Police suspect mother killed three children

Longwood police are investigating the death of three young children that were found underneath a bed a Georgia Avenue home.

According to an issued release, the father Gary Williams contacted Longwood police Tuesday expressing concern for the safety of his children. His estranged wife Andrea Williams allegedly had custody of Ilona, 9, Ian, 6, and Ivey, 5, over the weekend and reportedly took them camping.

North Carolina authorities arrested Andrea on a minor charge and the children were not in her custody. She advised North Carolina police that she took the lives of the three children. Longwood police, the state attorney's office and North Carolina authorities are investigating the case.

Sanford officers charge man for credit card fraud

SANFORD — Residents of the Monterey Oaks subdivision off Upsala Road say the neighborhood is relatively quiet, that is until last Friday evening.

"Whatever they had was a big thing," said resident Sylvia Velazquez. "There were police cars there all night."

What started as a reported sexual battery call at about 6 p.m. ended up as one of the

largest credit card and drivers licenses fraud cases ever for Sanford police.

Sanford police Sgt. Tony Esolf said officers responded to the scene when a woman came screaming out of 148 Caramel Bay Drive and forced her way into a nearby house.

She claimed she was drugged and two males were trying to rape her. Investigators said the thong-clad female made her way to the bathroom of the Spanish Bay Drive home, sat in

the tub and turned on the water. Officers then responded to the Caramel Bay Drive home rented by Robert Christopher Bojan, 35 to ask questions.

"He made a spontaneous comment to an officer if he wanted to watch kiddie porn on his computer," said Sanford police Investigator Cynthia Little.

Little said Bojan was suspected of being under the influ-

State senator arrested for DUI

State Sen. Lee Constantine (R-Altamonte Springs) was arrested shortly before midnight Saturday, when his vehicle was seen by a Maitland police officer being driven erratically.

The officer conducted a traffic stop at Maitland Avenue and Maitland Boulevard.

In the police arrest report, the officer wrote, "I was traveling east bound on State Road 414 on the Interstate 4

median lane. At that time, I observed a black Mercedes traveling in the curb lane, just in front of my patrol vehicle.

"The Mercedes then changed into the median lane, still traveling directly in front of my patrol vehicle, while continuing east bound on State Road 414. I observed the Mercedes drift toward the median with the vehicle's front and rear driver's side tires crossing over the solid yellow line.

"The Mercedes then proceeded to drift over towards the curb, with the vehicle's front and rear passenger side tires crossing into the curb lane."

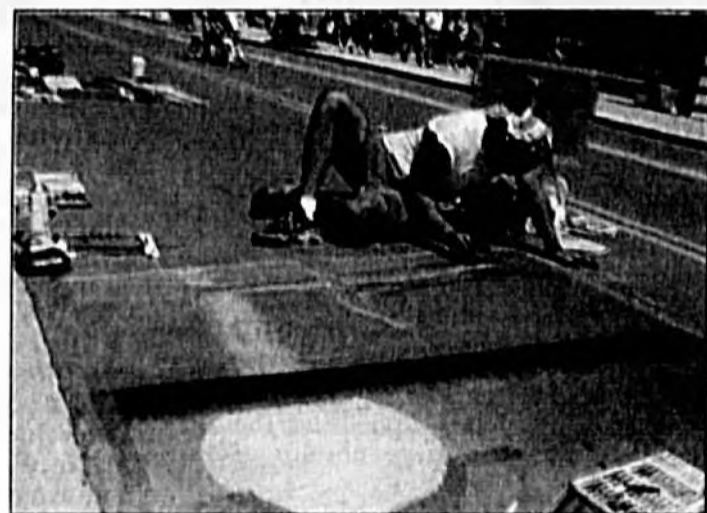

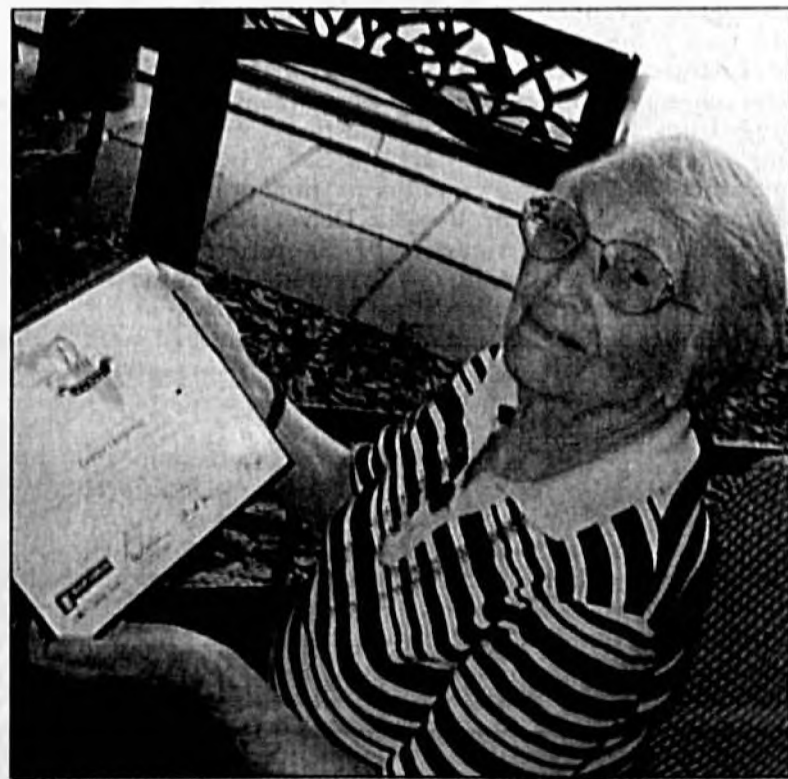

City of Sanford Utility Department readies for office move, offers low-flow toilet rebates

Beginning Monday, May 17, the Sanford Utility Department will have a new location.

The department is moving downstairs from the previous location in the second floor. Utility customers will not have access to the service on the first floor, in the west side of the building. There will be a new entrance near the Sanford Recreation Department. Signs indicating the location will be provided. For more information, call 407-330-5630.

Additionally during the month of May, the Sanford Utility Department will be accepting applications for toilet exchange rebates.

Houses built prior to 1995 often have toilets which use large quantities of water. Persons applying for and receiving a grant, would then be required to purchase a new style toilet.

Upon proof of purchase, the city will subtract \$50 from the citizen's water bill — one time only. Only 60 grants are available, and persons must be connected to Sanford utilities. For more information, call 407-330-5624.

Seminole County Historical Society guest speaker to reveal early St. Johns River settlements

Persons interested in knowing more about this Central Florida area and its early history are invited to visit the Seminole County Historical Society meeting at 7 p.m., May 20, at the County Agriculture Auditorium.

Bill Dreggors will tell about the early settlements along the St. Johns River which are now ghost towns.

William Joshua Dreggors, Jr., is a fourth generation Floridian and a lifelong DeLand resident. Through his strong interest in local history, he has collected artifacts revealing much of the early history around this area. Not only has he documented his findings on slides, but he has been very active as Curator of the Henry A. DeLand House Museum, past president of the West Volusia Historical Society, and presently its Executive Director.

Dreggors established and owns the Ice and Electrical Museum in the Stone Street Hospital Museum in DeLand, located at Bill Dreggors Park.

He was instrumental in creating the DeLand Naval Air Station Museum, and has co-authored three books on Volusia County history. For eight years, he served as a member of the Volusia County Historical Preservation Board. He has served four years on the Historic Preservation Advisory Council of Florida.

Currently, Dreggors serves as Chairman of the West Volusia Tourist Advertising Authority, board member on the DeBary Historical preservation Board and on the steering committee of Heritage Rivers, comprising the St. Johns River and the river basin which is a large portion of Florida.

Continuing to follow the vehicle, the officer conducted a speed check and reported his instrument clocked the Mercedes traveling 57 miles per hour in a 45 mph zone. He then stopped the vehicle, and said he could smell a strong odor of alcoholic beverages coming from the driver's breath.

The officer said Constantine told him he had been drinking but had only a couple of drinks. The officer however, said Constantine's speech was, "very slow and hard to understand."

While Constantine was cooperative in performing the field sobriety exercises at the scene of the traffic stop, after being taken to the Orange County Jail, he refused to provide a sample of his breath.

Constantine was booked on a charge of driving under the influence, with a prior conviction (in 1990).

The incident was videotaped using the in-car video system and the tape has been placed in evidence. Bond was set at \$500, and was posted shortly after.

ence of drugs. With the female's complaint of being drugged, suspected marijuana in plain view in the living room and Bojan's condition, authorities executed a search warrant at the home and found some marijuana, cocaine and prescription pills, Esoff said. Esoff was not brought on charges for child pornography, but investigators still have to search through three computer hard drives that were confiscated.

"When we did the inventory for the first search warrant it led to all this credit card stuff," he said.

Sanford investigators went back to obtain another search warrant and ended up finding stacks of blank credit cards, more than 17 drivers licenses all bearing Bojan's picture with matching counterfeit American Express cards. Most startling to police was two professional grade credit card printers, an embosser to stamp the numbers

on the cards, a roll of holograms seen on many credit cards and several "skimmers" used to store numbers from existing cards.

