

U.S. Aircraft, Crews May Go To Saudi Arabia

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter is considering sending highly sophisticated communications aircraft and crews to Saudi Arabia for possible use in the Persian Gulf area.

But a Pentagon official Monday night said "no final decision has been made" on whether to dispatch the Air Force Airborne Warning and Control System airplanes to Saudi Arabia.

The planes, known as AWACS, are highly sophisticated airborne communications and control systems that can coordinate fighter and bomber plane activity and information on hostile aircraft and defenses, and act as combat control centers. Such planes are now deployed in Egypt, and deployment to Saudi Arabia would leave open the possibility of using fighter aircraft to protect the Strait of Hormuz through which tankers pass with vital oil supplies to the West.

VATICAN CITY (UPI) - Two American bishops told a Vatican meeting that 80 percent of Roman Catholic women in the United States use contraceptives and the church must modernize its methods of teaching doctrines on birth control. The bishops made their comments Monday during the second working day of the Fifth World Synod of

Bishops meeting in the Vatican to discuss the problems of the modern Christian family. Cardinal John Quinn of San Francisco said the problem of birth control was "immense" for the church and rejection of its teachings on the subject was

World Bank May Expand Aid

-WASHINGTON (UPI) - The World Bank and International Monetary Fund began their 35th joint annual meeting today with a proposal for expanded aid to developing countries above planned levels for the next few years.

SEATTLE (UPI) - The number of Cuban refugees fasting to protest detention at McNeil Island federal penitentiary dropped to seven today when 54 others accepted a breakfast of coffee and sweetrolls, said

The protest began Thursday when 23 Cubans sat in one cell and refused to eat. By late Sunday, 61 of the 244 Cubans held at the island prison had crowded into five cells, refusing to budge or eat food, demanding that the Immigration and Naturalization Service speed up hearings on their behalf, said Grey.

4 Face Smuggling Charges

NEW YORK (UPI) - Four people arrested aboard a freighter carrying 30 tons of marijuana will be the first to face prosecution under a new federal law, authorities say.

The three men and one woman were charged with narcotics violations Monday under the law, which is designed to discourage the increasing use of ships in narcotics smuggling, federal authorities in New York said. Three others, British citizens, were turned over to authorities in Panama, where the ship was registered

The law - which forbids a U.S. citizen aboard a ship at sea to possess an illegal drug with intent to sell it carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$15,000 fine.

New Hepatitis Vaccine To Be Available In Year

NEW YORK (UPI) - The first effective hepatitis vaccine won't be available for general use for at least a year and first supplies will go to those with the highest risk of exposure dentists, surgeons, kidney dialysis patients and hospital

Dr. Wolf Szmuness, head of the New York Blood Center epidemiology laboratory, Monday announced the new, and as yet unlicensed, vaccine was found to be 96 percent effective against liver infection in field trials with male homosexual

volunteers over a six-month period. "The development of this vaccine has been referred to as a milestone, a breakthrough," said Dr. Aaron Kellner, president of the blood center. "Hepatitis B infection is one of the world's

major public health problems." Hepatitis B - also known as serum hepatitis - has long been linked to blood transfusions, but also is spread by intimate contact. Between 80,000 and 100,000 new cases occur in the United States each year, causing several thousand deaths. Merck Institute for Therapcutic Research of West Point, Pa., developer of the new hepatitis B vaccine, is gearing up for mass production and Szmuness said he expected it would be available "to the public at large in a year."

The new vaccine is made from particles of the hepatitis virus, extracted by a complicated process that includes boiling blood from virus carriers, said Dr. Morris Hilleman, director of virus and cell biology research at the Merck Institute. No price has been set, but Hilleman said he expects the vaccine to cost considerably more than measles or influenza vaccines - due to its more complicated manufacturing pro-

The process of manufacturing and testing, in fact, spans 65 weeks and involves "an intricacy unparalleled in the history of vaccine production," a Merck spokesman said. The first to receive the vaccine will be doctors, surgeons, ientists, nurses, medical laboratory technicians and blood bank personnel - those, who researchers say, run a high risk of exposure to the virus.

Man On Plane Nears Record REYKJAVIK, Iceland (UPI) - Jaromir Wagner came in on a wing and a prayer - literally. He landed in Iceland, standing on the wing of his aircraft to end a six-hour flight

across a stretch of the Atlantic. "I just love risks," the 41-year-old Czech-born daredevil told a crowd of Icelanders as he landed Monday in Reykjavik on the third stop of his attempt to cross the Atlantic standing on the wing of his plane. Keeping his balance with the aid of straps and a handlebar, Wagner and his twin-engine De Havilland Islander

plane landed after a six-hour flight from the Faroe Islands. 123 Death Row Inmates Hurt By Reports: Suit

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) - The Florida Supreme Court blocked the executions of two killers next week to consider a massive lawsuit demanding it vacate 123 death sentences because the high court unconstitutionally used secret reports. A coalition of capital punishment opponents from around the country filed suit Monday, claiming the seven Supreme Court justices violated the constitutional rights of death row inmates by reviewing psychiatric reports and other documents defense lawyers never saw and had no chance to challenge.

A few hours after the suit was filed, the court stayed the Oct. 8 executions of Carl Ray Songer, who killed a Florida Highway Patrol trooper at Crystal River in 1977, and Lenson Hargrave, who murdered a convenience store clerk in Miami. The coalition, in its suit, claimed the court's practice of onsidering secret documents had "tainted" Florida's capi punishment law, making it no longer acceptable to the U.S.



.The word from the ninth session of the UN Law of the Sea Conference, just ended at Geneva, is the most hopeful to date. Unless something comes unstuck, a treaty will be ready for signing by 163 participating nations at a session next spring in

Elliott Richardson, the latest to serve as chief U.S. negotiator at the conference, thinks the signing will be the most significant single development for the rule of law since the United Nations itself was founded. While that may be overstating the case, the number of agreements reached so far dealing with fishing, rights of passage and other issues is certainly impressive.

The agreement which seems to signal clear sailing from now on was reached last summer at Geneva. It calls for a complex voting formula for sharing power in the International Seabed Authority which will control development of mineral resources on the ocean floor. This was a tough issue, since only the advanced industrial nations have the capital and technology to conduct undersea mining ventures, while the poorer countries can argue - under the common heritage concept - that they deserve a piece of



Ali Keeps Talking, Holmes Under Cover National League Roundup

says this is the end of the line and the next minute he's screaming about being champion until 1985, defending the crown two times a year for the next four years. Larry Holmes, who was thumbed in the left eye during a sparring session Sunday, failed to appear at a scheduled news conference or training session Monday and said he didn't want to talk to any reporters until after the fight. On the surface, then, it appears Ali is a bit loony and Holmes' eye injury is more serious than he or his handlers are willing to

admit, But, in all liklihood Ali's mind is as sound as it ever was and Holmes' left eye isn't a big deal at all. Throw in a last-minute lawsuit that threatens to halt the entire thing, more than 600 writers and broadcasters scrambling to cover the story, put it all in a city where people pay for the right to lose their money, you have the scene: Holmes, 30, the World Boxing Council heavyweight champion with a 35-0 record, against Ali, the legendary three-time champion, Thursday night at Caesars Palace.

Monday, Ali, with three losses in 59 fights, shadowboxed before about 3,000 fans who paid \$3 each for the performance. "This will be a total mismatch," he bellowed while wiping the rivers of sweat from his trim, 218-pound body. "Holmes won't win a round. It won't even be close. He'll look slow and he'll look awful.
