## Boy Saves Family As Home Burns

A 16-year-old, long-haired blond youth was credited by W. A. Vinton, county deputy, with saving the lives of the boy's mother, two younger brothers and a sister after an early morning fire gutted their Rolling Hills home at 15 Roberts Street.

Vinton said Donald E. Christianson Jr. at 3 a.m. today, awoke to find his home in flames.

The deputy reported the boy leaped out of his back bedroom window, ran around to the front of the house and knocked on the door to awaken his mother, Eddie, 31, and Glenn, 8, his two brothers, and Cathy, a 12-year-old sister.

The family was hustled out of the burning home by Donald, who received back burns in the process.

The youth's father, a paint salesman, was at Jacksonville at the time of the blaze that destroyed completely the \$12,000 dwelling and estimated \$3,000 in furniture.

Vinton said Altamonte and Longwood Fire Departments were on the scene and combated the flames that quickly swept the frame structure.

Cause of the blaze is believed to be the lighting of a supply of paint kept stored on the porch, Vinton said.

"He did a good job" is the way the deputy summed up the youth's actions in getting his family out of the burning structure.

Vinton said he felt young Donald should receive some form of commendation for his efforts in his official county report.

## 'Greater Things In Store For Area' Rathel Quits SIC Agency

Don Rathel, director of the Sanford Industrial Commission, yesterday informed members of the industry-seeking and airport operation commission that he would not renew his contract for his services with the city after Jan. 15.

Rathel read aloud written resignation to SIC members at the close of the regularly scheduled meeting but would not disclose his plans, except to say he and his wife would continue to live in Sanford.

"I feel that the project for which I was retained has been fulfilled, and that the industrial program for Sanford is well underway and its industrial future well established," he stated.

Rathel said the airport was now a solvent operation and the future progress of this facility will be realized with proper management. "The 20 new industrial commission-generated industries in Sanford is indication enough that Sanford is on the move and greater things are in store for this area."

The director listed the establishment of an airport authority for the operation of the Sanford Airport and the county-wide formation of a professionally operated industrial board as two recommendations he would like to make. "Every effort should be made to upgrade the Sanford board," he stated.

As a parting remark, Rathel stated, "The cooperation of all agencies is necessary because you cannot win the big outside battles when you continually have backyard brawl!"

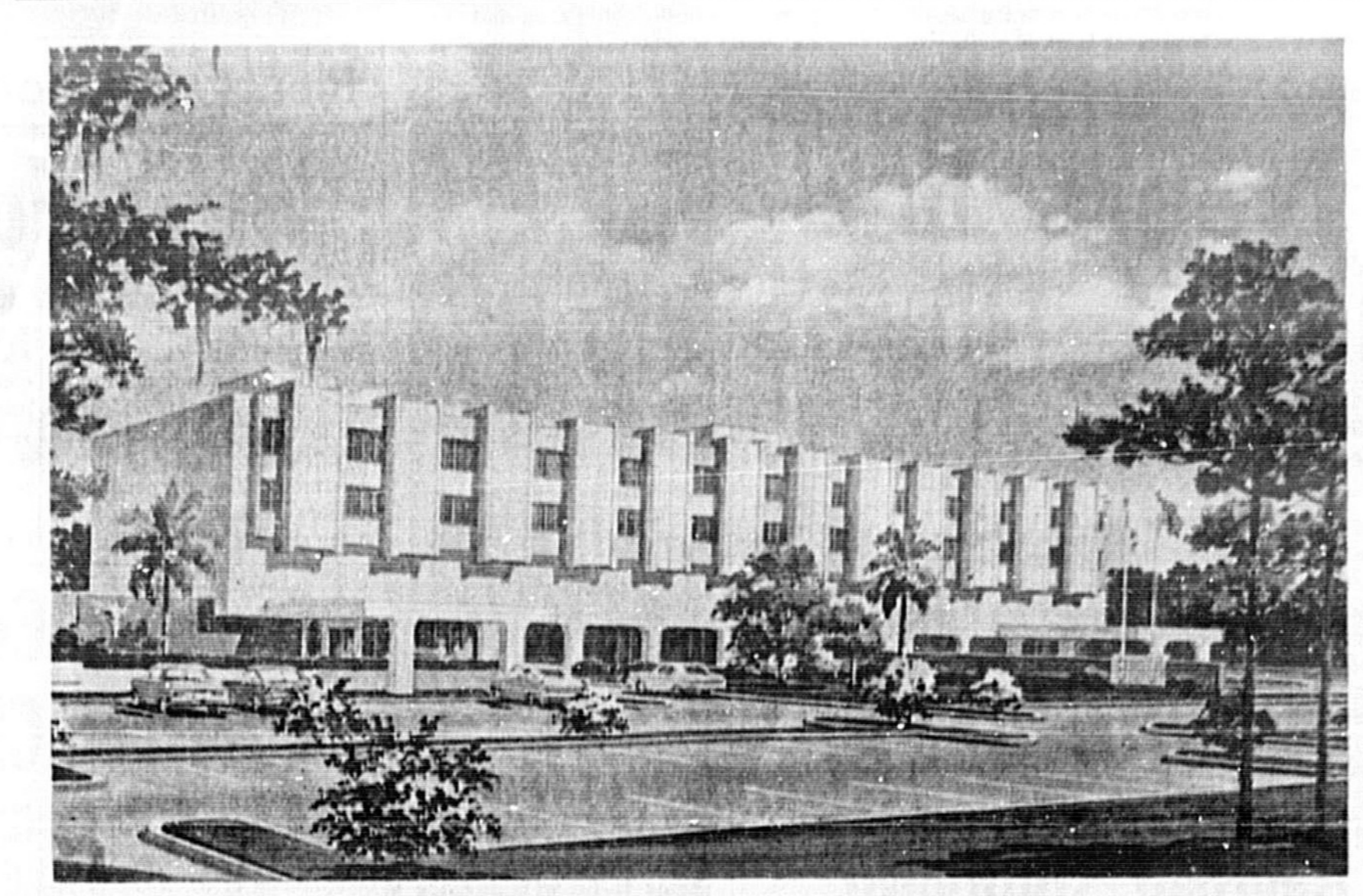
SIC members generally praised the work of the director and the W. Vincent Rathel, also a city commission member, said, "All of us regret that Don has arrived at this decision but understand why."