"The professional grade printer was actually in plain view laying in the middle of the hallway," Esoff said. "That's what led us to believe there was something going on here."

All total police counted more than 170 identification cards belonging to other people and countless credit cards from Capital One American Express and Discover, Borders gift cards, motel key cards and satellite television access cards. Police also confiscated Bojan's 2001 Lexus LS300 as suspected counterfeit credit cards and a scanner were found in the vehicle.

Esoff said Bojan stopped talking to Sanford investigators as more and more evidence was located. The Secret Service and U.S. Attorney's Office responded to the scene as Bojan is under



federal probation for making counterfeit licenses.

"When we started digging up this we knew we hit something big, it even impressed the Secret Service agent," Esoff said. "It impressed him enough to get the U.S. Attorney's Office to come out and look at all this stuff."

Investigators' work on the case is not finished as several "unusual" items were also confiscated. Police found a bullet-proof jacket with suspected bloodstains on it and even a camera watch.

"He had a camera watch so he could actually take pictures of people putting their pin (numbers) in," Littles said.

Police are also curious to know how Bojan purchased the commercial grade equipment to print the fraudulent credit cards.

"I believe he's been buying all this stuff on the black market," Esoff said.

One of the credit card printers was found in the garage packaged in a box with postal tape, which makes authorities suspect the equipment was mailed to him.

Bojan is charged with 99 counts of counterfeiting drivers licenses, possessing a fictitious, identification card and counterfeiting credit cards, 25 counts of

fraud and one count of possessing machines that make credit cards.

Littles said there would have been more charges filed against Bojan, but the law enforcement computer system can only handle 99 counts of one certain charge.

"I think we put a big dent in the credit card theft industry," Esoff said. "It appears he was a big player."

Chorpening has actively volunteered for The Good News Jail Ministry grading Bible study papers of inmates; Central Florida Regional Hospital working in the gift shop and the information desk; and Sanford Christian Sharing Center sorting donated food and clothing items for distribution.

"I'm shocked," Chorpening said as she received a certificate and congratulatory letter from Bush before a crowded hall of her volunteering peers at Hotel Orlando North in Maitland. "I never expected all of this. I guess it's worth living a 100 years for."

Chorpening is not the oldest volunteer to be graced with the state honor, however, her constant support of local citizens may be the longest running, said Nancy Roth, SCVP volunteer coordinator.

"Having served the Seminole County community for nearly 50 years and continuing to volunteer at 100 years old is a significant accomplish-

ment," she said. "All of her service assists the needy or less fortunate, and her caring, compassionate spirit is a model for all of us fortunate to know her."

Patt Russell-Reffner, vice president and board of directors for SCVP, said Chorpening was nominated for the award last year. When she received the call from Tallahassee about the Point of Light recognition the week prior to the banquet, she too was a little surprised.

"We just happened to have this (luncheon) planned the next week," she said. "It's important to know that our organization is noticed. It's nice to have that recognition, but it's nicer for the volunteer."

For Sanford residents that know Chorpening, it's widely known she's usually not the first to admit her lofty accomplishments - or to stop helping others in need for that matter.

"I never dreamed I was doing anything spectacular," Chorpening said. "I just did what comes natural."

And similar to Chorpening, the volunteers of SCVP give more every year to positively impact many facets of Seminole County life. From education to public safety, the 978 SCVP volunteers performed 143,000 hours of service last year, Russell-Reffner said.

"When there is a need in Seminole County you are there," she said to the banquet attendees, "and we appreciate it very much."

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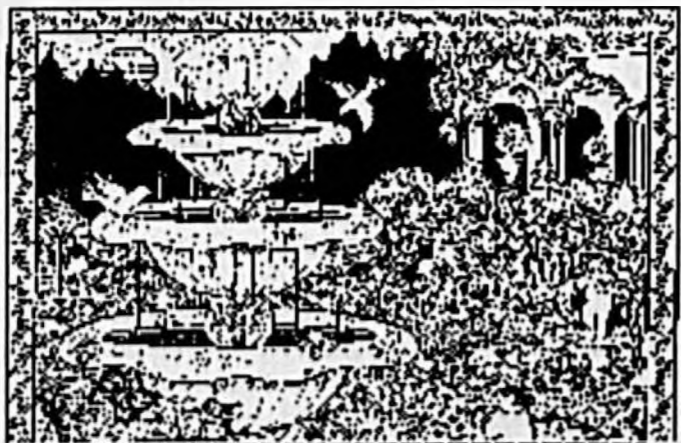

Albertsons opens new Heathrow store

HEATHROW — With two supermarket chains — Winn-Dixie and Kash n' Karry — recently announcing store closings in the state another is experiencing a "renaissance."
Albertsons, the nation's second largest grocery chain, opened its eighth store in Seminole County last Wednesday with fanfare only fit for a king as the new Heathrow location is the first unweaving of its "renaissance" store.

The grocery store is an anchor for the Colonial TownPark shopping center at the intersection of International Parkway and County Road 46A and just minutes from Albertsons district office.

The sweetest shop in town

LAKE MARY — A sweet new candy store is open in the Colonial TownPark. At a glance, Sugar Sugar is a candy haven for children and adults of all ages. The shelves are lined with candy of all colors and flavors, and old-fashioned swirled lollipops. "It smells so good in here!" is usually the first thing customers say when they enter the store.

Sugar Sugar, located next to the AmStar movie theatre, is a candy store where each piece of candy, called a "lolly," is handmade. The process is difficult and time consuming, but for owners Larry and Keren Speck, it's all worth it.

"Our core value is fun," said Keren Speck. "We want people to have fun when they come in."

When the couple was on vacation in Australia two years ago, they were introduced to a 200-year-old European candy recipe.

Intrigued by the idea of opening a candy store in the United States where the candy-making process is done by hand and shown to customers, the idea for Sugar Sugar was born.

Speck said most candy stores make their treats in a back room using machines. "Both kids and adults love to watch the candy being made," she said, adding that Sugar Sugar is one of the first stores in the country to make all of its candy by hand and in front of an audience. "It's the technique that is the interesting part."

Each piece of candy is different. Flavors range from watermelon, a favorite among customers of all ages, to sour apple, to passionfruit and root beer. Custom candy can be made to have names, logos, or words in it for business promotions, weddings or special occasions. Speck said a batch of candy was recently made for the Relay for Life charity event.

Employees who make

the candy are called "lollyologists" and train for about a month making candy.

"We get them started right away working with someone who has been trained," Speck said. "It really is like an art form. Every batch is different."

Speck said the lollyologists make about 120 pounds of candy a day. The process takes two people, and each batch is taste-tested.

The couple plans on opening more stores in the Central Florida area, ordering through the company's Web site and offer custom gift baskets.

"We really like it when people come in and say 'This is good candy,'" Speck said. "Adults and kids come in, they have fun, get a treat and a show. We really like making people happy."

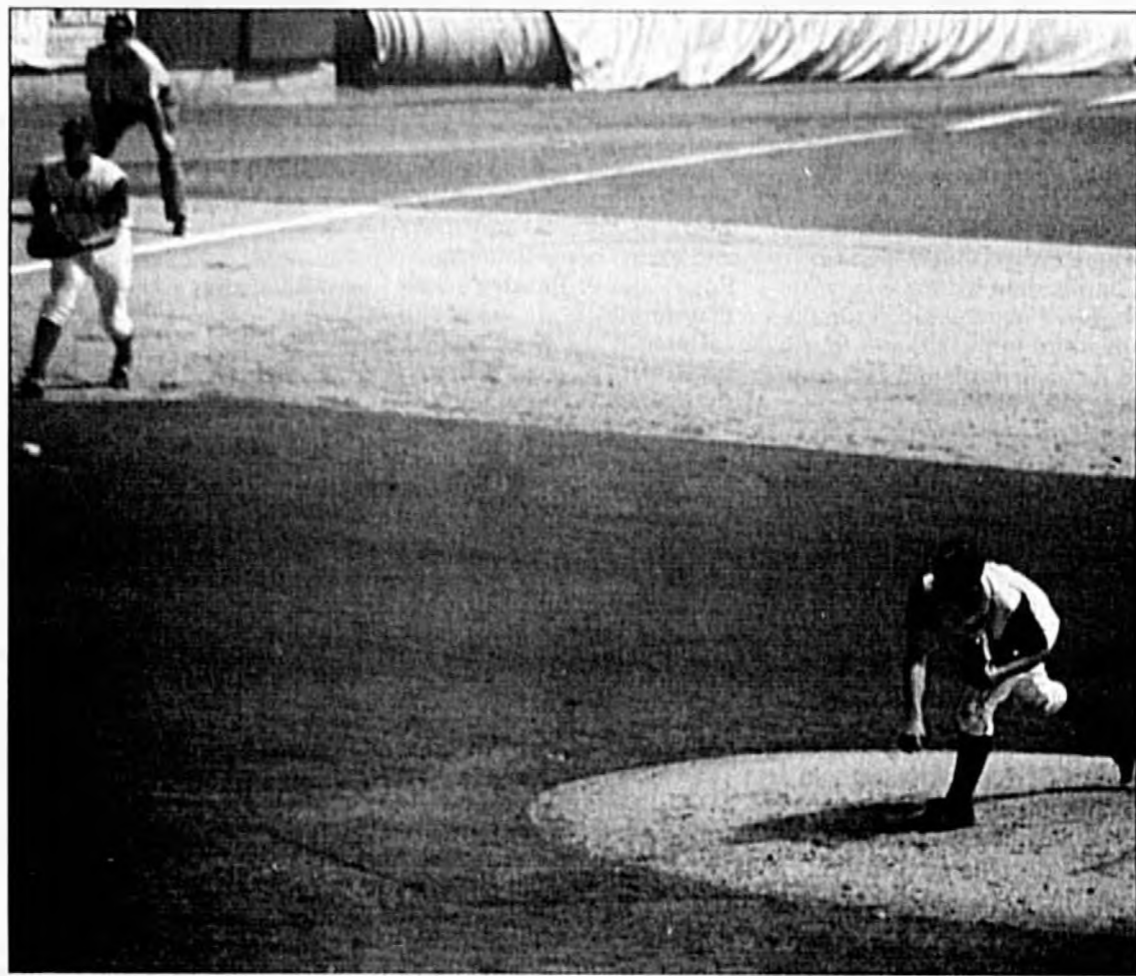
Junior first baseman Tom Roessler provided most of the offense for Lake Howell, going 2-for-4 with a double and driving in four runs.

