On the eve of Mother's Day, 82-year-old Ellen Falk of Sanford was telling how her family grew. "Momma was first," she said. "Then, Joe, Mary, Sarah, Francis, Pauline, Margaret, Charles, George, Tom, Bernadette, Edwin, Vincent, Rose, Dorothy and Ann. Ann's the baby." "Sixteen children?" "Yes, 16 children," Falk said, smiling. "And

Road warriors

County gears for year 2000; interchange to I-4 is all go

As Seminole County turns to the 21st Century, it also will turn on and off an essentially needed \$20 million interchange at Interstate 4 and County Road 16A - a project that nearly drove area developers and government officials to their wits end.

Our development plan to increase the corporate tax base would have come to a standstill if the interchange was lost, said Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris.

Plans are firm, however, to begin construction on the interchange in early 1998 following a commitment this month by the state Department of Transportation to contribute \$3.5 million.

The DOT money accompanies \$11.2 million in federal funds authorized in 1988 and \$5.8 million from local government and private contributions (dedication and right of way). The federal funds were in jeopardy unless the construction was not under way by January.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has identified the 38-year-old woman as Myrtle Edith Rexroad, whose last known permanent address was in Parkersburg, West Virginia.

They know nothing about her and have few clues as to why she was in our area at the time of her death.

The identification was made with the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), a spokesman for the sheriff's office said. A set of fingerprints were taken and she was identified through those.

Volusia County officials notified Rexroad's next of kin on Friday afternoon before releasing information about her to the

Renovation: Saving the past for the future

Citing some special historic buildings

SANFORD - The Sanford Historic Trust has already awarded its annual banners for excellence in historic preservation in the downtown historic district. And the mayor in honor of National Preservation Week will choose next weekend some beautiful examples of renovation from those nominated.

Many residents, however, hoped to see even more special awards, especially for structures that have shown a dramatic change in the past year.

The homes the Trust has selected are gorgeous and painstakingly restored to their original splendor. Most have been that way for several years.

Each day, however, another building in the historic district is rescued from the neglect that has plagued the area for decades.

Paint is splashed on the exteriors, rotting wood is replaced, little touches are added, landscaping is planned and executed. Suddenly, an eyesore is a beautiful addition to the neighborhood.

With the help of several of our readers and from former city commissioner Lon Howell, who represented the district for eight years, we found

Sanford celebrates National Preservation Week

SANFORD - Not just here in Sanford, but all across the country, people are celebrating the preservation of old homes and other buildings for posterity.

This is National Preservation Week, being celebrated here by

proclamation of Mayor Larry Dale and the city commission.

In addition, Sanford is celebrating her 120th birthday so the city is trying to personalize the national event by spotlighting area points of interest, including the Seminole County Student Museum.

One event, scheduled for the final day of Preservation Week, has

Mayor Dale handing out what he calls the Annual Mayor's Award for recognition of the outstanding historic preservation efforts. This will be both commercial and residential.

On May 17 at Park on Park at 2 p.m., the mayor will announce the winner in each category and present an appropriate plaque to the winners.

Mother's Day card that reads: "God Bless Grandma from her head to her toes."

David Falk helped his grandmother do her morning exercises and then he and Danielle listened attentively as she talked about how God had blessed her with so much love. "It's God's intent for us to have this big a family," she said. "His intent for all these lives. I thank him each day."

Ellen Falk (nee Servattus), the second of eight in her family, was a 21-year-old nurse when she fell in love with Carl Falk, a soft drink manufacturer (Falk's Flavor Spot came in 26 varieties) in Utica, N.Y. She said that her husband, to whom she was married 50 years when he passed away, agreed to wait two years after he proposed marriage.

"I asked him to wait until I could become the best nurse possible," she said. "Of course, he granted my wish."

Carl and Ellen became man and wife and started a little family of their own just after she turned 23. And along came Monica, Joe, Mary, Sarah, Francis, Pauline, Margaret, Charles, George, Tom, Bernadette, Edwin, Vincent, Rose, Dorothy, Ann, Ann, the baby. Sixteen children in 20 years. There were four miscarriages.

"When we were first married, I remember a nurse at the hospital where I worked asking me if we intended having children," Ellen Falk said. "Sure, I do. A

dozen or more," I told her, half kidding."

Vincent, the 13th of the Falks, says the doctor didn't charge for No. 12, his brother Edwin. "My parents had to pay for me and all the rest."

He said the boys had bunk beds, scrapped occasionally but had a blast for the most part. He remembers everyone roller skating on Tuesdays and ice skating in the winter. "We lived on the top of the hill and went to a Catholic church at the foot of the hill. We prayed a lot of Rosaries. As you can imagine, there was never a dull moment."

"My mom has always lived for her children and now all her grandchildren," Vincent Falk said. "She never asked for other niceties. Her family was what her life has been about. She's quite a woman."

Ellen Falk's keen eyes beam as she talks about her children and about their families. "Mary has 14 children," she said. "Rose has 12, Bernadette has 11, Sarah has nine and Francis has nine. Ann has five, Rose's latest, Noah, is one-year-old. I love that name. Noah. All Rose's children have Biblical names."

A few days ago, Falk said she was talking on the telephone to a grandson whom everyone calls "Abe." Falk said when she called him, "Abraham" he filled with pride, and thanked her.

"I have no special Mother's Day wish," Falk said Friday. "God has given me all I want."

A daughter and a son talk about their special moms

There are mothers of all descriptions, some who kiss, some who scold - most who kiss and scold.

Children have no choice, of course.

Christy Lambert, a judicial clerk at the Sanford Courthouse, is thankful for the mother who brought her into the world - Pinecrest Elementary School teacher's aide, Linda Myers.

