# Stadium rehab to begin in August

## City approves 10-year, \$1.75 loan to pay for construction costs

**SANFORD** — Construction will begin later this summer to complete the restoration of Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium.

The Sanford City Commission this week approved a \$1.75 million loan with First Union to complete renovations to the stadium.

The commission had hoped to receive state funding and avoid taking out the loan, but Gov. Jeb Bush vetoed funding

for the second consecutive year.

The one-year project calls for 1,472 seats, plus room along the foul lines for additional seating. The city will also remove lead paint and asbestos, as well as construct a new roof, dugouts, and locker rooms.

"It's a dream come true," said commissioner Whitey Eckstein.

The city is expecting to name a contractor for the project in July, and construction would begin in August. The renovations are expected to take one year.

"We will be able to have sporting events at the stadium, and possibly a concert," said Chris Smith, an assistant engineer for the city who is coordinating the project. "It should be a real asset to the city. We'll maintain the historic flair and reflect the stadium's history."

Earlier phases of stadium renovations, funded by the city, included stadium lighting, plumbing, improvements to lower bowl seating, and engineering drawings for the stadium field.

# Police arrest three teens for auto theft

**SANFORD** — Three teenagers were caught by Sanford police Wednesday while running from a stolen car.

The three Sanford teens were observed running from a stolen 1984 Chevrolet Caprice and into the residence at 813 Orange Avenue, the home of the mother of one of the teens.

Richard Beveret, 16, of 2540 Hartwell Ave., Ricky Mitchell, 16, of 1800 French Ave., and Donnell Dickerson, 13, of 813 Orange Ave., were arrested at Dickerson's home. They all

have prior arrest records, and are charged with auto theft.

Investigators said the teens may lead police in the direction of suspect in other crimes.

"The suspects have cooperated with police investigators and more arrests are anticipated," said Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen.

Officers responded to the area of 8th Street and Willow Avenue at about 8 a.m., and pursued the teens as they ran from the stolen car. Once inside Dickerson's home, a witness told police the teens said to get down and hide, because the police were outside looking for them.

# Owners may be fined if their pets poop in public

**SANFORD** — Sanford residents may soon face fines for not cleaning up after their pets.

The Sanford City Commission is considering an ordinance which would forbid animal owners from allowing their pets to defecate on public property, including parks.

"It is a problem in certain city parks," said Police Chief Brian Tooley.

The city has received numerous complaints from residents and employees regarding stepping in animal feces, getting it on their clothing and equipment, said Howard Jeffries, the city's landscape architect.

"Most of the complaints we have received come from people living near Toubey Park," Jeffries said. "They are stepping in it, getting it on their clothing, and in their cars."

Ron Rose, executive director of the Sanford-Seminole County

Chamber of Commerce, said the city does need an ordinance to clean up messes left by animals in public parks.

"Any ordinance that is directed at doing anything to improve the quality of life of city residents, and beautify the city's parks, I absolutely favor," Rose said.

Sanford does not have an animal waste ordinance. The city is looking into patterning an ordi-

# County budget nears \$500 million for fiscal year

## Good news for Seminole taxpayers: No new rate increases

**SANFORD** — Seminole County's proposed 2000/2001 budget is \$470,454,786 — up more than \$30 million from the adopted budget of 1999/2000. It would appear the number soon will top \$500 million.

The good news — residents won't be paying more taxes. The proposed 2000/2001 financial plan maintains the current millage rate of 7.8721.

The property tax on an average residential home with a market value of \$100,000 and a Homestead Exemption of

\$25,000, would amount to \$1,342.14. The biggest hunk of this — 53 percent or \$715.58 — would go to the School Board.

County Manager Kevin Grace said the proposed budget demonstrates the county's ongoing commitment to its highest priorities. He cited "unavoidable yet costly expenditures" but with new revenue sources on place millages can remain constant.

The general fund portion of the proposed budget totals \$131,441,980, which is a 7.8 percent increase over the current year. Grace said that a portion of the countywide millage was shifted from Transportation Trust Fund to balance the General Fund generating an additional \$2.6 million for general operating activities.

