Lending One's Name

We are used to the sort of advertising which uses the names of prominent persons who endorse a particular brand of soap or cigarettes. This device is used by advertisers to convince buyers that people of importance use their product. It is also used by both of our major political parties and by the Communists.

Several prominent actors and writers have testified before the House Un-American Activities Committee that they lent their names to Communist front organizations and causes, but they maintain that they did not know that their action had political significance. They claim that they were unaware that the high-sounding names for the petitiona they signed were in reality inspired by Communist Party directives.

An avowed Communist at least is convinced that he is right. The person who allows his name to be used to endorse a cause which he has not investigated is guilty of deceiving those who place value on his opinion.

Accepting or rejecting anything on the basis of another's opinion is risky business at best. The discomfiture of these witnesses before the House Committee should serve as a warning that a man's name signed as an endorsement does not necessarily mean that he knows what he is doing.

Simpler Perjury

One of the recommendations of the Kefauver Committee is so sensible and elemental that it is amazing that it needs to be made. The Committee proposes that the law against perjury be amended so that a witness making directly contradictory statements under oath could be charged with perjury on that sinmple fact, without the necessity of proving which of the two statements was false. Under present law the crime is defined simply as the making of a false statement under oath. It may be obvious from contradictory answers that a witness has lied, but the law is mocked if the witness must be allowed to get away with his purjury because it cannot be discovered which answer

Perjury is one of the more vicious of the crimes which may be perpetrated against a democratic government. The changing lights and shadows American court system, with its basis of presumption of innocence and guarantee of jury trial, is one of the fairest ever devised. This system is attacked and weakened every time a witness lies under oath. The damage to persons and to justice which can be caused by one lie is incalculable We should take every possible measure to assure the truth of court and grand jury testimony, and to detect and dis credit the lie.