"I can only thank God that He has given me the privilege to be her daughter and to appreciate all the sacrifices she has made for me and others," Lambert said.

It was extremely difficult when her mother and stepfather divorced when she was 12 years old, Lambert said. "I can still see the weariness on my mother's face as she struggled not only to keep herself together, but also to reassure me that I was very much loved and secure."

Lambert said that she knows she put her mother through some of the "most hurtful years of her life," and now that she is older realizes "how she dealt single-handedly with the problems it sometimes takes two parents to solve."

Bob Howe, the president of the Optimists Club of Sanford, is equally grateful to his mother - Helen (Nunemaker) Howe. "My mom was 16 when she

married - and you know what they say about anyone who gets married that young," Howe said.

"They say it will never work. Well, my mom and dad were together almost 60 years when he passed away."

"They had five children. I came along when my mom was 17 years old. My sister Marilyn was born 17 months later and my brother Doug four years later. Mom had two more children later - my sister Debbie was born when I was a senior in high school. And after that came Carole - 20 years after I was born."

"Mom was raising children for 40 consecutive years, and loving every minute of it. Her life centered around us."

Helen Howe, who has Alzheimer's disease, lives with her youngest daughter in Jupiter. "I see her often but sometimes she won't remember," Bob Howe said. "I will treasure her always. No, she didn't marry too young."

Remembering moms this weekend

Here is the historical look at Sunday and Monday, May 11 and 12. As if you don't know by now, Sunday is Mothers' Day. It has been declared as such by Presidential Proclamation for the second Sunday in May. It was first observed in 1907 at the request of Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia, who asked her church to hold service in memory of all mothers, on the anniversary of her mother's death. The tradition grew and expanded, and was formally established through an official congressional proclamation issued on May 8, 1914.

Here's an observance I like. Sunday is "Eat What you Want Day." This is sponsored by the Wellness Permission League in Mt. Gretna, Pa., and is supposed to be one day during which you can ignore or again/off-again diets.

As for the weekly observances, Sunday begins Kiwanis Prayer Week, Jewish Heritage Week, Girls Incorporated Week, Alcohol and other drug-related Birth Defects Week, National Nursing Home Week, National Police Week, National Transportation Week and Universal Family Week.

Sunday is the anniversary of the beginning of the battle of Hamburger Hill during the Vietnam war in 1969. U.S. troops were ordered, time after time, day after day, to take Dong Ap Bia mountain. The attempt lasted for 10 days, often with bloody hand-to-hand combat. We lost many of our men. Then, after securing the objective,

American military leaders suddenly decided they didn't need it and abandoned it immediately which is considered one of the sore points in the war. The North Vietnamese immediately took it back.

Taking a look at Monday, May 12 begins National Salvation Army Week, and National Sexual Harassment Awareness Week.

A couple of Civil War battles were held. On May 11, 1864, it was the Battle of Yellow Tavern near Richmond. That's when Confederate General J.E.B. Stuart was mortally wounded.

On May 12, 1864, it was the Battle of Spotsylvania (Va.), pitting General U.S. Grant against Gen. R.E. Lee. A total of 12,000 lives were lost, with Lee finally pulling back his troops in the middle of the night.

In historical birthdays, Irving Berlin was born May 11, 1888. Salvador Dali was born May 11, 1904; dancer Martha Graham was born May 11, 1894.

For present birthdays, actor Denver Pyle turns 77 Sunday and actor Mort Sahl turns 70 on

Sunday.

Monday, composer Burt Bacharach turns 68, baseball manager and coach Yogi Berra will be 72; actor Bruce Boxleitner is 46, comedian George Carlin turns 60, actor Emilio Estevez turns 35, actress Katherine Hepburn will be 90, journalist Howard K. Smith is 83.

And finally, for anyone heading for New York City, Monday, May 12, marks the 101st anniversary of a law enacted at the request of the city's Department of Health. For 101 years now, it has been illegal to spit on sidewalks in New York.

And as of this weekend, it's 9-DTMY.

Have a Happy Mothers' Day and an enjoyable weekend, one and all.

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New moms can take to heart

Keep me from interrupting them, talking back to them and contradicting them. Make me as courteous to them as I would have them be to me. Give me the courage to confess my sins against my children and ask their forgiveness when I know

that I have done wrong.
May I not vainly hurt the feelings of my children. Forbid that I should laugh at their mistakes or resort to shame and ridicule as punishment. Let me not tempt a child to lie or steal. So guide me that I may demonstrate by all I say and do that honesty produces happiness.
Reduce, I pray, the meanness in me. May I cease to nag, and when I am out of sorts, help me, Oh Lord, to hold my tongue. Bind me to the little errors of my children and help

me to see the good things that they do. Give me a ready word for honest praise.

Help me to treat my children as those of their own age, but let me not exact of them the judgments and conventions of adults. Allow me not to rob them of the opportunity to wait upon themselves, to think to choose, and to make their own decisions.

Forbid that I should ever punish them for my selfish satisfaction. May I grant them all their wishes that are reasonable and have the courage always to withhold a privilege which I know will do them harm.

Make me so fair and just, so considerate and companionable to my children that they will have genuine esteem for me. Fit me to be loved and imitated by my children. With all thy gifts, God, do give me calmness and poise and self-control.

Readers, I am often asked the significance of wearing a red carnation on Mother's Day. A

red carnation is worn to signify that one's mother is living. A white carnation signifies that one's mother is deceased.

There should also be an identifying flower worn by those mothers who chose motherhood by rearing a foster child or step-child.

And a special place in heaven awaits those mothers who choose a physically or mentally challenged child, knowing that he or she has not only special needs but also requires a superabundance of love, understanding and patience.

