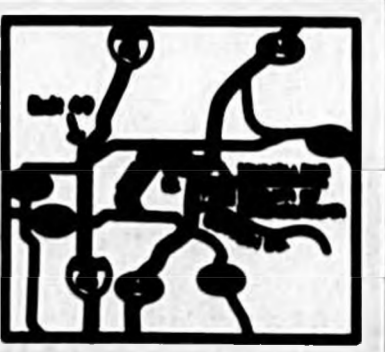

Airline shuts down at Sanford Airport

The Orlando Sanford International Airport confirmed Friday that Canadian Airline Jetgo has decided to stop commercial flights.

Jetgo began service between Orlando Sanford and the Toronto and Montreal area in October 2003. Jetgo's flights out of Fort Lauderdale, Fort Myers and St. Petersburg have also been canceled. Passengers are encouraged to make alternative arrangements for travel. While no official policies are currently in place with other Canadian airlines, Air Canada (1-888-247-2262), and WestJet (1-888-937-8538) have stated they will do their best to accommodate Jetgo passengers whose travel plans were disrupted as a result of Jetgo's cessation of service.

Other Canadian airlines offering service to Canada are Air Transat (1-877-872-6728), CanJet (1-800-809-7777) and Zoom (1-866-359-9666). All of these carriers fly out of Orlando International Airport.

New Americans stand united

SANFORD — A group of 220 immigrants from 64 different countries who currently live in the Central Florida area took their naturalization oath on Thursday, March 10.

The ceremony began with the posting of the colors by the American Legion Campbell-Lossing Post. Then, local Sanford resident, Patricia Karper, sang the "Star Spangled Banner."

Elvis Quiles, Citizen and Immigration Services adjudication officer, began the presentation of applicants by calling out each of the 64 countries.

"In a few moments you will stand as one," Quiles said.

Slowly, as each country was called, immigrants began standing, until all 220 were standing.

James Carbonneau, CIS officer in charge, led the oath of allegiance.

All 220 immigrants raised their right hand and recited the

oath of allegiance to the United States.

"I hereby declare on oath that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty of whom or which I have heretofore been a subject

or citizen; that I will support and defend the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I

Middle school rezoning plan ready for input

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board selected one of three plans for rezoning Jackson Heights and Lawton Chiles middle schools in Oviedo, and approved a field trip for a group of JROTC students to tour the U.S. Marine Base in Quantico, Va.

The School Board also honored teachers who performed well on audits, viewed a promotional video of Indian Trails Middle School, and informed district personnel that they may need to undergo further fingerprinting for state and national background checks.

Superintendent Bill Vogel recommended during the meeting that the School Board members consider public input received at a 5 p.m. work session and select Plan B among three for advertising.

A Core Committee made up of representatives from Jackson Heights Middle School, Lawton Chiles Middle School, seven elementaries, and two high schools met in January to study rezoning. The committee developed a revision of attendance zones for the two middle schools because of the relocation of the Lawton Chiles Middle School to SR 419, a

Downtown reawakens

SANFORD — Sanford's Alive After Five has awakened business in the Historic Downtown area where shop owners reported record number of customers touring their shops Thursday night during the three-hour, food-and-drink sampling affair.

Coupled with the opening of renovated First Street, Alive After Five attracted more than 400 people.

"We had about 50 more people last night than the month before, and about 60 of those folks were there to take part in a party at Willow Tree, so definitely good numbers," ADEO Media executive Shannon Sayre reported to City Manager Al Grieshaber Friday morning via e-mail.

Shop owners agree.

"It was a good night because of a lot of people got to see our stores in downtown Sanford," said Kenneth Ditzmann, who said between 60 to 80 people visited his

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Show me the money: They say money is the mother's milk of politics. It helps, but there's no guarantee that those who raise the most money will win the race, especially when it comes to local elections where plenty of grassroots legwork can overcome a big bank account.

Case in point is the District 1 commission race. **Lindsay Oyewale** raised slightly less than **Art Woodruff** and **Bernard Mitchell** combined, yet it's Woodruff and Mitchell in the runoff election on March 29. Woodruff finished in first with 40 percent of the vote, while Mitchell earned 25 percent. Oyewale was a close third at 23 percent, but close at third doesn't count when the field is narrowed to two. **Hank Dieckhaus**, who purposefully eschewed active fundraising, collected one-fifth the money Oyewale did and received nearly half of Oyewale's vote tally of 321.

"It's a city commission race. What the hell am I going to spend \$11,000 on?" Dieckhaus asked.