UCF won the title for the third consecutive year and sixth time since 1995. The Golden Knights won or shared titles in soccer, volleyball, basketball, and track & field. UCF also had runner-up finishes in tennis and softball, accumulating 228.0 points this season.

Florida Atlantic, which won the softball title and took a share of the soccer title, finished the year with 205.5 points, while Georgia State finished third with 195.0 points after winning a share of the basketball title. Troy State finished fourth with 157.5 points, taking the tennis title, while Campbell finished in fifth with 141.0 points and the golf championship. Jacksonville (138.0), Belmont (124.5), Mercer (103.5), Gardner-Webb (102.0), Stetson (94.5) and Lipscomb (85.5) rounded out the standings.

Teams are awarded points based on regular season finish in team sports and championship finish in individual sports. The points are awarded in descending order in three-point increments, beginning at 33 for the win with all ties splitting the points.

UCF WINS SERIES FROM #13 CLEMSON

Another weekend, another big series for the Bono brothers. Host Clemson defeated UCF, 8-5, in the open-

ing game of three-game series on Friday, despite Ryan Bono going 2-for-3 and driving in a run. But the Golden Knights were just warming up.

On Saturday, Ryan Bono laid down a perfect bunt on a suicide squeeze to give UCF its first lead of the night in the eighth inning to lead No. 24 UCF to a 7-4 comeback win over No. 13 Clemson in front of 4,448 fans Saturday evening at Doug Kingsmore Stadium in Clemson, S.C.

Twin brother Kyle Bono pitched his third straight complete game with 10 strikeouts and just one earned run to lead UCF to its 36th win of the season.

UCF rallied from a 3-0 deficit and won its first game of the season after trailing after seven innings of play with the critical non-conference win on the road.

Kyle Bono raised his record to a perfect 8-0 on the year as he retired the game's final seven batters. The sophomore from Lake Mary struck out 10 for the second straight game and lowered his season ERA to 1.20. His 10 strikeouts also give him 98 for the season, tied for eighth in UCF single-season history.

UCF trailed 4-3 before scoring two runs in the eighth to take its first lead of the game. Cooper led the inning off with a double to the wall in left center and Clay Timpner ripped a single to right to plate Cooper. With runners on the corners and one out, coach Jay Bergman called for the suicide squeeze and Ryan Bono laid down a perfect sacrifice bunt to score Timpner.

Earlier in the game, Ryan Bono was hit by a pitch for the 15th time this season, second-most in single-season history at UCF.

On Sunday, Darren Newlin pitched 5.2 innings and allowed just one run to lead UCF to a 3-2 victory over Clemson. Newlin moved to 3-0

on the year as the Golden Knights earned a key non-conference series victory over No. 13 Clemson.

UCF handed Clemson just its second three-game series loss at home to a non-conference team since 1999 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. The last time UCF won a road series from a ranked opponent was a three-game sweep of No. 8 Stetson in 2001 in DeLand. With the win, UCF raised its record to 37-11 while Clemson dropped to 30-18 overall.

In the fourth, Lake Mary's Drew Butera (2-for-4) ripped a RBI-single to left and Cooper followed with a RBI-single to right to extend the UCF lead to 3-0. Ryan Bono finished the game 1-for-3.

Corporate PERKS

More companies are attracting clients and treating workers with NASCAR weekends

Ontario, Calif. — As the deafening roar of speeding cars pierced the desert air at California Speedway, Carrie Hogg, 32, took in a deep breath of the oil, exhaust fumes and excitement that is NASCAR.

"This sure as hell beats watching a basketball game in a skybox somewhere," she said with a smile.

Hogg, an employee of Albertson's grocery store chain, and her husband, Philip, proudly showed off their Dale Earnhardt Jr. T-shirts as they made their way to the garages to watch the drivers and crews prep for the next race. After that, it was back to the hospitality tent for food and beers before settling in to watch the end of the race.

"And the best part," she yelled over the passing cars, "it's all on the company."

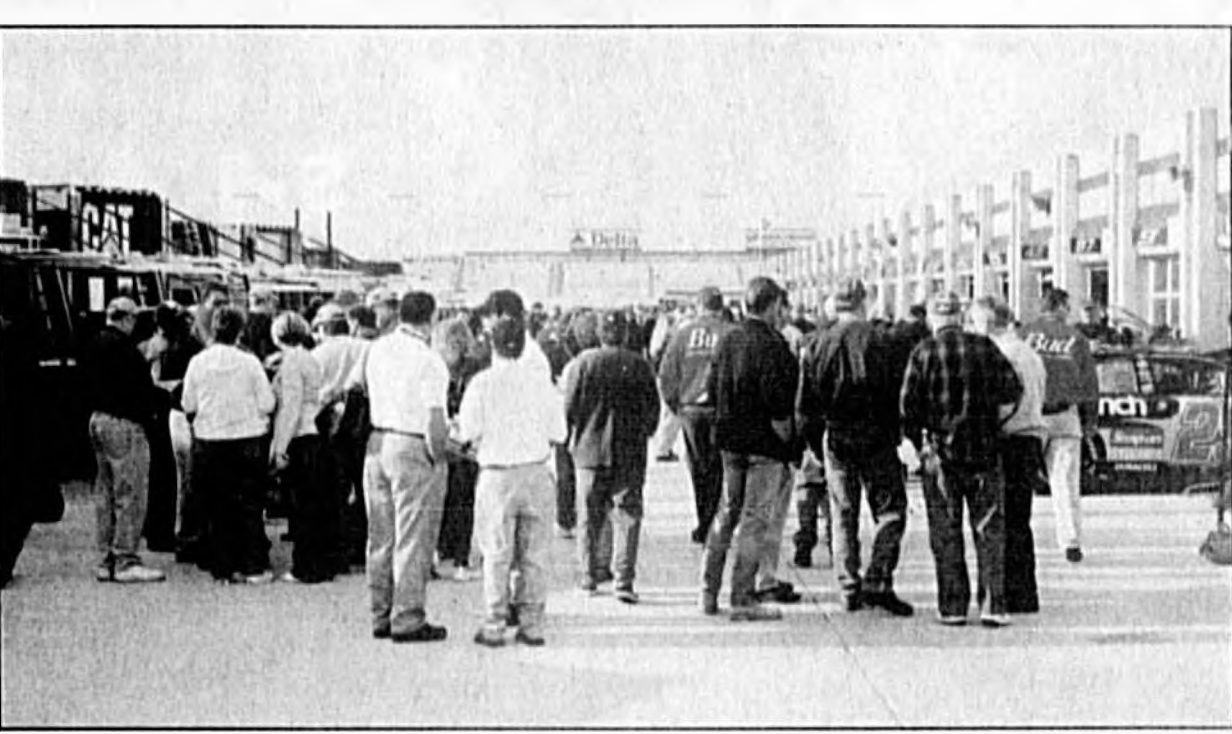
It's the newest and fastest-growing trend in the world of corporate "wooing" and employee recognition. While companies still reward key clients and accomplished employees with luxury suites at basketball, football and hockey games, many are beginning to embrace the growing popularity of NASCAR by offering a weekend of the stock-car racing experience.

Exciting experience

"Experience is really the key word," said Justin Macy, president of RaceAway Hospitality Inc., a Kansas-based company which promotes and sells sporting travel packages to corporations.

"The reason more and more corporations are buying these packages is because their clients or their employees are amazed with what they get," he said. "It's not like sitting up in a suite, watching a game. With these NASCAR packages, you're right in the middle of everything."

The packages, which cost \$200 to \$600, typically include air travel, lodging and transportation to the races. At the track itself, there is usually a hospitality tent with food and beer. Sometimes NASCAR drivers will make an appearance and do quick interviews or an autograph signing. Clients often are allowed inside-

access to the event, passing through the garage as racers get ready, checking out the cars as they are unloaded from trucks and getting close to the pit crews as the race is going on. Sometimes there is the opportunity to listen on headsets to the conversations between drivers and their crew.