CONFIDENTIAL TO ANYONE FOR WHOM IT IS NOT YET TOO LATE: The best time period of a mother's advice is anywhere from one week to 50 years. Losing one's mother before having thanked her for the many precious things she taught you is one of life's greatest tragedies.

Sharing memories of Sanford's USO

A few months ago, I received a large packet of materials from Mrs. Mary Washburn, former Sanford resident now living in Sarasota. Mrs. Washburn was the executive director of the Sanford USO for five years, 1963-68, and the majority of the information pertained to that. Thanks to her, I can give you a little history of a very important organization that was in Sanford for many years. And I have received permission from her to donate these materials to the Sanford Museum as I'm sure several of you would be interested in learning more.

The United Services Organization (USO), a uniquely American institution, was officially born February 4, 1941. Soon afterwards, USO clubs began springing up all over the country. The clubs were created to provide civilian facilities in towns adjacent to military posts where service men and women could go after duty hours. Those agencies who drew together to form the USO were the YMCA, the YWCA, National Catholic Community Service, National Jewish Welfare Board and the Salvation Army.

Entertainers joined the cause and later carried live entertainment all over the world.

The USO nearly dissolved after World War II, but the war in Korea brought it back. When the USO celebrated its 25th anniversary in 1966, there were clubs in 126 United States communities and 37 points overseas.

The Sanford USO was located at the corner of First Street and Sanford Avenue; the Sanford Chamber of Commerce now owns and occupies the building.

The November 3, 1944, edition of the Sanly describes the Sanford USO building as one of the favorite spots for the men and women of the Naval Air Station. The structure was built in 1943 at a cost of \$26,000 and was dedicated November 3, 1944. The average monthly attendance in 1944 was more than 13,000. A snack bar, library, reading room,

dance hall, play rooms, showers and badminton courts were part of the facilities offered.

According to Washburn, during her administration, organized play was not the main attraction at the USO. The boys usually wanted a quiet time and perhaps to take part in the many activities offered. Some things available were ping pong, pool, cards, a piano, TV, records, games, badminton, football, croquet, magazines, sewing equipment, writing materials, first aid kits and shaving gear. There were also the special events such as dances, dying 12 dozen eggs at Easter time and enjoying an Easter ham supper.

There were various short newspaper articles, some with pictures, included in the packet and most were undated. They do, however, give a glimpse of some of the activities of the Sanford USO.

Two Sanford mothers, with sons stationed overseas, won a contest and were presented with "Hi, Mom" telephone calls from the USO. These were Mrs. T.G. Albert and Mrs. Dorothy Russell.

The Chamber of Commerce Coffee Club paid homage to the local USO in observance of USO month at a meeting. There is a picture of Kiwanis President, Gordon Meyer, serving orange juice to Mary Washburn and Elyse Gassman, USO hostesses.

There is a picture of "Mom" Washburn checking over a unique tree she had arranged for Easter week-end. The tree was decorated with halves of eggshells in which were glued pieces of greeting cards, tinsel and other materials for a striking display.

Mrs. Washburn presented to the Sanford library, in behalf of the USO, six books entitled *Ten Secrets of Bowling* by Don Carter, world bowling champion. Mrs. Sarah King, head librarian, accepted the books.

It was announced that junior hostesses were needed to assist at the USO on week-ends. Their duties would be to dish out southern hospitality to the servicemen.

Mrs. Washburn was hostess to a dinner honoring junior hostesses Sandi Davis and Marcia Coleman who received 100 hour pins and Linda Brown who received a 300 hour pin.

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EDITORIAL

Her day

Everyone has or had a mother. This Sunday is supposed to be their day, or rather, our day in which we are to show our appreciation.

Appreciation however, is not always shown. We have all heard "you never call, you never write." It's a fact, some mothers are being ignored, even on this day of observance.

During one previous Mother's Day, we recall the crime reports in the following day's *Sanford Herald* told of several cases of domestic violence, where people physically beat their mothers. It shows how sick some people in our society truly are.

In one particular situation, the violence actually erupted because of an argument over a Mother's Day gift, or lack of one.

We suspect that most mothers may have "accidentally" reminded their offspring of the event. There are others however, who may have already left us. That should be no reason for ignoring them. The very first Mother's Day was a church sermon which a woman had requested on the anniversary of her mother's death.

Mom, if you only taught me Polish

Charlotte Laura Zveare had rheumatic fever as a child and was severely injured in an automobile accident when she was 19. Doctors told her she probably would not walk again and that she could not have children.

My mother did both. She was an auburn-haired charmer of 27 in 1930 when she married my dad, U.S. Marine Corporal Odes White. They honeymooned for 10 years before their one and only child arrived somewhat as a surprise in 1940.

My mother's parents - Stanley and Charlotte Zveare were natives of Poland. Mom, the second of five Zveare children, was born in Cambridge, Mass. - the closest I ever came to Harvard.

It upset me that my grandmother (Babcia) and mother would talk Polish when they didn't want me to know what they were saying. Did the same to my dad, who was from Indiana. I think he knew what they were saying and didn't mind too much.

We lived in a two-story, red brick home in Arlington, Va., a suburb of Washington, D.C. My father had left the Marines and joined the White House Police Force to guard President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

My mother had her hands full with me. I remember wonderful walks with her through Lubber Run Park. It was war time, but the lone fears I had were during the blackouts each night. Each of our windows had black curtains. Washington slept without its light in the early 1940s.

Often, my mother read stories to me, and taught me how to read and write. She was the one who helped me with most of my homework, unless it was arithmetic. That's where my dad came in. He was very proficient at math. Both of them were very patient with me, and strict when they had to be. I wasn't the easiest kid to understand. As I do today, I liked to escape to dreamland.

