# NO PROGRESS IS MADE IN RAIL STRIKE

## Nation Lies Prostrate Under Weight Of Railway Tie-up

### Cries For Action Heard In Senate

The greatest industrial nation of the world lies almost prostrate today. The railroad arteries which pump the life-giving flow of commerce through its mills and factories, stores and farms, are nothing but lifeless bands of steel. For the moment, at least, the tie-up is practically complete. The only major railroad functioning normally is the Illinois Central, and that road was exempted from the strike because it had been taken over by the government before the walk-out was ordered. It remains to be seen whether the efforts of other roads to get some trains into operation with supervisory crews will be successful.

Not since the strike of 1922 has the nation experienced anything like this, and the full impact of the stoppage has not yet been felt. The gravest and most immediate threat, of course, is to the food supplies of the big cities. Trucks and waterways are being mobilized to meet this threat, but the effects will reach into every corner of the land, across the national borders, across the seas, to Europe and Asia, where hungry people are waiting for the grain that now must be moved to tidewater from inland storage points.

Losses that will result from the tie-up, even if it is only of short duration, can scarcely be estimated. Perishable food will rot on farms, business and industry will be forced to halt completely in some cases, or drastically curtailed activity. Capital foresees plenty of trouble for us in the foreign field. The immediate concern, of course, is famine relief. The possibility that lives may be lost because of our failure to meet our promises in grain shipments is not a pretty thought, but the Washington diplomats see another danger. They see American prestige waning at a critical period when democracy and communism are competing for the affections of people in Europe and Asia.

Our domestic troubles, these diplomats point out, play right into the hands of the communists. "You see," says the Communist, "these Americans just can't handle their affairs in their democracy. Just look at them."

Fortunately for us, human beings, under unusual circumstances, prefer freedom to regimentation, and the tradition of liberty has deep roots in Europe. Our military embarrassment will not mean an irrevocable defeat, but there is no blinking the fact that we are drawing heavily on the capital of good will which we have piled up in the past.

Particularly grave fears are felt in connection with the food supply situation. California fruit and vegetable growers, for instance, say losses will run into many millions of dollars in a matter of days if perishables are not moved.

All over the country, express cars loaded with perishables have been sidetracked as a result of the strike which started at 4:00 P. M. Local Standard Time yesterday.

Not a single carload of livestock left Chicago—the nation's livestock center. Meat industry spokesmen say the rail strike will just about paralyze their production.

Millions of commuters in major urban areas either have been stranded in the big cities to which they travel by train to work daily. Other millions who managed to reach home in advance of the strike deadline will be unable to get back to work in most cases. The city of Los Angeles, for instance, is without major transportation as a result of the strike.

OFFICERS REPRIMANDED

WASHINGTON, May 24. (AP)—The Navy Department has given a severe reprimand to five Admiral Robert Giffin and four other Naval officers. They were in charge of the Naval Air Station at San Juan, Puerto Rico, last year when \$50,000 worth of aircraft repair tools and other equipment was lost or stolen from Navy planes.

### 75 Percent Of Local Railroad Men Idle Today

In the Sanford area the strike of engineers and trainmen has resulted in a 75 percent reduction in employment among approximately 500 railroad men in this district, it was reported this morning by Charles H. Black, superintendent of the Jacksonville division of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad.

Approximately 100 cars of north bound perishables, including celery, watermelons and local grown vegetables, are tied up at Rand's siding on the West side. "Our information is that cars on hand at Rand's siding that require icing are being satisfactorily taken care of," said Mr. Black.

The total number of cars tied up here as a result of the strike is 407, according to Mr. Black. Of these 232 are northbound and include 161 loaded cars (including the perishables) and 71 empty cars. South bound cars total 185 of which 104 are loaded. Of the latter, there is believed to be but a very small amount of perishable goods. In addition, there are 60 loaded cars for the Leesburg, Trilby and Kissimmee branch lines.