Strategies and preparation of the budget were done by the

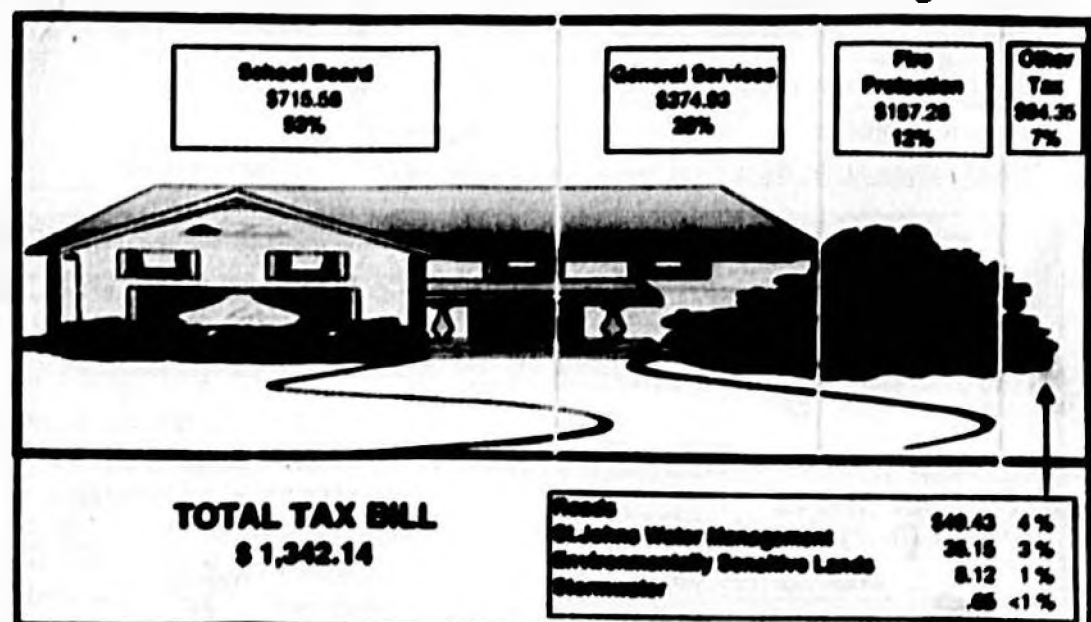

# Turk: No, 'I don't feel I did anything wrong'

The story has a number of plots — a county government whodunit that has already caused economic development director Bob Turk to resign his \$61,000-a-year position. Some think 52-year-old Turk was caught in a crossfire as two or more county officials engaged in election year maneuvers. Turk, however, did not provide County Manager Kevin Grace the answers and contribution Grace sought after reviewing Turk's travel and entertainment receipts for the last year and a half.

Turk frequently listed Dr. Rose Raska, Coordinator of the Seminole County School System's School to Work program as a dinner guest — and he often called her long distance while on trips. During a School to Work conference in Savannah, Ga., Turk charged a \$75 dinner with Raska.

"We were dating," Turk said Thursday. "Did I do anything wrong? No, I don't feel I did anything wrong. The trip (with

Raska) was a legitimate trip. The expenses were legitimate expenses. They (Grace, other county people) are reading more into it than they should."

Clerk of the Court Maryanne Morse, who studied Turk's reports, said she found "substantial abuse." Morse questioned a number of Turk's county VISA card and personal credit card receipts. There was one night when Turk took some foreign guests to three Orlando nightspots — "barhopping" as a county official was wont to say. Morse delivered the evidence to Grace.

Grace and Turk talked last week. When they finished, Grace allowed Turk the opportunity to resign. Grace downplayed the wrong Turk may have done, saying he "was leaving the county in good standing." Grace said he was uncomfortable about working any longer with Turk because a trust had been broken.

It rankled Grace, too, that the more he tried to quiet the flap the more the story had leaked out.

Bob Turk, Mr. Nice guy, was suddenly out the door. What was the real story?

Some — including Turk — sense an underhanded move by County Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide, who is seeking reelection this year. Morse and Van Der Weide had their own squabble two years ago when the clerk docked pay from the commissioner's pay checks. He had no receipts for a business trip to Europe. She blew the whistle.

Van Der Weide sued her — and who testifies in his defense? Bob Turk. Morse argued that Van Der Weide's trip to London was not approved by the county commission. He was supposed to go to The Netherlands. (Van Der Weide and his wife and her sister) also went to London, where he said he did county business. Turk vouched for him.