My mother was a wonderful cook. We ate many Polish dishes. And then there were her pies - apple, cherry and lemon meringue. She would make those for me and pumpkin pie for my dad. We ate at a small kitchen table. Many dinners were just for my mother and me because my dad had the 4 o'clock-midnight shift at the White House.

On Fridays, my mother used to take a bus to downtown D.C. to go shopping. Friday was bargain day. She almost always shopped for clothes for me. We didn't have a lot but we had enough. When I was eight or nine my mother began buying me a *Sporting News* baseball paper each Friday she was downtown. And one day, she brought home a handsome first baseman's mitt she got on sale for \$8 - a lot of money in 1949.

My mom didn't know a thing about baseball, but encouraged me to play ball with my cousin and the kids in the neighborhood. She lovingly watched me play imaginary games by throwing a rubber ball against the house and catching it hundreds of times each day.

And when I left home to join the Navy in 1957, my mom became a baseball fan, listening each night on the radio to Washington Senators ballgames. She would write letters to me on my ship in the Mediterranean, telling me how that Roy Sievers had hit another home run or that Camilo Pascual had pitched a shutout. It wasn't baseball she loved, of course - it was her son. That's why she became a baseball fan - to be close to me when I was thousands of miles away.

When I came home, my mother went to an Opening Day game. And throughout the 1960s when I began to travel and write about the Senators, my mom never missed a game on radio or TV. She would get quite upset when Frank Howard struck out, which he did frequently. But when Frank hit a home run, she cheered to high heaven.

My mom and I played Canasta when I was still a kid, and later she enjoyed playing Scrabble. We'd have some very close matches. She was a good crossword player and a natural at Scrabble. We'd play for keeps and we'd argue about things, too. Argued more than we should have but my mother always expected more of me. She fumed, too, that if I didn't stand or sit properly, I would have curvature of the spine.

She was delighted when I brought home the girl I would marry in 1967 and she thrilled when our boys - Todd and Jason - were born in 1968 and 1971. She wasn't happy that we named our second son, Jason. She told us that wasn't much of a name, that she would never like it. But she loved Jason and the last time I saw my mother alive, Jason was in her arms in her bed. She died the next morning. That was 25 years ago.

I see my mother in faded photographs, and I sense her guarding over me each day. I also hear her saying, "Don't worry, my son the writer. Don't worry."

One of the greatest aspects of doing this column is the fabulous mail we get. Several weeks ago one of the first letter's we received was from a soft spoken lady named Nancy M. Lodge. In that very moving letter, Ms. Lodge told of her courageous young son Michael. Not long after, I interviewed Ms. Lodge.

Michael, says his mother, is a very intelligent and curious 10-year-old boy whose feet and right leg are paralyzed from a tumor located inside his spinal cord. This tumor was noticed around 2 years ago. It was removed at that time and was found to be non-malignant.

Michael also wears a long leg brace on his right leg and a short leg brace on e left, using crutches to walk. Michael also uses a wheelchair for long distances. A quiet and strong-willed young man, Michael tries not to let any of this affect his dauntless determination.

Michael's first of two operations was in September, 1995. His second operation was in March, 1996, but this doesn't stop him from enjoying his favorite hobbies. These hobbies include: playing chess and poker (games his mother taught him while he was in the hospital), computer games (he wants to study computers) and even basketball.

Michael was also runner-up in the Volusia County Osteen Elementary School Spelling Bee and went on to the County finals with the fifth grade winner. Last year, Michael even got to go to the "Legendary" North Pole with the Walt Disney World Cancer Institute.

Michael's Mother (Nancy) works for the University of Florida's County Extension in Seminole County's Cooperative Service Institute for Food and Agricultural Sciences. Ms. Lodge says that everyone at her job is very supportive of her.

Nancy's faith and belief also help her make it through each day. She prays each day and night for a miracle. Another great source of strength for Michael and Nancy is Nancy's mother Ethel Mae Whidden of Osteen. As a single mother, Nancy says she and Michael never would have gotten along these last couple of years without her mother Ethel.

Caring for Michael has brought about many concerns of the disabled for Nancy. These concerns include the availability of services and equipment for the disabled along with their sometimes prohibiting costs and the mainstreaming of children back into public schools with the peer and scholastic pressures of

Light rail numbers don't add up

Central Floridians need to hear the truth about the proposed Light Rail system. In this time of proposed tax cuts, we find our government at odds with itself by perpetuating a huge, on-going, tax burden for the taxpayers of Central Florida. This is a tax that is unnecessary. The fundamental problem is a lack of vision and a failure to look to see if it all "ADDS UP!"

There are a great number of supporters for a Mass Transit System. I am of them, but not this system. Why? Because the numbers don't add up and the system is far out of date. It is a system, by track, much like the one Jesse James and his brother, Frank, robbed in the 1800's. Think about it!

I can assure you that people, all of us, will gladly leave our cars at home the day we have a system in place which will take us to work faster and cheaper than driving our cars.

These are the facts-light rail systems in the U.S. do not pay for themselves. They usually run at a deficit of 60 percent more or less. Who pays the difference? You do! Who rides these systems? Not many, and I would bet that you will not find any of those people promoting the system ever riding it. The reason is simple. These systems are not designed for the masses. The name "Mass Transportation" doesn't mean what it says. In order to have a true Mass Transit System you have to design a system that will appeal to the "MASSES." How do you do that? First you study the issue. You find out the needs of the people, which is to get to places fast and cheaply. Then you design a system which will meet those needs. I can assure you that people, all of us, will gladly leave our cars at home the day we have a system in place which will take us to work faster and cheaper than driving our cars.

The systems today, except for some long distance systems, do not even approach the needs of the MASSES. For one, will never ride the systems being proposed. It is a restoration of the past that should have been junked long ago. And, I venture to say that you won't find many others using it either, but you are going to pay dearly. You are going to pay the fare whether you ride the Light Rail system or use your car. You'll be paying for both in the form of taxes.