John Fitzpatrick, SIC member, said he credited Rathel with 90 per cent of the good job done by the SIC.

On another matter, Fitzpatrick, an auditor for the city, said use of city charter requirements, it would be necessary for all basic accounts of the SIC to bear City Commission signature.

W. C. Hurlburt, city attorney, stated either the mayor or any commissioner could sign the accounts.

## Spectacular Plan Unfolded

Spectacular plans for a magnificent new Florida Sanitarium and Hospital were unfolded this morning by Donald W. Welch, Administrator of the facility. The impressive edifice will be located on Highway 430, one mile east of I-4 in South Seminole County, on a 20 acre plot.

Welch gave three criteria which were taken into consideration by trustees and administrators of the hospital, needs, location, and plans. Welch stated that Orange and Seminole Counties were ascertained to be the most rapidly growing areas within the state, percentage wise in the next ten years, and that it is projected that these counties will grow faster than the metropolitan cities of Atlanta, Ga. and Phoenix, Ariz.

Welch illustrated his point with demographic statistics and a population density chart. Welch elaborated that there was not a single month that patients were not turned away at the Florida Sanitarium and Hospital. The new hospital will be a satellite similar to the main facility. Similar operations were studied in Raleigh, N.C., Greenville, S.C., Columbus, Ohio, and Houston, Texas. Welch feels that this satellite operation will be in the best interests of the community and provide the type of services needed.

Memberships dues are coming into the office of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce office in a steady flow that has been pleasing to John Krider, executive manager. He expressed the belief that even though present that actual sum received is \$600 under that in hand by the same date last year, the flow of funds will pick up.

Krider expressed glowing optimism for the area in the years immediately ahead. He added that effective work by the C of C would be determined to no small extent by the funds supplied them.

# Enemy Strength Misjudged

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. intelligence misjudged enemy strength in South Vietnam last year by at least 60,000 men.

This conclusion is inescapable after comparing a new official estimate with an earlier calculation of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong manpower for the fall of 1968.

The Pentagon said Wednesday night "revised" best estimates of enemy strength in South Vietnam during the fall of 1968 were at least 290,000.

Checking back a random estimate in early September estimated enemy manpower in South Vietnam as of Oct. 1, 1968 ranged between 237,000 and 250,000.

There was no immediate official explanation for the wide variance in the estimates. But it tends to underscore Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird's reluctance to deal publicly in numbers.

It also casts doubt on the Pentagon's new "best estimate" that there were at least 240,000 of the enemy in South Vietnam this fall.

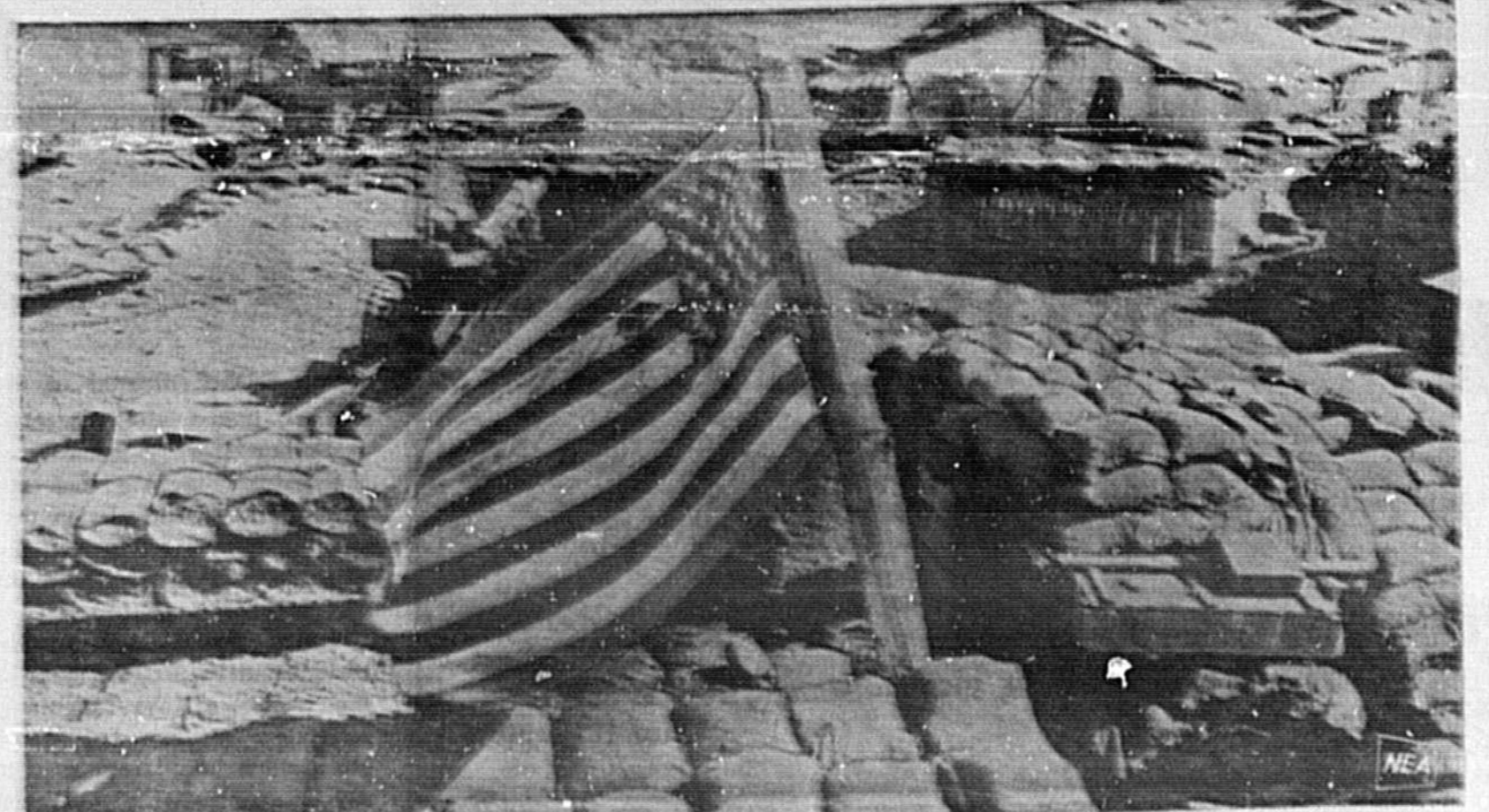
The Pentagon put out the new figures for autumn 1968 and autumn 1969 after Laird, under questioning by newsmen said "I would estimate that the range of enemy presence in Vietnam is in the neighborhood of at least 40,000 below last year."