As Van Der Weide seeks his third term, he may be planning to get back at his nemesis Morse with a new campaign slogan. "Just look at that Maryanne Morse — getting even with Bob Turk."

## 'Peace' not welcome at church

If I had my way, we would disperse with "the peace" at the Sunday worship service.

"The peace" is the part of the service when members of the congregation are asked to greet their neighbors in the pews by saying, "May the peace of the Lord be with you," or just, "Peace."

It can turn into quite a production number.

Those, like me, who object to the practice have referred to the peace by all sorts of uncomplimentary names — "three-ring circus," "show-biz time," "ring-around-the-santuary" and "fruit-basket upset," the last being a parlor game similar to musical chairs in which all the players dash around frantically when a signal is given.

One unhappy church parishioner mockingly described the ritual as "Peace where there is no

peace," an allusion to some of the more enthusiastic participants — including pastors — who indulge in aisle-hopping and emotional hugging and kissing.

A denominational magazine reported that its readers' major objection to the peace is that they consider it to be a jarring intrusion into the mood of reverent worship.

People in evangelical, nonliturgical churches are more likely to enjoy this Rotary Club genufity. They have been doing it for years, while it is a

rather recent development in the liturgical churches.

I recall hearing "The Old-Fashioned Revival Hour" on the radio years ago. At some point in the services, the Rev. Charles E. Fuller would say to listeners,

"Turn around and shake hands with your neighbor behind you."

I had trouble picturing how that would work, and I'm still not sure. If you turned around to shake hands with the person in the pew behind you, and he was turning around to shake hands with the person behind him, and so on from the front of the church to the back, nobody would be shaking hands with anybody.

But it is the "pew blocker" more than the "peace-maker" who raises the blood pressure of some churchgoers.

Pew blockers are those who take the seats next to the aisle at either end of the row, making it impossible to have any civilized access to the available seating in between. Their motto is, "We will not be moved."

Pew blockers earn the unspoken wrath and concealed dirty looks of their fellow worshipers, who must huddle knees, try to cover people's feet and bang their shins on such impediments as extruding pew racks to get to their seats.

A church member from Colorado used the columns of his denomination's magazine to take aim at those who stake out the end seats for themselves in church and won't budge.

His letter prompted comments from other readers. Strangely, few of the responses were sympathetic to his plight. Some sample letters:

"My advice to you is to get to church 10 minutes early. You'll have your choice of pews anywhere in the sanctuary."

"A lot of people suffer from claustrophobia. They have a fear of being closed in, so they head for the aisle seats. Too bad you can't be more sympathetic toward them."

"Emily Post writes on the subject that those who come early are entitled to the best seats — regardless."

Other pew blockers said they were planning a quick exit after church and didn't want to be held up in their rush for the door.

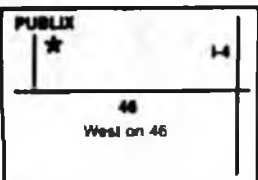

# 'Young Turks' making their presence known in Sanford

**SANFORD** — Newly elected commissioner Randy Jones represents a changing of the guard for the Sanford City Commission.

Jones, 29, is among an influx of young professionals who are

moving into Sanford. He joins commissioner Brady Lessard, 28, as part of what Mayor Larry Dale jokingly called the "Young Turks" after Jones was sworn in on Wednesday.

"You'll be hearing a lot from this end of the table," said Lessard, who will sit next to Jones during commission meet-

ings. Lessard and Jones do not agree on every issue. Lessard supported a proposed hotel and conference center on Fort Mellon Park, while Jones is in favor of preserving the park. However, they do have much in common.

Both are Republican business

owners. Lessard renovates real estate in the historic district, while Jones owns an automotive and boat detailing business. Both enjoy discussing Sanford's potential for fast-paced economic growth.

"A lot of young families see Sanford as a diamond in the rough," Jones said. "Maybe as

businesses and industries start to see younger commissioners, that could make a difference. We need to develop our tax base, and bring in high quality jobs."

City budget sessions begin next week. Lessard and Jones said they want to find money within the budget to increase funding for the police and fire departments.

"I'm as excited as the day I was elected," Lessard said. "We've got a new team in place, and police and fire issues are going to be at the forefront."

Jones said he hopes a younger presence on the commission will encourage more young people to move into the city.

