Deaths From Cancer Increased Last Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Deaths from cancer increased in the United States last year while the fight against tuberculosis made progress according to the census bureau. A total of 88,750 deaths were reported as having resulted from cancer last year, this showing an increase of 5,816 deaths over last year. There were 90,732 deaths last year from tuberculosis as against 90,452 in 1922.

Cold Weather Relaxes In Far West Where Death Toll Mounts; 8 Deaths in Missouri

Blizzard Reaches Texas, Louisiana
Bureau Expects Spread of Cold Wave Southward Coming Week
CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 20.—The icy grip of winter was slowly relaxing far west in the Rocky mountain region Saturday while it tightened in the middle west and began to envelope the east. Although nearly normal temperatures may be reached in the cold area in 24 hours, days will elapse before winds and rain commencing, which paralyze some sections, resume normal. Meanwhile the toll of lives continued to mount as deaths from freezing were added to fatalities in fires resulting from overheating.

Blizzard Hits Texas

DALLAS, Dec. 20.—The blizzard had penetrated the Texas Gulf Coast and Lower Rio Grande section Saturday demoralizing wire communication and doing damage to crops near Brownsville district. A thermometer at Brownsville registered 28 degrees above zero and sleet was falling in Galveston and Houston.

First Real Cold Spell

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 20.—Stinging northerly winds brought to the New Orleans territory its first real cold of the winter. The mercury early Saturday stood 39. Freezing was predicted for later in the day and lower temperatures in other sections of the state.

Cold Weather Next Week

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The weather outlook for the week beginning Monday for the Middle Atlantic States is cold weather practically all the week, mostly fair but strong probability of rains in the extreme south and snow or rain elsewhere about middle of the week. Sections of the Middle West entirely were isolated from outside wire communications by the freezing weather. Several persons lost their lives as the indirect result of the storm. Train wrecks resulting from destinations hours behind schedules and live stock in the plains states was reported suffering from the cold. In some sections there was fear of a fuel shortage.

175,000 Barrels Of Oysters Planted In Period Of 2 Years

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 19.—Approximately 175,000 barrels of oysters have been planted in Florida waters since the legislature of 1921 appropriated \$50,000 for defray expenses of the work, according to T. R. Hodges, shell fish commissioner. More than 100,000 barrels have been planted during this year, and the work will be resumed again Mar. 1, Mr. Hodges states. The oyster dredge Franklin, provided for the planting operations, has been tied up at Apalachicola over the rough weather of the next few weeks.

The planting operations covered virtually the entire coast of the state, extending all the way from Pensacola around the peninsula thence up the Atlantic side to Fernandina. Next year's operations will be on a more extensive scale however, than this year, because of more time in which to do the work, due to the fact that much of the territory already has been covered.

Paradise Flats, in St. Vincent's Sound county, has been the scene of the greatest activity since the planting began. There from 25,000 to 30,000 barrels have been planted, the work going on at the rate of about 3,500 barrels a week while the dredge was busy in that locality.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—London's female "Raffles," heroine of several score burglaries, has met her Waterloo and been "sent up" for 21 months. Petite, auburn-haired fashionably dressed, in stolen raiment, she went pathetically in court.

For three years she had been shadowed by detectives, always suspected, but always sufficiently clever to avoid capture. And then just a piece of bad luck led to her undoing.

Texas Old Timers Relate How Fish And Alligators Fell With The Rain

YOAKUM, Tex., Dec. 19.—Yorktown, a village southwest of here, comes out with a fish story that has startled this entire section. Henry Hohn, auto salesman, vouches for the tale and five or six old-timers relate similar instances in their lifetime.

During a very cloudy morning, with a stiff breeze driving dark clouds over the town, Hohn and two fellow workmen in the plant of the De Witt Motor Company, heard a thud on the iron roof. Running out to investigate they found a buffalo fish 13 inches long, weighing one and a quarter pounds. The fish was bleeding from injury it received in striking the iron roof but was still breathing.

The news spread rapidly and soon old settlers were coming in and telling of similar instances they had seen when "fish rained down out of the clouds."

Captain Ritcher, ex-ranger, related an instance of seeing fish descend from the clouds in West Texas large enough to furnish a meal for several men.