Of all the candidates, **Dean Ray** ran the most efficient race when you compare the money he raised to the number of votes he received. A used-appliance salesman by trade, Ray has campaigned for seven different offices since 1996. He has yet to win a campaign, but he knows a thing or two about stretching a dollar. Ray raised \$779. Divide that total by his 114 votes and Ray spent \$6.83 for each vote.

By contrast, District 1 commission candidate **Vance Taylor** spent \$2,660.35 of his own money and tallied just 15 votes. That works out to \$177.36 per vote. Most of Taylor's money was spent on mailing a campaign flyer. Perhaps he would have done better handing out C-notes to voters as they went to the polls. Then again, maybe not. Considering the hot water Orlando Mayor **Buddy Dyer** and **Ezzie "The Ballot King" Thomas** found themselves in Friday morning, Taylor made the wise — and legal — choice.

Here's the breakdown on the other candidates, from highest to lowest cost per vote.

- **Lindsay Oyewale**, District 1 race — \$34.89 per vote. She raised \$11,198 and garnered 321 votes. It appears Oyewale donated \$2,088.43 of her own money to the campaign. She also appears to have loaned the campaign \$1,000. It's difficult to analyze, however, because Oyewale's treasurer's reports were improperly filled out. City Clerk **Jan Daugherty** required the candidate to submit an amended report for the first reporting period, but it is still confusing.

- **Ron Fraser**, mayor's race — \$24.71 per vote. Fraser raised \$4,645 and received 188 votes.

- **Whitney Eckstein**, mayor's race — \$24.30 per vote. Eckstein collected \$29,450 and tallied 1,212 votes. Of the \$29,450 reported, Eckstein donated \$14,900 of his own money to the campaign. Another \$3,000 was donated by family members or family businesses.

- **Linda Kuhn**, mayor's race — \$18.41 per vote. Kuhn collected \$24,230 and tallied 1,316 votes. Of the \$24,230 reported, \$1,250 was donated by family members or family businesses.

- **Bernard Mitchell**, District 1 race — \$17.54 per vote. Mitchell raised \$6,280 and earned 358 votes.

- **Hank Dieckhaus**, District 1 race — \$16.00 per vote. Dieckhaus brought in \$2,402 and received 143 votes. Of the \$2,402 reported, \$1,600 came from family members or the family business.

- **Art Woodruff**, District 1 race — \$11.52 per vote. The incumbent raised \$6,545 and tallied 568 votes, the best vote-per-dollar ratio of all the mainstream candidates.

No home court advantage: Kuhn has been active in the **Sanford Historic Trust** for years, so you would think she would have a huge advantage in District 1 over Eckstein in the runoff election for mayor. That's not the case.

In Tuesday's election, Kuhn won District 1 with 505 votes, but Eckstein finished a close second with 459 votes. In 2001, Kuhn lost the District 1 commission race to Woodruff, so expect the March 29 runoff to be close in that district.

Kuhn easily won District 2 with 70 percent of the vote. Eckstein took Districts 3 and 4 with just over 50 percent of the vote in each. Kuhn finished in the mid-30s in those districts.

Early voting for the March 29 runoff election begins Monday, March 21. Beat the crowd, vote early!

will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform noncombatant service in the Armed Forces of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by the law; and that I take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; So help me God."

Key Note speaker Debra Nelson, a 18th circuit court judge, spoke after the ceremony.

Nelson said it was her fourth year speaking at the event and it hit home for her because she was only a second generation American. Her grandmother came to the United States from Russia at a young age.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited after Nelson spoke. Erick Espinoza of the U.S. Air Force, who was also

being naturalized during the ceremony, led it.

Closing remarks at the ceremony were given by Mirian Rethwill, president of The Pilot Club of Sanford.

Ciske Johnson of Sanford waved her flag and looked back in the audience to smile and wave at her husband, Jason, and their three children, Chase, 11, Myles, 10, and Reagan, 8.

Ciske was born in Paramaribo, a city in Suriname.

Suriname has a population 400,000 in South America between Guyana and French Guiana.

She met Jason while they were both attending college at Louisiana State University in 1986.

They were married in 1988 and moved to Central Florida after college, when Jason took a job for Merrill Lynch. The couple lived in Lake Mary for awhile, and then moved to

Sanford in 1998.

"Her English is actually better than mine," Jason said. According to him, he learned Louisiana English and she learned the Queen's English.

Ciske first had to get a permanent residency card, which used to be called a green card. After five years you can file for naturalization as a U.S. citizen, but Ciske waited. After Sept. 11, her husband said, she decided she would put in her application.

"For us, she wanted to vote in the [upcoming] election," Jason Johnson said.

Unfortunately, Jason said, Ciske's paperwork was misplaced and although they filed her paperwork in February 2003, she did not receive U.S. citizenship until this week.