All trains that left Jacksonville yesterday returned, including the Ovelto and Leesburg branch. Today the railroad was silent, and according to Mr. Black, no runs, even for mail, are scheduled. According to an Associated Press report from St. Petersburg, an Atlantic Coast Line passenger train left there this morning on its way to Jacksonville. An unnamed executive was said to be at the throttle of the locomotive. It operated over the Ovelto division.

Mail boxes at the Sanford Post Office were comparatively empty this morning, as the messenger to the depot brought in no incoming mail. In event of continuation of the strike, there is no certainty of incoming mail other than from Daytona Beach, which is carried here on the Star bus route which ends at Orlando.

This mail arrives here at 7:00 A. M. The bus passes through here going back to Daytona in the evening. There is no certainty as to delivery by air mail as no bus service has been authorized to take this mail to Orlando, the air terminal, according to Joel S. Field, postmaster.

Business in downtown groceries appeared to be especially brisk up to noon, and bread supplies dwindled fast.

Local shippers were of the opinion that celery could be safely left refrigerated cars for a maximum of 72 hours, and that after that, even if re-iced, decay might set in, due to the warm weather. It was recently estimated that between 380 and 400 cars of celery yet remain to be cut and shipped from the Ovelto section.

HEAD FOR MEXICO

### Churchill Raps Labor Party Plan

#### Ex-prime Minister Renews His Attack

LONDON, May 24. (AP)—Winston Churchill renewed his attack today on the British Labor government's decision to withdraw from Egypt. He told Commons that it would run British interests in the Middle East, destroy British communications in the Indian and Pacific Oceans, and cut the lifeline of the British Empire.

Churchill said that it would be impossible to defend the Suez Canal unless British personnel are stationed permanently in the canal zone. Other bases in the Middle East, he said, would be unsatisfactory and when Britain tried to get them she would be accused of imperialism.

Churchill warned that a British withdrawal from Egypt might seriously affect British hopes of getting American aid in the Palestine question. He said that to use Palestine as a jumping off place for occupation of the Suez Canal in an emergency would leave Britain without American help and with the most profitable track that could be imagined.

Churchill recommended leaving the status quo in Egypt for five or six years in hopes that the United Nations will be able to remove the old treaty dangers.

Huge Reception Planned For Barrs At His Birthplace

TAMPA, May 24. (AP)—The City Birthplace of Judge Paul D. Barrs, Miami veteran jurist campaigning for the Florida Supreme Court, has arranged a "hall-out" reception Friday night for the candidate, headquarters here announced today.

Judge Barrs arrived in Tampa from Pinellas County early today and after conferences with supporters was taken on a parade through the city by Judge Grayson, chairman of the local committee sponsoring the Miami jurist's candidacy.

Last night Judge Barrs delivered two radio talks. He was introduced by Judge Grayson, who declared "an overwhelming majority of lawyers favor Judge Barrs' election to the Supreme Court," and explained that the jurists are best qualified to know what type of judges are needed to "give out justice fairly and impartially, such as Judge Barrs has done throughout 17 years he has served as a trial court judge."

ORDERED TO CAPITOL  
SAVANNAH, Ga., May 24.—General Dwight Eisenhower was ordered to cut short a vacation in Savannah and leave for Washington. He has been called to an emergency conference in connection with the rail strike.

Decentralized System Of Ties Is Favored By Commonwealth Leaders

LONDON, May 24. (AP)—The British government and commonwealth leaders have announced a new system of decentralized trade policy, however. ### Public Stranded, Perishables Spoil

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 24. (AP)—President Truman will lay the whole strike situation before the nation tonight in a radio address scheduled for 11:00 P. M. Eastern Daylight Time. Patterson told newsmen that the Army may call back to uniform all men who ran service railroads during the war.

Folks often wonder what President Roosevelt would do under today's circumstances if he were alive. Well, on a previous occasion under similar circumstances, he said, "A plague on both your houses."