Visitors Make Rut Lone Point Against Sanford Girls; Miss Mildred Holly Is the High Point Player

Boys Defeated By Score of 15 to 9

Preparations Being Made to Play Duval Shortly After The Christmas Holidays

Basketball teams of the Sanford High School opened the local season Friday night with Hastings, the girls winning their game 14 and 1 while the boys were defeated 15 to 9. Both games were well played, replete with action and kept a large number of spectators along the sidelines on their toes.

With Mildred Holly, at right forward, playing in championship from Sanford walked away from Hastings. Miss Holly, looping three throws through the basket during the first half, accounted for all her team's points during that period. In the second half she tossed two markers through the baskets and shared honors equally with Bonnie May Kinlaw, each getting two field goals. These two accounted for all of the Sanford points.

Hastings' lone tally, a foul, is credited to E. Byrd. The whole visiting team, though they managed to present a creditable floor game, were woefully deficient in the matter of shooting baskets.

The sole reason why the Sanford boys team is not in the winning column is the inability to shoot. This is not as trite as it appears. The Sanford boys banged shot after shot at the baskets, shots that appeared to be points, only to have them poise indecisively on the rim then roll off. In passing they manifested a marked superiority to the visitors and kept the ball in their possession for the greater part of the time.

The play was fast, in fact, a trifle too fast for the insecure footing provided by the dirt court. There were frequent spills but the play was freer from fouls than

would be supposed at such a pace one on which the game was played.

Wilson, King and Byrd, the forwards and right guard of the Sanford team respectively, were responsible for the three field goals secured by the local aggregation. They were closely watched by the Hastings guards but despite this and their skidding they got clear and fired shots at the basket which, with either a little more practice or a little luck, would have counted for points.

Hicks, right forward for Hastings, accounted for the greater number of field tallies of his team, managing to secure four goals for a total of 8 points. Bailey, his mate at left forward, second with an even half of the total. With a little less efficient guarding the Hastings forwards might have added materially to their total for they made good a creditable portion of their chances at goal.

Coach Halt expressed himself as agreeably surprised at the team work shown by his aggregation. He expressed his confidence that, with a little intensive practice in shooting his boys will be able to take the measure of Hastings with little difficulty.

Athletic authorities of the local school are seeking a good game with Duval High School, of Jacksonville, to be played soon after the Christmas holidays. It is understood that there is an excellent chance of securing the game.

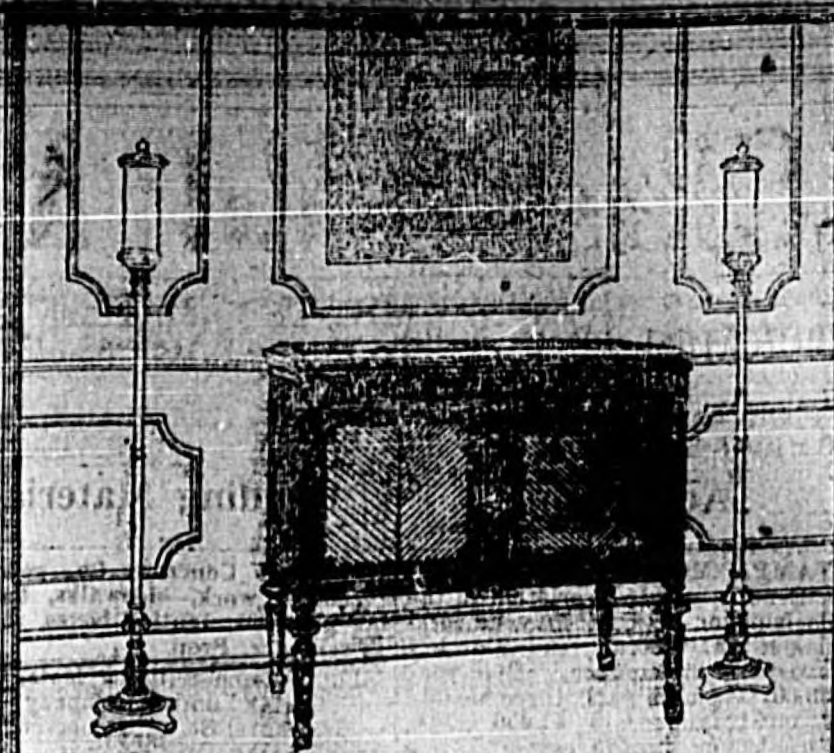