Now, let's discuss the math. First, there will be six multi-cars carrying up to 230 people each at peak hours. There are 70 seats, 160 people will be standing. Imagine at rush hour 230 passengers packed into these cars in 90 degree temperatures. There is air conditioning, but since these cars will stop at each station, doors will open at every mile. Do you believe that any air conditioning system will keep you cool and comfortable under such conditions?

What about speed? If you are using multi-cars stopping every mile, you know that the speed is not going to be much more than twenty miles an hour, or somewhere close to that, because of the need to slow down and then accelerate. You will be stopping, starting, standing, sweating, waiting, and not riding in comfort-not a pretty picture.

Several weeks ago, we had been told by the office of Parsons and Brinckerhoff that they anticipated a ridership of 55,000 people a day, using six cars at rush hour with service every 15 minutes. We were also told that they will use less cars during off-peak hours with service every 45 minutes to 1 hour. In using these figures, we found 55,000 to be an impossibility.

A recent newspaper article stated a lower ridership of 33,000 a day or 12 million people a year, which is still an impossibility. Lynx claims a ridership of 42,700 people a day. Now, we can assume that some passengers now using the Lynx bus system might switch to the Light Rail system which, in effect, would decrease the ridership and revenue of the Lynx system, already in deficit.



Think about this, Seminole County

Let's discuss the cost of building the "Light Rail". The initial cost is estimated at \$850 million for 25 miles from Sea World to State Rd. 434 in Seminole County. But, hold on, because the first phase will only be from downtown Orlando to Sea World at which time, we understand, that a one cent tax will be asked for in order to complete more of the system. If you live in Seminole County, you may have a long wait.

- To recap using published figures:
- * Ridership: 12 million a year, 33,000 a day
 - * Fare: Between \$1.00 and \$2.00
 - * Farebox? Will recoup 40% of the operating costs.
 - * Operating costs: Between \$16 million and \$20 million.

In order for the above numbers to add-up, only one of two scenarios is possible:

SCENARIO #1 - If proponents of the Light Rail claim an operating cost of \$16 million to \$20 million, then the deficit will only be \$89.6 million to \$112 million. But, wait, with these figures, the ridership decreases to 13,150 a day - a drop of 20,000 riders from the 33,000 figure stated!

SCENARIO #2 - If they claim a ridership of 33,000 riders a day, then the operating costs amount to \$45 million a year with a large deficit of \$27 million a year.

13,150 riders a day will do absolutely nothing to alleviate the traffic congestion of our city. To give you an idea, Hwy 426 (Aloma Ave.) has a daily traffic count of 55,000 cars!

Which scenario is correct? Probably scenario #1, with a low ridership of 13,150 a day. Think of it. \$850 million to implement a system which will carry 13,150 people a day at an annual deficit of \$9.6 million to \$12 million a year! The whole Light Rail project does not make any sense at all, and is doomed to fail miserably!

What is the answer? We must not accept the idea that a transit system must operate in deficit. We also need to approach the mass transportation system as if it is a system that we, all of us, would want to ride. That system needs to be fast. It needs to be an express system taking us to our destination non-stop. It must be comfortable with seating for all and, of course, air conditioned. People should be able to hop in and go with less than a 3 minute wait. As the need arises, the system must have the ability to expand intra-city and to extend easily into an inter-city transit system with a higher speed of up to 200 mph. Both segments need to be compatible with each other-same cars and guideways, but yet different speeds.

We should not even consider building a transit system in Central Florida, still a young and growing area, that is not the very best, and politics should play no part in that decision. We need a new system performing in a manner that will alleviate the congestion of our city and county roadways. A system that will pay its own way, and more than likely will operate at a profit. If we cannot do this, we are placing a reliance upon the public, a tax burden never to be satisfied, and we are going to do it with the knowledge that it did not have to be.

the next two or three years.

To explain the project, minus the acronyms, the Riverwalk project is to extend from Mellenville Avenue, along the Lake Monticello waterfront, westerly out U.S. Highway 17-92 to Wayside Park, a distance of approximately 4.5 miles.

It would be financed through the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) Enhancement Program.

Approximately one year ago, the Orlando Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) adopted an enhancement project for all of Central Florida. It included Sanford's Riverwalk project, but listed it to be accomplished as the last item on a list extending through the year 2004.

Now, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is suggesting the project be moved up significantly. To accomplish this, it would have to

receive approval through the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

Now it appears that based on approvals from all of these entities, design of the walk could begin in fiscal year 1998, with construction to take place around 2001/02.

The remaining acronym, LAP, is the Local Agency Program which the FDOT says establishes that the city's engineers are as good as the state engineers, and allows local governments to administer the programs.

Sanford's Director of Planning and Development, Jay Marder, said it essentially cuts out a level of bureaucracy that enables local governments to get more for their money.

Marder says more good news, in addition to the possibility of an earlier time frame, is that the original proposal called for the city to provide \$150,000 in matching funds. Now, the FDOT

is no longer requiring the local match.

The only area where the city may have to spend money is in the stabilization of the sea wall before a sidewalk area can be developed, as enhancement dollars cannot be spent on repairs.

Marder is presenting the information to the commission at this time, as he believes the city needs to begin preparation for the project now. "The project will involve cooperation with many departments, especially Public Works, Park, and Utilities," he said.

The Riverwalk project is considered a \$1.5 million undertaking that will include sidewalks and bicycle lanes along the entire lakefront over the targeted area.

The item is scheduled for discussion during the work session, Monday beginning at 3:30 p.m., in the city manager's conference room of Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Avenue.