"You get everything except grease on your face ... and I suppose you could even get that," said Matt Wagner, a sales representative for Cary, N.C.-based Premiere Sports Travel, the country's largest sports travel package distributor.

Both Wagner and Macy said the number of NASCAR packages sold has skyrocketed over the past couple of years. For RaceAway, a firm with revenues under \$1 million, they are the No. 1 priority. And Wagner said Premiere, which brings in a few million dollars a year, is focusing more on the profitable NASCAR packages.

"We do make quite a bit from these NASCAR packages, as they almost always sell out," Wagner said. He also noted the large capacity of NASCAR events as well as the longer season, which means more sale opportunities.

"And the fans are extremely loyal to NASCAR," he said. "These travel packages are a great way for people to see that it's not just a good-old-boy, redneck-running-moonshine kind of sport."

Destroying that image is one rea-

corporations get a lot from the NASCAR packages as well.

"The agent takes care of everything for you, in terms of lodging and transportation and making sure they have a good time, so you don't have to worry about it," said Roger Long, a sales executive for Syngenta Crop Protection in Greensboro, N.C.

Showing appreciation

Long took clients to a race in Bristol, Tenn., last year and said the price tag of a few thousand dollars was well worth it. "They were clients we really wanted to keep and show our appreciation to, and they had the time of their lives at the race," he said. "And they're still clients today."

Not all the kinks have been worked out of the NASCAR packages. Open access is such a new trend that some raceways struggle to give people access to the normally off-limits areas they want to visit. At California Speedway earlier this month, several patrons were milling around aimlessly at times and questioning staff as to where things were and where they could go.

But for Brian Mosley, 31, a supervisor for drywall company Jade Inc., that was all part of the experience. "We love it because we're right here in the middle of it," he said. "We can feel it. There's no other sporting experience like this."

A new coat of asphalt at Richmond International Raceway is expected to bring record speeds and possibly some single-file racing when the Nextel Cup runs there Saturday.

"Everybody knows when we go to a track for the first time after it's been repaved and it's new that one-groove racing is probably going to be more apparent," said Elliott Sadler, who

recently tested there.

"Once the Busch cars run on the track Friday night and maybe slicken it up a little bit, we might see a groove-and-a-half or hopefully two grooves by Saturday night."

Jeff Gordon, riding a two-race winning streak, said the poll record of 21.194 seconds (approximately 127 mph) likely will be broken during Friday's qualifying.

"The poll record will fall for sure," Gordon said. "I ran that time [during testing] on 30-lap tires."

Truex Jr. claims third '04 victory

Martin Truex Jr. won his third Busch Series victory in six races, leading 123 of 200 laps in the Charter 250 Saturday night at Gateway International Raceway near St. Louis.

Truex, driving the No. 8 Chevrolet for owner Dale Earnhardt Jr., started the race from the pole and finished 6.601 seconds ahead of Ron Hornaday Jr.

"The victory moved Truex 16 points ahead of Michael Waltrip in the series standings.

"We had a superior car tonight," Truex said after the race.

Jason Keller was third, followed by Bobby Hamilton Jr., Kyle Busch, Jason Leffler, Greg Biffle, David Stremme, Tim Fedewa and Robby Gordon.

Truex's victory Saturday marked the first time a Busch Series driver won from the pole at Gateway. Truex's other two wins this season were at Talladega and Bristol.

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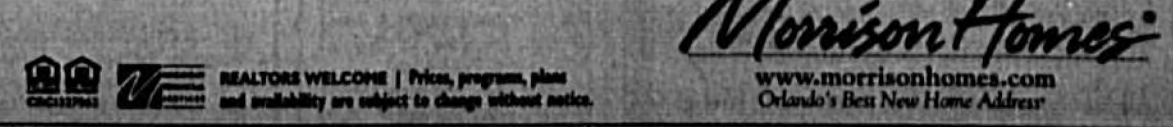

Sheriff's office busts major drug ring



Law enforcement agents seized more than \$175,000 in a sting.

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The operation was undertaken by the City-County Investigative Bureau, with the assistance of all seven of the city police departments in Seminole County, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, the Volusia County Sheriff's Office and the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

The investigation began in October 2003 into the suspected illegal drug dealings of Rodney Lee Florence, 28, of Casselberry and Kenneth Lee Lane, 28, of Longwood.

In February, the Sanford Police Department's Special Investigation Unit also developed some vital information with regard to this case. Based on the information, and evidence obtained, authorities requested, and received, arrest warrants against Florence and Lane, as well as 19 others. Search warrants were also obtained for 14 residences in Seminole County.

The bonds range from \$50,000, to \$100,000, to no bond. Of the 21 listed on the warrants, agents arrested 13 individuals. Five others, not named in the warrants, were also arrested for drug crimes.

Agents were able to seize three pounds of cocaine, five pounds of marijuana and \$175,000 in cash.

engaged in operating a legitimate wholesale or retail distribution enterprise — for Florida-grown produce — on May 1, 2004, will not be offered a lease renewal for the upcoming fiscal year."

The letter notification was

cause for concern for many businesses on the second floor of the market that are more involved in the trucking side of Florida's agriculture products. However, Coker said he broadened the original stipulation last week to include

those not engaged in operating a fully legitimate "agri-business" at the market.

The change in definition will leave two tenants of the market — Vicky's Permit Service (VPS Inc.) and C&S Logistics — without a

lease come June 30.

At the heart of the lease battle, is the market's oldest tenant, VPS Inc. When the market burned in the 1960s and rebuilt, Vicky Getman started her tractor-trailer permitting business. Although Getman is retired she still works as a controlling advisor. Employees doubt she will leave without a fight.

Police: Mother used pills to kill 3 children

LONGWOOD — A mother charged with poisoning her three children may have received much needed medical help if a law pushed by Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger had been in effect last fall.

Police say Andrea Williams, 32, fed her children stolen prescription pills and watched them die. The Longwood mother is being held in a North Carolina jail after she confessed Tuesday to the slayings of Ilona, 9, Jan, 6, and Ivey, 5.

Williams has a history of violence, but only toward herself. Longwood police were called to her home twice because she threatened to kill herself in October and November. Each time she made a claim that she was going to harm herself, Longwood police used the "Baker Act" to send Williams to the mental healthcare unit at South Seminole Hospital.

Once considered pioneering legislation, the Baker Act was approved by the Florida legislature more than three decades ago. It permits treatment facilities to hold patients up to three days if they are deemed an imminent danger to themselves or others.

The problem is after 72 hours, patients are most often set free without any stipulation to continue mental health treatment. The cycle can be vicious as patients identified by law enforcement officials can be readmitted under the Baker Act numerous times. Williams was twice released after the 72-hour observation period without future schedule visits.

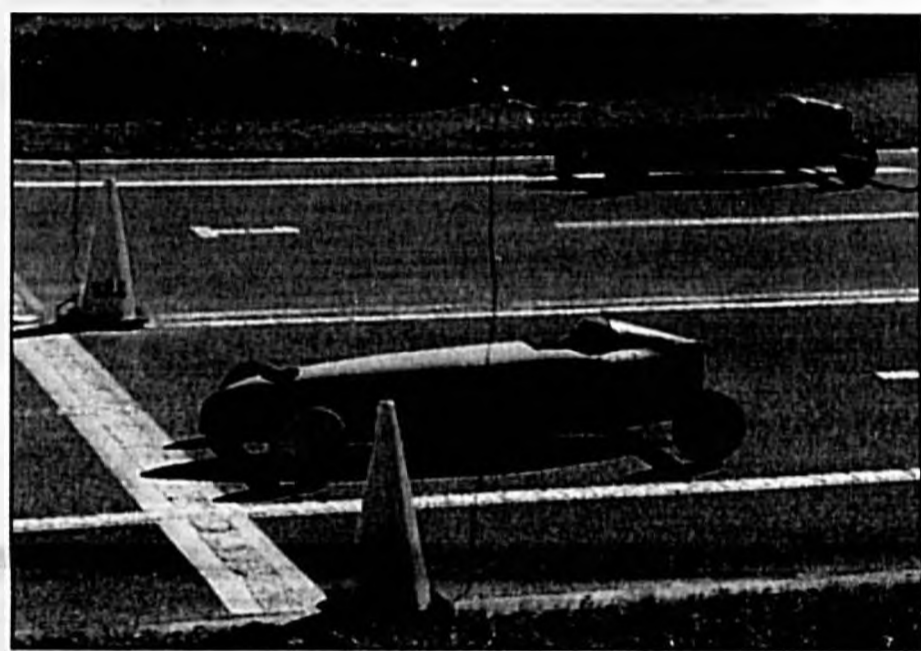
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Soap Box Derby is a youth gravity racing program for boys and girls ages 8 to 17. It is a unique program that encourages close adult-youth activities while building and racing the car.