"At this point you like to forget about the troubles you went through," Jason said.

Ciske, who is now a homemaker, is a Girl Scout troop leader and is involved in her

children's school and church. "I'm so happy," Ciske said after the ceremony. "It was such an honor." On the children's request,

the family went to celebrate in downtown Orlando at Manuel's on the 28th, a restaurant that overlooks downtown Orlando from the top of the

Bank of America building. "She's the kind of mother that you go, 'Wow, that's the kind of mother I'd like for my kids,'" Jason said.

A second chance Voter turnout March 8 abysmal

Some of the political types who hung out at the Supervisor of Elections Office March 8 said they were happy with the voter turnout for the city's recent election. But when one examines the numbers, the percentage of voters who actually cast a ballot was, in one word, abysmal.

Sanford is a city that wants people to think it's booming. Sanford wants other communities to see a caring, connected, and growing city poised for something special to build on its historical roots. Studying the voter turnout for March 8, however, would lead one to think this is a city unconcerned about who governs it.

Except for District 1, none of the four districts reached higher than 8 percent voter turnout. Maybe that number didn't register, so let's put it another way. Districts 2, 3, and 4 all brought out less than 8 percent of its voters in what many are calling a pivotal election.

District 2 has 5,963 registered voters according to the Supervisor of Elections Office. Just 306 people voted. Now some cast ballots in absentee and early voting, but not enough to bring the percentage up to a reasonable level. Only 450 people out of 6,044 voted from District 3 and 336 of 6,776 people cast ballots from District 4. Congratulations District 4 your percentage of voter turnout is under 5 percent — the lowest.

As expected, District 1 experienced a higher turnout. After all, the commission seat from that district was up for reelection as well as the mayor, which every district votes for. District 1 has the lowest number of registered voters with 5,252, and of those, 1,092 voted. That's 20.79 percent, but not even a quarter of registered voters came out from that district either.

Sanford has 24,035 registered voters. Just 2,855 of them cast ballots for 11.88 percent. Ask yourself what that number says about Sanford.

There's either a rampant case of apathy or people believed the weather forecasts and stayed home. The nasty weather didn't materialize, so apathy is looking good as an excuse. After the great turnout for the general election seen all over the country last November, let's not slip back into a my-vote-doesn't-count mentality.

The best thing about all this is Sanford will get a second chance. Both races ended up in a runoff. On March 29, you can get out and vote. Look around the neighborhood and see if any voters may need a ride or elderly voters may need help getting to a polling place. Maybe even organize voting parties and have some fun with the democratic process. In any case, get out and vote. Sanford's worth it.

Police crack down well done

Many Sanford residents are aware of crime problems, but will also say that it used to be much worse. The Sanford Police Department under the leadership of Brian Tooley has done a good job by most accounts, even gaining accreditation status in February. Lately, the department has cracked down on prostitution by arresting men will to pay for sex on the street. Some may call prostitution a victimless crime, but ask the abused and drug addicted women, the wives and girlfriends and families at home, and one will see that victims abound. At The Herald, we will print the mugs of the "Johns" when the police make their sting. We should all do our part to cut down on crime. Well done SPD.

Apparently my belief, and the response from the person I talked to, was in error. A candidate must still obtain 50 percent plus at least one more vote to be elected. Sorry about that bum information — but I assure you, this is probably not the first time that I goofed.

As a result, there will be a runoff election for Sanford's Mayor and District 1 Commissioner. This time you will have only two from which to choose. For Mayor, you have a choice of Whitey Eckstein and Linda Kuhn. For District 1, you have a choice between Bernard Mitchell and Art Woodruff. at Maitland Boulevard and Maitland Avenue, and spending too little time with his wife, Amy, and their three children, Sara, a junior at Lake Mary High School, and 13-year-old twins, Alana and Rebecca, who attend Greenwood Lakes Middle School in Lake Mary.

He had served at the Jewish Federation for nine years, so the schools foundation seemed like the opportunity to do what he really enjoyed — raising money to benefit others.

"This is really my passion, fundraising as a means to an end of working to help people," he said in an interview. He said he hoped to be able to work 55 to 60 hours now.

He has only been on the job for a week and said he is trying to learn the business. He wouldn't share his vision yet because he doesn't know if that would fit with the Foundation Board.

"I believe I was hired because of my relationship building skills and my expertise as a fundraiser," he said. Obviously, he said he wants to see the Foundation's endowment grow.

His new mission will continue to fulfill the basic Jewish concept of social responsibility, he said.

"Those who have have a responsibility to help others," he said. "Other children are not as lucky as my kids. I think The Foundation puts me in a position to help me do

that."