In trying to avoid citing specific figures, Laird said "it's not an easy task" to estimate enemy troop strength.

He has preferred to talk in generalities about North Vietnamese infiltration of the South, saying there has been an increase within the past few weeks.

However, his apparent lack of confidence in figures raises questions about the validity of claims that infiltration has grown up or down in any given month.

Estimates of the extent of the enemy's presence in South Vietnam are made in large part following questioning of enemy prisoners, identification of enemy units in the battle area and analysis of captured documents as well as from such sources as agents.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dr. Edward T. Teller, chief of a panel which recommended an end to the flying saucer hunt, says "there's no reason why the government should spend a lot of money checking up on lights in the sky."

The Air Force said it had no specific recommendation, but the viewer could pass on his information to a scientist, check signals with the local air base, or call the police department.

However, Ryan emphasized the panel's January report, "also said that if any scientific came up with clearly defined, specific proof for study, and he was professionally qualified, "he should be supported."

# Supreme Court Halts Governor Club Probe

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Complaining of a "waste of judicial time," the State Supreme Court today ordered the House Elections Committee to halt completely its investigation of the Governor's Club until Gov. Claude Kirk can challenge its constitutionality.

Chairman William C. Anderson, D-Gainesville, said the committee would turn its attention immediately to political training dinners, among them Kirk's recent \$1,000-a-plate affair at Miami's Doral Country Club.

The court restrained the committee from issuing or enforcing any subpoenas as they may relate to the Governor's Club or its records pending Kirk's appeal of the investigation.

"What is the logic of pursuing the course of procedure when the whole matter was resolved Monday," acting Chief Justice Harris Drew demanded of committee counsel.

The court Monday blocked the committee from enforcing six subpoenas, but the group turned around and quickly issued a new series of them.

Committee attorney Joe Jacobs declared the court had limited its order to the six subpoenas but the justices emphatically said the stay order applied to the whole investigation.

"It seems to me," said Drew, "that both your clients and the governor would be anxious to get this matter resolved. We have innumerable reserves by setting a hearing for Jan. 4 (on Kirk's appeal)."

"It's a waste of judicial time... you have to run over here to the court every day until the appeal is resolved," said Drew. "Why should the court be engaged when all of this will be decided?"

The high court's order, which came less than 20 minutes after the hearing concluded, followed by hours a Broward County Circuit Court injunction barring officers of American National Bank and Trust Co. of Fort Lauderdale from disclosing records related to the governor's club.

# FP & L Proposed Contract Voted Down Yesterday

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—A proposed contract with the Florida Power and Light Co. was voted down 23-22 here Wednesday by leaders representing 11 locals of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and the proposal now goes to the workers themselves for a vote.

John H. Miles, chief negotiator for the IBEW, predicted earlier the two-year contract would not meet with the full approval of the council.

But Miles would not predict what action the 2,100 striking field workers would take Friday.

"If they vote in favor, they have a contract," he said. "If not, it's back to the bargaining table."

The new \$4.8 million contract proposal missed approval by only one vote. Passage would have ended the strike which goes into its 58th day today.

Voting by the members is expected to be completed by midnight Friday.

# 'Trying To Get A Message To The People'

TARPON SPRINGS, Fla. (AP)—Worried parishioners of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church are offering prayers of supplication to a painting of St. Nicholas they say has been weeping steadily for four days.

The icon, enclosed in a glass case in the foyer of the church, is getting a message to the people, Father Elias Kalarotis believes. "But we don't know whether it's good or bad."

