U.N. Should Support New Deal For 3rd World

NEW YORK — (LENS) — Even after it had opened, the special session of the United Nations assembly was still being referred to as "the energy session" in some quarters.

The initial confusion of the special session was understandable, but it must now be firmly disposed of. What happened back in January was that France proposed a UN energy conference as a counterblast to President Nixon's call for talks in Washington about the oil crisis.

The French move dismayed the Arabs, who foresaw that this conference would give other third-world countries a platform from which to upbraid the oil producers for striking a deadly blow at their struggling economies.

Twelve days after the French letter had reached the UN Secretary-General, he received another, from President Boumediene of Algeria, who proposed that France's idea of an energy conference should be broadened into a debate about all raw materials. It was the Algerian move that produced this session.

The Algerians and other enthusiasts have, however, found it difficult to get a third world lined up behind their demand for a sweeping "new deal" in trade in primary products between rich and poor countries.

Baroness Recalls Revolution

BOSTON — When the Bicentennial is celebrated in 1976, one stalwart figure of the Revolution deserving of remembrance is the Baroness, the comely wife of an enemy general.

She is the Baroness von Riedesel whose husband, a Hessian general, fought with the British in Concord, Saratoga, and Saratoga, and surrendered with his wife and three young daughters at Saratoga Oct. 17, 1777.

The surrender came after several days and nights that the Baroness had spent in the cellar of a house under cannon fire with dying and wounded English officers whom she nursed and fed while still caring for her own brood and worrying for her husband in battle nearby.

Casselberry 'Eases' Swimming Pool Rules

CASSELBERRY— Council has voted to permit construction of aboveground and vinyl-lined pools on condition the pool owner has a minimum homeowners insurance of \$100,000 and signs an indemnity to hold the city harmless in case of accident.

H.A. Scott To Run In Longwood

LONGWOOD—H. A. (Bud) Scott, a local businessman, has qualified as a candidate for city council in the June 11 special election.

E.E. Williamson vacated the council seat he held for 18 years on April 20 due to poor health. He re-entered Winter Park Memorial Hospital Friday and is listed in "very serious" condition, according to family spokesmen.

Before being hospitalized, Williamson endorsed long-time family friend Scott's candidacy by signing Scott's qualifying petition.

Scott entered city politics in 1948 and served a total of five terms (10 years). City law requires qualifying candidates to file petitions by 10 registered voters. Candidates are also required to be property owners a record for one year prior to running for office.

Qualifying deadline is May 10 when voter registration books will also close.

No other prospective candidates have picked up the necessary papers, according to City Clerk Onnie R. Shomate. Also on the ballot will be a proposed city charter amendment and three straw questions, including whether the city should proceed with a planned \$3.27 million sewer system; whether the city should spend money on the historic district; and Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages. City Atty. Joe Davis said today. The charter amendment providing a method of recalling elected officials from office, under the state home rule law will be binding, Davis said.

State law permits voters to put a charter amendment to a vote by submitting a petition signed by 10 per cent of the registered voters.

EPA Still Withholding Sewer Grant

LONGWOOD—The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) still has not released the promised federal grants of \$5.32 million for the city's proposed 7.5 million gallon daily capacity regional sewer plant and interceptor system, Mayor Norman Floyd said today.

Floyd said \$3.4 million of the grant was to pay for 75 per cent of the sewer plant expansion from its current 1.2 million gallons daily capacity and \$1,917,000 is for the planned interceptors on Montgomery Road to the plant.

Also held up in the EPA Washington office is an \$813,000 federal grant for a Longwood interceptor to connect with the Altamonte Montgomery Road line.

The interceptor grants may be increased with rising prices, Floyd said, while the sewer plant grant is for the fixed amount. Most of the balance in construction costs in Altamonte Springs is to be financed through federal loans.

Under construction currently are sewer lines in the northern section of Altamonte Springs.

W. Springs Mulls Zone Changes

WINTER SPRINGS—A new zoning classification of Residential County Estate (RCE) has been requested by Walter Parkhurst of Tradewinds Road spokesman for North Orlando Ranchlands residents.

The request to amend the zoning ordinance was made during a public hearing on upgrading zoning in sections of The Ranchlands from R1-AA (Residential one family dwelling) to R1-AAA (single family on half-acre lot).

Parkhurst said 91 per cent of the Ranchlands property owners signed a petition for RCE in order to keep it an area for "people who want country type area without responsibility of farm upkeep."

It was discovered that under the recent codification of city ordinances no minimum standard was established for R1-AAA zoning, so council voted to continue the hearing until June 24.

The Planning and Zoning Board was instructed to provide City Council with its recommendation in reference to the amendment on RCE zoning as soon as possible. Sample RCE ordinances were submitted for consideration by Parkhurst and Councilman Irene Van Espel.

The proposed ordinances call for lots of not less than an acre and a minimum of 43,560 sq. ft. minimum home site. Present homes and property not meeting requirements of the RCE would be "grandfathered" in.

Longwood CofC Plans Sewer Talk

LONGWOOD—The Longwood Area Chamber of Commerce board of directors will meet at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at the Hattaway Realty office on SR 434 to make final plans for the sewer system forum to be held just prior to the city's June 11 special election.

Rod Cable, president, said the forum, to be held probably at Lyman High School, will go into the proposed \$3.27 million citywide sewer system in detail to educate the people before they vote on a straw ballot question concerning the system.

Cable said panelists at the forum will include city officials, consulting engineer William Palm and a representative of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Exhaust Ban Draws House Foes

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Environmental Protection Agency has joined forces with liberal Democrats in the House to fight a proposed amendment that would take exhaust controls off roughly two-thirds of the nation's automobiles.

The measure by Rep. Louis C. Wyman, a conservative New Hampshire Republican, has gained support since it first was introduced last December. Opponents privately concede that it has a chance of passing if Wyman goes through with his plans to offer it as an amendment to environmental legislation scheduled for floor action this week.

Wyman's amendment would suspend all emission control requirements for automobiles registered to persons living in parts of the country with no significant air pollution problem.

According to Wyman, only cars in 13 metropolitan areas—approximately one-third of the total number of registered vehicles—still would require controls.

He claims that removal of controls from cars in the rest of the country—approximately 95 per cent of the geographical area of the United States—would save billions of gallons of gasoline a year and at the same time spare motorists the expense of purchasing vehicles equipped with costly antipollution devices.

The EPA, working with Rep. Paul G. Rogers, D-La., chairman of the health and environment subcommittee, says Wyman's amendment would be a disaster, emasculating the Clean Air Act while achieving little fuel savings.

At a recent hearing of the House Commerce Committee, EPA Administrator Russell E. Train said removal of control devices would result in only a 3 per cent saving of gasoline and that the air in 65 cities with 85 per cent of the population would become unhealthy.

When Wyman first offered his proposal as an amendment to the emergency energy bill later vetoed by President Nixon, it was defeated by a 210-186 margin.