While helping underprivileged students is a big part of The Foundation, it also benefits the larger student populations with programs like Arts Alive, he said.

"Unfortunately, arts are usually at the top of the chopping block," he said when districts look at budget cuts. He also wants to grow the back pack program that gives low-income students supplies for the coming school year.

"Too often there's a what's in it for me attitude," Geboff said. Often organizations like The Foundation do not have a direct benefit to donors. He compared it to a police officer. Most people do not need an officer very often or even at all, but taxes pay for law enforcement because it's important.

Geboff said Calderone left him in good shape. She filled all the positions for the annual golf tournament this weekend, for example. He said an initial examination of The Foundation's progress shows that grants to the organization increased each year.

"I think there's a great opportunity for growth," he said. "We just have to get out there and ask." He added that in his experience people did not donate to such organizations because they were never asked.

Calderone said is proud of her years at The Foundation. She said she would have liked to see donations even higher,

so more people could benefit. She said they had increased annual income three or four fold during her tenure as executive director.

"We grew the endowment and grew the board of directors to represent the larger scale of the community," Calderone said.

She added that they automated and computerized operations as well as formed standards and policies for accepting donations.

She said The Foundation's Board of Directors contributed \$3,000 to the organization in her name.

"My passion still lies with the students and teachers of Seminole County," she said, adding that she would contribute whatever she could to help The Foundation.

Geboff said there was some question about whom he answered to, although he reports to Richard Wells, community involvement director for Seminole County Public Schools.

Calderone's letter of resignation went to Wells, but Geboff said he also talks with Superintendent Bill Vogel almost every day and there is the Board of Directors.

"I don't know who I answer to," he said.

He added that the staff is hard working and willing to get their hands dirty. They all stuffed bags for the golf tournament, for example.

"I'm really looking forward to this," Geboff said.

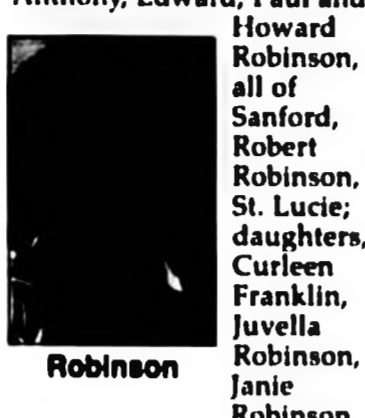

coins and antiques store on Magnolia Square. Thursday was the fourth Alive After Five event, scheduled for the second Thursday of each month from 5-8 p.m. Customers tour the various stores for samples of food, wine and beer, while obtaining signatures from shop owners. People who collected 10 signatures entered a contest for a prize.

"Alive After Five has enabled us to revitalize the Historic Downtown Sanford area for the benefit of all the merchants, residents and everyone else who come together to mingle, socialize in an atmosphere of congeniality," Grieshaber said.

"With the support of the Sanford art community, we are showcasing the city of Sanford as the premiere destination in Central Florida to live, work and recreate."

Since First Street reopened last month, Dittmann said traffic has increased "4-7 times" a given day, with walk-in sales tripling.

Debbie and John Ornel, owners of Magnolia Square Treasures, counted 130 people who visited their shop Thursday night. "This is the most traffic we've ever had. A lot of people are interested in embroidery, and we expect them to come back," Debbie said.

Entertainment for the Heritage Program was the renowned George Durham and Company. Guest soloist was Mike Chilton.

