himself an office previously unknown to the Law and Constitution, that of Prime or Sole Minister."

Melbourne insisted that Walpole only secured the title because the German-speaking George I had "so imperfect a knowledge of the language of the country" that he had to rely on Walpole for the transaction of business.

But the title stuck, until finally, in 1905, it was recognized by law.

Today, relations between the prime minister and monarch are considerably more formal than in the past. Melbourne, for example, received the following jovial invitation from William IV:

"The King highly approves the day fixed for the meeting of Parliament, and begs that everybody will dine with him after the Council and drink two bottles of wine a man."

Teetotalers in those "two-bottle" days were rare among the sovereign's upper counsellors—so

much so that Disraeli wrote: "All Prime Ministers have the gout." Baldwin's return to office leaves the number of prime ministers still 39. Twenty-eight have been English, seven, Scottish, three Irish and one Welsh.

Coral Gables Bonds Of \$7,000,000 Held Valid By U. S. Judge

MIAMI, Dec. 13. — (AP)—Rejecting the city's plea the bonds were issued by "collusion and conspiracy" of former city commissioners, Federal Judge Halsted L. Ritter yesterday upheld the validity of \$7,000,000 in Coral Gables municipal securities.

The city, desmurring to a suit by bondholders to recover \$3,000,000, contended the securities were issued, without election, by commissioners who at the same time were officers of the Coral Gables Corporation, developer of the area that later became the city.

The city alleged the bonds were void, claiming they were issued to raise funds to enable the firm to comply with its promises of extensive improvements to lot purchasers.

Judge Ritter found the question

of the bonds' validity had not been raised during the 10 years following their issuance, during which period succeeding city commissions had recognized the debt.

Sholtz Sends Appeal To Citrus Industry

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 12. — (AP)—Governor Sholtz called upon the Florida citrus industry yesterday to extend the power of shipment regulation to the State Citrus Commission by naming its members to a committee to administer the proposed marketing agreement.

The Governor said he believed "the grower is again being exploited for selfish purposes," and invited citrus men to make a check of the "interests" that are overloading the market.

The Citrus Control Commission was created by the 1935 Legislature and given broad powers over the industry. However, the authority did not extend to that of regulating shipments.

College Professors Killed By Employee

NEW YORK, Dec. 13. — (AP)—A discharged employe at the Columbia University College of Dental and Oral Surgery late yesterday killed two members of the faculty and himself and wounded a third professor.

The dead were Dr. Arthur T. Rowe, associate dean of the school; Dr. Paul Wiberg, an assistant professor of dentistry, and Victor S. Koussow, who was discharged yesterday morning as a shop mechanic at the school.

Dr. William H. Crawford, an assistant professor, was wounded. Police said Koussow, discharged following an argument with a fellow worker, obtained the revolver and returned to the school in the late afternoon. He first shot and killed Dr. Wiberg, according to police reports.

Dr. Rowe was next. He died shortly afterward. Then, after shooting Dr. Crawford, Koussow turned the revolver upon himself. He died instantly.

Virgin Isle Cocktail Is New Ickes Project

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. — (AP)—Creation of a "Virgin Islands cocktail" to popularize the islands' rum is receiving attention at P. W. A., but Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the Interior and P. W. A. administrator, said he hadn't tasted it.

He disclosed that one of his aides—he didn't name which—was working on the recipe and was "doing all the tasting himself."

The Public Works Administration has financed a distillery to produce the island's famous brown rum which once made the natives rich. A recent sale of 25,000 gallons of it, Mr. Ickes said, brought a "very satisfactory profit."

Congressman And Officials Confer On Bond Matters

Two Bills Proposed By Wilcox To Control Committee

Following a conference with City officials of Sanford and other municipalities in Central Florida yesterday, Congressman J. Mark Wilcox promised to make every effort to obtain relief for those municipalities now overburdened by bonded debt.

The bankruptcy law he passed through the House last year was so changed by the Senate as to be unrecognizable, but the congressman said he hopes that at the next session he will be able to amend that law whereby municipalities can go to court and effect a settlement of their debt problems.

When I go onto the floor of the House next session I want to have two bills which I feel certain will not be decided illegal by the Supreme Court. You lawyers can help me in this.

While Congressman Wilcox said he was not in favor of paid lobbyists, still he asked the 70 civic leaders at the conference to send to Washington a committee of about 10 members to explain their problems to the national legislators when they convene for the next session.

Wilcox Favors Sanford-Coast Canal Project

Effort Will Be Made To Get Withdrawal Of Protests Made By Coastal Cities

Congressman J. Mark Wilcox favors the Sanford-to-Titusville canal, he told an aggregation of citizens of the Fifth Congressional district yesterday, but the canal project was blocked by protests from Cocoa and Melbourne, on the coast, he declared.

The congressman talked about the canal at a luncheon session, but afterwards it was threshed out more thoroughly at a meeting called by proponents of the proposed Cape Canaveral harbor project.

In stating that the canal would afford a new route down the Florida coast to the Riviera which would attract yachts and other pleasure craft to the state, the congressman said he had made an investigation of the facts and was convinced that a canal eight feet deep and about 100 feet wide would not flood the Indian River country or drain the St. Johns flats and cause any damage to grazing and cattle lands.