Casting out on your own

If you like a challenge, then you will love fly fishing. "Fly fishing is more of a sport (than spin fishing) because you do have to have some ability," says professional fly fishing instructor Jon Cave. "You can't go out and pick up a fly rod and all of a sudden say 'I'm a fly fisherman,' even if you have the best equipment in the world."

Choosing equipment, learning distance casting, leader construction, fly selection and fly fishing opportunities in Florida are just some of the fundamentals that Cave will teach in his upcoming "Fly Fishing and Casting" course, offered by the Seminole Community College Community Education office.

Cave, an internationally renowned freelance writer/photographer/lecturer and U.S. Coast Guard licensed salt water guide has been a fly casting instructor since 1975.

A resident of Geneva, Cave has taught the course

at SCC since its inception. The course at SCC, according to Cave, is the oldest in the South and one of the oldest in the country.

"It's almost a return to basics," says Cave of the sport. "I always tell people, it's where art and nature merge with sport."

Cave started fishing as a young boy, but got "very, very" serious about the sport of fly casting around 1970. He learned the basics from seasoned veterans of tournament casting, around his home in Indiana.

"When I was a kid, they almost made it seem mysterious and it was tough to get any good instruction. So I did the best I could," he says, reading about the sport in books, making his own leaders and learning by trial and error.

Cave says that learning fly tying is not necessary, but "it's good that they learn how flies perform in the water" so they'll know what to buy.

Cave has fished for everything from bluegills to billfish, salt and freshwater. "It has to be pretty much on fish that will feed in the upper part of the water column," he says.

Fly fishing is a more deliberate type of fishing. I think you need to be more observant," says Cave. In the SCC course, he teaches the biology of fish and he also covers some places where his students can go an expect to catch fish right away.

The course is in-depth, Cave says, two hours, once a week, for six weeks.

The class is open to beginning to experienced anglers, men and women. The sport is becoming more popular with women. "Most people who do take (this class) are really outdoor oriented."

Be ready for the water this summer

The American Red Cross of Central Florida and Water Mania have teamed up again for the second year to offer Avoid Water Accidents through Rescue and Education—or AWARE, a free safety program aimed at teaching parents and children how to avoid risks or hazards in and around water and how to have fun safely.

Florida has the third-highest drowning fatality rate in the country, according to the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. For children, ages 1 through 4, drowning is the leading cause of death in the state.

Water Mania will host the program on four Saturdays throughout the summer, including: May 17, June 21, July 19 and August 16 from 7am-9:30am at its facilities on west U.S. Highway 192. Topics will include staying safe while having fun; self-rescue; out-of-water emergency assistance; rescue breathing and CPR. Other sponsors include: WCPX Channel 6, The Osceola Sentinel, The Osceola News Gazette, WOCL Cool 105.9 and Universal Outdoor.

"The Whales Tales program focuses on safety, but is conducted in an easy-to-learn way

for kids and parents," said Jon Ewing, health services director for the local Red Cross. "The kids really enjoyed the program last year." The Red Cross and Water Mania recommend the following guidelines for keeping children safe in and around water.

RED CROSS WATER SAFETY TIP FOR CHILDREN AGES 6 MONTHS TO 5 YEARS

Maintain constant supervision: Never leave your child unattended in or around any water environment regardless of what skills your child has acquired or how shallow the water.

Don't leave toys in the water: Toys could lure a child back when a parent is not present.

Don't rely on substitutes: The use of flotation devices and inflatable toys cannot replace parental supervision. Such devices could suddenly shift position, lose air or slip out from underneath, leaving the child in a dangerous situation.

Encourage safe practices: Don't assume young children will use good judgment and caution around the water. Children must constantly be reminded to walk slowly in the pool area and only to enter the water with you.

Enroll in a water safety

course with your child: Your decision to provide your child with an early aquatic experience is a gift that will have infinite rewards.

Look for the label: Use Coast Guard-approved life jackets for yourself and your children when boating and fishing.

Water the weather: Know your local weather conditions and prepare for electrical storms. Because water conducts electricity, stop swimming or boating as soon as you see or hear a storm.

Remember CHECK-CALL-CARE: If you come upon a person in an emergency, CHECK the scene to ensure it's safe and CHECK the victim. CALL 9-1-1 or your local emergency

number and CARE for the person until help arrives. **Take an American Red Cross CPR and first aid course:** Knowing these skills can be important around the water and you will expand your capabilities in providing care for your child.

In addition to learning water safety, participants attending the free program will also receive admission into the park for 85 for the entire day. Infants and children under the age of 3 get into the park for free. Participants will also receive \$10 discount coupons for Red Cross CPR, first aid, HIV/AIDS or water safety programs.  several homes in the district which had been improved dramatically over the last 12 months.

Some of the homes are small and the progress is slow and arduous. Others are larger undertakings which will take much longer to complete.

Each is a labor of love.
 A former bus depot at 201 Oak Avenue was tattered and neglected for several years. Trash was often piled around the stucco building and few paid attention to the structure. With some love and attention, the building has been transformed into a bright, cheery business center.

The Welaka Building at the corner of First and Oak, looked tired and was practically hidden beneath years of "modernization." Showing a strong commitment to the community, the owners infused between \$2 and \$3 million to restore the beauty to the building.

Community activist Fred Rogers and his partner have turned a battered old house into an exciting new Bed and Breakfast inn at Third and Park.

Like the picture-perfect houses in *Better Homes and Gardens* houses throughout the historic district are taking on the look they lost years ago.

Nestled under huge oaks, the pink house, accented in green, at 306 6th Street was a tired old house a year or so ago.

Howell said the house at 800 Elm Ave. was "once one of the worst looking houses in Sanford." Today, its bright paint and cheery windows make it one of the nicest.