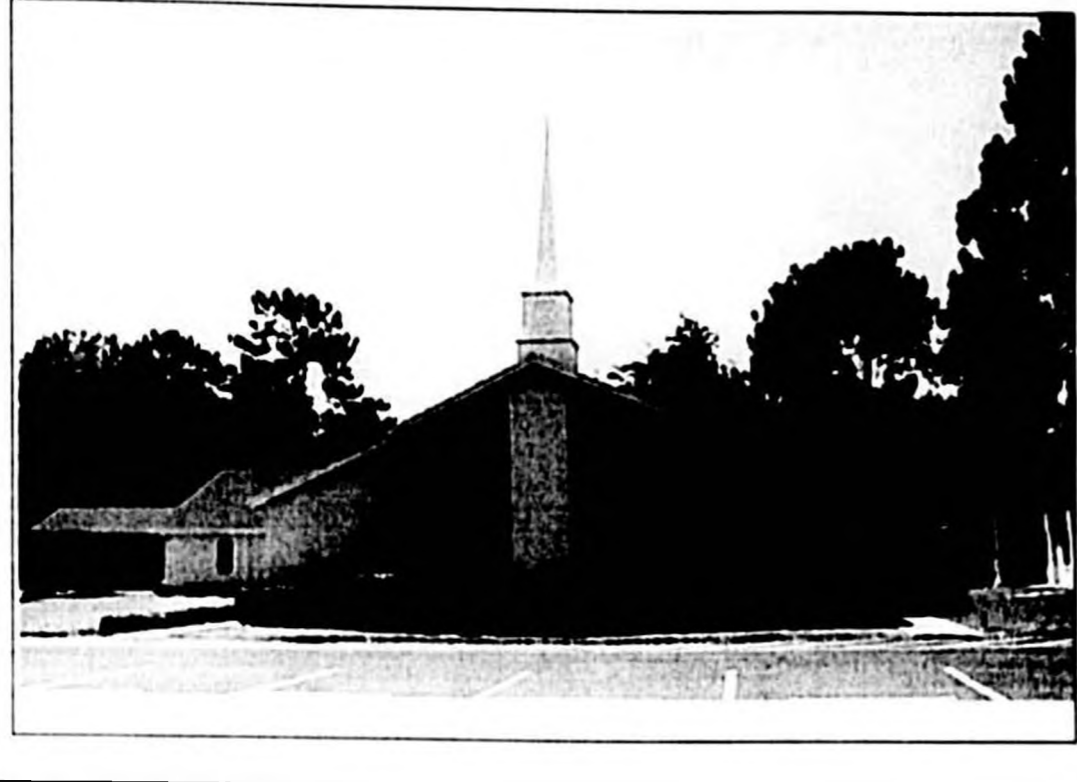

School Board report said. Hagerty High School is expected to open at the expanded former Crikes Middle School in August.

Sixteen plans were initially developed and measured against parameters such as consistency with consent decrees, keeping subdivisions and small neighborhood units in the same attendance zones, creating compact attendance zones with few or no island areas, targeting enrollments that allow for growth and anticipated changing demographics, and complying with feeder patterns to the extent practicable.

Sandra Robinson, School Board member, complimented the Core Committee Tuesday night on their graphs and cell maps, which were created to help with the rezoning process.

"The maps were very, very helpful," Robinson said.

At a work session prior to the regular meeting March 8, the School Board reviewed the three plans as well as alternate plans submitted by residents affected by the rezoning and alternative plans developed by Seminole County Public School staff.

The School Board voted unanimously to select Plan B as recommended by Vogel for advertisement and final adoption on April 12.

In other news, 51 teachers from 51 public schools in Seminole County received the "You Make Us Proud Award,"

Outstanding Audit for the 2003/2004 school year at the March 8 meeting. About half of the teachers awarded certificates were at the meeting to accept.

A five-minute video was also shown highlighting Indian Trails Middle School in Winter Springs. Sixth graders produced the promotional video in their video production class.

The consent agenda was also approved by the School Board, which is good news for 66 JROTC students from Milwee and Teague middle schools.

Principals Lois Chavis of Milwee and Roger Gardner of Teague Middle School gave their permission for the trip as long as it was approved by the School Board. The students will attend a "by-invitation-only" tour of the U.S. Marine Base in Quantico, Va. The overnight field trip will last five days, and the students needed a waiver of the field trip policy governing overnight field trips. The trip is scheduled toward the end of April.

The School Board also learned that any faculty or staff member of the Seminole County Public Schools who was not electronically fingerprinted before July 1, 2004, must now do so. Senate Bill 2986, approved by the Legislature last spring, requires "any person, instructional or non-instructional employee, certificated, contracted or licensed that has direct contact with a child is

required to have a Level 2 background screening for re-employment or re-engagement to provide services."

A Level 2 screening requires submission of fingerprints not only to Florida Department of Law Enforcement for a background check, but also to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

It is not immediately clear who will pay for the fingerprinting process which could be as much as \$80.

"The fees associated with the new fingerprinting requirements may be borne by the district school board, the contractor, or the person fingerprinted," the School Board report said.

Level 2 screening must be met every five years following the submission of someone's fingerprint. The District is in the process of negotiating for the purchase or lease of a mobile fingerprinting machine to effectively address the new requirements, the report said.

The next School Board meeting is March 29 at 3:30 p.m.