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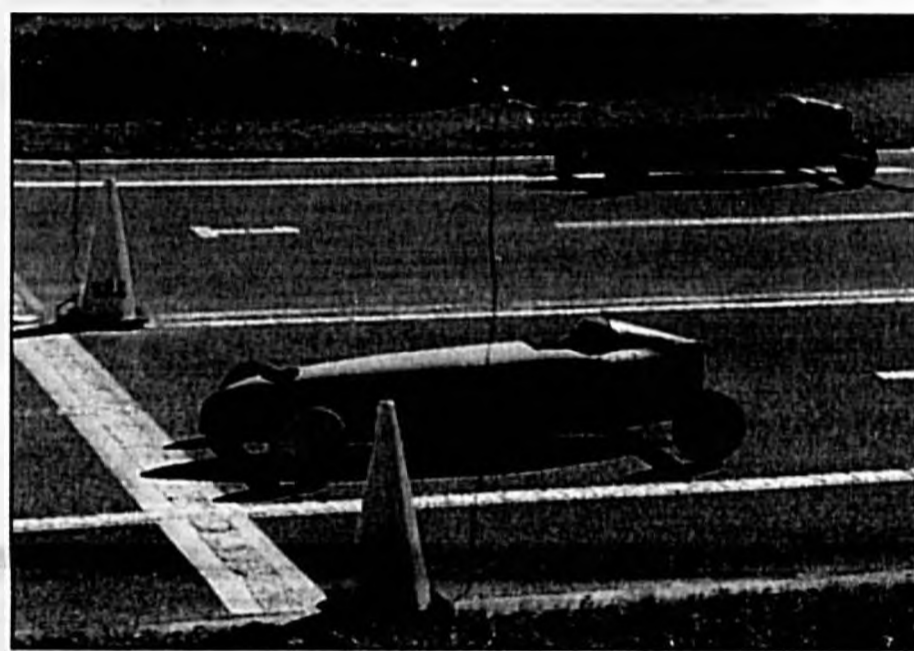

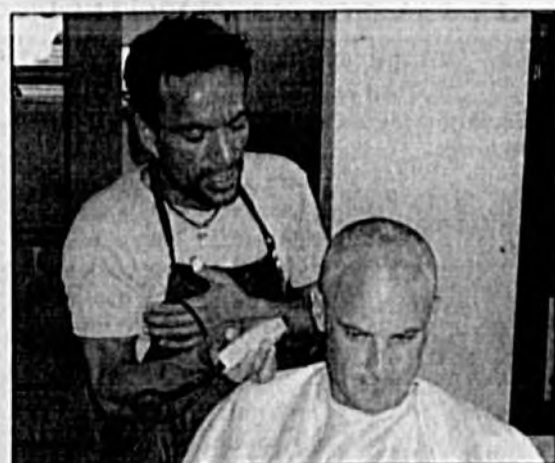

Longwood Police Chief Tommy Jackson said more needs to be done in the observation periods, as it's a "critical time" in determining the mental health of an individual.

"Obviously the proof is in the pudding if you are going to kill yourself or somebody else," he said. "Remember, we enforce the laws, we don't provide mental health care."

Eslinger has taken the lead on mental health issues as they relate to law enforcement. Six years ago, Seminole County deputy Eugene "Stetson" Gregory was killed on duty by a man suffering from mental illness.

Eslinger has lobbied for a change in the Baker Act that would provide more mental health treatment. The state legislature responded by approving Eslinger's reforms on the last day of the legislative session that ended two weeks ago. If signed by the governor, the law would take effect January 2005.

Under the reforms, individuals who are Baker Acted by police will still go through the 72 hours of mental health observation. The major change is mental health professionals will be able to require, with the consent of a judge, that the individual receive additional inpatient or outpatient treatment following the 72-hour period.

"(Williams) may have been able — and I can't say for certain — to fit the criteria for assisted outpatient treatment," Eslinger said. "It possibly could have helped in this case."

If Williams had received mental health treatments, perhaps the gruesome discovery in Longwood would have been prevented. Williams confessed to police about killing her children after she was arrested for trespassing at a residence about 50 miles north of Charlotte, N.C.

"There was an argument and we were asked to send deputies to the residence," said Maj. Coy Reid of the Catawba County (North Carolina) Sheriff's Department. "She was asked to leave and she did at that time, but an hour later she came back. They called us again and we went down there and arrested her."

Williams reportedly had a relationship with the woman at the house, Ashley Bishop. The two had visited each other over the past several months, accord-

ing to authorities.

"Once we arrested her, the party she went to see was concerned because the children were not with her and also her vehicle wasn't there," Reid said.

Bishop contacted the children's father, Gary Williams of Altamonte Springs, who thought the three kids were on a camping trip with their mother. Jackson said the department received a

the trek to North Carolina to question Williams, but she refused to cooperate.

Investigators suspect Williams fed the children the prescription pills sometime Mother's Day and watched them die about two hours later.

"What she did is she gave each child a number of pills and when they became drowsy she went from room to room,"

Jackson said. "The kids went from drowsiness to unconsciousness to death."

After the children died she moved them into one bedroom and placed them under a trundle bed. No trauma was found on their bodies.

"It appears to be a prescription pill," Jackson said. "Without compromising the investigation we think we might have known where she got them. We believe she stole them. We're still working on some leads there."

The Longwood investigator returned to Seminole County Friday morning from his North Carolina visit. Police Chief Tommy Jackson said investigators who worked the crime scene at Williams' home on Georgia Avenue and those who went to the autopsies Wednesday will combine their discoveries during the next few days.

"They are doing their pre-case conference coordinating all the information into a timeline," he said. "Pretty much seeing what they got and where they need to go and who they need to talk to."

According to Reid, Williams may have also wanted to hurt Bishop and her children. Catawba County deputies found several items in a bag they suspect Williams had stashed near a mailbox down the road from Bishop's home.

"She had a pistol, some ammunition, handcuffs and duct tape," he said. "We suspect she came up here to do harm to Ashley Bishop."

Where was that place?

Maybe I'll get into my Model-T and drive to Wisconsin Settlement, Saulsville or Benson Springs over in Volusia County. Then, next week, I'll drive to Rands, Taintsville, Ginderville, or Wagner in Seminole County.

Years ago, that could be quite possible, as those were said to have been the original names of cities and towns. A number of them, of course, are no longer in existence. As many folks know, Sanford started as Fort Mellon, and Seminole County was once part of Mosquito County (today they might call it "Blind Mosquito County"). Taintsville was midway between Chuluota and Oviedo. It got its name because residents would identify their settlement as "Taint Chuluota and taint Oviedo."

Wagner was located toward Oviedo from Sanford, along the Atlantic Coast Line railroad tracks. There was a train station and a number of homes in the area. The town of Oseola used to be known as Cook's Ferry. Rands was located just off State Road 46, west of Sanford at the railroad tracks. While no longer an actual settlement, it is commonly known now as Rands Siding, where the railroad had its roundhouse and switch yard.

Another Sanford location was Ginderville. If you head south on Sanford Avenue, to the curve just before where Lake Mary Boulevard crosses, that would have been Ginderville. I recall Merrill Ginder living in that area years ago. He was reportedly shot to death in his front yard, and to my knowledge, the case was never solved. Elsewhere in the county, Winter Springs was originally known as North Orlando; Allamonte Springs was Snow's Station; Casselberry was originally Fern Park. Lake Monroe (the town, not the lake) was known as Ahern.

Many other areas no longer exist. They were centers of residential areas but not formally incorporated. These include Bothamley, Mecca, Canaan, Charm, Clydes and Gabriella.

Over in Volusia County, Samsula was Briggsville, DeLawn Springs was Spring Garden, Orange City was Wisconsin Settlement, and Enterprise, later to become the capitol city of Mosquito County, was known as Fountain place at one time, and Benson Springs at other times. Farmton was the original Celery City. Farmton is located east of Osteen on a road that has been identified with many names: Main Street, Farmton Road, Oakhill Road, Maytown Road, and probably others. The road went from Osteen to Oak Hill on the east coast, but travelers were forced to stop many times on the dirt road, to open and close gates which kept cattle from roaming to other property.

Volusia County historians have also identified the town of Garfield, at the present intersection of Garfield and Enterprise Road, between Osteen and Enterprise. They say the town had its own post office which was later moved to Enterprise. Osteen, which was actually incorporated as a city, was originally known as Saulsville. In both cases it was named after prominent residents, the Sauls family and the Osteen family. The incorporation lasted only three years however, and while it had a city hall/jail (total size approximately eight by 12 feet), the only two paid employees were the town marshal and a man hired to light and extinguish the gas-powered street lights. I have never found any indication that there was a mayor or other city officials.