"There is something in the conduct of Senator Arthur Vandenberg, the Republican Senator from Michigan, which makes the American people yearn for more of his kind in the United States Congress," says the Times Union.

Marriner Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve board, says if we don't lend Britain four billion dollars we'll have another world war. We lent 'em four billion dollars 25 years ago and we had the second World War.

The Pearl Harbor Congressional Investigating Committee has finally concluded its inquiry into the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. And after hearing testimony of several hundred witnesses, calling in all the brass in America, spending millions of dollars and about six months on hearings, it has finally discovered that the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor was a complete surprise.

"People are beginning to realize," says the St. Augustine Record, "that under the Wagner Act (the Wagner Labor Relations Act), passed by the Congress of the United States some years ago, any labor leader, prominent in a union, and as much brain, brass and bluster as John L. Lewis, can cause a lot of trouble."

Reaping The Whirlwind

As the nation's railroads slowly ground to a stop yesterday afternoon, the realization was forcibly brought home to millions of people that after twelve years of experimentation and improvisation the New Deal's labor policies had resulted only in complete failure and that the people are now reaping the whirlwind of visionary idealism, impractical theorizing and communistic propaganda.

Although the Democratic party has been in complete control of all branches of the government ever since 1933 and has enacted into law every piece of legislation which the labor leaders demanded to increase their power and wealth, nothing whatever has been done to increase their public responsibilities, to restrict the abuse of their new found weapons, or to provide adequate machinery for the settlement of labor-management disputes.

We now find ourselves in the peculiar position where a single labor leader has more power than the President, even the Government, of the United States, for John L. Lewis can call the coal miners out of the pits any time he likes, but the President of the United States cannot "negotiate with bayonets". Government troops bodily ejected Sewell Avery from Montgomery-Ward's, but they dare not do the same to the President of the United Mine Workers.

Because no means have been provided for settling industrial disputes without strikes, homes badly needed by veterans who have been fighting for their country for four long years cannot be provided; tools needed by farmers in harvesting their crops are further delayed; automobiles, radios, washing machines, not to mention soap, shirts and nylon are withheld from the markets; and the great humanitarian task of feeding the starving millions throughout the world becomes a ridiculous impossibility.

And while America stands on the threshold of the greatest era of progress and prosperity in the history of the world, with better working conditions, higher wage levels and better standards of living for every workingman than have ever been known before, the nation also totters on the brink of destruction with bleak despair, stark revolution, complete chaos and a wild orgy of inflation and starvation staring it in the face.

In this condition none suffers more than the workingman himself. He loses his job. His wages are stopped. His meager savings are consumed in trying to buy bread for his family. The cost of this bread continues to rise as long as these conditions prevail. He suffers and his family suffers, all for want of a workable plan for settling industrial disputes.

We talk of permanent peace among the nations of the world while an economic war at home consumes our homes and firesides.

Due to the fact that the polio virus has been associated with flies, and that flies breed in "hot beds" or filthy surroundings, a number of Florida communities are ordering cleanups to remove these sources. In DeLand, City Manager Fred Cross enlisted the help of Junior High School to determine which "hot spots" should be sprayed with DDT. The rear of fish markets, grocery stores, the city dump and other fly breeding places were earmarked for spraying by the wide awake youngsters who alertly located "hot spots" that sleepy or indifferent city officials had overlooked.

City Manager Clyde E. Spank of Fort Pierce has been investigating the possibility of giving the city a DDT spraying, particularly livestock fly-breeding and harboring places as a precaution against the outbreak of another epidemic of typhoid fever such as the city experienced last year or of polio or other epidemics.

City commissioners became alarmed at the number of houseflies already showing up in large numbers and told the city manager that something should be done to assure protection of public health.

The "privacy suit" of Zelma Cason, 53 year old maiden, against Marjorie Kinman Havigs revealed that before "Cross Creek" was published, the former weighed 108 pounds, lost some weight over 123 book, gained 10 pounds after filing the suit and now weighs about 125 pounds. She denied using strong expressions to emphasize her statements "unless in anger" and then is quoted as denying she ever had outbursts of anger. The court was jammed with interested Cross Creek crackers.