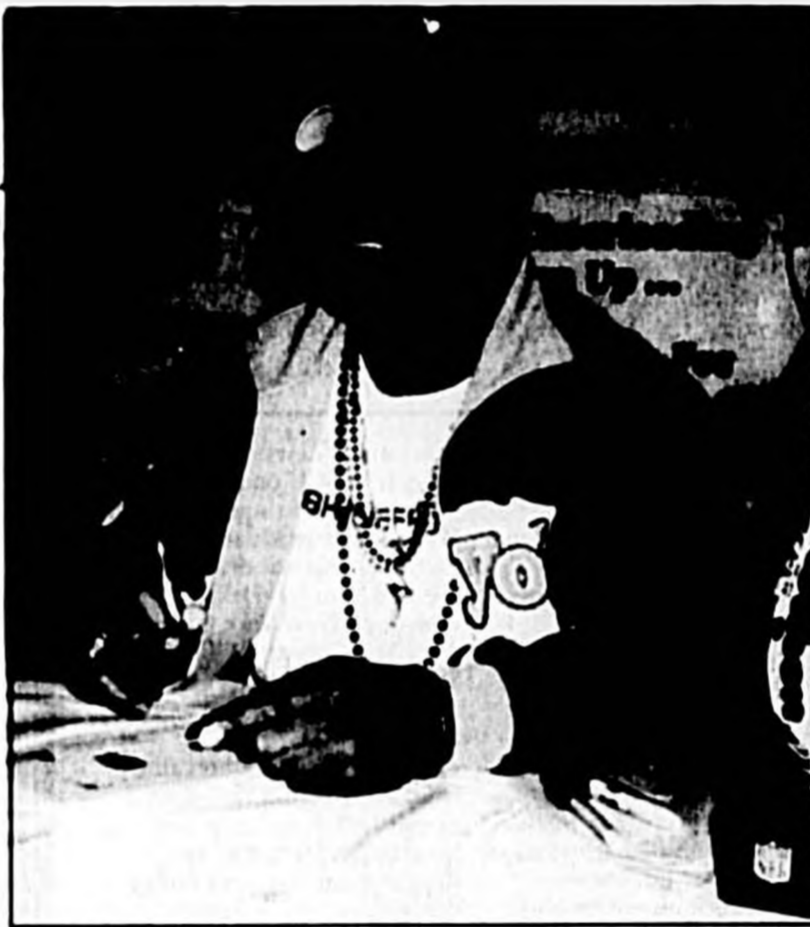

Dwyer too strong for Silver Hawks

For the third straight year, the strength of the Lake Howell basketball team came back to haunt the Silver Hawks in the State Tournament.

Once again, Lake Howell struggled with its shooting and defending state champion Palm Beach Gardens-Dwyer proved to be to big and powerful inside for the Silver Hawks as they fell, 71-61, in the semifinals of the 2005 FHSAA Class 5A Boys Basketball Championship at The Lakeland Center Wednesday evening.

For the second straight year, sharp-shooter Nick Calathas, one of four starting sophomores for Lake Howell (26-5), had an outstanding game, scoring on a lay-up off the opening tip and never quit, pouring in a game-high 36 points on 13-of-22 shooting from the floor, 7-of-11 on three-pointers, and also had eight rebounds and four assists.

Another of the soph's, point guard Jory Rodriguez, had good numbers with 13 points, six rebounds and eight assists, but he was just 6-for-19 from the floor as the rest of the team, without Calathas, was 11-for-43 (26-percent) from the floor and 0-for-12 on three-point attempts.

Meanwhile, Dwyer's two Division I signees, 6-foot-5 Alonzo Gee (Alabama) and 6-foot-7 Kyle Marks (Nebraska), combined for 32 points, including 13 points in the first six minutes by Gee, who finished with 21, as the Panthers (24-5) built a 14-point lead, 33-19, with 3:35 left in the second period.

The Silver Hawks, who came into the game ranked No. 3 in the state, finally found itself and went on an 11-4 run to close to within 37-30 at halftime.

Lake Howell didn't let the halftime break slow its momentum as they came out and scored nine of the first 11 points, capped by a Rodriguez basket off a feed from Calathas to tie the game at 39-39 with 4:13 remaining in the third quarter.

But Gee would end the Silver Hawks' 20-6 run with a three-point play at 3:36 and Lake Howell, which had to play so hard to get back in the game, would get no closer than one point the rest of the way.

The game was a rematch of the 2004 Championship Game which Dwyer also broke open late in the game to win, 64-49.

UCF BASEBALL BEGINS FINAL SEASON OF ATLANTIC SUN PLAY AGAINST CAMPBELL

No. 26 UCF (16-3) looks to continue its best start ever under head coach Jay Bergman as the Golden Knights open Atlantic Sun play vs. Campbell

(9-5) this weekend at Jay Bergman Field. UCF begins its final season in the A-Sun as the Golden Knights move to Conference USA in the fall of 2005.

The Golden Knights pounded St. Joseph's 22-3 Tuesday evening while Campbell lost 10-6 to Michigan State and 12-8 to North Florida this week in Jacksonville.

UCF set a school record with 13 runs in the fourth inning against Saint Joseph's, sending 19 batters to the plate and rapping out eight hits in the frame.