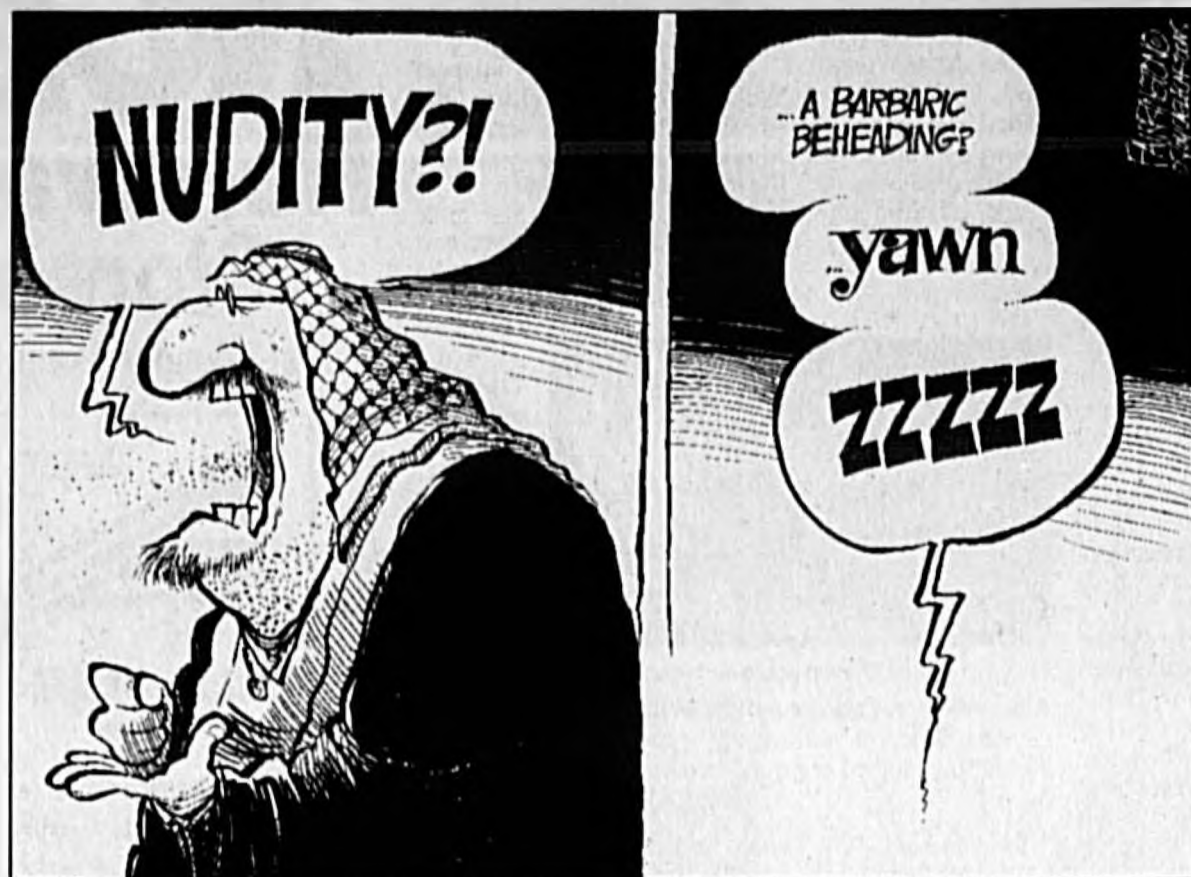
Then there is the St. Johns River. The original Indian tribes in the area called it Welaka, or Ylaco. The Spaniards who were some of the original explorers, called it Rio de Corrientes, (river of currents). Then along came the French who named it Riviere de Mai, (river of May). Later the Spanish returned to Florida and called it San Juan del Puerto (St. John of the harbor). It has also been identified on old maps as San Mateo and San Juan. When the British occupied the state from 1763 to 1783, San Juan was given the English name of Saint John, and it's been that way ever since.

I realize many readers of this column couldn't care less about the old names of our cities and settlements, but hopefully, it may be of interest to a few. As you can tell, I'm a history buff, but not to the extent Bill Dreggors or others are. Dreggors is going to give a lecture on the Ghost Towns of the St. Johns for the Seminole County Historic Society on Thursday, May 20, at the County Agriculture Center Auditorium on County Home Road in Sanford. The public is invited. Don't miss it.

One ghost story Dreggors doesn't know about however, is the ghost train of Osteen. Many years ago there was a railroad track through Osteen. It was taken out several decades ago. Now days, the sounds of train horns from as far away as the Deland area or New Smyrna Beach can be heard in Osteen if the wind is right. I have told people it's a ghost of the Osteen train. I wonder if anyone believes me?

Seminole High School students 'shadow' area professionals

"Job Shadowing" is a work experience option where students learn about a job by walking through the work day as a shadow to a competent worker.

The job shadowing work experience is a temporary, unpaid exposure to the workplace in an occupational area of interest to the student. Students witness, firsthand, the work environment, employability and occupational skills in practice, the value of professional training and potential career options.

Colleen M. Brown is the teacher on assignment to Applied Technology Education at the Sanford Educational Support Center.

"We've had over 600 students from all high schools in Seminole County involved in job shadowing," she said. "They select an occupation in which they are interested, and when we can, we assign them to the program where they are able to learn general ideas about the business and the need for dependability."

"Prior to going on a job shadowing," she explained, "students have to do a research paper about that particular occupation, so when they get to the job they selected, they have a good idea of what it takes to work there."

Under the sponsorship of the Sanford/Seminole Chamber of Commerce and Sanford Kiwanis Club, on April 21, 39 students from Seminole High School were involved in the latest Job Shadowing program. One of them was a freshman, two were sophomores, 11 were juniors and 24 were seniors at SHS. Occupations selected involved the medical profession, cosmetology, engineering, education, athletics, fire fighting, the legal profession, zoology, and several others.

The students were teamed with professionals at such businesses as the Healthcare & Rehabilitation Center of Sanford, Idyllwilde Elementary School, the Seminole County Fire Department, Lake Mary Pediatrics, and for 10 of them, Central Florida Regional Hospital. A luncheon was hosted by the Sanford Kiwanis Club for the job shadowing event.

Brown was responsible for locating

sive cars. So I arranged for him to spend a day job shadowing with a local undertaker.

"A job shadowing experience might make a difference in the life of a student by giving that student a new vision for their future," she said. "It may even provide inspiration that can change a student's life forever."

Take a walk on the wild side of Seminole County

The Geneva area, fortunately for those who live here, is home to several premier trails and passive recreation areas. One that is still partially in the planning stages — Flagler Trail — recently moved one step forward with the dedication of a trailhead at the intersection of Snow Hill Road and Jacobs Trail near Chuluota.

Marking the completion of the first phase of the Flagler Trail development (between the Econlockhatchee River and the Orange County line), the Snow Hill Road Trailhead was officially opened by the Seminole County Public Works, Engineering departments and Special Projects Team with a small dedication ceremony on April 19. The event was scheduled for this particular date so as to coincide with National County Government Week, whose theme this year was "Transportation: Counties move America's people and products."

Said Seminole County officials in a press release heralding the dedication: "Seminole County is excited about the trailhead opening due to the public service it provides to citizens and trail-users in this area of rural Seminole County where a fast growing population is already tied into a part of the Seminole County-wide

trail system as well as the established portion of the Florida National Scenic Trail (FNST)."

I'm excited because the Flagler Trail, when completed, will bring hikers, bicyclists and equestrians through some of the most beautiful natural places still left in Seminole County. It will also conveniently run right past my property line near its northernmost terminus at the St. Johns River north of Lake Harney. When completed, the 21-mile unpaved wilderness trail will take its travelers from that point to the Orange County line in Chuluota, as well as connecting into the FNST leading to the Barr Street Trailhead (County Road 426), eventually reaching Oviedo and the Cross Seminole Trail. (Who needs a car?)

Because of its length, scenic beauty and accommodation of various activities, says the county Web site, the Flagler Trail has been designated as one of the county's Showcase Trails.

The currently built 5.5-mile portion now runs from the Chuluota Bypass (Snow Hill Road) to the Little-Big Econ State Forest and the Geneva Wilderness Area. Parking is available at all three of these points.

Owned by Seminole County and maintained by Seminole County Parks and Recreation, the Flagler Trail is currently being surveyed to determine the areas in county ownership. An Eastern County Master Plan will then be created to determine the best possible route for the Flagler Trail to take. (To view the proposed route log on to www.seminolecountyfl.gov/ps/trails/trails_flagler.asp)

The basic design of the path is located along an abandoned railroad corridor that came to be known as State Road 13. The corridor was never used as a road, however, and the railroad was eventually abandoned in the 1950s. The right-of-way was acquired by Seminole County in 1984 from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and was restricted to public use. Around 1975, the Florida Trail Association designated the southern portion of the trail as part of the Florida National Scenic Trail, a designation that

must be given by the U.S. Congress based on the length and scenic quality of a trail. It has been functioning as a public wilderness trail ever since.

Unfortunately, before the FDOT abandoned State Road 13 right-of-way, they allowed segments to be used by private owners — creating gaps in the area that may potentially be difficult to fill in the future. The current survey work will determine alternate pathways to connect the southern portion to the section north of State Road 46 in Geneva.

To get to the Chuluota Bypass Trailhead, take County Road 419 east from Oviedo to Snow Hill Road. Take Snow Hill Road north until you see the sign that says "Florida Trail Parking." To get to the Little-Big Econ State Forest and the Geneva Wilderness Area, take County Road 426 north from Oviedo (or south from Geneva). Both parks are located on the south side of County Road 426.