Father Kalarotis, pastor of the church, said a cleaning woman Friday first noticed the painting weeping on Dec. 4. The tears, shining drops of water that slide down the inside of the glass, have been visible at all times since Sunday, he said.

The church was built in 1907 by Greek sponge divers who came to the area to carry on their arduous trade in the Gulf of Mexico. The priest said the icon was about 35 years old and measures about two-by-three feet.

"We checked to see if condensation could have gotten inside the frame," he said, "but it's still sealed tight. We don't know what is causing it."

The women of this seafaring town say they are worried.

Surrounded by sponges, shells and other harvests of the sea in a gift shop near the sponge dock, Margaret Tallichis said, "I just don't know what it means. It happened on the island of Rhodes when it was a little girl and a statue of the Virgin started to cry. Then, a little boy who couldn't walk or talk started to walk and talk again."

Mrs. Tallichis, who said she came to the United States in 1912, looked worried and added, "Other times, real, real bad things have happened when a painting started to cry."

Father Kalarotis said the church had recently demolished buildings it purchased as a site for a new educational complex.

# Florida Judge Eyed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A Republican appellate judge from Tallahassee, Harold H. Carwell, may be President Nixon's next nominee to fill a vacancy on the U.S. Supreme Court, a veteran editor says.

"There is just enough speculative wind stirring to lift hopes," said Malcolm Johnson, editor of the Tallahassee Democrat, in column Wednesday.

Carwell, 49, was a U.S. District Court judge for North Florida until seven months ago when the President elevated him to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals at New Orleans.

A judge for nearly 12 years, Carwell was appointed to the district court by President Eisenhower. Before he was a U.S. district attorney.

"The judge, obviously happy with his present position, won't even discuss the possibility of his nomination to the Supreme Court," said Johnson, a long-time observer of Florida's capital.

"That doesn't keep his friends from appraising his chances," Johnson added.

Johnson noted the Atlanta Constitution last week published an article which said "one well-known Republican said the present front-runner" is Carwell.

"The editor described Carwell as moderate-to-conservative in his view of the law, and in a solid position with most Southern senators regarding the importance shown on the surface of Carwell's record. A coalition of civil rights groups objected to his confirmation as a U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals judge last year. The Senate considered it, and apparently found no merit in the protest," said Johnson.

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP)—Gov. Claude Kirk says he has launched a nationwide search for a man to succeed Michael O'Neil as state transportation secretary.

Kirk, in Fort Lauderdale for a dinner in his honor, said Wednesday night he had not reached a decision on his new appointee and indicated it would be some time yet before he made his choice.

O'Neil's appointment was rejected by the State Senate last week after a bitter floor debate. He had been in office since July.

