DRINKING LIQUOR CANNOT BE MADE OR SOLD IN STATE

Landis Ruling Comes On Heels Of Action At West Palm Beach

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Additional testimony is not required for Governor Landis to sell medicinal, scientific or industrial alcohol within the limits of the state.

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WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The assertion that only one in 100 of the 3,000,000 employees wearing the blue eagle is a rate violator was made yesterday by NRA as it arranged for the voluntary re-employment agreement into next year.