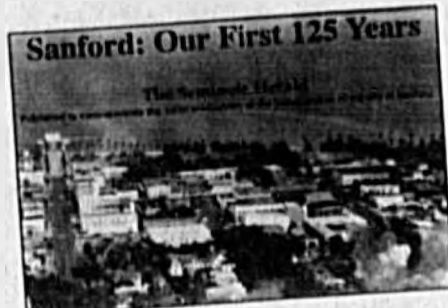

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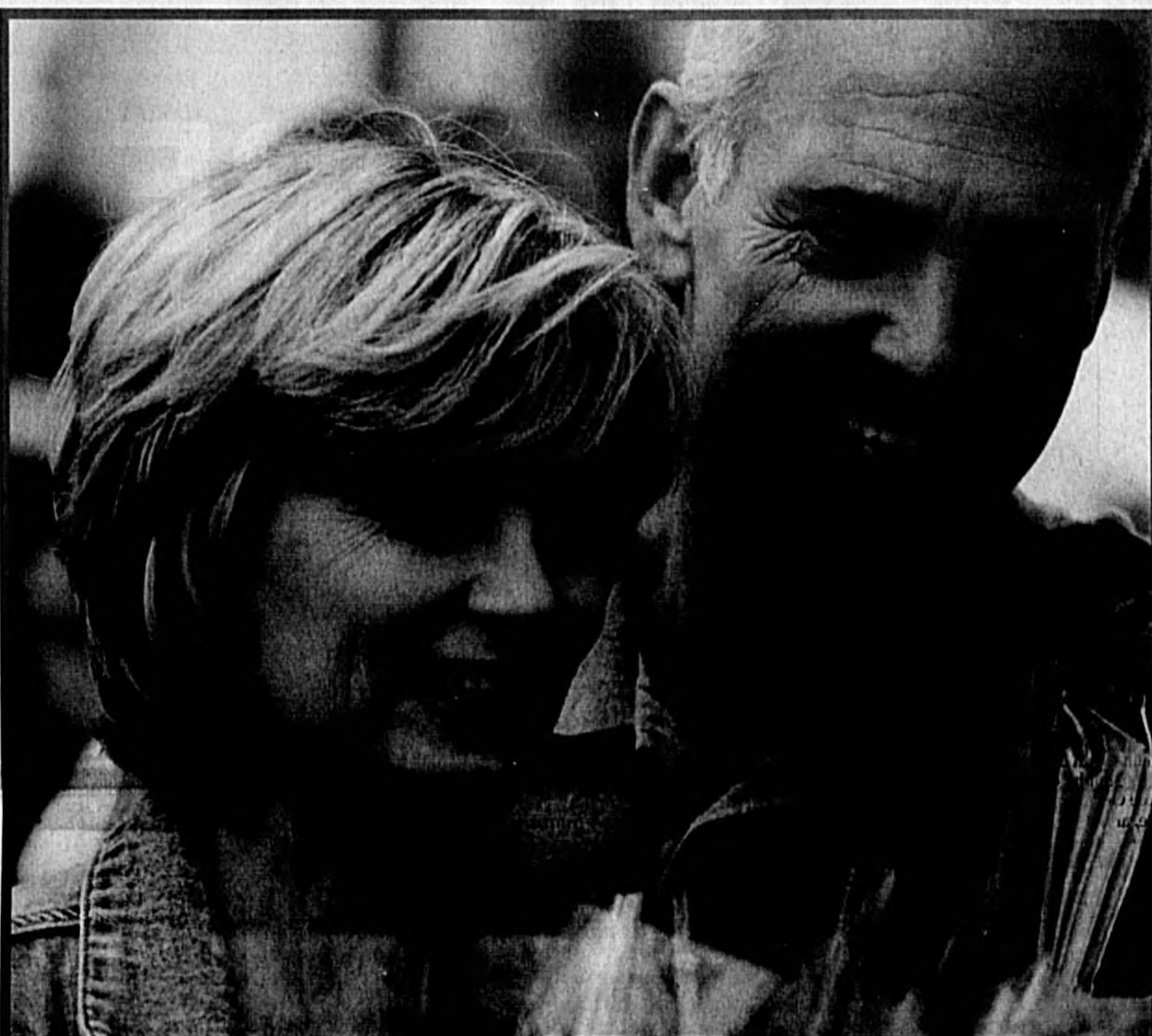
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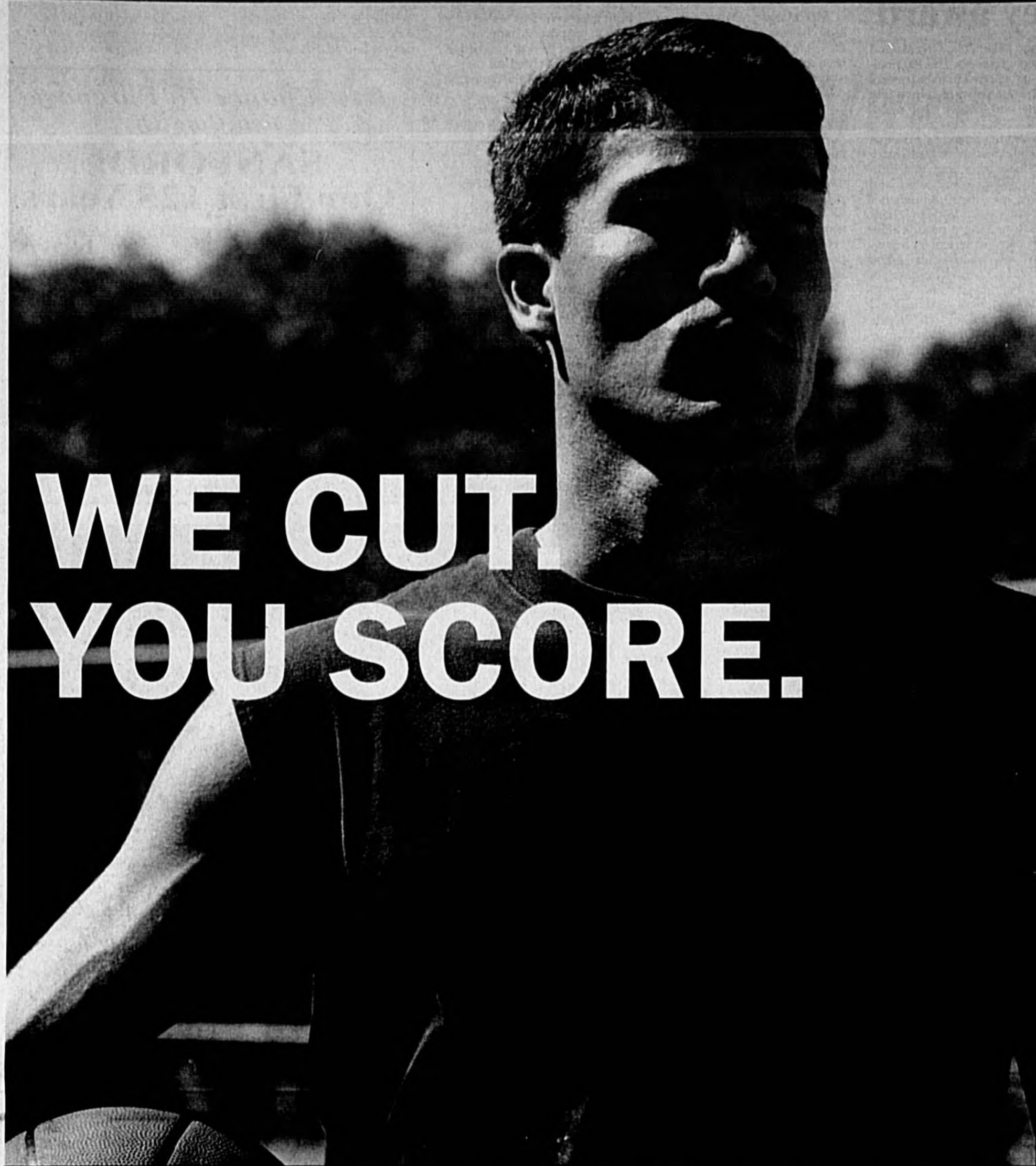

where we have been for 30 years," Weatherholt said. "A business that has been in one location for 30 years will be hurt by moving. They just have no idea of the detrimental value of us losing our location."

Coker said the adjustments will bring the market back to its intended purpose of supporting Florida's agriculture industry. The state's oldest market in Sanford has changed over the years, as it was once an out-bound destination for locally grown celery, cabbage and green beans. Coker said as area farming fields developed into subdivisions and condominiums, the focus of the market changed.

In 2002, a deal inking Sanwa Growers Inc. to a 10-year lease marked a turn in the direction of

the market. The addition of a leading produce distributor was the beginning of a new operation plan for the Sanford Farmers' Market that turned the facility in to an in-bound market. Last year, another produce distributor, T&R Produce, joined Sanwa and Coker said he is in negotiations to bring a third produce distributor to Sanford.

Coker is expected to visit Sanford Monday during a regularly planned inspection of the market building, but several tenants said they feel they have been left in the dark on the pending changes may be seeking answers from the Tallahassee official.

"I don't know if they are picking and choosing," said Larry Weyer of C&S Trucking, which is the sister company of his brother

Gary's C&S Logistics. "I don't know what they are doing. We're part of the food and agriculture industry just like everybody else."

Other tenants that are having their leases renewed have been told they will have to move operations from one trucking stall to a half of stall to make room for the possibility of a new produce distributor.