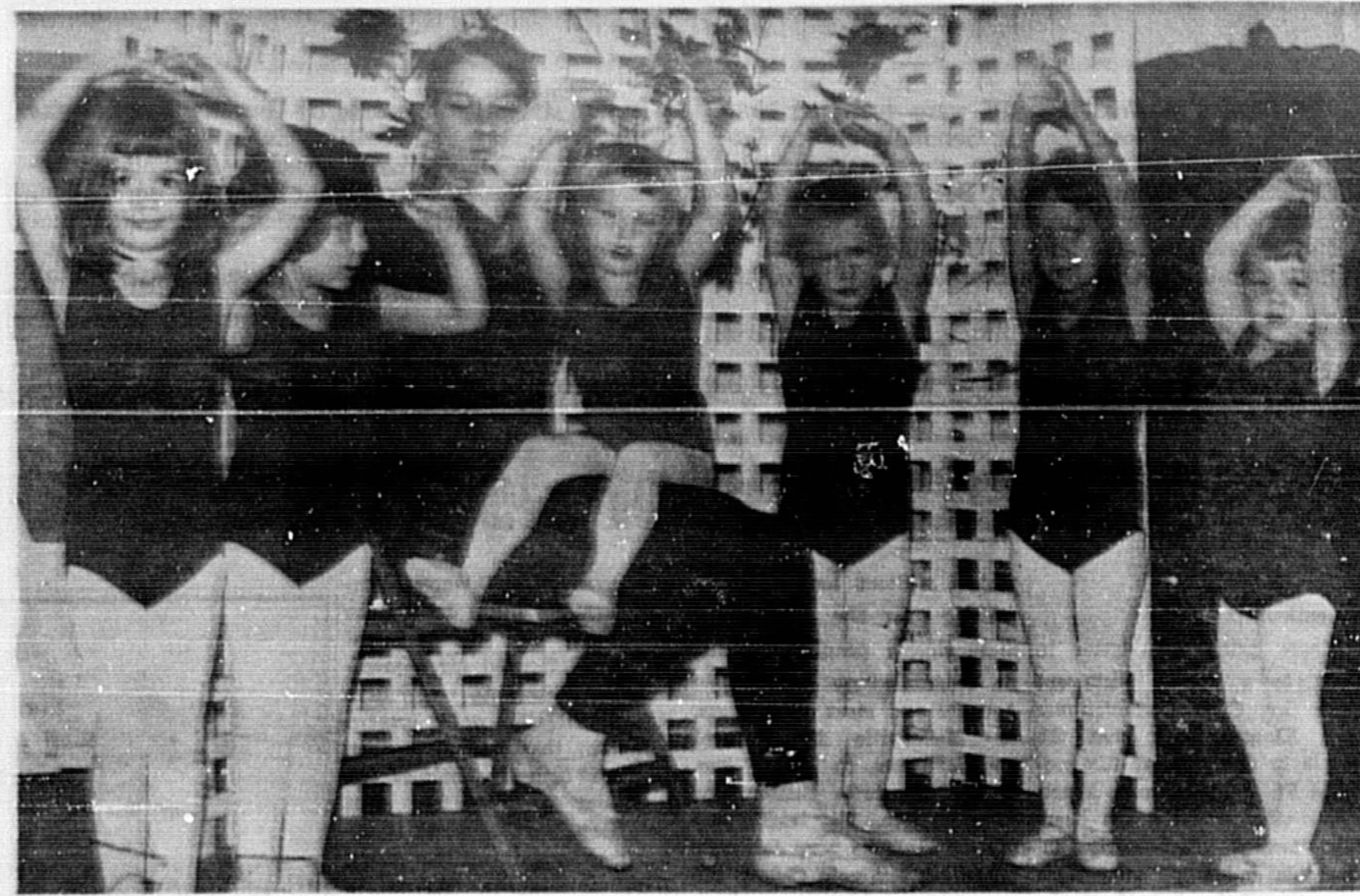

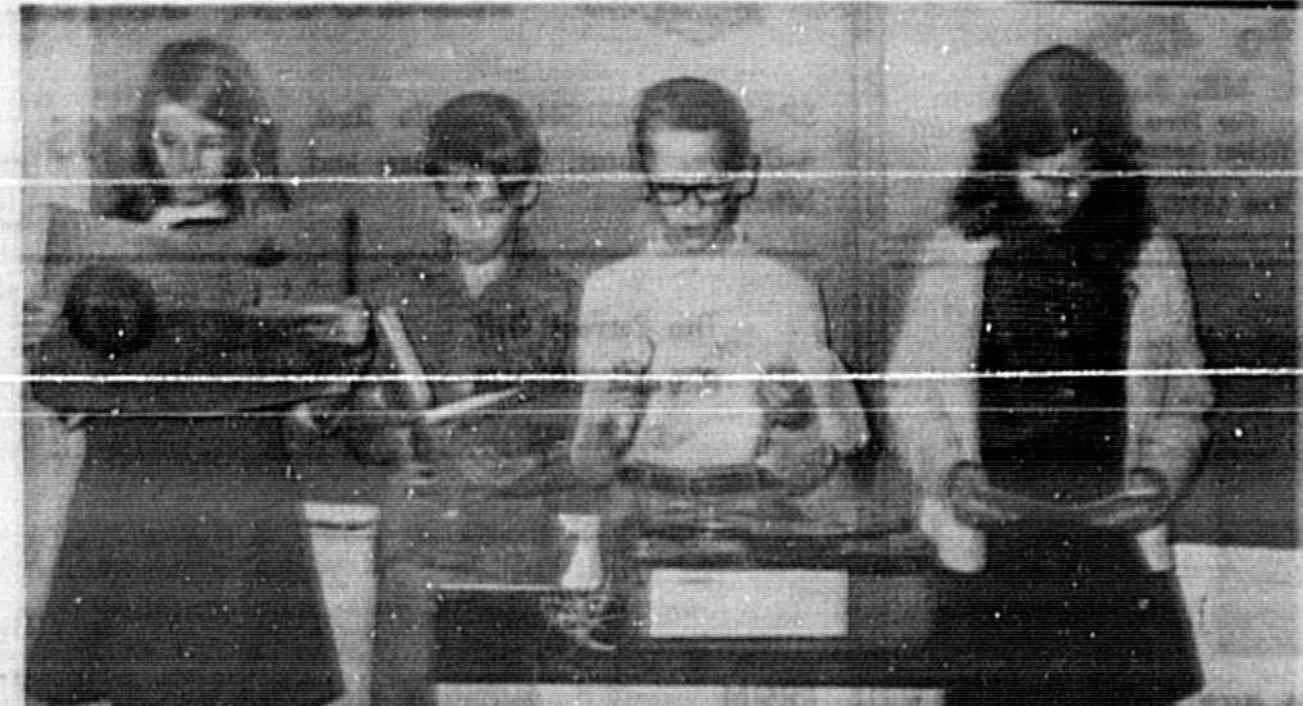

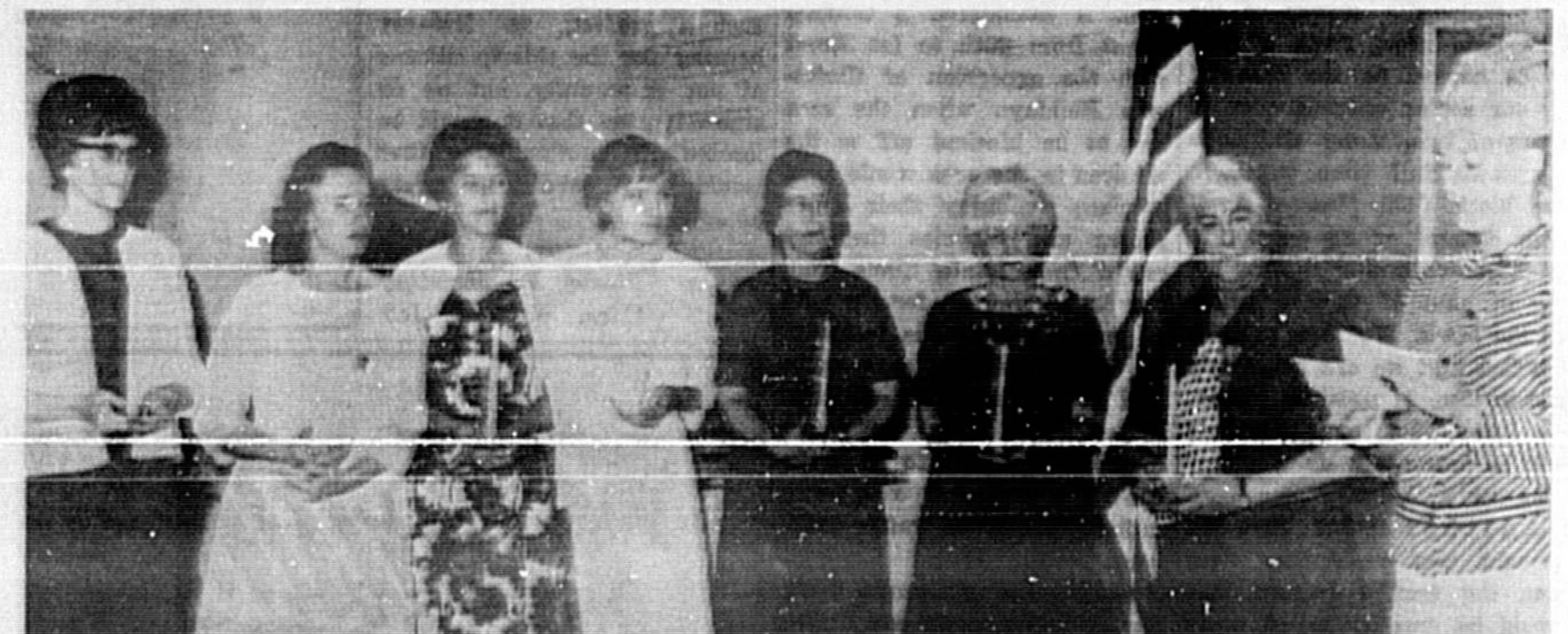

## Date Nut Bread In Tin Cans

By CECILY BROWNSTONE, Associated Press Food Editor

Here's a delicious Date-Nut Bread baked in soup cans. It makes six small rolls—some to keep, some to give as gifts. This recipe was tested in a friend's kitchen and in my own. My friend's teen-age son, who belongs to a church youth group, has extracted a promise from his mother to bake those date-nut rolls for his group's Cake Sale. The rolls cost about 25 cents apiece and can be sold for 50 cents—a good profit!

Be sure to taste these rolls as soon as they have cooled, because then they have a deliciously soft texture. They're still delicious after storing but the texture becomes firmer than when they are fresh from the oven. You can store this Date-Nut Bread in a tightly covered tin box for about a week. For longer storage—a month or so—wrap the bread appropriately and store in the freezer.

### DATE-NUT BREAD

- 1 1/4 cups cut-up fresh dates
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1/4 pound (1/2 stick) butter
- 1/3rd cup firmly packed light-brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups unbleached flour
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup chopped (medium-fine) walnuts

With clarified butter or solid white shortening, grease bottoms and sides of six 10 1/2-ounce empty soup cans.

Into a medium mixing bowl pour the dates. Add boiling water; set aside.

In large bowl of electric mixer, cream butter, brown sugar and salt. Thoroughly beat in eggs one at a time.

Stir baking soda and vanilla into date-water mixture.

To creamed mixture add flour (in about four additions) alternately with date-water mixture, starting after each addition just enough to moisten flour. Stir in raisins and walnuts.

Spoon batter into prepared cans, filling them two-thirds full.

Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a deep brown color—40 to 70 minutes.

Place cans on wire racks and let stand 10 minutes. Run a long thin sharp knife around inside and to bottom of cans and shake slightly; turn out on wire rack; cool completely.

Makes six small loaves.

Note: To cut the dates, use a kitchen scissors—blades floured if necessary—and snip each date into 3 strips.

A reader's request prompts us to repeat this recipe for a favorite Greek cookie.

- 1/4 pound sweet butter
- 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 1/4 cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- Whole cloves
- Confectioners' sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream the butter with 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar until almost white. Beat in the egg yolk. Sift together the flour, baking powder and ground cloves, add to butter mixture and blend to a smooth dough. On a lightly floured board, roll dough to a thickness of 1/8 to 1/4 inch. Cut into desired shapes. Insert one whole clove in the center of each cookie, and place, one inch apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake for 20 minutes, or until pale gold. Remove from oven, and while the cookies are still hot, dust generously with confectioners' sugar.