UCF set season-highs in runs (22) scored and hits (16) in the 19-run victory.

"We have not had a game like that all year, but I think we needed to have a night like tonight and get the offense going," stated UCF head coach Jay Bergman.

Eight of UCF's nine starters recorded hits, including two hits by Matt Ray, Winter Springs' John-Michael Howell, Lake Mary's Drew Butera and Kevin Richmond.

The Golden Knights scored two runs in the first, four in the second, 13 in

the fourth, two in the fifth and one in the sixth to round out the scoring.

UCF starting pitcher Ray Rodriguez raised his record to 4-0 on the season with five innings of work. The New York native limited the Hawks to one run on two hits with three strikeouts.

Howell, the former Winter Springs High and Seminole Community College star, ripped two doubles in the big fourth frame, giving him seven for the season, and finished the game with a career-high four RBI. Ray also drove in three runs while Richmond and Marshall Bernhard also drove in two runs apiece.

Howell's former teammate at SCC, Courtney Probst, had a hit, scored three runs, drove in two and stole his team-leading 15th base of the season.

Fifth-seeded Stetson improved to 15-13, while the fourth-seeded Bruins end their season 17-11.

UCF opened the game with a bang with Houston hitting a three for the Golden Knights only to have Jessica Miller answer with a three of her own for Mercer. Smith put the Knights back up by three after being fouled while making a layup.

Two minutes later, Karen Hickman hit a three for the second tie of the game. Smith put the Black and Gold back up by three 30 seconds later by hitting a three. Sarah Russell brought the Bears to within one after netting a jumper.

UCF then went on a 12-0 run over the next eight minutes with Claudia Johnson leading the way with six points. The Knights were up 21-8 with 5:11 to play in the half.

Mercer tried to make a comeback after Rhonda Owens netted two free throws followed by a three-pointer by Hickman. Slade then hit a free throw to put the Knights up by nine.

Tanya Kessenich hit a free throw for Mercer followed by a jumper by Roberts. The teams then went back to Mercer's end of the court only to have Hickman miss a three-pointer, rebounded by LaShay King. King passed the ball off to Roberts who netted a jumper for her 1,000 career point as a Knight.

Owens was fouled at the Bears' end of the court, making both free throws with 1:10 to go. Russell followed that up with a jumper for Mercer making the halftime score UCF 26, Mercer 18.

The second half started with a three-pointer by Hickman for Mercer to bring the Bears to within five of the Knights. Former Seminole Community College star Rosana Davis, who would finish with six points and six rebounds, then hit two free throws to make it 26-23, in favor of UCF.

Houston netted a jumper for the first UCF

Kessenich then scored two for Mercer followed by two free throws by Weber for UCF. Russell made a jumper followed by a three-pointer by Miller to bring the Bears to within one of UCF.

With 14:26 to play, Slade tipped one in for the Knights giving them a three-point lead over the Bears. Miller answered with a jumper for the Bears. Takira Allen then hit a free throw putting the Knights up by two only to have Erin Keller hit a three for Mercer giving them a one-point lead with 12:51 to play.

Miller gave Mercer a two point lead after netting a free throw to make the score 38-36. Roberts hit a jumper and a free throw for the Knights tying the score up again with 9:54 to go. Roberts hit another free throw less than 10 seconds later giving the Black and Gold a one point lead.

Miller responded with a layup and a free throw of her own to put Mercer back in the lead. Roberts was fouled again, making both free throws, tying the score at 41 apiece. With 6:18 to play in regulation, Roberts hit another layup to put the Knights up by two.

Keller tied the score up again after hitting two free throws for the Bears followed by a layup by Davis giving Mercer a two-point lead. Roberts responded with a layup of her own, tying the score with 4:29 to go.

Miller then netted a jumper for the Bears putting them up by one only to have Houston hit a three-pointer giving the Knights a one-point lead. Roberts was fouled again by Mercer, making both free throws for the Knights.

Mercer fouled Roberts again sending her to the line again where she hit both shots with five seconds to go. The Bears then fouled Slade with under one second to go sending her to the line for the Knights, hitting both shots giving UCF the win, 65-59.

Stetson was hot from the start, opening the game with an 18-4 lead during the first seven minutes of play. Belmont managed just three baskets, all by freshman Brooke Sunday, in the first 11 minutes of the game. The Hatters took leads of as many as 22, 30-8, with 6:44 left in the opening period. Reggie was a walk-on red-shirt his first year, but his hard work and dedication in practice earned him a full scholarship the next season.

He was used mostly in a special teams and scout team role the next two years before moving into a starting position his junior and senior seasons.