"If you walk along the dock, I want you to show me a piece of Florida produce. It's all from Guatemala and Texas," said Jennifer Conway of Enterprise Truck Brokers. "Why do we have to go (from one stall to a half)? Why is there money better than ours?"

Tom Cople, office manger for Enterprise added, "The thing

about this is the businesses that are here were the ones that helped get the farmers' market going."

Zeus Truck Brokers is also expecting to lose a stall. Alan Ponder, a broker for Zeus, said it would be the second change for the company that had to move its offices when T&R produce located at the

market in last year.

"They are the same as we are," he said. "They don't grow it, they just ship it out."

More upsetting to some of the trucking companies is a perceived reluctance from the state to support their industry. The Sanford Farmers' Market scales were shut down last year,

but the state built the new Farmers' Market pavilion at the front of the facility that is currently not being used.

"That big pavilion is not bringing anything into this industry," said Angela Weatherholt of VPS Inc. "It's a water fountain for the kids to get a cold drink of water."

Coker said the community needs to be patient as the state works to increase interest in the open-air market pavilion that has been closed for several months. Originally, opened every Friday, Coker said he was "skeptical" at the beginning if the date was right for Sanford and due to its poor performance it was shut down temporarily. He said the open-air market is planning a reopening for as early as next month on every Saturday.

Florida's official safety belt use rate is 72.6 percent. The national safety belt usage rate is 79 percent.

The reasons for focusing on safety belts is simple Ketting said. Getting people buckled up is one of the most effective ways to save lives on Florida's roadways. That's because safety belts are the best protection in a car crash. Yet, many people still refuse to buckle up.

• More than one-quarter of Floridians fail to wear their safety belt.

• Those who do not buckle up account for 60 percent of the vehicle occupants killed on our roadways.

• Safety belts are effective in reducing the frequency and severity of injuries in crashes, with effective rates ranging from 45 percent (passenger cars) to 65 percent (light trucks).

Last year the Seminole County CTST was named the Community Traffic Safety Team of the Year based on its efforts in enforcing D.U.I., speeding, and safety belt laws. Seventy-six agencies participated in the competition last year.

And while many times, opponents to belt use seem to have the louder voice, touting all the reasons why they should not have to buckle up, the overwhelming majority of Florida residents agree with safety belt laws.

A recent statewide survey revealed that the vast majority of Florida's motorists have a positive opinion on the topic, even supporting enforcement for those who don't buckle up.

A random statewide telephone survey was conducted as part of an effort to measure the effectiveness of the Buckle Up Florida Safety Belt Enforcement Wave. Questions ranged from opinions on safety belt usage and safety belt law enforcement to how often the respondents buckle up and where they get information on current campaigns designed to increase safety belt use.

The 601 respondents reported an overwhelmingly positive attitude toward safety belt use, with 88 percent agreeing that it is important for police to enforce safety belt laws and 97 percent stating that if they were in a crash, they would want to be buckled up.

The common excuse that

"seat belts are just as likely to hurt me as help me" did not hold true with respondents, as about 60 percent disagreed with that statement.

With the May Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement wave around the corner, it is good to know that most people are supportive of the effort, said Al Roop, Buckle Up Florida program director.

"We were pleased to see this extent of positive opinions about safety belt use," he said. "Seeing that 97 percent of people would rather be buckled up in a crash than unbuckled reinforces that we are on the right track with our campaigns. We still have some work to do, though, since currently only 75 percent of Florida's motorists are buckling up."

Buckle Up Florida joins with law enforcement four times a year in periods of strict enforcement of Florida's safety belt laws. These periods of enforcement, along with public awareness activities to inform citizens of the law, have helped raise Florida's official safety belt usage rate from 69.5 percent in 2001 to 72.6 percent today.

Based in a couple dozen tents near the Kuwaiti airport, the military police battalion was sometimes instructed to run area patrols, including one occasion in the first month of the deployment when they found a cache of land mines.

Voltoline said out of his five military deployments this has been the longest as it included a 90-day extension in December. A reservist since the 1970s, he previously served in Grenada, Egypt, the first Gulf War and Bosnia.

"It may be my last, I haven't decided yet," he said.

Originally signed on for a "two-year hitch" to pay for college tuition, Voltoline said he enjoys the service. He expects to return in June to his normal job as general manager of Consolidated Label Company in Longwood, but said there is also a possibility he could be summoned back to the Middle East.

"They better not take him again," said his wife Dena. "It's been a long year."

The family that includes Millennium Middle students Jade, 14, and Lindsey, 13, and Bentley Elementary student Samantha, 12, made by without their husband and father thanks to technology.

"It's amazing the e-mail capability," Voltoline said, who often would use the computer to communicate and see his family via a Web camera.

"I would lose my mind if we didn't have e-mail," Dena said.

Voltoline's trip home was an arduous journey that included stops in Romania, Iceland, Bangor, Maine, Indianapolis, and then a final destination in Georgia.

"We were greeted at every stop on the way so that was nice," he said.

Voltoline said although he's glad to be home, his thoughts

still are with those in Iraq. Two out of three units from the reservist battalion he serves in remain in the Middle East.

"It was hard for us to come out of home and have them reassigned to somebody else, but that's how the Army works."



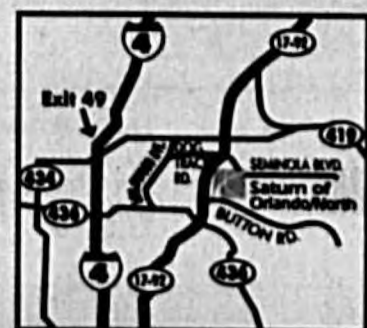

Since the bodies of Iona, 9, Ian, 6, and Ivey, 5, were found stuffed between two mattresses at a Longwood home last week, citizens have joined to support their father Greg Williams.

A memorial to the three children that were fed prescription pills by their mother Andrea Williams on Mother's Day continually grows at the Georgia Avenue home. The three children were laid to rest Tuesday after a memorial service at First Baptist Church of Longwood.

Bundy said at the Monday evening meeting of the City Commission that the five commissioners were donating funds to pay for the cemetery plots for the three children.

Bundy is a family friend of the Williams and served on a board for the Choices in Learning School the children attended.

The Longwood Police Department was also pitching in for the family and neighborhood. Chief Tommy Jackson said grief counselors were called in last week to City Hall as neighbors and the family were helped to deal with the tragedy.

Bundy also said the Longwood Police Explorers were donating \$1,600 they had raised to stop a loan on the home from defaulting.

"At this time Mr. Williams will at least have one less thing to worry about," he said.

"The outpouring from this community makes me proud to be a citizen of this community," he added.

Legislature funds local road projects

SANFORD — While Seminole County and other Florida counties took several lumps with costly state legislative decisions, funding for three major transportation projects will be making their way to Sanford.

State leaders approved more than \$7 million in appropriations for Seminole County road projects by the end of the legislative session May 1, but also

passed several initiatives that could cost the county more than \$2.6 million annually.

"Overall, I would say given the climate in Tallahassee with this session — budgetary constraints and in-fighting — I was very happy we escaped

with what we got because there was a point in time where it didn't look like we were going to come out that well," said Bobby Brantley, state legislative lobbyist for Seminole County.

Despite the negative finan-

cial impacts, county commissioners were pleased with the overall outcome of the legislative session.

"As bad as things looked a month ago, they ended up not being that bad," said County Commissioner Randy Morris.

Road projects scheduled to receive state funding — if approved by the governor — include: widening State Road 46 to four lanes from U.S. Highway 17-92 to State Road 415; widening State Road 415 to four lanes from State Road 46 to the Volusia County line and constructing a new bridge over the St. Johns River; and a new Interstate 4 interchange at State Road 46.

"As far as the transportation

Seeing is Believing

Goggles donated to sheriff's office simulate alcohol, drug impairment

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has new equipment that will have people taking a closer look at the dangers of drunken driving and promote safety in the community.

Fatal Vision Simulator Goggles are designed to simulate impairment caused by alcohol and other drugs. They look like your average chemistry lab goggles, but the lenses contain prisms which bend the light and distort what the eyes see.

The vision-distorting goggles, which come in six different strengths, simulate both daylight and nighttime conditions at levels ranging from low impairment, which is a blood alcohol content level of .06 or below, to high impairment, which is a blood alcohol content of .17 to .20.

The goggles were donated by Wayne Densch Inc., an Anheuser-Busch wholesaler based in Sanford. David Spindler, director of marketing, said two primary goals for the company are to prevent drunken driving and underage drinking.

"We're committing resources and efforts in that direction," Spindler said.

Wayne Densch is "very involved in the community," he said, adding that the company works with local businesses and organizations to promote alcohol awareness. During the holidays, the company locally sponsors the "Tow to Go" program, which offers adults who choose to drink a free ride home and also tows their car for free. Spindler said Wayne Densch also sponsors the We ID program, offering local retailers training in checking for valid identification.

Kyle Repp, a reserve officer and Longwood resident, has returned from serving his country in Iraq and now is focusing his attention on serving his community.

He had fairly consistent Internet access to communicate with his wife and Mowbray from Iraq, but without Repp the business was not bringing in enough money to cover a third of the bills to keep the business running, Repp said.

"It was a difficult time for me psychologically, being over there worrying about day-to-day dangers and watching my business go down the tubes,"