"Brady and I can relate to young people on a different level than commissioners in their 40's and 50's can," Jones said. "We're experiencing a lot of new growth in the city, with younger families moving in."

Change is coming for the commission. Dale's term as mayor expires next year, as will the terms of commissioners

Velma Williams and Lessard. Dale, 52, is not seeking a second term.

Lessard is considering running for mayor, although he said he is leaning toward remaining as commissioner. Williams, 58, is undecided about seeking a second term, although she also said she probably will run.

Each of the members of the commission commented on a coming changing of the guard after Jones was sworn in. Williams said the younger generation assuming leadership is "inevitable."

Meanwhile, Whitey Eckstein, 55, who has been on the commission since 1986, said he is pleased to see people in their 20's assuming leadership in the city.

"The city appears to be in good hands," Eckstein said. "I think this sets an example for other young people to come on board. Obviously, his views turned voters on in his district who are a lot older than he is."

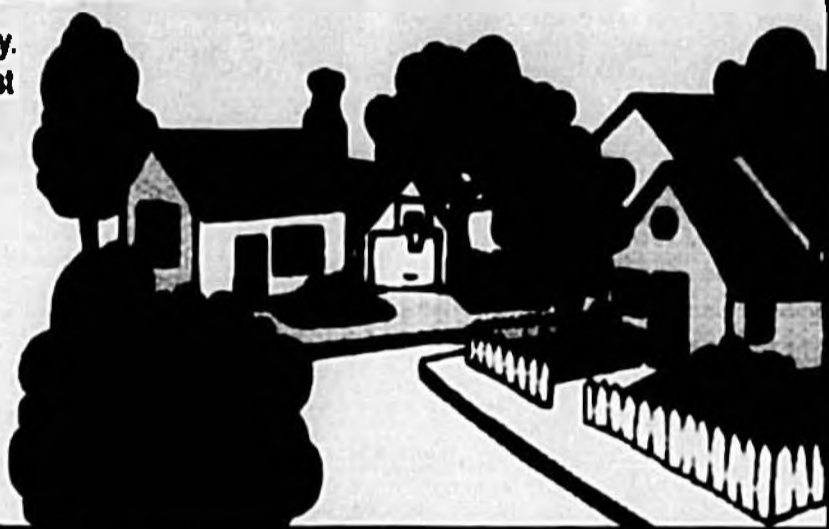

# Fireworks on the Fourth of July are best enjoyed from a distance

**DEAR ABBY:** Each year on the Fourth of July, thousands of adults and children are seriously injured by fireworks. Many burns and injuries affect eyesight, permanently damaging, and in some cases, blinding the victims. Because of this, the American Optometric Association has joined the Millennium Fireworks Safety Partners, a coalition of 35 national organizations, in urging people to avoid private fireworks and instead enjoy professional displays.

and about 75 percent were males. Sparklers are the second most frequent cause of fireworks injuries that result in trips to the emergency room. In addition to potential burns, a sparkler can literally "poke someone's eye out."

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), an estimated 20 percent to 25 percent of fireworks injuries are to the eyes. In a special study of fireworks-related injuries covering the period June 23 to July 23, 1999, CPSC reports that there were 6,300 emergency room-treated injuries, most involving fireworks, rockets and sparklers. Forty percent of the victims were under 15 years of age.

Seminole County has agreed to fund \$400,000 over 10 years, and \$50,000 in private funding has been donated. Sanford has allocated up to \$500,000 for the project, in addition to the loan. Meanwhile, Sanford is looking into expanded parking at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium. Mayor Larry Dale said the city is holding discussions with the Seminole County School Board regarding ways to expand parking at the

stadium. There is currently only room for 133 on-site parking spaces.

Built in 1951 to replace old Municipal Stadium once located nearby, renovations to Sanford Memorial Stadium will cost an estimated \$1.8 million.

The New York Giants trained in Sanford from 1948 to 1951, then relocated spring facilities to Arizona when the franchise moved to San Francisco.

In order to increase activity near the stadium, a four field

youth sports complex is being constructed at Chase Park, adjacent to the stadium. The complex is expected to be ready for use later this summer.

The four lighted fields at the complex will each have 200-foot fences. There will also be a service building with concessions, restrooms, and an area for administration and score keepers.

County's Fiscal Services Department, managed by Cindy Hall.