At Clewiston, officials of the local sugar mill workers union are protesting the "forced resignation" of Clarence Bittling, as president of the United States Sugar Corporation following his

difference of opinion with his board of directors. This is something brand new—a union taking up the cudgel for its employer.

The Parkview Drugstore which is close to the Fort Myers city hall and police headquarters was entered and robbed Monday evening.





## "Gripe Board" Makes Report To Patterson

### Doolittle Committee Urges Abolishment Of Words "Officer" And "Enlisted Man"

WASHINGTON, May 27. (AP)—The Army's so-called "gripe board" today laid before War Secretary Patterson a 53-page statement on what it thinks can be done to improve the United States Army.

The board's greatest break with tradition in its recommendations is contained in the suggestion that the very terms "officer" and "enlisted man" be banned from the Army vocabulary. The board said it thought that simple move would go a long way toward narrowing the official and social gap between officers and men.

It recommended that all military personnel be referred to simply as soldiers.

The six-man board was headed by Lieutenant General Jimmy Doolittle and was made up chiefly of ex G. I.'s and former officers.

The board also recommended abolition of the hand salute, except on Army posts and in overseas areas. Abolition of any rules or customs which make any barrier to social associations also was recommended.

The board proposed a thorough revision of existing differences in pay, promotion, furloughs, decorations and food. It called, too, for new measures aimed at raising the standard of living in the Army. Said the board: "Americans look with disfavor upon any system which grants unearned privileges to a particular class of individuals."

## Immediate Action Urged By Legislators

### By Legislators Urged By Bureau

Telegrams urging "fearless action" on the part of senators and congressmen on pending labor relations bills so that never again can public interest or welfare be at the mercy of any organized group, were dispatched Saturday to Senators O. Andrews and Claude Pepper by members of the Board of Directors of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, following a meeting at the office of American Fruit Growers Inc. in the Atlantic National Bank Building, Sanford. President M. L. Cullum today revealed the content of the telegrams which read as follows: "We urge you take fearless action on pending labor relations bills so that never again can public interest, health and general welfare, or government itself, be at the mercy of any organized group. Mere settlement of present coal, rail strikes will not solve the problem as strikes which preceded these and those which follow bear equally, if less spectacular, harmful results."

"Also urge support bill outlawing gangster practices, most notable being union requirement of many terminals that farmers' trucks must be unloaded by union men, often resulting in produce being trucked one block only at cost excess \$50 a load, when farmers' truck could have delivered at merchant's door without additional cost.

"Union porters working for merchant would refuse to allow their own employer to sell any merchandise if this rule was violated. This and other indignities are becoming unbearable."

The group discussed ownership of muck land in order to supply muck to growers, and it was decided that the Bureau should not own land for this purpose, action, however, on the matter was deferred until the next meeting, Mr. Cullum said.

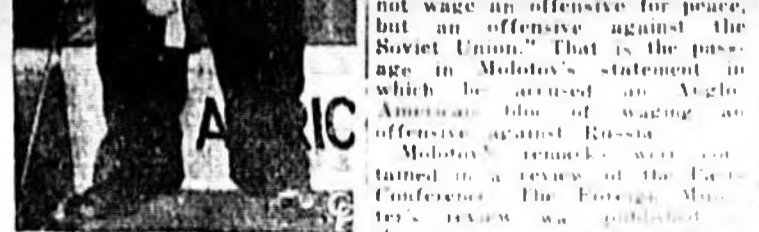

### More Than 100 Cars Of Perishables Included In Local Jam

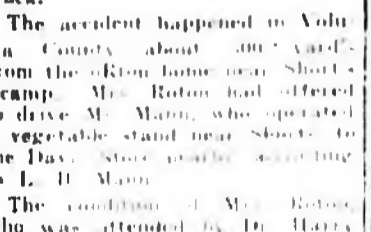