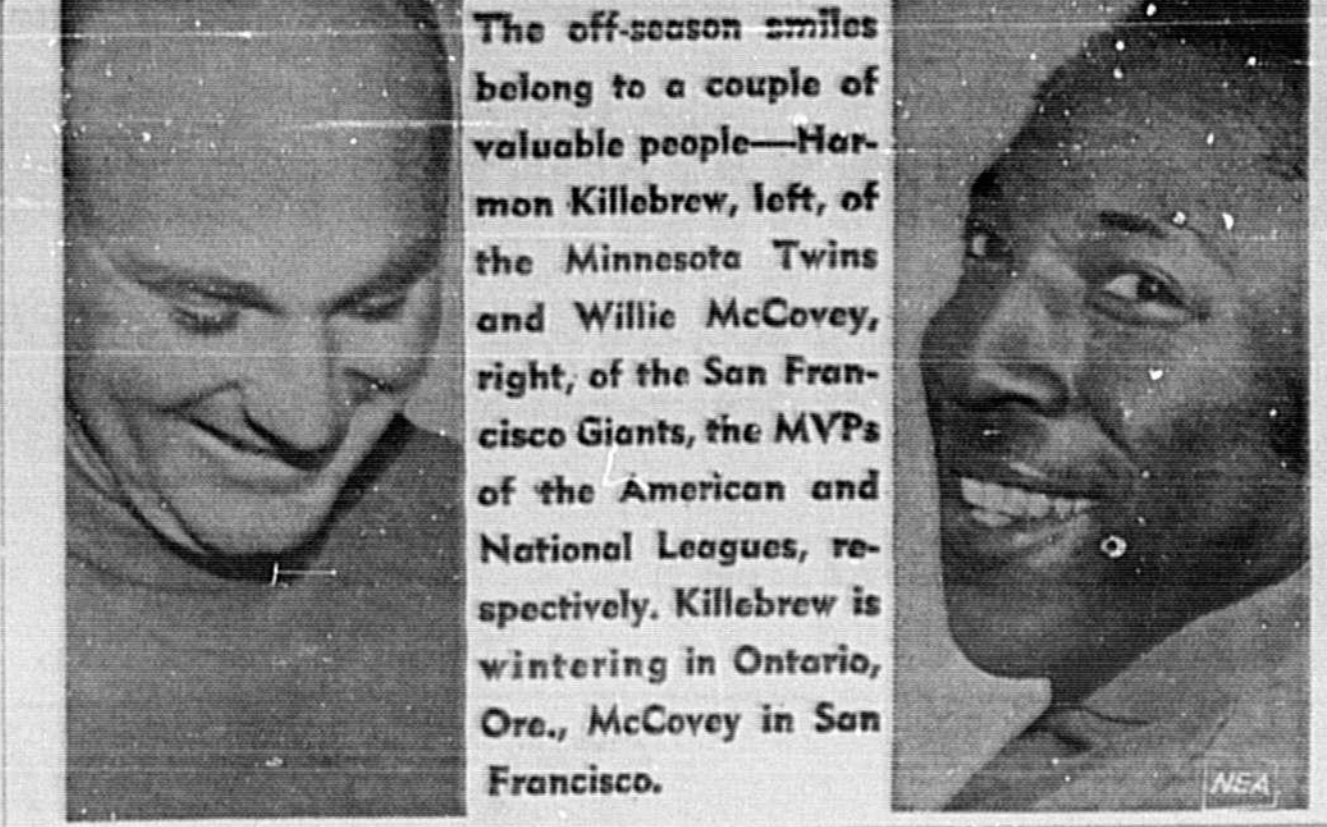
The Raiders dropped out of sight on the offensive poll, which didn't include their last outing when they scored 124 points off Lake Sumpter Junior College.

DENTON, Tex. (UPI)—The body of University of Tennessee swimming star Ed Collins, 20, was found in weeds off state highway 24 near Denton, Wednesday. Sheriff's officers said Collins had been shot three times.

Collins left Knoxville, Tenn., Tuesday morning. He told friends he would be hitchhiking to see his father in Las Vegas, Nev. He lived with his mother in Pompano Beach, Fla.

Sheriff's deputies identified him from a picture sent to them by the University of Tennessee Athletic Department. "We've got to find somebody who might have seen him on the highways between Knoxville and Denton," Gentle said. "We hope somebody will recognize him from his picture. Maybe we can get something started that way."