The county's new budget takes into account funding for a new Criminal Justice Center, the second year of paving all county-maintained unpaved roads, critical repairs to the county jail renovation of the courthouse and renovation of the County Museum.

It also includes continued implementation of the 1-cent Sales Tax in the amount of \$54,000,000 for major road programs as well as \$2,270,000 in proposed minor road improvements.

The county plans a 22 million gallon per day expansion of the Consumers Water Plant in the southwest area of the county. There is also an advancement of library collections for a fourth year toward the goal of 1.5 books per capita.

County Manager Kevin Grace said that the county plans to add 19 more positions under the Board of County

Commissioners, four for the Sheriff's Office and one for the Circuit Court. The total increase in personnel of 24 positions represents a one percent increase to the total county employee base.

Grace said the 8.4 percent increase in the tax base represents the fourth consecutive year of growth in excess of 6 percent. "This growth in the tax base," he said, "allows the county to meet the many needs of the community while maintaining stable tax rates."

The county will conduct budget work sessions on July 19, 20 and 21 at the County Services Building. These meetings are open to the public and will also be televised on SC-TV.

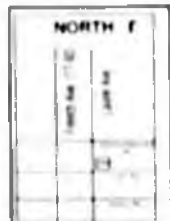

## Celebrate the Fourth with fireworks, not firewater reminds BoatU.S.

ALEXANDRIA, VA. - Drinking and boating kill more people during the Fourth of July weekend than any other weekend of the year, according to BoatU.S., the nation's largest organization of recreational boaters.

BoatU.S. estimates as many as 60 people will die on the nation's waterways over the four-day July 4th holiday.

"People go boating to forget their cares, but sometimes they also leave their common sense behind," said Ruth Wood, director of the BoatU.S. Foundation.

"Drinking while boating can be as dangerous as drinking and driving. Even though there are far less boats on the water than cars on the highway, and most boats are slower than most cars, it's just as important not to mix alcohol and boating as it is to avoid alcohol while driving."

Boaters need to be aware of two specific problems caused by boozing while boating:

- First, because of the combination of prolonged exposure to the sun, wind, noise, vibration and boat motion on the water, "boaters fatigue" can slow reaction time almost as much as if a boater were legally drunk. Drinking alcohol makes this "boaters fatigue" much worse, and one beer on the water can affect someone the way three or four beers would on land.

- Second, naming a "designated driver" doesn't work well afloat. Studies by the American Medical Association and BoatU.S. Marine Insurance have found that only 20% of the alcohol-related boating deaths are caused by drunk drivers.

Almost half the fatalities happen when the vessels are not even underway - either anchored or at the dock. Passengers don't wear seat belts on boats. If they've had too much to drink, they may - among other things - fall off the boat, stumble into open hatches, or drown while swimming.

Passengers need to remain aware of their surroundings and practice the same safety measures as the boat driver.

Like driving while intoxicated, boating while intoxicated is illegal. The U.S. Coast Guard enforces federal law, which sets a blood alco-

DAYTONA BEACH - It looks as if it will be "Dale Tuna" again as Bud Pole Qualifying for the Pepsi 400 concluded Thursday night at Daytona International Speedway.

Dale Jarrett, defending Pepsi 400 champion and February's winner of the Daytona 500, turned in a fast lap of 187.547 mph to lead the field and set the pace for Saturday's race.

Once again, Jarrett's teammate Ricky Rudd, driver of the No. 28 Texaco Havoline Ford Taurus, turned in the second fastest lap at 187.122 mph. Rudd started from the front row in his last trip around the 2.5 mile tri-oval in the Daytona 500.

"I hope I stay up front a little longer this time," said Rudd.

Pole-sitter Jarrett and his team came to Daytona facing the challenge of fielding a car as spectacular as the dominant Ford Taurus that won the Daytona 500 and now holds court in Daytona USA.

"If the fans go over and look at that car in Daytona USA (2000 Daytona 500 winning car), they can almost see a copy of this car," said Jarrett. "We did everything we could to make it a little bit better. We're really pleased here right now, and looking forward to getting three in a row here on Saturday night."

A June 13-14 test session at Daytona may have paid off for Jarrett, Rudd and Nadeau.

During the test, a confident Jarrett tested one new car, while Rudd and Nadeau each tested a new car and a proven racing machine. Nadeau will start Saturday's race under the lights from the eighth position.