His on the field accomplishments, which included several Player-of-the-Week honors as a scout team extraordinaire, and good work habits brought attention to Seminole High's outstanding program and soon quarterback Jeff Blake and defensive standout Earnest

"Sackman" Lewis followed Branch to ECU on full rides.

It was back to square one for Reggie after graduating from ECU. He was not drafted by the NFL, but the Dallas Cowboys, New York Giants, New York Jets and Pittsburgh Steelers all showed a great interest in signing him as a free agent.

But the most interest came from Washington Redskins owner Jack Kent Cook and head coach Joe Gibbs and Reggie made the most out of the opportunity, earning a spot on the roster and becoming one of the most respected and looked up to players on the Redskins for the next seven seasons.

Upon his retirement Coach Gibbs told Reggie, "thanks for all the years, you made it a lot of fun and you were a great part of our success."

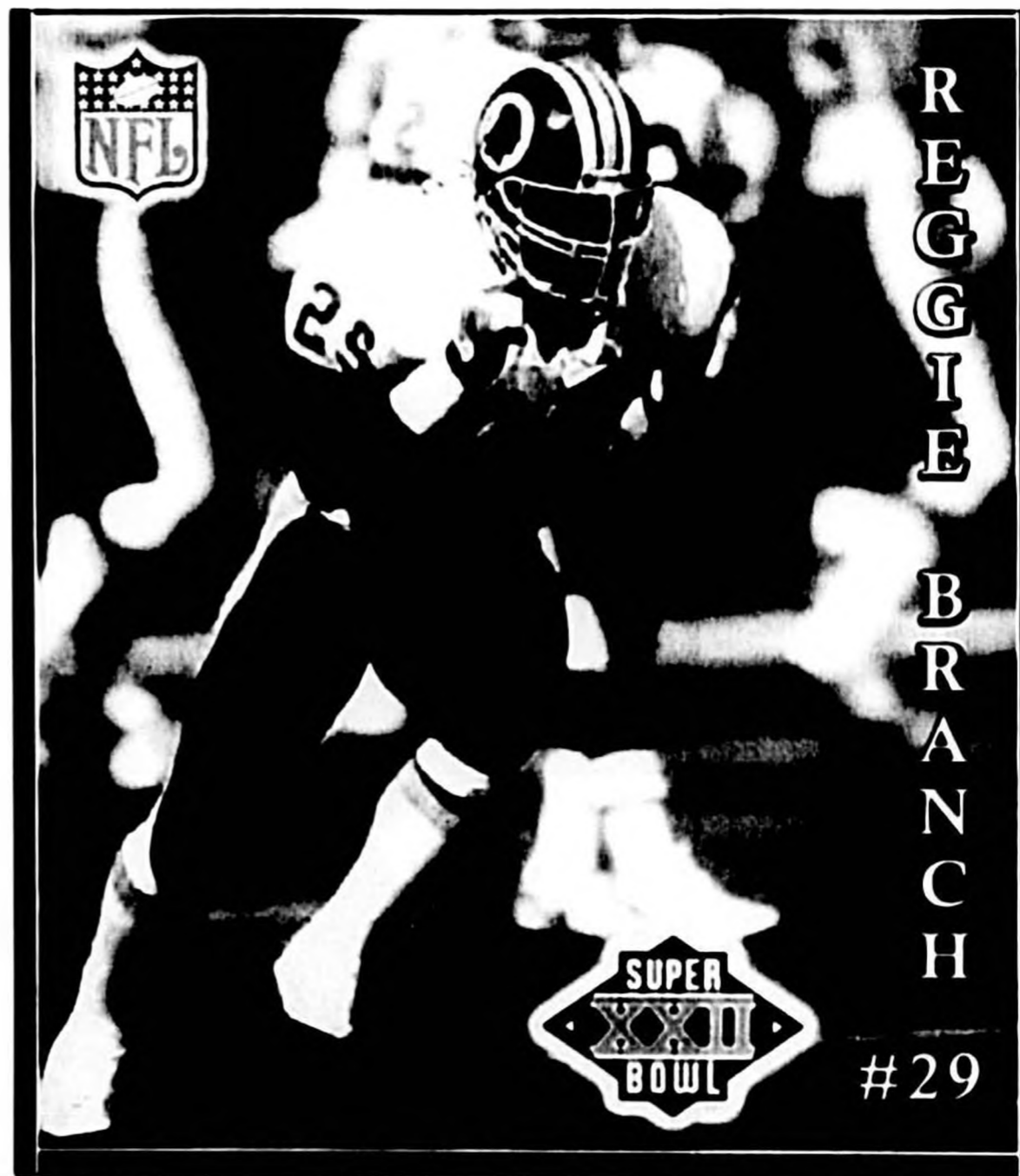