The home at 601 Magnolia was a burned out shell last year. It looked as if it could never be salvaged, neighbors said. Today, the traditional wood home built atop a stone foundation has returned to the hulking structure it once was. Bright pink paint has been replaced with a

sterner green and the burned structure has once again been made sound.

Steve and Kim Myers' two story salt box home at 718 S. Oak Ave. had been neglected a lot in recent years. But under their loving hands the quaint peach-colored house has been transformed from an eyesore into a beautiful addition to the neighborhood.

A hold grey house at 1217 Oak Ave. has been carefully renovated over the last year. Howell said. It has gone from a shabby home with a past, he said, to a beautiful example of early Sanford architecture.

At the corner of 11th and Magnolia is Commissioner Brady Lessard's home. The house wasn't even in the neighborhood a couple of years ago. Lessard not only had the house moved from French Avenue to its new place, but he and his wife Lisa also restored the old white house to a fine-barn red home.

On 10th Street near Magnolia, Main Street director Jennifer Singelsen and her husband share a lovely two story home that Howell said was "falling apart" a few years ago.

Often overlooked because it is outside the established border of the historic district, Jerry Mills' large house at Second and Holly has been retrieved from the depths of dilapidation and turned into a showplace.

At 306 4th Street, Bob and Linda Kuhn have created a gem of a home around the corner from Diamond Glass, the business they own on Palmetto Ave. Complete with a wide porch and a white picket fence, the house is simply landscaped and inviting.

"These people have all done this work themselves," Howell said of the houses selected for recognition. "They are working hard to make sure they can improve their neighborhood."

1998. "By the year 2000 we're going to reap the benefits of all this big time," said county engineer Jerry McCollum on Friday. The 46A interchange, he said, is crucial to the continued growth

of a business area rated by economic experts as the second hottest in the country.

There's a waiting list of major companies ready to join the ranks of those who have been establishing their headquarters in the Lake Mary/Heathrow/

Sanford area the past five years. Eventually, there will be more than 12 million square feet of office space in the district.

The existing I-4 interchanges at Lake Mary Boulevard and State Road 46 - already swarming - could not handle the future traffic to these work places. The 46A exit had to be added and begun simultaneously with widening projects on Rinehart and Grant Line roads, and CR 46A.

"There are going to be dramatic changes," said county Commissioner Morris, one of the key players in what he called a "10-year war." The brainchild of developer Jeno Paulucci, who envisioned a big business boom for the county, the 46A interchange project faced an endless string of delays and obstacles. Congressman John Mica from the 7th District of Florida, was

one of those who kept the cause alive.

Four years ago the DOT, which is in charge of the building, optimistically looked for construction to begin by 1996 or 1997 at the latest. The estimated cost then was \$12. Then, there were more snags.

Morris and other government and business leaders conducted a Community "Fly-In" to Tallahassee on March 31 and April 1 that helped convince state officials in the legislature to include measures to provide DOT funding.

McCollum said that many Seminole County residents who now go to Orlando for employment, will be part of the high-paying workforce in the county itself, drastically reducing the traffic on I-4. "We'll see this very clearly in the year 2000," he said.

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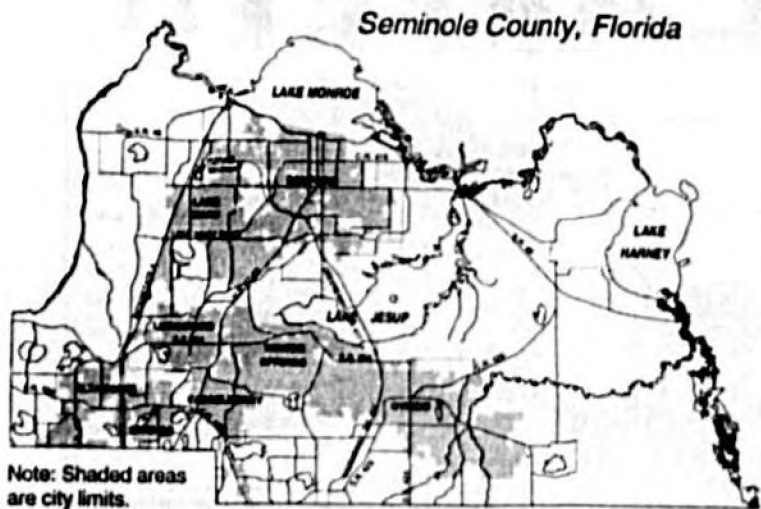