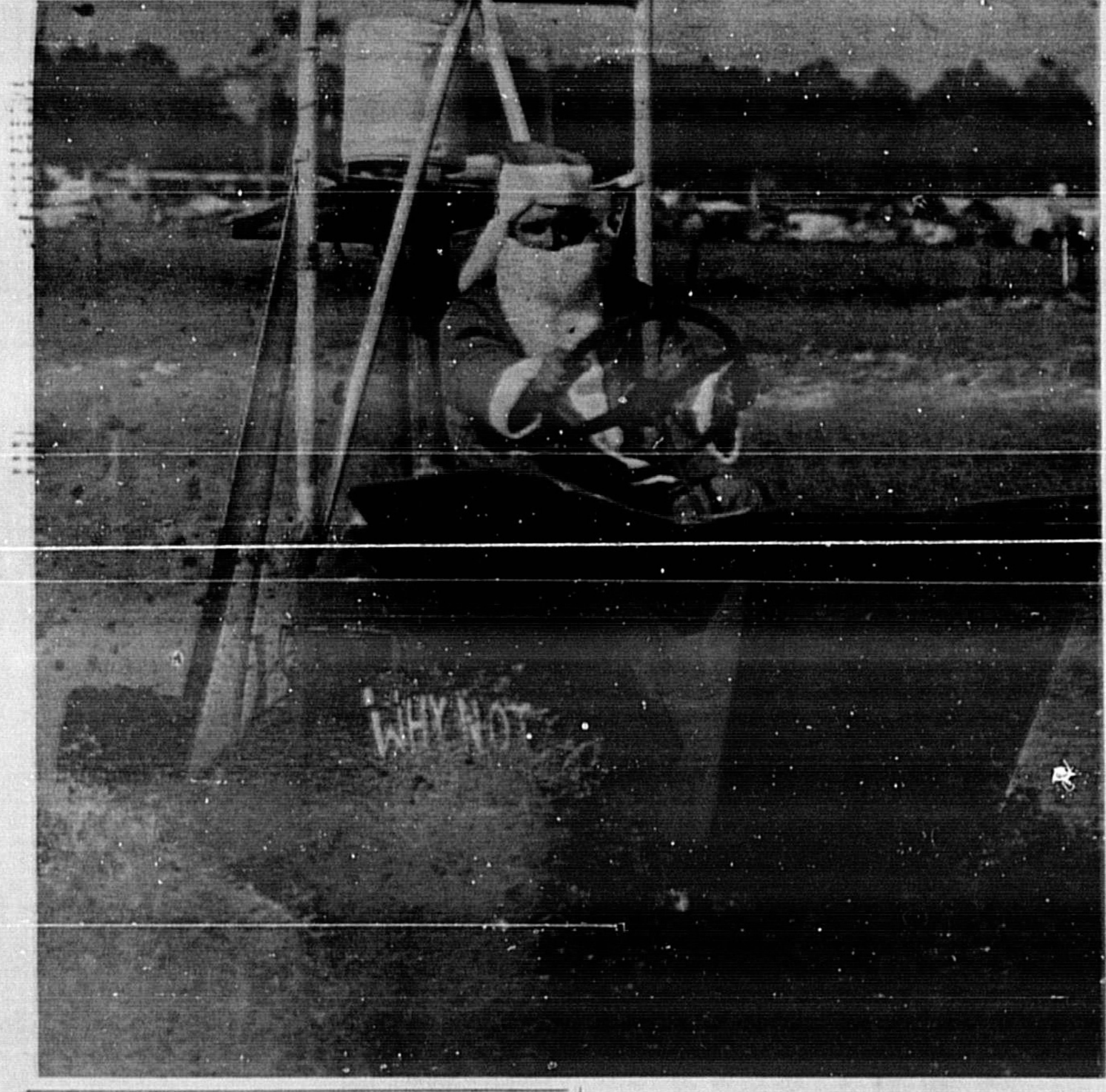

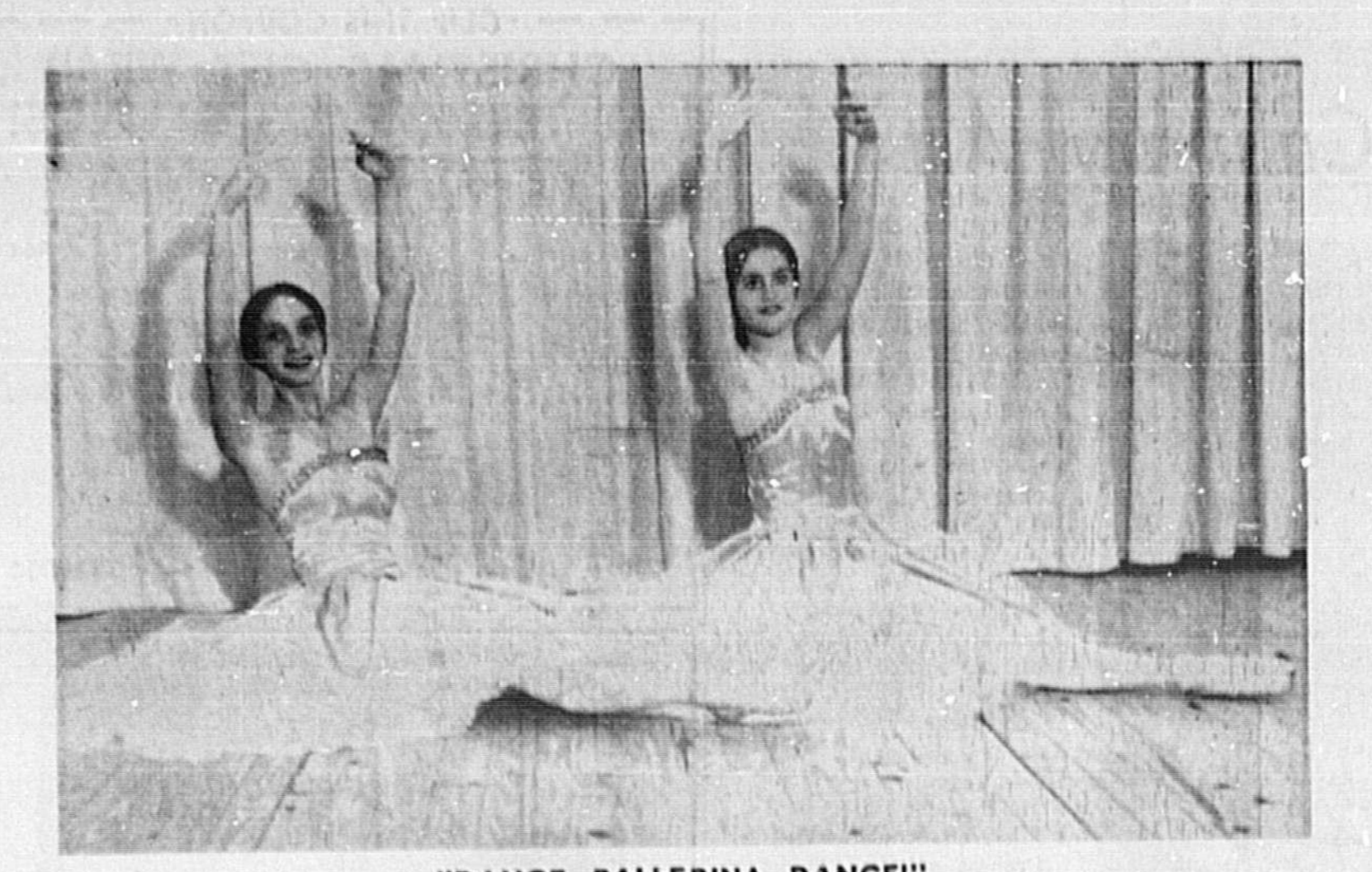