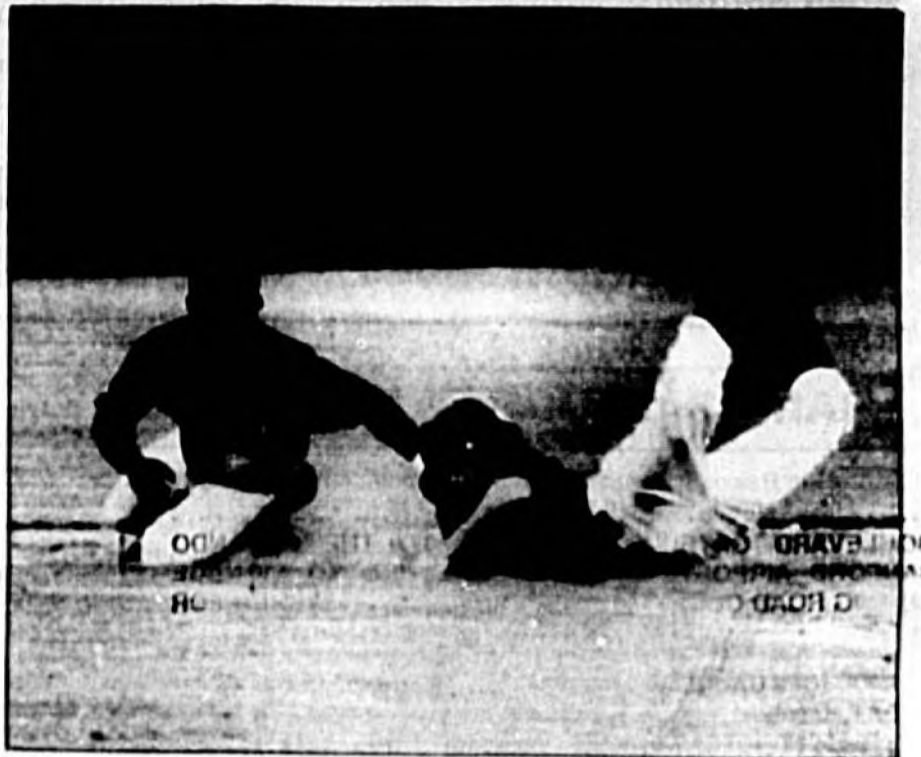

GFC sets 2nd annual Watchable Wildlife Conference

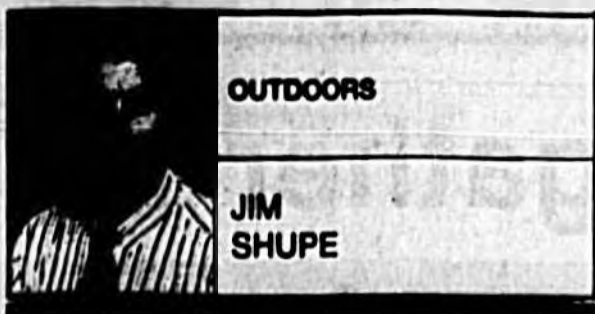

FISHING FORECAST

The river south of Pussie Lake is still great for bass in the 1-to-3 pound range. Tiny Rapalas are hard to beat as the bass are feeding on ditch minnows and grass shrimp. Large lures actually spook bass because they are used to feeding on very small food items. Bream and catfish are also hitting in the deep beds.

Count on good snook action at **Sebastian Inlet**. Large live shrimp fished slowly on plain lead heads are deadly for snook. Small bluefish, jack crevalle, ladyfish and a few redfish round out the action at this popular inlet.

Captain Jack at **Port Canaveral** reports that dolphin are offshore in 120-feet of water on out to 300-feet. King mackerel and cobia are on **Pelican Flats** and **SA Reefs**. Inside the **Port**, expect the usual sheephead and flounder to be cooperating. Trout and redfish are rated as fair on the flats of the **Banana** and **Indian** rivers.

Sheephead and bluefish are the top news at **Ponce Inlet**. Live shrimp and fiddler crabs work well for sheephead, while bluefish will just about anything. Drum, redfish, and jack crevalle are present in good numbers. Trout and redfish are rated as good in **Moquito Lagoon**.

Daly is ready to try tour again

For his sake and that of golf fans everywhere, left's hope Daly is serious about his latest attempt to turn his life around.

You know all about his history. When his head is in the game, he is a delight to watch. Not only can he poke the ball to Tiger-like distances, he has as soft a touch around the green as anyone in the game.

Remember his British Open win at St. Andrew three years ago?

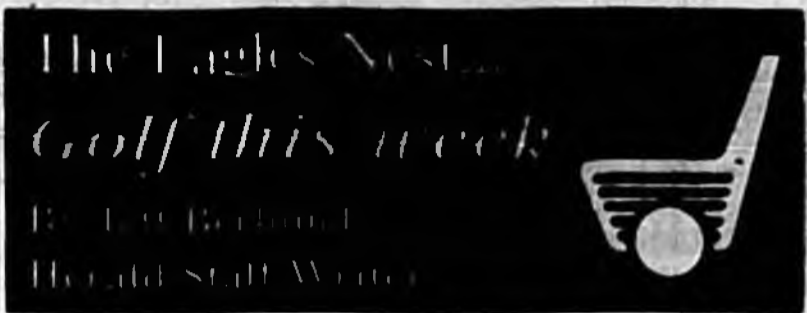
He didn't get that by hitting the ball a mile; it was his touch that gave him his second major.

But that doesn't matter. For the third time, Daly has entered alcohol rehab, doing the Betty Ford thing in California after trashing his hotel room in Ponte Vedra Beach at the Players Championship.

That incident is only one of many that Daly has experienced over the years since his 1991 PGA win when he literally played the tournament out of the trunk of his car.

Remember fighting with the father of another Tour player? Purposely hitting a drive inches over the heads of spectators at a charity event in Portland? Picking up his ball in Hawaii? Consistently and purposely driving into the next group on bad days when he was merely racing around the course?

When he's on, Daly is more exciting to watch than Tiger Woods.



But he hasn't been on in years.

Ask any Tour pro and a large majority will say that Daly is the least popular player in the clubhouse.

None of that matters if Daly is serious about his recovery. After leaving rehab for the second time, Daly stayed sober long enough to win two tournaments before announcing he was ready to be a casual drinker.

The results from Ponte Vedra show that it is not possible for an alcoholic to be a casual drinker.

Now, Daly is out of rehab (by the way, he was in an outpatient program in California, living in a condo rather than on the facility) and he's already planning his golf calendar.

Commissioner Tim Finchem hasn't given Daly the green light yet but Daly is already set to appear in several pro-ams with major PGA stars.

Twice he's tried to rehab and rushed back onto the tour. Two other times, a suspension from the tour for bad behavior didn't work.

For Daly's sake, give him a year off from the tour. If he's really serious about playing again, he'll use the year to think about his life and recovery.

But for Daly to rush back to pick up the millions in guarantees that will surely be offered might make him a wealthy man but it's also a dangerous situation for Daly the person and golf's reputation.
